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TORONTO BOARD OF TRADE.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1889.

Like the city whose financial and commercial interests it seeks to guard, the Toronto Board of Trade has made great progress during the past few years.

Designed to protect and advance the common welfare, it has done much to aid in placing the business interests of Toronto on a firm foundation, and in securing their wise and profitable extension.

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It has not only fulfilled its original purpose, but it has done more.

Representing as it does, the Trade and Commerce of the Metropolis of the first Province of the Dominion; many of the matters it has discussed, and upon which it has taken action have been of vital interest to both Ontario and the Dominion at large.

Every successful effort made on behalf of commercial interests must accomplish something for the general good.

Where trade is carefully nourished, and commerce flourishes, will be

found a prosperous people.

Therefore every community should take a deep interest in the proceedings and condition of its Board of Trade.

GENERAL TRADE.

The past year has been one of varied interest to merchants, and while the results of trade generally have not been more than moderately satisfactory, yet they have fully justified the opinion held at the beginning of it.

During August and September the excellent crop reports stimulated trade considerably, and expectations were general that a more active and extended business would continue.

It soon became apparent that the crop was over-estimated, and this, combined with the low prices realized for all kinds of produce, caused a reaction that has been felt up to the present time.

The report of the Ontario Bureau of Statistics regarding the crop of cereals and roots gives as large a yield in the aggregate as the year previous, but unfortunately in consequence of the low prices, farmers' deliveries up to the present date have been much below the average.

Added to this, the unfavorable weather experienced during the past two months has made it almost impossible for farmers to deliver their produce even when disposed to accept the low prices offered.

The volume of trade done by the country merchant, and remittances

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up to the present date, have been disappointing.

There still remains in farmers' hands, however, a very large stock of grain and produce yet to be sold, and which is certain to find a market this season, and we may therefore fairly expect a more active business for the spring months.

It may not be out of place to point out some of the causes for the low

price of barley, usually the first grain to be marketed in Canada.

Our Canadian farmers have always given particular care to the cultivation of this grain, and the reputation of Canada barley with the American

brewer has been very high.

During the past few years the very radical changes in the system of brewing and in the use of cheaper materials as substitutes for malt, such as corn and rice, have done away very largely with the necessity for a high grade barley, as they give the results that formerly our barley was relied on to produce.

Added to this, the fact that the growing of barley in the Western States has increased to such an extent that when a favorable crop is

secured it is almost equal to the requirements of the trade.

It therefore behooves our farmers to face the matter squarely, and decide whether with a duty of 10 cents per bushel, and freight charges added to reach the consumer in the United States, they can continue to grow barley in such large quantity as formerly.

MILLING INTERESTS.

The Milling Trade has continued to feel the effect of the competition

from the importation of American flour.

The duty on wheat imported into Canada is 15 cents per bushel, which, by way of comparison, is equal to 71½ cents per barrel of flour, whereas the duty on flour is only 50 cents per barrel.

It seems to me unfair under our policy of protection to home industries that the millers should not have the same treatment as accorded to other manufacturers, so as to participate in the advantages of our home market.

There can be no doubt that this industry is suffering, and although the farmers as a class have not appeared to take much interest, yet whatever affects its welfare must indirectly affect the agricultural interest with which it is so intimately allied.

DRY GOODS.

I am informed, and it is easy to understand, that a radical change must take place in the conditions under which this branch of trade is done before it is made generally profitable. st two roduce

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The large number of failures among the retail dealers is pretty conclusive proof that the looseness with which credit is dispensed, and the absurdly long terms upon which the goods are sold, is not conducive to a healthy state of trade.

It is easier to diagnose this state of affairs than to suggest an infallible

remedy.

Over importation, and excessive competition, with constantly lessened profits and increasing expenses will ultimately bring about a cure, but is it not possible to anticipate by (conference and concerted action) where such would be advantageous to all, and avoid so undesirable a consummation as the forced retirement of the many, for the ultimate benefit of the few?

The decided advance in the value of all textile fabrics, and the fact that stocks in the hands of all Canadian manufacturers are quite limited, more so probably than they have been for years, suggest an opportune time for a united move in the direction of a more rational dispensing of credit than at present obtains in this important branch of business.

