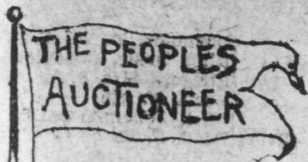

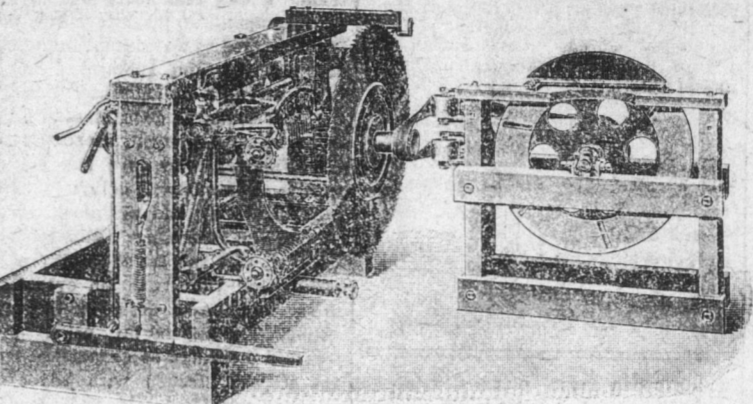

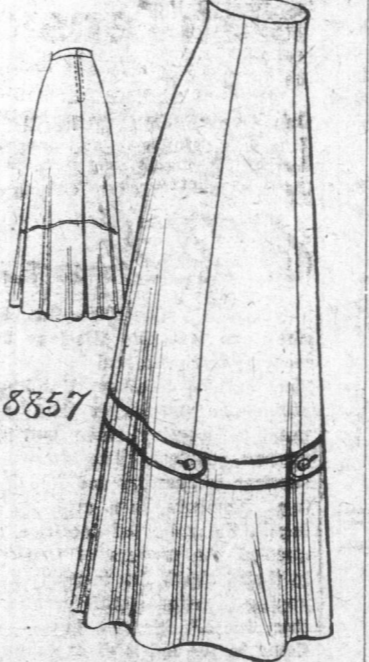

The Tenderfoot Farmer

It was one of these experimental farmers, who put green spectacles on his cow and fed her shavings. His theory was that it didn't matter what the cow ate so long as she was fed. Household Notes.

When next frying oysters, dip them first in mayonnaise and then in crumbs before immersing in the deep fat. They will be found delicious. Do not destroy any net from old curtains. Cut into squares of desired size and stitch together, and they will make excellent washcloths. Be careful never to use too much butter in cake. Use a scant amount rather than what the rule calls for, and it will save many a poor cake. If gilt frames are coated with copal varnish it will preserve them and they can be washed with water without removing the lustre from the gilt. A saucer of baked beans can be heated with castup in a pan and a spoonful of toasted crackers serves nicely for the noonday luncheon. Wipe off screens with a duster each morning and beat with a soft brush. The heating should be done lightly in order that the wire be not burned. Cold water, a teaspoonful of ammonia and soap will remove machine grease when other means would not answer on account of colors running. Don't handle the dough any more than necessary when making biscuits, doughnuts and cookies. The more you handle it the tougher it will become. To wash water bottles or any vase having a long neck, fill with clear, hot water and tiny bits of torn paper. Shake well and rinse in clear water. When frying doughnuts, French fried potatoes or anything of the kind drain on brown paper and you will find the grease drawn out into the paper. Romaine served with French dressing is tasty. 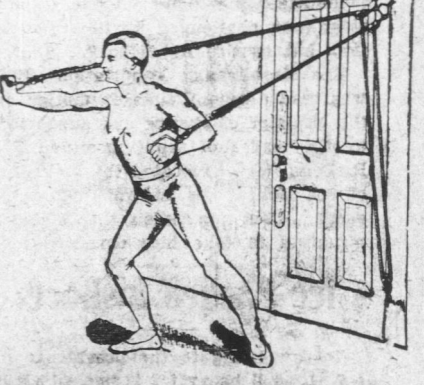

In the Assembly.

