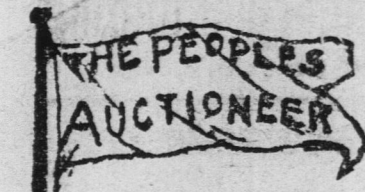

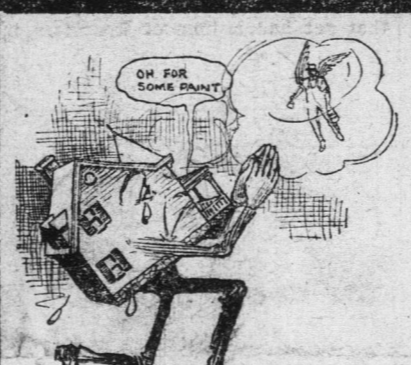

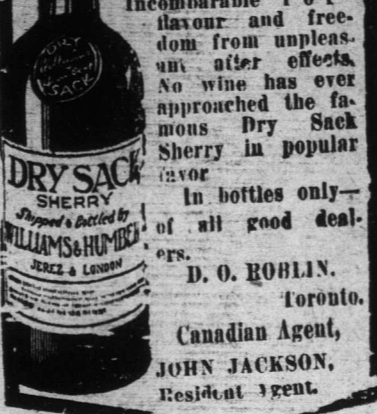

Peter Purfield, a policeman stationed there, thought it was the missing "Big Tim" and which later was identified. He was worth about \$2,000,000.

Some of these illustrations become so piquant that father keeps his copy down at the office and tells the children that his subscription has expired. Many of the serial stories in the average magazine would not be intelligible at all if it were not for the accompanying illustrations, which aim to do full justice to the subject by portraying the heroine in nine different poses and styles of negligee.

Women's magazines are those which tell how to make the blouse skirt build a six-room bungalow for \$280, not including labor or material, prepare fancy desserts with nothing in the house but sour milk and bread crumbs, and maintain a flower garden without allowing the fingers to come in contact with work. These magazines cause a good deal of home-made dyspepsia, but in other respects are very valuable.

Malicious Attack on Rt. Hon. Sir R. Bond.

COAKER VOLUNTEERED FOR BONAVISTA FIGHT.

We notice that the Daily News this morning states that when the alliance between the Liberal Party and the Fishermen's Protective Union was made, Sir Robert Bond "insisted on Coaker going to Bonavista for a very obvious reason."

Now in the first place there is no man in existence in a better position to know the terms of the agreement and the negotiations which led up to the alliance than the editor of the Evening Telegram. We make this statement in order to show that we are in a position to know exactly the facts of the situation, and we state without fear of successful contradiction that the suggestion that President Coaker should go to Bonavista did not come from Sir Robert Bond or from any member of the Liberal Party. Sir Robert Bond never insisted on President Coaker going to Bonavista for any reason, either obvious or not. The suggestion came from President Coaker himself. President Coaker himself volunteered for Bonavista District.

We make this statement because of the express misrepresentation of the Daily News and the sinister insinuation made against the honor of Sir Robert Bond and the freedom of will of President Coaker.

The express misrepresentation is contained in the statement that Sir Robert Bond insisted on Mr. Coaker going to Bonavista. Sir Robert Bond did not insist. President Coaker made the offer. This disposes completely of the assertion that any compulsion was exercised by Sir Robert Bond, or that any compulsion was submitted to by President Coaker. This assertion was made by the Hon. John Alexander Robinson, who is not in a position to know anything about the arrangement, is absolutely false and made with recklessness as to its truth or falsehood. Moreover, it is made maliciously, because it is insinuated that Sir Robert Bond insisted "for a very obvious reason."

As the "insistence" alleged is not a fact, the reason is false and it is also insulting, for it is an insinuation that Sir Robert Bond exercised the compulsion in bad faith, that he did it for a sinister purpose and that he did it for a dishonorable end. These insinuations are all false for he exercised no insistence at all.

Mr. Coaker acted absolutely voluntarily. He made up his mind himself to go to Bonavista and the announcement of his candidature in the Advocate was approved. Mr. Coaker has done a bold and manly action in volunteering for the Bonavista District. Even the man most sceptical of the strength of the F. P. U., who is usually the man who knows least about it, must acknowledge, Mr. Coaker has done a "sporty thing" in placing his public life on the event of the Bonavista election.

