A Parnellite Protest.

London, March 8 .- The Parnellites this evening gave out a manifesto to the Irish people signed by John Redmond, Timothy Harrington and Joseph Kenney. The manifesto concludes thus: "We can have no confidence in Earl of Rosebery's Cabinet. The time has come for prompt action. The Irish people will no longer tolerate a policy of national subserviency to English party interests. Let them organize the forces of their race to support the struggle for national Government."

Bomb in Rome.

Rome. March 9 .- Rome is in a state of great excitement, and all sorts of rumors are in circulation, among them being the report that an attempt was made to blow up the Chamber of Deputies. It is also said that the police have obtained valuable information from one of the men taken into custody, and that the authorities are in possession of evidence which would seem to point to a widespread conspiracy to

cause explosions in Rome. Eight persons were wounded by the explosion, including one lady. Six wounded are in the hospital. Most of them are in a serious condition, and one of them is reported to be dying.

London, March 9. - A dispatch from Rome regarding the bomb explosion says: It is believed the purpose of the perpetrator was to have the bomb explode at the hour the debate in the Chamber was expected to end and the deputies and ministers would be filing out. It is probable a massacre was frustrated by a simple incident which is regarded as almost providential. Premier Crispi had begged the indulgence of the Chamber to postpone his reply to questions under discussion on the ground that his voice had failed him owing to a cold. The Chamber thus adjourned earlier than was expected. The force of the explosion made a large breach

in the Chamber of Deputies. The exceptional surveillance recently adopted by the Government probably prevented the miscreant from entering the Chamber and causing a repetition of the Vaillant outrage in the French Chamber. The behavior of soldiers and police was

cool and fearless. Three suspects have been arrested who refuse to give their identity or any account of themselves. The bomb was composed of nitro-glycerine and gunpowder.

British Fighting Portuguese.

LONDON, March 9 .- Port Natal details of the encounter between the British and the Portuguese on the Zambesi River show the matter to have been more serious than first

reported. The African Transcontinental Telegraph Company have been pushing a line from the British sphere through Portuguese territory, the company's officials claiming their rights to build the line across Portuguese possessions had been obtained through an understanding with the Portuguese Governmeut. The Portuguese officials denied this claim, ordering the work stopped until compensation was received from the com-

pany for the use of the territory. The British construction party continued their work, whereupon two cannon shots were fired from the Portuguese fort, warning a saloon-keeper in the rear of the hall, the British to cease work and retire from the river bank. 'It is now about as good as settled," said a prominent Conservative to the Journal to-day, "that Hon. A. R. Angers will leave the Administration as soon as arrangements can be made for his succession." Senator De Boucherville is spoken of as likely to replace him in the Ministry. If an arrangement can be made so as to superannuate Justice Fournier then Mr. Angers will go on the Supreme Court bench, for which he has a liking. The visit of Mr. De Boucherville to Ottawa now is said to be in accordance with this matter.

### ROW IN THE P. P. A. CAMP!

Several of the Officers Have And Almost Caused the Capture of Resigned,

And the "Probabilities" Point to Serious Disruption.

(Associated Press Dispatch.)

WINDSOR, March 8 .- There is a biggest kind of a row going on among the officers of the Protestant Protective Association of Ontario, and as some of the parties concerned are in Windsor, it has caused quite a sensation among the local members. The trouble began through the election of Rev. Mr. Madill, of Bellwood, as grand president, to succeed John McConnell, of Windsor. It is claimed that since shortly after the election, which took place a short time ago at Hamilton, Mr. Madill has been giving his whole attention to the Orange order,

Quebec. The first officer to kick over the traces was E. J. MacRobert, chairman of the London Board of Education. He was elected grand treasurer, but sent in his resignation about two weeks ago, and ex-Mayor Fleming has been appointed in his place for the balance of the term.

About a week ago another resignation found its way to headquarters. This one was from Rev. Mr. Ghent, the Episcopal minister at Walkerville. He held the position of grand chaplain, but so far no one has been appointed to take his place.

