David Caplan, Last of Wanted Men, Captured Near Seattle.

CHICKEN RANCH

Concerning Blowing Up of Several Buildings.

[Canadian Press.] Seattle, Wash., Feb. 19 .- David Caplan, last of the men wanted at Los Angeles, Cal., in connection with the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building in the fall of 1910, was ar-rested last night on his chicken ranch two miles inland from Rolling Bay,

Bainbridge Island, twelve miles from Seattle. Caplan, according to Walter R. Thayer, manager of the Seattle branch of the William J. Burns Detective Agency, admitted his identity and expressed a willingness to return to Los Angeles for trial. He was taken to Port Orchard, where he was placed in

jail, under an armed guard. For two years he has been living under the name of Frank Moller on a small chicken ranch back of Rolling Bay. He also conducted a barber shop in Rolling Bay. He was found, Thayer said, through information gathered by William J. Burns after the arrest of Schmidt last Saturday in New York. Caplan was arrested at 9 o'clock last night by a deputy sheriff and five private detectives.

Glad It's Over. He was in bed when the officers burst into his cabin, telling him that he

was recognized as David Caplan. 'That's me; I'm glad it's over," Caplan said, according to a statemen Thayer made here today. Thayer said Caplan told him he was "willing to go back to Los Angeles and face the

"We found much valuable evidence in Caplan's cabin," said Thayer. "Be sides several letters and other documents, implicating several San Francisco men in Caplan's activities, we found three sticks of 80 per cent dynamite similar to that bought near Richmond, Cal., and used to destroy the Times building.

"Caplan has aged somewhat since we lost track of him four years ago. His hair has turned grey, but he looked to be in good health.

Has a Family. "From papers found in Caplan's cabin, we learned that he has a wife, Mrs. Terence Caplan, and two children

living in Chicago. "Caplan said that for two years before buying his property at Rolling Bay he had been roaming about the world, having gone to London, Paris, and other European cities. Caplan's bank book shows that he has been well supplied with money from outside sources. Valuable evidence connecting these sources with the dynamiting conspiracy was found among Caplan's papers.

"Our New York office has also discovered evidence connecting J. B. Mc-Namara, Caplan and Schmidt with the explosion which damaged the Lyon building in Seattle in 1910, just before the Times explosion. The three men according to the evidence we have gathered, were sitting in the railway sta-tion in Seattle waiting for a train at the hour the explosion occurred."

Quebec, Feb. 19.—Both Houses of the Legislature have decided to amend the law for remedying certain disabilities suffered by married women whose husbands have died intestate. In substance the bill provides that the surviving consort shall receive at least one-third, and under prescribed conditions one-half the estate, whereas at present the surviving consort, if no will exists, and when separated from her husband as to property, is excluded from the estate.

HOLLAND SENDS

If Dutch Ship Is Sunk, the Kaiser's Land Will Be Responsible.

THE HAGUE (via London), Feb. 19. -1:45 a.m.—An official statement issued by the Netherlands Government gives contents of the note of protest sent to Germany on that Government's establishment of its sea war zone.

The note declares that the Netherattitude to both Great Britain and Gernany and protests against Germany declaring as a theatre of war such an enormous stretch of water which peaceful neutral vessels may not safely enter or cross. It adds that the sinking of erchantmen on suspicion without arrest or search, would contravene in-ternational law, and that if a Dutch ship were thus sunk the Netherlands would hold Germany responsible.

The Government of the Netherlands as refused a request for war vessels Dutch merchant ships through the marine areas prescribed by Germany, on the ground that such action would enhance the risks of ships without such escorts.

COLONIAL SHIPBUILDING. THE one certainty regarding the issue of the present crisis is, says Engineering, a bigger conception of the future of the British Empire. There will be changes. So far as Britain is concerned, the duty of the United States is to be strictly neutral.

But as a sincere admirer of the neighboring state, The Advertiser does believe that the United States is as much the big brother of Bel-gium as Great Britain. By signing The Hague conventions the United States assumed a protectorate over every weaker nation. 





> LONDON, Feb. 18.—7:55 p.m.—Lieutenant Arthur Martin-Leake, of the Royal Army Medical Corps, has been awarded a clasp to the Victoria Cross, an extremely unusual honor. Lieut. Martin-Leake won the Victoria Cross in the South African war and, as this decoration is bestowed only once on an individual, the clasp has been 8th of November, near Zonnebeke, in rescuing, while exposed to a constant fire, a large number of wounded who were lying close to the enemy's

ideutenant E. W. Alexander, of the Royal Field Artillery, has been awarded the Victoria Cross for saving his guns at Elouges, Belgium, while under a flank attack, and for rescuing a wounded man, while under a heavy fire. Awarded a V. C.

Among others who have received the Victoria Cross are: Drummer William Kenny for rescuing men on five occasions while under fire and twice say F. A. Depass, all of whom were killed, for leading attacks on German trenches and rescuing wounded; James Mackenzie, of the Scots Guards, who also was killed, and Privates Henry Robson, of the Royal Scots; Abram Acton, and James Smith, of the Border Regiment, and Lieutenant Philip Neame, of the Royal Engineers for rescuing wounded, and Lance Corporal Michael Leary, of the Irish Guards, for conspicuous bravery at Cuinchy, February 1. Killed Eight Germans.

Leary, according to the official account, formed one of a storming party, which advanced against the German trenches. He rushed to the front and killed five Germans, who were holding the first barricade, after which he attacked the second barricade, which he captured after killing three Germans and taking two others prisoners. Leary thus, says the official report, practically captured the enemy's position by his efforts and prevented the rest of the attacking army from being

The Tennessee arrived here yesterday from the Syrian coast. Refugees on board say that Hassan Bey, the commander at Jaffa, has a rather overbearing manner and that he treats nationals of the entente powers with great rigor. Reports of a great Turkish victory in Egypt, printed in letters of gold, have been posted in Jaffa. The people have been told that Ismalia and Suez have been occupied by the Turks, who are now marching on Cairo. Graphic descriptions were given of the alleged sinking of several British cruisers in the Suez Canal and caused the greatest jubilation. The Turkish casualties in these engagements were given as ten nen killed and twenty-five wounded There was great rejoicing also at Jeru salem, where a large amount of ammunition was expended in the firing of guns to celebrate the event. Nationalists of the entente powers, Great Britain. France and Russia were insulted by the populace and compelled to re-main indoors. Six wounded German officers have been brought to Jerusalem, where Bach Pasha, the German com-

mander, has his headquarters.

Germans Are Pessimistic.

Some of the Arabs rebelled against the recruiting order and several of them had to be shot before they would advance. It appears, according to the information brought by these refugees, that while Constantinople was anxious to attack Egypt, the Germans desired merely to menace the British and compel them to hold troops in Egypt. The Germans who participated in the fighting, still speak of the hardships of the trip across the desert and some of them expressed the opinion that Turkish success was impossible. It is said there were six hundred German officers and men in the Turkish army, which undertook the expedition to Egypt. This trained Anatolians, with a number of Arabs and Bedouins.

He declares: "Peace depends more than ever upon the work in the fields this spring. The power of the state is conditional upon the productiveness of agriculture."

LONDON, Feb. 18 .- 3:30 p.m. -The anxiety felt here concerning the demands Japan made upon China in the course of the negotiations which almost immediately followed the occupation by Japan of the German concession of Kiao Chow, was exemplified in a request made in Parliament this afternoon for the publication of the text of these demands.

Answering his questioner Foreign Secretary Grey, said: "I am not at present in a position to communicate to the public information on this subject which has been given me confidentially by the Japanese Government."
