GIVES INDIANS HALF A MILLION

Washington, D.C., July-(By The Associated Negro Press)-One of the largest distribution of Indian tribal funds in recent years was authorized when the secretary of the interior ordered a per capita payment to the Choctaw Indians of Oklahoma. The total amount of tribal money to be divided among the individual Indians is \$519,975. There ar 20,800 enrolled Choctaws and members of the Choctaw Indian nation that will share equally in the distribution of the money belonging to the tribe.
