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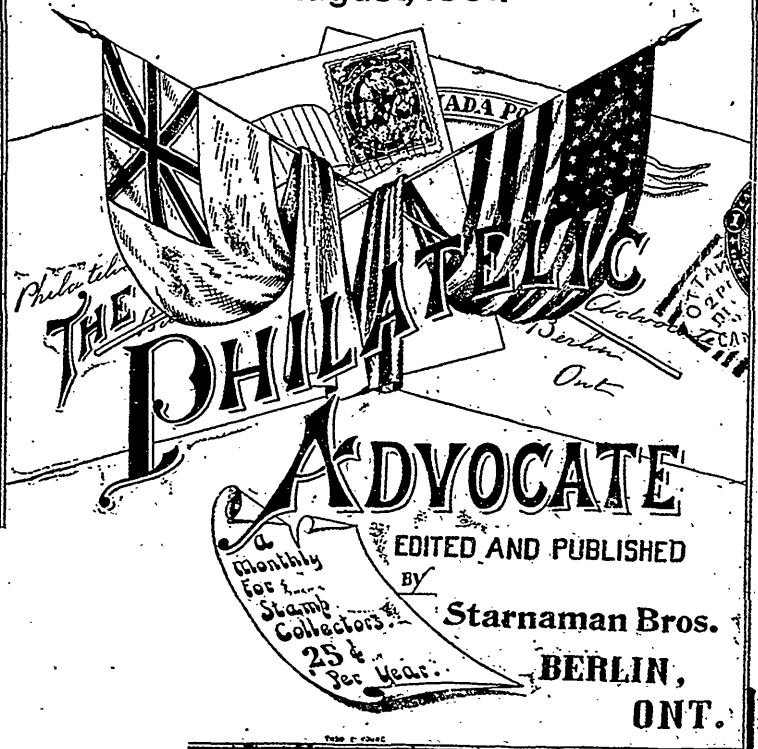

#### The Campaign.

The D. P. A. elections are over and the results, while satisfactory to the majority, will of course be contrary to the wishes of those who voted for the defeated candidates.

The campaign just closed has been one of the hardest the D. P. A. has ever seen. A number of disgruntled office seekers set themselves up as the D. P. A. Reform(?) party and issued campaign literature consisting of booklets, cards, dodgers, post cards etc, almost without end. They even stooped to falsehood in the endeavor to secure election, and their literature was full of libellous statements for which they will have to answer later. These reformers(?) were not manly enough to send us (Starnaman Bros.) any of their letters but, thanks to our friends, we received them promptly. Regarding this Mr. Ussher, in a letter of June 24th says "I knew it was unnecessary to do so but *did not think you would get it as soon as you evidently did.*"

It is interesting to note that while all their matter denounced us in the vilest and most ungentlemanly language, still most of it contained a few words of praise for us. In the supplement to the B. S. P. we find the charge against us of two men holding five offices. This is untrue as we only held three—Secy-Treas. (one office), Trustee and Official Organ. The next paragraph says "these officers (particularly Starnaman Bros.) have looked out for the interests of the society. If we have what is the need

of reform?

The next received was a card stating that we held the three offices mentioned above (probably forgetting they stated five before). This card also said the Bay State Phil. would give three free exchange notices as if votes were to be bought by a few ads and not secured on the merits of the paper.

The cap sheaf of the trash sent out was a booklet of twelve pages  $4\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$  inches of which seven were filled with a concoction of falsehood and slander and occasionally a word of praise regarding the growth of our glorious society. One paragraph is given to the centralization of power at Berlin. It is for the best interests of the society that the offices of Secy-Treas and official organ are in one city. All copy for official organ should be in by the 20th of each month, but it often happens that applications or reports received as late as the 28th get in as the D. P. A. forms are held open until the last and the Secy-Treas being right on the spot can insert them, whereas if he were living in another town it would necessitate a delay of a month. F. I. Weaver came by his position honestly and is as much entitled to the office as a member residing in any other part of Canada. When a committee on Constitution was wanted, Mr. A. M. Muirhead appointed Mr. Weaver and ourselves as we had long been active members, and being acquainted with every clause of the constitution, Mr. Wurtele saw fit to appoint the same committee again when changes were to be made. The reformers(?) forgot when speaking of centralization that Mr. Gile, is President, Trustee and pub. of Official Organ for Bay State Phil. Ass'n., also Sales Supt and Off. Organ of Junior Philatelists. This is worse than Starnaman Bros.