WEST INDIAN TRADE.

Early in the year the Honorable John Macdonald delivered an able address on the advantages to be derived from increased trade with the West Indies, and pointed out the necessity of establishing direct communication as the most effective means to attain the desired end.

By order of the Board this address was printed and widely circulated, and was no doubt the means of attracting such attention to the subject that the Government took the matter under consideration, and therefrom resulted the establishment (aided by a Government subsidy) of a regular line of steamers, sailing from St. John, N. B.

COMBINATIONS.

Since my last report this question has been freely discussed by the Board and also before the Banking Committee of the House of Commons as well as in Parliament, and a bill has been passed dealing with the subject. In the opinion of the prominent members of the House of Commons the act is chiefly useful as a fresh declaration of the law. It will be admitted by all fair-minded people that trade agreements, (usually termed combinations), in force in Canada, are on a just and reasonable basis, and have not been inconsistent with public interests, and that on the other hand public interests demand that no unnecessary restrictions be placed on the trade and commerce of the country.

I regret to observe the proposal to again discuss the question at Ottawa

during the present session.

The continuous agitation of a subject affecting interests so far reaching and important is calculated to disturb the business of the country, and

deter investors, and is to be deprecated, and especially so when in charge of a private member. It is manifestly a matter of such vast concern to our people that no further action should be permitted without the Government assuming complete responsibility.

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POSTAGE

The postal deliveries of this city are acknowledged on all hands to be most punctual, faithful and efficient; but the surcharge on drop letters as against postal cards circulating the length and breadth of the Dominion is considered a backward step. In any case the cities pay the greater relative proportion of Postal revenue, and no one grudges the deficit arising from widely separated and sparsely settled districts.

ESPLANADE.

Of the various interests that have received the attention of the Board, the question affecting the accommodation for Railways on the Esplanade has been most prominent, and acting under your instructions, the services of Mr. A. M. Wellington, C.E., of New York were secured to examine the existing and proposed status of the railway facilities along the water front of the city, and his report to the members of the Committee deals with the question in a manner that attracts attention.

Mr. Wellington points out that the difficulties felt in Toronto are common to it and to nearly every other large city on the Centinent, all arising from the general fact that the railways and the cities have grown up together very rapidly from small beginnings, when the magnitude to which the traffic of each would grow was little appreciated, and even if it had been appreciated capital was too scarce and costly to admit of adequate provisions to avoid such future difficulties, and to have exacted them would have prevented the construction of most of the early railways.

Mr. Wellington deals with the subject from the standpoint of recognition of the rights of the railways in their present position, and the question really at issue is which plan to adopt.

The railways on their part propose reaching the property south of Esplanade Street by means of overhead bridges; while on the part of the Joint Committee of the Citizens and Board of Trade the building of a viaduct is the plan that meets approval.

I believe that what is best for the City's interests will best serve the railways' interests in the end, and the question should be decided looking to the business and manufacturing interests, both present and future, of the city, and the free and unrestricted railway facilities necessary to each.

During this year great interest will centre around the

BANKING LEGISLATION,

necessary from the fact that the charters of all our banks expire in 1891.

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Further discussion upon this important topic has brought about very general agreement that the system of bank circulation in the United States is not superior to our own, and the serious dearth of the circulating medium felt recently on the other side has emphasized the necessity for the Canadian system. (In fact the editor of one of the chief financial papers in the United States is thoroughly advocating the adoption there of the Canadian system).

It is reasonable, as I had occasion to remark last year, that all fear of loss from or discount upon the bank note circulation should be removed from the public mind.

Certain Ontario and Quebec Banks have made arrangements during the year for the redemption of their notes in distant Provinces, reciprocating in kind with the banks there, so that notes which formerly were taken at a discount now pass at par.

Enough of this has been done to show that all objections on this score to the circulation can be removed by the existing banks themselves, if they so desire.

The other point, namely, the guaranteeing of the bank circulation where the resources of the larger and older and the smaller and newer banks vary so much, is probably more difficult for them to arrange among themselves, especially if provision has to be made for guaranteeing the circulation of every new bank venture that may be attempted.

