London, Oct. 26.—The British continue to press forward between Valenciennes and Tournai, Field Marshal Haig announces. They have captured the village of Maulde on the front north of Valenciennes. South of Valenciennes the British have gained new successes on the borders of the Murmal Forest, capturing Mount Dr. W. S. Solf Makes An-Carmel hill and Englefontaine.

British patrols have progressed north of the railway between Valenciennes and Le Quesney.

The text of the field marshal's statement reads:

"Early this morning we carried out a successful minor operation on the borders of the forest of Murmal, capturing the hill known as Mount Carmel and the village of Englefontaine, with a number of prisoners.'

SERBS OCCUPY KRALIEVO.

London, Oct. 26.—Kralievo, 60 miles east-northeast of Nish. has been occupied by the Serbian troops, says a Serbian official statement issued Friday. In the same region the Serbians have crossed the Tarnitsa River.

ALLIES TAKE BELGIAN VILLAGES.

London, Oct. 25.—Operations in Belgium continued to develop favorably, according to an official statement issued at the war office tonight, which says the French have carried Zulte, in spite of desperate resistance, while the British have occupied the villages of Ingoyheim and Oteghem, and are advancing toward the Scheldt River.

U. S. TROOPS HOLD GAINS.

With the American Army Northwest of Verdun, Oct. 26 .- The gains made Friday by the American troops east and west of the Meuse were maintained to day in spite of violent enemy opposition and a harrassing artillery fire against the American front lines and the areas in the rear. On the extreme left the Americans have strengthened their hold on the high ground in the southern part of the Bourgone wood.

RUSSIAN MAIDENS COMPELLED BY THE BOLSHEVIKI TO REGISTER AT THEIR GOVT. "BUREAU OF FREE LOVE"

Under Soviet Decree All Wom en From 18 to 50 Become the Property of the State-Law Claimed To Be Based Upon Previous "Ex cellent" Examples.

London, Oct. 21.—(British Wireless Service).—Russian maidens under the jurisdiction of certain provincial Bolsheviki soviets become the "property of the state" when they reach the age of 18 years, and are compelled to register at a Government "bureau of free love," according to the Official Gazette of the Vladimir soviet of workmen's and soldiers' deputies which recently published that soviet's decree on the subject.

Under the decree a woman having registered, "has the right to choose from among men between 19 and 50 a cohabitant husband." The consent of the man chosen is not necessary. The man chosen has no right to make any protest.

A similar privilege of choosing from A similar privilege of choosing from among the registered women is given every man between 19 and 50, "without the consent of the woman."

This provision is described as "in the interest of the state." Opportunities for choosing husbands and wives are to be presented once each month, the decree states. German Foreign Secretary Defends Soldiers Actions in Occupied Districts.

Amsterdam, Oct. 26 .- "As for Alsace-Lorraine, it is at once clear that, as these territories were expressly men teen points, we agree to regulation of these questions," said Dr. W. S. Solf. German foreign secretary, in addressing address referred to, President Wilson said that the "wrong done to France by Prussia in 1871 in the matter of Alsace-Lorraine, which has unsettled the peace of the world for nearly 50 years, should be righted." "Moreover, having accepted President Wilson's program as the basis of the entire peace work," Dr. Solf continued: "We will loyally and in the sense of complete justice and fairness, fulfill the program in all directions and at all points"

Dr. W. S. Solf said that Spanish Minister Villa Lobar, representing British and Rolging attractions. thorities had done everything in their power to alleviate the condition of fuzitives and residents in bombarded towns.

Only men of military age had been removed forcibly, Dr. Solf asserted, and even then exceptions had been made in the cases of physicians, clergymen, firemen, policemen, and those engaged in supplying food.

Referring to questions asked on the previous day, the foreign secretary said the Government emphatically repudiated any doubt of its intention honestly to any doubt of its intention honestly to carry out the principles laid down by President Wilson. He added:
"Having in reply to the president taken its stand on his messages, the Government is resolved to act accordingly."

GERMANS USING

With the British Army in France and Flanders, Oct. 26.—The heavy losses which the Germans have sustained since the allied offensive began have forced the enemy to use raw troops brought from the eastern front. The enemy now has 195 divisions on the western front, of which 183 are German infantry divisions, excluding 31 divisions withdrawn after they had suffered severe casualties during the past two weeks, and 6 Austro-Hungarian divisions. There are only 12 enemy divisions available in reserve on this front, and none of these are fresh. The desperate situation which the enemy is now facing appears to be fully appreciated by many of the German people, according to letters captured along the front.