The charge is also made that we do the printing for the society. We do, but all prices have been submitted to the President before the work was done, except in the case of repeat orders which were done at the same price. We have always done the printing for the society 20% cheaper than we would do it for any one else and once when tenders were asked for, our

prices were found to be 50% lower than most of the offers.

W. A. Starnaman is charged with threatening to expel members and forcing them to apologize. Mr. Gile had published articles derogatory to the interests of the association and was asked to retract the statement or suffer the consequences of the constitution. Mr. Gile wrote that he had previously apologized to the President, although we never asked him to do so.

Any person who saw Mr. Ussher's actions at the convention at St. Catharines where he worked against the interests of the society although only a member a few months would be convinced that there are far better men for trustees than he is.

For official organ the Reform(?) Party asked for votes for the *Bay State Philatelist* a paper which doubled numbers twice in four consecutive months in 1900. They state that the publishers of the *Advocate* refuse the association space without extra charge. This is false, as we give unlimited space for official matter, and defy the reformers(?) to show where we charged one cent more than we were entitled to. When the *Philatelic Canadian* was official organ the Auction Dept. was started by Mr. I. E. Weldon, then President. He made a rule that the official organ should receive 5c for each lot advertised and we took the official organship on these terms. Later we made arrangements to give one column free and get 5c a lot for all over that amount but we never charged anything extra although at times the limit was exceeded. It is amusing to note the following paragraph in the same booklet in which they are trying to raise a quarrel. "It is a matter of satisfaction and congratulation to know that the life of our association has been one of steady growth and continued success. We have thus far been noticeably free from quarrels and contentions, from schisms, political deals and boss denomination."

Space will not permit a more lengthy explanation but in closing we may say that we hope those who voted reform(?) will remain members long enough to find out the reform(?) leaders in their true characters. The vote shows that the members don't wish reform(?) yet.

The Sales Supt reported the following business during the year.

Fellow Members—My report for the year would be most satisfactory to every member of the association were it not for the substitution practiced by at least one member. I sent out eleven circuits with total sales of \$125.06.

I paid Mr. Marshall Olson's first claim of 2.75 out on above gain and now have \$7.38 on hand. There is another circuit now out which ought to make the department at least a dollar richer. I will forward this money to the secretary to be used towards paying claims of members who suffered through substitution. The claims amount to 23.45 and are Marshall Olson \$18.65, F. A. Quimby \$3.00, G. C. Cuenod \$1.80.

If these claims were paid out of the general fund of the association it would mean a payment of nearly \$15.00. I strongly recommend that this be done. Although this is a large amount for a society like ours to pay, still it would not take quite all the money in the treasury as stated by Starnaman Bros in their circular letter.

I have a suspicion as to who the substitutor is but have not enough evidence to publically expose him. I wrote the chairman of the trustees Mr. W. A. Starnaman telling of my suspicion, stating name of person suspected, and why I thought the party guilty. Mr. Starnaman acknowledged receipt of this letter and he afterwards wrote Mr. M. Olson and stated in the letter "Mr. W. R. Brown claims to know the substituter but refuses to give the trustees any information."

Fellow members I can prove that that statement is entirely false and will take the matter up with the trustees elect, would

I regret that the society has been a loser during my term of office and will do everything in my power to catch the substituter. When the new superintendent is elected I will communicate with him and arrange a plan to detect the guilty party.

### United States Minutes.

CONDUCTED BY USONA.

A thief at the Buffalo Exposition made a truly juicy haul in stamps from the official exhibit, getting pretty nearly complete sets of the postal issues, including the errors and high value State Department stamps.

The Marchand "remainders" have been turned over to an agent in Chicago for sale and are offered by him for \$2.50, the set has a nominal face value of 21½ cents. Eighty sheets of each value were printed and delivered about the beginning of the fiscal year, so there will be a plentiful supply of sets.