There is no one who has had a better chance of knowing the Union feeling in the Bonavista District than Mr. Coaker, and he considers that he can carry the District, and he knows if anyone does.

We have full confidence in his ability to carry everything before him in that District. In spite of the fact that the Morris Party candidates obtained such a large majority in 1909. There can be no doubt of the overwhelming change in that District. If evidence was needed to prove this, we have only to turn back to last December and recall the magnificent demonstrations, the great meetings, the denunciations of the Government, the effigy burning of McGrath and the action of the F. P. U. in presenting their President with the watch now on exhibition at Mr. Roper's.

The Fishermen's Advocate on Saturday said:—

"That Mr. Coaker and his two colleagues will be returned we have no doubt. If any one imagines Bonavista Bay fishermen are going back on Coaker and their Union and intend to murder the F. P. U. with their own hands and send President Coaker back to his farm at Coakerville, they will wake up by and by to find that no such thing will be done. Unless Bonavista Bay is won for the Union when the elections come off the F. P. U. will disappear, for without Coaker the organization at this stage of its existence would die a quick death. If Bonavista defeats Coaker, he will no longer continue to be President of the F. P. U., nor will he go into another district. The issue in Bonavista will decide the future of the F. P. U., and the part that Coaker is destined to take in the future welfare of the Colony."

The Government, the Government and the Legislative Council

The public astonishment that the vacancies in the Legislative Council should be filled at this late hour on the eve of a general election and at a time when no Legislature exists to transact public business but when the Government of the day has imposed its existence upon the people for a period of six months beyond the time allowed by law. The Government's term of office began the General Election in May 1909 and expired four years later. There is now no Legislature in existence and there has been none since June last. Notwithstanding this fact, these appointments are made by a Government which should have been sent before the

people six months ago. It is an outrage upon the community—why has it been done? Why has His Excellency the Governor allowed himself to be a party to such a palpable fraud upon the rights of the public? Surely the people of the Colony have a right, to an explanation of such an unheard of proceeding. What is the political significance of this move on the part of the Government? It has been actuated by two principal motives, one to embarrass the incoming Government by placing Morris nominees in a majority in the Council that he may manipulate his pawns in the Upper House to obstruct the wishes of the people at large as expressed at the polls next month. Surely the Governor has placed himself in a most invidious position by allowing his high office to be used by a political trickster like Morris as a tool to thwart the wishes of the people expressed in a constitutional way at the polls. If this is so he has been either fooled by Morris or he has deliberately become a party to this political fraud. Will this kind of thing ever stop? Is the Colony to be always at the mercy of a Governor who either deliberately or foolishly allows himself to be the political tool of men of the Morris stamp. The other motive which has actuated Morris in this matter is to pacify political followers who are in revolt against himself and his policy of ruin. Both motives deserve the condemnation of all thoughtful men. It is a disgrace to the country to the Government and to the Governor to see the Legislative Council made a mere "dummy" to be used for political cast-offs like Murphy. Fortunately the appointments are only provisional and it is to be hoped the people will protest in most emphatic manner against appointments like this under the present circumstances.

These appointments should not be made now because:—

(1) There is no Legislature to which these men can be nominated. The Legislature went out of existence in May last.

(2) It is an effort by Morris after his term of office has expired to fill up the Council with his nominees in order to obstruct the wishes of the people in spite of the wishes of the people themselves as expressed at the polls.

Surely the Governor should have waited for the result of the Election before consenting to these appointments.

