The police have obtained special information which will probably warrant an indictment against Cunningham for personally operating the dynamite which caused the explosion near Gower street said the child afterwards born was illegit-railway station. Congress Petitioned to Mave the Votes of Number of States Thrown Out. WASHINGTON, Feb. 4 .- Senator Sher man to day presented the following petition, signed by thirty-seven persons:

Whereas in several of the states, among which are South Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Tennessee and Ohio and some other states, the charge has been made that many of the citizens have been for a series of years, and during the late election for president and vice-president, kept away from the polls by threats and acts of violence and bloodshed, and a system of government unrebuked by some of the aforesaid states,

Therefore, we, citizens of the United States, respectfully petition and carnestly pray that your honorable body will examine these charges of criminal interference with the free suffrage, and if found t ue that the entire vote, of the states so offending illegally cast for president and vice-president may be thrown out of the final count.

DESTRUCTIVE BLAZE IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—Que of the larges res witnessed in New York for some time roke out at midnight in the wine vaults f Szeighardt Bros., Wooster street. The flames spread with frightful rapidity throughout the building, and owing to he inflummable nature of the conten he department were unable to cope wit the devouring element. The fire gained such headway that the entire fire depart ment of the lower part of the city was salled out. At 1.30 a m. the roof of the ourning building, which is a six story iron structure extending from 10 to 114 Wooster street, and from 97 to 105 Greene street, crashed in and shortly afterwards the walls caved in, crushing the adjoining houses. Contiguous to the purning structure were a number of tene nent houses. The police cleared the in nates out, and there are now about fifty families in the station house. Op paite the burning buildings are a row of tenements. Owing to the intense hear from the blazing structure they have cracked the walls on the other side of the street At 2 a.m. the entire block bounded by Spring, Prince, Wooster and Green streets was threatened. The loss at that time was estimated at \$1.500,000.

A Fireman's Fall. NEW YORK, Feb. 4 .- A fire broke ou his evening in a five-story marble buildon Barclay street occupied by Major Knapp, lithographers; Edward Miller & Co., clock manufacturers; Fritzsche Bros., essential oils; John Wygande, glass and crockery. The lithographing firm occupies the three top floors, where eighty men an overed. The flames pread so rapid hat several of the hindmost were slight building. There were seventeen engine and two water towers pouring torrents of the flames, but they were difficult thandle owing to the inflammable nature the contents of the building. Loss \$275 000. Fireman James Smith, who mounted to the top story, lost his footing and fel to the street seventy feet below. He was

That, considering how absolutely the indu

Our ambition lies in quite another direction.

We want to be represented in London by one man only, responsible to the government of Canada. Any division of respon sibility would be fatal to our independence To the workingmen of England our answer is short and sharp. We are going to do our own work, and you have no busines whatever to say that you want to do it for us. We take the notion to make machinery and weave cl h, and to do lots of othe things for ourselves. What right hav you to say that we shall not?

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

AN IMPORTANT INSURANCE CASE. The Question of What Really Constitutes

the Goods Covered by a Policy. A most important case regarding the esponsibility of insurance companies on the value of property insured was tried at the civil assizes yesterday before Justice Rose and a jury. The plaintiff, Joseph Powell of Phelpston, Ont., brought joint action against the Quebec and London fire urance companies on policies issued by ese companies of \$2000 each on his stock. The insurances were effected in December. 1883, and the premises were burned down in the January following. The plaintiff claimed that at the time of the fire he had goods in stock amounting to from \$13,000 to \$15,000. Before applying for the policies in question plaintiff had already insured his stock for \$6900, and the defendants had granted him the further insurance on the ground that his stock would average throughout the year \$14,000. On Jan. 6 his premises were destroyed by fire, and a board of arwere destroyed by fire, and a board of arbitration was appointed to determine the value of the goods destroyed. The arbitration found that only \$7000 worth of goods had been destroyed, and defendants claimed that the value of stock put in by plaintiff at the time of the fire was exces-

The ground for the present action was that plaintiff in good faith, and not know-ing the amount of his previous insurance, nad, at the solicitation of insurance brokers, agreed to further insure his stock, ers, agreed to further insure his stock, which he did, as was shown in evidence, beyond its insurance value. Plaintiff claimed when he effected the insurance that it was not to cover the value of the goods he had on hand, but what he was likely to have during the year.
