The most striking feature is that the face is that of a beardless youth, this being in direct contrast with the usual portraits which show Him bearded and with a moustache and a sad expression. 



#### Monarchist Groups Back Their Favorites.

JONDON. (Associated Press.) Something akin to consternation less been caused in Russian monarchist circles by Grand Duke Cyril's recent manifesto claiming succession to Czar Nicolas II., and a conference will take place at Wiesbaden to find a way out of the difficulty caused by rival groups of Russians who will not admit that the Russian revolution terminated Czardom. The Belgrade group of monarchists, which considers itself most representative, was not warned of Grand Duke Cyril's decision and would not in any case have supported him either as the guardian of the Russian throne of as a candidate to it, according to the Berlin correspondent of the Times. The Belgrade monarchists' hopes are centered around Grand Duke Nicolas Nicolaievitch, and they have been endeavoring for a considerable time to persuade him to place himself at the head of their move-

ALL AT LOGGERHEADS.

This group asserts that the chief instigator of Grand Duke Cyril's unexpected declaration is a Colonel Balasheff, at one time a secret agent, and a paid guard of the Russian Minister Protopoff. The monarchists on the whole regard Colonel Balasheff with great disfavor as he only recently left Soviet Russia where he was in the service of the Bolsheviki. On coming out of the country he became Cyril's closest advisor. Cyril's sup porters maintain that his energy, military ext and finally the fact that he is now the head of the family are all facts which render him the most suitable candidate for the throne. Supporters of Grand Duke Nicholas retort that Cyril is unpopular not only among the masses of Russia but also in the Romanoff family itself while Grand Duke Nicholas' popularity is so great that this factor alone decides their choice. Many monarchists seriously deplore the whole controversy and condemn the supporters of the unpopular Cyril as well as the supporters of Nicolas. These, they say, are endeavoring to bring into the contest the figure of an old soldier who has repeatedly declared that he would devote the remainder of his strength to the service of the Russian people only if he were called upon to do so by their general vote, but that he was loth to place himself at the head of any movement outside Russia



opinion that invaluable service to surveying in unexplored and unmapped territories will be rendered in the future by the seaplane; in transporting supplies, and men, thereby saving for the work many days of the working season, which is already short enough; in permitting reconnaisance and exploratory flights for purposes of planning surveys; in keeping in communication with the surveyors during the season; and in taking the photographs along the course of survey for filling in detail. To these who have a thorough knowledge of the ground conditions and experience in sketching and mapping such as surveyors have, the value of flights over the districts to be surveyed, can scarcely be overestimated.

During the course of this flight we flew over a series of base lines and meridians which I had surveyed years ago. At that time very little was known about the country in the immediate neighbourhood of the line and considerable difficulty was experienced in determining the best locations for the caches and the lines were produced with no knowledge of what was to be expected shead. Considerable time was necessary to locate and map the waterways and important topographical features. This year in approximately one hour in the plane these features were observed clearly and many more within the reach of survey. Had this flight been possible before the survey had been taken much time and expense could have been saved and considerable worry eliminated and what is true of this survey is equally true of all other surveys of this nature.