Mr. MacRobert is in Windsor now and had a conference with ex-Mayor Fleming this morning. He was seen at the Man-ning House by a reporter but would say nothing more than that he had a mighty small opinion of the grand president. He refused to give any information regarding the trouble, but appeared to be very much disgusted with the way the association was being managed.

It is said that the trouble now going on will either break up the association or cause it to split into two factions.

### IN CONGRESS.

The Tariff Bill Before the Senate-It May Stay There Two Months.

Washington, March 8 .- Mr. Jones (Dem., Dak.) thinks that not less than six weeks will be consumed in debate on the tariff bill aud possibly two months. He also said he did not know what the bill carried in the way of revenues but he did know there would be no deficiency. On the contrary he believed the bill would vield a surplus and the country would, he thought, forgive a party for providing a surplus while at the same time it reduced taxation. Under the bill in its present shape the

whisky tax is raised to \$1 10. The income tax provision of 2 per cent. remains in the bill, but the tax on nonresidents is stricken out.

Cigars are taxed \$5 a thousand. Cigarettes in paper, \$1 a thousand; cigarettes in tobacco, 50 cents a thousand. Lumber remains on the free list; so does raw wool.

Among the articles stricken from the free list are: Apples, beef, mutton and pork; coal, coke and iron ore; sugars. All sugars testing not above 80 degrees pay a duty of I cent per pound, and the

duty increases proportionately with the grade. Coal is made dutiable at 40 cents a ton,

and coke at 15 cents. Barley and barley pearled, patent or hulled, is raised from 25 to 30 per cent. ad valorem, and barley malt from 35 to 40 per cent.

Raw wool is left on the free list, the provision to go into effect Aug. 2, 1894. Carpets remain unchanged. The reduction in duties of wool take effect Dec. 2, 1894. Wool of sheep, hair of camel, goat, alpaca, etc., advanced and improved in various forms, is subject to duties ranging from 15 to 35 per cent.

### THE BABY CRIED

Two Slaves.

Hector the Black Knight's Interesting Story-A Queer Box of Merchandise-A Daring Escape From Slavery - A Whipping Overseer That Got Whipped -An Act of Kindness and Its Result,

Hector, the Black Knight, lectured in the King Street Methodist Church last night, and the crowd could hardly be accommodated. The lecture was preceded by a short programme, in which the members of the choir took part. The Black Knight is the same judicious mixture of blackness, fun, laughter and wisdom that charmed London people during the prohibition campaign. Although darkhued himself his lectures are full of sunshine, and he told his life tale last night and the story of his parents' life ond escape from slavery in a way that brought tears-at one time of laughter and again of commiseration—from many of his hearers.

The pastor, Rev. Walter Rigsby, occupied the chair. "I wish I could fill the church as well myself," said he is intro-

ducing the speaker. "Black up," was Mr. Hector's laconic reply and the crowded audience laughed

heartily. Continuing Mr. Hector stated that his lecture was on his life, a subject not of his own choice. It was based on incidents connected with the escape of his father and mother from slavery. His parents were slaves near Harper's Ferry, Virginia. Their escape was mainly the result of an act of kindness. And the speaker went on to explain that an act of kindness would gladden many a heart forever; but some people did not think so and did not practice it. His father saved his master's son's life, and the latter promised to do anything he asked him to. Then one day the overseer whipped his mother, and when the night came his father whipped the overseer. That meant sale for his father, and the latter went to the son whose life he had saved and reminded him of his promise. The latter was as good as his word, and assisted the slave, his wife and little baby to escape. He drove them the greater part of one night and left them in a thick wood with gold in the father's pocket, and ammunition at

morning he would personally see that the St. L. McIntosh, W. S. Ireland and Geo. slave hunters and the hounds were started Gott, of Amherstburg. in the opposite direction. The underground railroad brought the family to Pennsylvania and to the black man's friends-the Quakers and the Abolitionists. From Pennsylvania they reached Detroit, and then came trouble. How were they to get across? Kidnappers patrolled the river banks and ferry boats day and night. One day a dray drove down to the ferry with a large merchandise box on board labeled "Glass. This side up-handle with care." This case contained Mr. Hector's father, mother, and little sister. There were air holes for ventilation, and as many luxuries as the narrow quarters would admit. But when they reached the middle of the river their trouble began afresh, It was the same trouble that they had experienced all along the route, and that at several times had threatened to give them away when hard pressed.

