

#### Marvels of the Public Record Office.

At the Fleet Street end of Chancery ane, in London, stands a huge pile of uildings constituting the Public Records Office. In this great building there are over twenty-six miles of shelves, packed with documents which represent the accumulation of seven centuries. The records in this pile of offices date back to the reign of King John; but a few go further back still, and include some ancient Saxon Charters. King John was the founder of the British records, and he establish ed the system of recording public transactions. Some of these old papers deal with trivial things like a gift of wine as well as an important foreign reaty. Throughout the centuries these ommodation in various homes until in 1852 a permanent home was established by the building of the present palatial public record office. The treasures of this office have been tabulated and arranged by successive Keepers of the Rolls, and ransacked by many historians and writers. On February 24, 1800, the Record Commission sat to deal with the growing mass of documents and ponderous folio volumes were published as a result of the work done. The whole mass was thus arranged in a systematic way. Later, a great deal of work in connection with the problem of these vast treasures of ancient times was done by the deputy Keeper, Sir H. Maxwell Lyte. But the tragedy of the situation lies in this: the men who compile and arrange the mass of ever-growing material at the Record Office have neither the time nor the energy to reconstruct history, and our historians have often neither the experience nor the time to dive into such a mass of original records. So in these vast offices in Chancery Lane lies buried the great story in all its exact detail, all the historic and official past. It is said that a new con-stitutional history is needed to bring Stubbs' and Maitland's great works up to date: and it is in the Public Record Office material for such a work will

## Romance of Rare Relics.

PRICELESS MANUSCRIPTS SAVED BY CHANCE.

The original of Magna Charta was recovered by accident and saved by a miracle: Now it is one of the

treasures of the British Museum.

It reached the Museum as part of the contents of the Cottonian Library.

Sir Robert Cotton, in the reign of James I., visited his tailor, and found him with a pile of parchments wheih he was uisng to cut out patterns of garments. Sir Robert entered the garments. Sir Robert entered the shop as the tailor took up his shares and thus saved for the nation what is probably the most valuable piece of parchment in England.

In the British Museum, too, there is that valuable fragment of papyrus containing the "Sayings of Jesus." which was found at Oxyrhynchus less than twenty years ago, after having been lost for seventeen centuries. None of these alleged "sayings" is in the New Testament, yet they have a family likeness as: "Every one that hearkens to these words shall never taste death."

The famous "Diary of John Eve lyn" was found by William Upcott among some waste paper in a lumber room, and the tutor of the Marquess de Ronville, when playing tennis discovered that the drum of his racket was formed of parchment upon which was written a fragment of the ost Second Decade of Livy.

# **Buried in West Indies.**

Halifax, N.S., Feb. 12.—Capt. Wm. Barker, master of the Western Union Cable Company's repair steamer Lord Kelvin, died suddenly at sea, Saturday, and was buried to-day at St. Lucia, British West Indies, a message received here this afternoon by Capt. de Coteret, Marine Superintendent of the Halifax Station of the Western Union Cable Service said: On Friday the Kelvin reported all well. Capt. Barker has been engaged in cable work for many years, having been attached to stations in the West Indies, South America, Panama and Hong Kong. He was in command of the cable ship Mniia, in the waters of Great Britain, during 1919 and 1920. and came to the Halifax station to take command of the Lord Kelvin last September. Baron Schroder "remembered" his gardener in his will. This man had become as expert as his master in ortoglossum. Soon afterwards he sold it for 1.000 guineas.

WHY PRICES ARE HIGH. Twenty years ago orchid collecting was at its zenith. Many were the friendly fights between rival orchidists. Thousands of guineas changed hands in the London salerooms. At Cheapside a wonderful spotted variety of orchid, Odontoglossum Crispum was put up for sale. Baron Schrode bid high, but was beaten by Mr. H. T. Pitt, who secured this unique bloom or 1,500 guineas. It was a tiny plant of only one bloom.





"The woman who goes wrong, the thief who breaks into your house, the weakling who guzzles alcohol, the child who flies into a tantrum and screams, all blame anything and anybody except their own lack of discipline, their unbridled lust and their weak character.

"It would seem that it might be a good thing to establish a course in 'Who's to Blame?' in our schools.

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
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
