

FIRST SEDERUNT. .

At the City of Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church, there, Wednesday, the Eighth day of June, in the Year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, at half-past seven o'clock in the erening:—

Which time and place the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met, pursuant to appointment by the General Assembly held at the City of Kingston, on the sixteenth day of June last year.

The Rev. Thomas Wardrope, D.D., of Guelph, the retiring Moderator, conducted Divine Service and preached a sermon from the first Epistle to the Corinthians, the first Chapter and twenty-third verse,—"We preach Christ Crucified," and from the Epistle to the Colossians, first Chapter, twenty-eighth verse,—"Whom we preach, warning every man, and teaching every man, in all wisdom, that we may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus."

Dr. Wardrope then, with solemn prayer, constituted the General Assembly in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

The Senior Clerk, Dr. Reid, intimated that his colleague, Dr. Fraser, was unable to be present on account of age and infirmity, and requested that Dr. Cochrane be appointed to assist him, until a permanent Recording Clerk was appointed.

This was agreed to.

ELECTION OF MODERATOR.

Dr. Wardrope then briefly addressed the Assembly and announced that the time had come to appoint another Moderator to preside over this Assembly.

It was moved by Dr. A. B. MacKay, seconded by Mr. James Carmichael,—That the Reverend Principal Caven, D.D., be chosen as Moderator of the Assembly.

It was moved by President Forrest, seconded by Mr.James Croil,—That the Reverend Thomas Sedgwick be elected Moderator. On a vote being taken, ninety-two voted for Mr. Sedgwick, and one hundred and fifteen for Principal Caven. The Moderator declared Principal Caven elected. Principal Caven was escorted to the Chair by Dr. MacKay

and Dr. Watson, and in appropriate terms acknowledged the honour conferred upon him, and referred to the deaths of Dr. Cook, Dr. Donald Fraser, Principal Cairns, and Reverend Charles H. Spurgeon.

VOTE OF THANKS TO THE RETIRING MODERATOR.

On motion of Mr. Robert Hamilton, a cordial vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring Moderator for his conduct in the chair and the excellent sermon preached at the opening of this Assembly.

REPORT OF RETIRING MODERATOR.

 $\mathbf{Dr.}$ Wardrope then submitted a report in regard to the special duties laid upon him last year:

First, that the Loyal Address of last General Assemby to Her Majesty, the Queen, had been duly forwarded, and that intimation had been received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, through His Excellency the Governor-General, stating that the Address had been laid before Her Majesty, who was pleased to receive it very graciously.

Second, that a communication had also been received by him, from the Governor-General's Secretary, acknowledging receipt of the Assembly's Address to His Excellency, and stating that it had been laid before His Excellency, who was also pleased to accept the same very graciously.

RESIGNATION OF DR. WM. FRASER.

Dr. Reid then read the letter from Dr. Wm. Fraser, one of the Clerks of the General Assembly, tendering his resignation of office as Recording Clerk, on account of his increasing infirmities and age. It was moved by Dr. Torrance, seconded by Mr. Walter Paul,—That the communication of the Recording Clerk, resigning his office, be referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures, that they may give it a place on the docket of business.

It was moved in amendment by Dr. MacVicar, seconded by Principal Grant,—That the Moderator of Assembly nominate a committee to draw up a minute to be submitted to a subsequent sederunt, expressive of the sense of Dr. Fraser's services entertained by the Assembly.

On the vote being taken, the amendment was carried by a majority.

It was then moved in further amendment by Mr. Sedgwick, seconded by Mr. James Carmichael,—That the Clerk's resignation be referred to a special committee, who shall consider the same with as little delay as possible, and make such recommendation in reference thereto as may seem desirable.

On the vote being taken between the amendment of Mr. Sedgwick and that of Dr. MacVicar, which had now become the motion, the former was carried by a majority, and the yeas and nays being taken, it was declared carried.

The Moderator was requested to name the Committee at next Sederunt.

There was read an Overture from the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, asking the General Assembly to remit to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act, a proposal to the effect, that Synods may issue all Complaints and Appeals, not involving Doctrine or Polity, that may come before them.

Dr. Grant and Dr. McLaren were heard on behalf of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, in favour of the Overture.

After considerable discussion, the following motion, made by Dr. Gregg, and seconded by Dr. McLaren, was carried by a large majority,—That the Overture be received, and that the proposal contained be sent down for consideration to the Presbyteries, to be reported on next year.

MOTION FOR A COMMITTEE ON ENLARGING THE POWERS OF SYNODS,

Principal Grant then proposed the following resolution,—That a Committee be appointed to consider whether any or what matters now belonging exclusively to the General Assembly can with advantage be transferred to Synods, and report to next General Assembly.

Objection having been taken to the introduction of this motion, without its being sent for transmission to the Committee of Bills and Overtures, the Moderator asked the Assembly tovote "Yea and Nay" on the question, when 89 voted "Yea," and 46 "Nay." It was therefore agreed to proceed and discuss Dr. Grant's resolution.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet again at half-past seven o'clock in the evening, the Moderator pronouncing the benediction.

DR. FRASER'S RESIGNATION.

Mr. Thomas Sedgwick, Convener of the Committee to take into consideration the resignation of Dr. Fraser, the Recording Clerk, presented the following report, which, on motion of Mr. Sedgwick, seconded by Mr. Walter Paul, was unanimously adopted,—That, taking into consideration the long and valued services of Dr. Fraser as Recording Clerk of the General Assembly, as well as his position as a venerable Minister of our Church, who has for more than fifty years discharged the duties of a pastor, and for about forty years has occupied the position of Clerk in various branches of the Church, the Assembly should in accepting his resignation, which it does with the deepest regret, place on record an adequate estimate of his services, and in recognition of these, ask Dr. Fraser to accept for the remainder of his life the same salary which he received as Clerk.

It was further moved by Mr. D. D. MacLeod, duly seconded,—That a Committee consisting of Dr. Torrance, Mr. R. Hamilton, and the mover, Ministers, with Mr. Wm. Adamson, Elder, be appointed to draw up a minute for insertion in the Assembly Records, regarding the services and character of Dr. Fraser.

The motion was adopted.

ELECTION OF RECORDING CLERK.

On motion of Dr. MacVicar, seconded by Mr. Charles B. Ross. the Reverend Dr. Robert Campbell, of Montreal, was unanimously elected Recording Clerk.

The Moderator then having called Dr. Campbell to the platform, announced to him the unanimous call of the General Assembly to the office of Recording Clerk. Dr. Campbell in brief but feeling terms intimated his acceptance.

It was agreed that the Moderator should nominate a Committee to report as early as possible on the specific duties of Dr. Campbell as Recording Clerk, and as to the salary to be attached to the office.

HOME MISSION REPORTS.

The Assembly then called for the Reports of the Home Mission and Augmentation Committees,—East and West.

Mr. John McMillan presented the Report for Home Missions (Eastern Section), and Mr. J. M. Robertson, the Augmentation Report.

The following motion disposing of the Reports was proposed by Mr. P. M. Morrison, seconded by Mr. T. C. James, and unanimously carried:—

That the Reports of the Home Mission and Augmentation Committees of the Eastern Section, now presented to the Assembly, be received.

The Assembly records its gratitude to God for blessing the work of the Church in that Section during the year, and prays that increasing prosperity may be granted in the time to come.

The Assembly warmly thanks the Free Church of Scotland for its renewed gift of One Hundred Pounds Sterling (£100), also appreciates the interest of our own people shown by their support of the Funds; and commends these to the intelligent consideration and increasingly liberal support of all our people, young and old, so that there may be no diminution of effort to care for the spiritual wants of even the most scattered portions of our adherents; and that there may be also a yearly increasing contribution to the work in the Great North-West of our Dominion.

The Assembly learns with satisfaction that the Mission Stations are not wholly neglected in winter; but, at the same time, urges Presbyteries to make more strenuous efforts, in co-operation with the Home Mission Committee, to secure for them uninterrupted supply in winter as well as summer.

The Assembly calls the attention of Presbyteries to the importance of aiding the Committee in the distribution of probationers, by taking order that all the vacant charges shall

be supplied, at least half of the time, by labourers on the Committee's Roll.

The Assembly further sanctions the Grants reported as made by the Augmentation Committee and entrusts to said Committee the disposal of the applications for help still pending, or that may yet be made during the coming year; and, while recognizing the marked success of this part of the Home Mission work in the East in the past, commends it anew to the hearty support of the people, and the systematic management of Presbyteries and sessions, in concert with the Committee, for continued success in the future.

Dr. Cochrane, Convener of the Home Mission Committee for the Western Section, presented the Report for Home Missions and Augmentation, and, at the close of his address, moved the reception of the report. This was seconded by Mr. D. J. Macdonnell,

who spoke on the Special Claims of the Augmentation Fund.

Dr. Warden then moved as follows, seconded by Dr. Campbell (Renfrew):-

The General Assembly desires to offer grateful thanks to God for the marked success with which He has been pleased to crown the efforts of the Home Mission Committee and its Sub-Committee on Augmentation during the past year, and for the liberality with which the Church has responded to the appeal made for contributions on behalf of both departments of the work.

The Assembly cordially thanks the British Churches for the continuance of their grants; the executors of the several estates from which bequests have been received, and the brethren in the Maritime Provinces for generous help.

Further, the Assembly rejoices in the progress made, more especially in Manitoba, the North-West Territories and British Columbia, and commends anew this important branch of the Church's operations to the liberal and prayerful support of our congregations.

THANKS TO DR. COCHRANE.

Dr. Cochrane, who at the request of the Assembly had acted as Recording Clerk from the commencement of the Session, now retired and asked Dr. Campbell, the newly appointed Clerk, to take his place at the table. The Assembly thanked Dr. Cochrane for his efficient and valuable services in this capacity, rendered so promptly at a moment's call.

HOME MISSIONS RESUMED.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the remaining resolutions of Dr. Warden, in reference to the Report of the Home Mission Committee, Western Section, interrupted by the adjournment last night.

Dr. R. Campbell (Renfrew), the seconder of the motion, was heard in support of the resolutions.

EXECUTIVE OF HOME MISSION COMMITTEE APPOINTED.

The following were appointed the Executive of the Home Mission Committee for the ensuing year: Dr. Cochrane, Dr. Warden, Dr. Robertson, Dr. Laing, Dr. R. Campbell (Renfrew), Messrs. Macdonnell, Somerville, Farries, Gilray and Moodie, Ministers, and Messrs. Warden King, R. Kilgour, and George Rutherford, Elders.

The next resolution, moved by Dr. Warden, and duly seconded, was also adopted:— That the Committee be authorized to reduce in March annually the grants for the half year then ending, so as to equalize the expenditure and revenue of the year.

It was further moved by Dr. Warden, seconded by Dr. Campbell (Renfrew),—That the regulations under which the Augmentation scheme, Western Section, is administered be amended as follows:—That to entitle congregations to receive aid there be required an average contribution of \$8 per family, as well as \$4.50 per communicant, and a total contribution of \$450 and a manse, instead of \$400 and a manse as heretofore, the latter to refer to congregations hereafter to be placed on the list of aid-receiving charges; that the regulation restricting the grant from the fund to \$300 per annum be amended so as to read \$250 per annum; and that hereafter the salary of pastors of augmented congregations in Manitoba and the North-West be \$850 per annum, together with a manse, and \$950 per annum where there is no manse.

To this it was moved in amendment by Dr. Robertson, seconded by Mr. George McArthur,—That in the meantime, no change be made in the regulations affecting the salaries of ministers of augmented congregations in Manitoba and the North-West.

The amendment was carried, and the recommendations of the report as thus amended were adopted as a whole.

Mr. D. McRae was heard in support of the Overture. Before proceeding farther in dealing with the matter, it was agreed to hear Mr. D. G. McQueen, as representing the views and wishes of the Presbytery of Calgary, in relation to the proposals embraced in the Overture.

After discussion, it was moved by Dr. Robertson, seconded by Mr. R. N. Grant:—
That the Overture be received and referred to a Committee to be nominated by the Moderator, to consider the same and report to the Assembly.

The motion was carried.

PETITION in re PROPOSED PRESBYTERY OF ALGOMA.

There was next taken up and read a petition from certain Ministers, Missionaries and Elders in the Algoma District, asking for the erection of a new Presbytery, to be called the Presbytery of Algoma, which had been transmitted by the Synods of Hamilton and London, and of Toronto and Kingston, with their approval.

It was moved by Dr. Cochrane, seconded by Mr. R. N. Grant, and unanimously carried:—That the General Assembly sanction the erection of the new Presbytery of Algoma and remit the details to a committee to report as to its boundaries, synodical relations, date of meeting, etc., and report at an early sederunt.

The following committee was appointed in terms of the motion just passed: Dr. Laing, Convener, Messrs. R. N. Grant, John Somerville and George Grant, Ministers, and Messrs. W. D. Wood, M.P.P., and George Leys, Elders.

OVERTURE OF PRESBYTERY OF ST. JOHN in re RE-ARRANGEMENT OF BOUNDARIES.

An Overture from the Presbytery of St. John, asking the consent of the General Assembly to a re-arrangement of the boundaries of Presbyteries in the Province of New Brunswick was taken up and read.

The hour for adjournment having come, the further consideration of the question was deferred.

The Assembly adjourned, to meet again at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

On the same day and at the same place, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:

The Assembly met pursuant to adjournment, and was duly constituted, prayer being offered, at the Moderator's request, by Mr. J. A. Turnbull, of Toronto.

The minutes of the morning Sederunt were read and sustained.

COMMITTEE ON SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The Moderator named the Committee on the formation of a Synod of British Columbia, as requested at the morning Sederunt. The Committee is as follows:—Dr. Robertson, Convener, Principal King, Professor Baird, D. M. Gordon, D. A. McRae, D. G. McQueen, Charles Stephen, and Dr. Cochrane, Ministers, and George Hay, George Gillies, and Dr. Fraser, Elders.

OVERTURE OF ST. JOHN PRESBYTERY WITHDRAWN.

Dr. McRae, on behalf of the memorialists of the Presbytery of St. John, in the matter of being allowed to adjust the boundaries of Presbyteries in New Brunswick, asked leave of the Assembly to withdraw the Overture.

The request was granted.

REPORT OF AGED AND INFIRM MISISTERS' FUND.

Eastern Section.—The Report of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Eastern Section, was called for, given in and read by Mr. Edward Grant, Convener of the Committee.

It was moved by Mr. A. McLean Sinclair, seconded by Mr. Edward Grant, and carried,—
That the General Assembly receive the Report, express its satisfaction with the fairly prosperous condition of the Fund, and strongly recommend it to the favourable consideration of the ministers and congregations within the bounds of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces.

APPLICATION OF DR. BURROWS.

With regard to the request of Dr. Andrew Burrows, to be reinstated in his former relation to the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Eastern Section, now that he has resumed his connection with the Church in Canada:—

It was moved by Mr. Edward Grant, duly seconded, and agreed to,—That the application of Dr. Burrows, referred to in the report, be granted.

FRATERNAL GREETINGS TO AND FROM CONGREGATIONAL UNION.

A communication was received from the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec, intimating that half-past ten o'clock to-morrow had been fixed by that body as the hour for the reception of the deputation appointed to convey the fraternal salutations of the General Assembly to the Congregational Union.

The Assembly appointed four o'clock on Monday afternoon next, as the time when it would please the Assembly to receive the delegation from the Congregational Union.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

Western Section.—The Assembly next called for the Report of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Western Section, which was given in and read by Mr. J. K. Macdonald, Convener.

The Report showed that the amount received from Ministers' rates as well as from congregations was less than in the previous year, although the sum received for interest was larger, and a valuable contribution was received from the Hymnal Committee, which placed the Fund on the whole in a better situation than it was a year ago. Mr. Macdonald entered into a full explanation of the principles on which the Fund is worked, and made an earnest appeal to the Assembly to endeavour to secure that all the Ministers of the Church shall connect themselves with the Fund.

On motion of Principal Grant, seconded by Mr. J. A. Paterson, the following recommendations were carried:—

I. That the Report be received, and the Committee and especially the Convener and Agent be thanked. The Assembly express regret that a more hearty response has not been made to the appeals of the Committee by the congregations in the Western Section of the Church. The Assembly very heartily commends both the ordinary and endowment branches of the Fund to the liberality of the Church and presses for a generous offering, in order that the Aged and Infirm Ministers may be more worthily sustained. The Assembly further expresses deep regret that so many of the Ministers are not connected with the Fund, and urge upon all the Ministers the advisableness of becoming connected with the Fund, and of a due presentation by them of its claims upon congregations.

II. That the Committee be instructed to make a thorough investigation of the matter as to rates, both in regard to the annuitants on the list and to Ministers supposed to be connected with the Fund, and that the annuities be made in accordance with the facts, and that Ministers in arrears be notified, and payment of arrears with interest be required on forfeit of full benefit.

III. That the Committee be henceforth charged with the collection and record of rates, and be required to notify regularly as to rates falling due.

IV. That the Committee correspond with Ministers not yet connected with the Fund with a view to their becoming connected with it.

V. That in view of the unsatisfactory relationship of so large a proportion of the Ministers to the Fund, the decision of last Assembly under which payment of rates under the percentage plan or by the fixed scale under amended Rule No. 3 was made optional for one year, be continued till next Assembly, and the Committee continue the investigation, and report to the next Assembly.

VI. That in regard to Rule No. 9, it be made to apply to all annuitants on the list, and the benefits which, under the rule, may accrue to the longer service annuitants be paid so far as the state of the Fund will permit

VII. That the recommendation of the Committee, in regard to the adjustment of the accounts, so that capital may have the benefit of all amounts paid on account of it, and the salary and expenses of the Agent be charged to income, be approved.

VIII. That in view of the largely increased work of the Committee, the Rev. Wm. Burns be appointed Secretary of the Committee.

IX. That the Committee on Standing Committees be instructed to reduce the number of members in the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund Committee for the Western Section, and that the travelling expenses of members be paid when attending meetings of the Committee.

MEMORIAL OF REV. THOMAS GOLDSMITH.

There was read a Memorial from Mr. T. Goldsmith, Toronto, asking that the Assembly instruct the Committee for the Management of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Western Section, to pay him a certain amount which they had withheld from him in 1891 because he had fulfilled certain pulpit engagements during that year which had yielded him some income.

It was moved by Dr. Robertson, seconded by Dr. Bryce, and carried unanimously,— That the Memorial of the Trustees of the Nisbet Academy be remitted to the Synod of Manitoba and the North -West Territories.

DR. GRAY, DELEGATE FROM CHURCH OF SCOTLAND, RECEPTION OF ARRANGED FOR.

On motion of Dr. Robert Campbell (Montreal), seconded by Dr. Cochrane, the Assembly fixed half-past four o clock on Monday as the hour for receiving Rev. Dr. Gray, of Liberton, Scotland, as a delegate from the Church of Scotland.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again in this place at half-past seven o'clock this evening, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction.

SEVENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past seven in the evening:

The Assembly met and was constituted with praise, reading the Scriptures and prayer led by Mr. R. McQueen, at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of the afternoon Sederunt were read and sustained.

FOREIGN MISSION COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

The Report of the Foreign Mission Committee was called for and given in by Mr. Hamilton Cassels, Convener, who read some of its most important passages, and commented on the leading features of the work carried on in the several Mission Fields under the care of the Committee, during the past year, and concluded with moving the reception of the Report. The motion was duly seconded and agreed to.

REV. W. A. WILSON,

Mr. W. A. Wilson, of the Mission to Central India, now home on furlough, was introduced to the Assembly and was cordially received. He gave a vivid and interesting account of the work carried on in the district of Malwa, dwelling on the hindrances to the acceptance of the Gospel by the Hindus and other native races of India, and pointing to the tokens of encouragement with which the Missionaries are cheered.

REV. J. MACDOUGALL.

Heber's Missionary hymn having been sung, the Moderator next introduced Mr. John MacDougall to the Assembly, after explaining that Mr. MacDougall had been obliged to return from Honan, China, on account of Mrs. MacDougall's ill health.

THE OPIUM TRAFFIC, - RESOLUTION OF ASSEMBLY ANENT.

The following motion was offered by Mr. W. A. Wilson, seconded by Mr. A. Gandier, and carried unanimously:—

That this General Assembly does hereby express its hearty sympathy with the efforts that are being made for the suppression of the Opium Traffic in India,—a traffic which is so destructive to the physical and moral well-being of our fellow subjects and is so great an obstacle to the progress of the Gospel in that land, and does hereby instruct the Foreign Mission Committee to co-operate as far as possible in taking steps to attain that end.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet again at half-past nine o'clock to-morrow morning, of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction.

EIGHTH SEDERUNT.

At the City of Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church, there, Saturday, the eleventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, at half-past nine in the forenoon:

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met and was constituted with devotional exercises, prayer being offered, at the request of the Moderator, by Dr. R. Campbell, Montreal.

The minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

COMMITTEE ON PROPOSED ENLARGEMENT OF SYNODICAL POWERS.

The Moderator appointed the following Committee to consider whether any or what matters now belonging exclusively to the General Assembly can with advantage be transferred to Synods: Principal Grant, Convener, Dr. McLaren, Mr. Sedgwick, Principal King, Mr. D. J. Macdonnell, Dr. Cochrane, Dr. Laing, President Forrest, Ministers; Hon. D. Laird, Mr. W. M. Clark, Mr. Warden King, Mr. George Rutherford and Chief Justice Taylor, Elders.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT-CONSIDERATION OF RESUMED.

Mr. Hamilton Cassels moved and Mr. J. Chisholm seconded the following motion, which was carried unanimously:--

The General Assembly would record its utter abhorrence and detestation of the repeated attempts made by some of the Chinese residents of British Columbia, to establish a traffic in Chinese girls, and its most cordial sympathy with the members of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies of this Church, and of the sister Churches, in their earnest desire to see the traffic finally suppressed, and with the efforts already made for its suppression by the Christian citizens of our Pacific ports.

And, further, the General Assembly remits the whole matter to the Foreign Mission Committee for full examination and enquiry, with a view to strengthen the hands of the Governme Assembly

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT, - DELIVERANCE THEREON.

The following Deliverance, as to the disposal of the Foreign Mission Report, was moved by Mr. A. Falconer, seconded by Dr. Cochrane:--

The Assembly in adopting the Report of the Foreign Mission Committee records its gratitude to God for His blessing on the work and His kindness to the workers during another year; expresses its sympathy with its missionaries in Sauto amidst perils of the heathen, and with those in Honan in the cruel and dangerous treatment to which they have been subjected; extends its heartfelt sympathy to the missionaries that have been visited by sickness and death in their families, praying that they may be made glad by returning health, and supported by sustaining grace; and to the friends of Miss Harris, who has laid down her life in the work, trusting that the Comforter may abide with them.

The Assembly welcomes its missionaries who have returned from the field, prays that Mrs. MacDougall's health may be restored, and that the furlough of Mr. and Mrs. Wilson may prove helpful both to themselves and to the Churches. The Assembly notes with satisfaction the deepening missionary interest among our congregations and the increasing strength and liberality of the Women's Foreign Mission Work of the Church. To all who have so kindly aided us, the Government and estate owners in Trinidad, the authorities in India, and friends everywhere, sheere thanks are given, with the prayer that they may realize that it is more blessed to give than to receive.

MR. GEORGE AUGUSTUS NEWMARK.

With regard to the converted Jew, Mr. Newmark, mentioned in the Foreign Mission Report, Dr. McLaren offered the following motion, which was seconded by Dr. A. B. McKay, and carried:—

The Assembly regard with much interest the case of Mr. George Augustus Newmark, brought under their notice by the report—authorize the Presbytery of Montreal to take him under its care, and, if satisfied with him, to certify him to the Presbyterian College, Montreal, as a student in Theology; and authorize the Foreign Mission Committee, from the Jewish mission funds at its disposal, to supply the means it may consider necessary to enable him to continue in the meantime his present labours and the studies requisite to fit him for fuller usefulness among his former co-religionists.

FOREIGN MISSION PROPERTY IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

As to the question of the property belonging to the Foreign Mission Committee in British Columbia, Mr. Hamilton Cassels moved as follows:—

The General Assembly hereby appoint Rev. William McLaren, D.D., Toronto, Rev. Patrick McFarlane McLeod, Victoria, B.C., Rev. Thomas Scouler, Newminster, Mr. Hamilton Cassels, Toronto, and Mr. Thornton Fell, Victoria, B.C., Trustees for the Church to whom and their successors may be conveyed the property at Alberni, already purchased by the Foreign Mission Committee, and all other property that may hereafter be found necessary to purchase in British Columbia, in order to carry on effectively the Committee's work among the Indians and Chinese in that Province; and natruct the Foreign Mission Committee to see that such property is conveyed to said Trustees upon trusts which shall secure the property for the permanent use of the Church in connection with its Foreign Mission work.

The motion was seconded by Dr. Wardrope, and carried unanimously.

COLLEGE REPORTS.

The Assembly called for the reports of the Boards of Management of the several Colleges of the Church. The reports were submitted in the following order:—

Halifax.—Professor Pollok, D.D., presented the report of the Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, and dwelt upon the work overtaken during last session, and called the attention of the Assembly to the lack of students having the Christian ministry in view, in this country, and the need of something being done to remedy the evil to the Church which must follow the continuance of this state of things.

Mr. Thomas Sedgwick moved and Mr. James McGregor seconded the following motion:—The Assembly receives the reports of the Board and Senate of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, and expresses much gratification at the continued prosperity of the Institution. It approves of the effort to be made this summer to extinguish the debt and thus prepare the way for the appointment of a fourth Professor, in accordance with its own resolution and that of the last General Assembly; cordially sympathizes with the Senate in its desire that in the circumstances of the Home Mission Field, special efforts should be made by Presbyteries to induce young men to study with a view to the Christian ministry; laments equally with the Senate and the Board the removal, on account of enfeebled health of Dr. Burns, who has been so long Chairman of the Board, and who in various ways so greatly promoted the interests and efficiency of the College; and commends the College to the Divine blessing and the sympathy and support of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces. The motion was adopted.

Morrin College.—The report of Morrin College was presented by Mr. A. T. Love, who called attention especially to the great losses in the staff sustained during the year, in the removal of Dr. Weir, Mr. Coull, and especially of Dr. Cook, the Principal.

The following motion, disposing of the report, was made by Mr. D. J. Macdonnell, seconded by Dr. MacLaren:—

The General Assembly receives and adopts the reports of the Governors of Morrin College, and in doing so would assure them of its deep sympathy in the trials through which they have passed, in the removal by death of Prof. Coull, whose brief connection with the College was so full of promise, and especially in the loss of the valuable Principal and Professor of Divinity, Dr. Cook, through whose instrumentality the College was founded by the late Dr. Morrin, in 1860, and who had been the guiding and animating spirit of the institution during thirty years.

The General Assembly desires to place on record its sense of the loss sustained, not only by Morrin College, but by the whole Church, in the death of Dr. Cook, who had received the highest honours the Church could bestow, having been twice Moderator of the Synod of the Church of Scotland before the union, and having been unanimously chosen Moderator of the first General Assembly of this Church in 1875, and who was, during his lengthened ministry in Canada, so closely identified with movements tending to promote the educational and religious interests of the country, and was the conspicuous and able advocate of all things that make for truth and righteousness. The General Assembly would commend Morrin College to the generous sympathy and liberality of the Church. The motion was adopted.

Presbyterian College, Montreal.—In the absence of Mr. David Morrice, chairman of the College Board, the report was given in and read by Dr. Warden, who called attention to the effort now putting forth to increase the endowment of the College, and announced that a generous friend of the College offered to provide a sum sufficient to support an additional Professor in the College for the next five years, and to continue the sum for a longer period, if by that time the chair be not endowed. Dr. Warden concluded with the following motion, which was seconded by Mr. J. Somerville, and unanimously adopted:—

The General Assembly cordially thanks the large-hearted friend of the College, who has generously offered to meet in full the salary of an additional Professor for the next five years, and longer if necessary.

Further, the Assembly is gratified to learn of the progress made in connection with the effort to increase the Endowment Fund, and commends this effort, and the claims of the

College generally, to the liberal support of the Church.

As an addendum to the report may be presented at a later sederunt, it was agreed that the Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, continue in other until their successors are appointed by the Assembly.

Queen's College.—Principal Grant presented and read the report of Queen's College, and moved its reception and adoption, seconded by Dr. Wardrope.

To this it was moved in amendment by Mr. W. Mortimer Clark, seconded by Dr.

That the report of Queen's College be received; that a Committee, to be named by the Moderator, be appointed to examine into the whole relations of Queen's College to the Presbyterian Church in Canada; and, after conference with the Trustees of Queen's College, to recommend some scheme whereby the appointment, control and removal of Professors in the Theological Faculty of Queen's College, and also the direction and regulation of teaching in the Theological Department of that College shall be vested in the General Assembly as fully and to the same extent as they now are vested in it, in the cases of Khox, Montreal, and Manitoba Colleges,—said Committee to report to next General Assembly.

Besides the mover and seconder of the amendment, Dr. R. Campbell (Montreal), Dr. McLaren and others took part in the discussion which followed.

No other member desiring to speak on the subject at this stage, Principal Grant, as mover of the original motion, was addressing the Assembly in reply to the arguments in favour of the amendment, when the hour of adjournment, one o'clock, arrived. It was agreed to resume consideration of this subject immediately after the constitution of the Assembly on Tuesday morning next.

The Assembly then adjourned to meet again in this place, at half-past nine o'clock on Mo. day morning next, of which public intimation was given, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

the l:— II. That according to the instructions of the General Assembly, Dr. Robertson's motion be transmitted, and that it be taken up immediately after the Overture from the Synod of Hamilton and London,—"Regulation in re preaching for a year."

III. That all Overtures on Young People's Societies be taken up immediately after the Report on Sabbath Schools is disposed of.

IV. Unfinished business as previously reported, in the order reported.

V. Afterwards take up remaining business according to printed docket.

The Assembly proceeded to take up the reports of the Colleges, that had not been given in on Saturday.

Knox College.—Mr. W. Mortimer Clark gave in and read the report of Knox College, and directed attention to some of the salient points in the report, especially to the gratifying fact of the large increase in the number of students during the last session, to the efficient service rendered to the institution by Dr. Kellogg while Principal Caven was absent on his visit to the East, to the gratification felt by the College authorities at the return of the Principal with renewed health and vigour, to the need of the appointment of a permanent tutor in the College, and to the timely legacy left for the improvement of the library by the late Mr. James MacLaren, of Buckingham.

Mr. Clark concluded his remarks by moving the reception and adoption of the report, which was seconded by Mr. J. A. Paterson. The motion was agreed to, including the recommendation of the Board as to the appointment of a permanent tutor.

Dr. Gregg presented the report of the Senate of Knox College, and moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. J. A. Paterson. The motion was carried unanimously.

Manitoba College.—The report of the Manitoba College was given in and read by Principal King, D.D., in the absence of the chairman, Chief Justice Taylor. He dwelt on the leading features of the report, showing the gratifying progress made by the institution during the past year, mentioning particularly the handsome legacy bequeathed to the College by the late Mr. James MacLaren, of Buckingham. He pointed out the need of a lecturer on Mental and Moral Philosophy, to relieve the present staff, the members of which are greatly overtasked, each professor undertaking much extra work, and called attention to the recent extension and improvement of the College buildings.

Mr. D. M. Gordon submitted the following resolution, disposing of the report, which was seconded by Mr. J. K. Macdonald, and unanimously adopted:—

That the General Assembly receives the report of the Board of Manitoba College, and recognizes with gratitude the prosperity of the College, as shown both in the increased number of students in attendance, and in the improved financial position of the institution.

The General Assembly further records its thanks to the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Church of Scotland, the Free Church of Scotland, and the American Presbyterian Church, Montreal, for their continued assistance to the Ordinary Fund of the College, and to the first-mentioned of these Churches for a special donation of fifty pounds sterling to the Building Fund. The General Assembly also records its appreciation of the liberality of the late James MacLaren for his request of \$20,000 to the College, and of the liberality of Miss Perrine for her gift of \$2,000 to the Scholarship Fund.

The General Assembly records its satisfaction that the marked progress of the College has made an extension of the College buildings necessary, and that the work is now in progress, and commends to the liberality of the Church the appeal of the College Board for means to carry on this work.

The General Assembly empowers the Board to provide for additional teaching in Mental and Moral Philosophy, by the appointment of a lecturer.

The Assembly postpones decision in regard to the question of a summer session, until the report of the Committee on Remits be presented to the Assembly.

ing in , until VOUNG LADIES' COLLEGE, BRANTFORD.

The report of the Brantford Young Ladies' College was given in and read by Dr. Cochrane.

Dr. Laing moved that the report of the Brantford Ladies' College be received and adopted; further, the Assembly expresses its gratification at the increasing prosperity of the College, as indicated in the large attendance of students during the year, and the high standard of work attained; commends it anew to the confidence and generous support of the Church, as an institution to which parents may safely entrust their daughters, alike for its religious influence and educational advantages.

The Assembly nominates the following gentlemen, from among whom six shall be elected at the annual meeting, to act as directors for the ensuing year, namely:—Rev. Wm. Cochrane, D.D., Messrs. Wm. Watt, Robert Hervey, Wm. Nichol, M.D., Thomas MacLean, C. B. Heyd, A. Robertson, Wm. Grant, Robert Russell, Adam Spence, John Sutherland, Alexander Turner, and appoints Rev. Geo. M. Milligan, B.A., as the Assembly's visitor for the coming year. The motion was seconded by Dr. M. Fraser, and agreed to.

HYMNAL COMMITTEE REPORT.

The report of the Hymnal Committee was called for, given in and read by Dr. Gregg, Convener, who, after explaining points in the report, concluded with offering the following motion:—

That the report of the Hymnal Committee be received and adopted.

The motion was seconded by Dr. Laing, and unanimously carried.

It was further moved in connection with this subject by Mr. Robert Murray, seconded by Mr. Henry Gracey:---

The General Assembly instruct the Hymnal Committee to consider the question of enlarging or revising the Hymnal; also authorize the Committee to confer with the Hymnal Committees of sister Presbyterian Churches with regard to a common Hymnal, and report to next Assembly.

The motion was agreed to.

COMMITTEE ON REMITS REPORT.

The report of the General Assembly's Committee on Remits was given in and read by Mr. D. M. Gordon, Convener. The report bore that returns had been received to the Remits on a proposed summer session in one of our Colleges, on the proposal to appoint a Secretary to the Foreign Mission Committee, on the distribution of probationers, and on that on a special instruction of eatechists.

Mr. Gordon concluded with moving that the report be received. This was seconded by Dr. Laidlaw, and agreed to.

REMIT ON A SUMMER SESSION FOR STUDENTS.

It was agreed to take up the report of the Committee on Remits, so far as the remit on the proposed summer session in one of our Colleges is concerned. It is as follows:—

Your Committee beg leave to report that returns have been received from 37 out of the 46 Presbyteries of the Church; that of those reporting, one declines to express any opinion, three are opposed to the holding of a summer session, thirty-three (33) are in favour of it, that those Presbyteries in favour of a summer session are all of opinion that it should be held in Manitoba College, that 23 of these express general approval of the plan outlined by the Senate of Manitoba College, to the effect that the session should

extend from the beginning of April to the end of August, that the new arrangement should take effect in April, 1893; that increased remuneration be given to those students who may occupy mission fields in winter for the purpose of taking the summer session, and that some arrangement be made by the Senate of Manitoba College, by which, in addition to the lectures of the regular staff, the students might receive instruction from the professors of the staffs of some of the other Colleges, or from others who might be willing to render this service; that one of the Presbyteries expresses the opinion that the summer session should be supervised by a Committee of the General Assembly; that three Presbyteries express the opinion that the additional professors or lecturers who may be required shall render their services without additional salary, and that one Presbytery expresses the opinion that the increased expenditure involved be charged on the Home Mission Fund.

Mr. D. M. Gordon moved:—That the report of the Committee on Returns to the Remit on a summer session be received, and, in view of the opinion in favour of a summer session expressed by a large majority of Presbyteries, that a Committee be appointed to draft a scheme for giving effect to this opinion, taking account of that part of the report of Manitoba College bearing upon this subject, and that the Committee submit their scheme at a future sederunt of this Assembly.

The motion was seconded, and agreed to.

TIME FIXED FOR CONSIDERING FOREIGN MISSION SECRETARYSHIP.

It was agreed, on motion of Principal MacVicar, that the report of the Committee on Remits, regarding the proposed appointment of a Secretary to the Foreign Mission Committee, be taken into consideration this afternoon, immediately after the order of the day fixing the time and place of the meeting of the next General Assembly.

REFERENCE FROM PRESBYTERY OF GUELPH.

There was submitted a Reference from the Presbytery of Guelph with regard to the right of elders in Mission Stations to a seat in Presbyteries. Dr. Torrance was heard in support of the reference.

OVERTURE FROM PRESBYTERY OF TORONTO.

There was given in and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Toronto, which craved, among other things, that the Assembly declare the law of the Church with regard to the right of Mission Stations to be represented in the Church Courts.

The following motion, submitted by Dr. MacLaren, seconded by Dr. Torrance, and carried, disposed of both the Reference and Overture:—

That the Reference from the Presbytery of Guelph and the Overture of the Presbytery of Toronto be received and referred to a Committee to ascertain the existing law of the Churci in respect to the points referred to, and also to consider whether any additional legislation is necessary in regard to representation in the Courts of the Church, and report to next Assembly.

LETTER FROM DR. FRASER, EX-CLERK.

A letter was received from Rev. Dr. Fraser, addressed to the Senior Clerk, correcting a slight inaccuracy in the Minutes of Assembly, which ascribed to him longer service in the Church than he had rendered. His pastorate had extended only to 44 years, not to more than 50 years, as the Committee of Assembly in their report had credited him with.

TENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, and on the same day at half-past two in the afternoon:

The General Assembly met according to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. R. Johnston, at the request of the Moderator, engaging in prayer.

The minutes of the morning Sederunt were read and sustained.

DECISION in re "SUMMER SESSIONS" RECONSIDERED.

On motion of Mr. Robert Murray, seconded by Mr. R. Hamilton the rule necessitating the giving notice of motion for a reconsideration of the finding of the Assembly, on the Remit regarding the matter of summer sessions, arrived at in the morning Sederunt was suspended.

Thereupon Dr. Laing moved, seconded by Dr. Warden,-

That the decision arrived at in the forenoon, with regard to summer sessions, be reconsidered.

This was agreed to.

Dr. Laing then moved as follows, in amendment to the motion of Mr. D. M. Gordon, seconded by Dr. McLaren,—

That the report of the Committee on Returns to the Remit on Summer Sessions be received; and the report be referred to a Committee to report a detailed finding on the whole matter as submitted to the Assembly.

A vote was taken on the motion and amendment, and the Assembly, by a majority, adhered to the decision come to in the forenoon, sustaining Mr. Gordon's motion.

Whereupon Dr. Laing, Dr. MacViear, Dr. Proudfoot and Dr. Warden asked leave to enter their dissent from the finding of the Assembly.

COMMITTEE ON SUMMER SESSIONS.

The Moderator named the following as a committee, in terms of the motion of Mr. Gordon new passed by the Assembly:—

Mr. D. M. Gordon, Contener, Principal King, Dr. McLaren, Principal Grant, Principal MacVicar, Dr. Pollok, Dr. Wardrope, Dr. Cochrane, Dr. Warden, Dr. Robertson, Dr. Campbell (Renfrew), Mr. Tait, Dr. Armstrong, Ministers, and Hon. D. Laird and Messrs. W. G. Craig, W. M. Clark, H. Cassels, R. McQueen, George Rutherford, D. Fraser and James Croil, Elders.

TIME AND PLACE FIXED FOR NEXT ASSEMBLY,

The Assembly now proceeded to the order of the day, namely, the fixing of the time and place of the next meeting of the General Assembly.

Dr. Cochrane invited the Assembly to hold its next meeting in the city of Brantford. It was thereupon moved by Mr. George Cuthbertson, seconded by Dr. Laidlaw,—That the next meeting of the General Assembly be held in Zion Church, Brantford,

on the second Wednesday of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening.

The motion was unanimously carried.

APPLICATIONS FOR LEAVE TO RETIRE-REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on applications for leave to retire from the active duties of the ministry, which was given in and read by Mr. D. J. Macdonnell, Convener.

The following is the report as amended:

The Committee on the applications of Presbyteries on behalf of ministers for leave to retire, beg leave to report as follows:—

1. In the Presbytery of Pictou,—That leave be granted to Rev. Alex. MacLean to retire, and to be placed on the list of annuitants of the Aged and Intirm Ministers' Fund.

2. In the Presbytery of St. John,—That leave be granted to Rev. James McG. MacKay to retire, and be placed on the list of amuitants of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.

3. In the Presbytery of Sydney,—That leave be granted to Rev. Hector McQuarrie to retire and be placed on the list of annuitants, receiving an allowance of \$100 per annum.

4. In the Presbytery of Halifax,—That leave be granted to Rev. R. F. Burns, D.D., te retire, and that his name be retained on the roll of the Presbytery of Halifax, as Pastor Emeritus of Fort Massie Church, Halifax. Dr. Burns does not desire to have his name placed on the list of annuitants of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.

5. In the Presbytery of Montreal,—That leave be granted to Rev. Wm. Forlong to retire and be placed on the list of annuitants of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, and that his name be retained on the roll of the Presbytery of Montreal, as Pastor Emeritus of Henry's Church, Lachute.

6. In the Presbytery of Maitland,—That leave be granted to Rev. Duncan Davidson to retire and to be placed on the list of annuitants when he attains the age of seventy years.

7. In the Presbytery of Saugeen,—That leave be granted to Rev. John McMillan to retire and be placed on the list of annuitants.

8. In the Presbytery of Minnedosa,—That the case of Rev. A. T. Colter be referred to the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund for full enquiry, with power to take such action as may be deemed advisable in the circumstances.

9. In the Presbytery of London,—That leave be granted to Rev. D. M. Cameron to retire and to be placed on the list of annuitants of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.

10. That the case of Rev. Robert Home, in the Presbytery of Sarnia be remitted to the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, to consider whether without placing him permanently on the list of annuitants, an allowance from the fund may not be given temporarily.

On motion of Mr. MacDonnell, the recommendations of the report, as thus amended, as a whole were adopted.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUNDS-RECOMMENDATIONS ADOPTED.

The recommendations of the report of the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Western Section, were taken up and considered.

Dr. Warden moved, seconded by Dr. Campbell (Renfrew),—That the recommendations of the Report of the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Western Section, be adopted. The motion was carried. With re Mr. E. Gra report of th adopted. T

DELEGATION FROM CONOREGATIONAL UNION.

Dr. Cochrane introduced to the Assembly the delegation from the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec, consisting of Rev. A. F. MacGregor, Chairman of the Union, Principal Barbour, of the Congregational College, and Charles Whitlaw, Esq., of Paris, who successively addressed the Assembly, bringing the greetings of the Church which they represented, and wishing all success to the Presbyterian Church in Canada, represented by the General Assembly.

The Moderator replied in suitable terms to the address of the delegation.

RECEPTION OF THE REV. DR. GRAY, OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.

There was presented and read a letter signed by Dr. James MacGregor, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, and by Rev. Alex. W. Williamson, Convener of the Colonial Committee therein, addressed to the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and conveying the warm greetings and congratulations of the Church of Scotland to her younger sister in Canada.

The Moderator then introduced to the Assembly the Rev. W. H. Gray, D.D., Minister of the Parish of Liberton, Scotland, an ex-Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, and formerly Convener of the Colonial Committee thereof, commissioned by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland to appear before this General Assembly, who addressed the house, assuring the Presbyterian Church in Canada of the unabated interest and affection of the Church of Scotland, and of its purpose to aid the Church in Canada in its great work, especially in Manitoba and the North-West.

Dr. McRae moved, and Dr. Cochrane seconded the following motion, which was unanimously carried:—

The General Assembly most cordially welcomes the Rev. W. H. Gray, D.D., ex-Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, as a commissioner delegated to them from that venerable body. The General Assembly remembers with gratitude the lively interest manifested in the welfare of the Presbyterian Church in Canada by Dr. Gray, when acting as Convener of the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland. They gladly recognize in his presence to-day a renewed proof that that interest, and the interest of the Church so worthily represented by him, is undiminished; and they most fervently reciprocate the expression of goodwill and affection uttered by him on behalf of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

Thereupon, the Moderator conveyed to Dr. Gray the hearty thanks of the Assembly for his appearance before it, and the delight which his address afforded it; and asked him to convey to the Venerable the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, the deep sense of the Presbyterian Church in Canada of the kindness and consideration shown by the Church of Scotland to this Church, especially in its Home Mission work.

FOREIGN MISSION SECRETARYSHIP-REMIT ON.

The Assembly called for the report of the Assembly's Committee on Remits regarding the Remit on the proposed Foreign Mission Secretaryship, which was given in and read by Mr. D. M. Gordon, Convener.

- 1. That of the forty-six Presbyteries of the Church thirty-one had sent returns tothe Remit.
- 2. That of the thirty-one Presbyteries reporting twenty-two answer "yes" simpliciter; that four answer "nay" simpliciter; two recommend the union of the Home and Foreign Secretaryships; one recommends that the work be done by Rev. S. J. Taylor, in connection with French Evangelization; one recommends that it be carried on in connection with "some other office;" one recommends the appointment of a Secretary for office work alone.
- 3. That eighteen Presbyteries present recommendations for the office, the recommendations including the names of eight different individuals.
- 4. That one Presbytery recommends a salary of \$1,000 with expenses and house rent; another recommends \$1,600; and another \$2,000.

PROPOSED METHOD OF VOTING ON FOREIGN MISSION SECRETARYSHIP.

It was then moved by Dr. MacLaren, seconded by Mr. R. Hamilton,-

That in view of the Returns from Presbyteries, the Assembly do now, after receiving nominations, proceed to ballot for a Secretary for the Foreign Mission Committee, and do also determine that no one shall be considered elected who has not received a majority of the ballots cast, and that the name receiving the fewest votes shall be dropped after each ballot which may be found necessary.

To this it was moved in amendment by Principal Grant, and seconded by Mr. Robert Murray,-

That it be remitted to a Special Committee to be appointed by the Moderator, to consider this matter and report to the Assembly on Wednesday forenoon.

The vote being taken, motion or amendment, the amendment carried by a small majority.

The vote was now taken on the amendment, now become the motion, "yea" or "nay," when the Assembly by a majority voted "yea," and it became the judgment of the House.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet in this place this evening at half-past seven o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction.

COMMITTEE ON BILLS AND OVERTURES-REPORT.

Dr. Torrance presented a report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, intimating he order of business set down for this Sederunt, which was received and adopted.

REPORT OF BOARD OF FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.

The Assembly called for the report of the Board of French Evangelization, which was given in and read by Mr. S. J. Taylor, Secretary to the Board, who explained its leading features, pointing out especially the recently displayed activity of societies connected with the Church of Rome, in promoting a propagandism of misrepresentation of the history and principles of Protestantism.

The reception and adoption of the report was moved by Mr. W. Mortimer Clark, seconded by President Forrest, and carried as follows:—

That the General Assembly in receiving and adopting the report, records its gratitude to the God of Missions for the measure of success which has attended the labours of the teachers, colporteurs and missionaries of the Board, and anew commends the work, in all its departments, to the prayerful and liberal support of the Church.

The Moderator then introduced Rev. Jules Bourgoin, Principal of the Pointe aux Trembles School, who addressed the Assembly on the work carried on by the Board, and elequently defended the right of the French-speaking people of the Dominion to receive the Gospel.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF RELIGION.

The Assembly next called for the report of the Committee on the State of Religion, which was presented by Dr. A. B. MacKay, Convener,—who called attention to some of the most prominent features in it. The report dwelt on the importance of a careful teaching of the Shorter Catechism to the young, and of the faithful training of the Home,—and on the necessity of a true and earnest spirit of prayer, the want of which, together with pleasure-seeking and the influence for evil of unworthy Evangelistic agents were mentioned as among the hindrances to the progress of religion in Canada, Dr. MacKay concluded with a motion for the reception of the report, which was seconded by Mr. Walter Paul, and agreed to.

It was then resolved to take up the recommendations of the report scriatim. They were adopted as follows:—

1. That the Moderator of the General Assembly be requested to write a pastoral letter on the subject of Family Religion, and that all ministers be instructed to preach a sermon on this subject during the course of the year.

2. That Sessions be careful to divide all congregations into districts, each under the supervision of an elder—and that each district be of such dimensions that the elder appointed may be able to undertake the work expected of him.

3. That Young People's Societies keep steadily before them, as the great object of their existence, the study of the word of God, and the prosecution of Christian work—and that they avail themselves of the west helps to attain these ends, under the direction of the Sossion.

4. That all the members of the Church be exhorted to adhere to the principles of truth and righteousness in political life, and to show by their deeds that they hate the sins of bribery and corruption.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet to-morrow morning in this place, at half-past nine o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction.

At the Oity of Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church, there, Tuesday the fourteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, at half-past nine in the forenoon:—

The General Assembly of the Prosbytorian Church in Canada met as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, prayer being offered by Dr Laing, at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

COMMITTEE ON BILLS AND OVERTURES-REPORT.

Dr. Torrance presented a report from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, recommending an order of business for to-day, which was received and adopted.

The Rev. Principal Douglas, of the Wesleyan College, Montreal, being in the House, was, on motion of Dr. Laing, introduced to the Assembly, and asked to take a seat on the platform. Dr. Douglas thanked the Assembly for its courtesy, but asked to be excused from going to the platform.

MINUTE REGARDING RESIGNATION OF DR. FRASER AS CLERK.

Dr. Torrance, on behalf of the special committee appointed to draft a suitable minute with regard to the resignation of Dr. Fraser, Recording Clerk of Assembly, reported as follows:—That the General Assembly expresses its regret that the Rev. William Fraser, D.D., has felt himself constrained, through the infirmities of advanced years, to offer his resignation of the office he has so long held, and whose duties he has so satisfactorily performed as Recording Clerk.

Coming from Nova Scotia to what is now the Province of Ontario, more than half a century ago, and entering on a field of labour as a minister of the Gospel, he endeared himself to the people to whom he was specially called to minister in holy things, and to all with whom he was brought into contact, and has had no small influence in forming and moulding the religious life and character of many persons, and in helping to lay the foundations of that righteousness which exalteth a nation.

At an early period in the history of that branch of the Presbyterian Church with which he was connected, his qualifications for the duties of Clerk were seen and acknowledged, and he was chosen to fill the position on the removal of the former occupant by death, and he was in the office when the union took place in 1861 between the Presbyterian Church of Canada and the United Presbyterian Church, and was continued in the United Church. When the union took place, in 1875, between the Canada Presbyterian Church, the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland, the Presbyterian Church of the Maritime Provinces in connection with the Church of Scotland, and the Presbyterian Church of the Lower Provinces, he, from the one branch, and the late Professor Mackerras, from the other, were associated in the Recording Clerkship; and when, in the Providence of God, his colleague was taken away to the Church above, Dr. 1 raser was appointed to undertake all its duties, and has continued to discharge them to the satisfaction of the Assembly down to the present date.

The General Assembly would put on record an expression of its gratitude to God for the service to the Church which He has enabled Dr. Fraser, in his official capacity, to

Mr. George Hay has been commissioned by the two Presbyteries of Columbia and Honan, and elects to sit for the latter. Mr. John Stirling has been commissioned by the two Presbyteries of Montreal and Columbia, and elects to sit for the former.

1. It is recommended that the roll be amended by removing the above names from the list of the Presbyteries for which these elders decline to sit. The name of Mr. R. Hamilton has been omitted as commissioner from the Presbytery of Stratford unintentionally.

2. It is recommended that the name be added.

Principal Grant, with the leave of his seconder, by permission of the Assembly withdrew his motion; and the motion of Mr. Macdonnell became the unanimous finding of the House.

The hour for adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet in this place at half-past two this afternoon, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction.

At the same time, express sympathy with the Presbytery in the unusually difficult circumstances of the case, and declare the conduct of Mr. Muir highly censurable; notwithstanding, remove the suspension now resting on him, and, in the interests of peace, instruct the Session to give him a letter of dismission, that he may seek admission to another congregation, and enjoin Mr. Muir henceforth to seek earnestly to live peaceably with all men.

Dr. Forrest moved, and Mr. J. Chisholm seconded, the reception and adoption of the report. The motion was carried, as the unanimous finding of the Assembly.

The Moderator then called parties before the Assembly and intimated to them the decision of the House,

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUMMER SESSION-CONSIDERED.

The Assembly took up the report of the Special Committee on the Remit of the last General Assembly on a summer session in one of the Theological Colleges.

Dr. Proudfoot moved, seconded by Mr. James Carmichael,—That the report submitted by Mr. D. M. Gordon, as Convener of the Special Committee, lie on the table till next Assembly.

A vote being taken on this motion, it was lost. Thereupon Mr. D. M. Gordon moved, seconded by Mr. J. Chisholm,—That a summer session be instituted in connection with Manitoba College, and that the Senate of that College be instructed to arrange that the theological classes be, until otherwise appointed, held during the summer months,—that the session should extend from the beginning of April to the end of August, and that the new arrangement should take effect in April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.

To this it was moved in amendment by Mr. A. McLean Sinclair, seconded by Dr. Pollok,—That taking all circumstances into consideration, the General Assembly does not see its way clear to sanction the establishment of a summer session in Manitoba College, as set forth by those favouring that scheme; but, in view of the pressing necessities of the North-West, remit to the Home Mission Committee of the Western Section to consider in what other way these necessities may be met, and report to the next General Assembly.

The debate was adjourned till to-morrow morning.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet in this place at half-past seven o'clock this evening, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction.

REPORTS ON REVISION OF SYNOD RECORDS.

There were given in and read the reports of the Committees appointed to revise the records of the Synod of Hamilton and London, and those of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, bearing that they had examined the same and had found them carefully and correctly kept, and recommending that they be attested accordingly.

The Assembly ordered that both records be attested in terms of these reports.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The report of the Assembly's Committee on Sabbath Schools was called for, and presented by Mr. T. F. Fotheringham, Convener, who pointed out the salient features of the report, and concluded with moving,—That the report be received, and its recommendations considered scriatim,—which was duly seconded and carried.

The following recommendations were adopted :-

1. That question No. 9 in the schedule of the Returns from Schools be changed to "What is the net increase (or decrease) in total membership?"

2. That the Teachers' Course proposed be added to the syllabus as a Fifth Department, and that the Committee be authorized to prepare the regulations, etc., necessary for carrying it out.

3. That the Home Study Leaflet be recommended as a useful help in the preparation of the Lesson.

4. That the Sabbath School Committee be authorized to publish the Handbook of Sabbath School Management and Work, prepared at the instance of the Assembly of 1889, with the following words in the title page, Prepared for and Recommended by the Committee on Sabbath Schools of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

5. Mr. Fotheringham moved, seconded by Mr. J. G. Stuart, recommendation No. 5, as presented in the report. To this it was moved in amendment by Mr. R. Murray, seconded by Dr. Laing,—

That the General Assembly cordially recommend the Sabbath schools to contribute to the Sabbath School Committee an amount sufficient to meet current expenses, and to liquidate the debt of two hundred and sixty-one dollars incurred by the Committee.

The amendment was carried by a large majority.

6. The sixth recommendation, as presented in the report, was moved by Mr. T. F. Fotheringham, seconded by Mr. James Croil.

To this it was moved in amendment by Dr. Laing, seconded by Mr. J. G. Stuart:— That it be a recommendation to the congregations of the Church to take up a collection in aid of the Sabbath schools on the last Sabbath of September, the day already fixed by the General Assembly as a day of special prayer on behalf of the Sabbath schools of the Church.

On motion of Mr. Fotheringham, the recommendations, as thus amended, were unanimously adopted as a whole.

COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE-REPORT.

The report of the Assembly's Committee on Temperanee was called for, and given in by Mr. D. Stiles Fraser, Convener, who explained and enforced its leading points.

Mr. Walter Paul moved, seconded by Mr. Geo. McArthur,—That the Assembly receive the report, thank the Committee, and especially the Convener, and consider the recommendations scriatim, as also the questions to be sent down for the current year.

The motion was agreed to.

The Assembly then proceeded to consider the recommendations.