Paris, Oct. 26.—The battle has flamed up again and heavy fighting is now under way from Valenciennes to the Meuse. The Germans are fighting hard everywhere, but the Allies continue to make substantial headway in the task of driving back the enemy on the Meuse line.

Although the recent fighting has been marked by no sensational developments, it is having a cumulative effect which, apart from the ground gained, adds considerably to the wastage of men and material with which the Germans must reckon. In the last four days the enemy has lost well up towards 15,000 prisoners and 200 guns. His total losses of effectives cannot have been less than 50,000.

Ilness of Miners Reducing the Output.

Ontario Fuel Administration Notifies All Coal Dealers of Critical Situation.

Toronto, Oct. 25.—Owing to the outbreak of Spanish influenza, which has demoralized labor conditions in the mining districts from which Ontario drzws its supply of fuel, there has been such an alarming curtailment in the production of anthracite of late that grave fears have arisen regarding our future supply. grave fears have arisen regarding our future supply.

Most discouraging reports have reached the Ontario fuel administration within the past few days, and these advices assume such a startling aspect this morning that the administration considered it necessary to notify by wire every coal dealer in the province that events had taken a critical turn, and that a serious fuel emergency exists in Ontario. It is now felt that the province will likely fall considerably short of the allotment originally allowed by the United States fuel administration, both in soft as well as hard coal. PEACE AT ANY PRICE IS WANTED IN AUSTRIA-HUNGARY

Paris, Oct. 26.—In well-informed circles it is said that the nomination of Count Julius Andrassy as successor of Baron Burian, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, is, above all, important from the viewpoint of a conclusion of peace and an application of the "safety-first" principle in Austria. It is said that peace at any price is now popular at Vienna and Budapest.

The Zurich correspondent of the Journal says that the new BLAME foreign minister is understood to be a partisan of direct peace negotiations with the Entente. He says that the situation in Austria-Hungary is such that the monarchy will capitulate and throw itself on the mercy of the Allies.

The Czechs are now master of the situation at Prague. The Slovaks have decided to change the name of Presburg to Wilsonville. The Ruthenians of Galicia have declared for a separate Ukrainian state, comprising regions of Austria-Hungary inhabited by Ruthenians. It is reported that anarchy reigns in the ancient Danubian monarchy of Hungary. The correspondent says that in Austria no notice is being taken of decisions arrived at by Berlin.

The country here is flat, making an ideal field for manoeuvring all arms unto obstructed by wire or shell holes. It is virgin in its velvet beauty, and strikes home to the heart. It is well worth all our toils to have saved this to France. The chief features of the landscape are vast slag piles, marking the enternace to the mine shafts. Perceptible Decrease in the Number of New Cases of Influenza.

NURSES BADLY WANTED

And Some Doctors Are Ill From Their Recent Exertions.

"Things are brighter on the whole today," is the statement that has come from the Institute of Public Health, and also from the medical officer of health in regard to the Spanish influenza epi-demic in London. While there have been half a dozen or so deaths overbeen half a dozen or so deaths overnight, there is a perceptible decrease in
the number of new cases. At the camp,

practically no new cases have developed in the past 48 hours.
At the same time, there is an imperative need of more nurses. The nurses
who have been on duty for two weeks
and more, whether they have contracted

All classes of people are calling for nursing help which neither love nor money at times can procure. One family, it is stated, would pay forty dollars a week to a trained nurse if the trained

British Navy Has Nearly Trebled In Size and In Personnel During War

LONDON, Oct. 25 .- Figures made public tonight on the growth of the British navy during the war show that the fleet, including auxiliaries, increased from 2,500,000 tons displacement to 6,500,000 tons, and the personnel from 146,000 to 406,000.

Since the outbreak of the war 21,500,000 soldiers have been transported by sea, of which 4,391 were lost. For the requirements of the British naval and military forces more than 86,000,000 tons of stores were transshipped, while more than 24,000,000 tons were taken overseas for Great Britain's allies. Transportation also was provided for 2,000,000 animals.

The organization of convoys, due to German submarine warfare, has been an important part of the work of the British navy since March, 1917, from which time there have been 75,929 sailings, with the losses numbering only a few hundred vessels.