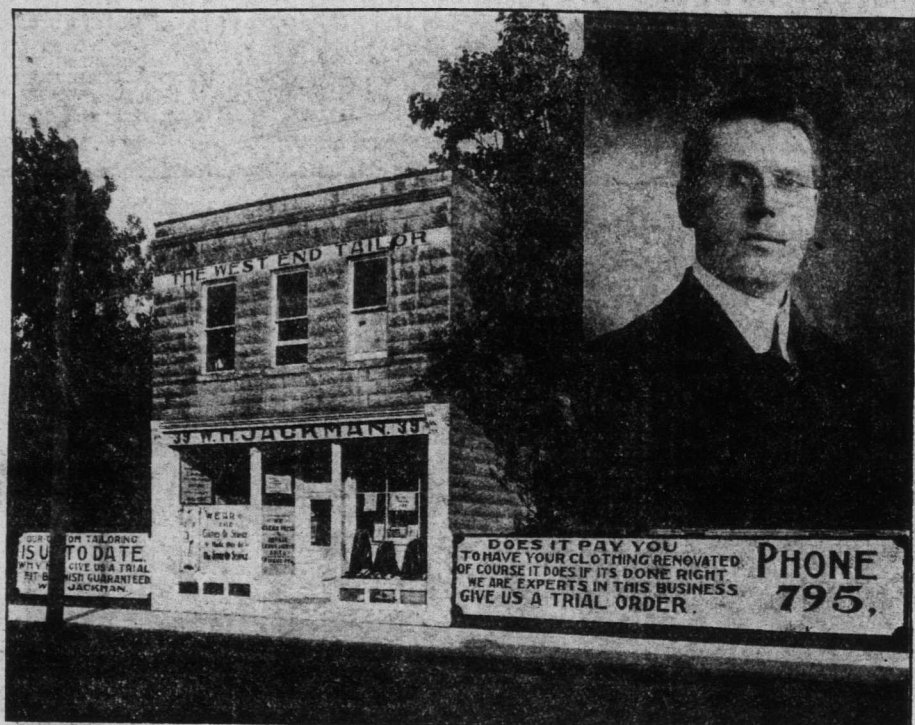

NEW YORK, To-day. Jose Manuel Hernandez, Venezuelan General, known as E. Mocho, sailed on the steamer Mocho, for San Juan To-day, with plans for an action whereby he hopes to depose President Gomez of Venezuela.

BRESLAU, Germany, To-day. Seven of fourteen prominent men arrested and accused of improper relations with young girls, have committed suicide. Among them was one officer and one former police official. The police are in possession of the names of nearly a hundred girls, who it is alleged, were implicated.

BETHEL, To-day. Ernest Solway, the discoverer of a process for the manufacture of soda, celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of that discovery, by giving more than \$1,000,000 to educational and charitable institutions and employees of his firm. The Universities of Paris and Nancy each received \$100,000.

OTTAWA, To-day. At the Rockliffe Rifle Range on Saturday afternoon Quarter Master Sergeant Harris of the Ottawa 5th Princess Louise Dragoon Guards was shot and killed. The fatal shot was fired just as several teams representing corps of the Ottawa Garrison were preparing to shoot for the Dundonald match, when a sharp crack of a rifle shot attracted the attention on the right of the firing line; Harris was seen to stagger and fall.

HEIDELBERG, To-day. Only a small number of persons, chiefly representatives of princely houses, were present at the funeral this evening of Princess Sophia, only daughter of Prince William of Saxe-Weimar. Eisenach. Hans von Helldroeder, for the hopeless love of whom the Princess killed herself, did not attend the services. It is understood he was asked not to attend. He left Heidelberg after a three hours' stay. The aged father of Princess repeatedly threw himself across the casket.

LONDON, To-day. Sir Edward Carson, leader of the Irish Unionists, is now engaged in reviewing volunteers in various places in Antrim. Speaking at a demonstration in Antrim Castle today, he pointed to General Sir George Richardson, who holds the post of General Officer commanding Volunteers, and said, "We have our General on the platform. The Radical press is exhibiting some emotion at the presence of this great General among us. I had better tell the Government we have more, we have the pledges of some of the greatest Generals in the army, that they will come over and help us to keep the old flag flying when the time arrives."

LONDON, To-day. A weekly dispatch editorial headed "Last Championship," asks "Is British sport to suffer a total eclipse?" The dispatch adds the last Olympic games were heart-breaking exhibition of our athletic decadence. Now we have the better reflection of reading of the defeat of the great Vardon. We cannot help feeling American methods, thorough, perfect self control played out their part. The Sunday Times says that the greatest representatives of British golf failing to win the American Championship will be the

cause of National regret and little amusement, but all other feelings will be extinguished in the admiration for the wonderful feat of Oulmet, who proved himself to be one of the greatest golfers. It has ever been heretofore that British golfers regarded American Championships as something they could pick up or leave alone as the spirit moved them, never forward that will not be the case.