The first and second recommendations were successively adopted as presented,

With regard to recommendation No. 3, the adoption of which was moved by Mr. D. S. Fraser, Mr. W. J. Dey moved, in amendment, seconded by Mr. W. Drysdale,—

That all the words between "Assembly" and "instructs" be deleted, and that instead of the word "Commission" there he substituted the words "Royal Commission of Enquiry into the Liquor Traffic." The motion was carried over the amendment.

Recommendations 4, 5, 6, 7 were adopted, on motion of Mr. D. Stiles Fraser, with a few verbal alterations.

Dr. Campbell (Renfrew) moved, seconded by Mr. J. Somerville,-

That in view of the appointment of a Royal Commission of Enquiry into the Liquor Traffic, there is urgent necessity that the case of the thorough-going advocates of temperance principles should be clearly and fully presented before the said Commission,—which can only be done by employing qualified agents and incurring much expense, the General Assembly acknowledges its responsibility in the premises and resolves,—

1. To appoint that the Moderator, the Clerks, Dr. Campbell (Renfrew), and the Convener of the Temperance Committee immediately prepare and issue to all the congregations a circular explaining the requirements of the case, and asking that a contribution be sent to Dr. Reid, if possible before the 15th July next.

2. To remit it to the Moderator, the Clerks and Dr. Campbell, acting in concert with the Temperance Committee, either to secure a separate presentation of the case on behalf of this Assembly, or, if found more advisable, then to co-operate with other organizations in presenting the case before the Royal Commission.

The motion was agreed to.

TEMPERANCE RESOLUTIONS.

On motion of Mr. D. Stiles Fraser, the recommendations of the Committee, as amended, were adopted as a whole, Dr. Campbell's resolution to rank as No. 4. They are the following:—

Church so fully recognize the earnest and faithful preaching and teaching of the Word of God as the principal factor in the Temperance Reform, and that their importance, especially as they bear on the evils of strong drink is of late years being more strongly emphasized with good results, urges all its ministers to give increasing prominence to sermons on Temperance, and all its Sabbath school teachers to use the many opportunities they have to instruct their classes in sound temperance principles.

2. That this Assembly, having heard the unanimous and vigorous denunciation given by so many Sessions and Presbyteries, in all parts of the Dominion, of the saloon or dramshop, and deploring the large numbers that are reported as plying their demoralizing traffic in so many centres of population, desires to place on record its unqualified condemnation of the saloon or dram-shop, as a centre of most degrading influences, and a source of great danger to the Church and country, and its conviction that the license system has been proved insufficient to effectually remove the terrible evils of the drink traffic, and that, so far as legislation is concerned, nothing short of prohibition, rigidly enforced by the proper authorities, should ever be accepted as final or satisfactory.

3. That this Assembly accepts the appointment by Parliament of a Royal Commission of Enquiry into the Liquor Traffic as a step in the right direction, though very far short of the prayer of the petitions presented to the Session of 1891, and instructs its Committee on Temperance to urge upon the Government the vigorous prosecution of the work of that commission, so that its report may be presented at an early stage of the Session of 1893, that there may be time for dealing with the great question of prohibition, fairly and fully, without any unnecessary delay.

4. (Dr. Campbell's Resolution).

5. That this Assembly, recognizing that the saloon, or dram-shop has a firm strong-hold in the pernicious habit of "treating," is gratified to learn that the "Commercial Men's Anti-treating League" is meeting with much success in removing a serious temptation and in weakening the influence of the saloon, and expresses the hope that it may be the means of leading many to adop the practice of Total Abstinence, in which alone there is absolute safety from the evils of strong drink.

6. That this Assembly gratefully acknowledges the good work done by the various Temperance organizations, and an increasingly large portion of the Press, in training the young and educating the public in the principles of Temperance and Prohibition, and recommends office-bearers and members of the Church to give such organizations and such

portion of the press due sympathy, incouragement and support.

7. That this Assembly, fully recognizing the potent influence of women in relation to the drinking customs of society, and the importance of proper home-training, earnestly recommends all the women of the Church to discountenance the use of intoxicants in family and social life, and all mothers to train their children in the principles of temperance and prohibition.

8. That, in view of the importance now attached to the scientific teaching of temporance in the public schools of the country, and the provisions being made for such teaching, this Assembly directs its Committee on Temperance to call the attention of the Provincial educational authorities to the necessity of making suitable provision for giving instruction on the moral, as well as scientific bearing, of the use of alcoholic liquors, and that Presbyteries' Committees on Temperance be instructed to memorialize public school inspectors within their bounds to have a Temperance Manual systematically used in all the schools under their jurisdiction.

9. That this Assembly approves generally of the plan of organization, as contained in Section 2 of this report, and recommends it as a simple and practical plan for doing effective temperance work within the Church.

1. Has the plan of organization for temperance work in the Church, recommended by the last General Assembly, been adopted in your congregation? If adopted, what has been done? And with what results? If not adopted, what temperance work has been done in your Church during the year?

2. Are temperance sentiments and the practice of total abstinence now on the increase in your congregation? Give a brief statement of the facts on which you base your answer.

3. Has the sale of liquor entirely ceased within your bounds? If not, do you think it has decreased during the year?

4. What, in your opinion, have been the causes that have hindered the strict enforcement in your community of temperance legislation during the last three years?

5. Do you favour the enactment of a prohibitory liquor law at an early date? Please give reasons for your answers.

6. What measures have you taken to promote the regular teaching of temperance in the day schools? What improvement has there been in such teaching during the year?

QUESTIONS TO PRESBYTERIES' COMMITTEES ON TEMPERANCE.

Have you carried out the instructions of the last General Assembly, contained in Resolution 8 of Report on Temperance? What have been the results?

That the Assembly instruct the Committee to appoint one member of the Home Mission Committee from each of the Synods of British Columbia, and of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, besides the Superintendent of Missions.

To this it was moved, in amendment, by Dr. Laing, seconded by Dr. McRae,-

That the Assembly instruct the Committee to nominate two members representing each Synod, in addition to Dr. Robertson.

The amendment was carried over the motion, and became the judgment of the House. The other items of the report, as presented, were gone over and amended.

The Assembly agreed to appoint the Foreign Mission Committee as nominated.

COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN SECRETARYSHIP-REPORT.

Dr. Moore gave in and read the report of the Special Committee on the Foreign Mission Secretaryship, and moved that it be received and its recommendations considered seriatim. This was agreed to.

The first four recommendations were adopted :-

I. In the judgment of your Committee, the qualifications for this position, and which should be looked for in the person to be elected for the office, should be :--

1. Good business ability, including tact and promptness, in the management of correspondence, and the preparation of information for the press.

2. Knowledge of the countries in which our missions are situated, together with the power of effective presentation or address at designation services and other important gatherings.

II. Salary, two thousand dollars (\$2,000) a year and travelling expenses.

III. That it be remitted to the Foreign Mission Committee to define more in detail the duties to be performed.

IV. That the secretary be ex officio a member of the Foreign Mission Committee, in addition to the number fixed by the vote of the Assembly.

V. That the Rev. R. P. McKay, of Parkdale, Toronto, be called to this work.

It was moved by Dr. McLaren, seconded by Mr. Joseph Gibson,—That the recomunendation of the Committee be adopted.

To this it was moved, in amendment, by Dr. Laing, seconded by Mr. Roderick McLeod. -

That the motion be amended by substituting the name of Rev. D. D. MacLeod, of Barrie, for that of Rev. R. P. McK.y.

It was moved, in amendment to the amendment, by Dr. Moore, seconded by Mr. J. Somerville,—That the name of Rev. J. B. Fraser, M.D., be inserted in the place of that of Rev. R. P. McKay.

It was moved by Dr. McLaren, seconded by Dr. Laing, and resolved to lay the motion and amendments on the table.

no one shall be considered elected who has not received a majority of the ballots cast, and that the name having the fewest votes shall be dropped after each ballot which may be found necessary. The motion was adopted.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, further action was deferred, and it was resolved that the continued consideration of this matter be the first business taken up after the reading of the minutes this afternoon.

It was further resolved to take up next after this matter, the report on the Assembly's Remit on a summer session in one of our Colleges.

The Assembly adjourned, to meet in this place this afternoon at half-past two o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction.

SIXTEENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:

The Assembly met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, led by Dr. Warden, at the Moderator's request.

The minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

It being reported by the Committees appointed to rovise the records of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, and those of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, that they were carefully and correctly kept, they were ordered to be attested accordingly.

Mr. Geo. M. Milligan nominated Rev. Alfred Gandier, of Brampton, for the Foreign Mission Secretaryship.

It was agreed to proceed to ballot on the following names:—Mr. R. P. McKay, Mr. D. D. MacLeod, Dr. J. B. Fraser, and Mr. Alfred Gandier.

Dr. Warden, Mr. R. Hamilton, Mr. Jas. McMillan and Mr. A. F. Tully were appointed scrutineers to take the vote.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

In the absence of Mr. David Morrice, Chairman of the Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, Mr. James Fleck brought in a supplementary report, recommending that Mr. James Ross, B.D., M.A., Minister of Knox Church, Perth, be appointed Professor of Homiletics, Pastoral Theology, Sacred Rhetoric and Church Government in said College. And that the Alma Mater Society of the College be empowered to nominate annually three of their number as members of the Board of Management of the College.

Mr. Fleck moved that the report be received and its recommendations considered seriatim.

This was agreed to.

Mr. Fleck then moved, seconded by Dr. Wardrope,—That the Rev. James Ross, B.D., M.A., Minister of Knox Church, Perth, Ontario, be and is hereby appointed Professor of Homiletics, Pasteral Theology, Sacred Rhetoric, and Church Government in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, at a salary of two thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,750) per annum, and that in the event of his signifying to the Clerk of the Assembly his acceptance of this appointment, the Presbytory of Lanark and Renfrew be instructed to dissolve the connection between him and his congregation, and that the

Presbytery of Montreal induct him into the above named chair of Homiletics, Pastoral Theology, Sacred Rhetoric and Church Government.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

FIRST BALLOT FOR FOREIGN SECRETARYSHIP.

The scrutineers reported, through Dr. Warden, Convener, the result of the first ballot for the Secretary to the Foreign Mission Committee: Votes cast 132; necessary to an election, 67,—votes for Mr. McKay, 68; for Mr. MacLeod, 31; for Mr. Gandier, 23; and for Dr. Fraser, 15,—no election. Another ballot was ordered.

ALMA MATER SOCIETY REPRESENTATION ON PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE BOARD.

On motion of Mr. Fleek, duly seconded, the recommendation that the Alma Mater Society of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, consisting of the graduates of the Institution, be empowered to nominate annually three of their number as members of the Board was unanimously adopted.

SECOND BALLOT FOR FOREIGN SECRETARYSHIP.

The scrutineers reported that in the second ballot for the office of Secretary to the Foreign Mission Committee, 150 votes were cast—necessary to a choice, 76,—and that 84 votes, being more than a majority, were cast for Rev. R. P. McKay.

It was thereupon moved by Dr. Laing, seconded by Mr. D. D. MacLeod,—That Rev. R. P. McKay be appointed Foreign Mission Secretary. The motion was supported by Mr. R. D. Fraser and Mr. Alfred Gandier, and was carried unanimously.

REPRESENTATIVES OF WESTERN SYNODS ON HOME MISSION COMMITTEE.

The Committee appointed to strike Standing Committees, instructed in the forenoon to name two representatives of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territeries, and two of the Synod of British Columbia, on the Home Mission Committee, Western Section, reported as follows:—That Messrs. James Farquharson and Peter Wright be the representatives of the former Synod, and Messrs. E. D. McLaren and J.C. Herdman be the representatives of the latter.

It was moved, seconded and agreed to, that the report be received and adopted.

RECOMMENDATIONS RELATING TO FOREIGN MISSION SECRETARYSHIP COMPLETED.

The remainder of the report of the Special Committee, appointed to consider and report some line of action with reference to the appointment of a Secretary for the Foreign Mission Work of the Church, was taken up and considered.

Recommendation VI.—That on the acceptance of the call of the Assembly by Mr. McKay, the Presbytery of Toronto be instructed to take the necessary steps for his release from the pastoral charge of the Parkdale congregation.

The recommendation, on motion of Dr. Moore, was adopted. Dr. Moore then moved that the recommendations of the Committee, as a whole, be adopted.

This was agreed to,

SUBJECT OF COLLEGE SUMMER SESSIONS CONCLUDED.

The discussion of the matter of a summer session in Manitoba College was again taken up, Dr. C. shrane, Dr. Proudfoot, Dr. King, Dr. MacVicar, Mr.Tully, Dr. Mungo Fraser, Mr. G. M. Milligan, Dr. Scringer, Mr. R. McQueen, and Mr. J. Pringle were heard on the subject. Mr. D. M. Gordon, as mover of the original motion, closed the discussion.

The vote was taken, motion or amendment, when there voted for the amendment 18, and for the motion 114. The "yeas and nays" being called for, on Mr. Gordon's motion there voted "yea." 114, and "nay," 13; and the motion accordingly became the judgment of the House.

DR. WARDEN'S NOTICE OF MOTION.

Dr. Warden gave notice of the following motion, which he would move when a fitting opportunity offered :-

That in view of the adoption by the General Assembly of the principle of a summer session, the Home Mission Committee (Western Section), he instructed to consider what action, if any, is necessary to secure the increased amount required for the work entrusted to their care; and more especially to consider the propriety of working the Home Mission field, in Ontario and Quebec, as is done in the Maritime Provinces, by means of Synodical Committees,-to report to next Assembly.

It was resolved to make the disposal of this matter the first item of business, after the reading of the minutes, to-morrow foreneen.

DELEGATION FROM DOMINION ALLIANCE.

It appearing that there had been an oversight in the Assembly's not notifying the delegation from the Dominion Alliance, that the hour of five o'clock this afternoon had been fixed for receiving them, it was agreed to inform them that the Assembly will be pleased to receive them at five o'clock to-morrow afternoon, Mr. Walter Paul undertaking to communicate with them to that effect.

The hour of adjournment having come, the Assembly adjourned to meet in this place this evening at half-past seven o'clock, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction.

SEVENTEENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening :-

The General Assencey met, as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Dr. A. B. MacKay leading in prayer, as the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

COMMITTEE ON LOYAL ADDRESSES.

Dr. A. B. MacKay, Convener of the Committee on Loyal Addresses, read the draft of addresses to Her Majesty the Queen, and to His Excellency the Governor General, prepared by the Committee. The report was received, and the draft adopted, and instruction was given that the addresses should be properly engrossed and forwarded in the usual way.

REPORT ON SARBATH OBSERVANCE.

The report of the General Assembly's Committee on Sabbath Observance was called for, given in, and read by Mr. J. Charlton, M.P., in the absence of the Convener, Dr. Armstrong. Mr. Charlton detailed the efforts put forth by the Committee during the year, especially the attempts to obtain necessary legislation from the Parliament of Canada for the protection of the sanctity of the Lord's Day, the prohibiting the publication and

sale of Sunday newspapers, and the lessening of Sunday labour in the railways and canals of the Dominion. A Bill had been introduced into the House of Commons which had these objects in view, but which had been defeated in Committee, after receiving its second reading.

Mr. Charlton moved the reception of the report, which motion was ag. sed to.

OVERTURE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

In this connection there was taken up and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Guelph, which had been adopted by the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, deprecating the opening of the Columbia Exposition on the Lord's Day, and the sale of intoxicating liquors therein, and asking this Church to use its influence to prevent both these evils. Overtures and memorials on the subject of the need of all legitimate pressure's being brought to bear, by the Christian people of the continent, to secure the due observance of the Sabbath in connection with the Columbia Exposition, were also received by the Assembly from the Presbyteries of Miramichi and Pictou, as well as a Minute and Overture from the Synod of Toronto and Kingston—which were taken into consideration. Resuming consideration of the report on Sabbath Observance, Mr. Charlton moved that the recommendations be considered seriatim. This was agreed to.

They were discussed, amended and adopted, one by one,-

1. Same as last year, viz.:—That ministers of our Church be careful to bring before their congregations the nature and sanctions of the Sabbath day as they have opportunity, and that at least one sermon during the year be devoted to the subject.

That parents in their home instructions, and teachers in the Sabbath schools, take pains to instil into the minds of the young the teachings of Scripture in regard to the Sabbath day.

That the ministers and members of our Church, and especially those on our various Sabbath Observance Committees, seek, as they have opportunity, to use the press in influencing public attention to right views on Sabbath Observance.

2. That the General Assembly express its strong disapproval of the opening of the Post offices on the Lord's day, and memorialize the Government in regard thereto.

3. That the Assembly express its general approval of the Bill for the Better Protection of the Lord's day, now before Parliament, authorize the Moderator and Clerk to sign a petition in favour thereof, and appoint the members of its Committee on Sabbath Observance as its representatives in the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada.

4. That the Assembly join with other bodies in earnestly asking the Commission and Directory of the Columbia Exposition, to be held in Chicago, to close the Exposition on Sabbath days; and that the Assembly also petition the Government of Canada to direct the closing of all exhibits over which they may have authority; and authorize the Moderator and Clerks to sign the necessary documents in accordance with this resolution.

5. That a circular be sent to Presbyteries, containing questions for the purpose of eliciting information, and that Presbyteries be recommended to call for reports from their Committees on Sabbath Observance at a regular meeting of Presbytery.

6. That the General Assembly express appreciation of the efforts made by the people of Toronto to prevent the running of street cars on the Sabbath, and gratification at their success.

The recommendations, thus amended and passed, were adopted as a whole.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow forenoon, at half past nine o'clock, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

EIGHTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church there, Thursday, the sixteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two:—

The General Assembly met, according to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Dr. McLaren offering prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

DR. WARDEN'S MOTION TO PROVIDE FOR THE SUMMER SESSION.

Dr. Warden now offered the motion of which he gave notice at the Sixteenth Sederunt, seconded by Dr. Campbell (Renfrew).

It was resolved to divide the motion into two parts, and the discussion was limited in the first instance to the following, which was unanimously adopted:—

That in view of the adoption by the General Assembly of the principle of a summer session, the Home Mission Committee (Western Section) be instructed to consider what action, if any, is necessary to secure the increased amount required for the work entrusted to their care.

The consideration of the remainder of Dr. Warden's motion was deferred for the present.

REMUNERATION FOR WINTER STUDENT MISSIONARIES.

Mr. D. M. Gordon moved, seconded by Dr. Warden,—That the Home Mission Committee be instructed to give increased remuneration to those students who shall occupy mission fields in winter, with a view to attendance on the classes during the summer sessions.

The motion was carried.

Dr. Campbell (Renfrew) craved leave to enter his dissent.

ADDITIONS TO THEOLOGICAL STAFF OF MANITOBA COLLEGE.

Mr. D. M. Gordon moved, seconded by Mr. J. Pringle,—That the Senate and Board of Manitoba College be empowered to make arrangements for additional teaching in the Theological classes by Theological Professors from some of the other colleges or by others who may be willing to render this service.

It was further moved by Mr. D. M. Gordon, seconded by Mr. J. Pringle,—That the Assembly is of opinion that fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) may be required annually to meet the additional expense incurred in connection with the summer session, and appoints a committee to secure this amount by special contributions from congregations and individuals.

It was moved by Dr. Warden, seconded by Mr. D. G. Cameron,—That the Assembly lay the motion on the table.

Dr. Warden's motion was put to the Assembly and lost.

Mr. D. Stiles Fraser moved, seconded by Mr. D. J. MacDonald,—That Mr. Gordon's motion be amended by striking out all the words after "session" and inserting instead, "agrees that congregations and individuals be asked to increase their contributions to the ordinary fund of Manitoba College by that amount."

Mr. Gordon, with the consent of his seconder, asked leave to withdraw his motion

in favour of Mr. Fraser's amendment. This leave was granted and Mr. Fraser's amendment became the judgment of the House.

Mr. D. M. Gordon moved, seconded by Mr. J. Pringle, —That students attending the summer session shall labour in some of the mission fields of the Church during the winter, either preceding or following the summer session.

COMMITTEE ON RELATION OF COLLEGES TO THE CHURCH.

President Forrest, seconded by Dr. A. B. MacKay, moved as follows :---

That the General Assembly appoint a Committee to take into consideration the relations of all our Colleges to the Church, to consider the practice which prevailed in the various branches of the new united Church prior to union, regarding the appointment of Theological Professors, and to suggest some plan by which uniformity of practice shall be secured, and to report to next Assembly.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON APPLICATIONS OF STUDENTS.

The report of the Assembly's Committee on the Applications of Students was called for, given in and read by Mr. James Fleck, Convener. The report was received; its several recommendations were considered *seriatim*, and the following deliverances were arrived at:

- 1. In the case of Mr. Duncan Campbell, referred by the Presbytery of Halifax, the Committee recommended that the request of the Presbytery be granted, and that Mr. Campbell be licensed after taking one year in any of our Theological Colleges, and passing the required examinations.
- 2. In the case of Mr. Edward St. Germain, referred by the Presbytery of Montreal, the Committee recommend that the application be granted, and the Presbytery allowed to take Mr. St. Germain on trial for license.
- 3. In the case of Mr. David J. Graham, referred by the Presbytery of Ottawa, the Committee recommend that the application be not granted, but that Mr. Graham be given the status of a literary student of the second year, on condition of his passing an examination on the subjects of the first year to the satisfaction of the Presbytery.

4. In the case of Mr. Colin S. Scott, referred by the Presbytery of Ottawa, the Committee recommend that the application be not granted.

5. In the case of Mr. Daniel S. Scott, referred by the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew, the Committee recommend that the application be granted, and that a special course of study be prescribed under the direction of the Presbytery.

6. In the case of Mr. John B. Smith, referred by the Presbytery of Lindsay, the Committee recommend that the request be granted, provided Mr. Smith can satisfy the Presbytery as to his knowledge of Greek before entering on the special preparatory course.

7. In the case of Mr. Eshoo, referred by the Presbytery of Toronto, the Committee recommend that the application be granted.

8. In the case of Mr. David Allan Burgess, which does not come through any Presbytery, the Committee recommend that the application be not granted.

9. In the case of Mr. H. W. Porter, referred by the Presbytery of Barrie, the Committee recommend that the application be not granted.

10. In the case of Mr. William T. Hall, referred by the Presbytery of Saugcen, the Committee recommend that the application be granted on condition that Mr. Hall pass an examination, satisfactory to the Presbytery, upon the subjects of the third year of the preparatory course, before entering the Theological Hall.

11. In the case of Mr. E. Lawrence Hunt, referred by the Presbytery of Guelph, the Committee recommend that the petition be not granted.

12. In the case of Mr. William Graham, referred by the Presbytery of Orangevillo, the Committee recommend that the application be granted, on condition that Mr. Graham pass an examination on the work of the first year, satisfactory to the Senate of Knox College.

13. In the case of Mr. J. A. McConnell, referred by the Presbytery of Sarnia, the Committee recommend that the application be not granted, but that Mr. McConnell be

given the standing of a first-year student in Theology.

14. In the case of Mr. J. N Guthrie, referred by the Presbytery of Regina, the Committee recommend that the application be granted, on condition that he pass an examination satisfactory to the Senate of Manitoba College.

15. In the case of Mr. John Perine, referred by the Presbytery of Calgary, the Committee recommend that the application be granted, and that Mr. Perine be taken on trials

for license.

16. In the case of Mr. T. U. Richmond, referred by the Presbytery of Minnedosa, and by the Synod of Manitoba, the Committee recommend that the application be not granted, but that Mr. Richmond be required to take a two-years' course in Manitoba College, the Presbytery thereafter to report to the General Assembly.

17. In the case of Mr. James Patterson, referred by the Presbytery of Minnedosa, and by the Synod of Manitoba, it was resolved that the request of the Presbytery be granted.

18. In the case of Mr. J. R. MacKay, referred by the Presbytery of Columbia, the Committee recommend that the application be granted so far that Mr. MacKay be allowed to take the examinations on the work of the third year of the Theological course of Manitoba Collego, and that the Presbytery be permitted to license him, provided the examination be satisfactory.

19. In the case of Mr. Thomas G. McLeod, referred by the Presbytery of Columbia,

the Committee recommend that the application be granted.

The report, as thus amended, was adopted as a whole.

COMMITTEE ON RECEPTION OF MINISTERS-REPORT.

The Assembly next called for the report of the Committee to which were referred the applications of Presbyteries to receive ministers of other Churches as ministers of this Church. The report was presented and read by President Forrest, in the absence of Mr. Thomas Sedgwick, Convener. The report being received, its recommendations were considered in their order, and the following disposals of them were finally made:—

1. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of Wallace to receive the Rev. A. Gray, a

minister of the Presbyterian Church of the United States.

2. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of Montreal to receive the Rev. E. D. Pelletier, a minister of the Congregational Church of the United States.

3. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of Montreal to receive the Rev. James

McCaul, a minister of the Presbyterian Church of England.

4. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of Montreal to receive the Rev. Joseph McCracken, a minister of the Church of Scotland. The Committee would, however, note in this case that circular letters were not issued by the Presbytery.

5. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of Ottawa to receive the Rev. Andrew Millar, a minister of the Original Session Church of Scotland, on the production of his

Presbyterial certificate.

6. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of Toronto to receive the Rev. Alexander Miller, a minister of the Free Church of Scotland. The Committee would note in this case, as well, that circular letters were not issued by the Presbytery.

7. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of London to receive the Rev. Joseph Elliott, a minister of the Presbyterian Church of the United States.

8. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of Winnipeg to receive the Rev. J. W. Nelson, a minister of the Presbyterian Church of the United States.

9. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of Stratford to receive the Rev J. C. Graeb, a minister of the German Evangelical Association.

10. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of Columbia to receive the Rev. J. K. Smith, D.D., a minister of the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

11. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of Columbia to receive the Rev. B. K. McElmon, a minister of the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

12. That the application of the Presbytery of Barrie in behalf of the Rev. Joseph Brown, a minister of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, be not entertained.

13. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of London to withdraw the application in behalf of the Rev. Mr. Lowry, a minister of the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

The Committee would recommend that the action of the Presbytery of Montreal, irreceiving, as a minister of the Church, the Rev. James Fitzpatrick, a Minister of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces in connection with the Church of Scotland, be concurred in.

Finally, the Committee would recommend that the General Assembly again call the attention of the Presbyteries to the Act of Assembly regulating the admission of ministers from other Churches,—and particularly to Sections IV. and V. of that Act, and enjoin on them strict adherence to the same.

The report as thus amended was adopted as a whole.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet at halfpast two o'clock this afternoon, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction.

NINETEENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:

The Assembly met in terms of adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. John Thomson leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS-REPORT.

The report of the Committee on Statistics was presented by Dr. Torrance, Convener. In presenting the report, the Convener called attention to some leading points, the discrepancy between the Presbyterian population as reported by Presbyteries and the Dominion census—comparison with 1891—the increase of the Church in all respects. The report closed with the following recommendations:—

1. Your Committee would call attention to the neglect of many vacancies in not sending in their reports, and would renew its injunctions to Presbyteries to require these.

2. That Presbyteries be enjoined to call upon their clerks, or Committees on Statistics, when there are such, to report at some meeting, say in March, or as soon thereafter as practicable, the names of congregations and vacancies that have not reported.

3. That congregations be enjoined not to report in their statistical and financial returns to Presbyteries moneys that have not actually been remitted to the treasurers of the Church for the different schemes.

4. That Woman's Foreign Missionary, Young People's, and kindred societies, in connection with congregations, that have undertaken the collection of moneys for religious purposes, be requested to furnish the treasurer of the congregation, or to report at the annual meeting of the same, the amounts they have collected, so that the congregations may be credited with these, and that they may appear in the reports of their operations.

That local treasurers, or the agent of any scheme, who have collected subscriptions in different localities, be asked to report the amounts and objects to the treasurer of the congregation to which the subscribers belong, that they may be entered in their books, and included in the returns made to the Committee on Statistics.

6. That it be referred to the Committee to be appointed to consider and provide for inserting a column in the Statistical Report enquiring if Young People's, or other societies have been formed in congregations and stations as auxiliary to the Home Mission Committee, and another in the columns on Finance, for entering the amounts collected.

7. That sessions be required to procure from the superintendents of all the Sabbath schools and Bible classes in connection with congregations and stations the actual number of those enrolled in each, so that the returns may be complete.

Dr. MacVicar moved, seconded by Mr. R. Murray, and it was unanimously resolved,—
That the recommendations as a whole be adopted, and that thanks be tendered to the
Committee, and especially to the Convener, for their services during the year.

DISTRIBUTION OF PROBATIONERS.

The report of the Committee on the Distribution of Probationers was called for and given in by Dr. Torrance, Convener. The report gave a general summary of the work of the Committee at each of its quarterly meetings, followed by a table giving the names of reporting and non-reporting Presbyteries, and two appendices giving vacancies and settlements, and a list of probationers.

The report was received and adopted.

SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Dr. Robertson, Convener, gave in the report of the Special Committee to whom it was referred to consider and report on the Overture of the Presbytery of Columbia, praying for the erection of a Synod of British Columbia. It is as follows:—

1. That the Presbytery of Columbia unanimously desires the division of that Presbytery into three Presbyteries, with a view to the erection of a Synod.

2. That the Presbytery of Calgary unanimously desires separation from the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories and union with the Synod of British Columbia, should the Assembly erect such a Synod.

3. That the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories is favourable to the erection of the proposed Synod in that part of the country now under its control.

4. That there are no barriers in the way of securing the necessary legislation for sequiring and holding Church property in British Columbia, in consequence of a part of the North-West Territories being included in the Synod asked to be formed.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the prayer of the Overture of the Presbytery of Columbia be granted, and that the Presbytery of Columbia be divided into three Presbyteries to be named, known, constituted and bounded, as follows, that is to say:—

1st. The Presbytery of Kamloops,—the same to consist of the following congregations and missions, with their ministers and elders, and such other congregations and missions as may hereafter be organized or supplied within the bounds hereinafter specified, in accordance with the laws of the Church, viz.:—

ASSEMBLY MINUTES FOR CONGLEGATIONS.

With regard to the number of copies of the Minutes to be sent to congregations, it was moved by Dr. Mungo Fraser, seconded by Dr. Laing, and carried,—That three copies be sent by mail to each congregation; and that twenty-five cents (25c.) be charged for additional copies.

FINANCE COMMITTEE (EASTERN SECTION).

Dr. Reid also gave in the report of the Finance Committee (Eastern Section), in the absence of Mr. P. M. Morrison, agent for the Schemes (Eastern Section).

Dr. Reid moved the reception and adoption of the report. This was carried.

STATISTICAL TABLES-PROPOSED CHANGES.

The Special Committee, appointed at last meeting, to consider the question for a reduction in the volume of the Statistical Tables, and in the number of copies of the Minutes of Assembly distributed to Sessions, gave in their report, specifying certain changes which they proposed in the questions sent out to congregations and stations, and also the number of copies of the printed minutes to be given to Sessions.

The report was received, and the portion referring to changes in the statistical questions was referred to the Standing Committee on Statistics.

PRESBYTERY OF ALCOMA.

The Special Committee on the Presbycery of Algoma reported through Dr. Laing, Convener. The report was received, and its recommendations were considered *scriatim*. They are as follows:—

1. The Presbytery of Algoma shall extend eastward as far as Sturgeon Bay, on Lake Nipissing, included. The boundary on the south shall be the west shore of that lake and French River, Georgian Bay; thence across the bay westward on the southern shore of the Manitoulin and adjacent islands to the Sault Ste. Marie: thence in a north-westerly

direction along the shore of Lake Superior to the White River, following northward that river and the east shore of Lake Nepigon; the Presbytery will thus include the congregations of Sault Ste. Marie, Little Current, Thessalon, Sudbury, and the mission fields within the above specified territory.

2. The Presbytery shall be connected with the Synod of Toronto and Kingston.

3. The Presbytery shall hold its first meeting at Gore Bay, Manitoulin, on the third Wednesday (the 20th day) of July proximo; and the Rev. D. H. McLennan, M.A., Minister at Bruce Mines shall be Moderator to constitute the Presbytery.

4. The relation of Rev. A. Findlay, Superintendent of Missions, to the Prosbytery of

Algoma shall be the same as it has been to the Presbytery of Bruce.

On motion of Dr. Laing, the recommendations of the report, as a whole, were adopted.

OVERTURES in re EXTRA-MURAL SESSIONS, ETC.

There was given in and read an Overture from the Presbytery of London craving that the General Assembly rescind its action of last year, permitting students to be licensed and ordained after two years' study in Theology; and also to rescind or amend the law requiring ministers from other Churches to give a year in the mission field before being eligible for a call.

There was also presented and read a resolution of the Presbytery of Montreal recommending to the General Assembly that the resolution adopted at last meeting permitting an extra-mural session for students of the second year in the mission field be rescinded.

It was resolved to separate the two parts of the Overture and take the sense of the House on each separately.

It was moved by Dr. Laing, seconded by Dr. Proudfoot,—That the first part of the Overture asking for the omission of the regulation regarding extra-mural sessions be adopted.

To this it was moved in amendment by Dr. Forrest, seconded by Dr. Moore,—That the Overture of the Presbytery of London, and of the Synod of Hamilton and London, and the resolution of the Presbytery of Montreal, bearing on this subject, lie on the table till next Assembly.

The amendment was carried over the motion, and, the "yeas and nays" being called for, the Assembly by a majority voted "yea," and the amendment became the finding of the House.

The second part of the Overture, that relatir; to the reception of Ministers from other Churches, was then taken up.

Dr. Proudfoot moved the adoption of this portion of the Overture, seconded by Dr. Gregg.

To this it was moved in amendment by Dr. Forrest, seconded by Dr. Moore,—That this part of the Overture also lie on the table till next Assembly.

The amendment was carried over the motion, and, the "yeas and nays" being taken, became the judgment of the Assembly.

TEMPERANCE DELEGATION.

There appeared a delegation from the Dominion Alliance, consisting of John R. Dougall, President of the Quebec branch of the Alliance; John H. Carson, Secretary of the League; Dr. Bazin, and Mr. A. M. Featherston. The Assembly was addressed by Messrs. Dougall and Carson, speaking of the constitution of the Alliance which they represented, of the work it has been endeavouring to accomplish, and of their desire to secure the continued co-operation of the General Assembly in its aims and efforts.

WOMAN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION.

There was read a communication from the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, of Montreal, through Mrs. Walter Paul, President, calling the attention of the General Assembly to the good work which is being done by the branches of that Society all over the Dominion, and asking the countenance, sympathy and co-operation of the Assembly.

The Assembly received the letter, expressed sympathy with the aims and efforts of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and instructed the clerk to communicate to the Society the expression of the Assembly's gratification at the success of their endeavours to promote purity and self-restraint among the people of this continent.

THE "RECORD" AND "CHILDREN'S RECORD."

The report of the Committee on the Record and Children's Record was called for and given in by Dr. Robert Campbell, Montreal, in the absence of the Convener, Dr. Warden.

The report was received and the following motion was unanimously adopted :-

That the report be received and gratification expressed with the continued success of both the *Presbyterian Record* and the *Children's Record* under their new editor, the Rev. E. Scott.

The General Assembly, in order that the *Record* may the better fulfil its end in bringing and keeping before the Church our mission work at home and abroad, directs the executives of the several schemes to furnish to it full information regarding their work, and strongly urges upon all sessions to take steps with a view to having a copy of the *Record* placed in the hands of every family in their respective congregations.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet in this place at half-past seven o'clock in the evening, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction.

TWENTIETH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening:

The General Assembly met as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. James A. Grant, at the request of the Moderator, leading in prayer. The minutes of the afternoon Sederunt were read and sustained.

REPRESENTATIVES ON PRESBYTERIAN COUNCIL.

The Moderator having intimated that it had been ascertained that the Presbyterian Church in Canada is entitled to four additional representatives on the Presbyterian Council, to be held in Toronto in September next,—two ministers and two elders,—Mr. Thomas Sedgwick and Dr. Robertson, ministers, and Hon. David Laird and Mr. David Morrice, elders, were chosen.

CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING FUND.

The Assembly called for the report of the Committee on the Church and Manse Building Fund. The report was presented by Dr. Robertson, who gave details of the work accomplished during the year, referred to the assistance the Fund had received from various quarters, and made an appeal for half the legacy left by the late Mrs. Nichols for Home Missions in the North-West to be given to this scheme.

The following motion by Mr. D. J. Macdonnell, seconded by Mr. Walter Paul, was adopted:—

That the General Assembly receives the report, expresses gratification at the large number of churches and manses erected during the year, and records its appreciation of the valuable aid given to Home Missions in Western Canada through the Fund during the past ten years; thanks the anonymous donor who sent £300 through the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland, the young people of Glencoe and all who helped this work during the past year, and also the Government of British Columbia and the land and railway companies for their generous assistance; thanks the Board, and especially the Convener and Secretary, for their services, and commends the Fund anew to the members and adherents of the Church;—

Further, in view of the material assistance given to the Home Missions by this Fund and the demands made on the Fund at the present time, owing to the large immigration, that the Home Mission Committee be empowered and instructed to grant of the moneys at its disposal the sum of \$5,000 for the work of the Board.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUNDS.

The Assembly called for the reports of the several Committees on the Funds for the Widows and Orphans of deceased ministers.

Mr. Croil presented and read the report of the Board of Mar' gement of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland. The report was received.

Dr. Reid presented the report of the Committee on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund (Western Section). The report was received.

Dr. Reid also presented the report of the Commit*... the Widows' and Orphans' Fund (Eastern Section), in the absence of the Convener. The report was received.

On motion, these several reports were adopted.

MEMORIALS ON BEHALF OF WIDOWS,

For Mrs. McLelland.—Dr. Reid read a letter from the Presbytery of Orangeville, appealing on behalf of the widow of the late Rev. T. J. McLelland, and asking that her name be placed on the list of annuitants. The Assembly declined the request.

For Mrs. McKay.—An appeal was also made on behalf of the widow of the late Mr. John McKay, missionary at Mistawasis Reserve, by the Presbytery of Regina, on the understanding that the Foreign Mission Committee should pay up any arrears to the fund due by the late Mr. McKay.

On motion of Mr. R. Hamilton, seconded by Dr. McLaren, the application was referred to the favourable consideration of the Committee.

LETTER FROM DAUGHTERS OF LATE J. BOWMAN.

A letter was read from three daughters of the late Mr. J. Bowman, the residue of whose estate was left to the Presbyterian Church in Canada, praying that a part of the estate be granted to them.

On motion, the letter was referred to the Committee on the Protection of Church Property, with power to dispose of it.

The report of the Committee on Church Architecture was called for, given in and read by Mr. James Cumberland, Convener. The report was received and the following motion was adopted:—

REMIT ON CATECHISTS.

The Assembly's Committee on Remits report the returns from Presbyteries on the Remit regarding special instruction to Catechists, that of the 46 Presbyteries of the Church, 26 made returns. Of these 14 Presbyteries disapproved of the Remit, 9 approved simpliciter, and 3 approved conditionally.

Dr. Laing moved that the report be received and laid on the table. This was agreed to.

REMIT ON DISTRIBUTION OF PROBATIONERS.

The Committee on Remits report also on the Returns to the Remit on the Distribution of Probationers. Of twenty-one Presbyteries reporting—three from the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, and eighteen from the Eastern Presbyteries—only nine are in favour of the L.terim Act simpliciter—the others either disapproving of it or favouring the scheme proposed by the Home Mission Committee.

On motion of Mr. R. Murray, the following resolution was passed:—That the report on the Remit be laid on the table, and that the Interim Act be continued in operation for another year.

OVERTURES in re DIVISION OF WINNIPED PRESBYTERY.

There were taken up and read Overtures from the Kirk-Sessions of Rat Portage, Port Arthur and Fort William, asking the Assembly to sanction a division of the Presbytery of Winnipeg, in the interests of that section of the Church in which these congregations are situated.

It was resolved, on motion of Dr. Laing,—That the matter of the division of the Presbytery of Winnipeg be referred to the Presbytery for consideration, and if approved, to be sent by them, through the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, to next Assembly.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

The Overtures relating to Young People's Societies from the Presbyteries of Maitland, Lindsay and Whitby, given in at a previous Sederunt, were taken up and read.

It was moved by Dr. McLaren, seconded by Dr. A. B. McKay, and carried:—Receive the Overtures, and in view of the desirableness of having the young people of our Church organized under sanction of the General Assembly, for the culture of their spiritual life, the training of them for Christian work, and the unifying of their efforts in extending the work of Christ's kingdom, the Assembly appoints a Committee to consider how these ends may best be attained, and report to next Assembly. The following Committee for this purpose was appointed, on motion of Mr. R. Johnston:—Dr. Wardrope, Dr. Parsons, Mr. J. Somerville, Mr. J. A. R. Dickson, Mr. R. D. Fraser, Dr. A. B. MacKay, Mr. John MacGillivray, Mr. D. G. Hanna, Dr. Duval, Mr. R. Johnston, Ministors; and Messrs. W. Paul, R. Kilgour, J. S. Smith (Smith's Falls), Dr. McDonald and W. M. Clark, Elders.

DEPUTATION TO MIRA-REPORT.

A report from the deputation appointed by last Assembly to meet with the Presbytery of Sydney and the congregation of Mira, to try and secure the implementing of the obligations laid on the congregation of Mira to Rev. Dr. MacLood by the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, reported, through Mr. R. Murray, that they had discharged the duty laid upon them by the Assembly, and the result has been the payment of part of the arrears.

It was moved and agreed to,—That the report of the deputation to the congregation of Mira be received and their action approved. That the deputation be re-appointed to continue their work with a view to bringing it to a satisfactory conclusion. Further, that the General Assembly express deep sympathy with the Rev. Dr. MacLeod, now the oldest minister in the Church, in his continued suffering from ill-health, and especially in the recent bereavement which has befallen him in the loss of his wife.

STUDENTS' BALARIES.

With regard to the salaries to be paid to students in theology of the second year, accepting appointments as missionaries, Dr. Robertson moved, seconded by Dr. Bryce,—That the salary of students of the second year in theology, who have accepted or will accept appointments as missionaries for one or more years, under the legislation of the last General Assembly in the case of such students, be at the same rate as that of other ordained missionaries.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, on motion, the Assembly resolved to continue the Sederunt until all the urgent business on the docket is disposed of.

MR. M'GREGOR'S UASE.

As regards the case of Mr. McGregor, brought under the notice of the Assembly, Dr. Moore moved, seconded by Principal King,—That, notwithstanding the rule now enacted, the Home Mission Committee be instructed to pay the sum due to Mr. McGregor, under the arrangement made with him by Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of Missions. The motion was carried.

FREE CHURCH JUBILEE.

There were taken up and read communications from the Free Church of Scotland, and from Crescent Street Church, Montreal, calling attention to the fact that the jubilee of the organization of the Free Church of Scotland wi. take place next May. These communications were received, and it was moved by Dr. Torrance, seconded by Mr. J. A. Turnbull, and carried—That Rev. Dr. MacKay, of Crescent Street Church, Montreal, Rev. Alexander Farquharson, of Sydney, Rev. John Crombie, M.A., of Smith's Falls, and Rev. James Middlemiss, D.D., of Elora, be the representatives of this Assembly to the Free Church of Scotland at their jubilee meeting in Edinburgh in May next, to convey to them the salutations of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

REFORMED CHURCH IN AMERICA.

A fraternal letter of greeting from the Reformed Church in America was taken up and read.

It was agreed that the Moderator and Clerks prepare and forward a suitable enswer to this letter.

EVANGELICAL CHURCH OF ITALY.

There was also read a letter from the General Assembly of the Evangelical Church of Italy, addressed to Dr. A. B. MacKay, of this city, to be communicated to the General Assembly, inviting a delegation from this Church, and craving the sympathy of our people with the work of the Church in Italy, and such co-operation as it may be in their power to render.

It was moved, seconded and carried,—That Dr. MacKay be requested to answer this letter in name of the General Assembly, assuring the Evangelical Church of Italy of our esteem and of our interest in its work, and of our hope that before long we shall be able to send a delegate to its Assembly; also of our desire that any of our people should practically show their sympathy with the Evangelical Church of Italy as they have opportunity.

PRESBYTERY OF VICTORIA AND RICHMOND-CHANGE OF NAME.

There was taken up and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Victoria and Richmond asking leave of the Assembly to change its name to that of "Inverness." On motion, duly seconded, the Assembly agreed to grant the prayer of the Overture.

PRESBYTERY OF MINNEDOSA-OVERTURE.

There was taken up and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Minnedosa anent the failures of missionaries to fulfil appointments regularly made and accepted. It was agreed to hand over the Overture to be considered and dealt with by the Home Mission Committee (Western Section).

SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES-REQUEST.

There was taken up and read a Request from the Synod of Manitoba and North-West Territories, asking the Assembly to condone the delay in holding a meeting of the Synod on account of the late arrival of the members, hindering the formation of a quorum at the hour appointed. The request was complied with.

CONSENSUS CREED.

The report of the Committee on a Consensus Creed, appointed by last Assembly, was called for. The Moderator, as Convener, reported progress. The report was received, and the Committee was re-appointed.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, MONTREAL

An abstract of the report of the Woman's Missionary Society of Montreal, transmitted by the Presbytery of Montreal, was presented and read.

The Assembly received the report, heard with gratification the statements contained therein, and recorded its sympathy with the aims and efforts of the Society.

PRISON REFORM.

A communication was received from the Prison Reform Association of Ontario. Owing to the pressure of business on the Assembly at this late period of the session, the Assembly regrets its inability to give time to the consideration of the matter, and instructs the Clerk to communicate with the Association to this effect. The Committee of the Assembly, in charge of this matter, was re-appointed.

MORAL LEGISLATION.

The same action was taken in the matter of Moral Legislation, brought under the notice of the Assembly by Mr. D. A. Watt.

CASE OF REV. JAMES BURGESS.

A communication was received from Dr. MacRae, clerk of the Presbytery of St. John, dr. ag attention to an irregularity in the procedure at the ordination of the Rev. James Bur, is, and asking the sanction of the Assembly to the same. The Assembly agreed to a sain the action of the Presbytery of St. John in the premises.

FEMALE MISSIONARIES-OVERTURE REGARDING.

There was taken up and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew, which had been transmitted by the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa with its approval, anent steps proper to be taken for the designation of female missionaries. On motion of Dr. McLaren, duly seconded, it was agreed to lay the Overture on the table till next Assembly.

THE BIBLE IN SCHOOLS.

For lack of time the Assembly was unable to take into consideration a resolution of the Sabbath School Association of Ontario, relating to the use of the Bible in schools; and the Clerk was instructed to notify the Association of the fact.

STATED COLLECTIONS.

The Assembly ordered that the stated collections for the schemes of the Church in congregations in which there are no Missionary Associations, be made as follows:—

- 1. French Evangelization, on the fourth Sabbath of July.
- 2. Home Missions, on the fourth Sabbath of August.
- 3. Colleges, on the third Sabbath of September.
- 4. Widows' and Orphans' Fund, on the third Sabbath of October.
- 5. Assembly Fund, on the third Sabbath of November.
- 6. Manitoba College, on the third Sabbath of December.
- 7. Augmentation Fund, on the third Sabbath of January, 1893.
- 8. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, on the third Sabbath of February, 1893.
- 9. Foreign Missions, on the third Sabbath of March, 1893.

Ordered, also, that all congregations and Missions Stations be enjoined to contribute to the schemes of the Church.

Further, that contributions be sent to the treasurer of the Church as soon as possible after the collections are made.

THANKS.

On motion of Dr. Torrance, seconded by Dr. Campbell, the following resolutions of thanks were unanimously adopte l, namely :—

That the thanks of the Asserably are due, and are hereby tendered,

- 1. To the different Railway and Steamboat Companies for reduction of fare to commissioners of Assembly.
- 2. To Sir William Dawson, Principal, and the governors of McGill University, for courtesies extended to the members of the Court.
 - 3. To the press for reports of proceedings.
- 4. To the pastor, session and deacons of Crescent Street Church, for the use of their commodious edifice and its extensive suite of rooms.
- 5. To the Committee in charge of the entertainment of members, and especially to the Convener, Dr. Scrimger, for their labours and courteous attention to the comfort of the members.
- 6. And to the citizens of Montreal for their generous hospitality extended to the members of Assembly and others attending the sessions of this Court.

CLOSE.

The business being finished, the Moderator addressed the Assembly, and, at his request, Dr. Reid offered prayer. The Moderator then gave out for praise Psalm one hundred and twenty-second, verses six to nine inclusive, which having been sung, he said:—

In the name of the Lord Josus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church, and by the authority of this Assembly, I now dissolve this General Assembly, and appoint and order another General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada to meet in the City of Brantford, and within Zion Church there, on the second Wednesday in June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening. The Moderator then closed the session with the Apostolic benediction.

APPENDIX No. 1.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA (WESTERN SECTION) FOR 1891-92.

The Home Mission Committee in presenting their report to the General Assembly express their gratitude to God for the continued success that attends this important department of work. Year after year the number of Mission Fields and Augmented Congregations, especially in the more distant Provinces and Territories, are increasing with a rapidity that must tax the liberality and energies of the church for many years to come. The hope of the Committee is, that as the ability of the older provinces to give, is gradually lessened by constant emigration of Presbyterian families, these newer Provinces and Territories, as they become more thickly settled, will be able to make much larger contributions to the funds.

The Home Mission Fund ends the year with a balance of \$12,800. This is due not so much to the regular contributions of congregations, but to the handsome bequest of the late Mrs. Nichols, of Peterborough, amounting in all to \$20,000; \$12,000 of which was put to the credit of the Home Mission Fund, and \$8,000 to that of Augmentatic n. The Augmentation Fund, with the help of this bequest and the special effort put forth by members of the Committee, has also a balance to its credit of \$2,500. But for this bequest and the special effort made to pay all the Augmentation claims in full, there would have been a deficit of about \$10,000.

In the Report now submitted, in addition to the regular contributions for Home Missions, there are presented the amounts expended by congregations in certain Presbyteries during the year, for mission work in towns and cities. It is possible the list is incomplete, but, in so far as given, they have been reported.

The arrangement of the Report is the same as last year. The two branches of our work—Home Missions and Augmentation—have been kept distinct, in the hope that this will facilitate reference to the work done by the Presbyteries in each department, instead of having them reported together. The Report contains particulars more or less copious of the progress of Home Missions and Augmentation in the different Provinces and Presbyteries, reports of the Students' Missionary Societies, the Lumbermen's Mission, and other matters of interest that have engaged the attention of the Committee during the year. The appendix presents complete and carefully-prepared statistics of all the Mission Stations and Augmented Congregations under the care of the Committee, with the manes of the missionaries, probationers and student catechists now employed.

HOME MISSIONS.

REPORTS FROM PRESBYTERIES.

PRESBYTERY OF QUEBEC.

Substantial progress has been made during the past year, notwithstanding the many discouragements met with in this Presbytery. Although our families still continue to move westward, those remaining exercise great self-denial in many cases, to have Protestant ordinances continued in their midst. It should be borne in mind that in many localities ours is the only Protestant church—the whole surroundings being Roman Catholic and French.

Metis.—The Rev. Adam Robertson was appointed ordained missionary a year ago; he is doing capital work. Through his efforts the church is now entirely free of debt.

Valcartier and Stoneham.—About fifteen miles from Quebec. Mr. Ashe, divinity student, attending Morrin College, has charge here, and sermons have been regularly conducted all winter. Families poor and widely scattered.

Kennebec Road.—The Rev. Mr. McDonald continues to labour faithfully amongst an isolated people, surrounded entirely by French, and no other Protestant services.

Lake Megantic Village.—An interesting village on the short line C. P. R., between Sherbrooke and St. John, N.B. Has had occasional supply during the winter. Student for the summer. New church now paid for.

Portneuf.—A small cluster of Protestant (Presbyterian) families, about thirty miles from Quebec on the C. P. R., between Quebec and Montreal, anxious for the Gospel. Supplied regularly all winter by Morrin College students.

Massawippi, Richby, Sawyerville, etc.—This group is located in the eastern townships. Our people are more than holding their own, particularly at Sawyerville, where we are increasing in numbers and spiritual life. New church built at Sawyerville dedicated recently, almost free from debt. Our missionary, Mr. Craig, has just accepted a call to Windsor Mills. The field will be occupied for the summer by two students, and we hope to secure a suitable ordained missionary in the fall of the year.

New Rockland.—A new mission about ten miles from Richmond. A mining and slate quarry region. All the families are Welsh, and the missionary preaches in the Welsh language. Services much appreciated; people generous and hearty. A reduction of \$2 per Sabbath is made in the grant this year.

Chicoutimi.—A town at the head of the Saguenay River, about 175 miles below Quebec. Services held for some time by students from Morrin. Taken over by the Presbytery last November. Ours is the only Protestant church for over a hundred miles around. Mission undertaken by Presbytery after much pleading on the part of an isolated people. Our missionary, Mr. Ferguson, reports hopefully. Services eagerly attended.

Each mission in Quebec Presbytery is a light in the midst of much darkness. Our people are devoutly grateful to the wealthier members of the church for giving of their means to supply them with Gospel ordinances.

PRESBYTERY OF MONTREAL.

Regular supply has been given to all the mission fields within the bounds during the whole year; the services in two of the fields being only fortnightly during the winter months.

In the Ogdensburg group a new church building has been erected on a site central to the people of two of the stations, the families of both of which now worship there, thus reducing the labour of the missionary. This church was completed and opened in January last, free from debt. The lack of a missionary able to preach in Gaelic is felt in the Arundel and De Salaberry field, as some of the people in the Lost River section do not understand English well. The services, however, of Mr. R. Thomson, the present missionary, seem to be appreciated by the people generally.

In Old Harrington, part of the Avoca field, a new church is in course of erection. The debt on the Farnham property has been reduced by \$1,000 during the year, leaving only some \$200 or \$300 now due. The Presbytery are encouraging the people to erect a Manse in the town, believing that this will tend to the furtherance of the work there.

In connection with $Trout\ River\ Live$ there is a prospect of a new station being formed this season, which will probably make the field self-supporting.

A number of preaching stations have recently been opened in the suburbs of Montreal, and the city congregations have agreed to make grants in aid of the working of these for the ensuing year. At Montreal Junction the contract for a church building has been let, which, it is expected, will be opened free from debt during the summer. At Cote St. Louis, where services were begun in May of last year, the work has been most encouraging; the building used for service being filled to overflowing. Lots have been secured in the neighbourhood, and it is hoped that a suitable church building will be erected at an early date. At St. Lambert a most desirable site has been purchased, and the city is at present being canvassed for contributions on behalf of a church, which it is intended will be at once pushed forward so as to be ready for occupation during the summer. The prospect here is most hopeful, and the probability is that ere long to will have a vigorous self-supporting congregation in this growing district.

At Longueil West, Mr. Andrew Hardie has gratuitously deeded to the Presbytery a large and suitable site on which, it is hoped, a church building may soon be erected. There is here, and especially in the adjoining district, Montreal South, a considerable English-speaking population, which is increasing in numbers, and many of whom are Presbyterians. At Mount Royal Vale, and at Petite Cote, services are regularly maintained by the Presbytery, and there is a prospect of ground being broken during the ensuing year at Montreal Annex, a new suburb, where a number of houses are in course of erection. In addition to these the Crescent Street congregation maintains its mission at Nazareth Street; Erskine Church at Maisonneuve, where a new church building was opened last fall, and St. Paul's Church at Forfar Street. The last named has recently been formally organized, and has made marked progress during the year. It was worked by a student missionary, under the supervision of the Session of St. Matthew's Church. This session also maintains a Sabbath school at St. Gabriel village, as does the Session of Calvin Church at St. Henri.

Recently about thirty families, formerly worshipping in the American Presbyterian Chapel on Inspector Street, applied to be received into the Presbytery and organized into a mission station. They have secured a site for a church building on Atwater Avenue, and have been duly organized.

PRESBYTERY OF GLENGARRY.

The station at East Lancaster has been regularly supplied during the whole year, and as an evidence of increasing presperity they have asked a reduced grant for the current year.

PRESBYTERY OF OTTAWA.