There was not much doing in the House yesterday. There was the usual batch of petitions presented. Mr. Earle commenced the presentation, setting forth that Joe Batt's Arm wanted another road, Fogo a well, Seldom Come Bay to exterminate dogs; coastal service, telephones and roads formed the burden of the prayers of Salvage Bay and Happy Adventure, as presented by the Hon. Minister of Justice, Hon. C. Emerson told of the need of a bridge at Harbor Breton; Mr. Cliff made it clear that Boyd's Cove needed a telephone service and the call of coastal boats; Mr. Clapp presented a petition, forwarded by Father O'Rourke of Bonne Bay, which set forth the necessity of erecting a lighthouse at Ferrole Point. Mr. Clapp showed that the fishermen of St. Barbe's were not abundantly blessed with lights, and emphasized the need of granting this request and attending to wants of like nature elsewhere in the district.

Sir Robert Bond gave notice of question in relation to the landing of certain cables on the island, and Mr. Cliff gave notice of question in reference to marine grants allocated for District of Twillingate, and as to whether a license of occupation of land at Peter's Arm had been granted to Dr. A. C. Ames.

In reply to Mr. Clapp's question as to a steam service for White Bay, the Hon. Colonial Secretary stated that the routes and service referred to, have been within the past twelve months discussed by the Government with residents from the District. The Government recognize that something will have to be done.

The Cold Storage Bill passed the Committee Stage and on the report stage was challenged by the Opposition, but carried by 14 to 7.

The Esquimaux Deportation Bill was read a second time on motion of the Minister of Justice and supported by the leader of the Opposition, Sir R. Bond, who advocated the inclusion of the Montagnais Indians within its scope. This suggestion the Minister promised to take into consideration.

Ice Packed Inshore.

To-day owing to the prevalence of a N.E. wind heavy ice is packed right along the coast from Cape St. Francis south, and it is impossible for shipping to leave or enter port. It is very heavy on the outside, the slob being pressed in close on the land. Reports round the city are to the effect that large numbers of old seals are in Conception Bay.

NORTHERN ICE REPORT.—Reports from mostly all the northern bays to the Fisheries Department, to-day show that they are filled with ice and slob. Bonavista Bay reports 6 miles of ice on the south side of the bay, which a heavy steamer would get through.

Shannahan and the Cute Man on Beaver Hats.

The Cute Man is very quiet and doesn't air his opinions very often, but last night he held sway and allowed his dreams to unfold themselves to us. "I was just dreaming," said he, "of the good old days when the Beaver Hat held sway, when 'twas considered a disgrace almost to attend the funeral of a near relative or a 'true' friend without wearing the Beaver Hat. For goodness sake, Tucker, says he, don't come with a peak cap; if you can't rise the 'tend' of a Beaver, don't come at all. I won't fall out with you or think you the worse for it, never fear."

When she heard of her sweetheart's death she hurried off to Chartres, and the scene when she was taken to see the dead aviator in his coffin was touching in the extreme. She was taken back to Paris, where she brought a wreath of roses. She followed the hearse to the cemetery on the day of burial, and was in a terrible state during the night. The next afternoon she left her home, walked to the cemetery, knelt down on a dead lover's grave, and placed a revolver against her heart, pulled the trigger. She was found a few seconds later quite dead, her head lying on the wreath of roses, already says the Leader, beginning to fade.

City Council Meeting.

Mayor Ellis presided at the meeting of the City Council held last evening.

A long discussion ensued over the question of Councillor Mullaly's resolutions to extend the franchise to the young men of the city who have not voted and to people paying taxes in the town and residing in the suburbs. Mr. Woods, the P.M.G., asked that the Council place a green lamp in front of the Post Office. The Council will inform Mr. Woods that he will have to work along with the old advertisement lamp.

Ayre & Sons complained of snow being dumped in the public cove near their premises, Water Street. They feared that when a thaw would come their premises would be flooded. The Engineer will attend to the complaint.

The complaint of Inspector General Sullivan about the almost impassable condition of some streets on account of snow, making the work of the firemen difficult in getting to a fire, will be attended to.

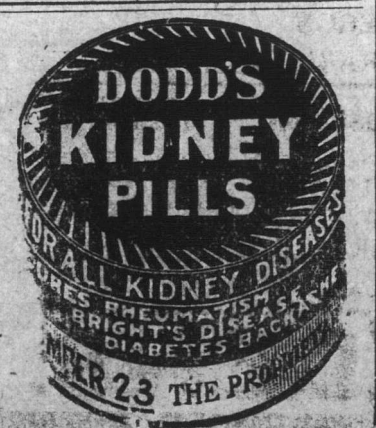
The request of the Nickel Manager for a reduction in the taxation imposed on his theatre show will be considered by a special committee.