Fraud orders have been issued by the Department against The Lottery Company

of Monterey, Mexico, and Ernst Harmson & Co., of Hamburg, Germany.

There is some dissatisfaction at the action of the government in declining to redeem the obsolete revenue stamps in less amounts than \$2, but after all, this is a reasonable minimum. The documentary stamps are still available to some extent and can be disposed of in almost all cases, while the proprietary stamps should be in the hands of druggists mostly and these can turn them over to the wholesaler. Banks are almost always willing to take over the stamps and forward them for redemption, as an accomodation.

In the standard catalogue there are a number of entires of the stamps of one country used in another country. The stamps of Chile used in Peru, the C. E. F. stamps of India, Antigua stamps used in St. Kitts, and many others. To this list should now be added the stamps of the United States used in Cuba, Porto Rico and the Philippines. Of course this does not refer to the overprinted stamps, but to the regular United States stamp, the only proof of the peculiar use of which is in the postmark. Of necessity these stamps must be collected on the original cover, or at least so much of it as will show the postmark. War was declared with Spain on Apr. 21, 1898, and the armies of the United States landed in Cuba June 22, in the Philippines June 30, and in Porto Rico July 11. As the administration of each postoffice was changed from Spanish to American control with the forward march of the invaders, the Spanish stamps gave place to the stamps of our own men. On August 1898, the peace protocol was signed, and about this time, or a little before, the use of the overprinted stamps

was begun. The plain stamps still continued in use, however, and at no time from the landing of our army to the date when the islands were formally transferred from Spain (this of course applies only to Porto Rico and the Philippines) has there been a time when the ordinary stamp of the U. S. would not frank a letter. The use of them during the two months between the invasion by our troops and the signing of the protocol, while the islands were Spanish property, and the following period to March 1899 while we held the land by possession, entitle the stamps of the United States used during that period to be entered in the catalogue under the headings of "Porto Rico" and "Cuba" and "Philippines," in the same as the stamps of various South African colonies are listed under Cape Colony by reason of their use in Mafeking besieged. The land belonged to Spain, Spanish stamps were not available, and United States stamps were used, not only by our men, but by everyone, native or foreigner, who desired to use the mails.

The varieties of stamps used in this way are many, and stamp available for postage in the United States seems to have been used here, the Omaha issue is quite plentiful and the writer has seen the 2 cent of 1890. The "Coamo" stamp, issued in default of United States stamps, is listed properly. Why not these?

Somewhat the same line of reasoning may be applied to the use of United States stamps by our troops in China, which correspond to the C. E. F. stamps of the British troops in China.

The sensation of the month in philatelic circles here is the passing of the Scott Stamp & Coin Co. as the leading stamp



firm. By its consolidation with the American Collectors Co. and the New England Stamp Co. a new power of capital, far in advance of rivals, has been formed, but everyone will miss the familiar name.

The sudden demise of *Redfield's Philatelic Post* was a matter of much comment, but the news of its purchase by and consolidation with *Mekeel's Weekly* will explain. The Mekeel Publishing Co. has been incorporated under the laws of the state of New York. It is a closed corporation, consisting of Messrs Mekeel (I. A.), Redfield and Severn.

J. M. Bartels, the dealer and authority on entire envelopes has moved from Washington to 230 Washington St., Boston. He follows in the steps of Mr. Rothfuchs who some years since left the Capital for the Hub.

## STAMPS STOLEN.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 6.—A daring thief made his way into the government building at the exposition at midnight, July 4, passed the four guards, and stole \$4,000 worth of stamps from the postoffice exhibit. These were rare, uncanceled stamps, composing a collection of the issue of this government from the first issue to the Pan-American issue. Some of them are quite valuable and were borrowed by the government from private collectors for this exhibition.

Jamaica is one of the few British Colonies which can be obtained complete for a comparatively small sum and it is nearly if not entirely free from the speculative taint.

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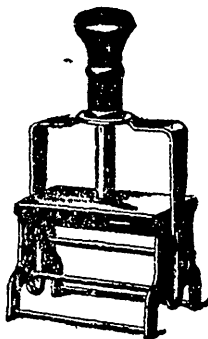
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