The number of mission fields in this Presbytery is now fifteen; Hintinbury, a suburb of the city of Ottawa having been added during the year. Some years ago a let was secured at this point, and a neat and commodious building erected in which a growing Sunday school has been maintained, and a Sabbath evening and week evening service held by young men from the city churches, and by the ministers, until this spring, when a student was secured for the summer months. The prospect of growth is very encouraging. The other fields were regularly supplied last summer. The winter months are the most trying, as it is impossible to seeme acceptable men as ordained missionaries to occupy the fields. The fields on the lines of railway and at convenient distance from Montreal were, through the kindness of the students of the college there, regularly supplied; but those at a distance obtained only occasional service. For one of these fields, however. Onslow and Eardley, the Presbytery have secured the Rev. H. T. Kalem, and it is hoped that during his appointment of two years the field may develop into a congregation of considerable strength. Some re-arrangements have been made which, it is hoped, will add to the efficiency of the service and the promotion of the growth of some of the fields.

PRESBYTERY OF LANARK AND RENFREW,

Considerable changes have been effected in the mission fields of this Presbytery since the date of last report, principal among which are the following:—

Mattawa has had annexed to it the Eau Claire stations of the Upper Ottawa Mission, and the congregation thus formed has been transferred to the Augmented List.

The Darling mission has been divided, part being attached to Middleville and part to Dalhousie, which two stations formerly constituted a settled charge. This re-arrangement will result in two settled charges, and be of exceeding benefit to the stations in Darling township, which have never had winter supply.

With some aid from Presbytery a new and commodious church has been erceted in a central position in the township of Alice, as a result of which two if not three preaching stations will be thrown into one, and the work greatly consolidated.

Eganville has been transferred from the Augmented to the Home Mission List temporarily.

PRESENTERY OF BROCKVILLE,

Our mission stations are only two in number, directly connected in aid-receiving fields; the others are either self-supporting or have been transferred to Augmentation List.

The two as yet in receipt of grants are: (1) Burritt's Rapids, which is a young but promising field, and is under continuous service almost the whole year. (2) Morton and Serley's Bay, which is filled by an ordained missionary, who is doing good service in that vicinity, and keeping our cause together. More seems to be impossible.

North Williamsburg and W. Springs have been removed to Augmentation List, and are about to call a graduate of one of our colleges. In the first year they will require grants from Augmentation of \$150 per annum.

Stone's Corners and North Augusta are still continued as a mission field, without grants, under the expectation that they will be able to proceed to regular settlement soon.

Besides regular contributions to Home Mission Fund, St. John's Church, Brockville, furnishes \$4 per Sabbath towards the support of a missionary in Manitoba.

PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON.

The mission fields have been supplied regularly during last summer. Winter services were conducted as follows:—At Roslin and Thurlow, Tweed, Portsmouth, Fredericksburgh and Bath, Sharbot Lake, Consecon, etc., every Sabbach; in North Hastings fields (4), during Christmas holidays, and at Demorestville nearly every Sabbath, by members of Missionary Association of Queen's College. Kev. Jas. McIlroy continues at Poland, etc., and Rev. Geo. R. Lang, B.A., at Wolfe Island, as ordained missionaries.

In Tweed, organized about eighteen months ago, a neat church edifice has been erected and opened under most favourable auspices.

Subscription sheets were sent to every aid-receiving mission field. Six of these have been returned with amounts subscribed by the people. The others are expected at an early date.

From reports of the students, endorsed by delegates who visited the fields, good work has been done during the year; and, in most instances, substantial progress has been made.

Picton is transferred to the list of mission fields, and Mr. D. McPhail, a member of the graduating class in Theology at Queen's College, has, at the people's request, been appointed to take charge for one year, as ordained missionary, his appointment to date from ordination. The stipend promised is \$650 per annum, without expense to the Home Mission Fund.

Pine Street mission, Kingston, inaugurated and carried out by Queen's Missionary Association, requests the services of an ordained missionary and promises a stipend of \$900 per annum, to be made up as follows:—From families connected with the mission, \$300; from Queen's Missionary Association, \$300; and from members of the Kingston congregation, \$300. By request, Mr. Boyd, of the graduating class in Theology, who has been intimately connected with the mission from the beginning, will take charge as ordained missionary in due course.

PRESENTERY OF PETERBOROUGH.

All our mission stations were supplied during the summer months, and our mission-aries report a fair measure of success. The membership in the Chandos and Burleigh field is large, and in Clydesidale—one of its stations—a Sabbath school and prayer meeting are maintained throughout the year. A regular service during the winter months is all that seems to be needful in order to build up a strong mission church. From Harvey the student missionary reports that the people take a deep interest in his work, and in every way have sought to encourage and strengthen him. Here also a winter service seems to be indispensable to permanent success.

The Minden and Holiburton field has four stations, so that supply can only be given to two of them, on each alternate Sabbath. There has been a winter as well as a summer supply for the past year. A neat and comfortable church building, erected last summer at Brown's Station, has been completed and occupied. The great desire of the people is to obtain the services of an ordained missionary. As the result of regular services during the past year, an addition of ten members, by profession of faith, was made to the communion roll.

PRESBYTERY OF LINDSAY,

The Home Mission work of this Presbytery has been pushed as zealously as on former years, but the returns are not so encouraging.

Three of our congregations have been vacant for a whole year, two others for a part of the year; another has been passing through a figure another has been passing through a figure and the year.

PRESBYTERY OF TORONTO.

Work was carried on in all the fields outside of Toronto, with progress reported in each ease. *Malton, Dixie* and *Port Credit* have been removed from our list of mission stations, and now form a congregation almost self-sustaining. An early settlement is hoped for.

Within the city, mission work has been well maintained, though we do not report any new field this year.

PRESBYTERY OF ORANGEVILLE.

The only mission field in this Presbytery is *Corbetton*. It receives no aid from the Home Mission Fund. Three mission fields have become augmented charges.

PRESBYTERY OF BARRIE.

The work has been carried on vigorously during the past year. Forty-three groups of stations were supplied last summer, and twenty-six during the winter, and progress has been made. The following have become pastoral charges, and are removed from the list of mission stations:—

- 1. Parry Sound .- Rev. J. B. Duncan, inducted on August 11.
- 2. Sudbury.—Rev. S. Rondeau, M.A., inducted August 26.
- 3. Sundridge.—Vacant and desirous to call.

Several changes have occurred respecting the ordained missionaries in the field. The Rev. John Garrioch was removed from Powassen in October to Airlie, Banda and Blackbank. Rev. R. J. Adamson, M.A., who laboured in the last named stations last summer, was appointed to Allandale for the past six months. Rev. D. M. Jamieson was obliged by ill health to resign his labours in Magnetawan. Rev. R. J. Sturgeon left Waubaushene, etc., on March 31, his two years' term of appointment having expired. The Rev. Mark Turnbull was removed in October from Medonte to Severn Bridge and St. Paul's, Morrison, and left in February under an appointment to the North-West. Owing to rearrangement of the district in which Rev. Henry Knox laboured, he is for a time at least without engagement in this Presbytery, there being no suitable field for him. It is with much regret to the Presbytery that Mr. Knox is not still in the bounds as a fellow-labourer. He came about ten years ago as a Catechist, supported by the late Mr. McCrae, of Guelph, and gained the confidence and esteem of the brethren to such a degree that leave was sought from the General Assembly, and obtained, to ordain him, He has been successful in the various fields of labour occupied by him, and is regarded by the brethren as a conscientious servant of the Master.

The rearrangement referred to is that of the congregations of Hillsdale and Elmvale, the pastoral charge of the Rev. George Craw for many years, and of a number of mission stations in their neighbourhood lying to the north of Barrie. Hillsdale and Elmvale have been disjoined. To Hillsdale, Craighurst, formerly one of the Minesing group, has been united, so as to form a self-supporting charge. To Elmvale, Knox Church, Flos, formerly connected with Wyevale and Gibson's, has been united, also a self-sustaining

Wyevale and Gibson have been united to a new station, Van Vluck, near the mouth of the Nottawasaga River, a resort of summer visitors, some of whom have expressed the desire that there should be the services of our Church. These changes leave Minesing and Midhurst somewhat weakened, but it is believed that they were necessary for the growth of the Church in that region.

In the numerous reports from the stations there are few references of interest for these notes. An ordained missionary gives the following impression of work in Muskoka:—"My field is like many others of these new mission churches, neither better nor worse, hard to work because fine workers are few. Then there are all the difficulties and drawbacks which life in this new and rugged country interposes. People are poor, hard-wrought, and many churches or denominations. Still, the interest is increasing, and the work is gaining ground. Comfortable tokens of the presence and power of the Holy Spirit are enjoyed, and the devoted missionary has the joy of the promise, 'Your labours are not in vain in the Lord,' and of seeing some fruit gathered to the glory and praise of the Lord."

The student missionary in the new field, Shebeshkong and Carling, was appreciated by the people, and he thus appreciates his field: "In this field there is a great room for work, especially at Shebeshkong station, because there are no services held there by any denomination except ours." Another student was differently situated in a village on the C.P.R. He writes, "This station has been abundantly supplied with services, there being Methodist and Episcopal services every Sabbath, in addition to our own, for less than thirty families all told."

At Cooper's Falls a new church was erected and opened with a debt of only \$50. A donation of that amount was made to the station by Mrs. John Thompson, of Longford.

Monkman's, in township of Tecumsch.—This was reported last year as a new station. It was organized on April 13, by Rev. J. McD. Duncan, B.A., with a membership of thirteen communicants. Mr. R. H. Glover, the missionary, reported at the close of his summer services: "The number of families has steadily increased, and there has been a steady continual growth in numbers and interest." He gives the number of families as thirty and of communicants as thirty-nine, nine of whom were received on profession of faith.

Allandale, under the care of the Session of Barrie, has done well, and has required but a small part of the grant in aid which was asked for.

Collingwood Mountain and Gibraltar.——These stations have long laboured under the disadvantage of having no winter supply, and that not merely because of scarcity of supply, but of the alleged difficulty of travelling between the churches because of the roads being blocked by snow. They manifested a desire to have supply this winter, and accordingly they had the services of ordained ministers for fifteen Sabbaths from October to January. They are desirous to become a settled pastoral charge, and have promised a stipend of \$500. Could this be accomplished a long-cherished desire of the Presbytery would be attained.

PRESBYTERY OF OWEN SOUND.

New churches have been built at Pike Bay, in the Indian Peninsula, and at Holland Centre, the former costing about \$450 and the latter \$600. These sums do not include the work freely given by members of the congregations. By using the services of young men preparing to enter on their study for the ministry supply has been given during the winter more than in years past. We have secured an ordained missionary for Lion Head and appointed him Episcopus of the district; also one for Johnston and connected stations.

We have a committee appointed to co-operate with a similar committee of the Methodist Church to define more clearly denominational bounds, from which we expect good results.

PRESBYTERY OF SAUGEEN.

This Presbytery has two missions and one augmented charge.

1. Balaklava, Ayton and Normanby.—These stations have been supplied during the year by a student. Balaklava congregation built last year a new church in the village of Mildmay at a cost of \$2,000.

2. Cotswold.—This field has been supplied every Sabbath afternoon by the Rev. M. C. Cameron, Harriston. An effort was put forth to unite the aforesaid with Rothsay in the Goelph Presbytery, but so far, with no good results.

PRESPYTERY OF HAM'LTON.

By the separation of Ancaster and Albertia the form—has been reduced to a mission station, and is supplied for the summer by a sevelent.

Hagerstille has made progress, and is in the part in charge of an ordained missionary for at least a year, in the hope that sufficient progress has be made to warrant a settlement.

Fort Eric and Victoria is a trying, and in many vays a disappointing, field, owing chiefly to the fluctuating character of the population. Being a railroad centre, changes are frequent. The Victoria people hope to build a church this year, which will give greater solidity to the work.

PRESBYTERY OF PARIS.

By the removal of Onondaga from the Home Mission list to the Augmented, by its union with Alberton, there remain now only three Mission Stations under the care of the Presbytery:—Balfour Street, West Brantford, under the care of Zion Church, and St. Andrew's Mission, also under the care of Zion Church, both wrought without expense to the Committee; and New Dundee, which is supplied during the present summer by the Knox College Student Society.

PRESBYTERY OF LONDON.

There is but one Mission Station just now within the bounds of this Presbytery. A poor and long neglected district in the north of Ekfrid Township has been taken up by the neighbouring ministers—Messrs. Henderson, Simpson, Stewart and Currie—and by their efforts a fortnightly service has been given them through the winter. The attendance ranges up to about 70. It is believed that the continuous labours of the student or missionary in this district would be the means of gathering a congregation. It is felt to be a great shame that Mormon proselytizers should find ways and means to creep into a place like this given over to poverty and ignorance. The committee has not seen its way clear to help.

PRESBYTERY OF CHATHAM.

Mission Field.

There is no material change in our mission field. Colchester group had service in the past winter, and paid \$112 for the same. Buxton group has been erected into a vacant charge, with promise of \$750 and manse. Blytheswood group have had the services of an ordained missionary during the past winter. Renoud Lure paid \$100 to reduce the debt of the Church built.

PRESBYTERY OF SARNIA.

There is but little to report regarding the mission fields of this Presbytery. The number is the same as last year—three.

' In the Inwood field our cause is making steady progress. It is expected that this field will in a short time be a self-sustaining congregation.

The work in the Sombra field has for many years been rather discouraging, but better success is hoped for in the future, as some of the difficulties in the working of this field have been recently removed.

The Marthaville field is made up of one station, with no change to report for the past year.

PRESBYTERY OF HURON,

There is really no mission station in this Presbytery. In the meantime Leeburn and Union Church, Goderich township, both of which were formerly connected with the Goderich charge, are being wrought as a mission station. They receive constant supply and meet all expenses themselves.

PRESBYTERY OF BRUCE.

Our Home Mission interests in the district of Algoma have made encouraging progress during last year. The following fields have been fully occupied:—Sault Ste. Marie, Tarbutt, St. Joseph Island, Bruce Mines, Burpee, Gore Bay, Little Current, Kagawong, Blind River, Spanish Mills, Webbwood and Manitowaning. Nearly all of these places have outlying preaching stations where services are regularly kept up.

The Presbytery regrets to say that it has not been able to send missionaries during the winter months, to Day Mills, Providence Bay, Cockburn Island and Thessalon. With regard to the last named congregation, we feel very keenly that we were not able to send such supply as would be suited to their condition. It was reported to us that they were ready to call a pastor. To furth, cheir wishes the Presbytery appointed an ordained man to go for a limited time, but he declined. After some delay, and considerable correspondence, another ordained was found, who signified his willingness to go, but "La Grippe" interfered and he could not go. In this way this very important congregation was all winter without the services and care of a missionary of our Church.

Gore Bay deserves special notice. Less than a year ago it had a membership of 66, now it has 161, and our missionary says, he is confident that by the middle of June next the membership will run up to 200. Its financial condition is equally encouraging. Several church buildings have been erected and completed this year. Nearly all the fields have contributed handsomely to the general Schemes of the Church.

MUSKOKA AND ALGOMA.

(Report of Rev. A. Findlay.)

The half year just closed, 'like those which have preceded it, has been marked by incidents calling forth expressions of gratitude to the great King and Head of the Church. At the beginning of the term want of suitable supply for many of the fields was severely felt; but this was, in a measure, overcome in due time. We began with nine missionaries for twenty-five fields that were anxious for supply in Muskoka, and the same number of missionaries for sixteen fields in Algoma. We were able, however, to supplement this number by one man in Algoma and four in Muskoka before the middle of the term was reached. By doubling up the fields and giving to some of the men two, and in some cases parts of three, fields, we were able to cover the ground partially, if not satisfactorily.

North Bay and Sundridge, recently placed on the list of vacant congregations, are as yet without settled pastors, but look forward hopefully that in the near future they will enjoy the services of the man of their choice. We have been able to supply them fully during these months.

Rosseau takes a step forward and asks for the appointment of an ordained missionary. They promise at the rate of \$450 per annum, with an increase after the first year. This is an important point as a resort for tourists during the summer season; and as the Colonization Railway to Parry Sound will pass through the northern end of this field, important charges may be expected in the near future. It is of the utmost importance that this field receive every encouragement to move forward. It has long been under the fostering care of the Home Mission Committee. We hope soon to see it a settled charge.

During the year Maganatewan and Severn Bridge each lost the services of their ordained missionary. Mr. D. M. Jamieson in the former field was compelled to resign on account of ill health, which we hope may soon be restored; and Mr. M. Turnbull, in the latter, resigned in order to engage in work in Manitoba. Thessalon, for want of a suitable missionary-many efforts to secure one having failed-was practically left without supply during these months. This is very much to be regretted, not only for the sake of our people there, but also for the sake of the cause generally, as some time must necessarily elapse before all the interests of this promising field can be brought up again to where they were in October last. Mr. D. H. McLennan continues to abound in his labours in the Bruce Mines field. The station in the village of Bruce Mines has been revived and promises well for the future. As there are ten stations on this field, covering a wide extent of country, it is evident that in the near future a division must take place; but meantime Mr. McLennan must have some assistance. Because he is willing to work, and anxious to see the cause prospering with him, is no reason why he should be allowed to do the work of two men. Four services each Sabbath, with roads never good and sometimes very bad, is more than one man can keep up for any length of time. At Webbwood the wisdom of the action of the Presbytery and Committee in giving to this important field an ordained missionary is seen in the progress which is being made. The weekly offering has been introduced, by which means nearly enough is secured to meet the expenses of the station. At Massey, the station associated with Webbwood, we hope soon to see this also introduced. Mr. Pelletier, their missionary, is not only doing good work among the English-speaking portion of the community, but has also in prospect the establishment of a French service for the benefit of his fellow-countrymen, who have settled in considerable numbers in that part of the country. Throughout this part of Eastern Algoma a very important field of operation among the French-speaking settlers, who are coming in in large numbers, is presented, and must in the near future occupy the attention either of the Home Mission or French Evangelization Committee of the Church.

From Gore Bay, Mr. J. K. McGillivray reports progress in a degree most encouraging. More than 100 names have been added to the communion roll in the various stations under his charge. One station has been organized and another is about ready for organization. Two churches have been completed, while the interest in things spiritual has increased in a marked degree.

Mr. Rennie, at Manitewaning, finds himself in much the same position as Mr. McLennan, at Bruce Mines—with a greater number of stations looking to him for supply than he can do justice to. This difficulty will be partially met during the coming summer, as the Missionary Association of Knox College has generously come to his aid by appointing an assistant for four months. A reconstruction and division of the field, however, is the only real remedy for this condition of things, and must soon occupy the attention of Presbytery.

At Burk's Falls, under Mr. J. L. Robertson, the work moves on apace. Several additions have been made to the membership of the Church, the result of evangelistic services conducted in the village during the past winter. During these months Mr. Rob-

A new c field in Algor ship of McD soon give us ertson has been called upon, in the Providence of God, to pass through deep waters of affliction; first through the death of Mrs. Robertson, in November last, and more recently by the loss of a beloved brother, Dr. Hugh Robertson of Toronto, who was suddenly called from a scene of usefulness under very painful circumstances. May those who are left to mourn be abundantly sustained by Him who alone can give comfort and consolation.

Since my last report I have visited more than once, as occasion required, all the stations in Muskoka receiving supply, and some of those in Algoma. The work has been going on satisfactorily in most cases; showing that while the missionary in charge has been striving to do his duty, ofttimes under great difficulties, the people appreciate the efforts which are being made to supply their spiritual wants. Still the intermittent character of the supply in some cases, or the want of it altogether in other cases, during those six months, tells very forcibly against progress such as is desired, and may reasonably be expected, under other circumstances. Some of our stations, in Parry Sound especially, will suffer severely during this coming season through an unusual emigration to Manitoba and the North-West—not more so, perhaps, than in some of the older sections of the Church in Ontario; but we can bear the loss less easily than they. The consequent disarrangement of our work, we hope, will only be temporary; as others will be found to take the places of those leaving us—or perchance, as it has happened before, some of these will return again, preferring the slow and sure of Northern Ontario to the uncertainties of the North-West.

During these months twenty-five communion services were held and fifty-five meetings in different parts of the field—chiefly congregational and missionary meetings combined. By these we are enabled to know the mind of our people in the various stations on matters affecting their interests, at the same time it gave us an opportunity to enforce duty and to lay the wants and claims of the Church before them. The result of these meetings is seen in a measure in the fact that the stations during the past year have contributed to the Schemes of the Church the sum of \$1,250—nearly \$250 more than last year. The greater portion of this was, of course, for the Home Mission Fund, though the claims of the other Schemes were not forgotten by them. Two facts are noteworthy in this connection. 1st. While the contributions to the Schemes are larger than in former years, the amount of arrears, so far as we have learned, is less; and 2nd, where arrears do occur they are not found to any extent among the stations which contribute to the Schemes. "There is that scattereth and yet increaseth—and there is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty."

Our work in many of the fields has been interrupted somewhat by the prevalence of the "grippe" in forms more or less severe. While our missionaries with one or two exceptions have been kept free, their time has been fully occupied in visiting the sick, while the attendance at many of the services has been very much diminished.

The Ladies' Association of St. Andrew's, Toronto, and of Orillia continue their interest in the fields they have taken under their especial care, viz.: Burpee, in Algoma, by the Ladies of St. Andrew's, and Carling, in Parry Sound, by the Ladies of Orillia. In both these fields service was continued during the winter, and arrangements have been made for the summer as well. It is to be hoped that ere long other associations will be found following the example of the above in this matter, and so share the satisfaction which we know they enjoy from engaging in the work in this definite form.

A new church was opened at Bar River, a station in connection with the Tarbutt field in Algoma in February last; also a new station was opened in the adjoining township of McDonald in connection with the same field. Faithful work on this field should soon give us a settled charge. Elders have been elected but not yet ordained at Rosseau.

Several evangelistic is Mr. RobService which has been omitted for the last few years at Port Carling will be resumed again this season under the care of the Students' Missionary Association of Knox College. In connection with this, service will also be commenced at Beaumaris. These are resorts for tourists during the summer months, among whom are many of our own people—Canadians and Americans—who miss the services of their own Church, and who are always found ready to support ordinances liberally when they have the opportunity.

Our fund for Sabbath School Supplies for the more needy stations has been increased by contributions of \$10.50 from the Sabbath school of Allandale through Mrs. Cameron, and of \$12.50 from the Sabbath school at Colourg through Rev. J. Hay, to whom hearty thanks are due. Acknowledgments are also due to the Hymnal Committee of the Church, through W. B. McMurrich, Esq., for a donation of the "Children's Hymnal," and to Dr. Moffat of the U. C. Tract Society for a donation of literature for the schools. Nor must the Lumberman's Mission be omitted here as deserving special mention, which through Dr. Armstrong, of Ottawa, placed a valuable collection of literature at the disposal of some of our missionaries for distribution among the men in the camps.

The Missionary Association of Knox College comes to our aid for the next six months as in former years, but with an increased number of missionaries. Four of these will occupy fields in the Presbytery of Bruce and fourteen in the Presbytery of Barrie.

In November last a meeting of the missionaries with some of the elders on the Algoma field was held for the purpose of considering the advisability of establishing a Presbytery in that part of the field. After considering the subject fully it was agreed unanimously to address a memorial to the Supreme Court of the Church through the Presbyteries and Synods affected asking for the establishment of a Presbytery, to include that portion of Eastern Algoma now within the bounds of the Presbytery of Bruce, and that portion of the District of Nipissing within the Presbytery of Barrie. As one standing outside this movement, yet understanding thoroughly all the circumstances connected with it, I can heartily commend this most important matter to the favourable consideration of the members of the next General Assembly. It has already been endorsed by the Presbyteries to whom it was referred, and we carnestly hope it will meet with like consideration from the Supreme Court of the Church. It will do much to strengthen our cause throughout that region of country; it will do very much to encourage the band of faithful missionaries who are labouring there under many serious discouragements, and we believe will do very much to deepen and extend the influence of Presbyterianism in a most important and rapidly developing section of the Dominion.

SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST.

(Transmit. by Dr. Robertson.)

GENERAL STATEMENT.

Many circumstances have combined to direct attention to Western Canada of late years. It has occupied a prominent place in discussions in the Dominion Parliament; the newspaper and periodical press advertised it in Canada and Britain; delegates from the Mother Land and from the continent of Europe have visited the country and reported, and their reports have been sown broadcast; men of leisure and men of business have come, seen and been conquered; and agents in Eastern Canada, in Europe and even the United States have placed, as never before, the merits of the country before intending immigrants. And, no doubt, the check immigration to South America received has helped Canada. Time, moreover, is proving the adaptability of the West for settlement, and confidence in the future of the country is increasing. That the country, at this stage, could export 16,000,000 bushels of wheat in one year is proof of its

And when people, who moved west years ago, return to Outario and the Maritime Provinces, and tell of their success, no wonder if fathers with large families decide to try this new land. And the West is a good land—a land of wheat and barley, of butter and nilk; a land where flock and herds increase and multiply; a land whose stones are irons, and out of whose hills you may dig silver; a land whose mountains are covered with timber, and whose valleys are underlaid with coal; a land the sands of whose rivers gleam with gold, and whose numerous bays and inlets swarm with fish. Let us thank God for the good land He has given us, and encourage the people in crowded centres to occupy it.

IMMIGRATION.

The volume of immigration is larger this spring than for years, and should the crops turn out well this season it is sure to increase. In two months 9,000 souls are said to have entered the country by the C.P.R. alone. Land commissioners report that sales this spring have been double or treble those of any previous spring, and the rush to certain districts has been such that facilities for locating settlers have been overtaxed. Of the newcomers a large proportion are from Ontario, a few from the sea Provinces, and a considerable contingent from Britain and the continent of Europe. From Dakota, Canadians, who settled there years ago, are returning like Naomi from the land of Moab, That they went out full and are coming back empty is no fault of theirs. They are welcome. The wonderful discoveries of silver in the Kootenay Lake country have attracted a large number of miners from Montana, Idaho and Washington, and, if half of what is told is true, we may expect several important cities to spring up in that region. A corner lot, 30 feet wide, in the town of Nelson, was sold this spring for \$4,000. The British Columbia Government has passed the requisite legislation accepting a loan of \$750,000 from the Imperial Government, and is now arranging to locate Scottish crofters on the west coast of Vancouver Island to develop the deep-sea fishing. Since these people largely belong to our Church, we must be prepared to provide them with the means of grace.

The Roman Catholic Church is endeavouring to plant colonies of her own people, from Quebec and the New England States, in Manitoba and the North-West, and so recover lost political power. She has hitherto met with but indifferent success. Very few Irish Roman Catholics come to the West.

Efforts are made to settle colonies of Jews on our vacant lands. The prospects of success is doubtful. The Jews who attempted farming some years ago did not persevere, but gradually drifted into our cities and towns, and betook themselves to the more congenial employment of second hand stores, pawn and junk shops.

MORMONS.

There is a settlement of Mormons established near the American boundary, south of Lethbridge. They gave pledges to the Dominion Government that they would not violate the laws of Canada in the matter of marriage. Many of these people are ignorant, and hence became the victims of shrewder men. The settlement is increasing, is prospering, and likely to be joined by others. Should they be left to multiply and spread without any effort being made to evangelize them? A mission might be difficult to establish and maintain, but, if we are to judge from the experience of the American Church, there is no doubt about the ultimate success of such an effort.

UNDESIRABLE IMMIGRANTS.

Philanthropic societies in Britain deport a number of children and youths to Manitoba and the West. Many of these are the offspring of criminals and paupers, and not

The Indian population decreased in the Territories 7,450 in 5 years, and is fast dying out. In 10 years the population in Manitoba increased 145 per cent., and in the Territories 164, notwithstanding the large decrease of the Indian population.

RELIGIOUS BELIEF OF THE IMMIGRANTS.

In belief the great majority of the settlers coming from Britain and Eastern Canada are Protestants. The colonists from the continent of Europe for the most part bolong to the Reformed and Lutheran Churches. Taking the immigrants as a whole the great preponderance is Protestant. From Catholic Ireland and Europe few seek homes with us. As in the past, a considerable proportion of the new-comers are Presbyterians, and we have no more thrifty settlers than those who were reared on oatmeal and the shorter catechism. Out duty to provide for the children of the Church is evident, but what about the foreigners that come to sojourn among us? The German and Hungarian, the Icelander and Scandinavian, are sturdy Protestants. The boast of catholicity on our part belong should be exemplified in caring for those who are not otherwise provided for, whatever their nationality or faith. To be a Presbyterian a man must not of necessity talk Gaelic, or broad Scotch, or hail from Ulster. The lack of an adequate revenue prevented us from undertaking this work in the past; the time, however, has come for broadening the scope of our work, and so showing that Presbyterianism is not a creed of race or locality, but adapted for all nationalities and races. It stands high in the estimation of Western people for its energy and adaptability; let us shew them its catholicity!

WHERE ARE THE IMMIGRANTS SETTLING ?

These incomers are finding homes in large numbers in the Province of Manitoba, and in parts of the North-West previously settled. They prize the advantages of churches and schools and nearness to railways, and, hence, many of them are purchasing railway lands instead of settling on free grant lands that may be some distance at present from any railway. The railway built to the Souris coal fields sent thousands into South-Western Manitoba and South-Eastern Assiniboia. The railways extending northward from Regina and Calgary have caused an influx this spring into the Saskatchewan Valley; and it is likely that from Edmonton there will be an overflow shortly into the Peace River country. The

The Go Prohibition

The Go Council. C railway built south from Sicamouse, in B. C., has opened up the O'Kanagan Valley, where the Earl of Aberdeen lately purchased 14,000 acres of land for \$250,000. He is to settle Scottish farmers on his lands, and, judging from the fertility of the soil and the excellence of the climate, his venture is likely to prove successful. The lands between Calgary and Edmonton (200 miles apart) are being occupied, and the construction of the railway to Macleod will fill up the 100 mile stretch between Calgary and Macleod. It is to be regretted that we have not missionaries at many of these points to welcome settlers. We follow when we should accompany or precede.

DANGERS OF IMMIGRATION.

These movements of population are always accompanied with more or less risk. The religious habits of many of the people who come to us are largely the result of their surroundings and associations. When surroundings are changed; when former associates are left behind; when boat and railway travel prevent the proper observance of the Sabbath, and there is no minister of religion to welcome the new comers, or care for those who are strangers in a strange land, when, for weeks, months, or even years, there is neither minister nor sanctuary, what wonder if in some hearts the flickering light goes out? Christianity has suffered irreparable losses in the United States by early neglect; and Western Canada has not entirely escaped. The gambler, the rum-seller, and the strange woman travel by fast express -- the Church by slow stage. When the Church arrives she finds saloons, gambling hells and worse places in full blast, and largely controlled by bilks. We have suffered comparatively little, so far, east of the Rockies because of the class of settlers coming to us, but success in mining districts means an influx of many undesirable citizens, and we must govern ourselves accordingly. The missionary should accompany the settler, not follow him afar off.

LIQUOR LEGISLATION.

Since the last Report some changes have taken place in reference to liquor laws. Up to the beginning of this year Prohibition was the law, although not by any means the practice, in the North-West. Through permits issued by the Lieut.-Governor, the admission of beer with 4 per cent. of alcohol, and other violations of the spirit, if not the letter of the law, the people became dissatisfied, and the Legislature, at its recent meeting, passed what may be called a species of high license law. The Synod believes this to be a step backward, but it is yet too early to pronounce on the merits of the new departure. It almost looked as if the authorities conspired with liquor men to make Prohibition a failure, and so secure a change.

In British Columbia a law came in force on the first of January, closing all beer rooms and saloons from 11 o'clock Saturday night till 1 o'clock Monday morning. This is a step in the right direction, and much credit is due to the Premier for the change. Efforts were made to evade the provisions of the Act, but the courts promptly gave decisions favourable to a strict interpretation of the new legislation. With the British Columbian's loyal submission to law, the decision of the courts will regulate his conduct. This law will be an unspeakable boon in mining towns.

The Government of Manitoba is going to take a plebiscite on the question of Total Prohibition this summer, and a majority is likely to pronounce in favour of the measure.

SCHOOL LEGISLATION.

The Government of Manitoba has appealed the school case to the British Privy Council. Other aspects of the school question have since been before the courts in Man-2

The following motion was passed "almost unanimously" by the Synod of Manitoba

and the North-West Territories at its meeting last November :-

"Forasmuch as the Synod, at its meeting in Portage la Prairie it. May, 1890, declared in favour of unifying the Public School System, and inasmuch as difficulties have arisen in carrying out what is believed to be the desire of a large majority of the people of Manitoba, the Synod expresses the hope that every reasonable means may be used to test the legality of the Act passed by the Legislature, by taking the matter before the Privy Council of the Empire.

"The Synod also supports what it believes to be the decided desire of the people of the North-West Territories, to have the right to decide what system of public school

education they shall adopt.

"And, further, the Synod declares its opinion that no system of public school education car be permanent or satisfactory to the people of Western Canada which confers on any one Church rights superior to those enjoyed by any other Church."

NORK OF THE CHURCHES.

Roman Catholic Church.

The religious welfare of the people of the West is cared for by Protestants and Catholics alike. The Roman Catholic Church, in a commendable way, provides for her people, however remote the settlement from civilization; and manages to procure a paster who can speak to the people in their own language.

Anglican Church.

The Anglican Church employs a large number of missionaries among the Indians, and devotes much attention to the incoming settlers. Ritualistic practices, however, in the Qu'Appelle and Alberta dioceses have disturbed the harmony of several of the congregations, and alienated the sympathies of not a few sturdy Protestants. The West is not congenial soil for the practice or propagation of ritualism.

Methodist Church.

The Methodist Church is extending her work, as she did in the early days in Ontario. Since the General Missionary Committee met in Winnipeg, after the date of our own General Assembly there, the Methodist Church has been much more energetic in the prosecution of Western work than before. Larger appropriations of money have been made and a better class of missionaries appointed. She fully realizes the future importance of the West to the Church.

Baptist Church.

Of recent years the Baptist Church has been more active. Her missions are mostly started where other Churches have been labouring for years, and, since the Baptists in the West are not numerous, success can only be secured by separations from some other denominations. In a sparsely settled country like Western Canada the undue multiplication of weak religious organizations is to be deprecated.

Congregational Church.

The Congregational Church has very few ministers west of Lake Superior, and is doing nothing to advance purely mission work.

Lutheran Church.

The Lutheran Church has organized several congregations among the Scandinavians and Icelanders, but that Church is incapable of overtaking the wants of its scattered children. It lacks financial backing.

Presbyterian Church.

Although the work of the Presbyterian Church among the Indian population is less than that of the Reman, Anglican and Methodist Churches, yet it exceeds that of any other Church among the white settlers. This was to have been expected when so large a proportion of the population belongs to our Church.

Mennanites

In Southern Manitoba, between the Red River and the Pembina Mountain, and also on the east side of the Red River back of Niverville, are found a large number of Mennonites. They keep to themselves, but judging from what one hears in travelling through their villages, vital godliness is not so prevalent as is desirable. Without a competen person speaking their own language nothing could be done; and correspondence with ministers of our Church in New York and Princeton revealed the fact that a suitable German-speaking missionary was difficult to procure.

Western Canada is of vast extent, has vast and varied resources, is capable of supporting a large population, is attracting population from all quarters, and the first duty of Canadians should be to provide the new comers with educational and religious institutions. People are plastic now, they shall take a set in a few years. In 100 years Christianity has increased its numbers from 200,000,000 to 450,000,000. Where did the additional 250,000,000 come from? From heathenism, 3,000,000; from internal growth, 247,000,000. The colonization of America, Australia, etc., has helped largely to make the change. North America in a 100 years is likely to have a population equal to the present population of China. What shall be its character? That largely depends on what is done for the people now.

STATEMENT OF PROORESS FOR THE YEAR 1891.

The past year has, on the whole been one of the most successful in the history of our work. Several causes con the control to this result. The crop in Manitoba and the North-West was large, and better accratics for marketing it obtained than in any previous year. There was quite an influx of settlers of a good class, and, as before stated, they located in districts already located, where they could enjoy the advantages of schools and churches and be near railways. By this means existing church organizations were strengthened, and it became easier to provide for the spiritual wants of the new comers. A considerable number of ordained missionaries were in the field, and continuous services were given at a large number of points during the whole year. Above all, the presence of the Spirit of God was felt among our people, resulting in a quickened spiritual life and the accession of a number of valuable people to the membership of the Church.

EXTENT OF WORK.

All the mission fields previously occupied, with two exceptions, received supply, and these are provided with missionaries this spring. There was also a considerable extension of work into new districts, and the fuller supply of districts previously occupied. It must, however, be stated that in the whole Cariboo district, where incomplete census returns show that there are about 5,000 people, we have not a single missionary, although a num-

bor of the children of the Church are known to be settled there. Nor has the Church any missionary beyond Edmonton, although a number of our people, formerly in the employment of the H. B. Co., are known to have settled on the Peace and other northern rivers. The Roman Catholic Church maintains missions 1,800 miles boyond Edmonton, and takes good care to provide for her people whatever their location or language.

The progress of many of our missions is frequently arrested owing to the intermittent nature of our supply of many fields, the wide districts in which some missionaries are obliged to labour, and the employment of men without experience and without the requisite training for the work. In a distance of 200 miles between Edmonton and Calgary we had but one missionary. One student is struggling this season to cover the 200 miles between Golden and the American, and another is learning how to spread himself over a field eighty-five miles long by thirty to thirty-five miles wide. This looks like one man trying to farm a whole section of land (640 acres).

STATISTICS.

At the meeting of the Home Mission Committee in March, 1891, there were 132 missions on the list. Several other fields were occupied during the season, so that, including the missions advanced to the status of congregations, 146 missions were supplied. Sixteen of these are congregations, two—railway missions—no longer call for our care, and some others are temporarily connected with other missions to effect a saving of mer and means. This spring we begin with 137 missions on the list, with the prospect of an increase in the near future. In the missions supplied last year twenty-six churches and seven manses were built. The missions, with their respective strength, the following table will show:—

SUPPLY RENDERED.

Energy the year supply was given 5,375 Sabbaths in 130 missions. This would give an average of 41? Sabbaths in the 52. The average the previous year was 40, and the year before that 35. Computed by years, 103 19-52 years' service was rendered, as against 92 last year. The missions advanced to the rank of congregations are all excluded. Adving the figures for augmented and self-sustaining congregations, the totals would be 2.74 19-52, as again t 137 in 1890 and 112½ the year preceding. This charge a gratifying occease. NUMBER AND STATUS OF MISSIONARIES ET AL.

To the 137 mission fields on the list are appointed or in charge 52 ordained ministers, including the Superintendent of Missions, 68 students and 18 catechists. If to these are added 71 ministers for self-sustaining and augmented congregations, 209 will represent these in charge of English-speaking congregations and missions. In the college are 4 professors and a tutor, and connected with Indian and Chinese missions are 8 ordained missionaries and 23 teachers, instructors and matrons. There will thus be seen to be 245 persons in the employment of the Church in Western Ontario, 135 of whom are ordained and 110 unordained.

COMPARISON.

It will be of interest to compare the strength of the Church this year with the returns of previous years. This statement, however, is only an approximation, for it seems almost impossible to get complete returns. Missionaries vary, too, in making returns. One man reckons as Presbyterian families only those in which husband and wife belong to our Church; another, where either belongs, is willing to reckon one-half. One man rigidly excludes all but avowed Presbyterians, another includes those attending Presbyterian services and no other, although not in the membership of the Church by profession. With these explanations here are the figures:—

SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Considerable attention was paid to the organization and efficient maintenance of Sabbath schools. The importance of this department of work is accentuated in the West, from the fact that family worship, with the instruction of the children, is not so prevalent as in the East. Schools in Ortario generously send books and papers, and thus, in nesmall degree, contribute to the success of our schools. The Upper Canada Tract Society has given valuable help to new districts by allowing a liberal discount on library books. The Sabbath schools in Winnipeg, Port Arthur and Portage la Prairie give us, in addition to books and papers, large financial aid. It is estimated that in summer at least 14,000 attend our Sabbath schools and Bible classes.

DISPENSING OF SACRAMENTS.

Arrangements are made from time to time to have the sacraments of the Church dispensed in all our missions. Communion rolls and baptismal registers are provided, so that the affairs of the mission may be kept in order from the outset. People are desirous

of having their children in visible connection with the Church, and it is gratifying to report that a large number of the young men of the West have made profession of faith in Jesus Christ.

STATE OF RELIGION.

It is difficult to report with much confidence on the state of religion in so large a Synod as that of Manitoba and the North-West. There are indications, however, that lead one to report favourably. In all the country between Lake Superior and the Rockies the Sabbath is well kept, and in British Columbia an improvement is noticeable. The attendance on Sabbath and week-day services is general and regular on the part of parents and children. The accessions to the communion roll are large. There is a good deal of activity in the erection of churches and manses, and for this object as well as for the support of their pastors, the people give generously. There is a healthy temperance sentiment; and sessions are seldom called on to exercise discipline. It is to be feared, however, that family worship is not general. In a new country, where opportunities of acquiring property are frequent, a worldly spirit is apt to take possession of many to the lowering of their spiritual life. British Columbia suffered because of early neglect and abnormal conditions, but there has been a decided improvement recently. The presence of the Indian in the North-West, and of the heathen Chinaman in British Columbia, in different ways helped to lower the moral tone.

STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETIES.

Valuable help was given by the missionary societies of Manitoba, Knox and Queen's Colleges the past year, and they all have a number of missionaries in the field this year. One could wish to see Montreal also represented, but fields in Quebec no doubt are needy.

SPECIAL ASSISTANCE.

The cordial thanks of the West are due to the congregations and individual members of the Church who gave such generous aid to mission work last year. Their help is needed and solicited, and of as many more as may desire to join them for the coming year. It is not too much to say that without such help our work must have been seriously hindered.

CHURCH, AND MANSE FUND.

The Church and Manse Board rendered good service in providing ministers and congregations with homes. Judging by the acknowledgments in the Record, the Fund gets no collections from congregations, and is seldom remembered in the wills of the wealthy. During the last ten years the Fund has helped to build over 200 churches and manses, and never were the calls on its aid so numerous as this spring.

MISSIONS VACANT DURING WINTER.

Twenty-six missions, with about 120 stations, are reported as having been vacant during the winter, while fifteen more were supplied by students from Manitoba College during the session. Fifteen more were supplied by catechists. Some of the fields left vacant perforce are important, such as Winlaw, Alameda, Musselboro', La Riviere, Cartwright, Clear Springs, Colleston, Saskatoon, Carsdale, Dongola, etc. At some of these points we represent Protestantism, and if we give continuous service, other denominations will not enter the field.

SUMMER SESSION.

But one extra-mural student entered the Western mission field, and it seems hopeless to expect much aid from that source. It is to be hoped that the General Asse, ally may

see its way clear to adopt the modified way of holding a summer session recommended by the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, so as to free a number of students for winter service. A few of the students from the East, one from Edinburgh and one from Princeton, entered the mission field this spring, pledging themselves to remain in the field all winter and take a session in Winnipeg if the Assembly should decide to make arrangements for such a session.

CHARACTER OF HOME MISSIONARIES AND VALUE OF THEIR WORK.

Comparisons have been frequently instituted during the year in the Church papers between the missionaries in the Home and Foreign fields and their work. That the former in a less degree command the sympathy and support of the Church and awaken less interest generally is freely admitted. And attempts have been made to explain, if not justify, the discrimination. It is creditable to the Church that she is doing so much for her missionaries abroad; her neglect of the missionaries at home is inexcusable. Let a foreign missionary return to Canada, and he is beseiged with applications to be heard in city and town. The home missionary is left severely alone. He may have a thrilling story to tell; no one cares to hear it. He is only a Home Missionary. Even the General Assembly does not care to enquire whether a few representative Home Missionaries might not be heard with profit when the Home Missionary Report is under consideration. Mark the different treatment meted out to their brethren from the Foreign field.

Does anyone explain the difference by mentioning the isolation in the Foreign field? The missionaries at Comox, Alberni, Nelson, Kettle River, Battleford, Ft. Frances and other points are compelled to prosecute their work far away from their brethren; and, in some cases, if they have Christian society now, it has through God's grace been their own creation. Does anyone suggest hard work? The great majority of missionaries in the West preach three times on Sabbath the most of the year, and drive frequently from thirty to forty miles to attend to duty. And for two months and a half the mercury any day may become solid. Yet seldom are the people disappointed, though blizzards do blow and the air has an edge occasionally. Visiting has to be conducted over large areas and at all seasons, and systematic and frequent visiting is essential to success. Nor can study be neglected. Many of the people are well informed, are constantly reading, have been accustomed to good preaching and like to criticise. To evertake his work, one of our missionaries walked every Sabbath seventeen miles on the railway ties. Another, this spring, hearing of a new settlement, got blankets and "grub," and packed them on his back seventy miles over a rough mount in trail to minister to the wants of the newcomers. Such men say and write little, bu work hard.

What of self-denial? One of them was called last season to a city congregation, with \$1,200 of a salary, but declined. The salary received was about one-half of that offered. Another, on his arrival in the field, was inforced that a missionary was not wanted, and would receive no support. "He is needed," he replied, "and if I get only the grant from the Committee, I am going to stay." His self-denial and decision commanded respect and secured success. Still another, tinding his people struggling to pay what they had promised, remitted \$200 annually of the amount due, and lived on the balance, and said nothing about it. R—— occupies a wide field, and can preach only fortnightly at his stations. On "blue" Mondays he sets up the type, and prints, in condensed form, the sermon of the previous Sabbath, and sends a copy, in tract form, to each of the families in the stations not supplied. Copies are sent to the Superintendent, and he does not know which to admire the most, the superiority of the printing, the excellence of the sermons, or the enterprise of the missionary. as hopeless e, ally may field. Ex paucis disce omnes. Nor should this subject be dismissed without testimony being borne to the large help given to our missionaries by their wives. These good women cannot afford to hire help, and hence, whether well or ill, domestic duties fall on them. It is useless to talk of a furlough; there are no funds. It is only when death has invaded the old home in the East that the wish to return rises in the bosom, and then only a letter can be sent. In a word, the missionaries of the Church are men of high character; not a few took a high place in college and seminary; they are moulding thought in the new West, and they deserve the sympathy and support of the Church in a more generous measure than has hitherto been accorded them. They are making the Church, and the Church that shall yet be the mainstay of foreign work.

DETAILED "TATEMENT OF MISSIONS IN THE SEVERAL PRESBYTERIES.

The state of the different missions in the several Presbyteries will appear from the following sketch. Much of the success of our Home Missions is due to the large amount of work done by the Conveners of the several Presbyteries.

PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG.

The mission field of this Presbytery is one of the largest in the Synod, and perhaps one of the most difficult to overtake. Speculators purchased, in early days, a good deal of the land in the vicinity of Winnipeg, are holding it for good figures, and hence settlement is progressing but slowly. But yet a number are finding homes in the district every year; and all new-comers, as far as possible, are cared for. Proximity to Manitoba College gives the Presbytery an advantage in the supply of its missions during winter, and of this source of supply it has availed itself to the advancement of its work. During the year Dominion City and Morris became augmented congregations and called pastors, and Millbrook did the same in the spring. Norman will be connected with Rat Portage for supply this year, and Whitemouth with Beausejour. There will thus remain 23 missions on the list; with 87 stetions, 564 families, 150 single persons and 515 communicants. The condition of each mission will appear from the following statement:—

- 1. Clear Springs has increased its families slightly, but growth is slow because the people are hommed in by French and German settlements on the north and west, and bog on the south and east. No other Church holds services in the district. Preparations are made to build a church this year. The settlement is far removed from a railway, but one is expected to be built through the settlement shortly.
- 2. Little Britain is one of the settlements along the Red River that date back to Dr. Black's days. There is but little growth, and scarcely any is expected. Rev. A. Matheron, who was once paster of Little Britain, is appointed there this year.
- 3. Fort Frances made some progress, but, owing to isolation of the district, the absence of a railway and its distance from markets, rapid progress is not to be looked for. The missionary in charge task seriously ill during the winter, and was sent to the asylum in Winnipeg. The mission extends for 80 miles along Rainy River.
- Greenwood shows decided growth, its families having increased from 41 to 66, and its communicants from 91 to 114. Steps will ere long be taken to call a pastor.
- 5. Gretag is united for supply, to two stations in North Dakota. This arrangement saves our Home Mission Fand, for there is no district with which Gretna could be associated. Steady progress is made. No other Church is represented. Families 20 and communicants 15.

Ignace itself is the end of a division and has repair shops. At ten points services are hold. There are 30 families, a large number of single men and 26 communicants connected with the mission.
- 9. Schrieber. Here, for several years, Mr. William Neilly laboured with great fidelity and marked success among the railway men and fishermen found along the north shore of Lake Superior. Last autumn his canoe was swamped in rounding a point on the lake, and he was drowned. The C.P.R. people turned out all their available men to search for his body, but so far it has not been recovered. Mr. Neilly had at the time successfully completed the erection of a building at Schrieber, to be used as a home for an institute organized there. The building was laid out with reading and bath rooms, gymnasium, etc.—the people of the place contributing \$3,000 to defray the expense of building. The death of Mr. Neilly was a great loss to our work. Mr. Lewis, formerly of Mount Lehman, takes his place. Mr. Pringle, of Port Arthur, Moderator of the Synod, rendered signal service during the vacancy between the death of Mr. Neilly and the arrival of Mr. Lewis.
- 10. Whitemouth remains stationary. The most of the people are connected with the mills. To lessen expense, Whitemouth and Beausejour are united for the summer.
- 11. Icelandic Mission.—This mission, too, had the misfortune of losing its pastor, Mr. Jonas Johnson, by death. He was a man of deep convictions, of good preaching power, evangelical in his views and tireless in advancing the welfare of his countrynen, for whom he would make any sacrifice. His brother takes his place. From this mission two young men came up to Manitoba College and are studying for the ministry. We hope that they may be blessed of God in preaching the Gospel to the scattered settlements of Icelanders in the West. This mission is making steady progress; the opposition shown at the time of its establishment having died out.
- 12. Stony Mountain has made no progress during the year, nor will much change take place till more settlers occupy the vacant lands.
- 13. Union Point shows little change. Faithful service was rendered, but the population in the field is sparse. There is a slight increase in families.
- 14. Posen is situated north-west of Winnipeg on the line of the H. B. Railway. The people labour under decided disadvantages in the absence of a market. Our Church was the first to occupy the field, and good work has been done. There is an increase of families reported.
- 15. Lundwille lies north-west of Posen, with which it was at first connected. The size of the district, however, and the increase of settlers, called for a division. This field is not large as to population, but is likely to increase.
- 16. Suthwyn is situated a short distance south-east and east of Winnipeg. The field has been readjusted as to its boundaries. There was some growth during the season. A new station was opened up. The families number 26 and the communicants 31.

- 17. Castleman lies west and south-west of Winnipeg, and is making progress. Its prospects are good. A church is to be built at one of the stations this season.
- 18. Beausejour suffered last season from excessive rains, which, in the absence of proper drainage, made farming unprofitable. Faithful work was done under decided difficulties. For this season one missionary supplies Beausejour and Whitemouth.
- 19. Shoal Lake and Lake Frances are situated north-west of Winnipeg on the line of the H. B. Ry. The people are farmers and ranchers. The population is increasing, and ere long there will likely be a good congregation.
- 20. Stuartburn, etc., lies east of Dominion City, and had a separate missionary last season for the first time. His expenses were borne by the Girls' Mission Band of St. Andrew's Church, Winnipeg. The families are 35 and the communicants 15. St. Andrew's supports the mission this year.
- 21. Marais and Plum Coulee lies north-west of Emerson, on the west side of the Red River. The expenses of the mission last summer were borne by a minister of the Church in Manitoba.
- 22. Iron Range is called after the Iron Mountain, south-west of Port Arthur, and was begun for the benefit of those engaged in the work of constructing the railway to bring the mineral to market. The mission is not on the list this year. A private donor supported it.
- 23. Lake Winnipeg Fisheries.—This mission is for the benefit of those engaged during summer in catching whitefish for the Winnipeg, St. Paul and Minneapolis markets. Many of those people belong a cur Church, and the mission was undertaken at the request, and is supported by the co-operation of the company. The work has been encouraging.
- 24. Nettley is a field on the west side of the Red River, near its mouth. The rich pastures and meadows in that quarter have attracted a number of small ranchers, and our mission is for their benefit. No other Church ministers to these people, and the population is quite mixed. There are 39 families reported and 23 communicants. People of all denominations unite in observing the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The mission was supplied the most of the year.
- 25. Keewatin appeared on the list last year, but is now ready to call a pastor. Satisfactory progress was made, and the people are in good heart.
- St. Augustine disappears from the list, having called a pastor. The congregation is growing, and an enlargement of the church is necessary. The congregation is liberal and generous to the Schemes of the Church.

Norman is a saw-mill mission, and this summer is joined to Rat Portage.

St. Andrew's Church, Winnipeg, started a mission in Point Douglas some time ago. Its progress has been encouraging. At the Sabbath school is an attendance of over 100. Last summer lots were purchased in a central situation and a church built.

There is a mission also in West Winnipeg, more or less under the charge of Manitoba College students. There is a good attendance, and preparations are in progress to build a church this season.

PRESBYTERY OF ROCK LAKE.

During the past year gratifying advance was made in this Presbytery, and although the shape of the Presbytery is of necessity unfortunate for any desired changes, yet it is hoped that the most of its missions will soon become congregations. Thirteen missions were reporte 94 single per



- Ravenswood has strengthened in families and communicants. At Rosisle a neat frame church was built. The field is wide, and the stations inconvenient for services, but no changes can be made with profit.
- Darlingford has made substantial progress last year, and is ready to eall a pastor.
 At Thornhill a neat and commodious frame church was built, reflecting credit on all concerned.
- 3. Musselboro' suffered through autumn frosts, but the people are in good spirits, and the mission is growing. There are 30 families and 89 communicants, and yet they had service but half the year.
- La Rivière is a good strong mission, and should have a settled pastor. Sixty-eight families and 59 communicants are reported. It received 27 Sabbaths' supply.
- 5. Crystal City and Clearwater were united last spring and put in charge of Mr. D. D. Mackay, who has done excellent work. The people at Crystal City are building, and steps are being taken to build at Clearwater also. The congregation is spirited and progressive.
- 6. Cartwright is a strong mission, ready to call a paster. Like too many other missions, however, its supply was for only aix months, and a student is in charge this spring again. "Arrested development" must be recorded as the result of this policy.
- 7. Pelican Lake is largely a Crofter mission. Sixty-one families, 63 communicants, and 34 single persons are reported. Mr. Gollow, who has, as a student, been so successful and popular in this mission for several seasons past, graduated this spring and is appointed as ordained missionary. This mission received only 31 Sabbaths' supply during the year. McNab St., Hamilton, provides supplement.
- 8. Killarney, under Mr. C.W. Whyte, made a decided advance. A manse was built, and arrangements are being made to build a church. Mr. Whyte has accepted an appointment to the Indian School at Cote's Reserve, and another missionary is placed in charge of Killarney this apring. South Killarney is to be supplied for a time with the parent field.
- 9. Riverside has risen considerably in families and communicants. Faithful work was done during the summer by a student, and Mr. Jos. Andrew took charge in the autumn. Should the railway promised pass through the field we shall soon have a good congregation. The congregation of Paris generously provides the supplement for this field.
- 10. Waskada is not strong but growing. Crop losses for several years arrested progress. Last season was more successful. Annoyance was caused at some points by zealous bigots trying to get some of the young people of our Church to join their body. There is a reduced number of families this year, arising from a different method of reckoning. The communicants have doubled.
- 11. Antlers reports an increase in communicants and families. This field has the advantage of a market now, and may be expected to grow. There is no finer district in Manitoba for grain raising. Arrangements are in progress to build.
- 12. Melita has grown rapidly, and is now an important village. Situated on the Souris River, it is apt to become an important railway town in Southern Manitoba. Families have increased from 26 to 41, and communicants from 41 to 59. A church and a manse are to be built this summer.
- 13. Roland is a new field on the N.P.R. east of Miami. Roland, Clegg (formerly in connection with Miami) and Rosebank will form the new group, with adjacent territory east and north-east of Roland. There will be about 30 families in the field at the outset.









