He sold two lots of paper to the Government after the agreement with Berthiaume. On an order for 370 reams at 10 cents invoiced at \$2,660, his profit was \$682. A HUNDRED LIVES LOST.

ATHENS, Sept. 12.—The damage done to the Faornina by the collision with the Thessalia was so great that she sank a few minutes after being struck by the Greek steamer. Most of the Faornina's passengers were in their berths where the vessels collided, and the latest estimate is that 100 persons were drowned. The Thessalia was badly damaged forward, but by keeping the purps going the steamer just succeeded in reaching Thaieron.

FIFTHEN LABORERS DROWNED.

LONDON, Sept. 12.—A steam launch carrying non-union laborers from Dublin to Londonderry sank in Lough Foyle yesterday after colliding with the steamer Albatross. Fifteen persons were drowned, among them a child of Graeme Hunter, sgent of the London Grain Federation, who was aboard the launch with his family. The launch came bow on toward the Albatross and struck her sponson. She commenced to sink immediately. The accident occurred in a narrow part of the river, but the night, though cloudless, was dark. An alarm was sounded just before the collision, but it was too late to avoid the accident. Hunter says he is certain he had lights and a good lookout. Important Changes in the Dominion Amending Law.

Building Expensive Public Buildings

OTTAWA, Sept. 11.—When the House met this afternoon Mr. Mackintosh gave an indignant denial to a statement published in L'Electeur to the effect that he had visited Quebec and that Mr. Blanchet had come to Ottawa at the instance of the Government, with the view of making war on Mr. Mercier. RUSSIAN MILITARY MANEUVERS. RUSSIAN MILITARY MANKUVERS.

St. Petersbeug, Sept. 12.—A correspondent who has been visiting the Russian southwestern frontier, at Bessarabia, as far as the Danube, says that troops are rapidly arriving, and in large numbers. This would be the base of departure for a Russian be the base of departure for a Russian army advancing toward the Balkans and Constantinople. At Tutschkoff four regiments were quartered, where last year fliere were only two. At Vulkova and Killa five regiments had recently arrived, in addition to the men already there. At Kaguel three regiments arrived about a month ago, and at Jalpuch reinforcements of 7,000 men have recently taken up their quarters. Troops are pouring at the same rate into other villages. These places are of little consequence apart from their situation, where an army of invasion would naturally concentrate. In view of these facts the correspondent concludes that Russia intends at no distant date to make across the Danube for Constantinople, and that her preparations show that this time she means to have a force sufficient to overthrow all obstacles.

This was but a small beginning, however. Afterward I rofessor Garner obtained many records of monkey speech in the zoological gardens at Chicago and Cincinnati, made notes upon the monkeys' doings at the time they uttered the "words," and took the records home with him for careful study.

CLAD TIDINGS. Beligion and the A committee of seven-teen clergymen of many denominations, with Rev.
Dr. J. H. Barrows at their head, have taken charge of the religious side of the Chicago Exposition. It is proposed to invite repre-sentatives of all faiths and countries to a general conference and discussion with refer-ence to the relation of religion to education, the labor problems, temperance reform, the sentatives of all faiths and countries to a general conference and discussion with reference to the relation of religion to education, the labor problems, temperance reform, the Sabbath question, and, in fact, to the whole life of man. Besides these general assembling as the different denominations will meet separately for conference. Gatherings of Sunday schools and Young People's Societies, of missionary organizations and of the Evangelical Alliance will also be held. The plan is broad, liberal and Christian. We may best describe its intent by quoting from a personal letter written by Dr. Barrows. He says: "It is the purpose to hold a Parliament of Religions, something which has never yet been held, which will promote international fellowship. It is not the idea to compromise Christianity or to offend 'heatheuism,' but to ask representatives of all faiths to speak out frankly and wasitively what truths they have Locaived from the Tather of Lighte. We are inviting men of the most diverse faiths to meet as beetbree. It will, be something new and strange for the Brahmin, the Buddhist and the Parsee to be asked to a parliament like this. We believe it will be a blessing to them to see our Christian civilization, and that it will be a blessing to us to see and hear them. Then we hope to have a larger representation of the sects of Christendom than has ever before been secured; meeting, not for the purpose of worship, but for conference, we may hope to gain the assistance of ecclesiastics who have not usually been seen with 'hereties.' Our unities will be chiefly along ethical lines, but we expect that the congress will show some surprising unities in religious thought and tendency."

Jose Manuel Balmaceda was born in 1840. He is an educated man of resolute will, a fluent speaker and an experienced politician. After serving as deputy in five Legislatures he became Minister of the Interior in 1882. He was one of the founders of the Reform Club in 1868, and in 1874 was an advocate of the separation of Church and State, and as Prime Minister, in 1884, he introduced civil marriage and other liberal laws. He was inaugurated President Sept. 18, 1886, for a term which expires Sept. 18, 1891.

