As March 30 - election date '88 — draws closer, Student Union executive and council candidates are giving all they've got to reach their first goal, which is to become elected into the positions for which they are vying.

Many of the candidates (not all of whom could be reached) were asked two on-the-spot questions: 1) their main reason for wanting to become part of the Student Union; and $\overline{2}$) their main goal if elected as a member.

The interviewing begins with Carl Burgess. Vice President external sounds good to him, because as he puts it "I have been involved with the Student Union as Science representative. There's a lot to do, although a lot has been done, and I am eager and interested to be a part of it." As for a goal? Pertaining to campus matters, Carl wants to put more spirit into the campus; pump energy back in".

Luigi Rocca wishes to become Vice President internal. "I have experience", he explains. "I was on the Student Union last year, and the more I did, the more I wanted to do. I took pride in it. I want to contiue with the good things we did this year and do even more." Asked to pinpoint a goal, Luigi wants to see the installation of "two way communication between the Student Union and all organizations to include everyone on campus." The emphasis is on including everyone.

Susan Forestell is looking for the Presidency. According to Susan, "I have followed the student government closely for the past two years. I have been quite vocal and a lot of students came to me and asked me to run, which is a lot of the reason (why I decided to run). I know how the system works, and how to things done." Susan continues, " I find it very hard to narrow it down to one goal without sounding too general." There are many things that need to be done, she believes. "We need to offer more services within the Union, have more control of the SUB, look into the present liquor policy, as well as to try and get more support in Athletics. The only way to a strong government is to build a stong Union based on communications" between its

members. Dean Frost is also running

for President. He is a member of United '88, a team composed of four students who are running for other positions as well, including: Trina Chisholm (VP Internal); Bruce Carroll (VP External); and Brian Clark (Treasurer). All four students explain that Dean's comments reflect the feeling of each one of them. "We want the Student Union to be successful. With four people working together from day 1 onward, we can reduce the amount of time to finally get something accomplished. We can guarantee cooperation between the four of us, reducing the risk of an unsuccessful student government." Dean emphasizes that as a main goal "If you come to us with questions, we ensure you that we will do our best to get the answers back to you. We are going to start right from day one.'

Council candidates, if elected, will be working with executive members, and they also have certain goals and reasons for wanting to get into the action.

Hoping to become Arts rep, Garth Reid wants to "form a respectable government, so students can enjoy their year." He would like to "contribute to a team; contribute to a team effort to create a government responsive to the students."

Darren McHarg has "been in the Business faculty for three years." He explains that "next year is my final year, and I feel I should get involved and make some contribution to the University. I would like to represent my Business faculty as best I can to make sure that business-related organizations have a say in what goes on." Becoming a Science rep is what Alan Robinson is after. Al comments, "I was on the Health Science executive this year. As well, I have been here for four years and have seen a lot of what has gone on with Student Council and I want to see more productivity. I want to decrease the number of bureaucratic hold ups. My goal is to fulfill the reasons why I'm running." Al concludes by saying "There needs to be more communication between the Science faculty and other faculties."

This would include books like Nabokov's Lolita, which deals with a man's sexual relationship with "a person who is, depicted as being, or appears to be, under the age of eighteen years."

To make their feelings known to local MP Bob Howie, staff members at the Harriet Irving library and at the Art. Centre are circulating a petition for those opposed to the Bill. It may be signed in the Art Centre office, or by the reserve desk on the main floor of the library.

SMART-PACC success in Miami The bacon is back

The S.M.A.R.T. P.A.C.C. Pig and travel companion have returned from their southbound excursion to MIAMI with less than impressive tans.

This could only mean two things: the sunny skies of Florida were cloud covered for four days, or the Pig was so busy promoting S.M.A.R.T. P.A.C.C that the suntan lotion never left his suitcase.

Well, according to Marc Braithwaite, the Pig's travelling companion, the weekend was a combination of the two., The overall result of the conference is that S.M.A.R.T. P.A.C.C. will be one of six model programs, and the only Canadian one, to be included in an Alcohol Awareness Education book.

This publication will be made available to any Canadian or American university who requests it from NODA (National Orientation Directors Association.) They will act as the "clearing-house" and main supplier of this alcohol awareness education informa-

tion. Apart from making these 6 programs available in manual form, NODA Is also willing to commit to endorsing and promoting these programs at their annual national fall conference.