- 14. Glenora is composed of families formerly connected with the Marringhurst field. The field is not strong, but will likely receive additions during the season. This is a new mission.
- 15. Ninga lies between Boissevain and Killarney, and is largely made up of stations formerly connected with Boissevain. The mission is new but promising.
 - 16. South Killarney.-Valuable work was done here last year.

PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON.

Fourteen missions were reported from this Presbytery last spring, and of these Alexander and Wawanesa have become self-sustaining, and Elkhoin has resolved to follow their example. Holland, McGregor and Whitewater have called pasters and passed off the list. This is a creditable showing. Thirteen missions are reported this year, including Elkhorn, but excluding Daybreak, which will get supply otherwise.

- 1. Arizona has gained largely in families and communicants. Steps have been taken to build a church at Arizona. The field was under the Students' Missionary Society of Knox College last year, and satisfactory work was done.
- 2. Douglas is a strong mission and ready to call a pastor. A church (stone) was built in one of the stations (Creeford), and it is proposed to move the Douglas church, which is about two and a half miles from the railway station, to the village. The people are in good heart, and could call a pastor at once.
- 3. Elkhorn.—An effort was made at this point to unite the Presbyterians and Methodist bodies, but it failed. The Presbyterians were willing to leave it to a vote, but some occult influence was at work and the movement collapsed. The Presbyterian people were so dissatisfied with the tactics of the other body that they resolved at once to become self-sustaining, and asked to be left alone. Some people preach, and are willing to practice, the lying down of lion and lamb together, if they are allowed to play the lion in the game and let the lamb disappear. So the Presbyteries judged, and acted on their judgment.
- 4. Lakeside is a field near the southern and on the western side of Lake Manitoba. The families are not numerous, but increasing. The families reported last year were 16 and the communicants 21. The respective figures this year are 22 and 36.
- 5. Griswold is composed of Griswold—separated from the Oak Lake congregation—and the Menteith field. There are 50 families and 70 communicants, and a pastor can be called at once.
- 6. Pipestone made satisfactory progress during the summer, but suffered through lack of continuous supply during the winter. With an acceptable pastor it would become a congregation at once.
- 7. Torbolton had continuous supply and made fair progress. Its distance from a railway militates against rapid growth. The field is promising, having 3 stations, 37 families and 63 communicants.
- 8. Brookdale received supply during the summer and made but slight progress. It is growing, however, and continuous services no doubt would quicken the pace.
- 9. Breadalbane is formed by uniting this station (detached from Virden) with Penrith and Kinsmore. The field is strong and will soon become a congregation. In the Penrith field good work was done last "ear. St. Andrew's, Almonte, provided supplement for Penrith field last year and preceding year.

Daybreak will receive supply from neighbouring missions.

10. Saskatchewan is formed by the grouping of three stations, two west and one east of the Little Saskatchewan, near its junction with the Assiniboine. The field has 27 families and 45 communicants, with the prospect of substantial increase. At Saskatchewan a church is to be built this summer.

- 11. Minnewawa lies between the N.P.R. and the Souris River, and west of that stream in its course north-east from Langvale to Wawanesa. The field has 40 families and 45 communicants. Erskine Church, Toronto, generously provided the supplement for the past year. A church is to be built at the main station this summer.
- 12. Taggart is a new field, and formed by attaching two stations demitted from Souris to unoccupied territory lying southward. The field has about 35 families and 45 communicants. There will be 3 stations—Taggart, Fairfax and St. Luke's.
- 13. Parkissimo was occupied for the first time last year, and increased its numbers, although it is not yet strong. The operation of the Maditoba Central Railway will likely come soon, and Parkissimo will be much benefited.

PRESBYTERY OF MINNEDOSA.

The greater part of this Presbytery is not so fortunate in its territory as those already under consideration. The country is much higher above sea level than the country farther south, and hence more subject to fall frosts. It is a famous grazing country, with rich soil; and those engaged in mixed farming are doing well. The growth of our work here will not be as rapid as in the Presbyteries of Brandon and Rock Lake. When the Synod was formed, in 1884, there were only 2 augmented congregations and 9 missions within the bounds of the Presbytery; and now there are 4 self-sustaining congregations, 4 augmented congregations and 20 missions. This is a gratifying advance. In the Presbytery are 20 missions, 78 stations, 724 families and 899 communicants. They are as follows:—

- 1. Arden increased in families and communicants, and is in a healthy state. A church is to be built at the central station this summer.
- 2. The Meadows lies north of Rosedale and was occupied last summer for the first time. Settlement is extending in that direction, and the mission, though weak this spring, is likely to receive considerable accessions during the summer.
- 3. Franklin (Bridge Creek) increased in strength, and is in a very satisfactory condition. An ordained missionary takes charge. A church was built last year.
- 4. Lake Dauphin.—To this settlement there was a large immigration last year, and our mission reaped much benefit. The work has increased so that two missionaries are needed. Lying over 50 miles from a railway, and with a road at times almost impassable, financial results of a brilliant kind are not to be looked for. Faithful work was done, and it was appreciated. The ladies of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, supplemented the mission. A church was built and preparations are in progress to build two or more churches this year.
- 5. Newdale is a strong field and ready to call a pastor. Its families decreased from 63 to 60, but communicants increased from 72 to 85. Spring Hill, N.S., provided supplement in spite of the great calamity experienced.
- 6. Strathclair has prospered much during the past two years, and the congregation is harmonious and hopeful. It is a matter of great regret that the minister is resigning on account of ill-health.
 - 7. Shoal Lake makes no progress. Settlers, as a rule, in this district have not pros-

- 8. Bculah has increased a little. The field must of necessity be limited, for the missionary has to care for the Sioux Indians in the neighbourhood. The building of the railway under construction will help us here.
- 9. Binscarth improved considerably last year. The friction that hindered progress is removed and the congregation is united. They are building a church at Silver Creek this summer.
 - 10. Russell is growing slowly. Conscientious service is rendered.
- 11. Rossburn has not made satisfactory progress. Quarrels about site and church-building hindered. A church was built at Perth, largely owing to the energy of the missionary.
- 12. Shellmonth was occupied during the summer, and showed signs of life and progress, but the winter vacancy blighted its hopes. There are 36 families and 38 communicants.
- 13. Saltcoats is increasing in numbers and showing financial g owth. A church is badly needed, but the people do not seem to think themselves equal to building it.
- 14. Dongola received supply for only 19 Sabbaths during the year, though the families number 54 and the communicants 57. Good work was done, but its full benefit was not realized. John Charlton, M.P., provided supplement.
- 15. Crescent Lake was supplied by a student in summer, and diligently looked after; but the people had silent Sabbaths all winter.
- 16. Yorkton is growing. The missionary is popular and doing good work. We had hoped to plant an ordained missionary here this spring, but none was available. The nearest ordained missionary is 168 miles away, and many settlers are 30 miles beyond Yorkton. Henry Kent, Esq., Toronto, provided supplement.
- 17. Crofters.—The colony sent out by the Imperial Government is located about 10 or 12 miles north of Saltcoats. These people are making good progress and promise to become valuable settlers. A missionary speaking their own language labours among them. The discontent of the first year is largely a thing of the past. The Sabbath school of Knox Church, Portage la Prairie, provided supplement.
- 18. Gilbert Plains is a new mission with 4 stations, occupied this spring for the first time as a separate mission. The settlement is in the Lake Dauphin country, and rapidly filling up.
- 19. New Dakota is a settlement of Canadians who returned from North Dakota, having suffered several and severe crop failures in that State. They are located west of Yorkton, and a missionary is sent this spring among them.
- 20. Odanah is a wide field with a mixed population. The Presbyterians are not numerous, but increasing slowly. Scandinavians and other foreign nationalities are represented. Faithful service was rendered.

PRESBYTERY OF REGINA.

This Presbytery extends from Fleming to Boharm, a distance of 200 miles, along the line of the C.P.R., and from the International boundary line to Prince Albert. It suffered much in the past through crop losses, but last year the people were blessed with a large yield. Lands abandoned in past years are reoccupied, and new lands are taken

There is this year a gratifying increase in almost all the columns of the returns sent to the Committee on Statistics and Finance. Last year Home Missions received \$210, this year \$401. Augmentation in 1891 got \$148, as against \$91 in 1890. Totals for Schemes in respective years, \$577 and \$986; and for all purposes, \$12,457 and \$18,183. Let us hope a brighter day has dawned for this Presbytery of faithful men. The figures are 23 missions, 87 stations, 755 families, 203 single persons and 837 communicants. The mission:—

1. Alameda has hitherto been supplied by Queen's College Missionary Society, and faithful work was done year by year by efficient missionaries. It was meet that when an ordained missionary was to be appointed he should be from that College, and be the one who laboured there last season. The C.P.R. people have extended a branch to the coal fields through this field, affording markets to the farmers and changing the character of our work.

Oxbow, a village of 200 people, is likely to be the centre of the field for the future. Preparations are made to build a church this aummer at this point. The field was vacant all winter.

- 2. Winlaw for years was supplied by the same Society from its inception till last year. A graduate from the College is appointed to the field this spring. This field hes east of Alameda, with its centre on the same railway. This field, too, was vacant all winter. The supplement furnished by Parkdale.
- 3. Battleford people are apirited, but their isolation and distance from railways operate very much against them. When the grant was reduced in March, 1891, from \$12 to 7.0 per Sabbath, the congregation undertook to made up the difference. A heavy church debt rests like an incubus on their shoulders, preventing financial advance. The congregation is holding its own, but making no headway.
- 4. Buffalo Lake was occupied during the whole year, and has made a decided gain in every respect. The missionary was our only extramural.
- 5. Broadview is weaker than last year. Many of the people have left the district. It was united to Grenfell for winter supply. Knox College Students' Missionary Society supplied it in summer.
- 6. Carlyle remains stationary. Crop losses in past years and distance from markets have hindered growth.
- 7. Cathcart made a perceptible advance last year. The missionary is able to preach in Gaelic, and is much esteemed by the people. The circumstances of these people are improving.
- 8. Colleston advanced but little owing to lack of supply in winter. More settlers are going to the district since the railway was built.
- Fort Qu' Appelle is increasing in numbers and financial ability. The membership increased from 46 to 59.
- 10. Green Valley has gone back rather than advanced. It is far removed from markets. The contemplated new railway will pass through the settlement whon built,
 - 11. Grenfell has made a slight advance, but its life is still feeble.
- 12. Kinistino has improved a little, but its distance from market is against it. The M. & N.W.R. is surveyed to pass through the settlement, and its advent must change the whole aspect of things. Until last summer our Church alone sent a missionary to

this settlement. Our missionary taught school, too, for six months. The Methodist Church, two of whose families lived in the settlement, sent in a missionary last spring. We thought at one time of abandoning the district, but our people protested, and petitioned that a missionary be sent, offering to do liberal things towards his support. The congregation of St. John's, Brockville, offered to provide a supplement, and a missionary was sent. It is likely there will be only one missionary this season. Census —19 Presbyterian families, 2 Methodist, 18 Anglicans.

- 13. Landsdowne has increased its communion roll decidedly, and is in good heart considering the injury inflicted by hail in 1890. Two missionaries in succession took ill, and work was thereby hindered.
- 14. Longlaketon.—For years Knox College Student Missionary Society faithfully and efficiently supplied this field. It is to be supplied by the Society this summer. A church is to be built at Lumsden.
- i5. Carsdale lies north-west and west of Regina, and is becoming a strong mission. The settlement was composed of a superior class of people from its inception. The families number 57 and the communicants 40. Knox College Students' Missionary Society supplies this summer. It should call a pastor.
- 16. Saskatoon has not grown. The settlement is not thriving, and yet 32 families, 16 single persons and 19 communicants are reported. A Queen's College Missionary Society student ministers to the people this summer.
- 17. Touchwood our Church alone supplies. There will be no growth till a railway reaches the settlement. Farringdon Church, Brantford, generously provides the supplement.
- 18. Whitewood is improving its record under the faithful guidance of its missionary. Sabbath school and Bible class work is doing much for the young people.
- 19. Wolseley is in much better heart this year. A stone church was built at Moffat, and preparations are made to build a manse at Wolseley this summer.
- 20. Welwyn has made slight progress, but with continuous supply, by an ordained missionary, would soon become a good charge.
- 21. Roseplain built a church last year, and is strengthening in numbers and financial ability. The missionary travels over a wide field, and renders conscientious service.
 - 22. Kenlis was detached from Indian Head, and has had an excellent record last year.
- 23. Coal Fields.—The railway is expected to reach the Souris coal fields in early summer, and since a number of settlers are already found west of Alameda, and a number of miners are expected to engage in bringing coal to market, an appointment must likely be made early to this region.
- 24. Carnduff lies between the Alameda field and Winlaw. Owing to the inrush of settlers there this spring a new mission there is a necessity.

PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY.

There has been a good deal of activity and no small progress made in this Presbytery last year. Lethbridge has become a self-sustaining congregation, calling the missionary who made it to become its pastor. Three churches were built and one manse. Arrangements are made to build three more churches this season. There was a good deal of exploration done, and the 18 missions of last year have become 25 missions this spring, 24 of which are to be occupied at once, and the other later on if practicable. Mr. Walton, of High River, and Mr. J. J. Ferguson, of Banff, rendered great service in supplying

fields during winter, without any charge to Home Mission Funds. Efforts were made to organize Young People's Societies to help Home Mission and Augmentation. Fields now occupied, 24; stations, 94; families, 458; single persons, 565; and communicants, 387. The separate fields are:—

- 1. Ainsworth, in the Kootenay Lake country; population mining. Ainsworth, Kaslo, Balfour, etc., included. Knox College Students' Missionary Society send man for summer. He becomes missionary to Home Mission Committee in October. Field new.
- 2. Bauff has held its own, but was much hindered by the difficulties connected with anthracite mine. Congregation most liberal in presentation, if not church, giving 74.89 per family, and \$56.17 per communicant for all purposes.
- 3. Bow River is in charge of a catechist, who is doing excellent work. Large increase in numbers. Church being built at Sheppard.
- 4. Canmore is growing. Ordained missionary petitioned for and appointed. Field not strong, but spiritual and liberal.
- 5. Clover Bar shows no increase. The influx of settlers this year to the district will help it. Student appointed for one year. Zion Church, Brantford, Ladies' Society provides the supplement.
- 6. Davisburg shows an increase in all columns. The minister is most conscientious and faithful, and highly esteemed by his people. The progress shown is all gain.
- 7. Donald, from its situation, cannot be expected to grow to any large size, but last year there was a gratifying advance, and a better feeling never existed since the inception of work.
- 8. Field is a new mission that received supply in the past through Mr. J. J. Ferguson, of Banff. The mission embraces a number of points along the railway on the western slope of the Rockies.
- 9. Gleichen is a railway field, and liable to continuous and sudden changes. Faithful and efficient work was done by the catechist, Mr. Ferrie.
- 10. Innisfail is the field called Red Deer last year. A good start has been made here. At Innisfail station a manse was built, and an effort is to be made to build a church this year. 50 families, 20 single persons and 40 communicants are reported. Central Church, Hamilton, provides the supplement.
- 11. Macleod had a missionary of its own last year, and is making progress. The uncertainty as to the point to be selected for the terminus of the railway coming into the town from Calgary has interfered with values and building operations. This summer will settle all this, and give an impetus to our cause.
- 12. Pincher Creek, 32 miles neacer the mountains than Macleod, built a church costing over \$2,000 last year. Its families and communicants have increased; and should the Crow's Nest Pass Railway be built, no doubt the town would grow rapidly.
- 13. Maple Creek is a railway mission which is making some headway. A church is to be built this summer. To the south a number of ranchers are settled, for whom the massionary is caring in spiritual things.
- 14. Metrose is a new field, which now is not strong, but which promises development. It lies to the west and south-west of Calgary. At one station a church is in course of erection.
- 15. Nelson has made a good beginning. A church is in course of erection, and a congregation organized. The majority of the people are connected with the mines.
 - 16. Pine Creek suffered severely through a hailstorm last summer. 28 out of 31

families lost heavily; some lost all. The congregation holds its own numerically. The missionary resigned, and a student is sent in this spring to remain a year.

- 17. Red Deer is a new field extending between the Innisfail field and Edmonton, 100 miles. To that district a number of settlers are attracted by the construction of the railway, and the resources of the country. Knox College Students' Missionary Society occupies the field.
- 18. Revelstoke is growing in importance. A railway is to be built southward this summer to the head of the Arrow Lakes to facilitate getting the Kootenay Lake eres to the main line of the C. P. R. A church is to be built. Connected with Revelstoke are Illecillewaet, Illecillewaet Mines, etc., to the east.
- 19. Salmon Arm lies to the west of Revelstoke, embracing part of the railway and settlements north and south of the road. The are 27 families, 48 single persons, but only 8 communicants in the field. The Ladies' Missionary Society of St. Andrew's, Perth, provides the supplement.
- 20. Slocan Lake is a mining district, 70 miles north of Nelson. A large population is flowing in there, and urgent representations were made to appoint a missionary, which has been done.
- 21. Upper Kootenay embraces the valley lying south of Golden to the international boundary. There are a number of families and single persons living in that part of British Columbia, ranching, mining, lumbering, etc., and hitherto little has been done for them.
- 22. Swift Current is doing so well that this spring it was deemed advisable to divide it in two, as one missionary could not overtake the work.
- 23. South Edmonton is a mission established at the terminus of the C. & E. R., opposite Edmonton town. Stone Lake and one or two other points will be included. The missionary is to teach, and no grant is asked.
- 24. Pilot Bay is a new mining centre east of Kootenay Lake, for which a missionary is asked. No appointment has yet been made.
- 25. High River has made considerable progress. A church was built and the people are in good spirits. The railway in course of construction will help the field considerably. Young men of St. Paul's, Hamilton, provide supplement.

PRESBYTERY OF COLUMBIA.

The work of this Presbytery is progressing very satisfactorily. Twelve churches and two manses were built in missions. One mission became a self-sustaining congregation, and two others were transferred to the Augmented List. One of these is to call at once, and the other may call its missionary at any time.

It is becoming more evident, however, that the work of this Presbytery cannot be managed to advantage with present arrangements. It is to be hoped, consequently, that the General Assembly may erect a Synod in the West, and divide the Presbytery into three. The recommendation of last year's report, with the division suggested, was approved of by Presbytery and Synod, and the coming Assembly is to be asked to give it effect. The Presbytery of Calgary is of opinion that its convenience would be consulted by detaching it from the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, and connecting it with the Synod of Columbia.

The Presbytery of Columbia suffered a great loss last year by the death of its Home Mission Convener, the Rev. D. Fraser.

Last spring 18 missions were reported, and 18 this spring. Connected with *hese are 58 stations, 641 families, 450 single persons and 627 communicants.

- 1. Comox advanced in numbers and finances last season, and will soon support ordinances itself.
- 2. Alberni.—To this field a missionary was sent last autumn, lumber for a church being shipped with him. There is the prospect of growth in the field, owing to the erection of saw and paper mills. Coal has also been found. There is a decided increase in all figures.
 - 3. Sooke and Metchosin received supply for half the year, and barely held its own.
- 4. St. Paul's, Victoria West, etc., reports a gratifying increase in numbers. At Victoria West a neat and commodious frame church was built, reflecting credit on all concerned. At Cedar Hill a church is to be built this year. The prospects of the congregation are better than ever before. Four ladies of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, provided the supplement.
- 5. Delta complains of an unfavourable season, and yet there has been a decided advance. Two good churches were built, the mission reports increased strength, and lowers its demand for aid from the Home Mission Fund.
- 6. Langley.—There has been a re-arrangement of this field, so as to avoid the dangerous crossing of the Fraser, and hence the mission is not yet self-sustaining, as was expected. The field is strong, however, and will likely provide for itself after the current year. Faithful work was done.
- 7. Mt. Lehman has increased in numbers, although progress was hindered by disputes that arose out of letters sent by the missionary to an eastern paper. A new missionary is sent in this spring. St. Paul's, Hamilton, provides the supplement.
- 8. Warnock shows no increase in numbers, although a much smaller grant is asked from the Home Mission Committee than last year.
- 9. Upper Chilliwhack is the Rosedale and Island field, and good progress was made during the year. A church is in course of crection at Rosedale. Thirty-seven families and 15 single persons are reported as against 18 families last year.
- 10. Nicola Valley reports no gains. Things are stationary, and will likely continue so till better communication with the outside world is obtained. One sympathizes with the missionary in his isolation.
- 11. Spallumcheen shows little advance. The railway built up through the valley will, however, help the district.
- 12. Vernon and Okanagan shows signs of life, and will grow with the district opened up by railway. The Earl of Aberdeen purchased a block of 13,000 acres of land in the neighbourhood, on which he proposes to settle a number of Scottish farmers. Vernon built a church last year.
- 13. Forthfield and E. Wellington.—This field was occupied last season for the first time, and with surprising results. A church was built at Northfield, and a manse at Wellington, and the Presbytery decided to divide the field, placing the missionary in charge of the Wellington part of the mission, and appointing another missionary to Northfield. Mrs. Topp, the Toronto Society in Truro, and some friends in Winnipeg furnished the supplement for Northfield.
- 14. Surrey was occupied last summer for the first time. There are three stations, a church and a manse were built, and the prospects are good. Twenty-eight families, 6

- 15. North Bend is a railway mission, the supplement for which was paid by Mr. W. Mortimer Clark, Toront. A number of important points visited by no other Protestant Church are cared for, and the results are encouraging. Mt. Pleasant was occupied as a mission in December, but improved in numbers and prospects so rapidly that it was put on the Augmented List in March. A church was creeted, and, although not complete, is used for worship. The congregation will soon be self-supporting.
- 16. Sapperton is one of the stations forming the N. W. New Westminster mission. Its companion built a good church and became a self-sustaining charge. This station built a neat and serviceable church, leaving only a small debt on it. It reports 32 families, 22 single persons, and 48 communicants.
- 17. Kettle River has suffered from the resignation of its missionary last autumn, and the impossibility of finding a suitable person to take his place. The district is important, and the people to be deeply sympathized with in their destitution. Rev. Dr. Mackay, of Montreal, and a lady of his congregation did much for the mission, providing Bibles, etc.; the lady furnishing the supplement towards support. Two churches were erected. A missionary is appointed this spring.
- 18. Wellington assumes a separate existence this spring, is building a church, built a manse last year, and is likely to call its missionary shortly. The record is praiseworthy for all concerned.

PRESBYTERIAL REPORTS FROM THE NORTH-WEST AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

In addition to the very full report of Dr. Robertson, the Convener has also received the following from Presbyteries in the N.-W. and B. C.

PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON.

The mission fields have made, for the most part, very gratifying progress during the past year.

- 1. Alexander has shown a very valuable example to our mission fields in becoming a settled, self-sustaining congregation without going through the supplemented stage. It has also dropped off its other two stations, Roseland and Kemnay, which, strengthened by the addition of Hayfield, are ready to call, and will in all likelihood be self-sustaining from the first. This is the most notable instance of progress it has ever been our privilege to record; and it has been brought about not so much by a growth of population as by an increase of liberality. Alexander has only about 20 families, and yet gives its minister one thousand dollars a year.
- Arizona has had continuous supply during the year, but the progress has not been very marked.
- 3. Douglashas had ordained supply during the year, and has made considerable progress. The grant has been reduced. The people there are likely to call soon, and, if happily settled, they will either be self-sustaining from the first or within a year. In a short time it will be a flourishing congregation.
- 4. Elkhorn has developed slowly. The field has been large, and only an evening service could be given to the village. The people are now wakening up to the necessity of having a settled pastor, and are willing to contribute more generously in the future to secure that result.

5. Lakeside is a very weak field numerically, containing scarcely more than twenty families, but they are good givers, and support ordinances for eight months in the year, with a very small amount of help from the Home Mission Fund.

6. Griswold, formerly called Menteith field, has been receiving from the Fund a small grant, but since the addition of Griswold will not require any aid. The expectation is that this field will very soon be transferred to the list of self-sustaining congregations, as the Menteith district is fast filling up.

7. Pipestone is developing fairly well, and is self-sustaining as a mission field with student supply. It is confidently expected that in a year or so it will undertake the responsibility of supporting an ordained missionary, if not a settled pastor.

8. Tarbolton has not made very marked progress for several years; but by some recent readjustments of territory, and by the stimulating example of Alexander, close by, it is expected that it will soon take its place among our progressive fields. Tarbolton itself has only about a dozen families, and these have agreed to contribute this year \$200 towards salary. The other stations are Ralphton and Brierwood, from which we expect to get \$250 towards a student's salary.

9. Saskatchewan has, until within a few weeks, been allied to Torbolton, but now made a separate field with three stations. They are liberal according to their numbers, but need a small grant.

10. Brookdale has not progressed as it ought to have done. It is well-to-do financially, but needs to be stimulated to a more vigorous exercise of the grace of liberality.

11. Breadalbane, along with Penrith and Kinsmore, h. been made a mission field. For the support of an ordained missionary Breadalbane alone gives \$400, and the whole field will soon be self-sustaining.

12. Minnewawa, in the southern part of the Presbytery, is comparatively a new field, but promises a rapid development. One of the stations, Nesbit, will build a church this summer.

13. Fairfax, or Taggart, is a new field, south-east of Souris, and the Presbytery anticipates for it a fairly rapid growth.

14. Roseland, along with Kemnay, formed until recently part of the Alexander field. Now, with the addition of Hayfield, it is a vigorous charge, looking forward to a speedy settlement.

15. Daybreak has had no supply during the winter. It is a weak station itself, but new connections will probably be sought for it this summer, and the work revived with brighter prospects.

Several familiar names have disappeared from this list. Holland, Treherne, McGregor and Whitewater are now augmented charges; while Alexander and Wawanesa have suddenly developed into healthy, self-sustaining congregations. We trust that this fairly good record may be far excelled by the outcome of the present year.

PRESBYTERY OF REGINA.

1. Keulis.—The district to the north, south and east of Indian Head was erected into a separate mission group, known as the Kenlis group, through the action of the congregation at Indian Head in seeking an independent position. It has received regular supply with very little expense to the Committee, but should soon have an ordained missionary.

2. Jumping Creek Station.—Placed under the charge of Mr. Rolson, Fort Qu'Appelle, and wrought in connection with it. The remainder of the field south of the Qu'Appelle

- 3. Kinistino.—To this station has been added that of Stoney Crock, some thirty miles distant.
- 4. Long Lake,—During the year this field has been divided, the new district being known as Carsdale.
- 5. Welwyn.—This station, separated from Moosomin, and forms, with Hilburn and two other stations, another field.
- 6. Moffat, in the Wolseley group, has erected a new stone church, and Rose Plain a frame one. New churches are being erected in the Lumsden and Buffale Lake, whilst Wolseley erects a manse during the summer.

PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY.

- 1. Some outlying districts were for the first time visited by our missionaries, especially Beaver Lake and Beaver Hills, 40 miles east of Edmonton; Dog Pond and Beaver Dam districts, north-west of Calgary; Queenstown settlement, south-east of Calgary; some remote districts in Salmon Arm field, etc.
- 2. The 18 Home Mission fields of last year have widened out into 25 separate groups of mission-points, requiring 25 separate labourers, ordained and unordained.
- 3. Lethbridge, until now on the Home Mission list, though for some time self-supporting, has called its missionary and had him regularly settled as pastor.
- 4. Some of our laymen aided in supplying destitute districts with religious services, especially Mr. R. Walton for High River, and Mr. J. J. Forguson for Field.

PRESBYTERY OF COLUMBIA.

The progress throughout the Presbytery during the past year has been most satisfactory. No less than 16 churches have been erected, or are at the present time under construction, of a total value of at least \$40,000, and the amount of debt on these buildings will be very small, as in most cases it is the purpose of the people to open them free of debt. This church building has for this year interfered with the prospect of immediate reduction in the grants required for the support of missionarios, but when the new churches are opened and organized we look for a much increased revenue from the congregations. There has not been so much done in the way of opening up new fields as in consolidating the fields already in existence, but what has been accomplished in this direction has greatly a ided to our strength in the Province. The work accomplished by the Rev. A. Young in Wellington and Northfield, which has resulted in the establishment of two good congregations, deserves special mention, because there were difficulties in his way which required the exercise of great judgment and prudence as well as evangelical zeal.

The new field in Surrey district has developed rapidly under the care of Rev. B. K. McElmon, and now that a church has been erected, we look for more marked progress in the future. The work in all the other fields is developing rapidly as population is flowing in, but new settlers are generally poor, or have locked up their capital in their land and improvements, so that we have to wait for a year or two before receiving much financial assistance from them. We are looking for a large increase to our population in the near future, and we anticipate the opening of many fields, both on the mainland and the island. The proposed formation of a synod will prove of great advantage in the development of our work, and we earnestly trust that the General Assembly will carry out our wishes as expressed in the unanimous decision of our Presbytery on this subject.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF MORRIN COLLEGE, QUEBEC: 1801-92.

The Society sent out two missionaries last spring. The one visited the settlements along the Quebec & Lake St. John Railway, where he held cottage meetings while going from place to place, and took careful notes of the number of Protestant families there were along this railway and throughout that district. The other was stationed at Chicoutimi, the head of navigation on the Saguenay (where he had been, under the same misajonary society, the previous year as nothing short of a "missionary squatter" -neither asked nor, at first, generally wanted by the residents there). Here the efforts put forth by the Society were marked by the blessing of God, so that ere the missionary left on this, his second, summer in the field, he came before the Presbytery of Quebec with a petition from the people of different denominations in this field, asking that the Presbytery of Quebec send to them an or lained missionary; and offering, at the same time, to give towards the support of same the sum of \$600 annually. This petition was looked upon favourably by the Presbytery of Quebec, which, with characteristic missionary zeal, succeeded—after visiting the field in question, and seeing its importance—in securing the services there and then of Rev. James Fergusson, B.A., formerly minister at Windsor Mills. Mr. Fergusson assumed the office of minister in this new field last November, and is still at Chicoutimi.

During the last winter our Society supplied needy localities about Quebec with divine services, receiving very satisfactory encouragement from the work done in these places.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY, 1891-92.

HOME MISSION WORK.

In the Home Mission department we have been enabled to send four missionaries to the North-West, and to support one in this city. The fourth would not have been sent to the North-West but for the liberal aid given to the Association by the young people of Chalmers' Church, Kingston. Their generous gift was the harbinger of a plentiful harvest, for the amounts contributed by the North-West fields this year have never been surpassed. We trust that they were but the tangible expression of spiritual blessings received by them.

The Pine Street Mission has also progressed well. The congregation is vory well organized. The debt is reduced to a triffing amount. We expect that an ordained missionary will be appointed to take charge of the work in a few weeks. It is gratifying to know that, although our expenses were much heavior than last year, our receipts were such as to leave a good balance in Treasurer's hand.

During the winter months the mission fields along the K. & P. Railway, as well as Portsmouth and Collins Bay, were regularly supplied. The hospital and House of Industry were under the charge of the College Y. M. C. A.

We are grateful to the congregations, Sunday Schools, and private persons, who have so generously contributed to any department of the work. Upon their sympathetic co-operation much depends. Our special thanks are due to Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland for the annual gift of £50 sterling for N.-W. work. In closing our report we ask all our

friends to remember in prayer our missionaries and their work—our missionaries that they may be faithful co-workers with our blessed Master, and that their work may result in men and women being reconciled to the Christ of God.

ALAMEDA MISSION FIELD.

T. R. Scott, B.A., Missionary.

Fortnightly services were held in five stations, Alameda and Auburn in the northern part of the field, and Bierwirth's, Hope and Boscurvis in the southern part. It was found impossible to hold regular services at Dill's station on account of the distance, and but one service was held there.

Sunday schools were conducted at Hope, Boscurvis and Auburn with very satisfactory results.

The attendance at the regular services was good, averaging thirty-eight at each service.

There are about thirty Presbyterian families in the field, and forty-five Presbyterian bachelors.

After two years of partial failure in crops a bountiful harvest delighted the settlers. One of the ways in which they expressed their thankfulness to God for this blessing was by contributing liberally for the support of the missionary, and also giving something for the Schemes of the Church. The total cost of the field this summer was \$382.05. Of this amount the field has already contributed \$327.30, including Mr. S. Sproule's present of a cart and harness, valued at \$55. When all the subscriptions are paid it will be found that the field this year is self-sustaining.

The railway is now running as far as Oxbow, near Alameda, and thus a ready market has been opened for the produce. The result is that the number of settlers is becoming greater each week. The Presbytery and field have recognized the need of an ordained missionary, and Mr. Scott, who laboured there during the summer, has been appointed and expects to enter upon the work about the beginning of June.

WASKADA.

J. D. Stewart, Missionary.

This field is situated on the south-western corner of Manitoba, about twenty miles from Deloraine, the present terminus of the Pembina branch of the C.P.R. With the international boundary line as its southern limit the field includes a district about twenty miles square. Services were conducted at five school-houses: Medora, Princess, Verona, Moira and Lennox, and Sabbath schools at three. As for the treatment received at the hands of the people, your missionary can only corroborate the statements made in former reports regarding the genuine hospitality with which he is welcomed by members of all denominations. Owing to the fact that the new branch line from Brandon to the coal fields has been constructed, and that the Pembina branch is about to be extended to meet the former at Melita, the settlers will have a much nearer market than heretofore, and will soon enjoy the consequent benefits. The settlers of this district furthermore shared in the general good crop of last season, though in some places it was badly damaged by the frost. Taking all things into consideration the prospects for the future are brighter than they have been in the past. A missionary has been on the field during the winter, and no doubt the people will soon see their way clear to have an ordained missionary amongst them. Families, 37; members, 31; cost, \$271.70; contributions, 217.61; cost to Society, \$54.09.

RIVERSIDE.

E. C. Currie, Missionary.

This field is in Southern Manitoba, and in what is known as the municipality of Turtle Mountain. It has for its northern boundary the Souris River. It is from all parts convenient to the villages on the Pembina Railway-Boissevain, Ninga and Killarney, It is an excellent wheat-growing section, but not exclusively such; for it is just as productive of other grains, as well as roots. Its prospects are the very best. Wood is in some parts scarce, but coal (at about \$3.50 per ton) may be easily obtained. The homestead land has nearly all been taken up, and they are beginning to sell the C. P. R. lands. The majority of the settlers are from Ontario, and are chiefly Presbyterian. The moral condition of the community is good, and their intelligence, perhaps, exceptional. There are six appointments, at which fortnightly services were conducted. At five of these appointments there were also Sunday schools, with average attendance of 18, 30, 35, 35. At four of the appointments a weekly prayer-meeting was held. At one of the appointments there is a Ladies' Aid, with over 25 members. During the summer the Sacrament was dispensed twice, and 23 were added to the Communion roll. Previous to last summer an ordained missionary was in charge for over two years, and since the student left, last fall, another has been secured. The people showed themselves to be interested and earnest in the work. They not only secured a rig, which was placed at the disposal of the student during the summer months, but also attended all the services very regularly. The field contributed over \$248.75 towards defraying the missionary's expenses.

NORTH BEND, REVELSTOKE, ETC.

Alfred Fitzpatrick, B.A., Missionary.

During the months of May and June, and the early part of July, I worked at Revelstoke and east to Bear Creek Station, the half of the field managed so successfully for the last two summers by J. A. Sinclair, M.A.; while the other half was under the care of J. Millar, M.A.

As Revelstoke and one or two other towns had diminished in population on account of a depression in the mining trade, it was thought better that I should go farther west and that Mr. Miller should undertake the whole field from Bear Creek to Duck's.

My work then included the small towns of Ashcroft, Spence's Bridge, Lytton, North Bend, Yale and Hope. The inhabitants of these places consist of railroad employees and officials, miners, prospectors, ranchers, tourists, etc. Many noble young men are employed here. They are all away from home and accordingly are always anxious to hear of the East, and to talk of the "days of auld lang syne." The missionary finds his work, in this most interesting country, not in the pulpit—for there are few pulpits—bu; in the railway carriages, in the caboose, and roundshop; or again, at the ranch and uniner's shack.

From all classes he will receive a hearty welcome, if he be a friend rather than a "preacher," a brother rather than "a white choker."

ZION CHURCH (PINE STREET).

John D. Boyd, B.A., Missionary.

This part of the work has from its inception progressed steadily, and, as a result, much good has been accomplished. During Mr. Boyd's illness, last spring, Mr. D. G. McPhail, B.A., carried on the work with success. In June five managers were appointed, who have rendered much assistance. The teachers and students who have helped in the Sabbath services, prayer-meetings and Sabbath school, deserve our sincere thanks. The

average at the Sabbath services has been about 100, at the prayer-meetings 25, and at the Sabbath schools 115. There are about 35 families identified with the Church. An ordained missionary will be appointed in the course of a few weeks. We trust that he, together with his faithful band of workers, will be sustained and encouraged by the Great Head of the Church in their labours of love.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE KNOX COLLEGE STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETY, 1891-92.

The following is a description of the fields taken up by the Society during the past summer :—

ONTARIO PROPER.

BUXTON.

P. McNabb.

This field lies to the south-west of the town of Chatham, in the county of Kent, Ont., and consists of three preaching stations, at each of which service was held every Lord's Day.

Buxton, the principal station, was once the headquarters of the mission to the fugitive slaves who sought refuge in Canada. The most of these have either died or returned to the South. White settlers have taken their places, and now there are good prospects of a large congregation.

Raleigh Centre was originally a Methodist congregation, but has for the last two summers received service from Buxton, and has now become connected therewith as a regular station.

Raleigh, some seven or eight miles to the south-east of Buxton, had been connected with it; but neglected for some time past, has been reclaimed and promises to be a good station.

The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed by the Rev. Wm. King, of Chatham, in the month of July, at Buxton. The Rev. Alexander Manson dispensed the ordinances at the other stations during the month of September.

KENT BRIDGE AND WABASII.

W. R McIntosh, B.A.

This field, which was taken up this summer for the fourth time by our Society, lies in the northern part of the county of Kent. It consists of three stations—Kent Bridge, Wabash and Grove Mills—at each of which regular Sunday services were held throughout the summer. At Kent Bridge and Grove Mills week-night meetings and Sunday schools were also held, both of which were well attended. The latter are continued by the people. There being no organization, the members partook of communion with Rev. J. Becket's congregation at Thamesville.

The sympathy and support given to the student in his work evidenced an interest in our mission, on the part of the people, that is highly satisfactory and encouraging.

COLCHESTER.

J. G. Reid.

This field is beautifully situated on the shore of Lake Erie, in the county of Essex, in the township of Colchester South. It is about twenty-three miles south-east of Windsor, and is claimed by some to be one of the best farming communities in the Dominion.

There are two stations—Colchester South and McGill. At each of these stations Sabbath school and public service was held every Sabbath during the summer.

A weekly prayer-meeting was held at each station, and the interest taken by a number of earnest Christian workers helped the student very much.

The communion of the Lord's Supper was dispensed twice during the summer by the Rev. Thomas Nattress, B.A., of Amherstburg. Six united with the Church; four by certificate, and two by profession of faith in Christ.

PRESTON

P. W. Anderson.

This village, beautifully situated in the fertile and picturesque county of Waterloo, is noted for its manufacturing, and also as being an attractive summer resort. It contains the widely-known "Sulphur Springs," which are putronized by a large number of American, as well as Canadian, tourists and invalids.

Services are held in the Lutheran, Methodist, English and Roman Catholic churches, as well as those held twice a week by the student in the hall of the Royal Templars of Temperance. Sabbath school was held every Sabbath afternoon at three e'clock, and still continues. On Wednesday evening a prayer-meeting was conducted.

Much interest was manifested in the services, and some devoted Christians encouraged the missionary very much in his work.

In July Rev. Mr. Porteous, of Galt, dispensed the sacraments.

NEW DUNDER.

H. S. McKitrick.

This field is situated in Wilmot township, Waterloo county, and consists of two villages, New Dundee and Baden, with populations of 400 and 900, respectively. The population in this field is for the most part Pennsylvania Dutch, and German.

At New Dundee Presbyterian service was commenced by the Paris Presbytery in July, 1889. • At Baden service was commenced only last May. A congregation has not yet been organized at the latter place, but there is good prospect of a strong one being organized there in the near future.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed at New Dundee in June by the Rev. E. Cockburn, M.A., of Paris.

The field is to be supplied from the College during the College session.

BLACK RIVER.

C. T. Tough.

This field is situated in the north-west corner of Ontario county. It comprises two stations, Black River and St. David's. Black River is almost supported by the lumbering trade. There are four mills, one being built this fall to take the place of one burnt last spring, involving the seriously felt loss of \$11,000.

St. David's is a farming district. As quite a number of Presbyterians, and a few of other denominations, reside in the community, the outlook for a thriving appointment is good.

This summer a beautiful frame church was erected, and was opened on the 4th of October. As most of the work and material was a gift, superintended by Mr. J. S. Gowdy carpenter and mamber a very small outley of money was required.

Two elders were elected. Weekly services, and also a prayer-meeting, were held.

The thanks of the Black River people are due Mrs. John Thompson, of Longford, for the gift of \$50 in support of the mission.

MUSKOKA AND ALGOMA.

FRANKLIN.

C. R. Williamson.

This field is situated around the north of Lake of Bays, south-east of Huntsville, in in the township of Franklin, district of Muskoka. It comprises four stations, at three of which—Dwight, Portage, and Cain's Corners—a weekly Sabbath service was held.

Prayer-meetings were held weekly at Dwight, and McCutcheon's, and monthly at Ox-Tongue.

Sabbath school was carried on at Dwight.

Rev. Dr. Clarke, of Bracebridge, dispensed sacrament in September, one member being added.

BUCK LAKE.

S. Whaley.

This is a new field, lying east of Gravenhurst, and comprising four stations—Reay, Doe Lake, Buck Lake, and Lewisham. At Reay, which was formerly in connection with South Falls, and supplied by the Home Mission Society, there is a union school, but at the other appointments the services were conducted in school-houses. The Sabbath school, organized at Doe Lake during the summer, and the union school at Lewisham, are both in a flourishing condition.

The people have no principal occupation. At one time lumbering afforded employment to a large number of persons, but forests and sawmills are things of the past. The country is rocky in the extreme, and as the amount of arable land in the ravines, and along the margins of the lakes, with which the district is thickly dotted, is not sufficient to warrant agriculture either probable or profitable, it is not difficult to foreshadow its future.

The Rev. M. N. Bethune, through whose instrumentality it was opened, visited the field, and administered the sacrament of baptism.

LORING.

G. E. Lougheed.

The field is situated in a lumbering district, about fifteen miles south of French River, and about forty miles west from Trout Creek and the G.T.R. The great distance from a railroad seems to be its great drawback. Land is good, and needs a railroad to

of French eat distance railroad to give it communication with other parts of Ontario. A railroad is expected to be built shortly. The only market as yet is the lumber camps.

The settlement is gradually increasing, thus it was necessary this year to give regular fortnightly Sabbath services in the outlying portions of the field.

During the summer months there were held in the central part of the field, Loring, a Sabbath school, and services in the morning and evening. Each alternate Sabbath afternoon services were held at Wolf River settlement, and in the western end of the field. At Wolf River a Sabbath school was also commenced. Both Sabbath schools are being carried on during the winter, as well as church service in the morning at Loring, by Christian workers in the field. Every Wednesday evening a prayer-meeting was held at Loring, and on each alternate Thursday evening at Wolf River and at the west end of the settlement. All the meetings were well attended, and much interest was manifested in the work. Rev. Mr. Garrioch, of Powassan, visited the field in September, and dispensed the sacraments.

CHISHOLM.

J. A. Cranston.

This field is situated in Nipissing district, eight miles east of the village of Powassan on the G.T.R. There are about sixty families in it, a large proportion of which are Presbyterian. Services were held at four places, Kell's, McDonald's, Robinson's and Booth's, a Bible class being also held at McDonald's, and Sunday schools at McDonald's and Robinson's, the latter having been started this summer. The new church at Kell's was finished and opened. Two hundred books received from Streetsville S.S. were distributed in the field. The ordinances of the Church were dispensed by Rev. Mr. Garrioch, of Powassan. There were seven baptisms; two new members were added on profession of faith.

SQUAW ISLAND AND COLLINS' INLET.

Jas. Menzies.

This new field comprises the stations Squaw Island, a tishermen's resort, nine miles from the north shore of Georgian Bay, and Collins' Inlet, a lumbering village on the mainland, twenty-one miles from Squaw Island by water. The former field was occupied during June, July, and August, service being held each Sabbath, morning and evening, in a shanty kindly placed at our disposal. The fishermen, whose homes are in the different ports on the Georgian Bay, and who resort here only in the summer months, appreciated highly the services held, and by attendance and personal effort greatly aided the missionary in his work.

The weekly cottage prayer-meeting and Sabbath school were well attended. Neither of the ordinances was dispensed. At the desertion of the Island by the fishermen in September, the missionary removed to Collins' Inlet, having been able to hold service there only twice during the summer. Here service was held in the school-house, morning and evening, with a week-night prayer-meeting, all of which were well attended. This field has been much neglected, as, although a mill has been here for forty years, no settled missionary has ever been here before.

WARREN.

J. D. Jeffery.

This field lies midway between North Bay and Sudbury, on the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway. The extent of the field from Verner to Wahnapitae is about thirty-three miles. Warren, the principal place, a village of some 300 inhabitants, is composed

of French and English, the French being about equal in number to the English-speaking people. In this place service was held every Sabbath, in an Orange Hall, there being no Presbyterian church. Great interest was shown in spiritual matters during the summer. Amongst other things, a Union Christian Endeavour Society of Episcopalians and Presbyterians was formed, with an average attendance of twenty.

FRENCH RIVER.

Wm. J. West.

This field is situated at the mouth of the French River, in the Parry Sound district, It comprises two stations, French River and the Bustard Islands, where several fishermen make their headquarters during the summer.

French River is a lumbering district with two mills, only one of which was running during the summer, that of the Ontario Lumber Co. A number of men are employed in bringing down and rafting logs on the river. Services were held every Sunday at both places, with an encouraging attendance. A Sabbath school was conducted at eleven o'clock, on Sunday, and prayer-meeting every Wednesday evening at seven o'clock at French River, with good attendance.

Rev. Mr. Currie, of Penetanguishene, visited the field in September, and dispensed the sacraments.

FRANK'S BAY.

J. S. Muldrew.

Frank's Bay is a lumbering village, situated on the south shore of Lake Nipissing at the point where the French River leaves the lake. It is the lumbering headquarters of Messrs. J. B. Smith & Sons, of Toronto, and the population, in the summer months, consists of the men employed in the firm's mill. The district around is very rocky, but finely timbered. There are no roads leading to the outside settlements, all communication being by boat.

The Sabbath service and Sunday school were well attended, as was also the weekly prayer-meeting; and the interest in the work was very encouraging. Besides the above services, public school was conducted four days in the week. The sacraments were not dispensed this summer.

WHITE FISH.

Jus. Landsborough.

This field is situated about twenty miles west of Sudbury, on the Sault branch of the C. P. R. It is over twenty miles in extent, comprising three villages, White Fish, Worthington, and Nelson, also several lumber and mining camps lying some miles from the railroad.

The district is rich in various kind of minerals, the supply of which is inexhaustible, thus making it a field of special interest to the Church.

A Sabbath school was organized, in which a growing interest was manifested, and a weekly prayer-meeting was held at White Fish. According to the wishes of the people, a missionary was appointed to continue the work during the winter.

The sacraments were dispensed by Rev. A. Findlay in September.

KORAH AND PRINCE.

J. A. Dow.

This field, situated west of Sault Ste. Marie, was taken up this year for the first time, and comprises three stations, "the Base Line," West Korah and North Prince. The work at these places has been, to a great extout, neglected, and thus the efforts of the Seciety in taking it up were very much appreciated. Although without a regular missionary, at the Base Line division a well-conducted and well-attended union prayermeeting and Sabbath school were being successfully carried on. At all the stations a deep interest was taken, and several energetic workers helped greatly in promoting the work by their united efforts. At North Prince people have been settled for twelve years, and have not had any services, except a few last fall, until this summer, when the opportunity was gladly embraced, and much interest shown. Rev. W. A. Duncan, B.D., of Sault Ste. Marie, dispensed the Sacraments at North Prince and the Base Line.

BETHUNE.

Wm. Black, B. A.

This field lies east of Elmsdale and Katrine on the N. & N. W. Railway. It comprises four stations—Kearney, Ravensworth, Sand Lake and Orange Valley. The people show a marked appreciation of Gospel privileges. The Rev. Mr. Robertson, M.A., of Burk's Falls and Katrine, dispensed the sacraments of baptism and the Lord's Supper. Four received baptism, and one united by profession of faith.

ENCAMPMENTS.

A. J. Mann, B.A.

This field is on St. Joseph's Island, and was taken up by the Society this year for the first time. It gave promise of being a good station, but the missionary had to withdraw, on account of ill health, after three weeks' work.

PROVIDENCE BAY.

G. L. Johnston, B.A.

This field is situated on the southern side of Manitoulin Island, and is about thirty miles long by twelve broad. The people mostly all engage in farming, although the land is in some places not very good. It was formerly for a number of summers under the care of the Society, but for the past six years a catechist has been labouring there. There are seven stations, three churches and four school-houses, at all of which services were held fortnightly. At each station but one there is a Sunday school, though not all under Presbyterian control, and all of them will be continued during the winter.

Ordinances were dispensed by Rev. Mr. Findlay, and Rev. Mr. McGillivray, of Gore Bay. The thanks of the Society arc due Mr. Mutchmor, who boarded the missionary free of charge.

NORTH-WEST.

SASKATOON.

Wm. S. Heron.

Saskatoon, the headquarters of the Temperance Colonization Company, is beautifully situated on the right bank of the South Saskatchewan River, and is about one hundred and sixty miles north of Regina.

The district is well adapted for farming purposes, but owing to the drought of the past six years the farmers have become great impoverished, and not a few have left the field to seek a home in some more favoured locality.

The four stations belonging to the field are: Saskatoon, Bingo, Osler and Alvena, covering a strip of country forty miles long by about ten broad. Fortnightly services were held in all the stations. The prople were kind and courteous, always giving the missionary a hearty welcome. Rev. Mr. Carmichael visited two of the stations in September, and dispensed the sacraments, when four new members were added.

LONGLAKETON.

John McNair, B.A.

This field lies along the east of Long Lake, and to the north of the Qu'Appelle River, Assa., N.-W.T. Its three stations lie in the form of a triangle, with Pengarth to the north-west, Strassburg to the north, and Longlaketon to the south.

Strassburg, a Lutheran colony of twenty families, was taken up this summer for the first time. The Sunday school is still conducted by Mr. J. Barron, who teaches the day school. All the services and the prayer-meetings at Longlaketon were well attended.

Rev. J. A. Carmichael, of Regina, dispensed the sacrament of the Lord's Supper in the field, and received sixteen persons into the membership of the Church.

BROADVIEW.

A. E. Hannahson, B.A.

This field is located on the main line of the C.P.R., about ninety miles east of Regina. There are in connection with it three stations: Broadview, Meadow Lee, and Tullah's School. The latter two are in the country, at which services were held fortnightly only. In connection with each station there is a Sabbath school, those in the country being opened up last spring.

Broadview has a population of about one hundred, the majority of whom are Presbyterian, Church of England and Roman Catholic. The country around is yet very thinly settled, owing chiefly to the uncertainty of the crops the past few years, through frost, drought, etc., which has caused many farmers to go to other parts. This year, however, everything has been in abundance, and farmers are quite hopeful for the future.

There has been a growing interest manifested in spiritual things during the summer, especially in the village of Broadview. The young people are indeed very earnest and diligent in Sabbath school and church work, and are anxious that the good work of salvation may continue to progress in their midst.

ARIZONA.

D. Spear, B.A.

This field is situated ninety-three miles west of Winnipeg, and forty miles east of Brandon, on the main line of the C. P. R. It consists of four stations: Sidney, on the railroad; Arizona, eight miles to the south-east; Chipping Hill, fourteen miles east of Arizona—in all of which services were held weekly—and Melbourne, west of Sidney, where occasional services were held.

These are all good farming districts, and the prospects are encouraging.

There is a Presbyterian Sunday school at Chipping Hill and a Union Sunday school at Arizona, both of which are well attended; and also a prayer-meeting at Arizona.

The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed by Rev. Isaac Macdonald, of McGregor—eleven uniting by profession and three by certificate.

CARSSDALE.

J. F. Scott.

This field lies about twenty miles to the north and west of Regina, Assa., and reaches, on its northern limit, the beautiful Qu'Appelle Valley. Two years ago it was separated from Longlaketon, two new appointments being added since separation. There are four stations—Carssdale, Pense, Melbourne and Lumsden. Services at Pense and Lumsden were held in the waiting-rooms of the railroad stations. Service and Sunday school at Lumsden, and also Sunday school at Carssdale, were opened in April and continued through the summer.

Rev. Mr. Carmichael, of Regina, dispensed the sacraments at all stations in September. Thirty-one united with the Church: twenty by profession of faith, and eleven by certificate. Two adults and sixteen children were haptized.

The people of this field are bright, intelligent and progressive settlers, and have shown by their interest in and support of the work that they are grateful to God for His many blessings.

An ordained man has been asked for, and until one is secured the elders at Carssdale station are carrying on the services there.

Total contributions from fields, \$2,176.68; total cost of fields, \$3,369.61; cost to the Society, \$1,075.98; total revenue from all sources, \$3,546.41.

ANNUAL REPORT OF MANITOBA COLLEGE MISSIONARY SOCIETY, 1891-92.

During the past year, the Society has been in a measure fairly successful. Five fields were occupied during the summer of 1891. The expenditure for the fields and other work of the Society was met by collections in the various congregations and by private subscription.

The receipts for the year amounted to \$978.00, and the payments made to \$636.00, leaving a balance to begin the work of another with of \$342.00.

The Society, owing to new regulations and the more considerable length of time in which the fields are to be occupied than formerly, has seen its way only to occupy two fields during the coming year. This may be changed, however, next autumn.

MUSSELBURGH.

This field for the last two years has been supplied by Mr. A. P. Ledingham in the interests of our Society. In the past summer the mission field advanced so as to become self-supporting, thus no longer needing the holp of the Society; the field has been taken over by the Presbytery of Rock Lake.

WEST END MISSION, WINNIPEG.

This mission, situated in the West End of the City, was held for the Society during the last summer by Mr. J. N. McLean, B.A. The students also supplied this station during the winter months on Sabbath evenings and Thursday evenings.

LANSDOWNE.

This field has been supplied by the Missionary Society for the past three years. Mr. W. B. Cumming, B.A., cared for it last summer. This field still requires careful attention from our Society. C. McDiarmid, B.A., is appointed for the present year.

COLLISTON.

This field, situated in the neighbourhood of Prince Albert, was occupied during the last summer by Mr. Geo. Gunn. The work of the summer has been blessed to the removal of some of the difficulties which were found in this field as in all Western fields.

FORT FRANCES.

This field is our eldest one. Situated at the head of Rainy River, it presents unusual difficulty in the way of travel. Mr. A. S. Thompson was the representative of the Seciety there last summer; a serious illness, which we regret, caused his removal from that point. Mr. Hugh Cowan has been appointed to Fort Frances for the present year.

MISSION TO THE LUMBERMEN, 1891-92.

The operations of the mission to the lumbermen cover the regions lying adjacent to the upper waters of the Ottawa and its tributaries. The object of the mission is to give to the men working in the shanties in this vast region the ordinances of religion, and to supply them with wholesome literature. The services are held in every shanty and in all the stopping places, and at the farms where the men are found, and are conducted by ministers and colporteurs commissioned for the purpose. The agents of the mission are warmly welcomed, and the services generally and reverently attended; the books and tracts eagerly looked for, and for the most part thoroughly read. New and profitable topics of thought are thus suggested, and many serious impressions made which, on the testimony of the men themselves, have resulted in a change of life and a permanent turning to the Lord. Thirty-one depots and 113 shanties were visited during the last winter. The total income of the mission was \$411.16; the total expenditure, including books, tracts and salaries, \$403.80; cash on hand, \$7.36.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

At the last meeting of Committee interesting reports were given by several of the members of Committee as to the formation of Young People's Home Mission Societies, and it was agreed to direct the special attention of all the members to the resolution adopted by the Executive in October last, as follows:—

In regard to the establishment of Young People's Home Mission Societies sanctioned by the last General Assembly, the Committee earnestly request the representative of the Home Mission Committee in each Presbytery to take steps at the earliest date to have a Young People's Society organized in every Congregation within the bounds.

