Although this latter cable was lying in 87 fathoms of water it was snapped by the anchor of a vessel 5 1-2 miles from land. There was a considerable delay in accomplishing repairs owing to bad weather and the lateness of the season. Since he returned home Mr. Keeley has learned that the Pelee Island cable in Lake Erie has been broken, presumably from the same cause, but it is likely that the repairs will be completed by Monday night.

Speaking to your correspondent, Mr. Keeley said he thought he would issue a circular to the owners of vessels in the Maritime Provinces indicating the precise location of telegraphic cables, and asking them to endeavor to avoid fouling the cables with their anchors. Five times in six years has the Pelee Island cable been broken from this cause and a notice was published in 1833 pointing out that wilful injury to a telegraphic cable was punishable under the law. In case, however, of the accidental fouling of a cable, owners of vessels who to avoid breaking it sacrifice their ship's anchor are compensated therefor, and Mr. Keeley proposes that the same offer, which is strictly legal, should be brought to the attention of the vessel owners of the Maritime Provinces. He says that it will be far cheaper to pay for an anchor at the rate of two or three cents a pound, as against telegraphic cable worth \$600 a mile. When a break occurs generally half a mile of new cable is required.

New York, Dec. 8.—The London special to The Times says: Mr. Chamberlin's energy in many directions continues to attract admiring attention. The ostensible reason for this action is the prevalence of the Scab disease among North American sheep, but the real motive is the imperative Government from the rural classes—to which the Government really owes its existence—for protective measures in behalf of the agricultural interests.

Ar exhaustive govermental inquiry was made recently regarding the scab disease, but experts refuse to certify that it is contagious or infectious. Moreover, it appears that though this disease has been prevalent in England many years no measure has been taken by the state to extirpate it, as is done in cases of really contagious diseases among live stock.

Duncan Bell said that he was in the Osgoodby building on the night of the fire. His office was directly above McMillan's, and he had heard no one below, although he had not left until 25 or 20 minutes to seven. Every light in the building was out, and there was no reflection when he went down stairs.



the Parents' Last Appeal. Sheriff Holmberg of Hennepin County is fully prepared for the execution, having secured the rope and erected the scaffold last June.

I have sought for my freedom on the grounds that I am innocent. I take no stock in this plea that I am insane. I am just as sane as any of the people who are saying that I am insane."




