"We have given instructions to all the postmasters and all handling the mail which is addressed to soldiers on Salisbury Plain, to use the greatest diligence and the greatest care so that there will be no delay or anything like that.

"We have even gone further than that," he continued, "for if there are any letters or parcels that come to Canada from our soldiers which are not sufficiently stamped, the postmassters have orders to stamp them without any extra charge, so that there will be no delay, and no cost to the recipients.

"We are taking up the matter of delays with the authority on the other side to find out where the cause lies. There are complaints in all the English and French papers about the postal service in England.