Even this, however, may be attained by the co-operation of the Government in surrounding the granting of new charters with such conditions as will secure their being granted only upon a substantial and lasting basis, which the law as it stands does not secure.

Free banking, theoretically, is good, and will always be popular as against what savors of monopoly, but a wise conservatism is necessary in dealing with monetary institutions having power to issue bank notes, and if the needful guarantee of absolute indemnity against loss can be secured by the action of the banks themselves, who are best acquainted with the attendant risks, and necessary precautions, it will be infinitely preferable to their being compelled to hold gold or Government securities against their circulation, with the periodical stringency and contraction which this would precipitate.

It would also seem advisable that the renewal of the bank charters should not be limited as heretofore, their expiry always causing more or less disturbance to commerce, and then, like any other enactment they could be the subject of revision or improvement as the necessity arose.

BOARD OF TRADE BUILDING.

The new building has made rapid and satisfactory progress since I last addressed you. The Contractors commenced taking down the old American Hotel about 15th of May last, and the building is promised to be completed by September, and will cost when finished not over the limit

of \$400,000.00. The additional cost over the first estimate arose through the purchase of the "Wilkes" lot on the East side, without which the building could not have been the success it now is, either financially or architecturally. It is almost useless to comment on the beauty of the building, as it speaks by its pronounced, graceful style, for itself, and is praised on all hands. My opinion is that it will be a great credit to the Board, and members ought to feel a just pride in having not only the best Board of Trade building in the Dominion, but one of the finest buildings in the City. It was found necessary to get an Act passed at the last session of the Dominion Parliament, increasing the power of the Board to hold property and to issue debentures.

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The success of the financial scheme is in a great measure due to the public spirit displayed by our members and monetary institutions in so heartily subscribing for the second debentures, thus making the first a gilt-edged investment. The revenue is already assured, as enough of the space has been let to return the entire amount of interest on the debentures issued.

BUSINESS EDUCATION.

The recent appointment of a professor of Political Economy at the University of Toronto promises to be of great service to the mercantile community. The preparation of students for the profession of law and medicine has too long in a measure monopolized the attention of the higher schools of learning. The course of lectures provided for the University in this department includes all the subjects calculated to give a student preparing for business a safe and sound grounding in the higher branches of economic science, and better fit him for his career.

The Bankers' section of this Board has already recognized the great value of the course of study provided for by the Department of Economics, and its members are prepared to give the chair every encouragement.

MUNICIPAL REFORM.

How shall our municipal machinery be made adequate to the effective administration of our civic government, is THE question, to the solution of which the citizens must immediately address themselves.

In many other respects we have reason to be proud of the progress of the city, and the position it occupies among the prosperous cities of the continent; but owing partly to the defective system in operation, and largely to the unwillingness of our successful men of business to take part in this important department of public work, it will soon be said of us with reason, that the right of self-government we assume to prize so highly, is in our case misplaced, and just cause shown why we should be largely deprived of that we value so lightly as to allow it to become contemptible

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The many evils are admitted and deplored, by none more perhaps than by those who in the City Council have given honest, faithful, and intelligent service as aldermen.

But it is hopeless to expect radical reform exclusively from within: there must be strong organized persistent pressure from without, and no mere change of system will suffice, unless attended by the services of thoroughly competent business men, of high standing in the community.

If such men cannot be induced to undertake this work as a public duty, then as a matter of dollars and cents it will pay the citizens five times over to hire their services.

As a whole, it is a work of magnitude, but like all similar work it can be taken in detail and reduced to a system of efficient and economical administration, and yet not be entirely wanting in the elements of what is known as popular government.

Plans innumerable have been proposed, some of them of considerable merit, but none apparently so digested as to command general acceptance.

I can conceive of no more important service the Board can render the citizens than addressing itself to this subject, formulating a scheme, and uniting to put it into successful operation.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, I would again express the gratification I feel that the Board, at the close of the present year, is not only stronger numerically and financially than ever before in its history, but the interest manifested by the members, and the influence exerted by it in all commercial and public enterprises, has greatly increased.