BROOKLYN, Mass., To-day. Oulmet trailed the leaders in the first half of the championship round, tied with Harry Vardon and Edward Ray, famous English professionals, for first place in the final round, then completely outplayed them in the eighteenth hole extra round. Oulmet won with a score of 72 strokes, two under par, for one of the hardest courses in the country. Vardon finished five strokes behind Oulmet, with 77. Ray took third place with 78.

ALEXANDRIA, Ontario, To-day. Mrs. J. A. H. Taylor, Montreal, shot and killed her daughter, Mrs. Harold W. Norton, and seriously wounded a thirteen-year-old grandchild also of Montreal, on Sunday morning while they were asleep at the home of her son, J. A. H. Taylor. On Saturday evening Mrs. J. A. H. Taylor, sr., Mrs. Harold W. Norton, and Lulu Norton came from Montreal to Alexandria on a visit. The family retired late on Saturday night. Mrs. Norton and her child were sleeping downstairs while the others slept upstairs. On Sunday morning at day-break they were startled by revolver shots and screams. Mr. Taylor, sr., rushed to the stairs when he met his wife coming up with her face streaming with blood. Mrs. Taylor, who had been suffering for some time from melancholia, had found a loaded 32 calibre revolver in the drawer in her son's dresser. She concealed it in her hat and came downstairs to the room in which Mrs. Norton and her child Lulu were sleeping. Without any warning while she still slept she shot Mrs. Norton in the left eye, then shot the child in the temple and turned the gun on herself. This shot, however, failed to kill her. Mrs. Norton died from the effects of the wound in the eye.

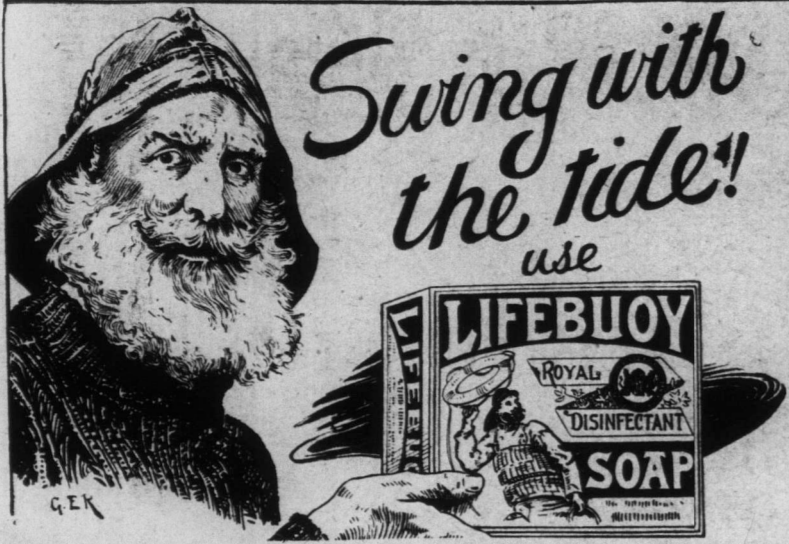

Cable News.

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 21. An attempt of the Telesco Branch of the Independent Order of Odd-fellows to establish a General Assembly, has been voted down by the Sovereign Grand Lodge for further consideration, and the proposed plan is indefinitely postponed.

HALIFAX, Sept. 21.

The sealing schooner Ida M. Clarke, has cleared for the South Atlantic sealing grounds, Capt. Ryan, of North Sydney, in command. The following Newfoundlanders are among the crew: Wm. Dominey, West Coast, mate; Fred and Robert Rossiter of Ramca; Alan and Howard Harnish, of the West Coast, and George Radnell.

LONDON, Sept. 21.

It is stated that a deadlock has been reached in the Commonwealth Parliament, and that preparations for another election are being made. Premier Cook, who is faced with practically the same difficulty in regard to the senate, as was Premier Borden, in Canada, has explained to the Governor General that even with a net majority of two or three, he could not hope to be long in administrative control. He will not be satisfied with securing the dissolution of the Lower House without revising the personnel of the Senate.

BERLIN, Sept. 21.

