



PEACE PACT FOR

Expected to Do Away With War for Many Years to Come.

Washington, April 25 .- Details of the treaty of peace between Nicaragua and Salvador, which was signed at Amapala on Tuesday last, were received at the state department today. The treaty is similar to that entered into a year ago and known as the "Marblehead pact," and it includes a provision for a general Central American peace congress to be held in Nicaragua in the near future and a special commercial treaty between Nicaragua and Salvador.

The new conference will be the third of a series of such gatherings of tha republics of Central America, each and all to conserve the peace of that section of the world. The first conference was held in 1905 and resulted in the adoption of a scheme for the settlement of issues between the republics. which, if it had been adhered to, would have put an end for all time to the frequent wars. 



ALTROCK ONE OF HARDEST TO BEAT

Cubs' Twirler Gives Baserunners No Chance Whatever to Steal on Him.

"Nick Altrock is one of the hardest pitchers in the world to beat, because he doesn't give baserunners a chance to steal on him," says Frank Selee, the former manager of the Chicago Cubs Mr. Selee, who has always been one of the closest observers in baseball and one of the most interesting talkers on the national game, pointed out in concise manner the big advantage Altrock has over an opposing team.

"In the first place," says the veteran manager, "Altrock has almost perfect control. That means you have go to hit the ball to get to first. Secondly, you can't steal on him, because he watches first like a hawk and has a wonderful snap throw to the base which does not permit a runner to get more than two steps away from the base without great danger of getting caught.

"There are several pitchers in the game who have more speed and better curves, but Nick more than makes up for his lack of speed and curves by his great fielding, his accurate control and his attention to men on the bases. It has been the same for years. Good left-handers who kept the runners close to first were always winners.

"Against that kind of pitching a team is at a horrible disadvantage. You can't steal bases and the hit-andrun play is easily broken up. When the runners are kept hugging first force plays at second base occur with greater frequency and the infielders are given more time to pull off double

TOWNSHIP WILL FIGHT ANNEXATION

Does Not Want to Lose Section East of City—Immense Jump in Assessment.

The city of London is not the only municipality which is going ahead by leaps and bounds in the matter of asessed value.

London Township is running the city a close race. Last year the township was as

sessed by the assessors at close to \$5,-000.000. When the county judge took up the work of equalizing the assessments in the different townships for the purpose of striking the county rate, he declared the assessment of the township of London to be too low, and he added about \$1,250,000 to it.

This alone brought the assessment

up to over \$6,000,000. Now the assessors have informed Councilor Frank Glass that the natural increase this year has been something enormous, and it is expected that the assessment will total some where between \$7,000,000 and \$8,000,000, with the probability that it will range very close to the last named amount. St. Lawrence ward, which lies immediately east of the city, was last year assessed for about \$800,000, but it is expected that this year it will run up to about \$1,400,000.

Many new factories are going up outside the city limits, and very many new housest have been built within the past year.

People are flocking eastward to be near the factories and their work, and incidentally to avoid the taxation of the city.

They have street railway accommodation right to their doors, because the Pottersburg cars travel along Dun'as street east, and the Hamilton road cars run to the city limits on the Hamilton road.

The city proposes to annex this part of London Township, but the indications are that the township council will put up a fight and will see that a proper vote of the people in the district is taken on the question of whether they wish to be absorbed by the

It is understood that the councilors are now consulting their solicitor on the question of what rights the city and the township have in the matter. It is said that the whole matter rests with the residents of the district named. If they vote to be annexed, well and




