THE LATE SENATOR WARK.

Senator Wark, who died a day or two ago, held an unique place among the legislators of the world. He has been a legislator for sixty-two years. during which time he had not missed a session in parliament until this last, when extreme old age had so weakened his constitution as to render it impossible for him to be present. Commenting upon his demise the Toronto Star speaks of him as follows: His serene disposition and Christian con-Tidence enabled him to look forward to the end with perfect equanimity, and though he took good care of his health, he did not surround his goings out and comings in with those minute precautions which make life a burden. He preferred to do for himself as much as possible, and refosed assistance which as a valetudinarian he might have claimed Brought up on the Spartan system he preserved those hardy characteristics to the day of his death. He even made light of his years, and held time at bay, so to speak, by his courages In journeying from Fredericton to Ottawa it was his custom to decline the offer of parlor cars and to underso the ordinary discomforts of travel. Last years his friends in parliament honored the hundredth anniversary of his birthday by presenting Senator Wark with an oil painting of himself which now graces the corridor of the senate along with the pictured faces of other personages famous in Canadian history. The occasion was memorable one not only as a tribute to the oldest living legislator in the world, but from the words and bearing of the venerable senator himself. His extreme old age was to be seen in his bowed form and quavering voice, but no one doubted that his mind was clear and his reasoning faculty as fetrong as it was in his prime. He make a little speech, couched in the choice phrase of an older school of orators in which he acknowledged the goodmess of God, in whose hands is the gift of days, and he reiterated the necessity of that faith which vitalizes the soul as the blood does the body. The thought in everyone's mind was that Death had passed over this grand old man so that he might be an example to a hurrying, eager generation ,of those solid foundations on which a calm and honored old age is built. Senator Wark always advised

simple diet, but that was the smallest part of his secret. For him, as for others, the elixir of life lay in something more than mere food for the body. Senator Wark had a mind enriced by much reading and a soul fortified by the promises of the Christian religion. With these stores of solace and reflection, the days never came when he said: "I have no pleasure in them." He led a full life. He was interested in great public questions to the extent that he forgot his own feebleness. And above all he had that abiding faith and steadfast hope which make life placid, because death is esteemed a goal and a re-

The Ottawa correspondent of The News in a thoughtful and appreciative article on the reorganization of Canada's defence, points out that for nearly all the improvements planned. It is a significant and instructive fact that Lord Dun-donald was violently denounced by Sir Frederick Borden and ail his echoes for the very suggestions for which Sir Frederick and the Government are now seeking credit. The sin-cerity of the attack on Lord Dun-donald may now be readily judged.



ABOUT PAVEMENTS Watermelons

Vivian Reeve of London an Old Chatham Boy has a Few Suggestions for the City Council.

Vivian Reeve, of London, an old Chatham boy, spent yesterday calling on his many Chatham friends. Mr. Reeve is well known here, having been organist of the Park street Methodist church for eleven years. In speaking to The Planet reporter he said:—

In speaking to The Planet reporter he said:

"I have never visited a place of the same size where there is as much enterprise as you have here in Chatham. I heard an old London man say the other day after a trip to Chatham that he was surprised to see the town going ahead so fast. Your paving construction is far shead of London.

"At the present time in London we are having great trouble with our paving, and the council is kept busy making motions and reseinding them by the actions of rival paying agents. We are now petitioning the government to amend the municipal act to give the councils of the different cities power over their own roadways. This will give the municipality a bigger voice in the matter of pavements and the agents will not have control of the streets through the property owners.

This is a good move and the Chat-

or the streets through the property owners.

This is a good move and the Chatham Council should co-operate with the London Council in getting this amendment carried through. In event of it being adopted the councils can go ahead, select the pavement and put it down.

"In London, however, conditions are different than they are here. There the city pays half the cost of every pavement and the property owners pay, each a quarter of the cost, according to their frontage; while here the property owners pay for the whole pavement, except at street intersections. I think our system in that respect is the better one, for the residents who live on a paved street are not the only ones who use the pavement. It is put down for the benefit of citizens generally.



JAPAN'S NEW PROPOSAL, MURDERED LITTLE GIRL

Witte, However, Promptly Rejects and Outlook Black.