Reports sent the Convener from Presbyteries, in regard to the organizing of such Societies during the year, indicate as follows:—

That in six Presbyteries Societies are already organized in several of the congregations: in other Presbyteries no action has been taken: while in some, the matter has been under consideration, and steps taken to have them organized. In certain cases, the Society has been affiliated with the Christian Endeavour Society, and the feeling seems to prevail, that if the latter Society would adopt the Home Mission work as one of its objects, if not the main object, the end would be gained in this way. There are already so many Young People's Societies of different kinds, that in many congregations it is difficult to add another. One report says, it is hard to bring the Christian Endeavour into line with the proposed Missionary Society, "as the young people think they have more freedom as they are."

The following is the Constitution of the Young People's Societies. Copies can be had by congregations applying for them, from Rev. Dr. Reid, Toronto:—

CONSTITUTION OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY (AUXILIARY TO THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE) OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA.

CONGREGATIONAL SOCIETY.

When the young people of a congregation wish to organize a Young People's Home Missionary Society, they shall signify their desire to the Session, and, on obtaining its consent, the pastor shall arrange for a meeting with the view of organizing. The following shall be the Constitution:—

ARTICLE I.—The name of the Society shall be the Young People's Home Missionary Society of the Congregation of——.

ARTICLE II. - Objects. - The objects of the Society shall be :-

- 1. The diffusing of information concerning the mission work of the Church, and more especially that done within our own country.
- 2. The cultivation of the devotional spirit among the members, and the discussion of missionary topics,
 - 3. The collection of missionary funds.

ARTICLE III,—Members.—The Society shall be composed of those young people being members or adherents of the congregation who earol as members and pay an annual fee of ——. Existing Young People's Societies may be affiliat... on adopting Article II. as part of their Constitution.

ARTICLE IV.—Officers.—The officers shall be as follows:—Honorary President, the pastor; President, two Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Committee of five members. These shall form the Executive, of whom seven shall make a quorum.

ARTICLE V.—The duties of the President, Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary and Cominittee shall be those commonly devolving upon persons filling similar offices.

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence with the Presbyterial and Synodical Society, and whatever other correspondence may be necessary for the furtherance of the work.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all fees of members, hold all funds contributed for the objects of the Society, and forward the same as directed to the Treasurer of the Presbyterial Society, or, in the event of there not being a Presbyterial Society, to the Treasurer of the Church.

ARTICLE VI.—The regular meetings of the Society shall be held as agreed upon. A special meeting may be called at any time by the President, on the request of three members.

The annual meeting shall be held on the ——day of ————. At this meeting reports shall be given in, by the Corresponding Secretary and the Treasurer, of the year's work; the money on hand shall be allocated to the Schemes of the Church, especially Home Mission and Augmentation; and the officers for the ensuing year shall be elected. A copy of the annual report shall also be sent to the Session, and to the Secretary of the Presbyterial Society.

PRESBYTERIAL SOCIETY.

When three congregations in the bounds of a Presbytery shall have organized Young People's Home Missionary Societies, they shall form themselves into a Presbyterial Society when the consent of Presbytery shall have been obtained.

ARTICLE II.—The members shall be the officers of the various congregational societies. In addition to these, each congregational society may appoint a delegate for every twenty members. Seven members present shall form a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE III.—The officers shall be:—a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and Committee of three members. These shall form the Executive, and five shall be a quorum.

ARTICLE IV.—The object of the Society shall be the promotion of the interests of the mission work done in our own country, by seeking to have all the young people of the congregations of the Presbytery organized, by disseminating missionary intelligence and awakening interest in the work of the Church among our young people.

Special meetings in the interests of the Society may be arranged for in the congregations throughout the bounds of the Presbytery.

ARTICLE VI.—The Corresponding Secretaries of the Congregational Societies shall send a written report of their year's work to the Corresponding Secretary of their Presbyterial Society at least ten days before its annual neeting, and he shall prepare therefrom his annual report, which, when adopted, shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Synodical Society and to the Clerk of the Presbytery.

ARTICLE VII.—At this meeting the Treasurer shall submit a full statement of money received, and the allocation of the same, and shall forward it to the Treasurer of the Synodical Society. Until such Synodical Society shall have been organized, the money shall be forwarded to the Treasurer of the Church.

In the event of Congregational Societies not allocating their funds to the Schemes, the Presbyterial Society shall do so.

Until a Society in the Synod shall have been organized, the Presbyterial report shall be sent direct to the Convener of the Home Mission Committee of the Church in time for the March meeting of that Committee.

SYNODICAL SOCIETY.

When two or more Presbyteries shall have been organized, application shall be made to the Synod to organize a Young People's Home Missionary Society for the Synod, and, its consent having been obtained, a society shall be organized with the following Constitution:—

ARTICLE 1.—This Society shall be called the Young People's Home Missionary Society of the Synod of —————.

ARTICLE II.—Members.—The members shall be the officers of the several Presbyterial Societies, together with the President or a duly appointed member from each Congregational Society.

Any person paying at one time the sum of \$20 shall become a life-member.

ARTICLE III.—The officers of the Society shall be:—A President, two or more Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. These officers, together with seven members chosen, shall form the Executive Committee. Five members of the Executive shall be a quorum.

ing People's sen the conARTICLE IV.—The annual meeting shall be held at such time and place as shall be appointed, at which the officers shall be elected, reports given in from the Presbyterial Societies, and from the Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer of the Synod's Society. The annual meeting shall be held in time to report to the Home Mission Committee at its meeting in March. A special meeting may be called by the President at the request of five members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V.—The General Assembly's Home Mission Committee shall take the supervision of the work relating to these Congregational, Presbyterial and Synodical Societies.

PUBLICATION COMMITTEE.

A Publication Committee of three members shall be appointed by the Home Mission Committee (Western Section), which, by correspondence with Presbyteries and Missionaries, shall prepare and distribute monthly, to Congregational Societies, missionary intelligence.

The Corresponding Secretary of each Congregational Society shall furnish items of interest to that Committee, so that all the members may be kept informed of the mission work done within the bounds of our own Church.

MISCELLANEOUS.

GRANTS FROM BRITISH CHURCHES.

During the past year £200 has been received from the Free Church of Scotland, besides a few individual donations, and £150 from the Church of Scotland.

EXTRA-MURAL SESSION AND SALARIES.

The Executive in October last adopted the following resolution, and under it appointed Mr. Alexander McGregor to Buffalo Lake in the Presbytery of Regina:—

That Students who have completed their second year in Theology and who accept appointments for a period of at least one year under the regulation of last General Assembly respecting an extra-mural session, shall receive, until they have passed their examination in the extra-mural session, the salary given to unordained men labouring continuously for one year in a field.

. At the meeting in March last, it was moved that the action of the Executive be sustained. In amendment it was moved by Dr. Robertson, seconded by Mr. Farquharson,

That the claim of \$6 per Sabbath for Buffalo Lake for the past half-year be granted, so as to make the salary of the missionary that of an ordained missionary.

A vote being taken, 4 voted for the amendment and 21 for the motion, which was declared carried. Dr. Robertson dissented from the finding of the Committee and intimated his intention to appeal to the General Assembly.

PROPOSED SYNOD IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

At the last meeting of Committee, Mr. P. McF. McLeod, in name of the Presbytery of Columbia, intimated that it was in contemplation to divide the present Presbytery into three, and to form a Synod for the Province. The Committee expressed its gratification at the statement of Mr. McLeod, indicating as it did the rapid expansion of the work in British Columbia, and their approval generally of the proposal to sub-divide the Presbytery and form a Synod.

PRESBYTERY OF ALGOMA.

The matter of the erection of a new Presbytery, to be composed of congregations and stations at present connected with the Presbyteries of Bruce and Barrie, was also considered. Representatives from the Presbyteries of Bruce, Barrie, Owen Sound, and Maitland were heard, favourable to the erection of the new Presbytery. The Committee expressed its general concurrence in the proposal.

BEQUEST OF THE LATE MR. W. CREAM.

At the meeting of the Executive in October last the Convener reported that he had received a copy of a protest served upon the executors of the estate of the late Mr. W. Cream, of Quebec, by the heirs, to the effect that as there was a community of property between Mr. Cream and his wife, he had no power to will that portion of his estate bequeathed to the Home, French and Foreign Mission Funds of the Church, and restraining the executors from paying said bequests. The matter was referred to Drs. Cochrane and Warden, with instructions to take legal advice and such action as may be necessary, after consultation with the other Mission Boards. The Committee have now to report that a compromise has been effected between the Home, French and Foreign Mission Committees and the heirs of the estate, whereby each of the three Committees was to receive \$1,500 in full of their claim on the estate.

EXECUTIVE FOR 1892-93.

It was agreed to recommend to the General Assembly that the following constitute the Executive for the ensuing year: Revs. Dr. Cochrane, Dr. Warden, Dr. Robertson, Dr. Laing, Dr. Campbell, Messrs. Macdonnell, Somerville, Farries, Gilray and Moodic, and Messrs. Warden King, R. Kilgour and Geo. Rutherford.

AUGMENTATION.

REPORTS FROM PRESBYTERIES.

PRESBYTERY OF QUEBEC.

The state of our angmented congregations continues about the same as last reported, It is very hard to make any reductions in the grants on account of so many of our families constantly leaving the district; in fact, notwithstanding these losses, congregations with much self-denial endeavour to get along without asking anything additional. Our people are liberal according to their means, and do what they can for the support of ordinances. No assistance is given till every congregation is visited and strict enquiry made that they themselves are doing their very utmost towards self-support. But for the Augmentation or some such Fund, whole localities in this region would certainly be without the Gospel. At present three of our augmented congregations are vacant, two of which will be settled soon.

PRESBYTERY OF MONTREAL.

There has been some progress made during the year in regard to the augmented charges in the Presbytery. The congregation of the First Church, Lachute, is now removed from the list, having resolved to meet in full the salary of its pastor. Taylor Church, Montreal, has increased its contributions to the minister's salary by \$50, reducing to this extent the grant from the Fund. In consequence of the death of the Rev. J. Hally, the congregation of St. Therese is now vacant, and is, meantime, meeting in full the expense of supply. It is hoped that St. Louis de Gonzague, which is also vacant, may soon again enjoy the services of a settled pastor. The congregation of Laguerre has greatly lost heart since the withdrawal of its minister, and is virtually now a mission station. The other augmented congregations remain very much as they were a year ago.

PRESBYTERY OF OTTAWA.

This scheme is highly appreciated and cordially supported by the Presbytery. It has produced the most desirable results among us. Another of our congregations has, through its aid, reached a self-sustaining power, and three others have increased their contributions so as to decrease the grant required from the Fund. The Presbytery deeply regrets the embarrassments under which the scheme has laboured, and earnestly hopes that by the increased liberality of the Church it may continue to encourage many a struggling congregation, and cheer the home of many a faithful paster in the future, as it has very markedly done among us in the past.

PRESBYTERY OF LANARK AND RENFREW.

The Presbytery has again to record its appreciation of the benefit of this Fund. Year by year self-sustaining charges have been added to the roll, to the great benefit of Pres-

byterianism within the bounds. This year Ashton and Appleton assume the status of a self-sustaining congregation. Mattawa has been added to the list of supplemented charges, and starts with good prospects. In the other charges there are no changes worthy of note, but satisfactory progress is being made; and, in every case, the spirit of the people is good, and the desire manifested to ask for less assistance as quickly as circumstances will permit.

PRESBYTERY OF GLENGARRY.

There is no material change in the three congregations receiving grants from the Stipend Augmentation Fund. To all three the supplements are still a necessity of their existence. From the reports submitted to the Presbytery all appear to be in a satisfactory condition. Glensandfield and East Hawkesbury have reduced their claim on the Fund by fifty dollars. Apple Hill and Gravel Hill have increased their contributions to salary by twenty-five dollars, while Summerstown, with its small proportion of families, manfully holds its own.

PRESBYTERY OF BROCKVILLE.

Our augmented charges are four in number. Our Augmentation List becomes heavier as our Home Mission List becomes lighter, but we have every reason to believe that, as it has been in the case of the greater majority of our changes, so will it be with our present list, viz.: that in a little while all, or nearly all, will be advanced from the list to the status of self-sustaining charges.

We claim that substantial progress is being made, when we can promote mission

stations to the rank of augmented charges.

The constant aim of Presbytery is to get them past both lists as speedily as possible, and to this end we are successfully operating through the essential assistance of the Augmentation Scheme.

The ministers and, as a rule, the congregations of this Presbytery are loyal to the scheme, and fully convinced of its invaluable service in the cause of Church Extension.

Of the twenty-one settled charges constituting this Presbytery, no fewer than fifteen have been more or less indebted to the Augmentation Fund, since its inception nine years ago.

PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON.

Augmented Congregations.—All these (8) were visited by deputations appointed in the interests of the Augmentation Fund.

An increase in the amount of stipend, and so a corresponding decrease in grant required from the Fund, was made by the following congregations: Camden and Newburgh, \$50; Lansdowne, etc., \$40; St. Columba and St. Paul, \$25; the appointment of an ordained missionary to Picton makes a further reduction of \$15. In grants.

The grant to Camden (8th) and Tamworth (asked for six months), has been reduced from \$300 per annum to \$250, and that to Trenton (for one year) from \$250 to \$200. The Augmentation Fund has thus been relieved to the extent of \$340. Further reduction will probably be made at an early date.

PRESBYTERY OF PETELBOROUGH.

It is to be regretted that though a few of our congregations responded to the appeal for more liberal contributions to this Fund, a larger number have shown little interest in its success. This seems all the stranger when its eminently useful and practical charac-

Our aug the list in th ter has been so clearly exhibited in the lifting up of two of its mission stations into the position of augmented charges, with the prospect of their shortly becoming self-sustaining.

Havelock has become an augmented charge, as has Janetville, Ballyduff and Pontypool. At Pontypool, which has only been occupied as a mission station for two years, a church has been built. The only other change has been the addition of \$50 to the minister's salary by Springville and Bethany.

PRESBYTERY OF WHITPY.

There is only one augmented charge within the bounds, that of Newcastle. During the year this congregation has, with the aid received from the Fund, met all its obligations and made some necessary improvements in the church, and has promised to reduce, next year, the amount asked from the Fund.

PRESBYTERY OF LINDSAY.

The claims of Augmentation have been presented to every congregation, both through the Presbytery and by private letters from the Convener.

The amount contributed, as far as reported, \$220, is less than that of last year. The reasons indicated in the Report on Home Missions operated against this scheme also during this year.

Fenelon Falls has been taken from the list, having become self-supporting. But as soon as Mr. Neilly is settled at Sunderland a supplement of \$200 will be asked for; so that practically there is no improvement. Of course Sebright, etc., has been taken off the list, but is added to the list of mission stations, and now receives \$150 per year instead of \$300; but this is different from becoming self-sustaining.

An appeal was made to every congregation within bounds for an addition to Augmentation contributions; but only \$15 of the \$25 asked for has been reported.

Augmentation at Fenelon Falls has done a positive injury to the cause of Augmentation in this Presbytery; congregations use it as an excuse for illiberality.

PRESHYTERY OF TORONTO.

There are six congregations receiving aid from the Fund. During the past year there was very little change in these charges. All are being well worked, and most of them, we believe, will before long be more than self-sustaining. Patience is required now, as times are very much changed, especially in the city. Contributions to the Fund are quite as liberal as in the past, and we are hopeful for the future of this Fund. There are those who love our Zion too well to let this important work fall to the ground.

PRESBYTERY OF BARRIE.

The six congregations which were on the list last year still remain. To them, Parry Sound and Sundridge have been added.

Parry Sound and Sudbury have become settled charges. North Bay and Sundridge are vacant.

Changes are expected which may lead to the union of Knox Church and Guthrie Church, both in the township of Oro, and to the withdrawal of the grants which they now severally receive.

PRESBYTERY OF OWEN SOUND.

Our augmented congregations have been reduced to two, and one of these will be off the list in the very near future.

PRESBYTERY OF SAUGEEN.

Cedurville and Esplin have been on the Augmentation Fund for several years, and sorry to report no progress in consequence of removals from these places.

PRESBYTERY OF ORANGEVILLE.

Grand Valley and South Luther have made progress, and the grant has been reduced. The grant to Rosemont and Mansfield has also been materially reduced. Three mission fields have been placed upon the list of augmented congregations.

PHESNYTERY OF HAMILTON.

Progress has been made during the year. Haynes Ave., St. Catharines and St. David's, Blackheath, etc.; Nelson and Dundas streets have become self-sustaining. Niagara, St. Ann's and Smithville, and Cayuga and Mt. Healey, have each advanced \$50. The total reduction in the Presbytery amounts to \$350 per annum. On the other hand the grant to Waterford has been increased \$50. We would feel like congratulating ourselves if the strong congregations in the Presbytery took a more practical interest in the Fund. We regret the feeble, unwilling support accorded this most important Fund.

PRESBYTERY OF PARIS.

Mount Pleasant and Burford have made gratifying progress during the past year. In addition to the reduction of the grant to \$100, the debt has been removed from the manse. This burden having been removed, it is expected that this congregation, in a short time, will reach the status of a self-sustaining charge. Since the meeting of last Assembly two augmented charges have been added to this Presbytery. Alberton has been transferred from the Presbytery of Hamilton to that of Paris, and united with Onondaga, forming an augmented charge, to receive a grant of \$100. By mutual agreement the supplemented charge of Waterford and Windham Centre has been transferred by the Synod from the Presbytery of Hamilton to that of Paris. There are, therefore, now three augmented charges within the bounds, viz.: Mount Pleasant and Burford, Onondaga and Alberton, and Waterford and Windham Centre.

PRESBYTERY OF LONDON.

The number of augmented congregations in this Presbytery is larger than is desired, although the proportion is not greater than in other Ontario Presbyteries. As a matter of fact they are being worked more efficiently under this Fund, with settled pastors, and at less cost than when they were mission stations. No pains is spared by the Presbytery to develop the liberality of the assisted charges, which themselves contribute for stipend at the average rate of \$7.66 per communicant.

PRESHYTERY OF CHATHAM.

Matters are much the same as last year. Duart and Dawn have been reducing indebtedness on their manses. Some of the augmented charges have been weakened by removals.

PRESDYTERY OF SARNIA.

In the management of the supplemented congregations, the Presbytery exercises the greatest care in order that its demands on the funds of the Committee may be as little as possible. To this end the state of each congregation is very carefully enquired into every year, and whenever possible augmented congregations are strengthened by the addition or opening up of new stations. Black Creek and Guthrie Church, which formerly received a supplement of \$300, has while vacant at least been made self-sustaining by the opening up of a new station.

In the same way the grant to Alvinston has been reduced from \$200 to \$50, with the expectation that this will be needed no longer than for one year. On the other hand, two vacant congregations recently settled. Corunna and Moretown, and Mandaumin, have been put on the list, with a supplement of \$50 each for one year. Oil Springs and Oil City, and Point Edward, have the same supplement as in the past year. With the exception of Point Edward it is expected that all our augmented congregations will be self-sustaining in a year or two. The prospects for Point Edward are exceedingly gloomy. The probability is that owing to the opening of St. Clair Tunnel both the town and congregation will disappear.

PRESBYTERY OF HURON.

The augmented congregations in this Presbytery are two, the same as last year. There is a marked improvement as to increase of members and contributions in Bayfield and Bethany. Grand Bend and Corbett is also in advance of last year.

PRESBYTERY OF MAITLAND.

During the past year two changes have taken place in the augmented congregations. Langsido became vacant by the resignation of Rev. D. Davidson, who is about to retire from the active duties of the ministry. The Presbytery has attempted to unite this congregation with a neighbouring one, but the efforts made have not proved successful. Dungannon and Port Albert have gained ground, and a reduction of \$50 has been made in the grant asked for the coming year, with the full belief that the congregations will make a corresponding increase in their payments towards stipend. In Pine River and Belgrave there is no change to note.

PRESBYTERY OF BRUCE.

In regard to augmentation we cannot report any improvement. In giving to this Fund our congregations are behind in their duty. Why this scheme of our Church, that is known to have been of very great benefit in many quarters, should be so unpopular, as clders sometimes represent it to be, we cannot tell. It certainly should not be. It is but carrying out in this department of Church work the Christian principle, the strong should help the weak, especially so when we know that the weak are doing all they can for themselves.

MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST,

AUGMENTED CONGREGATIONS IN THE SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST.

Transmitted by Dr. Robertson.

The augmented congregations in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories made a more decided advance last year than any year since the Synod was organized. In April of 1891 there were 24 congregations on the Augmented List, and during the year 13 more were added. Nine congregations, however, became self-sustaining,

Of the congregations that became self-sustaining, two belonged to the Presbytery of Winnipeg, three to Rock Lake and four to Of the congregations still on the list, five belong to Winnipeg, one to Rock Lake, eight to Brandon, four to Minnedosa, five to Regina, two to Calgary and three to The number of stations connected with these congregations is 67, churches Columbia. The families number 1,287, the young people not connected 33, and manses 9. with these families, 285; and the communicants, 1,811. The people promise for the support of their pasters, \$20,350, allowing \$100, the value of a manse for a year, or at the rate of \$11.17 per communicant. The amount promised from the Augmentation Fund is \$5,625, or at the rate of \$200.90 per congregation. The average last year was \$227.50, and the preceding year \$241.66. In view of the higher salary promised in the West, owing to the higher cost of living there, grants will be seen to be very moderate. It should be stated at this time, when this Fund fails to command the hearty support of the whole Church, that it has been of great service in helping forward the cause of Presbyterianism in Western Canada. Over thirty congregations have been helped already towards self-support in the West through this Fund, and a number more will follow in a few years. That it is truly a Home Mission Fund with us will be seen when it is borne in mind that outposts like Edmonton and Prince Albert, Kamloops and Chilliwack share This fund helps many a congregation to support a pastor that without its in its bounty. help could not secure a pastor at all.

A brief statement for each Presbytery is submitted.

PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG.

Since the last report Scikirk and Fort William became self-sustaining congregations. Scikirk is growing steadily under the pastoral care of Mr. Sutherland, and promises to become a good charge. The town of Fort William has grown much during the past two years, and the congregation participated in the prosperity. For some time the congregation was staggering under a large floating debt, which was removed last winter, thus encouraging and uniting the people for fresh effort. Blythfield can make no material progress till the vacant lands in the neighbourhood are occupied. Good work is being done. Emerson is growing and promises soon to become self-sustaining. Morris, Dominion City and Milbrook have called efficient and popular pastors, and the outlook is promising. Dominion City is building a manse this season. These 5 congregations have 11 stations, 5 churches, 1 manse, 219 families, 8 single persons and 316 communicants. Including \$100 allowed for a manse, the people promise \$3,350 for pastoral support, or \$10.42 per communicant. The average amount per congregation promised from the Augmentation Fund is \$220.

PRESBYTERY OF ROCK LAKE.

Three of the augmented congregations in this Presbytery became self-sustaining last year, leaving only one on the list. Miami, Boisserain and Deloraine, which passed off the list, have developed strength and promise well. Miami has recently called a pastor. Marringharst (now called Belmont), which remains on the list, is divided, Belmont, Baldar and Hautly forming the congregation, and the other stations being erected into a mission field. Belmont built a comfortable church last year. The congregation has 3 stations, 1 church, 1 manse, 50 families, 4 single persons and 65 communicants. Including \$100 for manse, the people promise \$700 towards salary, or \$10.77 per communicant, and require to get \$200 from the Augmentation Fund, when a minister is settled, to enable them to give the minimum stipend.

PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON.

No Presbytery in the Synod has made more gratifying progress than Brandon. In 1884, when the Synod was formed, this Presbytery embraced the territory now embraced in four Presbyteries—Brandon, Minnedosa, Regina and Calgary. Within the present boundaries of the Presbytery there were then 2 self-sustaining congregations, 2 augmented congregations and 9 missions; now 12 self-sustaining congregations, 8 angmented and 12 missions, with the prospect of a decided advance this season. Wawawa, which became self-sustaining, built a church during the summer, Souris a manse, and Oak Lake is enlarging its church and building a church at the Haggard station.

Chater's progress has been retarded by autumn frosts, which did considerable damage to crops. The congregation is taking steps to build a manse this summer. MacGregor is growing and strengthening. A church was built at the Beaver Creek station (now Hampden). Petrel has advanced but little owing to crop losses. Rounthwaite is growing steadily. Church built last summer. Treherne built a commodious manse, and the congregation is increasing and crowding the church, and making an enlargement necessary. Holland is gradually improving its record; its average for stipend is the highest in the Presbytery. Hartney called Mr. S. Polson, and is doing well. A manse was built last summer. Roscland is formed by the union of Roseland, Kemnay and Hayfield, and promises to make a good congregation. At Hayfield and Kemnay churches are being built this summer. The 8 congregations now on the list have 27 stations, 12 churches, 2 manses, 360 families, 60 young persons and 572 communicants. The stipend promised is \$6,050, including \$200 allowed for 2 manses, or at the rate of \$10.57 per communicant, and the aid promised from the Augmentation Fund per congregation is \$137.50.

PRESBYTERY OF MINNEDOSA.

The country forming this Presbytery may be said to be the Highlands of Manitoba, and, fertile though the soil is, it is better adapted for grazing than grain raising. The growth of congregations will here be slower than further south. Birtle has been at a standstill owing to financial depression, and our congregation has simply held its own. Rosedale has made good progress during the year, increasing its families and communicants very considerably. Shanks is on the list for the first time. Its families number 52 and its communicants 82. During the year a church was built, and the congregation promises well. Hamiota, like Shanks, is on the line of the Manitoba Central Railway, and is strong in numbers and position. A church is being built this season. These 4 congregations have 10 stations, 4 churches and 1 manse. Families connected with them, 214; young persons, 34, and communicants, 285. The stipend promised with manse is \$2,400, or \$8.42 per communicant, and the average aid promised each congregation is \$143.75.

PRESBYTERY OF REGINA.

This Presbytery has made a decided gain during the year, families and communicants having increased in every congregation. The financial record has also improved. To the four congregations previously on the list, Indian Head has been added. The Prince Albert people are working unitedly and heartily in the advancement of the best interests of the congregation. A substantial brick church, costing over \$4,000, was built last year. The Mossejaw congregation built a comfortable brick manse, and is a flourishing condition. Mr. Ferry resigned Qu'Appelle lately, and the congregation is now vacant. Mossomin has enlarged its church and nearly doubled its communion roll. The Fleming station built a new church, and is growing. Indian Head called J. K. Welsh, and contributes at the

rate of \$17.85 per communicant towards his support. The way in which the lands of the Bell Farm are held militates against the growth of settlement, but the congregation is increasing steadily. These five congregations have 9 stations, 6 churches, 2 manses, 242 families, 73 persons not connected with these families, and 307 communicants. The amount promised for salary is, including manses, \$3,800, or \$12.60 per communicant. The average amount promised to each congregation from the Augmentation Fund is \$240.

PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY.

The congregations in this Presbytery have made no perceptible advance. The inflow of settlers to the Saskatchewan valley will likely add to the strength of the Edmonton congregation for the future. The congregation is taking steps to Prild a manse this year. Medicine Hat congregation is not likely to grow much until the coal in the neighbourhood is mined, and the farming and grazing lands in the vicinity are occupied. In both congregations faithful work is being done, and the financial record is improving. Edmonton increased its contribution to salary \$300, reducing its claim on the Augmentation Fund \$100. These congregations have 3 stations, 2 chorches, and 1 manse, 72 families, 31 persons not belonging to these families, and 106 communicants. The salary promised, including manse, is \$1,550, or at the rate of \$14.62 per communicant. The average grant from the Augmentation Fund per congregation is \$325.

PRESBYTERY OF COLUMBIA.

This Presbytery had only Kamloops on its list last year; and Mt. Pleasant and Chilliwhack were added this spring. The Kamloops congregation, owing to a depression prevailing in the place, has not grown any during the year. Its organization, however, is better, and its contributions for Church Schemes are a sign of healthiness. Should Chilliwhack get a sui able pastor, as is likely, it will soon be self-sustaining. Mt. Pleasant is a suburb of Vancouver, and a missionary was put in charge last December. About 60 families were gathered and organized. A site for a church was purchased, and a building is now erected, although not finished. As that part of the city is growing, and the pastor active and popular, it is likely that the congregation will soon be off the list. Connected with these 3 congregations are 4 stations, 3 churches, 1 manse, 130 families, 75 single persons not connected with these families, and 160 communicants. The amount promised for stipend, including \$100 for manse, is \$2,500 or \$15.66 per communicant, and the average aid promised from the Augmentation Fund \$266.66 per congregation.

RESBYTERIAL REPORTS FROM THE NORTH-WEST AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON.

There have been on the List during the past year eleven distinct charges, embracing about thirty separate congregations. Of these charges, three were put on the List during the year and four have become self-sustaining.

Glenboro' no longer requires aid from this Fund; but, with its 60 families and 110 communicants, is both able and willing to holp itself.

Wawanesa has been less than six months on the Augmented List. It passed from the rank of a mission station to that of an augmented charge when the present pastor was settled in November last, and on the first of April it was left to its own resources with the full consent of both pastor and people.

Souris has been self-supporting since September last. Owing to some recent changes in the field, it has probably been financially weakened, and, as a precautionary measure, a small grant has been asked for the present year. The charge is at present without a pastor, and it is believed that should a happy settlement be effected soon, even this small grant will not be required.

Oak Lake has not only become self-sustaining, but at the same time has consented that Griswold, one of its strongest stations, should be cut off; which, when added to one of our aid-receiving mission fields, has had the effect of making that field self-sustaining also.

Chater has had its grant reduced, and has also lost one station—Rugby, which has gone to strengthen another field. There are only 34 families in the charge; and when we remember that they are giving at the rate of \$18 per family for stipend alone, we can readily acknowledge their claims on this Fund. A still further reduction in the grant is made for the current year.

Rounthwaite is developing rapidly under good pastoral care. The supplement is now reduced to \$150, and will probably be dispensed with within a year. There are 38 families in this charge, which contribute an average of \$21 per family for the support of the ainister.

Holland was transferred to the List in July last, with a grant of \$250 per annum. The grant has already been reduced, and with one good year may be altogether cut off The field is not, however, very strong numerically, having only 29 families and 43 communicants.

Petrel has suffered more from failure of crops for the last two or three years than perhaps any other charge in this Presbytery. Only for this the grant would by this time have entirely disappeared. As things are, the Presbytery has asked the small grant of \$100 for the present year, hoping that further aid may not be required.

Treherne is making rapid progress, and will, we feel assured, look for no outside aid beyond the present year.

McGregor is now getting only \$100 a year from the Augmentation Fund; and seeing it has within its bounds at least fifty good, substantial families, the Presbytery expects the field to take care of itself after the present year, unless there is some division of territory that may postpone for a year or two that desirable result.

Hartney, formerly known as "Whitewater Mission Field," was settled early in the present year and put on the Augmented List with a grant of \$200 a year; * This, like the

It will thus be seen that in no past year has this class of charges made such progress as in the one just closed, and the Presbytery has every reason to hope that every charge at present on the List will be self-sustaining in two years.

PRESBYTERY OF REGINA.

Prince Albert.—Settled since last report. New church erected and congregation prospering; expected next year to be self-sustaining.

Moosejaw.-Grant lowered. Manse erected during the year.

Qu'Appelle Station. - Settled with grant of \$350, but now again vacant.

Mossomin.—Grant lowered. An addition put to the Church; expects to throw off next year the very small grant now given.

Indian Head.—Settled again in July last, when it was detached from surrounding stations and formed into one charge, where regularity of attention has told in favour of the progress of the work. Church building seated and improved.

PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY.

Edmonton lowers this year its demand upon the Fund and is expected before long to be self-sustaining. A manse is likely to be erected there this ensuing summer.

Two congregations—Medicine Hat and Edmonton are on the Fund. During the year, no great progress has been made in either case. The growth of population has not been great. Both are struggling with, and out of, debt, and both with hopeful outlook for next year.

REPORT OF SUB-COMMITTEE ON AUGMENTATION.

The foregoing reports from Presbyteries show how the Augmentation Fund is regarded in all parts of the territory under the supervision of the Committee. From Quebec comes the statement that "but for the Augmentation or some such Fund, whole localities in this region would certainly be without the Gospel." Dr. Robertson testifies that in the West the Fund "helps many a congregation to support a pastor, that without its help could not secure a pastor at all." Similar testimony has been borne year after year by those who have had charge of this portion of the Church's work all along the line from Quebec to Victoria.

At the same time the fact romains that, but for the share of Mrs. Nicholls' legacy, which was devoted to Augmentation (viz., \$8,000), the income would have fallen hopelessly short of the expenditure, and a large deduction from the grants would have been inevitable. At the date of the meeting of the Home Mission Committee, in March, it was estimated that, even should the whole amount of the legacy be expended, there would still be a deficit of \$1,500, and members of Committee undertook to raise in their respective Presbyteries special amounts (ranging from \$25 to \$500) in order to make up the deficiency.

The response to the appeal which was made by members of Committee in fulfilment of their undertaking has been most gratifying. It is impossible to state with exactness what was given on account of this special appeal, because in a few instances the ordinary contributions of congregations to the Fund were included in the amounts sent; but it is within the mark to say that instead of \$1,500 upwards of \$3,000 was realized over and above the ordinary contributions. The Presbyteries of Montreal and Barrie deserve special mention, the former having sent \$1,112 and the latter \$123, on account of the deficit. In several other instances the amounts sent greatly exceeded the sums which members of Committee had undertaken to raise.

The result is that, after grants have been paid in full, there remains \$2,500 of the

legacy still unused, and the outlook for the coming year is hopeful.

An overture from the Home Mission Committee, asking that Synods take oversight of the work of Augmentation, has been most heartily approved by the Synods of Hamilton and London, Toronto and Kingston, and Montreal and Ottawa. Should the General Assembly endorse the proposed course of action, it is reasonable to expect that such oversight on the part of Synods will increase the interest of congregations in the scheme. and will tend to promote the equitable and economical administration of the Fund.

It thus appears that, owing to the stimulus given by this Fund. no fewer than 199 congregations have been enabled to reach the self-sustaining point during the past nine years. That as many as 55 congregations have been removed from the list, though not self-supporting (many of them having been transferred to the list of Mission Stations), is an indication of the care and discrimination which have been exercised by Presbyteries and by the Committee, and is an answer to the charge which has been sometimes made that the Fund is used to keep unsuitable men in congregations which would become self-sustaining under a change of ministry.

It is not to be expected that the claims on the Fund will be lessened during the next few years. The number of congregations now on the list is 147, as compare I with 145 in April, 1891. There were 23 congregations removed from the list during the year, and 25 added to it. The amount of grants paid during the year, ending 31st March, 1892, was \$27,028.72, as compared with \$24,831.30 paid during the preceding year. We ought to welcome this increase, for it means the consolidation of our mission work—it means the promoting of many mission stations, especially in the North-West, to the rank of settled pastoral charges receiving temporary aid from this Fund. It is hard, however, to welcome the expansion of our work in the face of an insufficient revenue and repeated deficits requiring special efforts to meet them.

The whole amount required annually is about \$30,000, in order to give grants averaging \$200 to, say, 150 congregations. One would think that it ought not to require much pleading or a great deal of machinery to secure a fair proportion of this modest

sum from each Presbytery in the Western Section of the Church. May not the Committee accept the recent response to the appeal made in order to secure the payment of grants in full as an indication that the Church, as a whole, does not think the minimum stipend too high, and that it will deal more generously than in some past years with the weaker charges?

MISCELLANEOUS.

BEQUEST OF THE LATE MRS. NICHOLLS.

The Committee at its meeting in March, agreed to use for Augmentation purposes \$8,000 of the bequest left by the late Mrs. Nicholls, of Peterborough. It having been found that there would (even with this amount added to the Fund) be a probable deficit of \$1,500 at the close of the financial year, it was resolved that the sum of \$30 be deducted from the grant due for the past half-year to each settled augmented charge in Ontario and Quebec, and the sum of \$40 from the grant due to each settled augmented charge in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West.

At a later stage, this resolution was rescinded, and the members of the Committee agreed to raise in their respective Presbyteries special amounts to make up the deficiency. The amounts thus promised being sufficient to remove the estimated deficit, it was agreed, to withhold payment of the grants for the past six months (October to March) till end of April, in the hope that the state of the Fund would then admit of them being paid in full. The Committee are given to say that this was done, and a balance left at the credit of the Fund after all the claims were paid.

MODIFICATION OF REGULATIONS.

It was agreed to recommend the General Assembly to authorize the Committee, in October, to reduce, if necess "y, the grant for the half-year then ending, on the following scale: In congregations in Quebec and Ontario, \$25; and in congregations in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West and exceptional cong. gations in towns and cities, \$30; with similar reductions in March also, if necessary.

It was further agreed to recommend the General Assembly to amend the regulations under which the Augmentation scheme is administered, as follows: That to entitle congregations to receive aid there be required an average contribution of \$8 per family, as well as \$4.50 per communicant, and a total contribution of \$450 and a manse, instead of \$400 and a manse as heretofore, the latter to refer to congregations hereafter to be placed on the list of aid-receiving charges; that the regulation restricting the grant from the Fund to \$300 per annum be amended so as to read \$250 per annum; and that hereafter the salary of pastors of augmented congregations in Manitoba and the North-West be \$850 per annum, together with a manse, and \$950 per annum where there is no manse.

co-operation of Synods in the practical working of the Augmentation scheme; (2) the feasibility of securing the formation of a guarantee fund in the interests of Augmentation, and (3) to formulate such other suggestions as may appear to them necessary in the interest of the Fund. The Committee was further instructed to prepare an overture to be transmitted to the several Synods in the western district, and report to the Home Mission Committee at a meeting to be held prior to the meeting of Assembly in Montreal.

The following parties were appointed to support the overture before the several Synods: Montreal and Ottawa,—Drs. Campbell, Warden, and Mr. Warden King; Toronto and Kingsten,—Mr. D. J. Macdonnell, Dr. Hossack and Mr. Robert Kilgour; Hamilton and London,—Drs. Laing, Cochrane and Mr. G. W. Rutherford.

*The total receipts for Home Missions as given in the financial statement is \$78,741.44. Of this amount, however, \$8,000 was transferred to Augmentation, and appears in the financial statement of that fund.

CONCLUSION.

While the Report as a whole is exceedingly gratifying, it should be borne in mind that the ordinary contributions to the Home Mission Fund for the year have barely met the expenditure, while those for Augmentation are far behind. This year the North-West and British Columbia received \$37,390 for Mission Stations and Augmented congregations. Should arrangements be made to give full supply in winter as well as in summer to the stations in the North-West and British Columbia, an additional outlay at least of \$10,000 (for Home Missions) must be met. The Committee would therefore again notify Presbyteries, Missionaries, and Augmented congregations that while the grants made are the amounts which, in the judgment of the Committee, are necessary for the efficient working of the fields and Augmented congregations, this Committee can only disburse the money placed at its disposal by the Church, and earnestly appeals to Presbyteries to adopt means to secure largely increased contributions on belalf of the fund from the congregations within their bounds.

The Committee would also remind congregations that they can very materially reduce the amount of interest paid on the large sums borrowed in October for claims then due, by forwarding their contributions as they are received, to the Agent of the Church, instead of withholding them till the end of the financial year.

APPENDIX No. 2.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE. 1891-92.

(EASTERN SECTION.)

The work under the charge of the Home Mission Committee of Assembly for the Eastern Section of the Church has been carried on systematically and carefully by Presbyterics and the agents on the roll of the Committee during the past year. Ninety-seven men, forty-two ordained and fifty-five catechists, have for periods of varying length, and in many places, been scattering the seed of the Kingdom, and He who hath said "My word shall not return unto Me void," has made it productive of "glory to God in the highest and on earth peace."

A brief statement concerning each Presbytery will present to Assembly some facts that will enable the Court to realize the importance of this work:—

PRESBYTERY OF SYDNEY .-- Six catechists were at work in this Presbytery last summer and one during the winter. Two of the seven labored in vacant congregations, viz., John Fraser, at North Shove and North River, and A. K. McLennan at South Gut and Englishtown. Both of these congregations are aiming at a speedy settlement. Indeed the former has now Both of these congregations are aiming at a speedy settlement. Indeed the former has now secured Mr. Fraser, who has completed his course of study, as their pastor. In both the people have been wiping out old debts and building new churches, thus preparing for a fresh, vigorous start as self-sustaining charges. Two more, namely, J. B. McKinnon and Archibald McPhail, the former in sunner and the latter in winter, assisted the pastor of Cape North in his wide and truly missionary field. A fifth, John Mackintosh, aided the pastor of Glace Bay to supply his numerous and growing stations with the preaching of the gospel. This congregation has since been divided and the new congregation of Bridgepart. self-sustaining, is in search of a pastor who can preach in both Geric and English. Thus the Home Mission work is building up the weak places, and gradually adding new congregations to our Church. The remaining two occupied strictly mission fields.

Mr. McKay says of Little Bras d'Or:—Three of our families have moved away from this place and none have come in. Although things like these discourage, yet this is a fine field for work. At Groce's Point where there are fifteen families in connection with the mission there are only seven communicants." Of Louisburg Mr. K. J. McDonald writes most encouragingly:—"The families are not numerous, but are engaged in a spirited effort to erect a new church, that, when finished, will accommodate r good-sized congregation which they hope to collect from families in their near neighborhood that are now connected with strong congregations far away from them. It is a promising nucleus of a vigorous congregation, and will repay the fostering care of the Presbytery and the H. M. Committee."

No ordained missionery labored within the bounds of this Presbytery, and only one of the ministers on the Committee's roll of supply spent a few months in one of the vacant

PRESINTERY OF VICTORIA AND RICHMOND.—Three catechists during summer and one in winter were employed in this Preshytery. Baddeck Forks is thus reported by P. K. Macrae: "The field in which I had the privilege to labour for the summer season of 1891 is about six miles from Baddeck. Formerly it and Baddeck formed one congregation under the pastorate of the Rev. Kenneth McKenzie who was obliged to resign his charge on account of ill-health. This field is not by any means difficult to work, as the people are quite compact, There is but one preaching station. but I always had weekly meetings throughout the different sections of the field. The religious element is comparatively high, and the people are exceedingly kind and hospitable. Those who speak the language of Ossian are by far in the majority, so that it will be absolutely necessary to have a man here who can preach in both languages. There are in all about 86 families who contribute more or less towards the mission. But out of this number only 80 actually belong to our Church. The other six being either Methodists or Baptists.

Mr. J. B. McLeun says of Arichat and surrounding places:—"It is hard to know our real strength. In Arichat there is no proper place for meeting in; it is absolutely necessary that we have a building if our aim is effective work. A lady has offered a lot; it remains for the Church to work up enthusiasm in the field and outside with regard to building. There is one district, Madame Island, that should be opened up. It is about three miles from the main island, it has 28 Protestants all told. tion and from other reasons the Protestant clergyman in Arichat has never been in the habit

of visiting it. One service was held by the Presbyterian student this summer; a Sabbath School was started which meets regularly with a good attendance."

In the Margaree Stations Mr. W. C. Morrison labored during summer, and Mr. Wm. A. Morrison during part of the winter. The latter says:—"I am happy to state that although our gatherings were only small, the people have been very regular in their attendance at all the services, and we hope and trust that some have received good and lasting impressions in their better. in their hearts. Family worship is neglected by many in this field, steps to establish the same would be of great benefit."

There were not any ordained missionaries stationed in this Presbytery, but the Committee furnished men for the regular supply of nearly all the vacant charges. The difficulty to be met has been the procuring of laborers capable of preaching in Galic, and it must be confessed that failure not infrequently followed the most earnest efforts. In many places in Cape Breton and in some portions of P. E. Islard the Galic language is indispensable to a successful | storate; and the number of men who can use with ease both it and English is exceedingly 1. nited,—but the Church must struggle on and appeal to the young men of these places, to whom both tongues are familiar, to come forward speedily and meet the want.

PRESBYTERY OF PICTOU, -Five catechists and two ordained missionaries supplied the mission fields of this eradle and centre of Presbyterianism in the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Miller, of Cariboo, and Mr. Smith, of Eureka, say nothing beyond the figures in their statistics. Both, however, had important fields and both supplied them well. The latter is a rapidly growing place, the site of extensive iron works, and this year has an ordained missionary. There is little doubt that it will soon become a thrifty self-supporting congregation.

Concerning Country Harbour and Isaac's Harbour Mr. Donald Fraser says :- "You will observe in this report that there is no charge for board. Mr. Smith, in Country Harbour, and Mr. McLellan, in Isaac's Harbour, make this with their other contributions towards the mission. They deserve special mention and credit for their sacrifices on behalf of the work. This year I held extra services occasionally in Lower Country Harbour and was very much encouraged in that neglected part of the field. Services were always well attended there and the people seem dearrous to get part of the services of the catechist. Hitherto only Upper Country Harbour and Isaac's Harbour were regularly attended to. Services being given to

Lower Country Harbour only now and then at the option of the catechist. I would advise this part of the field especially being attended to."

Mr. McGlashen writes about Mulgrave as follows :- "The situation of the field augurs its importance. It is growing, happily, in Presbyterian direction. Of the Protestant population the large majority is Presbyterian. I think there is an imperative necessity that we put a men in the field during the winter season. Our cause is now in a fairly flourishing condition and if we immediatly occupy the ground during the entire year there would be no call for the other denominations, and ere long, I doubt not, our church would become self-supporting.

Mr. John A. Mackintosh, in a few words, tells of the hunger of the people at Cape George for the Bread of Life:—"This is a field in which the greater part is made up of Roman Catholies. The people appreciate the services of the catechist, as the Protestant church here

is the only one within twenty miles.

Mr. McLeod Harvey and Mr. A. D. Gunn labored as ordained missionaries at Little Harbour and Fisher's Grant and at Barney's River respectively. Progress has been made in both fields in the matter of support, and were it not for the constant drain caused by the emigra-tion of the young people both would soon become pastoral charges. The missionaries believe that the day of self-support is not far distant, and the Committee devoutly prays that the Lord will increase them more and more in numbers as in willing-heartedness to uphold His cause.

This Presbytery had many vacant charges during the year, but it received very few Probationers from the Committee, in consequence of the pernicious habit creeping into our Presbyteries of permitting vacancies wholly to secure their own supply. It is only fair that at least half the supply should be arranged by Presbytery and accepted from the Committee. Unless this is done the men under the direction of the Committee do not get a fair chance of being heard in vacant congregations, and as a result some of the best men available will not put their names on the Committee's roll. Serious attention should be given to this matter, and all Presbyterics should arrange that at least half the preaching in vacant congregations, be furnished by the men who loyally adhere to our rules of order and place themselves at the disposal of the Committee for periodic appointments to the several Presbyteries needing supply.

PRESBYTERY OF WALLACE.—A catechist supplied the small congregation of Linden during the summer, and an ordained missionary had charge of it in connection with Oxford during the winter. Mr. Rainnie, the eatechist says:—"The field is a promising one. With careful management and oversight the field should in a very short time become self-supporting. It seems absolutely essential for the success of our cause that the field should be occupied during the whole year, and that by an ordained man if possible. The older people are still making efforts to keep up supply but have not been very successful. Our people have done well this summer, and may be expected to do better in the future, and if helped now to secure regular supply will be bound to the interests of our Church, and the Covenanters too seem inclined to drift to the Church which will aid them in their time of need. If the Presbytery wish to retain the hold obtained the wants of the field will have to be attended to at once. This summer a new station was opened at Northport where the majority of the families were Covenanters, and large numbers attended the Sabbath services and all seemed favourably disposed towards our Church."

During winter the congregation of Oxford, greatly weakened by financial disasters, was connected with Linden for temporary supply by Rev. Andrew Gray. This conection, though not intended to be permanent, is continued under Mr. Gray for another year.

PRESBYTERY OF TRURO.—Four catechists for the summer formed the mission staff of this Presbytery. River Hebert, long under an ordained missionary, had to be supplied by a catechist on account of the impossibility of securing an ordained man. For the coming year, however, an ordained missionary has been obtained and the field promises well.

Of Harmony Mr. Rattee writes :- "Spiritually, the field is backward. Many are careless, and some three or four, though earnestly entreated, did not attend church during the summer. lut some, who ought to know, tell me there are signs of improvement. Financially the field is growing stronger."

Westchester is thus reported by Mr. Clarence McKinnon, catechist in charge:—"Though no directly calculable evidences of progress have been manifested in the field this summer by fresh additions to the members ip of the church, there have been other signs of a hopeful nature. A deeper interest seems to prevail, as shown in a very vigorously conducted and flourishing Sabbath School, which has been carried on at Greenville, and will be maintained during the winter months as well as in the summer. At Westchester Mountain too, where services are held but seldom during the winter, arrangements have been effected for the maintenance of a union prayer-meeting to be held all the year around. Services were held on alternate Sabbaths at Greenville Station and at Greenville Crossing; this arrangement has been effective in reaching more people than could have been reached had the services been confined to one place. It would be advisable to continue this arrangement in the future.

Mr. Frank Jobb says of North River:—"The field is a hard one to work because it is broken up among different denominations. Some scheme of systematic giving should be introduced, and Upper North River and South Branch should have one place of worship. I think our cause is growing in this field, with occasional supply during the winter, work will be easier during the coming year."

The Presbytery has had two vacancies on its hands a good part of the year and has received supply for them almost entirely from the Committee's roll. It is hoped that both congregations, Stewiacke and Londonderry, will soon obtain suitable pastors. The, present fine fields for the work of energetic men.

PRESHYTERY OF HAIFAX.—In this large Presbytery there were welve catechists and two ordained missionaries at work. Two of the fields supplied by catechists, namely, Musquodoboit Harbor, and Lawrencetown and Cow Bay, are congregatious for whom ordained men could not be secured. Lawrencetown is now settled, and Musquodoboit Harbor is calling the Rev. James Rosborough for several years its pastor in days gone by. Carleton and Cheboque were once a pastoral charge, but for years has been too weak on account of emigration, from Carleton particularly, to come up to the Angmentation minimum. Mr. Thos. Miller has spent the year with them, and there are signs of improvement in the financial strength of the congregation, particularly in the Chebogue section.

Digby and Bay View are not increasing in strength, but there are some most loyal Presbyterians in the place who are unwilling to be abandoned by the Church. The Presbytery, therefore, has asked the Committee to continue its support to this field. Middleton, another scattered station in the western portion of Nova Scotia, presents no bright hope of growth,

but the people are anxious to have services and they cannot be forsaken. St. Croix and Ellershouse are more hopeful stations. Mr. Davis, the catechist reports:—

"The field is encouraging, and a pastor or ordained missionary is needed. Prayermeetings were held every fortnight at Ellershouse and Sweet's Corner, and at both places the state of Christian Endeavor Societies were organized which intend meeting during the winter. church has been repaired at St. Croix, and six were added to the communion roll. It is to be hoped that a settled pastor can be obtained ere long. C. E. prayer-meetings at St. Croix, weekly, are well attended and interesting."

Mt Uniacke and Beaver Bank are poor and difficult to work on account of the distance between the stations. They did well, however, last summer under the energetic labours of Mr. J. B. Astwood.

Salem, &c., are contiguous portions of Shubenacadie and Mailland congregations. Mr. A. M. Thompson officiently assisted the pastors of those charges in these stations. They may some-time grow into a separate congregation. The North West Arm is in the suburbs of

Halifax, and is making slow but gradual progress. Colourg Road is a station opened up in the south-western portion of the city, which is growing rapidly. Two of the catechists, Mr. S. A. Fraser and Dr. Hare, spent the summer in Labrador. They were supported by the Students' Missionary Association, which faithfully cares for the scattered and needy people on that shore. Mr. Fraser by permission of last Assembly, was ordained to dispense ordinances in this field, and he says:—I organized a mission station in Harrington with twenty-five communicants. Received six others into communion station in Harrington with twenty-five communicants. Received six others into communion with the church, five of whom reside at St. Pauls River, and one at St. Augustine. The services of an ordained man are necessary to the prosperity of the work, especially since organization. The prospects are good. Mr. Ross has laboured there during the winter as teacher and evangelist, and with much encouragement. For the coming year Mr. F. W. Thompson has gone thither to labor as an ordained missionary. Wm. McCulloeh Thompson and A. P. Logan labored as ordained missionary. Wm. McCulloeh Thompson and A. P. Logan labored as ordained missionary and Walton are now in a position to call a man as soon as one can be obtained. Suckville and Walton are now in a position to call a man as soon as one can be obtained. Suckville and Walton are now well organized congregation, and may soon be expected to stand alone with a settled pastor. There have been many vacancies in this Presbytery, which the committee assisted 'argely in supplying, not only with preaching, but also in several cases with pustors now happily settled.

PRESBYTERY OF LUNENBURG AND SHELBURNE.—This Presbytery had two catechists and one ordained missionary employed. *Riversulale*, Mr. J. H. Kirk's field contains five stations, and involves much hard work, which he performed with such satisfaction to the people and the Presbytery, that both have earnestly sought his return, and he has been sent to them for another summer.

Mr. Alex. Laird succeeded Mr. Vans in the charge of the Bridgewater out-sections. His work was very satisfactory. He says in his report:—(1) Communicants, 84 in number, have hitherto been included in the returns for Bridgewater, but Presbytery is now separating the e stations from the town, so we make a distinct return; (2) Families returned 54. There are, however, 60 families in which there are Presbyterian members, 40 being altogether Presbyterian; (3) There were no prayer-meetings in existence when I came to the field, and no Sunday Schools, but one union one (Newcomville), and as my stay was short I did not organize any; (4) The population is large and increasing (according to census returns). The field is not over-crowded with other denominations, as many of our stations are.

Mr. Crawford continued his work as ordained missionary at New Dublia, and reported encouraging progress. He says: Not having to supply Molega Mines, as hat year, I have given constant service to New Dublia and Pleusantville. The attendance especially at West Dublia has been gradually increasing. We have had an increase of two families. One of these, in which are two communicants, came from LaHave congregation. Another communicant came to us from Conquerall Bank. Our prayer-meetings and Sabbath-schools have been going on as last year, with a little more than the usual interest in connection with Christian Endeavor work recently started in one of our meetings. During the year the congregation have erected a new church, 45 feet long by 30 feet in breadth, so far at an expense of \$775. The outside is completed in a neat and excellent manner, and it is comf rtable for service, though the inside remains unfinished. Toward the erection of this church and for new organ and stoye, and for lights and bell for the Union Church, West Dublia, our people have raised during last year about \$550.

This Presbytery has suffered severely from the loss of settled pastors by resignation or translation. To only a limited extent however, has the committee been asked to furnish supply, and as yet only one settlement has been effected.

PRESBYTERY OF St. John.—In this Presbytery twelve catechists labored all summer, and a thirteenth for two months in the fall. There were also five ordained missionaries at work during the whole year.

Mr. D. L. McQuarrie says of *Pisarinco*: "The field is very promising. There is every opportunity of building up a strong congregation."

Mr. R. Watson reports of Nerepis:—"The field is in good working condition. The meetings have been better attended this year in all the places except Clarendon, and there is a more decided interest in the work. A new organ was purchased this spring for the Nerepis church, and a large chandelier and lamp, but the chandelier and lamps are not paid for yet. The church is in first rate condition. The church at Jerusalem has been nevely shingled, and they expect (D. V.) to renovate it inside this fall or next spring. Clarendon's subscription is far short of last year's, but considering the expense and trouble the people have been put to building the new church, I think they have done remarkably well, and am much pleased to see that Mr. Walker has been sent to continue the services for a few more Sandays; the people will be very thankful. I would still strongly urge the claims of this field upon the Presbytery that, as soon as possible, a man be sent who can stay a whole year, and at the end of that time, if he was carnest and energetic, I feel confident that the field would be in a condition to owe him a call." Mr. James Walker, who followed Mr. Watson, for two months, corroborated this testimony.

Mr. S. J. McArthur laboured at *Riley Brook*, and says of it:—"The hope of the field is in its future development. There are some dozen or so families who are really Presbyterian, the greater part of whom are in a poor and struggling condition. Some are very comfortable, as well as very careless. Had we a small church at Riley Brook, the people would all fall in

with us. Whoever occupies the field first will have it.