The result of this publication, of which UNB plays an important role, is two-fold: First, it will hold back the powerful legislation now underway in the States to make Alcohol Awareness programs mandatory, and it will allow universities to apply for a grant (Federal Incentive Program for Substance Education, United States or National Drug Strategy in Canada) to gain access to initial start up funds for their own program.

NODA has proposed a 5-year waiting period against the legislation to allow for the idea behind this manual to take effect. From this manual, universities will be able to adopt certain elements of each program to help design and implement their own alcohol awareness education program. Pennsylvania State University

recently adopted elements of UNB's S.M.A.R.T. P.A.C.C. into their own program and called it T.A.A.P. (Total Alcohol Awareness Program).

So what does all this mean for UNB? By being a part of this "Manual of Alcohol Awareness Education Programs," S.M.A.R.T. P.A.C.C. is opening up avenues to help all other Canadian and American universities design a program that is tailor-made for their institution; one that will make its programmers stand behind it and make the students feel like it was designed with them in mind.

As the only Canadian model program, S.M.A.R.T. P.A.C.C. and UNB will receive international recognition by setting such an impressive example as a model university. The common goal; to increase alcohol awareness on campus and reduce alcohol abuse by students through these six programs; constructed and managed by students for students; a goal which Marc feels is well worth the effort.

Campus Entertainment

Campus Entertainment has brought the Student Union back into the public eye. By offering free movies on a weekly basis, top-rate concerts and guest speakers, students have been able to receive visible proof that their Student Union fees were being well spent.

James Small, VP External, says the committee, headed by co-coordinators Marc Braithwaite and Tim Judah has been "well worth the money." But he adds that it can be improved. "We can do a lot more things with the committee; offer a lot more services."

Valedictorian Election

The election for Valedictorian was held last fall. The winner will not be known until the end of March.

The original election was plagued by complaints and irregularities, prompting the Student Union to set up an independent investigation and then declare first one winner and then another.

One of the candidates, Cathy Steele claimed she was told the election had been pushed back one week. The election was not postponed because council had already designated the date. Larry

Long, Chief Returning Officer at the time, said Steele's not being informed was at most a clerical error.

The first results released for the Valedictorian election listed Heather McNaught as the winner by a small majority. After a recount of the ballots the new totals did not match the CRO's totals. The search for the alledgedly missing ballots continued until well after Christmas.

At Council's February 10th meeting, S.U. President Jane Arnold reported that she and VP (Ext) James had completed a recount of the ballots and found an error on the CRO's tally sheets.

The recount revealed that for the SUB polling station totals, McNaught's count was recorded as 77 when she only received 7 votes.

Council accepted the revised results and declared Eric Gingles as Valedictorian. However, at its next meeting, Council decided that perhaps their declaration was improper, and decided to run the election again with the same five candidates during the spring election.

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So, as the old saying goes, if at first you don't succeed, hold another election.

Cafe closure concerns

Five students representing international students, orientation committee and the Student Union were present at a meeting with Kim Norris to discuss cafeteria closure. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss a "plan that will work for all organizers of student activities held in the S.U.B. cafeteria." The Orientation Committee & Student Union are concerned about Friday night Extravaganzas and other activities requiring bands. Jane Arnold suggested that signs and posters be posted to warn student. of early cafeteria closure one week prior to the event. All present agreed that bands would have ample time to set up their equipment at 5:30. Students eating while the bands are setting up, are not considered in the way and do not need to be moved. social events such as International Night and other cultural events, organizers asked that they begin preparations around 1:00 p.m. but that the cafeteria does not close until 4:30 p.m.

The job of the Vice-President (Internal) is to assist the President in matters relating to the internal affairs of the University. This includes acting as a liaison with campus organizations, serving as chairman of the constitution committee and, in general, dealing with administrative matters as they come up.

The most important thing that I have to offer is experience. For the past year I served as one of the Science Representatives on the Student Council and have had the opportunity to familiarize myself with the Student Union and how it operates. Specifically, as a councillor, I served on the finance and selections committees, and chaired the honoraria committee.

There are several issues that I consider important and which need to be dealt with during the next year. These include:

1. More formalized communication with clubs and societies. A faculty consultation was held in November which allowed the leaders of campus student organizations to air their concerns to the Student Union executive. This type of two-way communication is essential and must be continued and improved.

2. Improved communication with students at large. Many students are concerned about where their \$62 SRC fee is going and rightfully so. This is why I'm suggesting a monthly newsletter, published by the Student Union, which would outline in detail the activities of your student government.