"That baby was sure to cry at the very time you did not want her to," said Mr. Hector. "And when I see a woman in the audience with her child I always feel for her more than I do for her neighbor who has left her baby at home. For I know what it is for that woman to get to church with her child. She has got to get her baby ready, and then she has got to get herself ready. And when a woman gets through getting ready she has done something. (Laughter.) I have often heard my mother repeat the story of that time on the boat. She said as baby began to cry she applied every art that was known to her to hush her, but baby cried right on. She said that she did not know what else to do only what she had done many a time before in times of great peril-she prayed. Right in that box she prayed that God would hush to God before baby was sound asleep. So sound asleep that even the hammering on the box when it was being opened in Windsor did not waken her-which proves to you and I that God answers prayer. Then as my father and mother were delivered out of the box they got down on their knees and thanked God for having brought them in safety to Windsor, Canada, where colored men are free. (Ap-

plause.)

Then the lecturer went on to tell how his father and mother both died of cholera and five children (including himself) were left alone. Then he was adopted into a family, the head of which sent him out with 25 cents and a long black bottle. "If you will have drink," said Mr. Hector, "go for it yourself and don't send your children into these rooms of sin and wrong.' (Applause.) Then for nearly an hour the lecturer held his audience at cone time laughing, again silent and thoughtful, as he unfolded the story of his life-his life as a drunkard, as a soldier, as a railway engineer (the first black man to drive an engine in New York State), and his life as a preacher. The lecture, besides being a source of amusement and merriment, was interspersed with many a moral. "I don't think that a man has any more right to blow tobacco smoke into the air that I breathe," said the lecturer, "than he has to spit tobacco juice into the water I drink, for I have to take them both down. He held the young women largely responsible for the tobacco habit among the young men. "Young women are so anxious to have a beau that they will go with anything that has a hat, a cane and a cigarette." (Laughter.) The Black Knight pronounced the bene-



Sir Leonard Tilley's Wondrous Prophecies and What Came of Them.

(Hon. David Mills at Delaware.) Let us consider for a moment the causes Let us consider for a moment the causes of the depression which reached us from 1875 to 1880. We had, at that time, an insolvency act upon the statute book. There were official assignees in every country. SIR LEONARD TILLEY,
in submitting to the House his first protec-

tive tariff in 1879, said: "By the last return I have, which covers the year 1877, the balance of trade against England is shown to be \$700,000,000 a year \* \* But last calendar year showed the balance in favor of the United States had reached \$300,000,000 a year. I think, then, without entering into a discussion here offree trade and protection, so far as it affects England and the United States, we may fairly conclude that the prosperity of the one country at this moment is caused by the large surplus in its favor, and the depression in the other by the large deficiency. Under these circumstances it appears to me we should turn our attention to the best means of reducing the volume of our imports from all parts of the world."

Could anything show better than this exract how totally unacquainted with the first rudiments of political economy and of I can give you a better illustration of this fallacy than that presented by Webster nearly 70 years ago in the Senate of the United States. He said:

"Some years ago, in better times than the present, a ship left one of the towns of New England with \$70,000 in specie. She proceeded to Mocha, on the Red Sea, and there laid out these dollars in coffee, drugs, spices, and other articles procured in that market. With this new cargo she proceeded to Europe; two thirds of it were seld in Holland for \$130,000, which the ship brought back and placed in the same bank from the vaults of which she had taken her original cutfit. The other third the Chambers Street Hospital on Tuesday was sent to the ports of the Mediterranean, for the first time in their experience tested imported, which was \$100,000 more than was exported, and is, therefore, proof of an unfavorable balance of trade to that amount in this adventure.'

