It must be borne in mind that the great majority of the schools which come under Regulation 17 are not made up exclusively minority of English-speaking child-ren. It was the failure of these schools to give the minority of Eng-lish-speaking children a suitable education in their own tongue which led first to agitation, then to in-vestigation, and finally to the remedial action taken by the Ontario Derartment of Education.

in most cases the English-speaking children who were thus discriminated against are Catholic children. This is, for the most part, a separ-ate school problem. Irish, Scotch and English Catholic parents object to their children in attendance at an English-French bi-lingual school being given incomplete instruction in English. There is reason to be-lieve that in the majority of these cases the defective teaching in Eng-lish was deliberate, for the purpose of driving the English-speaking peo-ple out of the community and thus facilitating the French conquest of Eastern Ontario. It is because this carefully-worked-out plan to achieve ractal ambittons by a refusal to teach English adequately is being successfully blocked by the applica-tion of Regulation 17 that there has been this outburst of Nationalist fury and this daring attempt to coerce Ontario.'