3. International Students - It is necessary that we become more sensitive to the needs of the international student community. Therefore, Council should appoint one representative to keep it abreast of any problems or events related to this community and which should be of interest to all students.

and Ramsay Anderson (candidate for Vice President External). We have worked together on senate and University committees and have dicided to offer as a team because we work will together. We have all followed student politics closely for the last two years and all of us, especially Susan Forestell, have been vocal about the problems we have perceived. This year, we were approached by several students who asked us to run for office in order to fix the problems we have pointed out.

The present student coucil executive wants to raise student fees by 25%. Even with Campus Entertainment, the student government has not yet lived up to its \$32 overnight increase. While our studentfees are comparable to those of other Universities, our services are not

We are already accountable and responsible to the administration. It's time to be responsible and accountable to the students. Changes in the student fee should only take place in coordination with a referendum. In addition, the line by line budget must be published so that students can see exactly where their money has been spent.

We believe that for 1988/89 student fees should be lowered if it is all possible. Under no circumstances will be allow them to be raised.

Meanwhile, in order to live up to the \$62 student fee, the Student Union must offer services like five cent photocopying, tutorial services, typing and word processing services, and book exchange and a legal aid service. The Student Union must also guarantee a yearbook on time, produce a student handbook and a course and teacher evaluation at registration and deliver a student directory (containing all the pages) within a month of the beginning of classes. The Student Union should establish a committee whose sole mandate it will be to stimulate support for our athletic teams. The Student Union should also work with alumni to establish a football team.

The student council has recently announced plans to establish a "board of directors" whose function it will be to monitor the content of the Brunswickan. The University is supposedly the bastion of freedom. If we are unable to maintain a free and autonomous student publication when we are less than a true University.

The student government at UNB has no official opposition. The only criticism of the student government that ever arises does so on the Brunswickan. If the student government regularly monitors the Brunswickan that medium of criticism will be eliminated.

We have never before had a "board of directors" for the Brunswickan because we do not need one. The establishment of the proposed board is a pointless exercise that will only serve to promote the abuse of free press on this campus. The Brunswickan already has an editorial board - one that frequently checks material with law professors before publication. We want to work toward the restructuring of Bar Services so that students can make money on liquor sales. We also work toward turning the "Woodshed" or "Down Under" into a pub. We believe that the liquor regulations on campus are too rigid and want to work with the administration to have them relaxed. Never before have we had so little control of our own Student Union Building. Clubs like AIESEC are being denied space and are seeing their membership decline because of it. The SUB director wants to close the blue lounge. Recently, our money paid for the installation of a wall that serves only to benefit the leasees - not the benefit of students. The SUB director has gone so far as to suggest that students sign leases to stay in their own SUB!

students that when it appeared that the students could take care of their own SUB, they could regain control. There are three openings for UNB students on the SUB Board. Only two positions have been filled. This is not the way to prove our ability to run the SUB effectively.

The student council is now thinking of moving all student organizations to the newly bought Canadian Forestry Service Building. But the University is looking for a corporate sponsor to rent the building. All student organizations will move out of the SUB and into the CFS building. But what will happen when the University does find a corporate sponsor to rent the CFS building? Students will return to the Sub only to find it occupied. Without offices student organizations including the Brunswickan, CHSR and the student council will die.

We must not lose our SUB. By demonstrating ability we can regain control of our building. We will work with alumni, government and administration toward this goal.

What does UNITED '88 have to offer the students of UNB? Here are some of the policies that we are currently developing:

INCREASED STUDENT PAR-TICIPATION IN VOTING.

More students exercising their right to vote will give the Student Union a greater mandate in formulating policies and lobbying groups, such as the federal and provincial governments, in an effort to obtain increased funding for post secondary education in areas like Canada Student Loans.

INCREASED AWARENESS AMONG THE LOCAL COMMUNITY

Will be an attempt to lobby the local business community for increased scholarship and/or donations for the university. Possible areas of interest could be the initiation of special funding for handicapped students attending UNB.

INTRODUCTION OF A "STUDENT SERVICES MEMBERSHIP"

Reclassifying the current student fee structure from its present form to a type of "student services membership". This might include such things as an automatic membership to the College Hill Social Club along with increased discounts at local businesses. With this in place, it is possible that the frequency of quality entertainment will in-

crease on campus.