If the ship had foundered at sea the exports would have been \$70,000 and the imports would have been nothing at all, and yet, according to Sir Leonard Tilley's view, the second transaction would evidence prosperity, while the results of the other points in the opposite direction. And the following year we find the Minister of Finance congratulating the House on the fact that our exports have at last become equal in value to our imports.

Now, let me say here, that when Sir Leonard Tilley spoke of the United States being prosperous and the trade of the United Kingdom depressed, his statement was at variance with the facts. The depression in the United States was much greater than in England, and it was to this fact that we must attribute the far greater shrinkage in values in the manufactures of the United States than in England at this period. Sir Leonard Tilley has spoken of the period of his retirement offered as just as good. Take "Putman's" from office in 1873 as one of unusual pros- only.

perity, and that of 1878 of his return to office as one of very great depression. In effect he said in his budget speech of 1879: "We, gentlemen, made the country pros-perous, Sir Richard Cartwright made it the very reverse. We are back in power to make you prosperous again. The country is iil; it needs skillful physicians; the task we have before us is a formidable one, but it is not one beyond our ability to accomplish." What, let me ask you, had Sir Leonard Tilley done as a Finance Minister before November, 1873, to make the country prosperous? What did Sir Richard Cartwright do subsequently to make it attention.

make it otherwise? The truth is that the extension of commerce, the activity of our trade, the stimulus which foreign demands gave to industrial pursuits here, were as independent of anything that Sir Leonard Tilley or those associated with him, did, as the coming of the day is of cock-crowing.
When the communities with which we traded were engaged actively in commercial pursuits, we were in the current with them, and moved on satisfactorily; when they were depressed, and their in-dustrial establishments were closed, and they no longer required what we had to sell, we partock with them in part in the industrial depression. Sir Leonard Tilley assumes that prices both at home and abroad are under the control of the Government and are regulated by fiscal legislation; that the country is in debt to the amount that its imports exceed in value its exports, and that it is the duty of the Government, and it is one of the things

which he proposes to accomplish, to reduce the value of imports from all parts of the world, and in this way keep the country from commercial bankruptcy. Now, let me say to you, that ever since the provinces of British North America have become politically united, there has been a balance of trade against them, with the exbalance of trade against them, with the exception of one year. Our imports have nominally exceeded in value our exports by nearly \$600,000,000, or about \$22,000,000 a year. Where are our creditors for this large sum? Who are they who have had the folly to trust the importers of Canada for large sums which have never been paid? This, if true, might be very dishonest; but would it not rather militate against the prosperity of those who trusted us, and who have never been paid, than against the prosperity of those who buy and pay not? Does not everybody see, apart from the conclusive illustration which I have given you, that this cannot be so? England has, Sir Leonard Tilley admits, run behind, acording to his notions of political economy, \$700,000,000 a year. At the end of ten years this means \$7,000,000,000. If this were a correct view, instead of growing more wealthy she would become yearly poorer. Instead of lending money to other countries, she would be in debt to every country in the world. The decennial census which are taken contradict this theory. Her fixed capital annually increases. The income of her population becomes annually greater. Every return made contradicts the theory which our political opponents have attempted to act upon. The Euglish nation are the great carriers of the world. Her

great natural resources, they admitted that imcreased imports represent not merely the value of her exports, but what she earns in the carrying trade, the profits upon her foreign commerce, and the interest upon her foreign investments. And when the United States returns showed that her imports fell short \$300,000,000 of the value of her exports, it was not an evidence that she had received for her exports \$300,000,-000 in cash. Her returns show that the export of gold and silver was, at the same time, equal to her imports of these metals.
The United States have railways built trusted, how ill they were qualified to be placed in charge of the supreme direction carried in foreign bottoms; a considerable portion of her public debt is held abroad, and when her exports exceeded, in value, her imports, it only proved that that exaims, the hopes and expectations of our cess was used to pay the interest on public political opponents in respect to the tariff.

license commissioners in the past. Those who know Mr. John McClary, Mr. J. W. Little, Mr. Daniel Regan, Mr. Charles Elliot, and Mr. Geo. M. Reid, and other estimable citizens who have from time to time, served their Province in performing a duty that, from the nature of it, can never be very pleasant, can estimate at its full value the present attack on these gentlemen.