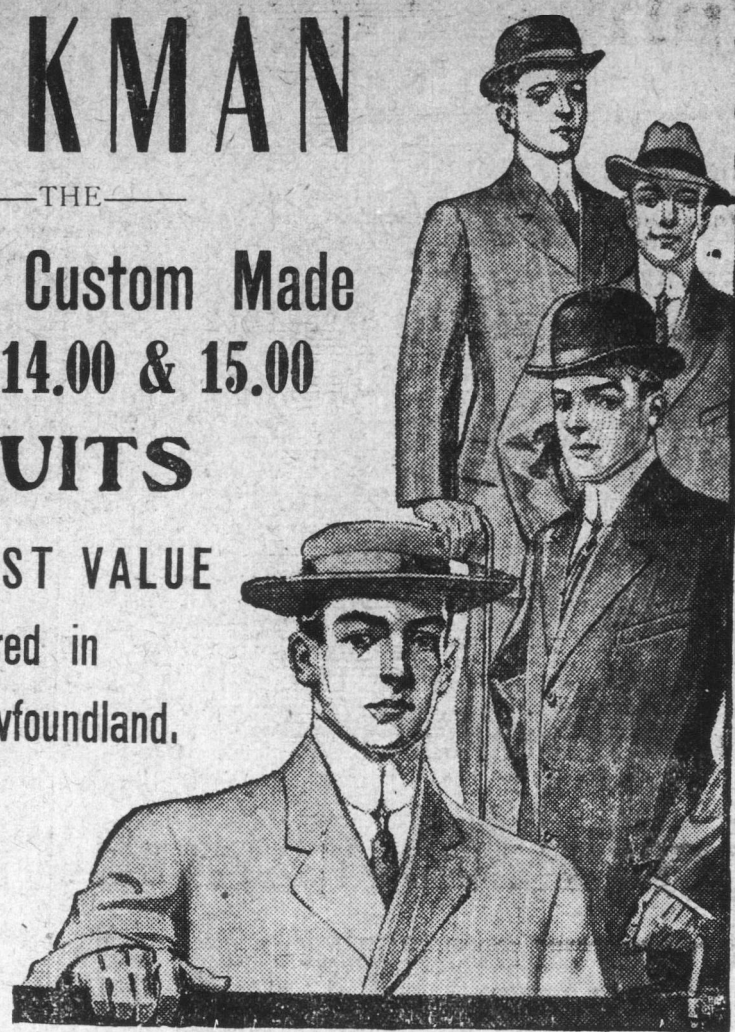

KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK.

Special to Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, This Morning. Brakesman Sargent and Baggage-master McLoughlin were killed in a train wreck on the Halifax South-western Railway yesterday.

Messrs. Tait, Higgins and Mitchell

OXFORD - CANADIAN TEAM WIN EVERYTHING.

Dr. Tait received a letter from his son this morning saying that his hockey team, the Oxford-Canadian, had won the match for the English championship with the London team in the Prince's Rink in that city. The score was 11 to 2 in their favor.

Mitchell and Higgins of St. John's are also on the team, and their achievement will be read with pride by all Newfoundlanders. In their European tour they won every match, their average being 12 to 1 right throughout. They won five cups. Their tour in Europe occupied three weeks, during which they played 17 games, viz. three at Brussels, three at Berlin, three at Prague, four at Les Avantes and four at Chamoux. They scored 204 goals as against 17. After returning to Oxford they finished their tour by playing for the championship of England at the Prince's Rink, London, winning there also by 11 goals to 2. In this last contest there were three Newfoundlanders, Tait, Higgins and Mitchell. In the continental tour Mitchell did not play. In Germany they won by 7 to 0; Belgium, 10 to 0; France, 4 to 2; England, 11 to 2. It is a great honour for Newfoundland, and Canada should not get all the credit for it as implied in the name of the team.

