The remarks, with which the hon, member prefaced the introduction of this Bill, were to this effect—that the Town and Royalty of Georgetown, although formerly a separate Road Divitici, were attached to one, which, of itself, was so extensive, that it was almost impossible for one Commission-er to descharge the duties consequent upon the union. The object of the Bill was, therefore, to disconnect the Town and Royalty of Georgetown from the District to which they had, for some time, been annezed, and to render them again a separate and distinct District.

Hon. 