Scotch Settlement was the scene of Mr. J. F. McCurdy's labors. It is now united by the Presbytery with Shediac, and under the care of an ordained missionary. Mr. McCurdy reports:—"The spiritual life of the congregation is low, and the church members are not on the whole as fully impressed with their responsibility as those of many other congregations. They are, however, regular in their attendance upon ordinances. They are able to contribute much more largely than they do to the support of ordinances and the schemes of the church. Education is greatly needed in this line. One source of their unsatisfactory religious state is the frequent change of students and ordained missionaries that minister to them during the year. The only remedy for this is to effect a union with Shediac, and the majority seem at last to be ready for it on a reasonable basis. As to the character of the service they need, I may say that I am convinced that kindly, personal, private talks with individuals, coupled with steady and frequent house to house visitation, are essential to true success in winning souls to Christ: and if comparison be instituted are, at least in this field, of more value than even the Sabbath services. In Cocaigne a fine union church is about completed, and as the Presbyterian families are more numerous than those of any of the other evangelical denominations, it is highly important that regular Sabbath and mid-week services be conducted there as well as in Scotch Settlement.

Petiteodiac and Sausbury contain a few Presbyterian families, but they have been diminishing in numbers, and the Presbytery has not sent a man there for the coming year. Mr. Hazen Murray, who was the catechist hast summer, says:—Petiteodiae and Sa isbury are two villages situated ten miles apart on the C. P. R., in Westmoreland County. I took charge of this mission the first Sabbath in May; found the Presbyterian element small and disheartened. I only found ten families who claimed connection with our Church in the entire field, and before three months had passed, it became my melancholy duty to attend the funerals of two of our church members, both being heads of families. We own no clutted property in the entire field, so in Petiteodiae we were indebted to the Methodists for use of their building. Here we had large and intelligent congregations, and a healthy interest in our work. In Salisbury, Rev. Mr. Howard (Methodist), kindly opened his church to us, but here there was little interest. I was much encouraged by the interest shown in Steere Settlement, large and attentive congregations filled the Baptist church, and the missionary is heartily welcomed in the homes of the people. I was forced to give up Scott's Roads, the Presbyterians having all moved away. There is little prospect of growth in this field, certainly none at present, and if supplied, it means a large expenditure to the Church, and a feeble response from the mission. I voice the unanimous sentiments of om loyal adherents (and none are more devoted to the church of their fathers), when I suggest that no supply be sent them next summer. In closing I must record my deep appreciation of the unfailing kindness and courtesy of our Methodist brethren, at every point were I came in contact with them.

Mr. J. H. Hattie testifies thus of Campbell Settlement:—Although large in area and strong in numbers, it has always been very weak financially. However, fired with the enthusiasm of my predecessors they have made some advancement. A few names have been added to the church roll during the year, and a deeper interest in the work of the Master is becoming

manifest.

Mr. George C. Pidgeon speaks of Waterford, his field, in the following terms:—The number of new communicants added to the roll was 6; that of baptisms 4. The field is widely scattered, and there are great possibilities if anyone were stationed there. But as it has been all through the history of the field, so it is now, the field cannot grow when there is Presbyterian service there scarcely half the year, while the other denominations have constant supply. The people are zealous, kind, and liberal, anxious to extend the cause, and greatly desirons of having a minister settled among them.

Dorchester had Mr. J. R. Fraser, who says:—Of late years a number of people have left Dorchester, and this has materially weakened our interests there. The people are few but

very spirited in their efforts.

Mr. D. C. Mackintosh who laboured at Baillie and Tower Hill speaks highly of the field. He thinks there could be a good cause gathered there if a man could be permanently settled among them. There was a new church completed and opened at Lynfield, one of the stations. Mr. D. O. McKay labored at Riverside, a somewhat scattered but interesting field in Albert County. It possesses elements of a self-supporting charge, and ought if possible, to have constant supply. Mr. J. P. Falconer labored for most of the summer at Edmundston. A church has been commenced there which will give visibility to our cause. It is a small but important place, and our people are the majority of the Protestants. Mr. R. Grierson labored in the vacant congregation of St. George, which has recently secured as its paster, Rev. R. G. Vans. Mr. Grierson did excellent work in stirring up the people to a new effort to have a settled p stor, as well as in many other ways.

Salina; all of whom have given much satisfaction to the Presbytery. Our cause under them, in the face of emigration and other drawbacks, has held its own in all cases, and in some has made considerable progress. Could such men in sufficient numbers be obtained, and money enough to support them be provided by the Church, our cause would soon show a rapid development in the mission fields of all our Presbyterics. This Presbytery received regular supply for its vacant charges from the Committee, and has thus given the men available for settlement, every opportunity in its power of obtaining a permanent congregation.

Pressytery of Miramich :—Eight cacechists and two ordained missionaries were employed by this Presbytery.

Mr. James F. Polley who labored at Hardwicke reports:—The Presbyterians of Hardwicke have this summer done all in their power towards supporting the mission. Some families have moved away since last summer, also some individuals who were good supporters last year. The Christian spirit is still manifested in many, and my prayers is, that the Holy Spirit may still work on the hearts of many of my hearers in this place, and lead them in the way

everlasting.

Concerning Boiestown Mr. R. Laird says:-The many draw-backs consequent on the nature of the fields, are yet far from being entirely overcome, but have been to some extent diminished. Much interest was manifested in the work by all directly connected, the services specially being well attended. A beginning was made at the proposed new church at Hayesrille, and there are hopes of its being completed by the close of another season. The Sabbath-school work has increased much during the past season, both in attendance and earnestness of workers. Generally speaking, many of the people are wakening up to their religious interest and duties, and would like to have an ordained pastor, only they feel themselves incapable of providing the necessary support. A few more summers of active earnest work ought to reader this practicable. For the present some effort should be made to give at least occasional supp'y during antumn and first part of winter.

Mr. R. A. Finlayson reports of New Bandon:—This is a very good field. They have 'wo

nice churches. Prayer-meetings and Sabbath-school are held all the year round. I think the only fault to be found is, that they do not pay as much as they might for the support of

At Caraquet the Rev. F. L. Fraser labored for a catechist's pay in a most acceptable The people completed a church which was dedicated to the service of God free from debt. Mr. L W Parker occupied Douglastown and Nelson with much acceptance. The tield when thus supplied is self-supporting, but it should be in the charge of an ordained man Mr. John D. McKay was put in charge of a new and poor but needy field called Protectionville. His work was quite successful. A Sabbath-school and prayer meeting that have continued in operation till the present were started by him. No attention had previously been given to the place by any denomination.

Mr. Donald M. Campbell did faithful work at Kouchibouguac. He complains of the people moving away on account of the dull times following the cessation of lumbering operations, but says the people still there are hearty in their support of the gospel and delight in their attendance on it. Mr. D. J. Fraser spent the summer at *Port Daniel* and gave great satisfaction to the people. This station is now united to the congregation of New Carlisle and Hopetown of which it was formerly a station. Mr. John Turnbull labored as ordained missionary at Flatlands and Metapedia for the summer, and during the winter itinerated among the vacant stations of the Presbytery.

Mr. W. J. Fowler occupied Escuminae as ordained missionary. He reports as follows:-"We have in all 6 Sabbath Schools with 17 officers and 157 scholars enrolled.—The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed twice during the year and nineteen were added to the communion roll on profession of faith. The field is in a very good state of organization, but I think is scarcely strong enough to rise from its present condition of having an ordained missionary, to a settled charge. There is a small settlement of twenty families or more some twelve or fourteen miles from the church at Pointé à la Garde, known as Kernet Road, and at present connected with the Campbellton congregation. It think, if the P. shytery deemed it best, that that station could be effectively worked with this field and bring it up to the status of an augmented charge."

This Presbytery received, as it asked, regular supply for its vacancies, which are now happily settled. Mr. Kinnear, late of Buctouche, in the St. John Presbytery, taking New Richmond; Mr. J. Greenlees, New Mills, and Mr. J. M. Sutherland, New Carlisle.

PRESBYTERY OF P. E. ISLAND, -This Presbytery had two catechists placed in vacant congregations—it having no purely mission fields in its territory. Mr. J. D. Logan gave good satisfaction to people and Presbytery at Richmond Bay, East, and Mr. D. C. McKay has continued for the whole year at Dundas.

Both fields paid expenses in full.

This Presbytery has also taken regular supply for its vacancies from the Committee,

and with the happiest results.

Roberts, who reports that he has met with much encouragement—the people susceptible to religious influences and attentive to the ordinances of the sanctuary. Mr. J. P. Falconer, a young man of culture and earnestness, is to go there for the coming year.

WINTER SUPPLY.

The reports of all the catechists emphasize the necessity of continuous supply to our fields. This subject occupied the attention of the Committee and carnest representations were made to Presbyteries to endoavor by some means or other to have the house of God open in each station every Sabbath. The reports from the Presbyteries on winter supply given in the appendix do not show that this has been accomplished, although a good deal has been done in this direction. The elders have been utilized to a limited extent, but not to the degree the Committee could desire. How to solve this question is one of the most difficult as it is one of the most important for our Church to consider.

THE LUMBERMEN'S MISSION.

In the Presbytery of St. John Mr. Watson has laboured during the winter among the camps of the Upper St. John. He finds a welcome in almost every camp and has good opportunities for presenting the truth to many who have searcely ever attended the public worship of God.

In the Presbytery of Miramichi the Rev. Wm McLeod was employed for two months in this work, the Presbytery supplying his place meanwhile, and the Home Mission Fund bearing the necessary expense. His work was thoroughly done and blessed results have followed from it to the spiritually hungry occupants of the eamps.

SABBATH SCHOOLS AS HOME MISSION AGENTS.

The Committee issued this year as last a Sabbath School lesson on our Home Mission work. It has been well received, and some Sabbath Schools are enlisted as agents in promoting this great cause. It is all important to impress the minds of our young people with a deep sense of the necessity laid on us to thoroughly evangelize and keep evangelized the people of our own land. Consequently the Committee has taken this method of instructing the young people of our Church, and it asks the cordial co-operation of all pastors and Sabbath School officers.

AID TO NORTH-WEST.

The Church in the East has raised \$2,072.58 for the work in the North-West. The Committee deeply regrets that this is only two-thirds of what was given last year, and will urge the importance of keeping up to our former attainment in this respect.

GIFTS.

The Free Church of Scotland has again remembered us and sent us £100 stg. towards our work. This help is most highly appreciated, and the hearty thanks of the Committee and the Church are hereby given to this mother in the old land who has not forgotten her children across the sea. A bequest of \$400 from Mrs. Cuthbert of New Richmond, P. Q., is also gratefully acknowledged. Further, the Alex. McLeod Bequest of some years ago, which has been for some time in litigation, this year yielded, besides nearly five thousand dollars for investment, \$1,237.87 of accumulated interest for the meeting of enrrent expenses. Thus \$2,125.53 have come into our funds beyond the contributions of our people.

FINANCES.

Our receipts last year were \$12,116.36, an increase of \$587.78 on the previous year. Our expenditure was \$11,616.37. We began the year with a debt of \$201.34. We close it with \$298.65 in fund. This favorable result is owing to receipts from nanual sources such as the bequests and gifts shown above. The Committee finds that our congregations gave last year for work in the East \$7,919.25, as compared with \$7,954.58 the preceding year; and that our expenditure for the East was \$9,543.79, as compared with \$7,954.58 the preceding year; that is, whilst our outhay on account of increased service rendered our fields was over \$1000.00 more than the preceding year, our income from the eongregations was a few dollars less. Besides this, we fell short last year \$1000 in our contributions to the North-West as compared with the previous year. We ask our people to consider this matter carefully. Do they mean that our work must not advance? We cannot believe that. But if our work is to grow and our expenditure to increase, our people must contribute more liberally. The only certain source of revenue we have is the contributions of the people. Bequests seldom come. The Free Church may at any time withdraw her grant. The proceeds from investments are only two or three hundred dollars per year. To our people, therefore, we must look for the increase necessary to carry on our work with efficiency; and next year we should get

instead of \$8,000, \$10,000 for the work in this eastern portion of the Church. -The increase of liberality in the past has been steady and we do trust that it has not yet reached it highest possible development, but that another year will witness an increase adequate to the demands on the fund. We are persuaded that, if this matter is put fairly before the people and arrangements made for systematic and regular contributions, we shall enjoy a surplus and not suffer from a deficit next year. Will all our pastors and missionary agents conscientionally involved the work? tiously undertake this work?

In addition to this expension of the Colomic set for Home Mission work, the catechists' stations and the fields of ordered and congress rails, as shown in the tabulated statement, nearly \$13,000, besides \$1,000 and so other set less. The other fields supplied by our ordained men raised about \$9,000 and so a total of about \$34,000 for the carrying on of the work under the charge of your Committee.

A comparative view of the work for the years 1881-2, 1887-8, 1888-9, 1889-90, 1890-91, and 1891-92 shows that during the decade there has been a very decided advance both in the number of agents at work and the receipts and expenditure for the service. For the interest and information of the Assembly and the Church we present the comparison here :-

APFENDIX No. 3.

REPORT OF AUGMENTATION COMMITTEE, 1891-92.

(EASTERN SECTION.)

The Committee on Augmentation looks back upon the year closed with feelings of pleasure and gratitude at the work accomplished. Fifty-one congregations were aided to the amount of \$8,058.79. The receipts were \$8,738.67. Expenses \$414.70 which, with grants, made a total expenditure of \$8,473.49, leaving an excess of income for the year of \$265.18, and bringing up the working balance on hand to \$3,483.62. It should be noted, however, that \$200 were delayed in payment, which taken out of the fund in the early part of next year, will be equivalent to reducing our excess of income over expenditure to \$65.18. Even this small sum however, is comforting, as it is on the right side. The Committee, as in previous years, consulted the Synod of the Maritime Provinces at its meeting last October; and, with the sanction of that court, asked the presbyteries to raise \$9000.—The following table indicates how the several presbyteries succeeded in inducing their congregations to support the Fund

From the figures here given it appears that Halifax and Miramichi presbyteries gathered more than their allotment: and that in the former only two congregations neglected a collection, while in the latter every congregation responded. There are fourteen congregations, as against eleven last year, that have not sent a contribution to the fund; but seven of these are vacant; so that the neglect cannot be construed as showing any decay of interest in the operations of the scheme. There has been an increase in the matter of local support in six of the presbyteries, to the amount of \$390; besides the gain in the case of New Carlisle in the Presbytery of Miramichi, that has become self-sustaining, relieving the fund to the extent of \$200 per annum. Eleven congregations once on the Fund, have now become self-supporting.

In accordance with the permission granted by the last Assembly, the Committee, in October, dealt with the cases deferred at the Spring meeting, and made grants as follows:

Fifty congregations have applied for grants for the year ending March 31st, 1893. The Committee has promised \$7089 to forty-three of them, that with two exceptions have complied with the conditions of the scheme. These exceptions are Chipman in the Presbytery of St. John, and Lower Stewiacke in the Presbytery of Halifax. The Committee considered that in these cases there were reasons sufficient to ask the Assembly to make them special cases, and grant permission to give them \$200 and \$150 respectively, which is hereby done. The Committee also respectfully requests that, as in former years, permission be granted the Committee to deal at the Autumn meeting with the seven deferred applications, as well as with any new ones that in the meantime may arise. For these cases \$1300 may be needed; which, in addition to the grants already made and necessary expenses, will aggregate about \$9000 that will be required next year. The Committee confidently believes, judging from past experience, that the friends of the cause will cheerfully supply this amount.






Leaving an excess of receipts over expenditure of \$1,948-88

and reducing the debt from \$11,866.04, as reported last year, to \$9,917.16. at the present time. This debt has been still further reduced by the sale of a lot on Robie Street, Halifax, which has been held for several years by the Board. The Synod instructed the Board to dispose of this lot, and devote the price of it to the reduction of the debt rather than to an increase of the capital, because the cost of the enlargement of the College Building which represents capital had been charged to income. The amount realized for this lot is \$5,225.00, and reduces the debt at the present time to \$4,692.16. The Board hopes to wipe out this debt during the coming summer, and has arranged for the visitation of the several Presbyteries with this object in view.

When the debt is cleared off the Board will act on the authority granted to it by the last Assembly, and, with the concurrence of the Synod, appoint a fourth professor in the college. The Board hopes to be able next year to submit the name for ratification by the Assembly.

The connection of the Church with Dalhousie College is the same as last year. The full salary of Professor McDonald is paid out of our funds. That institution is the chief feeder of our college, and therefore the annual expenditure on it is in our own interest as well as in that of Dalhousie. The scheme of affiliation between the two has proved beneficial to both, and promises to be increasingly so in the future.

The college building, in its enlarged form, has given ample accommodation to all our students, and can supply rooms to a number more. It and the premises—both commodious and beautiful—have been kept in good condition by the house committee, and at a very small charge on the funds.

REPORT OF THE SENATE.

The Session—the Seventy-fifth since the inception of this College and the Seventeenth since its reorganization in 1875—was opened on the 4th November with a lecture by Dr. Chrie, in which he sketched the progress of Theological Education in the Synod of the Maritine Provinces down to the present time. On the following day the examination for the Morrison Prize in Hebrew was held. The prize was given to Mr. Donald M. Campbell, a student of the Second Year. The whole number of students enrolled was 28; of whom twelve were in the first year, seven in the second, and nine in the third. The number of teaching days during last session has, as shown by the Professors' Reports, been unusually large. Upon the whole, there has been less interruptions from preaching engagements than formerly. This has been of advantage to the students both for the preservation of their health and the prosecution of their studies.

In the management of the Library considerable improvement has been effected. Mr. W. C. Morrison, one of the students, who has been appointed Librarian, has taken much pains in making a complete list of hundreds of volumes which have been added to the Library since the last eat-logue was formed. An improved system in the issuing and returning of books has been followed with advantage. During the past year valuable contributions have been received in books from Dr. Burns, Mrs. Peter Ross, the Rev. E. A. McCurdy, and the Rev. J. K. Hewison, Rothesay, Sectland.

In connection with the departure from this province of Dr. Burns, the Chairman of the Board, which will be felt in every part of our Church work, we cannot omit to record in a particular manner our obligations to Dr. Burns for his numerous and valuable gifts to the

The Board had authorised the Senate to propose to Mr. Carruthers that he should teach a daily class in Elecution for a month or five weeks during the winter. Accordingly, Mr. Carruthers, at considerable inconvenience to himself, came during the month of February and gave a course of lessons to the students. It is admitted by all that this arrangement has proved to be a great success. The results were highly satisfactory to the students as well as to those who had an opportunity of witnessing the closing exercises of the class. It has been determined that Elecution shall from this time be a necessary part of the Course, Mr. Carruthers, while himself an accomplished elecutionist, has proved to be qualified to teach the subject and train publis in a most effective manner.

be qualified to teach the subject and train pupils in a most effective manner.

During the past **eventeen** years the College has made some substantial progress, though not doing all for the Church that we wish. In that time we have acquired and enlarged a commodious building. The endowment fund has been greatly increased. The annual collections by congregations have been doubled. Formerly about one-third of the congregations made collections for the College; now nearly all make the annual collection. Then the contributions to the Bursary Fund were \$75.00; now they average \$400.00 per annum. Then the Bursary Fund had an endowment of \$1200.00; now it has an endowment of \$10,500.00. Then there was an average attendance of thirteen students; now there is an attendance of twenty-eight. Still with forty vacant congregations, not to speak of mission fields at home and abroad, the College is very far from doing all the work that is required for the Synod of the Maritime Provinces. It is the duty of Presbyteries to look ont suitable men and have then sent to College with a view to the ministry. This is an essential part of presbyterial duty as laid down in the laws of the Church. If this duty were faithfully done the usefulness of the College would be proportionally augmented, and it would meet all reasonable expectations.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE. MONTREAL, FOR THE YEAR 1891-92.

To the Venerable, the General Assembly:

In presenting their Annual Report, together with that of the Senate, the Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, would express their gratitude to God for the continued success of the institution under their care.

The attendance during the past session was seventy-seven, the accommodation provided in the building teing taxed to its utmost extent, and a number of students were unable to secure rooms in the College. Eight students completed their theological course, three of whom preach in both French and English.

From the accompanying statement of the Treasurer, it will be observed that the financial position of the College has somewhat improved since last Report. By the exercise of the strictest economy, the expenditure of the year has been kept within the income. As intimated to last Assembly, the Bourd appointed the Rev. D. L. McCrae to canvass for subscriptions on behalf of the Endowment Fund. Considering the general state of the country, Mr. McCrae has been fairly successful, the amount subscribed to date being \$20,000, of which the sum of \$4,522 has been paid.

The term for which the special subscriptions, received from friends in Montreal and elsewhere for the past five years, having expired, the Board are seeking a renewal of these for another term of five years. Though the canvass is not yet completed, it has, thus far, met with such gratifying success that there is little doubt of an amount equal to the past five years being obtained, and it is hoped that before the expiry of the term the increase to the Endowment Fund may be such

as to render the continuance of these special subscriptions unnecessary.

The Board have much pleasure in reporting to the General Assembly that a large hearted friend of the College, a Montreal gentleman who does not wish his name to appear, has intimated his purpose to contribute the full salary of an additional professor, for the next five years, and longer if necessary. The Board are now considering this matter, and hope to be able to submit to the General Assembly a name for appointment as professor, together with the subjects of his

MORRIN COLLEGE, QUEBEC.

REPORT OF THE GOVERNORS OF MORRIN COLLEGE FOR THE SESSION 1891-92.

The Governors of Morrin College beg leave to present their report for the past year, and in doing so are glad to be able to say that, notwithstanding the severe and heavy trials through which the institution has passed in the death of three of its professorial staff, they are constrained to express their gratitude to God for the measure of prosperity vouchsafed. The meinbers of Assembly will remember that at the time of the meeting of Assembly last year, we were called upon to mourn the sudden death of Professor Weir. Dr. Weir had been identified with Morrin for about twenty-eight years, and was a most painstaking and successful teacher. His death was a severe blow to the College. To continue the work carried on by Dr. Weir, Mr. William Crockett, M.A., was appointed to take the Classics, and the Rev. George Cauli, M.A., the Hebrew. Towards the end of January Mr. Cauli was attacked with la grippe, which terminated fatally in a few days' illness. During the short time that Mr. Cauli was with us he endeared himself to his students, and gave promise of being of great use to the College. He was indeed a capital Hebraist, and had just got before his death a little taste of what he had longed for and what he was admirably fitted for, viz:—to teach students Hebrew and Old Tostament Exegesis. The classes in Hebrew were conducted for the balance of the session by the Rev. Hugh Craig, B.A. one of our most distinguished graduates.

Again nearing the close of the sessions, we were called upon to part with our venerable and esteemed Principal, Dr. Cook. Although the doctor had reached the good old age of eighty-seven years, yet his intellect was bright, clear and vigorous to the last, so much so that he met with his class in Apologetics not many days before his death. He died as he lived trusting in his

In the midst of all this sorrow and anxiety the Governors are deeply conscious of the excellent work performed by the members of the staff, and of the fine spirit manifested between professors and students.

The attendance has been larger than for many years, there being thirty-five students registered, nine studying for the ministry of our Church. Seven of these are now in the Home Mission fields.

As is known to the Assembly, Morrin is affiliated to McGill University in Arts, and two students passed the B.A. examination with distinction, one of them taking first-class standing. These two young men have the ministry in view.

In reference to finance, the Governors regret to state that the income of the College is far below its requirements, so that its work is carried on under many difficulties. There is urgent need of a considerable addition to its resources, but various causes combine to render present efforts in this direction exceedingly difficult.

In conclusion, the Governors would repeat what they said in a former report, that they cannot help expressing the hope that the General Assembly may encourage their professors and students by a cordial expression of sympathy with the important and difficult position they occupy. Feeling that generous benefactions and endowments could nowhere be more beneficially bestowed, they carnestly appeal to wise and liberal friends of the Church and religion to aid them in providing a liberal and thorough university and theological education in this stronghold of Roman Catholicism.

APPENDIX No. 7.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF QUEEN'S UNIVER-SITY AND COLLEGE.

The Trustees respectfully submit the following report of the fifty-first session of the University;

1. ATTENDANCE.

The total number of students registered was 468—viz., in Arts and Law, 286; in Medicine, 145; in Theology, 37. Allowing for those who registered in more than one Faculty, the number was 454. Of those in Theology the following 17 were in the third or final year: James Binnie, B.A.; J. D. Boyd, B.A.; James Cattanach, B.A.; D. R. Drummond, M.A.; A. Fitzpatrick, B.A.; John Fraser, A. Graham, B.A.; D. D. McDonald, I. F. McFarland, B.A.; A. K. McLennan, B.A.; D. McPhail, B.A.; R. M. Phalen, B.A.; T. R. Scott, B.A.; John Sharp, B.A.; J. A. Sinclajr, M.A.; D. Strachan, B.A.; A. Thompson, B.A. This is the largest final class that Queen's has ever had in Theology, and many of them are men who have won high University distinctions, indicating the possession of talents and scholarship that we trust will enable them to do the best service for the Church and the country in after years.

The work of the session was prosecuted with diligence and success. Rev. James Ross, B.D., continued his course in Church History, and the Principal and Professors express entire satisfaction with the conduct of the students. Their zealous missionary spirit is shown by the extension of their Home and Foreign and City Mission operations, and by the acknowledgment of their work expressed by the Presbytery of Kingston.

2. FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

Last year we called attention to a serious accumulated deficit of \$8,080. This year the deficit has increased to \$9,101, and it would have been much greater had it not been for the action of the Temporalities Board in paying up all old arrears. This deficit must be credited in part to the Arts and in part to the Divinity Faculty. It is gratifying to be able to state that the amount received from the General Assembly's College Fund last year was \$2,812, as against \$2,193 sent in the year before; but we are still \$1,200 short of the minimum sum required from this fund for the ordinary support of the Divinity Faculty, and our trust is that the Church will now seriously consider the matter and put this side of the University in its proper position.

We may be permitted to point out again the exceptional burden that falls upon the Board. We have a University to sustain as well as a Theological College; and the greater portion of the funds raised for Queen's has been for the general work of the University. We have, however, made good the grant previously given by the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland for Theological education, and have added a third Professor and a Lecturer to the Faculty. But the endowment of our Theological department is insignificant beside the comparatively substantial endowments that we heartily congratulate Knox and Montreal Colleges on having obtained; and, until a special endowment for that department is raised, the annual minimum of \$4,000 must be looked for from the General Assembly's College Fund. This can be done in only one of two ways: by our friends who have hitherto sent collections increasing their contributions from 30 to 50 per cent., or by other friends, who have hitherto abstained from helping, recognizing our necessities and claiming their share in maintaining Queen's. The Trustees ardently hope that by one way or the other, or by both ways, this annual minimum of \$4,000 may be reached before they report again to the Assembly.

We append list of contributing congregations, with our best thanks to each and all.

KNOX COLLEGE.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF KNOX COLLEGE.

The Board of Management of Knox College have much pleasure in presenting to the General Assembly their Report for the past year and also in transmitting the Report of the Senate of the College. Both reports show the continued prosperity of the College in all its departments. The total number of students in the College during the past year was 111. Seventy-nine of these attended the Theological Classes and thirty-two students were enrolled in the Preparatory

tness attenued the Inestogical Classes and thirty-two students were enrolled in the Preparatory Ceurse. A number of students, having in view the ministry of the Church, are attending University College, Toronto.

The College Residence has been fully occupied by the students, and some who would have desired to obtain accommodation within the College itself have been compelled to seek for quarters elsewhere. The management of the College Residence continues as formerly under the careful superintendence of Mr. and Mrs. Fullerton.

As reported to the last Assembly, leave of absence was given to the Rev. Principal Caven for the latter part of the session in order that he might have an opportunity of travelling in the East.

The sater part of the session in order that he might have an opportunity of travelling in the East. To enable Dr. Caven to derive the full benefit of his well-earned holiday, the Board unanimously placed at his disposal the sum of \$600. They have pleasure in welcoming him on his return much benefited and strengthened by his vacation and journey, and trust that he may yet he spared for many years to render good service to the Church. The Board acknowledge with thanks the gift of a very fine portrait of Dr. Caven from the Alumni Association. This now occupies a prominent place in the College.

The place of Dr. Caven in the lecture room during his absence was taken by the Rev. Dr. Kellogg, who, with the kind assistance of the other professors conducted the classes taught by Dr. Caven during the portion of the session when he was absent. It need hardly be said that the services of Dr. Kellogg were highly appreciated by the students.

The Rev. Dr. Gregg, Senior Professor, ably discharged the duties of Principal during Dr. Grand's absence.

The Board have used every effort to see that the comfort of the atudents resident in the College should be promoted and that the sanitary condition of the College should be put in a thoroughly satisfactory condition. The Board have great pleasure in reporting that the health of the students has been excellent and that no such outbreak of epidemic has visited the College during the past session as that which was so distressing during the session of 1891. To affect these necessary improvements an expenditure of \$1,045.55 was necessary. A large expenditure in connection with the plumbing, steamfitting and general repairs to the building was incurred during the past year. These amounted to \$2,425.88. A fire alarm has also been introduced into the premises.

The total expenditure for the past year amounted to \$20,929.94 while the receipts, including a balance of \$1,416.85 from last year, were \$20,465.20, leaving a balance due to the Treasurer of \$464.74.

The total amount received from congregations and from donations amounts this year to \$6,227.82,

as against \$5,984.09 received troin congregations and from donations amounts this year to \$6,227.62, as against \$5,984.09 received during the previous year. The amount of interest received from the Endowment Fund was \$12,658.53. Attention must be called to the fact that from the fall in the rate of interest and the increasing difficulty of obtaining investments the same return cannot be expected from the same capital as was received in the past.

The amount received from the Endowment Fund has been from subscriptions \$1,032.37, and from the bequest of Mrs. Nicholls, \$20,000. The Board have received intimation that the late Mr. James McLaren, of Buckingham, has left by his will the sum of \$20,000 for the improvement of the library. The Board propose funding this amount so that it shall produce an annual income to be The Board propose funding this amount so that it shall produce an annual income to be applied in the purchase of new books and in maintaining the library in efficiency. The Board cannot permit this opportunity to pass without expressing the deep sense they entertain of the obligations under which the College lies to the late Mr. McLaren, who, during his life time, as it will be remembered, gave \$50,000 for the purpose of endowing the Chair of Systematic Theology, and who by this bequest manifested his continued interest in the College to the last.

It has always been the desire of the Board that students before entering on the study of Theology should have a degree in Arts, and it is a matter of satisfaction that so many students now in the College have taken a University course. Arrangements have in the past been made for instruction in this department by tutors from time to time selected for this purpose. The Board would, however, recommend that this department of the College work should be placed under the clarge of a permanent officer, who, in addition to the duties of a teacher, might be in a position to advise with the students in this course as to their studies and the nature of work in the Church for

which they might be adapted.

Besides the students whose names are given in the above lists, there were two ladies who attended classes in Church History, Apologetics, Old Testament Literature and Systematic Theology, and whose proficiency, as shown by the closing examinations, proved very satisfactory.

The classes in Exegetics and Biblical Criticism were conducted by Principal Caven from the The classes in Exegetics and Biblical Criticism were conducted by Principal Caven from the commencement of the session till the end of January. From this time till the end of the session the classes in Exegetics were taught by Dr. S. H. Kellogg, to whom the Senate is greatly indebted for the acceptable and efficient manner in which he conducted these classes in the absence of Principal Caven. In the junior Exegetical class were read several chapters in the Gospel by Luke and in the book of Genesis; and lectures were given on the principles of interpretation. In the senior Exegetical class were read several chapters in the Epistle to the Romans, and several chapters in the book of Exodus and in the Prophecies of Isaiah. Greek and Hebrew exercises, prepared by students of the second and third years, were read and examined by Drs. Caven and Kellogg.

The classes in Church History were conducted by Professor Gregg, who delivered lectures to the students of the first year on the History of the Church during the first eight centuries, and to the students of the second and third years chiefly on the History of the Church in England, Scotland, Ireland, and in the Dominion of Canada. Professor Gregg also examined the Homilies prepared by students of the first year; and, in the preparatory department, taught a class in Mathematics.

The classes in Systematic Theology were conducted by Professor McLaren. To the senior class, consisting of the students of the second and third years, he lectured five hours weekly. Four class, consisting of the students of the second and third years, he lectured five hours weekly. Four hours each week were devoted to lectures in the regular course, in which the subjects dealt with were the Decrees of God, and Election, Crestion, Providence, the Origin of Man, the Origin of the Lord, Trichotomy, Man's Original State, the Covenant of Works, the Fall, Original Sin, the Covenant of Grace, the Person of Christ and Christ's offices as Prophet and Priest. One hour each week was devoted to the Confession of Faith, in which chapters xv.xix. were examined. The students of this class were examined, at the close of the session, on a prescribed portion of Dr. A. A. Hodge's Outlines of Theology. The students of the second year were examined on Fairbairn's Revelation of Law. To the junior class, consisting of students of the first year, Professor McLaren lectured four hours seeh week. The subjects discussed in the regular course were Inspiration, the Rule of Faith, the Attributes of God, and the Trinity. One hour a week during the greater part of the session was devoted to an examination of chapter 2.-v. of the Confession of Faith. The etudents of this class were also examined on a prescribed portion of Dr. A. A. Hodge's Outlines of Theology. were also examined on a prescribed portion of Dr. A. A. Hodge's Outlines of Theology.

In the department of Old Testament Literature two lectures weekly were delivered to the second and third year students, in which, after a consideration of Prophets and Prophecy, a critical examination was made of the prophetical books of the Old Testament. One lecture weekly was delivered to the third year students on the Poetical Literature of the Old Testament. A text book was used in the class. Two lectures weekly were delivered to the second year students, based on Flint's Anti-Theistic Theories and portions of Farrar's Critical History of Prec Thrapht. Four lectures weekly were delivered to the students of the first year on the Evidences of Natural and Revealed Religion. In connection with these, portions of Fisher's Grounds of Theistic and Christian belief were used as a text book. A short course was also given on the Capon of the Old Testament belief were used as a text book. A short course was also given on the Canon of the Old Testament.

The classes on Church Government and Pastoral Theology, Homiletics were conducted through the whole secsion by Ur. Proudfoot, whose labours were confined to students of the second and third years. He delivered 38 lectures on Church Government. Of these 6 were devoted to the office of the Ruling Elder, and 6 to an exhaustive examination of the Patritic Literature of the first two centuries, so far as it relates to Church Polity. Hs delivered 15 lectures on Pastoral Theology. On two days every week a class conference was held, in which Practical Homiletice was taught. No models were used in the class, except such as were furnished by the students themselves; these were duly corrected. Students were encouraged and helped to exercise their inventive or creative powers in finding suitable subjects, and in constructing discourses on principles which must underlie all permanently effective, persuasive discourses—no matter what may be the gifts or attainments of the preacher.

A class in Elecution, attended by all the theological students, was taught by Professors Neff and Bechtell, of Philadelphia.

The tutors in the Preparatory Department were Mr. John McNair, B.A., in English; Mr. George Logie, B.A., in Greek, and Mr. H. F. Thomas, in Latin.

In the classes in English, the subjects of Grammar, Literature, and Rhetoric were taught. Text books were used, and portions of English classic authors were studied. Each of the students wrote a number of essays, which were carefully criticised. There was a marked improvement in essay writing, to which was assigned a place of equal importance with the other subjects.

In the Greek classes portions of Xenophon's Anabasis, of Homer's Iliad and Odyssey, of Plato's Crito, and of the Gospel by John were read. Greek Grammar and Greek Prose Composition were taught. Text books were used.

The Latin classes read portions of Caesar's De Bello Gallico, of Virgil's Æneid, and of Cicero's Pro Archia. Latin Grammar and Latin Prose Composition were taught. Text books in Grammar and Composition were used.

During the session the health of the professors and students has, on the whole, been good. Some have been for days or weeks laid aside by illness, but restored to health. In one case the illness has proved fatal. It has pleased God to remove, by death, Mr. George W. Logie, who was greatly esteemed and loved, and whose character as a student and success in the mission field gave promise of a life of great ministerial usefulness.

In the early part of the session the Rev. J. A. McDonald, who had discharged the duties of librarian for several years in a very satisfactory manner, having accepted the call to the congregation of St. Thomas, resigned his office, and the Rev. W. A. J. Martin was appointed librarian for the current year. Mr. Martin reports that during the past year 285 volumes, of which 73 have been by gift, have been added to the library. Of the books presented to the library specially grateful mention should be made of the donation by W. Mortimer Clark, Eq., of a fac-simile of the Codex Sinstitions, issued by instruction of the Czar of Russia in 1862, of volumes to complete the autotype copy of the Codex Alexandrinus; of autotype copy of the MS. of Aristotle's Constitution of Athens, and of an autotype copy of the poems of Herodas from Papyri recently found in Egypt. Volumes to the number of 714 were taken from the general department of the library, nearly all of which have been returned. The books of the Consulting Department were extensively used. The work of cataloguing the library has been commenced, and is to be continued during the summer.

For several years attention has been called to the fact that, in various departments, there has been that a scant supply of books in the library: and earnest appeals have been repeatedly made to the friends of the college to supply the defect. Thanks are due to the Alumni of the college and others who, in response to these appeals, have contributed a goodly sum of money, the greater part of which has been expended in the purchase of books which seemed to be most necessary. But a much larger library fund was needed, and the Senate feels called on to give thanks to God that He put it in the heart of the late James McLaren, Esq., of Buckingham, who during his life time contributed the munificent sum of \$50,000 to endow the chair of Systematic Theology, to bequeath the additional munificent sum of \$20,000 for the purchase of books for the library. For these generous gifts the name of Mr. McLaren should be held in grateful remembrance.

During the session the College Literary and Theological (formerly called the Metaphysical and Literary) Society was reorganized, and by its debates and the preparation, reading and criticising of essays, in public and private meetings, it proved a means of intellectual culture and of useful discipline to its members.

As in former years the work of the College Missionary Society has been carried on with great vigour and success. By its collection of funds and sending out catechists to the more destitute localities in the North West and elsewhere, it continues to be a valuable auxiliary in the Home Mission operations of the Church. At the close of the session 28 students were allocated to different fields.

The Saturday morning conferences have been held as usual during the session. At these and other meetings profitable addresses were given by the Revs. Messrs. D. J. McDonnell, J. S. Turnbull, A. B. Winchester, Edward H. Sawers and Dr. W. T. McMullen.

The Rev. J. Knox Wright and the Rev. W. H. Jamieson, M.A. and Ph.D., completed their examinations for the degree of Bachelor of Divinity, and the Senate conferred on them this degree.

MANITOBA COLLEGE.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF MANITOBA COLLEGE FOR THE YEAR 1891-2.

The Board of Management of Manitoba College begs to submit to the General Assembly its Report for the past year, and to transmit the Report of the College Senate.

The number of students in attendance during the year, as appears in the Report of the Senate, has been 139, as against 131 in the preceding year, and the work of the various classes has been

regularly carried on.

A detailed statement of the accounts and funds of the College, duly audited, is presented herewith. The generous donations of the Church of Scotland, the Free Church of Scotland, and the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, which the Board has had the pleasure of acknowledging for several years, were again received, and the Board desires heartily to thank those churches for their continued liberality. It also gratefully acknowledges the renewal during the past year of the donation of \$250 from the congregation of the American Presbyterian Church in the City of Montreal. In addition to these the Presbyterian Church of Ireland has sent £50 as a special donation to the Building Fund, for which welcome assistance the Board is deeply grateful. The congregational Building Fund, for which welcome assistance the Board is deeply grateful. The congregational contributions from Ontario, Quebec, and the Maritime Provinces have decreased, and are this year about \$300 less than during the previous year. The total amount of these is about \$1,000 less than what is required to pay the salaries of the two Professors appointed by the Assembly many years ago, and for the payment of which the Church is understood to be responsible. The total receipts for the Ordinary Fund, including \$1,351.94, the balance in hand at the beginning of the year, have been \$16,741.02, which includes, for class fees and board of resident students, \$5,243, or nearly the same amount as last year. The expenditure for the year has been \$14,033, or a little less than last year, and there has been carried to the credit of the Building Fund \$1,330.99. This leaves a balance in hand of \$1,677.03.

The legacy of \$10,000 from the late John Robertson, Esq., was paid in November last, and this, with a donation of \$25, has increased the Endowment Fund from \$15,690, reported last year, to \$25,715. The Board has, however, reserved the power to use this \$10,000 from building purposes, temporarily, and pending the payment of subscriptions to the Building Fund. The Board has

temporarily, and pending the payment of subscriptions to the Building Fund. The Board has received notice of another handsone legacy of \$20,000 left to the College by the late James Maclaren, Esq., of Buckingham, in the Province of Quebec. That it should have been put in his heart to remember, in so generous a manner, a small college at such a distance from his place of residence, and so far removed from where his chief business interests lay, is a great encouragement to the Board. It indulges the lope that other wealthy members of the Church, remembering that it is the Lord their God who giveth power to get wealth, will yet follow the liberal example set by Mr. Robertson and Mr. Maclaren. The Board is desirous of placing this legacy, when paid, as a further addition to the Endowment Fund.

The capital of the Scholarship Fund was reported last year as \$500. It was also stated that an offer by Miss Perrine, of Berlin, to give \$1,000 to this Fund, subject to the payment of a moderate interest to her for life, had been accepted. This sum has been received during the year, and the same lady has given another sum of \$1,000 for the same purpose, and on the same terms. The whole amount of this Scholarship Fund, \$2,500, is now invested.

During the year \$455 has been spent in fencing the grounds, and in necessary repairs to the

building and heating appliances.

Last year the Report of the Board contained the statement that the erection of additional buildings was much needed, and could not be long delayed. The General Assembly, in receiving that Report, was pleased to express the gratification with which it learned that the work of the that Report, was pleased to express the gratification with which it learned that the work of the College had obtained such dimensions as to require the erection of additional buildings, and to commend to the support of the members of the Church any well-considered effort which the Board might put forward to secure increased accommodation. During the past win-ter the Board became convinced that, if the work of the College was to be carried on efficiently, the erection of additional buildings could be no longer delayed, and after careful deliberation and full consideration of the whole question, resolved to proceed with the erection of these during the present summer. Plans for a large extension of the present building were accordingly procured from a competent architect, and a subscription list for defraying the cost opened. Several liberal subscriptions have already been made and a vicence according to the present summer. accordingly produced from a competent architect, and a subscription lat for defraying the cost opened. Several liberal subscriptions have already been made and a vigorous canvass is being carried on. Donations made to Dr. King by friends in Scotland, and a few former subscriptions paid during the last twelve months, which, with the gift of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland already mentioned, amount to \$1,354.28, and the sum of \$1,030.99 transferred from the Ordinary Fund, with a small balance in hand from last year, enable the Building Committee to begin operations with \$2,500 in hand, exclusive of the subscriptions. The proposal brought forward at the last meeting of the General Assembly that a summer session for students of theology should be held in one of its Colleges, has been taken under consideration by the Board, and should it, in the opinion of the General Assembly, be considered advisable to institute such a session, and to select Manitoba College as the one at which work shall be carried on in summer, the Board, while quite satisfied with existing arrangements, is prepared cordially to acquiesce in the resolution of the Assembly, and to do all that lies within its sphere to carry the proposed scieme into successful operation. The Board, when considering the question, had before it certain resolutions come to by the Senate of the College, the substance of which appears in the Report of the Senate transmitted herewith. After careful consideration of these the Board fully approves of the action taken by the Senate, and endorses the views expressed in its Report. The Board would, however, call the attention of the Assembly to the fact that the College will be put to considerably increased outlay in carrying on such a scheme, and it would respectfully, but earnestly, considerably increased outlay in carrying on such a scheme, and it would respectfully, but earnestly, urge the necessity for action being taken by the Assembly to secure for the College the further financial support required. Mere general resolutions commending the College to the liberality of the Church, however well meant, will be an insecure foundation for the Board to build upon. Surely, if the College agrees to such a radial change being made in the mode of carrying on part of Surely, it the College agrees to such a radical change being made in the mode of carrying on part of its work, with the attendant risk and exp...e, in order to supply what is believed by so many to be an absolute necessity in connection with the extension and upbuilding of the Church throughout a large part of the Dominion, the Assembly should provide the means of support without throwing an increased burden upon any of the Professors or officials of the College.

The language of approval in which the Senate refers to the work done by the various tutors during the past session is heartily concurred in by the Board. Recognition is also gratefully made of the services of Miss Lawson, who efficiently discharges the duties which lie within the sphere of the Matron.

REPORT OF THE SENATE OF MANITOBA COLLEGE FOR THE YEAR 1891-2.

The Senate of Manitoba College begs leave to submit to the General Assembly the following report regarding the work of the year. There is equal reason, as there was at the close of the previous session, for presenting it in a spirit of devout thankfulness to God, whose goodness has been displayed to the institution in many forms during its brief history.

The number of pupils of all classes enrolled during the session has been one hundred and thirtynine, being an increase of eight over those of the previous year. The increase, while not great, is larger than the Senate had been led to anticipate in view of the extension of the facilities for higher education in Winniper.

The Theological classes were attended by twenty-three students; one of the number, however, chiefly on account of ill health, ceased to attend classes soon after Christmas; two others, while attended to make a market attended to work as a market attended to a market atten tending regularly and taking some of the examinations, are not yet entitled to rank as regular students of Theology. In addition one, Mr. Jonas Johnston, was, the Senate regrets to report, removed by death at an early part of the session to the great loss of the Icelandic Church, which has been gathered largely through his earnest and self-denying labours.

In the New Testament, Matthew, chapters vi. and vii., and the 1st Epistle of John were read critically by the students of all the years. In Systematic Theology the main subjects of discussion were those embraced under the head of the Application of Redemption, including Faith, Repentance, Justification, Sanctification, and the Sacraments. The first part of a course of lectures in Biblical Theology on the basis of the personal teachings of Christ was delivered to the students of the three years, as also a number of lectures on Pastoral Theology.

Professor Baird taught, as in former years, a senior and a junior class in Hebrew. The former was attended by students of the second year, the latter by those of the first. Davidson's Hebrew Grammar was the text-book used in both classes. During the first three months of the session a

During the first three months of the session a class, including all the students, studied Church History five days of the week, the work of the previous year being carried on from the beginning of the ninth to the close of the sixteenth century. The Senate does not deem it necessary to give the names of the pupils in the Preparatory Department; the number in this department is larger than in the previous seasion, and embraces a greator proportion of students having the ministry in view. It is hoped that most of them will take a full University course before entering on the study of Theology.

The arrangement mentioned in last year's report, by which Natural Science was taught under the anapices of the University of Manitoba by Dr. Bryce and the Professors of St. John and Wesley Colleges, has been maintained during the past session with advantage. The University has also conducted the classes in the College in higher English Literature and History, as well as those in previous and preliminary Euclid.

Professor Hart has continued to teach the Classics and the French in previous and preliminary Euclid.

He also conducted daily classes in Latin and Greek with students of the preliminary year.

Dr. King lectured throughout the session to the students in philosophy, on Locke, Reid, Hamilton, Kant and Flint. The classes met daily, and on two days of the week twice a day. The Rev. James Farquharson, B. A., of Pilot Mound, gave valuable assistance in this and in some other departments in the earlier part of the session. Dr. King also met daily for German with the

In deference, however, to what appears to be a general desire of the Church that a summer session should be instituted at the seat of one of the colleges, under the Assembly, and in view of the fact that Winnipeg, especially because of its proximity to the largest mission field of the Church, appears to be the most suitable locality, the Senate has agreed to recommend to the General Assembly to arrange that the Theological classes in Manitoba College should hereafter, and until otherwise mointed, be held during the summer months, that the session should extend from the heginning of April to the end of August, and that the new arrangement should take effect in heginning of April to the end of August, and that the new arrangement should take effect in April, 1893.

The Senate, in passing this resolution, desires at the same time humbly to represent to the General Assembly, first, that care must be taken to preserve in unimpaired efficiency the Arts department of the College, both as requisite to furnish a supply of qualified students of Theology, and on more general grounds, and that therefore the change contemplated should be accompanied by the addition to the present staff of a lecturer in mental and moral science; second, that the Senate of Manitoba College should be empowered to make arrangement for additional teaching in the Theological classes to that of the regular staff of the College by Professors from some of the other colleges or by others who may be willing to render this service; third, that the Home Mission Committee should be instructed to give increased remuneration in view of the additional exponse incurred to those students who agree to occupy mission fields in winter, with a view to attending Theological those students who agree to occupy mission fields in winter, with a view to attending Theological classes in the summer session, and fourth, that the General Assembly, should it sanction the change, take at the same time effective measures to secure the amount of financial support necessary to

The Societies connected with the College—the Missionary, the Literary and the Y. M. C. A.—have been in efficient operation throughout the session, and they have all served important ends. The exercises mentioned in last report for effectively preserving the religious character of the institution have been maintained throughout the session.

The Senate in closing its report would gratefully record the goodness of God in the measure of health vouchsafed both to professors and students in a season of exceptional sickness.

REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF FRENCH EVANGELIZATION

OF THE

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA.

The Board of French Evangelization in presenting this report to the General Assembly would call attention to a few facts bearing directly on the work committed to its care:—

I. The unwonted zeal and activity of the Church of Rome in the work of propagandism, as shown by the pretentious claims and one-sided statements in the public press, the circulation of tracts and pamphlets falsifying history and vilifying the reformers and their representatives, the frequent preaching of retreats and diligent visitation of heretics as well as the faithful.

II. The growing discontent among the people, craving for a better education than they now enjoy, thousands of whom, nominally in the bosom of the Church, have lost faith in her dogmas, and, unable to free themselves from fostered prejudices against Protestantism, if they have not already lapsed, must lapse into indifference or practical infidelity, if left to themselves.

III. Our Roman Catholic countrymen in this Province have not the Gospel. Individuals here and there have it in their possession. The Roman Catholic Church has approved of versions of the Scriptures issued by her dignitaries and others, even in the Province of Quebec. That the people have not received them and know little or nothing of their saving tuth, a visit to any parish will prove.

In these circumstances "the weapons of our warfare are not carnal," but the simple Gospel of the blessed God offered in the love of it. It alone will remove discontent, destroy prejudices, break down the power of the priest, bring to nought the ambition of a grinding hierarchy, and give to the people their liberty and privileges.

That God has owned and blessed the work there is proof on every hand. The first missionaries entered this field about fifty years ago. Some of them are still active in it. Then there was not a single French Canadian Protestant on the St. Lawrence; now, at the very lowest calculation, there are twelve thousand French Canadian Protestants in the Province of Quebec, and twenty thousand in the United States. A French Canadian, presumably a Roman Catholic, writing on the spread of Protestantism among his countrymen in the States and here in the Daily Witness of 14th May, says:—

"One remark may first be made concerning which the reader can draw his own conclusions. About forty-five years ago, we had a few thousand French-Canadians in the States, and not twenty of them were known to be Protestants; at that time there were but few priests permanently established among our countrymen; there were not, perhaps, three established parishes in the New England States. To-day there are hundreds of cures and as many parishes regularly established, French groups of from ten to twenty thousand, and there are also scattered all through the States thousands who have become Protestants. Why is it that Protestantism grows stronger and stronger as the number of priests increases? Let the reader, as has been already said, draw his own conclusion on this historical fact. You will hear some Catholics say that the ground gained among our countrymen by Protestantism is due to the Bible societies, to Protestant propagandas, etc. If it is so, why cannot the priests counteract these influences, if their moral conduct is in accordance with the Christian doctrine? But no; if we lose our faith and language in the United States and here too, we should blame neither the Protestants nor the English—we must lay the fault at our own door, as it is, first, the fault of men of our own creed, in regard to religion, and our very own fault if we lose our mother tongue."

"There are about three thousand French Canadian Protestants in the commercial metropolis of the Province of Quebec, and five ohurches where they meet. These churches are supported by Protestants in general and particularly by the Presbyterians. And do you think that those liberal minded Christians demand the exclusive use of the English language in preaching, singing, etc.? Very far from it: they have appointed French ministers to these churches, not Irish ministers that would speak nothing but English, but French pastors who use their mother tongue and nothing else in their preaching. All the prayer books, pamphicts, tracts, etc., are exclusively in French. This is Protestant or true Christian generosity and British liberality."

The writer then gives an incomplete list of names of about fifty French Canadian congregations and their pastors in the United States and Quebec, a large proportion of the pastors in the States being men who were trained in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, and have followed their countrymen over the lines, and continues: "There are many other places in the States and in this Province where French Canadian Protestant churches, chapels, and meeting houses are established, but what we have said will suffice to show the progress of Protestantism among my compatriots. Let me conclude by saying that Protestantism is threatening old parishes, situated in the very heart of our Province, where great dissatisfaction is expressed with regard to the clergy."

- Mr. J. L. Morin, pastor of Eglise St. Jean, Montreal, himself a convert from Romanism, in a paper on Methods of French Evangelization, read before the last Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, said:
- "All the results of French evangelization are not represented by a certain number of churches or converts. We are spreading liberal ideas through the whole Province." As a proof he alluded to the greater measure of tolerance Protestants now enjoy among the Roman Catholics, especially of Montreal. "With these great results in view, for which we must thank God Almighty and for which, in the name of my countrymen, I thank the grand Presbyterian Church in Canada which has contributed so much in the achievement of these results, we may well continue to labor with faith and hope in this saving work of French evangelization.
- "But this work is attended by great inherent difficulties namely: (1) the depravity of the human heart, favored in 'many respects by Romanism; (2) the national feeling; priests tell the French Canadians that their tongue and nationality depend on their attachment to the teachings of Rome; (3) the partial truths of Christianity contained in Romanism causing its followers to believe that they possess the whole truth; (4) the ignorance and prejudices of the people; (5) the spirit of intolerance and persecution existing among Roman Catholics. In view of these difficulties we need the wisdom from on high to devise the right methods for doing this great and difficult work."
- Mr. Morin having spoken of colportage, mission schools and preaching, the methods mainly made use of, referred to the success attending the conferences held in his own church last winter by the Rev. Mr. Martin, the converted priest, and advocated similar meetings elsewhere in the interest of the work. He also spoke of the power of the present the work of evangelization; "No money can be spent by the Board of French Evangelization with more beneficial results than by sustaining a good French Protestant paper which could go where no missionary can go. Such a paper well edited by a staff of able Christian men, of whom there are many among the converts, would be one of the most powerful instruments for the education and enlightenment of the French Canadians." He expressed regret that the Protestant Church, which makes so many sacrifices for French evangelization, appears not to have understood that fully; and concluded by saying that if these four methods had not been used in all their applications by our Christian churches they were used enough to show—by the results already attained—that there are many reasons for encouragement and for the enlargement of the work.

FRENCH NEWSPAPER.

At the meeting of the Board last March the question of a French newspaper was favorably considered and referred to the executive, but has not yet been disposed of.

COLPORTAGE.

The colporteurs are the advance guard, and prepare the way for the missionary-teacher and regular missionary. The colporteurs of the Board are practically itinerant missionaries. Not only do they distribute religious literature and the Word of God, but they also read it in the homes of the people, and pray with them, and gather the families into small groups for religious services, whenever possible. Thirteen have been engaged in this way during the whole or part of the year in Quebec, New Brunswick and Ontario. Eighteen hundred and sixty Bibles and New Testaments, and about twenty-six thousand tracts and copies of Le Rayon de Soleil and L'Ami de la Maison have been distributed. "When I came here I was much discouraged because of the prejudice and bigotry of the people. I should relate the following incident, because it was my first encouragement. One day I did not know what to do nor where to go, so I fell on my knees and cried to God for strength and zeal in His cause, and for more love for the precious souls perishing around me and for wisdom to speak to them. Then I went along the railroad track, and was passing by a large saw mill, when a man called out to me, 'Have you got any books to sell?' 'Yes,' said I, 'do you want to buy some?' I went into the yard, I sold no books but had a long talk with the men. A young man, a French Roman Catholic, promised to come to our meeting, and came the next Sunday. I then went into a French Roman Catholic family where they had two Bibles, but they asked me to get for them two larger Bibles, as those they had were very small type. Here are three families who will read the Bible in spite of their priests."

"Nearly every day Roman Catholics come to my house and ask about the scriptures, when I have the opportunity of showing them the true way of salvation as opposed to the way of salvation of the Roman Catholic Church. Every day, and often many times a day, Roman Catholics ask me, when reading to them the scriptures, what we Protestants believe."