The Cologne Gazette prints a semi-official article severely criticizing Lieut. General von Bernhardt for an essay in which he spoke of the possibility of getting Ireland to side with Germany, in case of war between this country and Britain. The article was based on an essay in the Irish review on the attitude of Ireland in the case of war. The Cologne Gazette stigmatizes the article in the Irish review as crazy, and says in regard to General Bernhardt's contention that war is inevitable, that Germany will continue her policy of settling disputes with England with the support of the overwhelming majority of its population. This repels completely to the idea of a war of conquest against England.

LONDON, Sept. 21.

The Committee appointed by the Government to investigate the Land problem, or at any rate, that part of it, which deals with the rural worker, have made the following recommendations: (1) A widespread system of small holdings, cultivated by tenant occupiers, holding the land at equitable rents, with security of tenure; (2) The system to be safeguarded by the establishment of Land Courts with judicial powers; (3) Establishment of Wages Boards to adjust wages in accordance with local conditions; (4) Re-adjustment of the hours of labour, and more frequent holidays. A system of land purchase financed by the State was rejected by the Committee on various grounds, the chief of which was that peasant proprietors must sooner or later become burdened with debt and sink into the clutches of money-lenders. Housing rural workers is for the moment left an open question, though it may be taken up on this question the Government policy has not yet been formulated.

LONDON, Sept. 21.

Commenting on Lord Haldane's published Montreal address under the title of the Higher Nationality, the Morning Post says that it is well worth reading for its simple presentation of the sane and true idea which he put before his audience and all others capable of appreciating. It cannot but set men thinking about the basic truths and facts on which this idea reposes. While Haldane's sanguine temperament suits him to be what is called an optimist, and while he chooses well those facts which do not harmonize with his purpose, he forgets the great hold that French law and ideas of conduct have on a large part of Canada. He ignores the strong infusion of German ideas and the German "gettlichkeit" in the United States. These are not harmful omissions, as they enable him to set out the main thought with greater clearness. He may be so far right that the German element in America nor the French element in Canada are not likely to change the general trend of feeling, if no attempt is made to force it into a pre-designed channel. The value of the address is not its novelty, but lies in giving expression in an intelligible shape to feelings which have gradually upgrown.

Tragedies of the Wash.

An Article Which Has Nothing to Do With Soap.

The speed of the steamers which ply in the Thames and other English rivers is strictly regulated by the rules laid down by the various conservancies, and is generally limited to six knots an hour. This is a most necessary precaution, for the bow wave or wash kicked up by a comparatively small craft is most ruinous to the banks. Even along the Thames, thousands of pounds have been spent in strengthening the banks with bags of cement and other material. Otherwise, tons of earth would be carried away every day by the sucking action of the waves made by the tripper steamers.

At regattas, where a launch follows the racing craft at ten or twelve miles an hour, the spectators have to be uncommonly careful to avoid being swamped, and every year there are accidents caused by canoes or punts being caught broadside on and filled.

The bow wave of a big ocean steamer travelling at anything like full speed is three to four feet high, and so steep that no row boat is safe within half a mile. If you want to see what such a wave can do at close quarters, watch one of the big transatlantic craft coming down the Solent from Southampton. Of late, the speed of big steamers in this narrow strait has been limited for the damage done to small craft moored or drawn up on the mud used to be really serious.

Carried Away the Landing Stage.

In many cases lives have been lost of people on shore who could not get out of the way in time. No longer ago than last August 3rd, the huge Hamburg-America liner Augusta Victoria was the cause of wholesale massacre. She came down the fjord at much too rapid a pace, and her wave caught the landing-stage at Wittenbergen, and carried it completely away.

Nearly forty people were flung into the water. Two were drowned outright, four more died after they were got out, and over twenty were more or less injured.

The worst waves are those which strike a sloping bank. They run up it to a most surprising distance. Those who have been over from Dover to Calais will remember the long

stone jetty running out beside the harbor. This was the scene of a terrible tragedy on August 15th, 1908.

Calais was crowded with excursionists, both French and English. It was hot weather, and a number had been paddling, and some of these climbed up on the jetty to look for mussels.

At half-past four in the afternoon the steamer Queen came past, and her swell swept right over the jetty and washed away about a dozen people into deep water. Assistance was at hand almost at once, but no fewer than six people were drowned. Three of them were children of nine to fourteen years of age.