What our city contemporary pines for is a return of the times when Mr. Carling bossed the election of the City Council; when Mr. Carling's ward agents controlled the issuing of licenses; when Mr. Carling's political emissaries compelled the granting of 100 or more licenses in the city of London, when the population was not over half what it now is.

These were the halcyon days of "municipal control," with the Brewery Boss on the top every time.

The Free Press indorsed the unwarranted attempt to have the full control of the liquor traffic centralized in Ottawa, so that the administration of the law might be in the hands of its political friends. It now sighs for the return of the domination of the Brewery in municipal affairs. That will not be. The Crooks Act has been generally indorsed, by all outside the magnetic influences of the Brewery, as the best license act that Ontario has ever had. NO TORONTO PAID AGENT CAN REPRESENT LONDON.

The references in Toronto newspapers to our former fellow-townsman, Mr. W. R. Meredith, Q.C., of that city, are of special interest to Londoners now that the London Conservative managers have put him up as their candidate in the coming election for the Legislature in this city.

All the cartoons in the Toronto journals have illustrated the view that prevails there—even among honest Conservatives that Mr. Meredith has accepted the position of solicitor of that city, receiving an income for the office of \$13,500 a year, because he despairs of ousting Sir Oliver Mowat, and therefore cannot afford to let the Telegram newspaper puts it-which

The new development has caused the Toronto Star, in bantering terms, to thus refer to London:

"Little London up in the woods should be proud that it has as its representative in

No one has ever called Mr. Meredith's ability as a lawyer in question. We presume that he will be able to serve the city of Toronto, which has bought his services at a high price, with faithfulness. In all matters relating to that city, which, as we have already pointed out, is a rival to every other city in the Province, he may be depended on to carry out the promise which he publicly made the day after his appointment-to give his first attention to his new clients, that is, the people of Toronto. It would be dishonorable on his part to accept \$13,500 a year to safeguard the interests of Toronto, and, as occasion offered, to work against his clients, the people of that city, in which he long since concentrated his interests. We cannot expect Mr. Meredith to work against Toronto when questions affecting that city and London come before him. His friends may tell us that he will work against Toronto; he may even so promise himself, but it does not stand to reason that he can serve two masters. As another Toronto Conservative journal says in speaking of residents of Toronto who represent outside places, "The fact is that a member cannot serve two constituencies without at some time or other finding that their interests come into conflict." This is said of men who merely live in Toronto and are elected in outside constituencies, and are not retained, to the tune of many thousands of dollars, to work for Toronto's interests-to work all the harder when the interests of rival centers, like London, conflict with those of their clients. We believe that we voice the views of the large majority of the citizens of London-merchants, manufacturers, organized labor-when we say that no can- restoration to the old service of one train a didate who is city solicitor of a rival city, and bound at all times to work for the interests of that corporation, can be elected to represent this self-respecting and progressive community.

Mr. Meredith cannot be elected in London. He should have a seat in Toronto, whose paid advocate he has become.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE. The following is the full text of the resolution proposed by Mr. Marter with re-

gard to Government House, Toronto: "That in the opinion of this House the maintenance of Government House and the establishment connected therewith at the expense of the Province should, after the expiration of five years from the appointment, or other earlier determination of the term of office of his honor the present

Lieutenant-Governor be discontinued." The discussion which took place in the Legislature developed the fact that the passage of the resolution would practically mean nothing. The present Legislature is n its dying days. Many of the members on both sides will doubtless not be in the new Assembly. But it will be easy for the electors to commit the candidates offering the principle that Government House

shall be abolished during their term. There would be some sense in that course, if it is conceded that no change shall take place till Lieut.-Gov. Kirkpatrick completes his term three or four years hence.