"Last year we were insulted in a good many places, but this year the same people are very kind to us, and a good many desire to speak to us about the Bible. Two members of a Roman Catholic family have been converted. One wishes to go to the mission school; and her sister is trying to make and save something to be able to go to Pointe-aux-Trembles schools next winter."

"A Roman Catholic said to me to-day, 'I have the Bible, but my conscience is not at rest. I know what God wants me to do, but don't do it.' Another Roman Catholic said to me, 'I have no knowledge of the gospel, my father used to read it, and my mother beat me once for reading it secretly. When my father died the book disappeared, and for that reason I do not know the Bible. But that does not keep me from seeing the error of my church so well that I have lost faith in her teachings. I go to please my friends, and to keep up appearances.' After some conversation he bought a New Testament; may God bless it to his conversion. His companion said, 'I just take what is good in my church, and come and see me in my home."

"In speaking with a notary, the subject of our conversation turned upon the hypocrisy of the clergy. "It is I who know it," said he, "for many of them are my old college friends." Besides, he said that one of his sisters had suffered in a convent, and then, "I would like to know what takes place in these fine big convents." He is now reading a Bible which I lent him.

"The other evening we went into a house occupied by two families, and were made welcome. Soon we were engaged in conversation. I could see a marked change, although I frequently visited them, and they have had the gospel for three years. The mother and children made known to me their decision to abandon the Church of Rome for the gospel, but not so the father. Every opportunity I had I had spoken to him of the gospel and the Saviour, and was always listened to attentively. This evening I asked him to state clearly his mind, when he replied, that for some time a great change had taken place within him, and he had made up his mind to unite with his family in joining the Church of Christ. I spent three hours in reading and explaining the gospel to these thirsty souls. One of the daughters is married to a Roman Catholic husband, and attended the Protestant church during his absence at the shanties. When he came home he wished to force her to go with him. Not being willing, he persuaded her to go with him to the priest. She went willingly, and was not ashamed to confess her faith. She told the curé tnat she would never kneel at his feet to confess her sins; that God alone could pardon sin; and that she would follow the gospel of Jesus. The priest told her that her gospel was not a good one. "Where, then, can I find a good one?" she asked. He answered, that if she could find a copy of the New Testament translated by the Monseigneur Baillargeon she might read it. I lent her my copy, as her husband will be disposed to listen to the reading and find light."

"Six Roman Catholics came to my house during the month to ask questions about the Bible. I read many passages with them, and urged them to seek to know more and more the truth. They have now the New Testament. May their eyes and hearts be opened."

"I was offering the Bible to some men working in a yard. Some of them insulted me, and said my Bibles were not good. I showed them that they were good, and talked with them about half an hour, when some of them agreed with me and bought some tracts. When I had gone along the street about thirty yards, some one threw a stone which struck me on the back, hurting me so badly that I had to take the cars home, and was ill for five days. May God touch the heart of that man, and enable him to see his error and do better."

"A young Roman Catholic told me the other day that he had had lost faith in his Church, and that he was going to see his priest, and then come to see me. He said, 'I want to know the truth and to be saved, and I must therefore take the right way.' I encouraged him to continue in his search. I was speaking with two men in the market, with one of

them for the first time who listened very attentively. One of them said, 'I know many who have left the Catholic Church to become 'suisses.' I asked him if they became worse. 'No,' said he, 'they became better. Before they were swearers and liars. Their lives have been completely changed.'"

"Mr. L. came to my house with a letter from one of our missionaries, asking me to try and find work for him. He told me that his wife was not converted, nor his brother-in-law and family, living in the same house with him. I went with him to his home and found there several Roman Catholics. I read with them for about two hours, and had prayers before leaving. The next day he came to me ngain, saying that his wife had been very much impressed with what I had read, and asked me if I would come and speak to their priest, as many young men who had begun to doubt them would be glad to know what the priest would say about the Bible. I fixed the next Saturday afternoon. That day I went with Mr. L. and a few friends to the Jesuit Church, on——street. One came who had been a superior, and I, showing a Bible, asked if it was good to read it. 'No,' said he, 'because it has not the approbation of our clergy.' I asked why they did not give an approved copy to each family. He answered that in the Catholic Church, though they read the Bible, they have another foundation. I answered that I was very glad to hear that from the mouth of a priest, and that some of his people also heard it. Seeing his blunder, he rubbed his hands and smiled pleasantly, and asked me what my religion was. 'I am a Christian,' I answered. 'Oh, yes,' said he, 'I know you Protestants say so, but it is not true; and the proof of it is that you are divided into more than sixty sects'. Then I said, in order to lose no time, 'I am a Presbyterian,' and asked him to what denomination he belonged, saying that I had been told that he was a Jesuit. 'No,' said he. Turning to Mr. L., who heard this denial, I asked if it were not true that this priest was a Jesuit, and he answered 'yes.' The Roma. Catholics who came with us are convinced that we Protestanzare not afraid of the priests, and also that their church claims to have another foundation of them will learn to know and accept the truth."

MISSION SCHOOLS.

Ignorance, being the mother of superstition, is a chief hindrance to evangelization; hence the necessity for mission day schools, in which the ordinary subjects of primary schools are taught, as well as the truths of scripture. They have been a blessing to a large number of Roman Catholic children, and to many scattered Protestant families Iving in districts where they would either be without schools of any sort, or be obliged to send their children to the Roman Catholic Schools, the character of which is well known. In the County of Ottawa, at St. Haycinthe, Joliette, Stc. Anne, etc., there are ten schools which owe their existence to the fostering care of the Board, and are now self-supporting. These are not included in this report, and will account for the apparent falling off in attendance for the year. Twenty-four mission day schools and three night schools have been carried on. Seven hundred and ninety scholars were enrolled, of whom three hundred and sixty-five were Roman Catholics. The average attendance has been over five hundred.

A school has recently been opened in St. Gabriel Ward, Montreal, with good prospects of success.

This system of mission day schools is completed by the central mission schools at Pointe aux Trembles, whose feeders to a large extent they are.

POINTE AUX TREMBLES SCHOOLS.

These Schools are situated on the north shore of the St Lawrence River, nine miles east of Montreal. They were founded in 1846 by the French Canadian Missionary Society, and were purchased by the General Assembly of our Church in 1880. On the mission property there are two school buildings, one for boys, which can accommodate about 120, and the other for girls, with accommodation for between 80 and 3° including the recent extension. Upwarks of 3,500 French Canadians have already been educated here. Many of these now occupy positions of trust and influence as ministers, teachers, physicians, lawyers, merchants, etc. Pupils are admitted between the ages of thirteen and twenty-five, the average age being seventeen. A preference is given to the sons and daughters of French Roman Catholic parents and to the children of recent converts from Rome, living in parishes where there is no Protestant school. Many of these are unable to read or write when first received into the schools. The session begins in October each year and continues for seven months. The pupils all reside in the buildings, and thus enjoy the advantages of a Christian home, under the watchful nurture of earnest, devoted teachers. They all take their share of housework. The day's duties are thus laid out.—Rise at 5.30 a.m. All are in the class-room studying privately from 6 to 7. Breakfast at 7. House and out-door work from 7.30 to 8.45. Family worship, when all assemble together, boys and girls, at 8.45. School begins at 9 with united Bible-class for all, and continues till 12. Dinner at 12, followed by recreation to 7; studying privately in class-room till 9, then family worship, (boys and girls in their separate buildings) at 9, and

They are earnest Christians of devoted, missionary spirit, thoroughly consecrated, it is believed, to their work. The Principal, Rev. J. Bourgoin, has been twenty-one years connected with the institution, and is admirably adapted for his position. Miss Vessot, formerly French teacher in the Montreal High School, and daughter of one of our oldest missionaries, is Directress of the girls school. She, as well as all the other teachers, renders most efficient service.

Special prominence is given to the religious instruction of the pupils, and to the teaching of God's Word on the points of difference between Protestants and Roman Catholics. In these every pupil is thoroughly indoctrinated, and it is no exaggeration to state that comparatively few of our English speaking young men and women are better acquainted with their Bibles, or better able to give a reason for the hope that is in them, than are the pupils of Pointe aux Trembles when thay leave the Mission Schools there.

The attendance last session was one hundred and eighty-eight, the largest in the history of the Institution. Not only is great care exercised in the selection of pupils from the increasingly large number of French Canadians applying for admission, but the policy of the Board in inducing the brightest among them to continue for three or four consecutive sessions, is bearing manifest fruit. The schools are visited and examined monthly by a committee of the Board appointed for the purpose, and towards the end of the session written examinations are held on all the subjects taught during the year. A public closing examination took place in the last week of April, which was attended by a large number of ministers and other friends, who bore testimony to the efficiency of the schools, and to the thoroughness of the teaching given, especially in Bible studies.

When the Board acquired the property in 1880, they resolved to admit no pupils gratuit ously, except Roman Catholics whose parents were unable or unwilling to contribute. All others are required to pay something, in proportion to their ability, towards board and tuition. The amount received in this way during the past session was \$1,639. A considerable portion of this amount received in this way during the past session was \$1,039. A considerable portion of this amount was money earned by the pupils themselves during the preceding summer. This result is most gratifying, indicating as it does an increasing appreciation of the value of a good education. After deducting these fees, the average cost to the Church of each pupil is \$50 per session. The Board desire that the institution should be supported by means of scholarships of \$50 each, guaranteed by private individuals or Sabbath Schools. A particular pupil is assigned to the donor of a scholarship, to whom the state of the state of the state of the schools. reports as to the progress made are forwarded from time to time. In this way a Sabbath School contributing a scholarship, is put directly in correspondence with the Mission School, and the letters, if read publicly to the Sabbath School, tend to keep up their interest in the work. The enlargement of the buildings and the consequent increase in the number of pupils necessitates a very large increase in expenditure annually. It is hoped, therefore, that many more of the Sabbath Schools of the Church will assume the support of a pupil. From those unable to do so, a contribution is earnestly asked. The Board have no hesitation in warmly commending the schools as worthy of public confidence, assured that no means are likely, by the blessing of God, to be more efficacious in the work of French Canadian Evangelization, and in advancing the cause of Christ in the Province of Quebec. Year after year God has munifestly set His seal upon this work, and blessed the labors of the teachers, but never perhaps has there been a more successful session than the one just ended. "The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad."

As reported to last Assembly, the debt on the buildings was \$2,716. It is encouraging to report that this amount has been entirely removed, and the buildings are now free from indebtedness. It is, however, necessary to put new heating apparatus into the boys' building and to renew the fences &c., on the whole property. This will entail an expenditure of about \$1,250. It is hoped that there will be a considerable saving in fuel after the new furnaces have been put in.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL.

Two years have not yet passed away since the enlargement of our Mission Schools sons to accommodate about two hundred pupils, and we are glad to say that during the past session one hundred and eighty-eight boys and girls have been received.

Ninety-one were children of converted families and ninety-seven children of Roman

The proportion of scholars belonging to the Church of Rome has never been so great, and we felt somewhat doubtful about the advisability of taking so many. However, Protestants and Catholics lived in the very best harmony, and though they had, almost every day, long and lively discussions about the particular teachings of the Church of Rome, we saw with pleasure that they always remained friendly, and that gradually those who had been the bravest supporters of the errors of the Church of Rome retreated before the light of the gospel, and at last accepted it as the only rule of their faith. Twenty of our new pupils openly confessed Jesus as their Saviour, and they were admitted into the fellowship of the Church. Eighteen of our young men and young women have expressed their desire of devoting themselves to missionary work, and four of them have already been sent to various

fields of labour.

Our scholars are divided into five classes, taught in the following subjects by our scinars are divided into the classes, taught in the following subjects by six teachers:—Bible, Reading, Writing, Grammar, Dictation, Composition, Literature, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Geography, History of Canada, History of England, General History, Drawing, Singing, Latin, Greek, English, Bookkeeping, Art of Teaching, Hygiene, Besides the religious instruction which the pupils receive in our public services, prayer meetings and Sat-bath school, where all are present, they receive every day a Bible lesson, in which salvation through faith in Christ is the main subject. The pupils learn every day a few passages of the Scriptures, with a few questions of the Shorter Catechism, and they are provided with numerous arguments for justifying their new faith, and to help them they are provided with numerous arguments for justifying their new faith, and to help them in repulsing the attacks of Roman Catholics. It has been most gratifying to us to see pupils who not long ago were firm Roman Catholics, take an active part not only in prayer meetings among themselves, but also in public meetings, and work with perseverance to bring to

Jesus our recruits who were adhering to the teachings of the Church of Rome.

They show the same zeal towards their parents and by their letters, the reading of the Bible when they are permitted, and by their devoted and respectful conduct, they seldom

The pupils have studied faithfully and diligently during the whole session, and their rapid progress has been checked only by the visit of "la grippe," from which scarcely one of our young people escaped, though, thanks to our Heavenly Father, all recovered.

As we glance over the past session our hearts go out in praise to God, who has spared

all those committed to our care, and has cheered by the light of the truth many young souls, who had vainly sought peace and salvation in their own merits, and who had after all no

other prospect but the flames of purgatory.

The departure of our Scholars leaves us lonesome and anxious. We know that they are going to pass through many trials, difficulties and temptations unknown to young Protestants generally. If the vacation is a happy time for those who go to spend it with converted parents, it is a time of hardship for those who, with new ideas, new principles, new faith and new aspirations, have to go again into Roman Catholic homes, where every day they will be compelled to face those errors, superstitions and prejudices sharpened by ignorance and malice, and which often they cannot repel openly without offending those whom they cherish, and whom they must respect. Sometimes the conflict is put to an end by a glorious victory of the truth, but not infrequently by the expulsion of the young heretic, who is obliged to carry elsewhere his light, which is hurtful to the sight of weak eyes which have never been opened except in darkness.

However, the fact that since a few years the number of pupils in the various mission schools has more than doubled, is showing plainly that the families who desire to see their children educated under the influence of the Gospel, are increasing rapidly in number, and

many now do it openly, without fear of their priests or of their neighbors.

It is most evident that there are thousands of intelligent people around us, who are longing for the abolition of a system which keeps the mass of the nation in perpetual ignorance, poverty and servitude, and leaves before the children of the soil no other means of escaping tyranny and starvation, but to go and offer to a foreign nation their strength and industry in exchange for bread and liberty.

In presence of the pressing need of our countrymen, may the Lord strengthen our faith, quicken our zeal and put in our hearts a sincere desire to work diligently in the glorions work of winning the Province of Quebec for our Master.

It will be remembered that this congregation came out of the Church of Rome with Father Chiniquy at the time of his conversion. Since then, to the present, the people have been much indebted to the venerable father for his earnest efforts in their behalf. It is unnecessary to say anything here of his apostolical labors in Canada and other countries, for the overthrow of error and the establishment of truth.

PRESBYTERIES OF GLENGARRY AND BARRIE.

Two colporteurs of the Board labor in the Glengarry Presbytery, and one in the Barrie Presbytery, in the neighborhood of Penetangnishene. This presbytery is to be congratulated on having among its workers Messrs. Rondeau and Pelletier, former missionaries of the Board, who will not overlook our numerous fellow citizens of French origin in Eastern Algonia.

A few extracts from reports and notes of missionaries will give some idea of what is being done, and the influences at work :

"Walked to-day nineteen miles across the mountains visiting the people. Spent five hours with one Roman Catholic family; they appeared to be greatly interested in the word, and wanted me to come and speak to them again. The people around here are very illiterate, and progress must be necessarily slow."

"Our hearts have been cheered by the consciousness that our labours are not in vaia, and that God is pleased to acknowledge our efforts in His cause. I have met many Reman Catholics to whom it has been my privilege to preach the glad tidings, who listened to me with interest, and in many cases showing evidence of an inward longing after a higher, purer power, to satisfy the needs of their hearts, and acknowledging that the Church of Rome did not afford them that spiritual peace of which I spoke, as the result of following the voice of the Lord through the gospel."

"Many know that in forsaking their Church and in embracing the gospel truth they would be happier. They would like to do so and confessed the same to me, but are, in most cases, prevented in doing so by some worldly interest."

"A gentlemen said to me; 'I know that I should study the Bible, but I fear to do so lest the study of it create such disgust in my heart against the Church of Rome, that I shall abandon it altogether.' I manifested surprise at such a statement and showed him his inconsistency and guilt in refusing to take a step which he knew to be his duty to take, while he continued to follow a course which he knew and acknowledged to be a wrong one. To this he became very serious and said; 'Ah sir! you do not know the consequences of my taking such a step; it means failure in my business, and I am not strong enough in my

I again expostulated with him showing him the danger of delay in matters pertaining to eternity, showing him that it was better for him to fail a hundred times in all he undertook in this world, than to live without God and without hope in Christ. I left him serious and sad, but, as I hope to see him often, I trust God will bless my efforts, and lead him captive at His feet."

- "Another gentleman said to me: 'There are hundreds of us protestants, and were it not that we lack courage, we would completely sever our connection with the Catholic Church, and become regular attendants of yours, but we are all afraid lest we should suffer in our worldly interests. The priests have a powerful influence over a certain class of people, they can lead a certain portion of the population as they choose, and turn them against us. —There are scores of such cases, and I am convinced that in the near future thousands throughout the country will emancipate themselves from the chains and power of Romanism. We can but be faithful in sowing the seed, and ask God to water it and give it growth. May the Almighty God kindle into a thune the spark of zeal existing within our hearts, that we may become more and more consecrated to His service."
- "Six Roman Catholics came to meeting at P- -. When it was over they all came to me asking for New Testaments, saying 'we must know more of Jesus.' I have since visited them in their homes, and have been pleased to see them so decided in seeking the truth of the
- "Two Roman Catholic families have just left A--... They said, we cannot join your Church here where all are against us, but in the States we shall all become Protestants at once."
- "A man from P- N- came one day to my house. He wanted to see me, and learn our belief. I hastened to direct him to the infallible source of life. On leaving he accepted a Bible. Since then I am glad to say that he has decided to send his son, a boy of thirteen, to the Pointe-aux-Trembles Schools, and so our great work progresses favorably."
- "I am happy to tell you that I visited St. A-eighteen miles from here on the invitation of a Roman Catholic. Three fathers of families were gathered together in a house to hear me explain the Gospel, which I did from four in the afternoon until eleven at night. I can assure you it was good to see them listen, and devour, as it were, the truth. They have invited me to go back, and promised to have a good gathering of people to hear me. So thus the good work is spreading.
- "My wife and I have just spent two days at P- The meetings in the School house and the private houses were delightful. Romanists no longer fear me, and five families of them invited us to come and read the Bible with them. They all say we are very much pleased, you read the Gospel to us, we know now that it is the word of God."
- "It is remarkable how the sick and dying send for me, wishing to speak of Jesus. I am just in from such a visit, where I spent all the night and part of this morning, with a man who sent for me the mement the priest was away from his house, and I met him coming as I was going. I am very tired at times, and the work so trying, but Jesus is with us and we must speak of Him to these Roman Catholics who are so willing to listen."
- "The Roman Catholics are sending for us, and coming to us every day. It is the beginning of brighter days and great results. The French Protestants still suffer persecution and go in great numbers to the States, so do not look for results in the number of people attending the meetings. The year has had many many trials, and only God knows it, but far more joy and fruits than my poor faith deserved; so I say, 'Bless the Lord, O my Soul! Trust in the Lord and He shall bring it to pass.'"
- "Latterly I came in contact with a young man named A-, who frequents the house - our Colporteur at L After many conversations he took a copy of the word of God home to the house of his aunt, where he boarded, but found it necessary to hide the book from her. He read it until he became convinced of its truth, and then could not keep it to himself, but at once opened his mind to a young man, one of his companions, who is now studying it for himself. Encouraged by this he went a step further, and was soon reading it to his aunt, who gave him liberty to place a copy of it on her table. Meanwhile the priest eard that this young man was not only reading the Bible himself, but also to others during the evening hours, and privately unnounced that he would denounce from the pulpit these evangelistic meetings. The young man heard of it, and went in company with his friend to the priest's house. He told the priest of the rumor, and said that in so doing he was about to commit a great injustice unknowingly, if he denounced him publicly for reading the worst of God, and asked if it would not have been better to carry out the injunction of Matt., xviii. 18, handing him the book he held in his hand, and asking if he could call that a bad book. "I am sorry to report that two of my best families have gone away; my heart is heavy. Nine persons gone in one day! God hless them where they go. I rejoice to see our Roman Catholic people coming more and more. During the month, at twenty-five cottage prayer

Catholic people coming more and more. During the month, at twenty-five cottage prayer meetings, over seventy Roman Catholics were present."

"For the last three weeks our parish priest has denounced us and preached against our mission schools and especially the Pointe-anx-Trembles Schools. He said: 'Four young men from here are at those schools. They will cove back devils. Do not let them come near you. Send them away from the parish.' On Monday two Roman Catholics visited me and told me of the priest's sermon; and added 'we must put an end to such talk. If people most to a vour Church or sand their children to a Protestant School it is their business. want to go to your Church or send their children to a Protestant School it is their business and the priest should not interfere.'

shelf but no one dare open it. At last one evening a little boy took it and tried to read a little but he only spelt and read two verses in St. John's Gospel. At the time the father was sick in bed; the next evening he called his son to him and said; 'Will you try and read again in your book; tind the place you read yesterday; it speaks of Jesus giving eternal life. The passage was found and read. Last Sunday I visited the family, the father having asked for me. To all human appearance the man is dying and his friends are glad that the riest has visited him and given human absolution, but I rejoice to report the words of the dying man: 'Sir, I am ignorant, but oh! I believe that it is true Jesus gives eternal life!'"
"Four years ago a brother minister and myself were visiting the French Protestants in

our county; one day I said to my friend, please wait for me a few minutes and I will go and offer a New Testament to the people of that house. This I did, telling them I had the Word of God for sale, and reading a few verses out of it; they bought and paid for a copy. I promised to call again if I ever passed there. A few weeks ago I went back to the house, and was greeted in this way: 'O sir why did you not come back before this. Our son went away to the States two years ago and took the book with him, but we want one, for he wrote and told us to buy one at once and to read it, for it is the true Book of God."

Yesterday at 10 p.m. a Roman Catholic lady came and with tears said: 'My boy is dying come, come at once, he must not die without seeing you.' Of course I went; some thirty men and women were in the house. I went immediately to the poor sick boy, pressed his hand and and women were in the noise. I went immediately to the poor sick boy, pressed his hain and saked him if he suffered. 'No, no, but I am so afraid to die, the priest was here, I took the bon dieu; send them all away, speak, speak to me.' For three hours I spoke and prayed, then some bigotted fellow sent for the priest, but as it was 2 a.m. he would not come and the father of the boy said, 'My son is well prepared now; he says that Jesus is coming for him, that is all I want for him and for me.'"

"During the past month we have had proofs of this truth: "that the minds of the people are getting more anxious and more desirious of light." I am more and more convinced that hundreds are convinced of the errors of Romanism and of the truth of Protestantism, but, of course, not being acquainted with Holy Scripture they cannot, as yet, judge the extent of their errors. Still light is spreading gradually, the dawn has broken upon the thick darkness of Romanism, and, ere very long the beautiful "Sun of righteousness" will rise and shine in glory, purity and truth and the darkness will disappear. Rome is still mighty in appearance, but is is tottering at its base. People wonder what power can sustain and comfort us in days of trial, and many are led, from inquiry, into searching for themselves, in the search of the order, if possible to find the same light and comfort.

Many more extracts of like nature might be given from the reports of colporteurs and missionaries, but the foregoing are sufficient to make apparent,-

- 1. The fidelity of colporteurs, teachers and missionaries in presenting to the people a pure Gospel, and in preaching Christ and Him crucified.
- The people's appreciation of the advantages of the education given in our schools and of the missionaries' services, in sending for them in times of trial and distress.
- 3. The spirit of inquiry and independence is manifestly growing among the people, many appearing determined to have the word of God.
- 4. The continued depletion of the ranks of the converts by emigration to the United States.
 - 5. The need of extending our work on the old lines.

COLIGNY COLLEGE, OTTAWA.

The Session just closing has been one of success, not unmingled with sorrow. The attendance of pupils was one hundred and fourteen, of whom thirty-three were boarders and eighty-one day pupils. Early in January Mrs. Crawford, the Principal, was taken seriously ill with the prevailing influenza, followed by pneumonia, brought on, it is believed, by her assiduous attention to duty and especially by anxiety and increased labor consequent on the sickness of one or two of the resident pupils, after their return from the Christmas vacation, Every thing was done that careful nursing and medical skill could accomplish to promote her recovery, but God willed it otherwise, and after a brief illness she was removed by death, to the great sorrow of the members of her family and of all the teachers and pupils, and to the unspeakable loss of the institution. Others of the teachers were for a time laid aside by illness. These were all happily restored to health, and the work of the College went on with comparatively little interruption.

Miss Jessie McBratney, who has been senior English teacher for the past three years, was appointed to act as Principal to the close of the Session, and has discharged the duties of the position with such marked ability and tact that the Board have formally appointed her as Principal of the College. She possesses special qualifications for the office, having had lengthened experience in teaching both in Montreal and Ottawa, proving herself a teacher and disciplinarian of rare ability and exercising a most healthful Christian influence over young ladies, whom she has the faculty of attaching to herself and moulding

With Miss McBratney next Session will be associated a thoroughly efficient staff of trained and experienced teachers of pronounced Christian character.

The Board are determined to spare no effort to make the College second to no Yeang Ladies School in the country, and with the experience of the past three years, hope to make it worthy of the confidence of all parents desiring for their daughters a first-class education in a truly Christian home.

The terms for Tuition and BOARD have been fixed at the lowest point consistent with efficiency. The cost for resident pupils for board with furnished room, fuel and light, and tuition in all the ordinary branches, including French, German and Latin, ranges from \$150 to \$172.50 per session of 38 weeks.

The buildings occupy a most eligible site in the Capital of the Dominion, and are most admirably adapted for educational purposes. They are spacious, well furnished, lighted with gas, heated with steam and hot water, and provided with all modern conveniences for health and comfort, the sanitary arrangements being perfect. The grounds are large and well laid out, and are utilized for lawn tennis, croquet, etc.

The course of study extends over six Sessions of about nine months each, and embraces the following departments:—1st, Preparatory; 2nd, Junior; 3rd, Intermediate; 4th, Senior; 5th, Collegiate. The musical department is in charge of a graduate of Oxford University, England, holding honor diplomas from the Rocal Academy of Music, and Trinity College of Music, London. There is a Kindergarten un an an experienced English Teacher, with a French assistant. There are also resident teachers of French and German, from France and Germany. The next Session commences on 13th September. Circulars with full particulars as to terms, fees, etc., can be obtained on application to the Rev. Dr. Warden,

Through the generosity of Baroness Earnscliffe and Messrs. Orme and Gill of Ottawa and Mr. David Morrice of Montreal, gold and silver medals and prizes are offered for competition next session.

From the Treasurer's statement it will be observed that the receipts from fees, board, etc., met the entire ordinary expenditure of the year, and also about \$800 of the interest on the mortgage on the property. The indebtedness on the building now amounts to \$22,396, having been reduced \$693 during the year.

Were this indebtedness removed, there is a reasonable prospect of making ends meet from year to year. Otherwise the experience of the past indicates that this cannot be done and accomplish the object aimed at by the General Assembly.

The opening of the institution under the auspices of the Church has, it is believed checked the tendency on the part of many of our families to send their daughters to convent, and thus good has been accomplished. About one-fifth of the resident pupils during the last three years have being French-speaking, to whom the College has been the means of much good. The removal of the indebtedness on the property will be most helpful in this direction, and will enable the Board to increase the efficiency of the College generally.

While cordially thanking all who have aided in the work during the past year, the White containty thanking all who have added in the work during the past year, the Board desire especially to thank the Presbyterian Church of Ireland for the renewal of its annual grant of £150 stg.; the National Bible Society of Scotland for its aid in the work of colportage; Mr. Geo. D. Fergusson, of Fergus, and Mr. Ignatius Cockshutt, of Brantford, for the continuance of their generous contributions, the former of \$500 to the General Fund, and the latter of \$500 to the Pointe aux Trembles Schools; and Mr. Henry Morton, of Montreal, who annually furnishes a large case of stationery, etc., for the mission schools.

SUMMARY.

The work under the care of the Board during the year embraced thirty six congregations and mission fields, ninety-five preaching stations, with nine hundred and forty-two Protestant families. The average sabbath attendance was over three thousand and twenty, of whom nine hundred and forty-one were Roman Catholics. One hundred and forty-three were added to the church, making a total membership of over fourteen hundred and twenty-three. Eleven hundred and eighteen scholars attended Sabbath School. The people contributed six thousand, two hundred and lifty-five dollars. One new field was occupied, and the congregation of St. Anne transferred (page eleven). Thirteen colporieurs were employed and eighteen hundred and sixty Bibles and New Testaments, and about twenty-six thousand religious tracts and papers distributed. Forty-two thousand and ninety-two visits were made. Seven hundred and ninety scholars (page six), of whom three hundred and sixty-five were from Roman Catholic homes, attended the Mission day schools, with an average attendance of over five hundred. Seventeen French speaking students attended college during the winter, three of whom graduated in theology and have since been licensed. One hundred and eighty-eight pupils attended the Pointe-nux-Trembles Schools, ninety-seven of whom came from Roman Catholic homes. One hundred and fourteen attended Coligny College, Ottawa. The total number of laborers employed, including twenty-four ordained ministers, four licentiates, missionaries, teachers and Colporteurs is seventy-time. Total receipts, fifty-six thousand, five hundred and fourteen dollars, and twenty-three cents. families. The average subbath attendance was over three thousand and twenty, of whom nine

Good work has been done in the various fields with four or five exceptions. While all has not been done that might have, there are results sufficient to encourage the devoted missionary, and to stimulate the faith and quicken the zeal of the Church in her efforts to "preach the gospel to every creature."

I.-NEW HEBRIDES.

In co-operation with the Agents of sister Presbyterian Churches in Scotland and Australasia, our three tried and trusty missionaries have, during the past year, carried on their work in Eromanga, Efate and Santo with their accustomed wisdom and energy. Some shadows have fallen upon the plain of their experience and work, but on the whole the year has been to them one of light and gladness. Mr. and Mrs. Robertson and their family have been kept in a fair measure of health, which enabled them since their return from Sydney a year ago to prosecute their labours without interruption. Mr. and Mrs. Mackenzie have been obliged to take a trip to Australia for the purpose of recruiting their failing health. We carnestly pray and trust that they will soon be enabled to return to their field in full vigour of body and soul, refreshed by intercourse with the good Christian people among whom they sojourn. Mr. and Mrs. Annand have been under severe strain from the savages of Santo, who not only attacked and put to death a white trader, but also directly and indirectly affected for evil the people whom our missionaries were beginning to influence by the Gospel of peace. We are persuaded that this backset will be but temporary. The kingdom of darkness driven to desperation is putting forth a spasm of effort to retain its ground, but the truth of God is mightier and calmly awaits the day of its triumph.

MISSION SYNOD.

This body met at Aneityum, May 28, 1891, and continued in session till June 6. Our three missionaries were present. Dr. Steel, who has acted as the Agent of our own Church and some of the Australian Churches, resigned his office, and the Synod adopted a minute expressing its sense of the great value of his services to the missions. It was ag ...d that the money realized by sale of the Dayspring be capitalized and the interest be devoted to meeting current expenses of the steamboat service.

Reports from the various stations were favourable. The mission families had enjoyed a fair measure of health. The progress at all the stations was good—at some it was marked. At Futuna the membership has increased, and Christian marriage has been celebrated for the first time. On Tongoa and Shepherd Isles there are now no professed heathen; and a large number has been added to the membership of the Church. A church has been formed at Ma', and 14 more have renounced heathenism. Nine natives have come to live on the mission premises on Tangoa, Santo, and are desirous of instruction. The Synod welcomed back Mr. and Mrs. Watt, who brought with them a translation of the whole New Testament into the language of Tanna, the gift of Sabbath schools in South Australia. The work is much hampered by the lack of efficient teachers.

"The Native Teachers' Fund" was declared closed, and the various Churches supporting the mission will henceforth be required to bear the expenses connected with the teachers of their own missionaries. The following estimate for all purposes for 1892 for the Presbyterian Church in Canada was approved by the Synod: Rev. H. A. Robertson, £375; Rev. J. W. Mackenzie, £272; Rev. Joseph Annand, £175; Dayspring, £250.

The Synod of 1892 is now in session in the same place.

DR. STEEL.

The Committee accepted the resignation of Dr. St el of the Agency for our Church in Australia, and put on record its appreciation of the work he has done for us during his incumbency of the office. Arrangements have not as yet been completed for the future, but will be during the coming summer.

STEAM SERVICE.

The accommodation rendered to our missionaries by the monthly steamer has been much appreciated by them. The Committee learns with regret that the New South Wales Government subsidy has been withdrawn, but it is believed the service will not be discontinued, and that some means will be found of making the grant without additional cost to the Churches.

REPORTS.

We subjoin the reports of our three missionaries, which tell the story of the year's work with a reality that no second hand can give.

THE WORK ON EROMANDA FOR 1890-91.

Rev. H. A. Robertson.

While there have been some things to discourage us during the two years covered by this brief report, and while the conduct of some of our young people living at the principal station has greatly grieved us, revealing unmistakably the coarseness of their natures, the extreme lowness of their whole moral life, and their unblushing effrontery, yet on the other hand, we have been greatly cheered and encouraged by the life and manners of a large number of our leading Christians all over this island.

True, many former years witnessed far greater external change, such as giving up their degrading heathenism and their wars, in which much property was destroyed, lives lost, and bitter feelings engendered, causing shocking murders afterward to square accounts, and which in turn led again to war madly carried on by the entire population.

But during the last two years our more advanced Christian people, men and women, including all our elders and the most of our teachers, have shown much interest in the mission on their own island, and their has been, and still is, a thoughtful, quiet gentleness in all their words and actions, and a growing interest in the training of their own children, as also in the schools for the training of the young people of the whole island. There has been shown much warm Christian sympathy for us in our serious sickness, a deepening respect for ourselves and our word as Christ's servants, and a devoutness in prayer that deeply touched our hearts and caused us through tears to exclaim, "What hath God wrought!" We have seen a wonderful, delightful change in Eromanga in twenty years. To God be all the glory.

During 1890 we had 30 teachers employed in Eromanga, and two young men assisting the leading teachers at Dillon's Bay and Portina Bay. Owing, however, to deaths, sickness, unsuitableness, and one case of sin, we have only had 26 during 1891.

We expect soon to settle four new teachers, though at old stations.

Besides the work on orr island, as elders and teachers, our people have been, as in former years, assisting some of the missionaries on other islands. One of my elders has just gone to take charge of Mr. Michelson's work on the Shepherd Islands. Mr. Michelson had this man for several years, and was so well pleased with him that he asked me if I would allow him to go to Tongoa and take charge of his entire mission field, the Shepherd Isles, until he and his family return from their furlough. I was be given to At the two principal stations, Dillou's Bay on the west side, and Portnarevin (sandy port), on the east, there have been regularly conducted on Sabbaths an early morning service at 7 o'clock, another at 10, and Sabbath school at 3 p.m., which have been very well attended.

There is an early morning week day school each morning except on Saturday, which is well attended. On the same days and at a later hour there is a class for children, which has been remarkably well attended, and at last we have succeeded in getting parents and friends to allow their children to live at Dillon's Bay in order to attend this school.

Prayer-meeting is held every Wednesday afternoon in summer, and in the early morning in winter, and is fairly well sitended.

At all the 26 outstations there are two services on Sunday, i.e., forenoon service, and Sunday school in the afternoon, early morning schools during the week except on Saturday, and prayer-meetings on Wednesday afternoons. All go to the early morning class for an hour daily.

Upon the whole I have great comfort with my teachers, and my eight elders give me much help. All of our elders and teachers are fairly good speakers; perhaps half a dozen of them are good, clear, preachers of the Gospel. One, Yomot, is excelled by few white clergymen as an instructive preacher. But as a rule they are all poor teachers. They lack patience, tact and perseverance. They do not like to teach beginners. They much prefer instructing those who are able to read more or less freely and easily.

The Lord's Supper is dispensed once a year at east and west stations alternately. We used to have it twice a year, but found it too much for the old and infirm to travel so far more than once a year. Last December we met at Portnarevin, and in July last, 1891, the people came from all parts of the island to Dillon's Bay. And after a delightful day on the 12th of that month, when the Lord's Supper was dispensed, they continued with us for a fortnight, attending classes and ministering to us when we were both ill after communion Sabbath.

Before returning home, the once savage, warlike people of a district on the southeast side of the island extented a most pressing invitation to us to meet at their district next, and the invitation was so hearty and so polite, so unlike anything of the kind we had ever known of Eromangans, that we said we would comply, though it is an out-of the-way place, and no suitable house for us to live in. But how could we refuse?

Perhaps some of my readers may remember me telling many years ago of a missionary journey I was making, and how a maked chief pressed me to go to his village, a few miles beyond where I had intended to go that time, and how, when following my guide, I came upon an open space cut out of the forest, in the centre of which stood a neat school-house, just finished, and at one side a rude pulpit built for me by the chief; and a large present of yams and two immense hogs lying outside as a present for me; and how the old chief caught my hands and pressed me for a teacher to tell him about God and eternal life: and how I was obliged to seek a quiet spot to hide the tears that would flow, bite my lips as I might. Well, that is the district where we hope to join with that old chief's people and many other Eromangans in January next, 1892, in remembering-Christ's death.

The Christian natives have given the following free labour for mission: They burned two large kilns of lime, finished a mission cottage at Elizabeth Bay, gathered thatching for four mission buildings, cleared twico the undergrowth from the road across the Island, kept clean the graves of the martyrs, kept the mission boats painted, and did all the boating required in visiting other parts of the Island, kept up all the district schoolhouses, built five new ones, and prepared and shipped to Glasgow, Scotland, 16 casks (3,000 pounds) superior arrowroot. In addition to this there has been paid labour to

the value of £60 stg., i.e., apart from the teachers, to servants and others engaged at times during the two years.

The number of Christian marriages in 1890-91 has been 36. The number of adults

baptized, 16; infants, 40.

The whole population of Eromanga in 1888 was 2,540. The only professed heathen are a very few on the extreme south of the island, and a few at the north end. Nearly all would feel insulted if they were spoken of as pure heathen. There are no enemies, I visit every village in all parts of the island, and the missionary party is everywhere received with great friendliness and kindness.

During these two years I have put into the hands of the natives, in their own tongue, the first edition of the four Gospels, and a second edition of the Acts of the Apostles, bound in one; 2,000 copies-1,000 bound in cloth, and 1,000 lying in sheets in Sydney until required; also 2,000 copies of our catechism and hymnal bound in cloth. The Gospels and Acts cost, including hinding 1,000 copies, £170 stg.; the catechism and hymnal, £27 10s. The British and Foreign Bible Society paid for the Gospels and Acts, and we are striving to refund the Society, in part at least. The small books we must pay from proceeds of arrowroot, as the B. & F. B. Society only pays for the printing of the Scriptures pure and simple.

I have made a translation of the Epistles of Peter, and began last night Romans

afresh, but find it a most difficult book to translate into Eromangan.

Thus my work goes on with its dark and bright sides. Such as it is, I offer it to the Foreign Mission Committee, the Church and the many personal friends whom God had given us within the Presbyterian Church in Canada, chief among whom I would mention those dear friends who, for so many years, have helped to support my teachers in this island. God has greatly blessed our poor labours in Eromanga.

REPORT FROM ERAKOR STATION.

By Rev. J. W. Mackenzie.

Although we have had several additions from the heathen, we cannot report much ground broken. Indeed, there is only one important village on our side of the island, still unevangelized, and owing to their preparation for a feast in honour of the principal chief, who died this last year, we have not been able to do much amongst them. It is their belief that if they would listen to the Gospel, while they are carrying on their feast, they would get sick and die.

With the conduct of our church members we have been much encouraged. Many of them have been most exemplary in their conduct, and have been giving evidence of the growth and development of the Christian life and character. Their contribution of arrowroot was the largest they have ever made. When it is sold we hope to pay in full the B. and F. Bible Society the balance we owe for the printing of the Efatese New Testament, and to have a considerable sum over towards meeting the expense of printing "Line upon Line," which some of our scholars are now translating, and a new edition of a hymn book, which we much require. During the past two years we paid the Bible Society out of the proceeds of arrowroot, a hundred and sixty-five pounds (£165) sterling.

Our collection this year for Foreign Missions, taken up at our last Communion, amounted to twenty-four pounds eight shillings (£24 8s.) sterling.

The regular Sabbath services, conducted by myself at the head station and by the native teachers at the out-stations, the Wednesday evening prayer-meeting, the weekly teachers' and candidates' classes, the weekly class for women, the training class and the week day schools were all kept up as formerly.

My experience in teaching English has not been entirely satisfactory, and of late we have not been devoting so much time. to it. The boys and young men who had acquired a smatter rather up attending taken do become n

nd of late we had acquired a smattering of it, seemed to think that it was so important an acquisition that they were rather uplifted thereby—at least many of them. Indeed with several of the young men attending the training class, pride seems to be the worst feature, and they require to be taken down a peg occasionally. We believe, however, that as they grow older they will become more satisfactory.

As trade is developing here, and as Fila Harbour is becoming an important place—
(the Australian Steam Navigation Co. and the New Hebrides Co. have their headquarters
there, and the Sydney steamer on its way to Fiji er 'ls there instead of at Ancityum) we
anticipate not a little discouragement in our work, in losing some of our smartest young
men, on whom we have spent many years of labour, training them for teachers. They
are found to be very serviceable on board trading vessels, and so good wages are offered
as an inducement for them to go. We have already had some experience in that direction.
But I suppose it is what we must expect.

Mrs. Mackenzie's school for settlers' children has increased somewhat this year. There are now ten attending. I should mention in regard to the settlers' children that we receive nothing for educating them. Three of them, who live with us, pay for their board, but two others, a half-caste and a Malay, we so far keep at our own expense, as they are orphans. Teaching these children involves a great deal of extra labour, but we feel it to be an important part of our work at present. They would otherwise grow up in ignorance without education of any kind. Some of them are children of Roman Catholic parents, but there is no restriction laid on us in regard to spiritual instruction, so we feel it is a good opportunity to sow seed which we trust will in due time spring up and bear fruit. Indeed, we have already reaped some fruit. I lately baptized one of the three for whom the school was opened, and at our last communion she sat down with us and commemorated our Saviour's death. On that occasion we had the presence of the Australian and New Hebrides Co's. manager -Mr. Roxburgh, who has a store at Fila Harbour. I may here mention that it is a great pleasure to us to have such a fine Christian gentleman as one of our neighbours. His presence here will do much to raise the tone of morality both among Europeans and natives.

SANTO.

Rev. J. Annand.

Under date of 5th May, 1891, Mr. Annand writes:-

"The prospects in regard to the establishment of the kingdom here are growing brighter. Since December we have had sixteen lads between twelve and eighteen years of age living with us. They have exceeded our expectation in their well-doing. Several of them can now read, and two of them lead their companions in social prayer-meetings.

"This advance on their part has stirred up a considerable amount of opposition. Several of the older people have left church, and in many ways show their disapproval of

what is being done. However, opposition is a healthy sign, a sign that the enemy's reign is in danger. We trust that grace may be given to all of us to do our whole duty.

"Two weeks ago a middle-aged woman came to reside on our premises—whether she will be allowed to remain long or not I cannot say, as a man claims her as his fifth wife. She will not leave unless forced away as all their arts in persuasion have already been tried and failed.

"Next week we expect to leave home for Synod meeting to be absent four weeks. We leave the work in the hands of a teacher who has been with us about a year and nine months. We cannot get a sufficient number of teachers to occupy our villages now ready to receive them."

These bright prospects were soon beclouded -- September 30th, Mr. Annand writes :-

"On the morning of the 12th inst. the bushmen from the hills "ame down to Tangoa, and after throwing the two white men there off their guard by engaging to work with them for the day, they suddenly attacked them, shooting Mr. Sawers through the heart and then chopping him with their tomahawks. The rifle aimed at Malcolm, Sawers' companion, missed fire, after which they attempted to club him; but he managed to reach their camp and, seizing his revolver, frightened them away. He then ran for our station as fast as he could, lest he should be shot on the path. A native of Malekula, working with the two white men, was killed, and his body carried to the hills for a cannibal feast. Taking a few of the Tangonas and our own lads, I went at once to the scene of the tragedy to recover, if possible, the bodies and prevent plunder. The bushmen had all cleared out of sight before we arrived, some two hours after the fatal shots had been fired. We found the body of our friend Sawers on the spot where he fell, so we brought it to Tangea for burial. During the day we made a second trip, and so saved their goods from plunder. The Tangoans rallied round me well and acted nobly. Their anxiety for my safety cheered us and gave us evidence that we have gained a stroughold in their affections.

"A very sad element in the affair was the fact that Mr. Sawers was married on the Monday evening previous to a young woman who came all the way from Scotland to meet him. She was with him only two days before he was killed. Both Mrs. Sawers and Mr. Malcolm are now with us. The latter will require to await the arrival of a man-of-war to give evidence.

"Although the Tangoans have always told us that the bushmen were very bad and would kill all white men that they could, we did not fear them in the least. This has given a feeling of insecurity here not previously experienced. It will be a heavy blow to the advancement of civilization on Santo. Mr. Sawers was a man of considerable experience with natives, having been in charge of a plantation in Fiji for some years. He treated the natives well, and, so far as we can learn, no cause existed for the murder beyond the hostility of the bushmen to all white men coming to the country.

"Their retreats in the mountains are so numerous and so secure that it is very improbable that the men-of-war can reach them to punish them. If not punished for this, the bushmen will be worse than ever towards settlers. By our last mail our hearts were saddened by the tidings of Mrs. Leggatt's sudden death on Malekula, and also by Mrs. Lawrie's insanity through illness and worry. These things have overshadowed us like a thundercloud, but we trust that all will again be bright. The Lord is still with us, and His work will advance.

"I am glad to say that our health is very good—that the cough that troubled Mrs. A. for several months has entirely left her. Let not our friends be anxious about our safety, for, so far as we can judge, our lives are perfectly safe in our Master's keeping. We earnestly ask the prayers of God's people on behalf of His work on Santo, that these degraded tribes may be speedily brought to the Saviour."

We have learned very little more about the native side of the affair since the morning of the murder. The murder has not been popular with the bushmen generally. One day a party from another district set out to make war upon the murderers, but a heavy rain coming on wet their powder, so they decided to return and wait for a time to see what the man-of-war will do.

"Two weeks and a half ago H.M.S. Cordelia came in and took Malcolm's statement and such other information as I was able to supply upon the subject, and then sailed away to consult the joint commission for the New Hebrides. Whether anything will be done to bring the offenders to justice or not, I cannot say.

"A week later H.M.S. Goldfinch, with Sir John B. Thurston, the Governor of Fiji and Lord High Commissioner for the Western Pacific, on board, arrived. He also heard the statement of the murder. It is now nearly six weeks since Sawers was shot, and nothing whatever has been done to show the natives that they are likely to be punished for the crime.

"All have been quiet about here since, but of course less confidence is now placed in the natives. They are all so horribly descriful and treacherous that no one knows what next may happen.

"You congratulate me on the success of our work. How I wish that we had success: I am sorry to inform you that our lads are not doing as well as they did some time ago. There is a constant influence for evil brought to bear upon them by the people of the village in an underhand way that is very annoying. All openly profess to be our friends, but secretly they are doing all they can to obstruct and neutralize the Gospel influence for good. The three lads who were taking part in our Wednesday evening prayer-meeting have all so far relapsed that I do not now give any of them an opportunity of praying aloud in our meetings. We hope and pray that we may yet see them all at the feet of Jesus. However, in the meantime we can only wait and pray. I may soon find it necessary to dismiss one or more of them from our premises, they are getting so disobedient and indifferent to good conduct.

"Last night our three females all fled to the village, so I went out and locked their house. This morning they were back again wanting to be restored, so they have got another probation. Simon, my eldest teacher, came to me this evening with a report that our youngest lad has been talking badly about the Gospel and the missionary. So Master Bomoli got a lecturing to-night in measured terms. Thus you see we have our trials here also.

"October 28.—Our lads became more rebellious, and for two days two of them were on strike; but they finally came back and entreated to be reinstated to favour. So now all is going on smoothly again. The whole male population of the village came with a present of yams to us, to show us that they do not wish us to leave them yet.

"Pray for us and for these people."

Later communications indicate that no new disturbance has broken out, and it is to be hoped that an era of unbroken success has begun to dawn upon the work. May the Lord of the harvest make His word to these benighted people the power of God unto their salvation.

II.-TRINIDAD.

The work in this field has been crowned with much blessing, as the reports abundantly testify. The Rev. W. L. Macrae, who attended last Assembly, spent the summer in visiting a number of the congregations of both the Western and Eastern Sections of the Church. He was everywhere received with delight, and was carnestly sought by many places that he could not reach. A missionary on furlough is in danger of being overworked, but we are happy to report that Mr. Macrae got through his labours with improved health, and returned in December fitted for a new term of service in the high places of the field.

PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE.

The institution for the training of native agents has been successfully started under the designation of "The Presbyterian College, Trinidad," with Dr. Morton as President, and Messrs. Grant, Coffin and Lal Bihari as associate professors.

Mr. Coffin is exerctary of the Board of Management and Treasurer of the College funds. He resides in the institution and has charge of the buildings and grounds, and has a general oversight of the students in the home. The following account of the College, its history and opening, is from the pen of the Rev. E. A. McCurdy, now pastor of Grey Friars Church, Port of Spain, and up to his departure thither a year ago a most prominent member of this Committee.

The Foreign Mission Committee decided on its erection in the summer of 1890. Rev. K. J. Grant, who was home on furlough, threw himself with his usual enthusiasm into the effort to raise the \$4,000 necessary for that purpose, and before he left Canada was able to report success.

Shortly after his return the Mission Council purchased "Shady Grove," a valuable property adjoining the mission premises at San Fernando, on which still stands the dwelling occupied by Dr. Morton and his family at the time of their residence in that town some years ago. It has been repaired and is now used as a dwelling by Mr. Coffin, and as dormitories for the students. There was also a beautiful site just beside the Susamachar Church, or church of the "glad tidings" in which worship the native congregation ministered to by Mr. Grant and his nati a helpers.

Upon this site the institution has been erected, and, with the church beside it, crowns the brow of a gentle elevation, "a thing of beauty," destined, I trust to be "a joy forever." Situated in the principal street, no one, Christian or pagan, can pass the mission premises without having his attention called to the character of the work there carried on. The college is a fine building 25 by 50 feet with 15 feet post. The frame floor and walls are pitch pine of the best quality, and the roof is galvanized iron tiles. It is raised some four feet from the ground, supported by concrete pillars. There are entrances at the front and rear, and on one side, with steps and platforms of the same material. The roof projects both at the ends and sides, forming a "hood" which at once improves the appearance of the building, and protects those within its walls from the hot rays of the tropical sun. The ventilation is admirable; the doors and windows consisting largely of jalousie, lattice, and other open work. Indeed there is but one opinion as to its excellence, adaptation, and beauty, reflecting credit alike upon those who designed the plan and those who carried it into execution.

On February 2, Mr. Grant's birthday, by the way, and, though only a coincidence, yet under the circumstances a most delightful way of celebrating it—the Presbytery of

A bui Workers f been given February collected l Additional and Geo. C of a librar Trinidad met in the morning at San Fernando, and made arrangements for the opening services of the day, Rev. G. M. Clark, of New Edinburgh, Canada, being also present. These services were a meeting in the afternoon by the Presbytery for the formal opening, and another of a more popular character in the evening.

The afternoon meeting was attended chiefly by Asiatics, most of the catechists from all the mission fields, as well as a considerable number of the East Indians from San Fernando and the surrounding districts being present. Devotional exercises were conducted in the native language, Hindi hymns being sung and the congregation led in prayer by Rev. Lal Bihari and Charles Soodeen. The students present were addressed by Dr. Morton in their own language, and Rev. Mr. Grant in English; and the Indian people by Lal Bihari in Hindi, and Rev. Mr. Wilson in English. Thirty-six students were enrolled. Rev. Mr. Ramsey, as acting Moderator of the Presbytery, announced the arrangements which had been made for carrying on the work of the institution.

The meeting was briefly addressed by Messrs. Clarke and McCurdy, the latter simply fulfilling his appointment of Presbytery, to acknowledge the part taken by the Indian people in the crection of the college in their contribution of \$225, and the superintendence of the work by one of their number, Mr. Albert Sammy, who had given some five months of his time gratuitously in this way, thus securing a building of larger dimensions and better quality at a much smaller cost than could otherwise have been attained. Mr. McCurdy conveyed to Mr. Sammy the vote of thanks passed by the Foreign Mission Committee, and on their behalf presented him with a copy of the Encyclopiedia Britannica (American edition), as a token of the Church's appreciation of his services, intimating that the Committee rejoiced in what he had done, not simply on the ground of immediate value to the Church, but because they looked upon it as a part of the first-fruits of a great harvest of generous effort yet to be yielded by the Christian Indians of Trinidad in the work of evangelization of their countrymen. Mr. Sammy in acknowledging the gift expressed his gratification at the appreciation of his services, and intimated that it was his purpose to leave the volumes just presented to him in the college for some years in order that the students might be able to refer to them.

GENERAL REPORT FOR 1891.

The year 1891 has been one of exceptional toil and care for our missionaries in Trinidad. The new school ordinance came into force in February. The scalo of salaries at first adopted was re-arranged and reduced in July, and the Board of Education was so overwhelmed with work that it was only after much delay and uncertainty details were adjusted. We have to thank the Board of Education for the consideration shown to any proposals made by us, and for their willingness to consider the circumstances of our work.

Much has been done during the year in providing suitable schools and teachers' houses in the place of unsuitable rented ones, and several schools have been opened in important districts that have not yet been placed on the list of those assisted by Government.

TRAINING INSTITUTE.

A building has been erected in Shady Grove, San Fernando, at which the Christian Workers from all the districts are to be gathered for special training. Much care has been given to the working out of this scheme, and the Institute will go into operation February 2nd, 1892. The funds to purchase Shady Grove and erect the buildings were collected by Rev. K. J. Grant, in Canada, as reported by him at the close of last year. Additional funds for special details have been contributed by East Indians in Trinidad, and Geo. Goodwill, Esq., of Port of Spain, has given 87 excellent volumes as the nucleus of a library.

CHANGES.

In May, Rev. W. L. McRae left for Canada on furlough, and with him Miss Graham on sick leave. It is a matter of regret that Miss Graham's health obliged her later to resign her work. Miss Kirkpatrick, of Nova Scotia, has been appointed to succeed her in the San Fernando school. During Mr. McRae's absence, Rev. A. W. Thompson took charge of Princestown. In providing for the Training Institute and adjusting the work, it has been decided that Mr. Coffin shall remove to Shady Grove, San Fernando, and Mr. Thompson take over the Couva District, from January 1st, 1892.

MARRIAGE LAW.

The Indian Immigrants' Marriage Ordinance, of 1881, worked very unsatisfactorily. It excluded in the "interpretation clause" the descendants of any man who had been a Christian in Trinidad, and it was a disputed question whether it did not exclude from the special protection which it provided for all who were married as Christians. In the new Ordinance the "interpretation clause" includes all the descendants of Indian immigrants, and it is expressly stated that the protection afforded by it "shall apply to all immigrants, of whatever religion." This we feel is an important point gained, and it is greatly to be hoped that seduction, and consequent wife murder, will be checked by the new Ordinance. It is gratifying to report that ships which arrived this year brought a larger proportion of female immigrants.

The Mission Council desire to record their satisfaction with the way in which the Church in Canada responded to their call at the beginning of the year for enlarged means to meet the wants of the work. The following abstract of expenditure shows how the funds have been used:

REV. DR. MORTON'S TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

It is our pleasant duty at the close of another year to report that all our workers have been spared and, with the exception of one teacher, all are at their posts as when the year began.

El Soccorro Hindi school was closed in May as the Estate was abandoned and nearly all the East Indians removed to other districts. Andrew Gayadun, the catechist who taught it was removed to Caroni and has since given all his time to that important district.

