dvantageous for England. The most important British concession is the transfer to France of paramountcy in Morocco. That is not news at all; it was first published in the press as long ago as September last. It was this announcement, made long before the contracting parties desired the news to become public, which upset the French plans of taking possession of that kingdom. It was in connection with that that M. Delcasse, Minister of Foreign Affairs, invented the new diplomatic phrase "pacific penetra-tion" which is now employed to describe the French policy. It may safely be prophesied that when France attempts to carry it into effect it will require plenty of guns and bayonets, to be used in the same fashion as when Great Britain pacified South Africa. 

It will be noticed that there is no mention of negotiations with the Dominion Government. The New York legislators recognize only Great Britain. In this they are following the regular course. Canada has no treatymaking powers and consequently no right to be consulted or addressed by the United States in this matter.

Here is a question which affects States. Great Britain is not even remotely concerned. The subject is not a contentious one quite the reverse. Canada will be glad to co-operate with the United States in the conservation of the Falls of Niagara, and probably the British Government will leave the matter entirely in Canada's hands. But the Dominion has no constitutional standing in the case, and the United States is obliged to ignore her existence. The British Government, also, in the exercise of its sovereign powers, could overlook this country in its negotiations with the American Government. London and Washington could frame and sign the treaty, and leave Ottawa out of the reckoning. In the treaty of Washington and subsequent treaties, where Canadian interests were involved. Canada has been consulted by the mother country, and Canadians have been associated with the British commissioners in the negotiations, but this has been purely an act of grace on the part of the British Government, and not a constitutional right belong-