Mr. Marter asserted in the Legislature that the ADVERTISER favors his motion. The Advertiser cannot indorse a resolution that accomplishes nothing, and that is apparently meant to obtain for the member some election capital merely. We fayor now, as we favored seven years ago, when Mr. Meredith and others opposed the reform, the complete and immediate abolition of the Lieutenant-Governor's establishment at Toronto, unless he consents to maintain it himself.

It is impossible to legislate ahead, as some of our contemporaries have suggested is the intention of Mr. Marter's resolution. But we cannot see why, if abolition is not decreed at once, the question should not be addressed to every candidate for Legislative honors, "Are you ready, at the earliest possible moment, in the new Assembly, to vote for the abolition of the Lieutenant-Governor's establishment at Toronto?" Let us suppose that the majority on both sides of the House were so pledged, legislation making the change would follow the mandate, and it the Dominion Government desired to keep up the establishment, in spite of the verdict of the Province, till Mr. Kirkpatrick's term ended, or beyond that time, as suggested by the chief Conservative organ in Toronto, on the Ottawa Administration would be the onus of disregarding the popular verdict.

We believe with Mr. Balfour, M.P.P.. hat Government House is like the Ottawa Senate, as now constituted, an excresence on the body politic, to be got rid of at as early a date as possible. To pass abstract resolutions that cannot be carried out for years would be to indulge in child's play. The people want action.





Another Day's Debate on the Budget.

Members for Toronto and Attack the Government.

Flimsy Character of the Opposition's Arguments Self-Evident,

PARLIAMENT HOUSE, TORONTO, March 8. -During recess, W. D. Balfour introduced a deputation to Sir Oliver Mowat. It represented the County Council of Essex, and was composed of Warden Hairsine, Reeves Wintemute, Watson and Barrett and County Clerk McKee. Their object was to secure special aid from the Government in the enlargement of the county jail. The chief argument adduced was that the criminals incarcerated, owing to the county being a border one, were largely from over the line. During the past ten years, of 1,894 persons placed in jail, 960 were foreigners. The matter will be carefully weighed.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.) PARLIAMENT HOUSE, TORONTO, March 8. -Mr. F. D. Clarke resumed the budget debate in the Legislature this afternoon. He said that Mr. Harcourt had asked the House to exult in the fact that the receipts of the Province last year were \$4,291,914. but it should not be forgotten that almost \$2,000,000 of this sum had been gotten by a disposal of valuable assets of the Province -timber. There was no cause for congratulation in such a fact. It was a serious matter that the annual expenditure did not come within the ordinary revenue of the Province, but that the required sum had to be made up by the disposal of Provincial timber. Turning to the question of liquor licenses, Mr. Clarke said that Mr. Harcourt had rejoiced in the diminution of the liquor traffic, as indicated in the fact that last year there were 365 less licenses issued than in the previous year. He did, too, but the Government had no reason to take special credit for itsself through this condition of affairs. It was due to the strong temperance feeling that was growing in the Province and not to any special action taken by the Government. It was observable, however, that the Provincial Treasurer was as silent as a dumb oyster in regard to whether the Government was going to perpetuate the out-rage of administering licenses solely to a

view of aggrandizement and prestige. Succession duties were, Mr. Clarke said, another tax and a proper tax, he thought, imposed purely for the purpose of enabling the Government to prevent the disparity between ordinary revenue and ordinary expenditure becoming greater than it had been during the past few years. The deficiency in the five years just concluded had been \$2,359,794, and, in this period. while the ordinary receipts had only increased 2 per cent., the ordinary expenditure had risen 15 per cent. A Brief Sketch of Him-Dr. Antliff Will Stay Till June-Resolution of Regret.

The reason for calling the meeting was to consider the resignation of Dr. Antliff, which had been formally handed in. In stating the case to the board Dr. Antliff submitted the correspondence in the matter and made plain the circumstances leading up to his resignation. The doctor, however, assured the board that though he was expected to start on his new duties at once he would remain with them until the end of the conference term in June.

