OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—The supreme council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite for the Dominion of Canada arrived in Ottawa for the annual conclave in this city.

Officials appointed some time ago by the customs department for work in the United States are giving general satisfaction. It is their duty to investigate into the value of goods shipped to Canada when any doubt regarding a violation of the tariff laws is raised.

Canadian officials are received with every courtesy when making their investigation, but once in a while some United States manufacturers will get on their "high horse," and then it is a case of discipline.

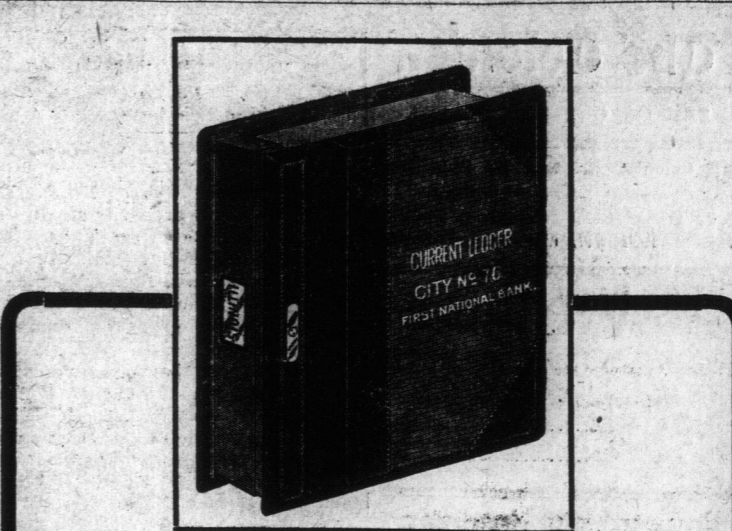

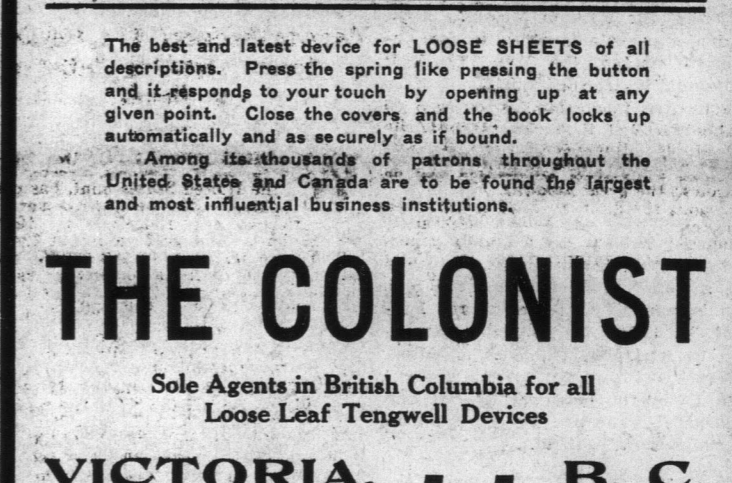
