### 7,000 SOLDIERS ARE READY IN CHICAGO TO STOP RACE RIOTS

Several More Casualties Are Added To List of Victims.

NEGRO HOUSE BURNED

Residents Escape When the Whites Set Fire to Building.

Chicago, July 30.—Rioting between whites and blacks continued long after whites and blacks continued long after midnight, and several casualties were added to the list of 27 dead and hundreds of wounded. A negro residence at Fifty-seventh street and Wentworth avenue was burned by the whites, but the occupants escaped. The 9th and 10th Regiments of Illinois traces from Cairo were reported by the 9th and 10th Regiments of Illinois troops from Cairo were reported on the way to Chicago to increase the available soldiers to more than 7,000, but none had taken up patrol duty, the city officers refusing to concede defeat, and ask military aid.



Terms of the loan, which will undoubtedly be attractive, will probably not be made known till next autumn.