PEER INCREASED ALCOHOL/DRUG EDUCATION Through an intensive public awareness campaign, we hope to establish a campus wide cognizance of this important problem. By increasing student awareness in this area, the UNITED '88 TEAM will be doing their part to ensure students learn more about social interaction, peer pressure and individual responsibility in conjunction with the academic requirements that culminate in a university diploma.

INCREASED REPRESENTATION OF RESIDENCE STUDENTS.

By proposing the establishment of a separate council seat for those in residence, we are recognizing the major role these students have in the day to day activities of the university. The house Presidents would meet and elect one member from their representative board to provide the on campus students with a direct voice on council.

RE-EVALUATE STUDENT UNION EXPENDITURES (FINANCIAL AC-COUNTABILITY)

By re-examining the financial base of the Student Union, we are looking at ways to improve accountability to the entire student body and maintain a higher level of efficiency in the spending of the student's money.

DEVELOPMENT OF GREATER SCHOOL SPIRIT.

Perhaps one of the most memorable of any university experience is the lingering feeling of school spirit and loyalty. Through increased student union sponsored activities such as rallies before varsity games, and support of our representatives at academic competitions, we hope to enhance this unique feeling at UNB.

Five years ago, The International Advisor was impeding international students efforts to obtain visas and looking into their bank accounts. The housing and food services director made racist comments to the media about foreign students and the housing crisis. Last year, the student council took away a significant portion of the Board of International Students' budget. They put it toward their own honoraria. A few months later the University sold Rosary Hall - an offcampus residence with predominantly foreign student inhabitants. We believe the international students on this campus are not getting the consideration they deserve and we are committed to delivering it.

We will publish a line by line budget, begin constituency meetings, hold referenda on substantial issues and establish a residence representative for council. We believe that communication with the students is the most important aspect of good government. It's time the students knew what the Student Union is doing and it's time the Student Union knew what the students are thinking. We also believe internal communication is vital to the cooperation necessary for a productive government.

With a new provincial government, the door is open for lobbying for not on-

ly more but better student employment as well as tuition and student loan issues.

There is one other issue that our opponents have already begun to cloud that we wish to perfectly clear. That is, our presidential candidate's association with John Bosnitch (our other two candidates do not have and never have had any association with Mr. Bosnitch). In 1986, Susan Forestell began to show her active support for the Student Union Inc. headed by John Bosnitch. Seven months later, she offered her resignation. Susan Forestell had different points of view on certain matters and she felt that the battle had come to a standstill. And indeed it has. John Bosnitch is no longer in Canada and has not been for several months. The Student Union Inc. court case has recently been resolved. Most of the members of the Student Union Inc. no longer live in New Brunswick. Susan Forestell is not John Bosnitch. Her style is not like his. She does believe in student rights and she does believe that the Student Union Inc. should not have been handled the way it was nor should Lana Grimes be locked out of the SUB. She is not a fanatic nor is she a radical as Dean Frost would have you believe.

Finally, a word about our op-ponents. United 88 is being funded by Moosehead Breweries. Labatts has been much more visible than Moosehead on campus for the last year (ex. Labatts Live: Student Union business = more beer sales). Moosehead sponsors the hockey team. Our opponents are mostly hockey players. It isn't very difficult to see what sort of deal has been made. We must ask ourselves if we want a student government who must take direction not from students but from a corporation.

If this weren't enough, Dean Frost recently informed staff at the Brunswickan that Dr. Downey (University President) had written him 25 March, 1988

a letter commending him on his decision to run. In fact, the letter turned out to be from Dr. Woodfield (University Secretary) and the main purpose was not to commend Mr. Frost's great initiative but to express concern over the fact that Moosehead is sponsoring United 88. If Mr. Frost is misleading students at this stage of the game, to what lengths will he go in office? The fact is, if the new student

government is made up of people who are sponsored by a brewery, the administration will come down harder than ever with even more rigid liquor regulations. Residence socials, extravaganzas and the Social Club will all be in danger of having strict regulations or even being shut down altogether.

United 88 says they are concerned about influence in areas like the federal and provincial government. Anyone from either government or from CFS or the NB Alliance or any university will award United 88 with no credit whatsoever if they realize that their election campaign was sponsored by a brewery and that they attempted to buy votes with free beer. Outside the brewery business, they will be a laughing stock.

United 88 says they want to start an alcohol awareness program. Their obvious ignorance of UNB's acclaimed SMART PACC program is indicative of their understanding of what is happening on their own campus. Interesting too, that while they want to promote alcohol awareness, they attempt to buy votes with free beer and force everyone on campus to join the Social Club whether they are of legal age or not.

