BRITISH WARSHIPS AT RIO.

A FORCE THERE "SUFFICIENT TO

The Government Confident That Captain Lang's Squadron Can Protect British Interests in Brazil-Forty-Eight Hours to Constitute a Week's Work in the

PERFORM ITS DUTY."

Arsenals Hereafter, London, Jan. 5.-In the House of Commons to-day further questions were asked regarding the situation at Rio Janeiro and the protection afforded British interests

Sir H. Kay-Shuttleworth, Secretary of the Admiralty, replied that there were four British warships at Rio Janeiro, which was a greater number than any other country had there. These vessels were sufficient to protect British interests. He added that the Admiralty had no intention of directing the commander of the British North American squadron to proceed to Rio Janeiro, as the Government had every con-fidence in Captain Lang, the present British

naval commander there.
Sir Ellis Ashmead-Bartlett asked: "Do you imply that the British squadron at Rio Janeiro is stronger in point of armament than any other squadron?

"I ask the question," he added, "because the ships representing one naval power there are twice as strong as the British ships."

The Secretary replied that the Admiralty was of the opinion that the British force at Rio Janeiro was sufficient to perform its

Forty-eight Hours a Week's Work, H. Campbell Bannerman, Secretary of State for War, replying to a question asked by John Burns, Socialist, said that he had carefully considered the question of reducing the hours of labor in the ordnance facing the hours of labor in the ordnance factories. As a result of this consideration the Government had decided to reduce the number of working hours to 48 weekly. The Secretary added that he believed this could be done with advantage to the public service and to the employes. A NEW LINE. The Proposed Collingwood and Toronto

There was a meeting at noon yesterday of the special committee of the City Coun cil appointed to deal with the proposed Collingwood and Toronto Air Line Railway Ald. Lamb, Leslie, Hewitt, Small and Ald.-Elect Sheppard and J. E. Thompson

Mr. Frank Moberly, the chief engineer of the company, laid before the committee in a clear and concise manner the advantages which would result to Toronto by the control of the control o which would result to Toronto by the construction of this road. It would be built in the most substantial manner, and equipped with the most modern and powerful locomotives. The grain cars would be built of steel and carry 100 tons of freight.

Three hundred miles of lake carriage and four days' time in transport from Chicago or Fort William to Montreal would be saved. It would not compete with saved. It would not compete with any existing Canadian or steamship lines, as the traffic it is proposed to carry would be diverted from the Buffalo and New York

The cost of carrying grain by this route, via Collingwood to Toronto, would not exceed one cent per bushel, including elevating and loading charges. The length of the road would be 70 miles, and the total the road would be 70 miles, and the total cost, including equipment, would be \$2,600,000. It is proposed to come into Toronto by the valley of the Don with terminal docks in Ashbridge's Bay.

This project will have the effect of making Toronto the transhipping point for the grain going east and coal and other heavy freight going west.

When the enlargement of the St. Lawrence Canals is completed Toronto can ship flour and grain direct to the Maritime Provinces and in return get supplied with Nova Sectia steam coal at \$1 per ton less