A number of the board made very feeling reference to their connections with Dr. Antliff. The church had, they said, been very successful, and all departments had prospered both spiritually and financially. The meeting concluded with the passing of a resolution expressing regret at their pastor being compelled to sever his connections with the church, and wishing him success in his new field of labor.

The question of calling another pastor to replace Dr. Antliff was left with a committee. It was decided that the call be extended to Rev. Wm. H. Emsley, of Montreal, and conference will doubtless ratify the appointment.

A BRIEF SKETCH

of that gentleman will be of interest: Rev. Wm. H. Emsley, of the Mountain Street Methodist Church, Montreal, was born on March 9, 1850, in the town of Barnsley, in the west riding of the county of York, England. His father, Joseph Emsley, proprietor of the Flockton Main colliery and linen manufacturer, was likewise a native of Yorkshire, and son of Wm. Emsley, of Cudworth, long noted in the county as a front rank educationist.

Joseph Emsley married Elizabeth Wiles, who was born in the West Indies, and who with her brothers had been sent to England to obtain the advantages of higher education. Mr. Emsley, the present clergyman, was educated in the grammar school of his native town and in London. His studies were principally guided with a view to the practice of law, for which profession he was designed. This purpose, however, was overruled, and accordingly, in the winter of 1870, in company with two companions-Revs. James Strothard and Caleb Parker-Mr. Emsley crossed the Atlantic and joined the Eastern British-American Conference of the Methodist Church, being sent to Truro as assistant to Rev. John Read, who was then in delicate health. After a short residence, however, his health became unsettled, and he returned to England, obtaining an appointment in the civil service, which he relinquished to enter the East London Training Institute for Christian Workers, and to assist in the secretary's office of the Children's Home, with which institution he was associated. He did mission work in the east end of London until the summer of 1874, when he returned to Canada, and was at once engaged to supply a vacancy caused by death on the Maynooth Mission of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada. With this conference he remainded identified until the consummation of the union of the various Methodist churches in 1884, when the arrangement brought him into the Bay of Quinte

Conference limits. Ordained in the year 1878 in Toronto, his appointments have been respectively Trenton, Newcastle, Markham, Newcastle (a second time), Magnetawan, Minden, Bobcaygeon, Lindsay and Napanee, Brockville, and Montreal, where he now is. On Aug. 29, 1878, Mr. Emsley married Susie, youngest daughter of the late Henry Major, of Pickering. Mr. Major was one of the leading men of his county, and was a successful agriculturist. It may be interesting, as indicative of the rapid development of our country, to know that Mr. Major once owned what is now valuable property in Toronto, then Little York, and that he traded it for a snare in a flat boat on Lake Ontario, and was well satisfied with his bargain. His sons the Major brothers, of Whitevale, are, worthily following in their father's steps. Mr. Emsley is a young man just in the prime of life. He has, however, occupied the leading pulpits in his conferences, and with reasonable anticipation has many years of service before him.

Rev. Mr. Emsley was wired the invitation to the pastorate here, and to-day a telegram of acceptance was received.

CANADIAN TRADE RETURNS.

Interesting Facts Collated From the

Government Blue Books.

OTTAWA, March 8 .- The new trade returns furnish the following facts: The foreign trade of Canada is more than \$10 a head of the population less than it was when Sir Richard Cartwright was Finance Minister. This is what the Government organs call "a most satisfactory showing." At the same time, the customs duties have increased by nearly \$1 per head, the public debt from \$129,000,000 to \$300,000,000. Special efforts have been made, and heavy subsidies paid, to increase trade with the West Indies, but our trade with those islands was less last year than it was ten years ago, and we sold them less than we did twenty years ago. Special attention has been paid to trade with Australia, yet Canada exported \$370,000 in 1878, and in 1893 only \$288,000. Our exports to Newfoundland were less in value last year than they were twenty years ago. Our imports from Newfoundland last year were only a little over a third of what they were twenty years ago. In 1873 our total trade with Newfoundland was \$4,609,552; in 1893 it had fallen to \$3,247,903. Our total trade with Great Britain was more in the ten years 1873-1882 than it was from 1883-1892. The only important trade which shows a per capita increase is the trade with the United States. The bounty paid on pig iron last year represented an output for Canada of 47,000 tons. It was 40,000 as far back as 1887, so that the furnace men have a right to complain of the low import duty on foreign scrap iron, which displaces pig. The bounty was paid to three concerns, with the exception of a few dollars,