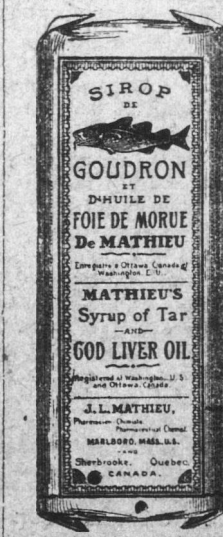

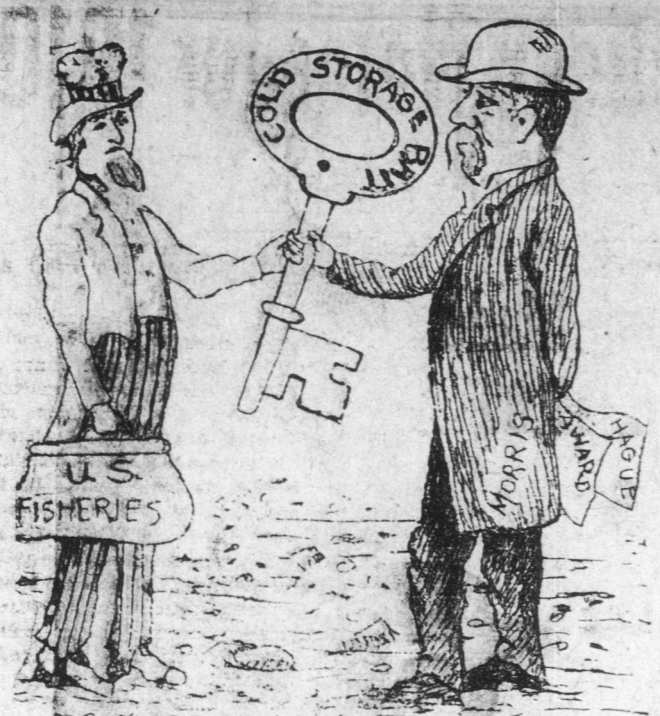

The Conception Bay British Society's Jubilee.

Very Successful Celebration.

That valuable old institution, the Conception Bay British Society, celebrated its Jubilee yesterday in a most fitting way. At 9.30 the members gathered in their hall, and headed by their fine band and accompanied by the Juniors—King Edward Branch—they attended Divine service in the Methodist Church. The service was a very hearty one, and the pastor, Rev. T. B. Dandy, preached a most fitting sermon, which was very highly spoken of by the large congregation.

At 8 p.m. the members with their wives and sweethearts assembled in the hall, and the committee set themselves to the task of making the affair an "At Home" in every sense. The dance took place in the upper or Masonic portion of the hall. At 10 p.m. the whole company repaired to the refreshment room, where everything was in readiness for supper. After full justice had been done to the good things provided, the President, Mr. Albert Rogers, called the company to order, and in his usual happy style gave a very clear summary of the good work accomplished by this benevolent institution since its formation. Addresses to the point were also made by Judge Oke, Mr. Thomas Ford, Mr. Herbert Andrews and Mr. Bernard Parsons.

To begin at the beginning, the President stated that the Society was organized on Feb. 2nd, 1861. Its first President was J. L. Roddick; from 1862 to 1864 that office was filled by H. T. Moore; 1865-66, George C. Rutherford; 1866-69, Joseph Godden; 1870, James Hipsley; 1871-72, John Strathie (still a member, and a resident of St. John's); 1873-77, Wm. M. Ford; 1878-79, Thomas Wills; 1880, Wm. Ford; 1881-83, D. Fletcher; 1884-86, Joseph Russell; 1887-88, Jno. Strathie; 1889, Thomas Henderson; 1890-93, Nathaniel Pike (now of Grand Falls); 1894, Henry Hiscock (now of St. John's); 1895-97, W. A. Oke; 1898-1900, Nathaniel Pike; 1901, W. A. Oke; 1902, Nathaniel Pike; 1903, H. Albert Rogers. There are at the present time, five of the above gentlemen living, viz., Messrs. Strathie, Hiscock, Pike, Oke and Rogers. The

officers for the first year were: J. L. Roddick, President; H. T. Moore, Vice-Pres.; George C. Rutherford, Treasurer; Jas. Hipsley, Secretary; with the following committee: J. D. Withycombe, John Strathie, Andrew Rutherford, Jas. Godden, Joseph Godden, Capt. Geo. Brown, Chas. W. Ross, W. S. Squarey and Geo. Howell. The gentlemen composing the first building committee have all passed away except John Strathie and Geo. Makinson.