Some years ago, a Plymouth man fishing off the rocks on Plymouth Sound, opposite the end of the break-water, was caught unawares by the swell thrown up by a cruiser, and swept into the sea.

In spite of the fact that he was wearing heavy boots and that he had a creel strapped on his back, he struck out and tried to get ashore again. But the rocks were so slippery that he could get no hold, so he boldly started swimming back to an inlet where there is a strip of shingly beach. But the task was beyond him. He was actually sinking when a boat came up, and rescued him just in time.

An almost exactly similar incident occurred at Gibraltar, where a soldier, fishing off the rocks one evening, was in like manner caught and washed into the sea. He fell, with his head on a rock, and was stunned. Yet, when he came to, he found himself ashore again.

The odd thing was that there was not a soul in sight.

It was not until long afterwards that he found out that his rescuers had been a boat load of Spanish smugglers, running a cargo of tobacco into Spanish territory.

Temperance Rally Sunday

AT GEORGE STREET ADULT BIBLE CLASS.

A meeting of much importance to the Class was held yesterday afternoon, when a temperance programme was adopted, which is to form the basis of greater activity along these lines in the future. The speaker was Mr. I. C. Morris, who in an eloquent and appealing manner, reviewed the efforts of temperance reformers in Newfoundland. He took his audience back to the days when agitation obtained its first measure of success with the passing of the permissive bill, which allowed districts to decide whether or not intoxicating liquor should be sold within their boundaries. The remarkable growth of the work was traced up to the present time when we have the encouraging spectacle of local option in every district except St. John's. He made an earnest appeal to the men of the Class to take up the work seriously and with the enthusiasm of young life.

A series of resolutions were unanimously passed, committing the Class to more aggressive temperance work in the future. A committee of volunteers was then formed, to make a special study of the question with a view to creating a stronger sentiment amongst the wide membership, as well as to help in individual reform wherever possible.

Regular temperance services will be organized by this body, and an endeavour made to get every member a total abstainer and a worker.

Mr. Edgecombe and Mr. C. J. Loughlin also referred briefly to the great need of the class giving their most loyal and continued support to this work.

Conversion of Young Eskimo Lad.

Yesterday was the Feast of St. Matthew the Apostle as well as the Consecration of the C. of E. Cathedral. The day was an especially memorable one in Church of England circles because the great Feast was synchronized by the baptism of a lad who had been converted in the Far North. The candidate was the Eskimo who was recently brought here from Ungava missionary labours in these desolate regions too much cannot be said. His Lordship the Bishop administered the Sacrament of baptism, Rev. Canon Bolt, Rev. Mr. Stewart and Mrs. Bolt acted as god-parents. The baptismal names were Matthew Aupalok. The ceremony was a most edifying one and before it His Lordship the Bishop gave an eloquent and touching discourse. The occasion, he said, was unprecedented and he expressed the good wish that the young Eskimo just received into the Church would be able to return to his native people in the future and impart the Gospel.

To-day Matthew Aupalok entered Bishop Field College to begin the rudiments of education and it is the earnest wish of a great many that young Matthew will live to take up the avocation of his foster father.

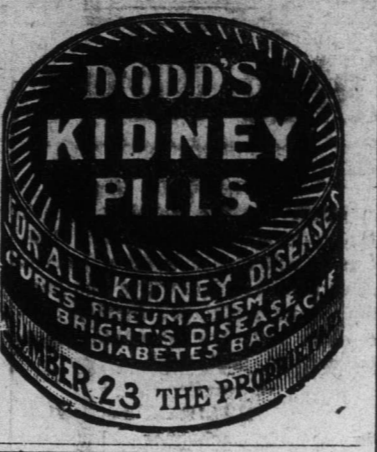
So was Algernon's wife.

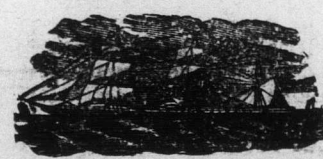

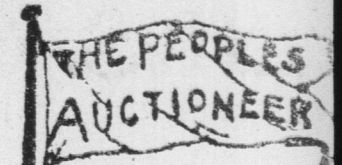