I sincerely thank the members of the Board, and especially the Vice-Presidents and members of the Council, for their unvarying courtesy and generous support accorded me in my humble efforts for the advancement, welfare, and usefulness of the Toronto Board of Trade.

Mr. Edgar A. Wills, our secretary, has performed his duties with entire satisfaction, and it is largely owing to his energy and zeal that we have been able to secure such a number of desirable tenants for our new building, thus giving assurance of its proving a financial success.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT.

To the Members of the Board of Trade of the City of Toronto.

Gentlemen,—I beg to submit my annual report of the financial condition of the Board for the year ended December 31st, 1889.

Leaving a balance of Income over Expenditure of \$2,119 78

This balance I have added to the sum of \$9,503.57 we had in hand at the beginning of the year, and the two sums make a total of \$11,623.35 available for future contingencies.

We have maintained our membership, though several deaths have occurred during the year. It is still 915, with one life member—in all 916.

The fourth year of the GRATUITY SCHEME began on 1st July, 1889, and now 830 of our members are entitled to participate in its benefits. This leaves only 85 of the original members to come in and share in the scheme.

The total number of deaths since its establishment, 29th June, 1886, has been 24, two of those having occurred since July last.

The amount paid out to families of deceased members to this date has been \$24,058.40; and not a few of these have cause to thank the Board for having provided them with means when it was very badly needed.

The funds under the control of the Gratuity Board now amount to \$42,000, and are invested in Debentures, and on deposit in the Bank of Commerce.

The full details of our Income and Expenditure will be found on next page.

During the year 41 members have been elected, qualifying by the transfer to themselves of outstanding certificates of membership, the total membership of the Board being 916, including one honorary membership.

Pursuant to a By-law to that effect, certificates of membership suitably engraved were issued to the members on the 16th of March, 1886. From that period up to the close of the present year, 229 certificates have been transferred. Of this number 24 were those of deceased members.

Five members have died, all of whom were members of the Gratuity Fund, making the total number of deaths of members since the organization of the Fund on the 3rd of June, 1886, 24.

Eight hundred and thirty members out of the total 916 are members of the Gratuity Fund, an increase of 10 since the 31st of December, 1888, or an increase of 95 since the 1st of September, 1886.

TRADE SECTIONS.

I am pleased to be able to report that the efforts which have been put forth in the direction of the formation of Trade Sections during the past year have not been unavailing. Several important industries with large representation in the membership of the Board have taken advantage of the provisions of the By-laws, which with the sanction of the Council permit of the formation of Trade Sections..

The additions to the Trade Branches already in existence, are the Marine Section, whose Constitution and By-laws admit to membership Vessel Owners, and those interested in vessel property; also the Jewellers' Sections, whose constitution is still more elastic, admitting as it does to membership, all manufacturers of jewellery, clocks, silverware and kindred manufactures, also all wholesale dealers in jewellery, watches, clocks, fancy goods, &c.

During the year the Constitution and By-laws of the Wholesale Lumber Section have been amended, and it is now to be known as the Lumber Section of the Board of Trade of the City of Toronto. Membership therein is not now confined to wholesale dealers in lumber, but all lumber merchants and manufacturers of lumber, members of the Board, are eligible for membership.

During the year that has just closed, the various sections have demonstrated in a remarkable manner the value and importance to themselves of these Trade Branches. Steps are being taken looking to the formation in the near future of other Trade Sections, and I know of no more encouraging feature in connection with the best interests of the Board than the steady growth in number and usefulness of its Trade Branches.

The recognized influence and the important services rendered the public by the Toronto Board of Trade has greatly stimulated the growth

of Boards of Trade throughout the Province, and the expressions of good-will met with everywhere has been very gratifying to me.

Forty-nine donations have been received for the Library, irrespective of the Reports, &c., from the Dominion and Local Legislatures.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

TORONTO, JULY 3rd, 1889.

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To the Council of the Board of Trade, Toronto.

GENTLEMEN,

The Trustees of the Gratuity Fund in this their Third Annual Report, have to record that during the past year five deaths of members have occurred, the average age of whom was $44\frac{\pi}{5}$, while the percentage of deaths to the whole membership has been about $\frac{\pi}{5}$ of one per cent.