If you vote Government for the Students you will vote for students who care about students, who want to work hard for students, who have worked hard for students in the past. You will vote for honesty, dedication, competence and above all a government that will always put students first.

Quite frankly Arnie old love, I should go and see a sexual therapist before Maria begins to suspect that the real reason you're hanging around with the gardner really doesn't have anything to do with tips about potted geraniums.

Once this is over and done with however, the picture takes off at a fair old clip. There's this other-world totalbastard thingie see, which looks on armed human beings as we might look on bunnies, birds, large bugs, rocks or whatever else it is that New Brunswickers take to the woods to blow up. Whulp, the upshot of it is this extraterrestrial monstrosity skins and partially digest everyone except our Arnie (what a completely unsuspected surprise!) who has to use his wits to get the better of something that looks only slightly worse than your average male at the Social Club on a good evening. If you like mindless violence though, as Porky does, the pyrotechnic extravaganza during the storming of the rebel camp is really quite breathtaking. Otherwise it's a stupid fascist, chauvinist, violent film that is quite good fun if you can ignore the putrid masculinity throbbing all over the place.

Robocop is next and this is a real belter of a movie. Although it has a title made for the funny papers this is first rate entertainment. It's got schlock! It's got humanism! It's got bathos! It's got real slimy shit-head baddies that feed utter standardized law and order cliches, such as "Stop, you are under arrest," etc. To cut a long story short, one night ole tin-head manages to have a dream. Suddenly, memories of family, home and his grisly demise begin to come gnawing back at his repressed brain and it's GO GET 'EM TIME!

Robocop is a wonderfully directed and produced film with startling cinematography using shots at breath-taking angles (actually reminiscent of latter-day comic book styles) to create an uneasy and exciting pace

Porky is still wandering around the place with a saucepan on his head though, thinking he's some kind of robocat, but I think he'll soon drop the idea after I've oiled him several times.

Strongly recommended is THE NAME OF THE ROSE starring Sean Connery as a moderate monk attending a convention of like-minded souls at a castle in Eastern Europe in the middle ages.

I'm always drawn to works that use barren, filthy and wind-swept sets to create a grim atmosphere and this particular piece is a good example; Club Med will definitely not be offering this place with next year's selection of places to get pissed and laid at. Monks are dying rather strange deaths and it's up to our Sean to find out just what the devil is going on (Hooray! A pun!). An unorthodox detective story to say the least but compulsive viewing nonetheless. Includes one of the most erotic and yet simultaneously unsettling love-scenes you'll see this decade in conventional cinema. get it out.

Turkeys that should be left well alone are the bloody ludicrous MAXIMUM OVERDRIVE where people are made into mincemeat by anything that's run on a battery (kind of a night of the living dead where the zombies are replaced by Mack Trucks), WANTED DEAD OR ALIVE where Rutger Haver meets Gene Simmons (sic) in a piece of gratuitously fascist tripe, EXTREME PREJUDICE, Walter Hill's worst piece of work to date, and MANHUNTER, Michael 'Miami-Vice' ann's piece of sub-psychological nonsense that even the excellent William Petersen can't save from squawking all over the shop. Do catch RIVER'S EDGE though, the twisted tale of a gang of teenage fry-heads trying to reconcile the fact that one of their moronic mid-west members has turned his girlfriend's lights out, and RAISING ARIZONA, a bloody hilarious study of emotional kidnapping produced and directed by the severely gifted Joel and Ethan Cohen. Don't believe any dickhead that says otherwise because it's naffin' brill! Until next time I'm yer pal

"Mr. Frost was very helpful and understanding," said Judah. "I think he understands it would be contradictory to have a presidential party promoting alcohol on campus."

The administration has also voiced concern. In a letter to Dean Frost, the University secretary stated that although United '88 appeared to have acted in good faith, the administration would prefer that corporate sponsorship be kept to a minimum.

Student Union president Jane Arnold was a little more

outspoken in her condemnation of corporate sponsorship. "Speaking generally, I'm against the whole concept," she said. "At the moment, the election doesn't appear to be about issues, but about who's sponsoring who."

Marc Braithwaite, the CRO, has ruled that United '88 must take down their "Spot the dog" posters. He also wants to recommend to council that there should be ammendments made to the bylaws banning future sponsorship.

"Companies that deal with the student union on a day to day basis shouldn't be allowed to get directly involved in the elections," said Braithwaite.