It is hard to estimate what good has been accomplished by this body, but some idea can be gathered from the following summary: The stock benefits paid out from 1894 to 1910 was \$11,849, and mortality money during the same period, \$4,360, making a total of \$16,209.00, or over \$1,000.00 each year. It is safe to say that in its fifty years of existence about \$45,000 have been paid out. The Society is still in a flourishing condition, and with such excellent officers, backed up by the noble army of fellow workers, it is sure to go on increasing in numbers as well as in usefulness.

Before the party left the feast room Judge Oke, at the request of Mrs. A. Rogers, presented the body with two beautiful pictures, one each of King George and Queen Mary. This present was given in memory of her father, Mr. William Brown, who was an earnest and esteemed member for a number of years. About 2 o'clock the celebration came to a close by the hearty singing of God Save the King.

Davis, Jordan Sheppard, Edmund Rogers, Captain James Parmenter, George Davis, Robert Tetford, Alex. Crocker, Thomas Shaw, Geo. Gordon, John Webber, Lorenzo Sheppard, Geo. French, John N. Ash, Chas. Garland and Thomas Courage. The ladies, too, took their parts well, and were accorded a hearty vote of thanks.

Epsom Salts Rout Lockjaw. Mankato, Minn., Feb. 2.—Six weeks ago Herman Mattson of Anboy lost part of one of his fingers in a corn shredder, and three weeks later lock-jaw set in. He was brought to Mankato and placed in a hospital and solutions of Epsom salts were injected into his spinal column. He began to improve, the salts aiding his system in developing an antitoxin. The physician said that Mr. Mattson will recover. This is the second case of lockjaw that has been successfully treated in Mankato. It is said that there have been but eleven cases so treated in the United States.

Uses of a Moustache. Dr. Paul Klager, the famous Viennese physician, declares that the growing fashion of shaving the moustache is responsible for the growing number of patients suffering from headaches and diseases of the respiratory organs. Among 500 cases of serious headaches and diseases of the nose and throat he had counted 120 patients who had their moustaches shaved off. The moustache is of course a natural protection for the nose against the invasion of cold air, dust, and microbes. Women are not so often in the streets and wear veils to protect themselves, and their nostrils are narrower than those of men.

Alligator Shoots Chutes. The very last creature that the average man would select as a trick animal is the alligator; yet even that deliberate brute can sometimes hit a swift pace. It has been trained to shoot the chutes with easy grace. This feat is performed regularly at an alligator farm in California, the big saurian waddling up the incline at the other side and sliding down the water chute at express train speed. At this novel farm there are five hundred or more specimens, ranging in size from the huge bull to the newly hatched, lizard-like youngsters. They are raised for their hides, although the sale of little fellows for pets and the admission to the grounds help to swell the profits of this unusual business.

How He Escaped. Two Americans were disputing as to which had experienced the greatest cold in winter. Said one: "In the part of Iceland where I was last summer the ground is frozen so hard all the year round that when they want to bury a man they just sharpen his feet and drive him in with a pile hammer." My room was on the top story. No fire escape or ladders in that primitive settlement. Staircases burned away. Luckily kept my presence of mind. 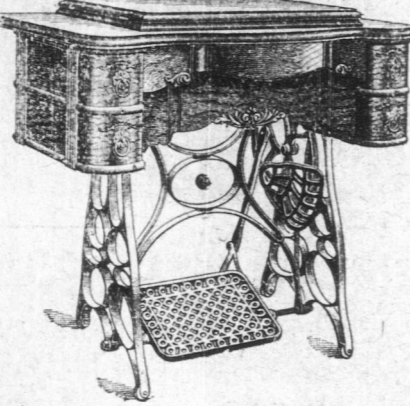

Special Evening Telegram.
 WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.
 The bill direct was passed to-day on the floor of the House of Representatives. It came during a debate on a bill for leasing coal lands in Alaska. Representative James Wickersham of Alaska, Republican, rushed at Representative Frank W. Mondell, of Wyoming, also Republican, and struck at him. Angry words and threats were uttered by other members who took part in the affair. Several members hurled themselves on Wickersham, whilst others were struggling with Mondell, who was making for his assailant. Representative Foster had taken Wickersham by the throat. This added to the uncontrolled anger of the delegate, and for the moment diverted his attack to the would-be peacemaker. Mondell endeavored to raise the chair in which he had been sitting in order to hurl it at his antagonist. For the first time for four years the Sergeant-at-Arms had to carry to the floor the Mace, emblem of authority, to restore order.