BOUNCING THE MAGISTRATES.

Chicago's Sixteen Police Justices and Their Menials Must Resign.

CHICAGO, March 8 .- Mayor Hopkins has come to the conclusion that many of the police justices of Chicago are corrupt, and he called for the resignations of every police justice, clerk and bailiff in the city. Mayor Hopkins says:

"I think we have more police courts than we need. I see no reason why police magistrates should be employed in courts where the trial of the whole docket does not take more than an hour or two."

There are sixteen justices and twice as many clerks and bailiffs. The chief cause for the removals is the charge that the justices will not drive crooks out of town or send them to jail.



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

ders and give the owners an opportunity to supply the checks. A tender was also accepted for a supply of a patent preservative of board sidewalks, but the article will be used only at the option of the engineer.

At the next meeting of the committee tenders for street sweeping will be let. W. J. Austin and W. Richards, on behalf of the Knights of Sherwood Forest and the Juvenile Foresters respectively, applied for the use of the agricultural hall for two nights a week for drill purposes, until the opening of the fair. For the last year or so the hall has been granted free, but this year the committee considered the advisability of fixing a fee.

Ald. Garratt moved that the city supply an electric light and remove and replace the fixtures, and charge 40 cents a night.

Engineer Graydon suggested that some steps be taken in regard to the lane in rear of the wholesale block on the west side of Richmond street between King and York, and the lane in rear of some buildings on the east side of Richmond, near King street. The owners had refused to improve them, and they were in a filthy condition. It was referred to the council.

AT LAST!

Daniel Coughlin is Once More a Free Man -Close of an Event ul Era in His History.

CHICAGO, March 8 .- Daniel Coughlin is free man to-night. For the first time since the morning of May 18, 1889, when he was stripped of his detective's star and placed under arrest, he enjoys the precious boon of personal liberty. Once convicted of murder and conspiracy, consigned by the verdict of the jury to the penitentiary for the term of his natural life, granted a new trial as the result of errors in the previous proceedings; brought back from Joliet after three years of incarceration, a jury of his peers this afternoon declared as the outcome of a second trial that has occupied four months and four days, that he had neither part nor parcel in the assassination of Dr. Patrick

Henry Cronin. The jury retired on the stroke of 11 o'clock, and shortly before 4 o'clock came to an agreement. When the clerk read the verdict: "We find the defendant, Daniel Coughlin, not guilty," for a moment not a soul stirred. Then came a cheer. A hundred throats joined in and pande-

monium prevailed, no effort being made by the court attaches to maintain decorum. Coughlin seemed stunned as the words fell from the clerk's lips. Then by an effort he arose from his seat, pushed back the crowd, and exclaimed in triumphant tones, "Boys, justice has come at last." The crowd gave an answering cheer. Pausing for a moment to wring the hand of his father, Coughlin jumped into the jury box and thanked every man in turn, while the

tears streamed down his face. In the meantime Coughlin's faithful little wife had heard the news and hurried to the court room. Coughlin was about to pass out through the judges' chamber, when a cry was raised by 100 voices "Dan, Dan, come back; here's your wife." The ex-detective turned just in time to catch his helpmeet, as, sobbing and half-fainting, she fell into his arms. After waiting some time for the crowd to disperse, Coughlin, his wife and father managed to reach a carriage and were driven to the home that the ex-detective had left four years ago.
