MAN'S FOOD IN FUTURE.

THE SCIENTISTS LOVE TO TELL US WHAT IT WILL BE.

Better, Cheaper, Softer - No Waste in Supply or in Cooking - But Will There be as Much Fun in a Good Dinner Than as There is Now?

How will the coming man be fed? The Department of Agriculture has become interested in this question very much, and before long will publish a series of bulletins on the subject. They will be prepared by such well-known experts in this branch of research as Professor W. O. Atwater and Dr. Edward Atkinson. The former gentleman has been engaged to conduct certain investigations and experiments of a scientific character. At the bottom of the whole inquiry lies the fact that the people of this country do not eat or how to cook their foods.

The burden of ignorance falls most heavily upon the wage-workers, who, taking an average among them, use only half of their money to buy food. The estimate not including the cost of cooking. The poor man wastes in preparing it for the table a great deal more than he saves by buying a cheaply prepared food. To make a pretty fair idea as to whether it fits the bill, the scientist has been busy for some time in gathering together all the information as to how much nutrition they contain or whether it is of a kind suited to his bodily requirements.

Professor Atwater has an apparatus at Wesleyan University for measuring the physical elements of our human beings. It is a metal box, inside of which a man is seated, and through which a carefully-weighted quantity of certain foods. A current of air is drawn through the box by a machine-pump. Not only is all the waste from the man's body analyzed and weighed, but the air is analyzed and weighed, and the amount of oxygen and carbon dioxide is ascertained and after it comes out of the box.

By the latter analysis it is discovered just what elements and how much of them have been given off, and the lungs of the man in breathing, and the amount of oxygen and carbon dioxide which he has taken in. STRANGLER WITH A WINDOW CORD

A Lunatic's Cunning Device to Obtain the Means by Which He Could End His Life.

C. R. Pears, aged 30, an inmate of the Toronto Insane Asylum, whose relatives reside at Uxbridge, was found hanging from a window in the east ward, strangled to death with a cord which he had fastened to the window frame, and had pulled it up, and drawing out the lower portion of the frame, got hold of the rope, which, with the weights attached, served to raise and lower the window. Without cutting this rope or pulling it up he placed his head in the loop and letting his body fall back strangled himself.

You With Sea Turtles. "I am reminded," said an old coasting captain, "of an experience I once had with sea turtles on the edge of the gulf stream, about 80 miles from Havana. I was part owner and captain of the Mary Lytle at that time and was coming up from Savannah with a half cargo of rice, when one morning the cookout yelled to me to come up on deck and look at the sea turtles. When I got up and looked over the rail, the whole ocean, as far as I could see ahead of us, was covered with turtles. They were tremendous fellows and were paddling along lazily in the opposite direction to that in which we were going.

It didn't take us long to rig up a windlass and tackle and begin pulling some of the old fellows aboard. We picked the biggest, and they came, and in the course of three hours we had caught 20, about all that we could handle. The shell of one that weighed 470 pounds is now in front of an eating house on Houston street, New York. I would hate to say how many turtles were in sight of the Mary Lytle that day for fear somebody might think I was fish yarning, but they came by us steadily for five hours, and when we got well into the school it extended as far as the eye could reach on all sides, and there was a turtle to about every 40 square feet of water, and I didn't see one that weighed less than 150 pounds."—Washington Star.

Wire Wound Pipe. An important change is to be noted in engineering practice—namely, that of winding steam pipes over 8 inches in diameter with three-sixteenths inch copper wire, thus nearly doubling the bursting pressure, in the case of merchant steamers using high pressure steam. It is found that with the wire wound gun, wire of square section coiled round the pipe under tension adds enormously to its strength, and the results of some tests have showed that a wire pipe stands just above the pressure it ought to have stood when unwound. To obviate the risks of careless brazing and enable the thickness of sheet copper forming the pipe to be reduced to a minimum, at the same time that full advantages of wire winding is secured, an improved system of manufacturing steam pipes has been devised—forming even a closer analogy to the wire gun than the usual system of wire winding—and consists in using copper of the thinnest practicable gauge to form the interior of the pipe. The body of the pipe proper is composed of steel wire wound closely around the core, the interior surfaces being filled in solid with copper by a new system of copper electro deposition.—New York Sun.

Six Cameras in One. The astronomers and observers in general have noted and recorded many oddities among the various comets or "hoary stars" that have made their appearance in the heavens. That of the year 1102, known as "Metia's comet," was in the form of a plow, but without anything resembling handles. The crook near the "moldboard" finally elongated until the celestial wanderer stretched out in a V shape until it looked like a flock of geese. Johannes says that the comet of the year 70 A.D. was in the shape of a sword, and that it "hung over the city of Jerusalem" a whole year. The comet of 1321 looked like the flukes of an immense whale, the resemblance being so strong that it went into the histories of several widely separated countries as the "Pothic comet." Donati's comet, which first seen on June 2, 1858, was in the shape of a tadpole. On Oct. 9 it was sword shape, and six days later was a counterpart of the wing of a gigantic bird.—St. Louis Republic.

"A what?" asked the clerk letting his chin drop. "A persipier," repeated the duke; "one of those," he added pointing to what he wanted.