Immigration Inspector.
 President Taft has appointed Mr. Edwin B. Woods, well-known in St. John's, Immigration Inspector.
 A gentleman in this city received a letter a few days ago from a friend in New York, from which we take the following:—
 The announcement from Washington that President Taft has just appointed Edwin B. Woods, Esq., Special Immigration Inspector to investigate contract labor conditions in the United States will, no doubt, be received with delight by Mr. Woods' many friends in Newfoundland and New York.
 Mr. Woods was born in St. John's, Newfoundland, in 1850, and was educated at the Wesleyan Academy where he graduated in 1864. In 1871 he emigrated to the United States, and entered the law office of Martin & Smith, Wall Street, New York, among whose clients were Jay Gould, J. C. Cook and Geo. B. Grinnell, financial magnates of their day; and to the atmosphere of his surroundings, with confidential clerk to the firm, may be attributed the wide knowledge of affairs in general he now possesses, and which will make him an important factor in the work of the department to which the President has just assigned him.
 In 1888 Mr. Woods was appointed Commissioner of the Supreme Court of Newfoundland for the State of New York, which is a life position. He is especially prominent in mission work among the Chinese of New York, and to this fact, in some degree, may be attributed his present appointment, as the position was much sought after, both for the honour and the handsome remuneration it carries with it, but, through the influence of his friends, having secured a private interview with the President, Mr. Woods received the appointment.
 In the Newfoundland colony of New York he is held in high esteem, and was the unanimous choice of the committee for Chairman of the "Newfoundland Night" Ball for 1910, the success of which is beyond question, he having brought together, in a friendly spirit, on that occasion the presidents of the three Newfoundland Societies.

Holiday Notes for 1910.

CHAPTER XII.—We Stroll Into Mr. Clouston's Fish and Glue Factory.

At the first meeting of the citizens which was convened two years ago at the Court House, and held in the Council Chambers, for the purpose of considering the advisability of forming the Board of Trade, the Hon. Sir E. F. Morris spoke for one hour, and among many worthy and important statements he also made the following: "Paradoxical as it may seem, the worst calamity that could happen Newfoundland, would be a big cod-fishery." In justification of this statement he further said that the limited nature of our markets was the ground upon which he based it.

Whether we catch too much codfish, or whether too many of our people are fishing, is not an essential question just here, nor will we record any opinion pro or con, but we do claim that we have been, and still are, salt-curing too much codfish.
 With this fact staring us in the face we felt a double interest in the new modes of putting up our staple as adopted by Mr. Clouston. We had long believed that there was room for some improvement, therefore finding ourselves on the spot where experiments in this direction were being made, we asked divers and many questions.

We began with the fundamental one of splitting and washing the fish. In this feature we noticed that the splitting was complete and that the whole fish was laid open, and that ample time had been given the work. Right here is where many of our local fishermen fail. They do not fully split their fish, but in their haste they leave three or four inches of many of the fish unsplit. Following the splitting process came the washing, salting, etc., and all this was being done with the utmost care. The water was kept renewed, the cloths used were very clean, and the result was that the fish were put in bulk, or press, in a most wholesome and clean condition.

Thus the basis of good cure was laid, and with the drying and other necessary finishing processes carried out along the same lines, the product was No. 1 in every respect. The flesh of the fish was clean and the colour of the fish was clear and butter-like or saffron. The fish was well and fully cured, and was evidently well adapted to hold its own in spite of climatic changes.

On enquiring from Mr. Clouston we learned that the initial stages of his experiment were over, and that he is now confident of what can be done in a more improved method of curing codfish. This is certainly good news, and if applied more generally to our great fishing industry, it will con-


