A London dispatch on Nov. 23, said that advices received from Amsterdam were that General Ludendorff had started for the eastern front in connection with the Russian offer of truce.

The Situation

London, Nov. 28.—Little excitement has attended the elections to the Constitutent Assembly now being held in Petrograd says the Petrograd correspondent of the Dally Mail, in a dispatch, dated Tuesday. He thinks that less than 50 per cent, of those entitled to vote, cast their votes, but perhaps another 10 per cent, would vote before the polls closed Tuesday afternoon.

News from the army fronts, the correspondent says, is contradictory, but apparently the vast mass of soldiers support the Lenine government. "In August, 1917," said the Minister, "the Belgian army had twelve times as many machine guns as in 1914, seven times as many field guns and heavy pieces, with five times as much ammunition as was on hand at the outset of hostilities.