Thirteen members have subscribed to the Fund during the past year, thus bringing the total membership to 826, leaving still 90 original certificates of the Board outstanding. The aggregate ages of these thirteen members was 453, the average being thus 35 years.

Forty-three Certificates have been transferred during the past year to new members. Of these, one was taken by a subscriber past the limit of age (59 years) for participating in the benefit of the scheme. The average age of the balance of those retiring (42) was 42 years, and the average age of the new members was 36 years.

It will be noticed that the sum of \$13,195 has been collected during the year in assessments, and that \$5,171.45 has been paid by way of gratuities less \$543.68 held in trust,—the average amount of each gratuity being \$1,034.29, and the number of beneficiaries ten, the representatives of the five deceased members. The expense of administering the Fund has been \$651.15, and the assessments outstanding at the end of the year, and to be collected, \$39.00, is evidence of the punctuality with which the various assessments have been paid.

In every important respect, therefore, the anticipation of the promoters of the scheme have been fulfilled—the estimated surplus at the end of three years on a membership of nine hundred having been \$45,024, while the actual amount on hand with a membership of eight hundred and twenty-six is \$35,298.35.

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During the year the Trustees have held fifteen meetings; and the sum of \$17,000 belonging to the fund has been invested in securities yielding interest at the rate of $5\frac{60}{100}$ per cent. per annum.

Reference has already been made in the records of the Board to the loss sustained by the removal of our fellow-member, the late Hon. James Patton. No member took a more intelligent interest in the working of the scheme than he did, and he will be greatly missed from among us.

It is scarcely to be expected that future years will see so few inroads by death in our ranks, the percentage this year being abnormally small, but, greater or less, the beneficence connected with the operation of the Gratuity Fund must continue to be its prominent feature, and it is greatly to be desired that the remaining members of the Board eligible for participating in the scheme should, during the coming year, co-operate with the others in furthering its usefulness.

A Trustee falls to be elected at the Third Annual Meeting of the Subscribers in September next, in lieu of Mr. D. R. Wilkie, who retires by rotation.

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ORDER OF DISTRIBUTION OF THE GRATUITY FUND

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BOARD OF TRADE OF THE CITY OF TORONTO.

- If the deceased member shall leave surviving him a widow and no children, the whole is payable to the widow.
- If the deceased leave a child or children and no widow surviving, the whole is payable to such child or children in equal shares.
- If the deceased member leave a widow and a child or children surviving, one-half shall be payable to the widow and half to the child or children in equal shares.
- 4. In any case under which any child or the children of a deceased member would if surviving him, be entitled to the gratuity payable on his death or a share therein under any of the foregoing clauses, and such child or children do not survive him but leave (surviving him) more remote descendants, they shall take (in equal shares, per stirpes) the gratuity or share therein to which their parent or parents respectively, if surviving, would have been entitled.
- 5. If the deceased member leave no widow or children or more remote descendants surviving him, the gratuity shall be payable:—
- If the deceased leave father and mother, or either, surviving him, then to the father and mother in equal shares, or to the one if only one surviving.
- 7. If the deceased leave no father or mother surviving him, and leave brothers and sisters, or both, the gratuity shall be paid to the brothers and sisters in equal shares, and if there be also children of any deceased brother or sister, such children shall take in equal shares the share which the deceased parent, if surviving, would have taken; relatives of half-blood to take equally with those of whole blood.
- 8. The shares of minors to be paid to the legal guardians or their personal estate.
- 9. If there be no person entitled to the gratuity under any of the foregoing clauses the same may be disposed of and paid to any person or persons whom the Trustees of the Gratuity Fund, in their uncontrolled discretion, shall deem to have been wholly or partly dependent upon the deceased member or reasonably entitled to the benefit of the gratuity, or if the same be not so disposed of by the Trustees, it shall go to and form a part of the Gratuity Fund.
- 10. The shares of minors for whom no guardians shall be appointed may be paid into a legal depository of trust funds, subject to the order of such minors when they shall have arrived at full age, or to the order of their guardians when appointed.
- 11. All guardians must accept the guardianship in writing.