In the beginning of President Balmaceda's administration he fulfilled in a measure the liberal tenuts of his early career. The public revenues were increased

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Geo. Q. Dow of New Hampshire, writes the Country Gentleman as follows: "I do not beliave in breading old sows. I used to think I wenld raise pigs from a sow as long as also would produce them, but from careful observation for the past few years I am pactive that far more satisfactory results are to be obtained from using young sows. By young sows! I mean such as have reached proper size, or practically arrived at maturity. A sow will come in season at a very sarly age—as young as a months—but no person of sense would think of breeding them as that age. Six or 7 months may do, but I praier to wait until the sow is about 10 months old before having her served. At this age she is well matured, all her organs are developed, and she is apoper condition to raise a family. If she proper condition to raise a family, if she prove prolific, a good saliker and gentle mother. I should bessel her just as often as her condition and her formar litter would permit, regardless of whether the pigs came in spring, summer or winfer. I should keep her just as long at this work as I could, allowing each litter of pigs to remain with her until six weeks of age, and no longer. I should permit her to have three, or at the most four illustra, and should than fat and kill her for markes. Old sows are very apt to get heavy, alumay and awkward. The consequence is they step on their pigs, lie on four and are too big and stiff to care much about it. Then, again, they are apt to become poor milkers. It is true they will have big litters in number—for more pigs shan they have the milk or teats for, and as a result their young do not thrive and go ing Sows for Breeding.

Examine you fowls carefully for scaly leg, and treat those showing the least signs of having it. This is a disease well known to all noultry raisers, caused by a gathering of infinitesimal payasites, which comes in prescribly at first in the agevices between the edges of the leg scales, and which increases rapidly, piling up on themselves, forming apparantly greyish-white warts or rough bunches. Picking Off Grape Vine Leaves.

It is a question in the minds of some shether or not it is best to pick off a part of the leaves of the grape vine to let in the sun and assist in maturing the grapes. On this point Mr. Seward, of the Indiana State Board of Agriculture, expresses himself as follows: "Some years ago I had a very fine wine that ran on a trellia a distance of several rods. It bore well and one year gave promise of a fine crop. While I was away one day a man came to my house who 'knew it all.' He persuaded my wife that the way to get nice grapes was to pick off about three-fourths of all the leaves, and, she giving her consent, he forthwith put his theory into practice on my vine. When I returned home and saw what had been done I was very angry and told my wife she would nee the effect of that work in the uneven ripening of the fruit. It turned out as I had said, and when the grapes began to ripen there was hardly a bunch that did not have green grapes mixed with the ripe ones. The fact is that the leaves are the lungs of the plant, and the plant cannot ripen the fruit avenly if a part of them are removed." Picking Off Grape Vine Leaves.

Keeping a Swarm at Home.

A lady bee-keeper was trying to make a warm stay in the hive the other day, and after hiving it the third time, came to the conclusion that she would try the water cure; and as soon as she shook them off the limb into her wire swarm-oather, with the watering can she drenched them with cold water, and then uropped them down in front of the hive. "The result was, she says, "that they laid there pouting on the agrass for some time, scarcely offering to show, but as the sun warmed them they gradually crawled in on the combs. I then poured another can of water over the hive and on the grans around it, and all went in without grumbling as soon as they got dry enough to crawl, and we have no swarm that has done better work since than this one." Ensilage for Sheep.

After referring to the value of such succulent foods as roots and ensilage in feeding fat cattle, the Chicago Breeders' Gazette has this to say regarding rations for sheep.

"On many Western farrast the English breeds of sheep are now for the first time finding a home. These animals have attained their form, size and reputation to the green pastures and turnip fields of England. Can that well-carned reputation be maintained on the average Western farm, where dry feed of the most limited variety is the almost universal rule? We fear not. The venture is a most important one, and is no case should it fail. We need the best of sheep, and the highest attainments across the water are not above our ambition. Intelligent care in handling and the best of buildings will enable us to continue these animals in their high form only when backed up by nutritious foods, ample in amount and palatable in form. If roots have not been grown where these sheep are being bred and fed, then let the silo supply the deficiency. So far as the experiments go good silage provides an admirable substitute."

Floors for Poultry.

We prefer an earthen floor for poultry houses by all means. Use the most mellow soil you can procure. Loam is better than sand; the drier it is the better. If the air in your hennery is full of dust arising from the hens scratching and wallowing, then you may know that the premises are thoroughly disinfected. Especially is it beneficial to have an ample quantity of dry earth under the perches. The dust from fine, dry loam which cettles upon the nest boxes, perches and every part of the woodwork tends to keep off vermin, so that in some cases no whitewashing is necessary. Be sure by all means that the bed of earth which forms the floor it higher than the ground surrounding the building, so that the surface water when there are thaws and rains will not run into the building. As an additional precaution surround the building with a shallow dith communicating, if possible, with the lower ground in the violaity.—[Poultry World. Pumpkins for Pigs.

Pumpkins for Pigs.

The farmer who is so fortunate as to have a good supply of pumpkins has a valuable food in them as a part ration for his fattening hogs. It is claimed by some that hogs will fatten on them as their only food. We would not care to risk the statement so far as to undertake to fit a lot of hogs for market with them. We would feed as many each day as the hogs would eat up clean, and then give them all the corn they would consume besides. Young eat up clean, and then give them all the corn they would consume besides. Young hogs with a ration of pumpkins each day will stand a much longer feeding on corn than they would if fed corn alone. There can be no doubt that the mixed ration will be much better assimilated than the corn when, fed alone. It is a wasteful way of feeding, to throw out enough corn or pumpkins, or both at one time, to last the hogs two or three days. Their food should be given to them sweet and clean, at least twice a day.—[Stockman and Farmer.

Profit from Geese.

Curtis said: "As we are all looking for some means to help ourselves, this is a good question. Geese can be made profitable, as feathers are still in demand. Fence off a pasture or a part of one on a flat, if possible, where there is good water, and confine the geese there. They will live largely on grass. Here they can be kept the year round with suitable shelters. Goslings are hardy and easy to rear. The geese will furnish four crops of feathers if well sheltered.