Japan Would Withdraw Indomnity Back Northern Half of Island For \$600,000,000-Limitation of Russia's Sea Power Go Over.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 24.—The Japanese plenipotentiaries yesterday, at the conclusion of the afternoon session of the peace conference, threw the cards upon the table. The protocols involving agreement upon eight of the 12 conditions originally presented by Japan had been signed.

M. Witte sat silent and the move in the creek divisionality same passed to

the great diplomatic game passed

Japan's Offer.

Baron Komura in a few words explained that Japan in her great desire for peace was ready to make certain "modifications" of the original articles in the hope that Russia could find it possible to accept them. He then presented in writing the compromise proposition which President Roosevelt had suggested. It offered to withdraw article 9; providing for the payment by Russia of Japan's bill for the cost of the war, on condition that Russia would accept article 5, which provides for the cession of Sakhalin, so modified as to include an arrangement for the repurchase by Russia of the northern half of the island for 1,200,000,000 yen. In addition it offered to withdraw entirely articles 11 and 12 (suffrender of the interned warships and limitation upon Russia's sea power in the Far East).

Not a Kopeck, Says Witte.

Without a moment's hesitation M.,
Witte explained that the modification
proposed was merely a sham, a change
of phraseology, a diplomatic attempt to
"dorer la pilule" and ask Russia to pay
war tribute under another name. He
could not accept it. He told Baron Komura Russia wanted peace. She had
given the proofs in accepting every article involving the issues upon which
the war was fought, but she could fight,
and money for tribute she would not
pay—not a kopeck. He asked Baron
Komura to withdraw all demands for
tribute.

Outlook is Black.

And so the plenipotentiaries separated, to meet again on Saturday, ostensibly to permit M. Witte to place in writing, as the rules of the conference

tensibly to permit M. Witte to place in writing, as the rules of the conference require, his reply to the Japanese compromise proposition. In reality, the adjournment over the two days was to give each side an opportunity to consult its Government for the last time. The outlook is black.

The decision rests, therefore, as it has from the first, with Russia. Unless the Emperor agrees to yield between now and Saturday, the end is likely to come on that date. And the indications from Peterhof, instead of raising the chances of a change of heart on the Emperor's part, seem to indicate even a firmer determination to yield neither territory nor indemnity, sugar-coated though the latter may be.

Black as the prospect appears, however, the failure of the negotiations is not certain. The Russian camp is pessimistic to a man, but they all know the quick and startling changes of front that sometimes take place at Peterhof, and there are factors in the situation which might effect one of these

erhof, and there are factors in the struction which might effect one of these sudden and inexplicable changes in the Emperor's attitude which have free quently astonished Russia. Private a vices from St. Petersburg say th vices from St. Petersburg say that sentiment there and in Moscow and other large centres favors acceptance

Roosevelt's Last Effort.
Oyster Bay, Aug. 24.—President Roosevelt's final effort to induce a cessation of hostilities in the Far East is almost dramatic in its extraordinary interest. Through George L. Von Meyer, the American Ambassador at St. Petersburg, he yesterday made a direct appeal to Emperor Nicholas to permit the adoption of such measures in the pending peace conference as will terminate the war. A long cablegram in the pending peace conference as will terminate the war. A long cablegram was sent to Ambassador Meyer by the was sent to Ambassador Meyer by the President late on Monday. As a result of the instructions he received, Ambassador Meyer had a special audience of Emperor Nicholas yesterday at Peterhof Palace.

Japs Get Another.

Tokio, Aug. 24.—The Japanese refloated the Russian torpedo-lipat destroyer Silni at Port Arthur Tuesday.

Bleeds to Death.

Port Arthur, Aug. 24.—John Doney, who is well known in mining circles in all parts of the district, was found dead in his room in the Mining Exchange yesterday having bled to death. While coming out from Sturgeon Lake a few days ago, he slipped and cut his wrist open on a bottle. The wound bled freely, and he was in much danger then of bleeding to death. However, he had the wound atteded to and came to Port Arthur Tuesday. Last night he went to his room, and, in some manner, opened the wound, and before discovered, bled to death.

C. P. R. Is Protesting.

Ottawa, Aug. 24.—It is said that the C. P. R. is registering a vigorous kick again the location of the G. T. P. line in the west, on the ground that the territory served by the C. P.