Red Hill school was merged into the Government school about half a mile away; but the experiment has not been satisfactory and may not continue.

A new school was opened at Sangre Grande, a place 24 miles from Tunapuna, where the people are chiefly cocoa planters. The distance is great, but it is expected that the railway will shortly be extended from Arima to at least the edge of this settlement. It is important to secure a hold among these land owners where the soil and the prospects are good. We are therefore making a tentative effort in a hired house.

The Mausica school has suffered greatly from the removal of the population to more fertile lands farther inland. A forest fire which burned down eight houses hastened this movement.

The rainfall this year has been unusually small, and although there has been no great mortality there has been a great deal of sickness among the children of the schools. Sore eyes were for a time epidemic, and fever prevailed so that for some months it was hard to keep up a good average attendance. Night schools have been carried on at nearly all the stations for adults in Hindi and for lads in either Hindi or English.

CATECHISTS.

The catechists employed were: Paul Bhukhan at Arouca; Chararja Lalla at Arima; Ajodhya at Chin Chin Savanna; F. Davis at Tacarigua; John Buddhu at Tunapuna; Geof. Subarn at St. Joseph; Andrew Gayadeen at Caroni. John R. Ganesh at Chaguanas and Chandarnagar.

The first on the list is co-manager with me of all the schools, and besides his own field has some oversight of Arima and is liable to be sent to any part of the district. Lalla has only been employed one year and is under the oversight of P. Bhukhan. Ajodhya is an old man who gives only part of his time to the work at a very small allowance.

It is the duty of these men to visit and look after all the Christians in their district, to encourage the people to send their children to school—to assist the teacher in giving religious instruction at the appointed hour—to teach adults to read in the evening—to conduct services on Sabbath and on one week evening—to visit hospitals and the people at their homes and hold open air services. Friday afternoon they report to me for the past week, get directions for the next week's work and receive three hours special instruction. In the evening, along with the teachers, the girls from the Home, and all who can be got together, they are examined and instructed in the Bible lessons for the week.

These men have laboured faithfully and studied diligently throughout the year. They have been at peace among themselves, and proved themselves peace-makers among the people. Some of them have at times been reproached for the name of Christ and have taken it patiently.

THE WORK OF THE MISSIONARY

has been to manage twelve schools and see to their efficiency—to direct the work of eight cathechists and train them for it, and to visit and hold meetings in all sections of his field. This year an unusual amount of labour has fallen upon me in connection with the general work of the mission and of Presbyterianism in the island. It is hoped that the settlement of Rev. E. A. McCurdy in Grey Friers congregation and the more regular operation of the new school ordinance has brought this extra work somewhat to a close.

TEMPERANCE WORK

has been carried forward in the lines reported last year. Three crowded meetings were held and 56 names have been added to "The Tunapuna Blue Ribbon Band" which now numbers 331. Except for the lowest castes, strong drink is forbidden to Hindus as well as Mohammedans. The temptation in Trinidad breaks down this rule with many. And if, when they become Christians, it is understood that the restriction is abolished as a legal command, and not required by the law of love to God, our fellows, or ourselves, only disaster can be expected; for self-control is weak, drinking customs prevail, and drink of the most dangerous kind is for sale at every corner. Beyond dispute abstinence is good for the present distress. Drinking is the reproach of Christians, and that reproach we wish to remove.

WORK AMONG WOMEN.

St. James' Church, Charlottetown, P. E. I., supplied \$100 for this work. Fanny Subarn, and for a time Annie Mewa, aided Mrs. Morton in carrying it on. Women's meetings were held at all the stations and at most of them at a fixed hour weekly or fortnightly. The difficulties in this work are great; but the good results are in some cases very apparent and I can testify to the excellent general influence exerted by this branch of our work.

HOME FOR GIRLS.

In 1890 I reported that Mrs. and Miss Morton had six girls from 14 to 18 years of age under special instruction in secular subjects. Bible knowledge, sewing, cutting, washing, cooking, etc. This year the average number is this extemporized home was nine. They acquitted themselves well in my Friday evening Bible class and fell very harmonicusly into the line of work marked out for them and into our home life. Five were married during the year, four of them to teachers. All of these help with work among the women of their own district and three of them teach the sewing in their husbands' schools. In this connection, Alice, wife of N. Imambakhsh, teacher at Chaguanas deserves special mention. She had more advantages than some of the others, and in one of the most remote districts has kept up a regular course of meetings and house-to-house visitation. Hitherto this work has not been on the estimates. The money for carrying it on in 1890 was offered us when in Canada in 1889. The Ladics' College, Halifax, the

Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, Congregational Societies (chiefly in Truro), and personal gifts, have supported the work for two years, and the year closes with a good working balance. The management and training now cost nothing in money; but money could not easily purchase the time, toil and thought given to it by our volunteer workers. It has told most distinctly for good on the persons chiefly concerned, and it has commended itself to onlookers, both heathen and Christian, as a practically wise effort. It may not be needed in all the districts or always in this one; the means of carrying it on may not always be available, but in present circumstances it seems clearly one of the things providentially provided to meet a need.

STATISTICS.

Thirty-seven adults and twenty-five children were baptized during the year. Fifteen marriages were celebrated, and the year closes with fifty-eight on the communion roll, being an increase of eight.

Our thanks are due to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (W.D.) for a contribution of \$300, to all who contributed by money or mission goods to the success of our work, and to God the Father of all for health, home mercies, and tokens of His favour.

TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF REV. K. J. GRANT.

A year ago your missionaries were busily engaged in bringing their schools into line with the new Education Ordinance, which came into operation the 1st February. In this district we erected nine new buildings, six school-houses, and three houses for teachers; we also repaired nine school-houses and in some cases the repairs were extensive. On the completion of the building work in the country sections, we began the college building, and following on that work, the refitting of "Shady Grove" dwelling-house. Personally I would not have been equal to the work of supervising and directing that all these operations imposed, but without any charge, I received much assistance, and particularly from Mr. Sammy, one of our members who had complete charge of our new building in this town.

The managing committee of the congregation repaired the church at a cost of \$350,00, all of which was collected from the members of the church.

School work was carried on in the usual way in 17 schools by 44 teachers and assistants. Pupils on roll 891. Of these 619 were boys, and 272 were girls. The daily average was 669. This of course does not include the attendance of the four Indian schools transferred to Government. From this date Picton and Wellington Schools will be merged into the Government school which will also include the children of an Anglican and a R. C. School. In all schools religious instructions may be given at a specified time, but in Government schools the teacher is not permitted to give this instruction.

Needle work is taught in many of the schools, but in some much more efficiently than in others. Much depends on the mistress.

An advanced sewing class, consisting of young women numbering about 20, was under instruction at the Manse during the year. Mrs. Ragbir was assisted by Mrs. Grant, and she in turn acknowledged Mrs. Ragbir's services by handing over a portion of the donation from W. F. M. Society, which enabled her to do more efficient work in her own section. This weekly gathering of these young women has done very much good, and in many ways, which I need not specify. It was a pleasure to all concerned. From one piece of work by the class \$32.00 were realized.

The work of evangelizing has been carried by your two ordained native agents, Babu Lal Bihari and Mr. C. Ragbir and a dozen catechists, some of whom are intelligent, efficient workers. On Saturdays all assemble in San Fernando for instruction. In addition to the daily work from door to door, we have on the Lord's day, services at 20 stations, besides the English and Hindustani services at the Central Church.

From the beginning of our work to date we baptized 1,479 and admitted to the communion 381. Communicants now in good standing, after removals by death and otherwise, 294.

The year now closing affords many satisfactory marks of progress,

After the regrettable retirement of Miss Graham, Annie Olmel, aided by Mr. Thorne, gave such proof of her ability in the working of the school as to warrant her appointment from this date to Vistabella School. Her four assistants, all young women of our church, will be employed under Miss Kirkpatrick.

Usine Ste. Madeleine School did exceptionally well under Mr. Kinsale.

Our Central Sabbath School has steadily risen. On Sabbath last 211 were present. I had 24 young men in my class. We have over 20 teachers, and half that number was present every Sabbath during the year. At the close of 1890 three pupils gave the titles and golden texts without error for 52 lessons; this year 25 repeated them; one giving chapter and verse in addition without mistake. The school contributed \$141.00 which provides the Westminster teacher, the quarterlies for pupils, and Sabbath school papers for town and country schools; the Christmax treat, and £5 sterling for the B. & F. Bible Society. In acknowledgment of this donation, we received 35 neatly bound Bibles, which served as prizes.

The interest taken by several of the young people in the Christian Endeavour Meetings under the superintendence of Mrs. Geddes Grant is very gratifying. I know that these meetings have been very helpful, and three young men from this Society have sought and obtained admission to the Communion recently.

Our managing committee, with the exception of my son, consists of Asiatics, who conduct all outward affairs of the Church with ability, and in a thorough businessike way.

The contributions of the native Church exceed those of any tormer year. The Central Church contributed, including a small balance from previous year, \$1,404.62, and the out-stations, \$392.45, making a total of \$1,797.07. From this they voted \$150.00 for the College building.

Burdens that had to be borne in former years by your missionaries are now taken up by willing, skilful hands. For example, we bring together annually the membership of the whole district; this year the catechists subscribed the cost of the treat, and in a most satisfactory way carried out the whole arrangements.

As in the past old friends have stood by us. Messrs. Tennant, Lamont, Cumming and the Colonial Company, estate proprietors, and also Mr. Robertson, Mayor, have our best thanks.

For every favour we desire to acknowledge Him in whose hands are the hearts of all men.

REV. MR. MACRAE'S FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

During the year I was somewhat over seven months absent from the field on furlough, having left on the 9th of May, and owing to an unavoidable delay did not return until the 7th of January.

In the first part of the year two new school-houses were built, one at Morichal and the other at Fairfield, also two teachers' houses—one at Ben Lomond and the other at Jordan Hill.

This completes the list of buildings provided for in the estimate for 1891, viz.: four school-houses and two teachers' houses, the only change being that a teachers' house at Jordan Hill was substituted for a school-house on Lethian's Estate.

The catechists' work was carried on with the usual vigour. Besides Mr. Soodeen, ten men were employed during the year, all of whom, with one exception, did good work. The usual instruction was given to both catechists and teachers on Saturdays.

The school work required vigorous efforts on the part of the managers to keep up the attendance. The schools at Morichal and Fairfield, two important districts, have hitherto been carried on at the expense of the Mission, but as the requirements of Government are now complied with we hope they will soon be put on the list of Government Assisted Schools.

Owing to the amalgamation of two schools into one there are now 13 schools in this district having an aggregate roll of 627, and a daily attendance of 495.

It was a great comfort to me on going home, to leave Mr. Thompson in charge of the field, and a greater comfort still on returning to find that by himself and Mr. Soodeen the field had been managed so well and the work carried on so successfully.

Besides \$25.00 donated specially to the college, the Native Congregation contributed this year \$432.00—the amount estimated.

The number of marriages for the year is 14. Baptisms, 45; viz., Adults, 26, Infants, 19.

REV. J. COFFIN'S SECOND ANNUAL REPORT.

The past year has been one of extension and progress. The field has been more fully occupied with schools and catechists that former years, and a foundation laid for future work in a large section previously under no Christian teaching. Amid many influences that are not helpful there are hopeful signs visible. Gradually our work is being more felt by the mass of the people, greater confidence is bestowed, the way is being prepared for the reception of the first and the door of opportunity is wider open. The Christian people are exhibiting more interest in the work of the Mission, while a feeling of strength and hopefulness for the future is manifested. Greater intelligence on the part of converts has been noticeable throughout the year.

Much time has been given to school work, which has been considerably extended during the year. I add statistics for 1891.

Compared with 1890, the above shows an increase of 181 enrolled and 103 daily average; compared with 1889, an increase of 329 enrolled and 214 daily average. Schools Nos. 1-6 have been during the year on the list of schools assisted by the Government. Praysal and Calcutta schools, owing to delay of Government have not yet been placed on the list, but as they fulfil all the conditions and have been recommended by the Inspector of Schools, in all probability they will come on as Government assisted schools from January, 1892. Carapichaima (upper) was opened during the year and conducted at a small expense to the Mission as a branch of the Calcutta school.

Few changes have occurred in the teaching staff for the year. Considerable improved work. ment has been shown by the teachers in activity and increased interest in their work. Throughout the year I trained the teachers in secular studies from eight to eleven a.m. on keep up Saturdays, devoting also some time to the study of the Bible lessons to be taught in the ts, have schools in the following week.

> New school-houses have been erected and occupied at Calcutta, Rivulet, Praysal, Perseverance and Chandernagore, and teachers' houses at Calcutta, Chandernagore and Esperanza, all of which are most suitable and substantial buildings. The new district covered by the Praysal, Carapichaima and Calcutta schools is a most hopeful one. There are in the section nearly 300 Indian children of school age, of a class most easily reached, desirous of education and little projudiced against Christian teaching.

> Sabbath schools are regularly held in the different stations and have been well attended. By means of religious instruction in the day schools and on the Sabbath the young are being taught the truths of the Gospel.

CATECHISTS.

The number of catechists employed was larger than in former years, to cover new ground and meet the growing wants of the district. Seven men gave all their time to religious work with whatever assistance they were able to give in the schools of their district, by gathering in children, teaching Hindi or giving religious instruction. Three others gave their evenings and Sabbaths to religious work, while another, who has charge of Dr. Morton's work in the Chaguanas section, gave part of his time to this field. Each man has his own district, for the oversight of which he is responsible, thus being gradually trained to more self-reliance. Eleven places have had regular Sabbath services, while hospitals and barracks are visited on Sabbath as opportunity is given. During the week the catechists visit the Estate-Hospitals, barracks, villages and homes of the Christian people systematically, teaching the Word as opportunity is offered and in whatever way circumstances may permit.

On Friday afternoons ou catechist class has met regularly for Bible study and report of week's work. In January we began the study of the Acts of the Apostles and spent most of the year on this book. It was my first attempt to teach in Hindi, and by careful preparation, and the aid of an interpreter when my vocabulary failed, the study proved helpful to myself in every way, and much enjoyed by the catechists. It was encouraging to find these men so eager to study the Word and to take so much pleasure in the grasping of new views of the truth. Without an exception they have proved faithful, and their conduct has been satisfactory and commendable.

The Sabbath evening English service has been kept up throughout the year with regularity. Mr. Thompson, who remained in Couva from his arrival in February until May, rendered most acceptable service in this connection as also to myself by his good fellowship and assistance in other departments of the work.

Miss Fisher, in addition to her day school duties, has taken the leading part in temperance work among the young, and by leading the music at the English service and assisting in two Sabbath schools, has greatly assisted in our work.

As in the past, our thanks are due to proprietors for their liberality, to managers of estates for their courteay. We also record our thanks to the Sabbath school of Kamloops, B.C., for the sum of \$15 paid to Mr. Morrison for this field; also to the Ladics' Societies of Kensington, P.E.I., Woodstock, Richmond, Florenceville and Oak Mountain, N.B., and United Church, New Glasgow, for valuable boxes of clothing.

Such is briefly the record of the year's laboura. We can supply facts and figures. Beneath these is the silent working of God's Spirit which we cannot measure. There is

REV. A. W. THOMPSON'S FIRST ANNUAL REPORT.

On my arrival in Trinidad early in February I went to Couva and remained there until the end of April, rendering some assistance to Mr. Coffin in his English work.

In the month of May Mr. Macrae left on a furlough to Canada and I was put in charge of the Princestown district during his absence.

The work of this district was carried on so far as possible according to the plans of Mr. Macrae.

Of necessity the most of our time was given to school work. All the schools of the mission in the district were regularly and systematically visited. Mr. C. C. Soodeen rendered invaluable assistance in this connection as well as in the general management of the field.

On the suggestion of Mr. Macrae and with the sanction of the Mission Council, Mt. Stewart school was merged with Palmyra school after the first of July. This necessitated the enlarging of the Palmyra school building.

To meet this expenditure—not otherwise provided for—the Mission Council voted \$200 which had been received for supply rendered to Grey Friars Congregation previous to the arrival of Rev. Mr. McCurdy.

A small school at Lengua Wood was discontinued at the end of October, and the pupils were brought to the Lengua school. This arrangement has proved satisfactory. The present number of schools is 12, with 1 branch school (Elswick).

A word of explanation may be added in connection with the number of the communicants reported as now in good standing. In the absence of Mr. Macrae, it was thought best not to receive any new applicants. The "Return" is therefore about as last year.

This field, more than others, has had trials and difficulties, but it is hoped that these are now things of the past. In the face of them all the work has prospered and the outlook for the future is very encouraging.

The past years work is ended. It has been thoroughly enjoyed. There is but one regret—so little done.

Reviewing the past and looking forward to the future, we "thank God and take courage."

CANADIAN LADY TEACHERS.

As reported last year, Miss Graham, in consequence of an accident, was disabled from work and returned home for rest and recovery. But she found that the summer had passed without the return of strength, and felt herself compelled by her physical condition, much against her ardent desires, to resign her position.

The Committee secured at once, as her successor, Miss Martha Kirkpatrick, a teacher of several years' very successful experience, who went out to her work in Docember in company with the Rev. W. L. Macrae, who was returning from his summer's furlough. The other three were kept by a merciful providence in good health, and were enabled to prosecute their work with marked success. Their reports, as also those of the native agents, are deeply interesting, but want of space prevents their insertion in this report.

ST. LUCIA.

As usual active work has been carried on in this island under the supervision of Mr. J. B. Cropper, who gratuitously gives much of his time to the direction of the catechists employed. The Mission Council of Trinidad sends annually a delegate to visit the field and perform the functions of an ordained agent, and report on the work. This report for last year has not yet come to hand, but the Committee know from private sources that the Lord's blessing has been granted in connection with the labours of the catechists and teachers employed. This is a most interesting out-branch of the Trinidad work, and one which is conducted largely through native agency. It deserves all the encouragement that the Church can afford, and will amply repay the effort and money and prayer expended on it.

WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY (EASTERN SECTION).

This Society deserves honourable mention in connection with the work in the New Hebrides and Trinidad. It undertook, at the request of the Committee, to raise \$4,000 for Trinidad schools, \$300 for the New Hebrides, and \$750 for work in St. Lucia; and, needless to say, it accomplished its object. This year the Committee asks from it \$5,700, and from the pleasing account of its growth, as shown by its last annual report, there can be no doubt that the request will be fully honoured. That it may continue to grow and influence our people to take a deeper interest in the great cause of the world's evangelization, is the ardent desire of the Committee, as we are sure also of the whole Church.

Mrs. Burns, its president ever since its organization in the fall of 1876, has removed with her husband, Dr. Burns, to Scotland. In her removal the Society sustains a great loss—but we trust her mantle will fall upon some other sister, that, in the spirit of Elisha, will continue the work on such lines as the circumstances may require. The Committee embraces this opportunity of expressing its deep sympathy with Mrs. Burns in the sickness of Dr. Burns which has compelled his retirement from active work among us. He was a most conscientiously active member of the Committee, and took a very deep interest in our Foreign Mission work. We fervently pray that alike to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and to the Committee the loss of two such members as Dr. and Mrs. Burns may be sanctified; and that to them, thus compelled to retire, there may come the consolation of beholding the Lord's work prospering abundantly under the direction of other hands, also of themselves soon being permitted, through the Doctor's restored strength, of engaging anew in its prosecution.

STATE OF THE FUNDS.

The Committee desires to call attention to the state of the funds. In the Eastern Division the receipts are \$22,257.58, or, including \$1,311.56 received per Dr. Reid after the close of the accounts, \$23,569.24, and the expenditure is \$31,135.32, leaving a deficit on the year's work of \$7,566.08. Of this amount, however, fully \$5,000 for school buildings in Trinidad were voted the previous year, though not then paid. But aside from this extraordinary expenditure, nearly \$2,600 stand against us on the year. This is partially due to a marked falling off in bequests, which are always an uncertain source of revenue, and ought to be set aside for special emergent calls, such as the extra school buildings of Trinidad, but to a larger extent to a want of increase in the givings of the people as compared with the necessary increase of expenditure on the work from year to year. It is difficult to avoid increase of expenditure with expanding operations, and the

only right method of equalizing receipts and outlay is to obtain an increase of giving both by the Christians in the mission field and by the Christians in the Church supporting the mission. In both cases there was increase last year, but not sufficient for the increased demand. The congregations in the East gave for the year ending May 1st, 1891, \$18,732, and for the year ending May 1st, 1892, \$20,438. But whereas in the former the legacies amounted to \$8,440, in the latter they only reached \$859.15. From this it is clear that we must endeavour to secure larger contributions from the congregations in order to relieve the Fund of an incubus of debt.

The Committee tenders thanks to all the supporters of the cause—to the Government of Trinidad for its aid in support of school work—to the proprietors of Trinidad estates and their agents and employees for money and sympathy—to the native Christians in the soveral fields who are learning to give with their experience of the blessings of the Gospel, and above all, to the many at home, who, praying "Thy kingdom come," show their heartiness by denying themselves to honour their Lord.

III.—MISSION TO THE INDIANS OF THE NORTH-WEST AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The changes in the staff in this mission field have been much more numerous than usual, and there have been four appointments to new posts: the Rev. John A. McDonald, B.A., to work among the British Columbia Indians at Alberni (authorized by the last General Assembly); Mr. W. J. Wright, to the position of Trades' Instructor in the Crowstand Industrial School; Miss Walker, formerly of Portage la Prairie, to the matronship of the Regina school, and Mrs. Leckie to a similar position in the Birtle school. It will thus be seen that the work is growing. Special attention has been given to building up the work of the new and very completely-equipped school at Regina, with the result that the attendance has grown during the twelve months from 16 to 84. This has been, it is true, in some measure at the expense of such schools as Mr. Moore's and the Crowstand; but the latter, at least, has still a considerable field to draw from, and at any rate the greatly superior equipment of the Regina school causes the Committee to view without misgiving such a depletion of the smaller schools as shall set their officers much freer for evangelistic work than they have bitherto been.

While the attention given to the work of the schools, and especially the boarding and industrial schools, shows that the hope of success in mission ork rests mainly with the young, yet there has been no relaxation of effort on behalf of men and women. The majority of our missionaries are now able to use the Indian languages with some facility in personal dealing, if not in preaching, and the general testimony is that superstition is losing its hold, and that there is a greater readiness than ever before to give a respectful hearing to the truth. The valuable and abundant gifts of clothing that come from the older provinces have done much to break down the walls of mistrust, and the influence of children who have been trained in mission schools has had, in several cases that are named, not merely an elevating, but even a saving, effect upon their parents.

STONEY PLAIN.

Mr. and Mrs. Magnus Anderson, who had been in charge of the school since its organization in 1885, expressed a desire to be relieved at the close of the summer. The school was established as a day school, and after it was changed, in 1891, into a boarding school both Mr. and Mrs. Anderson seemed to feel the increased responsibility as a somewhat heavy burden. Accordingly Mr. and Mrs. George J. Welbourn, members of the Rev. S. H. Eastman's congregation in Oshawa, were appointed to the place, and they have filled it with tact and success. There is a noticeable increase in the interest which the Indians take in spiritual things. A regular Sabbath service is held, which is ordinarily conducted by Mr. Welbourn, but of which the Rev. D. G. McQueen, of Edmonton, takes charge once in the month. A Sabbath school for old and young has been opened; and recently, at the request of the Indians themselves, a Wednesday evening prayer-meeting has been begun. For the quarter ending with March the number of pupils on the roll was 10, and the average attendance was 7. This, on account of removals, was lower than the report for the preceding quarter.

MISTAWASIS.

At the date of the last annual report the death of the Rev. John McKay was fresh in the mind of the Church, and this mission was plunged in grief. Since then Mrs. McKay has built a house for herself and her family in the neighbourhood of the reserve, and she expects to spend her remaining years in close sympathy and co-operation with the work to which her husband gave his life.

The Rev. Frank O. Nichol, who graduated from Knox College last spring, was chosen to succeed Mr. McKay, and with his young wife entered upon his work in August. Both display decided aptitude for their work, and the mission in its religious, school and industrial aspects seems now to be very efficiently organized.

Sabbath services morning and afternoon are held in the church, and the attendance aggregates 150. The Sabbath school has an attendance of 36. There are now 55 communicants, 17 having been added during the year by profession of faith and 6 by certificate. There were 7 baptisms of children and three of adults.

Soon after the arrival of Mr. Nichol, Miss C. B. McKay, who had been teacher of the mission school ever since its establishment under the care of her father, resigned her position on the eve of her marriage, and the Church was deprived of valuable services, always cheerfully given, and with such tact as to avoid in great measure the difficulties which usually beset Indian schools. To teach the school as successor of Miss McKay and to act as interpreter for Mr. Nichol, Mr. Donald H. McVicar, B.A., was appointed, and his skill and experience have proved of great value to Mr. Nichol. The number of pupils on the roll during the quarter ending with March was 20, and the average attendance nearly 14. This was a smaller attendance than for the previous quarter, but it is to be remembered here as in the case of all the other day schools, that the attendance given is for the severest months of the winter, when three-fourths of the public schools outside of towns and villages are closed entirely, and when the attendance is necessarily smaller in considerable degree than during the other months of the year. Mrs. Nichol kindly taught the girls sewing and knitting, and also taught a similar class twice a week among the women of the reserve. In the former class there were 14 members and in the latter 25. Three hundred yards of cloth and over one hundred skeins of yarn were used, and as a result the boys, girls and women of the reserve have now clothing suitable for Sabbath wear. A log dwelling-house for the school-teacher is now being erected, of which the whole cost, except a grant of \$100 from the Church, is being contributed by the Indians. The amount of work they have already bestowed upon it is valued at \$75. They have also contributed \$55 to the Schemes of the Church.

A number of adult Indians, who desired to know more of the Bible, but could not read the Cree version published by the British and Foreign Bible Society, attended a night school taught by Mr. McVicar, and they are not only able now to read and write their own language, but to master the contents of the Word of God.

Mr. Nichol, who is the son of a doctor and possesses considerable medical knowledge, declares that he has found this qualification of immense advantage in enabling him to reach some who would not otherwise have come within his influence. Mr. Nichol's report concludes: "If the success of our work is judged by the attendance at church services on Sabbath mornings and afternoons, by increased interest in Sabbath school work, in memorizing Scripture truth and in desiring to know more of it, by attendance and application to the work of the sewing school on Wednesdays and Fridays, and by increased desire to keep their homes clean and inviting, we have reason to believe that progress has been made.

PRINCE ALBERT.

Miss Lucy M. haker has continued to teach the Sioux day school at Prince Albert. The number of names on the roll is 19, but the average attendance is only 9, the low average being due partly to the severe illness of the teacher during January, which caused the school to be closed for several wocks, and partly to the severity of the weather and the prevalence of influenza among the children. Miss Baker says: "The pupils are more interested in their lessons, and not a few of them begin to manifest quite a pleasure in coming. Although their progress is not all that we could desire, yet, taking all obstacles into consideration, perhaps it is all that for the present can be expected."

REGINA.

At the date of the last annual report the Regina school (which is maintained wholly by the Dominion Government) had just been opened, under the management of the Rev. A. J. McLeod, B.A. For several months after organization Mrs. McLeod kindly discharged the duties of matron, but last autumn, as the attendance of children grew larger, Miss Elizabeth Walker, whose work at Portage la Prairie had been in successful, was transferred to the Regina school. Another change of staff has been due to the resignation of Mr. C. D. Mackenzie, whose experience in Indian schools, and whose executive ability were of great value in the initiation of the work at Regina. Mr. Mackenzie now returns to his home in Kentucky, and his place is taken by Mr. Neil Gilmour, a school-teacher and elder of the church in Banff. The attendance at the school has now reached 84, and nearly all are children who have previously been in one or other of our mission schools. The outdoor industries taught are farming and carpentry. Mr. McLeod reports that "religious exercises are held in the school for 10 or 15 minutes, morning and afternoon. On Sabbath morning a service is held consisting of singing, reading together from "Peep of Day," repeating the ten commandments, etc. On Sabbath evening we have a children's service in which we take up Old Testament history."

MUSCOWPETUNO'S.

The Rev. W. S. Moore, B.A., continues to hold services on the three reserves—Piapot's, Muscowpetung's and Pasqua's. Meetings are held at six places, with an average attendance per Sabbath of 29. The number of communicants on the roll is 28, 8 having been removed and 2 added during the year. Fourteen infants were baptized and five

A small but neat and comfortable stone church was erected on Pasqua's Reserve, and a little log building on land adjoining Piapot's Reserve, to be used both as a place of meeting and as a temporary residence for the missionary on the occasion of his visits to this reserve.

There have been many deaths during the year, among them Musa-Kepenes, on Muscowpetung's reserve, the first member of the band to be baptized by Mr. Moore, and the leader among the Christians. While on his death-bed, he charged his people to adhere to the Christian religion, to ask for the erection of a church on the reserve and to bury him beside it. His death made a profound impression, and the result is seen both in the eagerness of the people for a church and the greater attention that is being given to prayer in their homes. The total amount of contributions for religious purposes was \$66. The school, which istaught by Mrs. Moore, had during the last quarter 16 names on the roll and an average attendance of 10. Of these 16 names, several are those of poor half-breeds who are practically as heathen and as destitute as Indians, but for whose education the Government does not hold itself responsible, and on whose account, therefore, no Government grant is received.

FILE HILLS.

Last autumn Mr. D. H. McVicar was transferred to Mistawasis, and the work on the four reserves, which constitute the File Hills mission, has been left in the hands of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Skene. The school is making satisfactory progress, and reports an average attendance of 12. Mr. J. A. Macrae, the Government school inspector, says that Mr. Skene is remarkably successful in getting the children to speak English, and Mr. Skene in his report says: "The pavents have been very friendly and no trouble has been experienced in keeping the children with us. The latter seem to have learned to trust us, and to look upon the school as home. We have had service every Sabbath during the quarter. The attendance has been as low as 3 and up to 17. We have been specking of the Jews and of Abraham, Joseph, Moses and the Israelites in Canaan, and we are now at the story of our Saviour. I see little change in the people as far as religion is concerned. They appear to give good attention to what is said during the service, but I fear there is not the least desire on their part to know of the Saviour. They seem so very dark. My impression is that the children are our only hope. The thought of their condition is very sad." Within the last few days the Rev. George Flett, the veteran missionary from Okanase, whose influence reaches far beyond his own mission, has, at the request of these Indians expressed through Chief Star Blanket, gone to the File Hills to speak to them about religion and education.

ROUND LAKE.

The Rev. Hugh McKay reports as follows :-

During the months of April and May the appointments given in last report were kept up, and nearly all the families in the field were visited. Four services were held each Sabbath—two at the mission and two on the reserves.

Your missionary attended the meeting of Assembly at Kingston in the month of June, and then a few days were spent in visiting and lecturing at the following places: Peterborough, Port Hope, Cobourg, Toronto, Streetsville, Burlington, Hamilton, Dundas, Woodstock, Thamesford, Embro, Kintore, Lucknow, Teeswater, Ripley, Walkerton, Owen Sound, Annan, Leith, Montreal. At each of these places a lecture was delivered on the subject of Foreign Missions.

Returning to the mission field in July the usual appointments were taken up.

At Yellow Calf's reserve fortnightly services were held. The average attendance was about 30. The people have shown not a little interest in the meetings. We had the free use of a house in which to hold our services. We were welcomed in their homes, and received shelter for ourselves and our horses during the nights we apent with them. As this field is 30 or 35 miles distant from the mission, we found it necessary to leave home Saturday morning and return Sabbath evening. The people show that they are interested by remaining after the close of the regular meeting to ask questions and compare their pagan religion with the Christian. They speak freely of the folly of baving ach gods as the north wind and the thunder and stones and the buffalo bones. They s of that these are only creatures, and say that it is right to worship only one Great Spirit. While speaking with these people in the meetings you would think they were all in the balance and about to give up their paganism and embrace the light of the Bible, but they go out and are still the same pagans.

The most of them are farming now. They had a good crop last year, so there is not much destitution, but there has been much sickness during the past year, and a few have passed away, among them one little girl about four years of age. The memory of that sweet face still lingers on my heart, and I like to think of her as in heaven. There was also one young man who was a scholar at our school two years ago for a term of three months. He had not been baptized, but I trust he knew enough about Jesus to lead him to love Him, and he has gone into the presence of Him who "is touched with the feeling of our infirmities," "who shall not quench the smoking flax nor break the bruised

reed."

There are four on this reserve who are professed members of the Church, and we trust the example of these, with God's blessing, may do much in leading these poor

pagans into the light and liberty of the Gospel.

On Osoop's reserve we also had fortnightly services at the house of Gaddie. Here we always meet with a nice gathering of civilized people. They come to meeting dressed as white people; they take part in the services, and are always interested. Most of the people are settled down on their farms, and are doing well. They will no doubt soon be in comfortable circumstances. We have on this reserve two members. Although the majority of the people are Catholics, still we think we have a work to do. In mission work we visit all alike. We are always treated with kindness by the people belonging to that Church, who are held in ignorance and darkness worse than that of the poor pagan. On this reserve we also had occasional services at the Agency, and at the house of Nepapenase. At the Agency we always have good meetings, which are attended by all the white people about, and by the Indians in the near vicinity who understand English. I must mention the kindness of the agent, Col. McDonald, and of Mrs. McDonald, in giving us the use of their parlour for our meetings, and of Mrs. McDonald in leading the service of praise. Also of Mr. and Mrs. Sutherland, farm instructors, whose house has been always open for your missionary, and whose table often satisfied his hunger.

The house of Nepaperase is in the valley, and here we were able to induce some of those who live some distance from the house of Gaddie to attend, also a few belonging to

the Church of Rome.

Kewistahaw's Reserve.—Here we had also regular services in the house of the chief, some who are still pagans driving five or six miles to attend the meetings. In regard to the progress made on this reserve, I am not able to speak. They all speak well of the school. There is scarcely a child of school age who is not attending school. They treat your missionary with kindness and respect. They speak well of the religion of the white man. They have stood up in the meeting and declared publicly that they have lost faith in their own religion, and that the religion of the white man is the true religion, and yet they are all still pagans and bound to their idols.

Thei son has been attending our school during the same time. They frequently visited us, and we visited them in their home, and we looked upon them as perhaps the most civilized on the reserve. When asked about becoming Christians they would say, "Before long." At our last communion we expected them to unite with us. They stended our meeting. K. also attended that meeting, and in the morning spoke to me about uniting with us. L. and his wife heard of this conversation and of the intention of K. They took him to one side, and scolded him for thinking of giving up the religion of his father. I mention this fact to show how we may be at times disappointed and discouraged in our expectations.

One man said, "If this boy who is ill shall recover, then my wife and I shall know that the Lord is God, and we shall come and be baptized and we shall then stand for our children in baptism." The little boy is recovering. It is easy for people to make promises when in trouble, but as soon as the plague is gone the promise is forgotten. The Chief has said, "Next summer I shall cut off my long locks, and cut away my pagan worship and worship the living and true God."

The people on this reserve are doing well at farming. They are settled down in their own homes, and becoming more like white people in this respect. I was surprised to find at one home two rooms, one as a kitchen and dining-room, with stove, chairs, table, dishes and all nice and clean, the other for bedroom, with carpet on the floor, the wall papered, pictures on the wall, a little stove nicely polished, and every indication of comfort.

Oochapaooase is the next reserve east, and here our meetings were held at Kennie's. Here we find the most degraded of our Indians. Many of them are helpless and worthless. There are about twelve families living near to one another. Their houses indicate poverty-no stove, no chair, nor table, nor bed-keeping up the old ways and starving. There is another little encampment like to this a few miles distant, in which there are about eight families. The Chief of this band was Oochapaooase. He passed away last fall. I visited him several times during his illness, and spoke to him again and again of the way of redemption through Christ. During my last visit I asked him, "What shall I say to all your kind friends far away, who have been praying for your conversion?" He said, "Tell all my kind friends that this poor chief dies with love in his heart to the Great Spirit. Take my boy," he said, "and educate him in your school. I have not much to leave. I am not able to give you money to pay for his education-only that black horse-I give you that." It was sad to witness the sorrow of the poor widow. Can you think of a little Indian village, sheltered from the north wind and from the storm from the east and west by a forest? It is winter, and as you come near, you see now and then a shower of sparks from the little chimneys as some Indian woman stirs her fire or supplies new fuel. You enter a humble abode, and upon the ground is seated the poor widow. As soon as you are recognized she begins to cry as if her heart would break. She is soon able to talk a little about her loss, but before long she gathers her blanket about her and goes out. She follows a well-marked path through the forest and the dark, and the keen frosty air; she comes to a little hill, and on this hill is pitched the old tent, and in the tent is the grave of the Chief. The widow walks about the tent, and you may hear her voice far as she repeats over and over again, full of sadness, the words, "My tent companion-my tent companion." We pity the poor pagan woman as she weeps for her loved ones—no bright star of hope to light up the gloom.

Although there is much that is sad and discouraging in our mission work among this band, still we have tokens of good. The people who at first rejected us now open their doors and ask us to come in. They say, "Come often and tell us about God, and about

His Son and about the good Spirit. It is hard for us to understand; make it easy for us like children."

One young man died this winter. During my visits to this young man the Indians would gather about and listen with marked attention to what we said, and they all seemed to join in the prayer. I trust a bright day is near for the poor pagans on these reserves.

At Round Lake Mission regular services are held twice each Sabbath. These were attended by the people of the mission, the scholars of the school, a few of the Indians who live in the neighbourhood, also a few white people who are near. The attendance varied from 30 to 120.

We were, through the kindness of the Woman's Foreign Mission Society, able to clothe many feeble ones, and to make more comfortable the bed of many who were sick. In the day when the books shall be opened, the Church shall know more of what that noble band of workers have done for the poor pagans of our beloved Canada. May God bless more and more the Woman's Foreign Mission Society.

Our communion was held on the second Sabbath of March in the school-room. The meeting was well attended, some driving thirty miles to be present, others twenty miles, and not a few twelve miles. Six members were added upon profession of faith in the Lord Jesus. Two made application for baptism, but baptism was delayed for a little. We have no doubt, however, that the same parties will come again with more light on the subject of baptism, and a higher appreciation of the honour of being received as members of the visible church of Christ. Twenty sat down with us and partook of the emblems of the broken body and shed blood of our blessed Lord and Master. We thought of the promise, "Lo I am with you all the days," and felt that good impressions were made, not only upon the hearts of those who are his professed followers, but also on those who are "almost persuaded," and on those who are still "joined to their idols."

The Sabbath school has been conducted through the year with an average attendance of about 30. The regular Sabbath school lessons have been taken up, and not a little interest shown in committing to memory portions of Scripture, the Shorter Catechism, and hymns. The number of members added during the year is 8, 6 by profession of faith and 2 by certificate. The number of baptisms—6 infants. Meetings were held at 7 different places. More than 100 families have been visited in their homes. One of our communicants was removed by death, Mary Ann Gaddio, aged about 12. Her end was peace and joy and full confidence in the power of Jesus. We have no elder in the field, nor prayer-meeting. There are about 500 persons in the field who are not able to understand English, and about 100 who speak English.

The attendance during the year at the school has not been as high as last year, as 8 have been sent to Regina Industrial school, and 2 have been taken to Qu'Appelic Industrial school; but those who were with us were more regular in their attendance. The average attendance for the year has been about $17\frac{1}{2}$, whereas for the previous year it was about 20.

From Yellow Calf's reserve we have not a child at present attending a school. There are over 20 children of school age there attending no school. The only reason they give is that their children are too small to leave home, and they wish to have a school on their own reserve so that they may see their children often.

The progress made by the children at school has been as good as we could expect. The children spent from 4 to 6 hours each day in the school-room, and besides this the girls have done most of the house-work, we having had no hired holp during the past 3 months; also the boys have found work hauling hay and wood, attending to eattle, keeping on fires, &c.

The English is the chief subject taught in the school-room, but we are not yet able to insist upon the English being the language of the school.

THE CROWSTAND.

The three-storey stone building, which was in process of erection a year ago, was completed last summer at a cost of \$3,000. It was fully occupied during the winter, and this spring a re-arrangement of rooms is bling made in the old building and a small wooden addition is being erected, which will fit the whole much better for the purpose for which it is intended. At the request of the Indians the erection of a big church has been undertaken, for which most of the labour will be furnished gratuitously by the Indians themselves. The Rev. G. A. Laird, B.A., and his wife, who faithfully and laboriously carried on the work of this mission, had been for some time anxious about the education of their children, away from the evil influences of an Indian reserve, and in the month of March Mr. Laird sent in his resignation. His place has been taken by the Rev. C. W. Whyte, B.A., a graduate of Montreal Presbyterian College, who during the past two years has given valuable service in the Home Mission field at Killarney. Services are held at four places, with an average attendance of about 50. There are 44 communicants, three of whom were added to the roll during the year. For the past quarter the school had 50 names on the roll, and an average attendance of 42. During the year 26 pupils have been transferred from this school to that at Regina, by which process and by the increased accommodation indicated above, it is expected that there will be a complete avoidance of the overcrowded condition of the school, of which frequent complaints have hitherto been made. Much needed help was given to the principal last autumn by the appointment of an assistant in the person of Mr. W. J. Wright. Mr. Wright's special work is to act as industrial instructor to the boys, and he has proved himself not only well qualified for his duties, but capable of winning, in a high degree, the confidence and good-will of the pupils under his charge.

BIRTLE

The good work hitherto carried on by Mr. and Miss McLaren has been continued, and their hands have been strengthened by the addition to the staff of Mrs. Leckie, who brings to her work the skill of a trained nurse. The school is filled to the limits of its capacity with 34 names on the roll, and an average attendance of 24. The building in which the school was held a year ago was in poor condition, and ill-suited in plan for the purposes of an industrial school. It was therefore given up in November and another building rented, which although weather-proof is still unsuitable. The last annual report contained the following statement: "The Government has informed your Committee that the sum of \$10,000 has been inserted in the estimates to be laid before the current session of Parliament, to provide for the erection of a new building." The promise implied in this statement has not yet been fulfilled. It now seems extremely desirable, both in the view of your Committee and of the Presbytery of the bounds that the Church should undertake the erection of such a building as is needed, and such as shall allow the painstaking officers of the school to achieve the success which their diligence merits. Owing to the location of the school within the limits of the town of Birtle, the children have the privilege of attending the Presbyterian church and Sabbath school.

RIRD TAIL.

The Rev. John McArthur, who has charge also of an adjoining Home Mission field, reports that there are 28 Indian families under his care on the reserve. There are 28 communicants on the Roll, two having been added during the year, and two removed by death. There are two elders, and the number attending the Sabbath service is 45. There is a Sabbath school with an average attendance of ten, the majority of ch. Ireu of school

age being away from home in attendance at boarding and industrial schools. The Young Men's Christian Association holds weekly meetings in the homes of the people, with an average attendance of seven. The W. F. M. S. has religious exercises in connection with its weekly meetings. It has fifteen members and an average attendance of seven. The congregation contributed \$65 during the year, of which \$25 was for the Schemes of the Church, and \$10 for charitable and benevolent objects. The past year, Mr. McArthur says, has not been without its discouragements. Some of the Christians have taken share again in the heathen gambling dances, and as a consequence there have been several painful cases of church discipline. Although the Christian Indians exhibit many imperfections of character and disposition, yet there is such a contrast between their manner of living and that of their heathen neighbours that it has a strengthening effect on the Christians themselves and a good influence even on the heathen—and thus slowly yet increasingly the Gospel is manifesting its power over the whole band.

OKANASE.

Services are held at four places within the bounds of the four reserves which constitute the parish of the Rev. Geo. Flett. The total population is 270. Of these the only Christians are at Okanase, where there are 28 communicants. There were five baptisms during the year. These Indians contribute nothing towards the support of ordinances, but they have a small fund for the relief of the sick and destitute among their own number. The day school under the charge of Miss Cameron has seventeen names on the roll, and an average attendance of twelve. A Sabbath school was carried on until the end of January, by which time the attendance had become very small on account of the severe weather, and it was given up until the return of spring. Mr. J. Ansdell Macrae, the Government inspector of Indian schools, in a letter in which he praises several of our teachers, says:—"I shall mention Miss Cameron to the Department as the best day school teacher in the North-West Superintendency."

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE.

Since the removal of Miss Walker to Regina, the work of this school has been carried on by Miss A. Fraser as matron, and Miss E. Huston as teacher. This is a school in which some of the pupils are boarders and some are day scholars. In the winter the number of day pupils is small. For the last quarter the record of this school has been 23 on the roll, and an average attendance of 14. The Indians take a keen interest in the Sabbath services held in their camp. One of their own number acts as interpreter. They join in the singing with evident feeling, and several lead publicly in prayer in the Sioux language. The temptations that lurk in the way of their Christian life are many and hard to resist, and contrary to the law though it is, the depraved men who supply intoxicating liquor to the Indians now and then occasion the fall of some follower of the Lerd Jesus, whose spirit is willing but whose flesh is weak. The Rev. Peter Wright, B.D., and several of the members of his congregation have always Lakell a deep interest in the mission, and its success is due in no slightmeasure to their help. An addition costing about \$300 was made to the building last autumn to accommodate the increasing attendance.

ALBERNI.

Last July the Rev. J. A. McDona'd, B.A., entered upon his duties as missionary to the Indians of British Columbia. After spending some weeks in exploring he settled upon Alberni as his headquarters, with the approbation of the Committee and the Columbia Presbytery, and mission premises there have been purchased by the Committee, with funds generously provided for the purpose by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. Plans are being laid for the establishment of an industrial school, and in the meantime Miss Minnie McDonald, the missionary's sister, has without expense to the

nissionary to g he settled see and the Committee, Missionary , and in the pense to the Church opened a day school for the benefit of the adjoining Seshaht village with eleven names on the roll. From the neighbouring Opitchesaht village five children attend the public school of Alberni. Services are held each Sabbath, when the people are at home from their sealing and fishing expeditions, at the two villages—the Seshaht, which has a population of 165, and the Opitchesaht, which has a population of 55. The attendance varies according to the number at home. "Yesterday," writes Mr. McDonald on the 4th of April, "Mr. Cushing, a Christian Indian from Nanaimo, preached in Chinoek while I conducted the rest of the service. We had 35 Indians at the Seshaht village and 40 at the other. There are two Sabbath schools with an enrolment of 45 and an average attendance of 22, while a number of older people come as visitors. Yesterday we had fourteen at the Seshaht school and fifteen at the Opitchesaht. As to the condition and progress of Christian work at present in our mission I have to report it is very encouraging. The first six months of work has passed, in which on account of my ignorance of the language little preaching could be done, as a suitable interpreter could not be found. Still from the addresses of 'Bo's,' the Chief of the Opitchesahts, and 'Big Joe,' a head man of the Seshalts, who spoke in the absence of the Chief, I learned that I had won the confidence and good will of both people by my endeavours to help them by starting schools, holding singing services and attending to the sick and those in trouble. Big Joe said that their people had not known of the two places after death, but now since they had a missionary to tell them all about these things, they would know the way to go to the good place. The children are making good progress in learning leading Gospel verses in English and Indian. The Lord's Prayer and Ten Commandments have been translated. A number of the most familiar Gospel and Sunday school hymns have been practised, and all, old and young, join heartily in the 'Noonook,' i.e., singing. Seven of the boys and girls who can read have received a Bible or Testament each, while others received tickets and cards with Scripture verses.

"At the singing services some of the leading scenes of Christ's life are shown by means of the picture lesson rolls. The children repeat the texts and I explain as best I can the scenes and texts. Apart from the Sabbath meetings a singing school was held for ten nights in which I gave lessons in the tonic sol-fa notation.

"During the six months 166 cases of sickness or bodily affliction have been attended—there being only two fatal cases. The last week was spent for the greater part in helping and superintending the planting of gardens by the Seshahts. Seven pieces of ground have been prepared and planted with potatoes, earrots, onions, corn, beans, etc., and two flower plots have been made. Twenty-two were employed at the work; others will follow this week. Sixteen men have gone in a scaling schooner to the North Pacific, leaving their wives and children here. Some asked me to watch over their families in their absence.

"The mission house and property seem to be the model for the new Seshaht houses and gardens. It is in a line with a row of seven new frame houses erected within the last year on a hill a few hundred yards from the Somass river. The reserves of the Seshahts and Opitchesalits are considered among the best land in the Alberni valley and the best on the west coast.

"Most of the young married people are trying to live like the whites. They are very apt to learn any kind of work from the whites. Some of the men build their own houses, make fences, cut wood, and the women make nets, sew, bake, cook and work in the garden. There are sewing machines in several houses—also clocks, hanging lamps, mirrors and even lace curtains. The old people still live in the large rancheries, where, in some cases, four or five families of 20 to 25 persons keep house.

"These Indians are for the most part a happy, contented people, greatly differing from those of the North-West as I have seen them on the well-known Mistawasis Reserves which I visited in 1890."

NOTES.

The difficulty of obtaining a hold on bands of heathen Indians has been greatly lessened by the welcome gifts of clothing that have come to the care of the missionaries from many of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society's Auxiliaries in Ontario and Quebec, and even in some cases from the Maritime Provinces. These gifts serve many purposes, besides commending the Gospel by showing the love of those who for Christ's sake see d to the succour of people whom they have never seen; they protect the destitute from the wet and the cold; they form the main supply of clothing for the children in the industrial schools; the yarn and the webs of print and flannel afford an opportunity of training youthful fingers in the lass of the normal deletion of the mission, and discovers that while Christianity seeks to relieve need, it does not engourage idlatess.

Four pages of the Western Missionary have been occupied monthly in advocating the claims of Indian missions and making the Church acquainted with what is being carried on. The labour and responsibility of editorial duties have been abundantly rewarded by the increased interest which is being shown in the work of reclaiming the aborigines of the North-West.

Grateful acknowledgment is due to several ministers who during the year had it in their power to aid our missions, and who ungrudgingly gave time and influence to this end. It is fitting to mention in this connection the Rev. D. G. McQueen, of Edmonton; the Rev. A. Robson, of Fort Qu'Appelie; the Rev. P. Wright, of Portage la Prairie; and the Rev. P. McF. McLeod, of Victoria.

The Sub-Committee held fortnightly meetings as in former years. These were attended regularly by the members resident in Winnipeg, and on special occasions also by missionaries and representatives of the western Presbyteries.

SUMMARY.

There are 13 Indian missions under the care of the Church. There are 8 ordained missionaries and 22 helpers who assist, or in some cases are in sole charge, in the capacity of teachers, matrons of industrial schools, or the like. There are 222 Indian communicants—40 were added during the year, and 10 removed, leaving a net increase of 30. There were 16 baptisms of adults and 56 of infants. The 11 Sabbath schools have an average attendance of 294, and in addition in some cases, such as Portage la Prairie and Birtle, the Indian children attend the Presbyterian Sabbath school of the town in company with white children. There are 8 industrial schools, which have an enrolment of 264 pupils, and an average attendance—for the first quarter of 1892—amounting to 220. There are 4 day schools, which have 65 names on the roll, and an average attendance of 36. \$277 were contributed by Indians for religious purposes, of which \$103 went to the Schemes of the Church. This is an increase in every particular except the number of baptisms and the attendance at day schools.

The work of Indian evangelization grows in interest, the more we know of the wards of our nation the more do their necessities appeal to us. The work grows in urgency too. Settlers are crowding in with their feverish anxiety for "getting on" at any cost, and many of them with the theory that the Indian has no rights which a white men is bound to respect. The prohibitory liquor law, with its wholesome restrictions, is now gone, and however loosely its prohibitions were regarded among white men, it made it possible to enforce the prohibitory law for Indians. These are some of the influences which are abroad, and which are not likely to predispose the Indian in favour of adopting the white man's religion. It is the more necessary then that we be up and doing to possess our whole land, farms, ranches, mines, reserves and all for Christ.

IV.-MISSION TO CHINA.

(1) FORMOSA.

The record of the past year in this portion of the mission field, like that of former years, has been one of progress. The work has been prosecuted with zeal and energy by Dr. MacKay, his fellow-labourers and helpers, and an encouraging measure of success has accompanied their labours. Owing to the death of Mr. Jamieson, to which reference is made in the report of this Committee to last Assembly, Dr. MacKay has been without a Canadian colleague during the past year. It is not desirable, in the judgment of your Committee, that this state of things should continue. Dr. MacKay has also indicated his desire for the appointment of a missionary to labour with him in the work of the Gospel in Formosa. Your Committee have, therefore, appointed Mr. Wm. Gauld, a graduate of Knox College, to this field. Mr. Gauld has commended himself by the work which he has done during his college course in the home field, and by the interest which he has manifested in Foreign Mission work as one who is well fitted for the resonance. The position to which he has been called.

Mrs. Jamieson left Tamsui in the month of June of last year, and has a urned to Canada. The proposal made by the Committee of last year, that one of the brethren from the Presbytery of Honan should visit Formosa and confer with Dr. MacKay, has not been carried out. While both the Presbytery and Dr. MacKay expressed the pleasure which they would have in meeting and conferring together, it was not deemed advisable by the Presbytery that any member of the staff should be sent conditional auch a mission in the circulastances in which the missionaries were situated at that time.

Last year events prevented statistics of the mission in Formosa being sent, but this year your Committee are pleased to be able to lay before the Assembly very interesting extracts from the full and satisfactory reports received from Dr. MacKay. In these a succinct account is given of the progress made during the past twenty years, and of the present condition of the Church in Formosa.

"As statistics embrace facts relating to population, births, deaths, disease, education, religion, etc., all parts should be carefully weighed together. The numerical statements must not be rudely separated from other important facts. It must be conceded that this is too often done, to the entire misconception of affairs and utter estrangement of cause and effect. Statistics were forwarded to Canada in 1890; last year events prevented us doing so. As it is exactly twenty years since work began here, I now make the figures cover that period: Number baptized from 1872 to 1892, 3,082; number of deaths during same time, 451; number under suspension now, 26; number of living members, 2,605; number of elders (10 died), 77; number of deacons, 89; number of chapels, 50; number of preachers, 50; number of native pastors, 2; number of students, 12 to 20; number of teachers, 8; number of Bible-women, 19; number of matrons, 2; number in girls' school last year (including old and young), 45. Apart from many repairs, etc., the contributions for 1891 amounted to \$1,053. Number of stations supported by the native church in North Formosa, 4."

"I am reminded by letters and numerous visitors that I landed here just twenty years ago. In no way can progress be seen more distinctly than by comparison. Time at this moment fails me to note details, but a few thoughts are here added: Twenty years ago North Formosa was an unbroken field; this day, if there were no chapels, converts, preachers, elders, deacons, etc., I would nevertheless praise the Lord and maintain that His powerful arm cleared the way and prospered the cause. Look at the mighty fortress and consider the following:—Anti-foreign feelings have been largely removed;

deep-scated prejudices brushed aside; countless superstitions exposed; idolatrous rites made subject to ridicule; Confucianists have been humbled; Buddhists and Tanists enlightened; Mandarins made to respect us; the rich induced to visit us, and thousands upon thousands so influenced as to know idolatry is worthless. Hundreds of the learned and illiterate are intellectually convinced that we proclaim *Eternal Truth*.

"If there were no baptized members these are the subjects which would be brought more prominently before you. Then if parties ever thought converts have been easily gathered in here, it is high time they at once abandon such false views. Every step forward, every convert gained, and every chapel established was amid bitter opposition, deceitful plotting and violent threats, etc. At the time very little indeed of what we were actually passing through was made known by letter to the Church in Canada. At the present time it is well to remember and not forget what the past has been here.

"But there are churches and Christians, for 3,082 have been admitted by baptism. We have been 7,300 days gathering in that number; but then, upwards of 100 are able to go forth and proclaim to others, 'Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ.' Peter began one morning at 9 a.m. and admitted 3,000 by sundown. Well now, suppose he did. What then? He didn't get 3,000 every day, and many a weary tramp the heroic Paul made without seeing thousands flock in at once.

"But why get on this line of thought? Let Apostles and Martyrs enjoy their wellearned crowns and habitations. Our business is not to be harping about those 3,000, but to strain every nerve in doing our duty—in being faithful unto death. We serve the same Lord and Master, unchanging and unchangeable for ever. We have no right to question His giving thousands in one day, or one in a thousand days. 'Nay, but, O man, who art thou that repliest against God?' 'O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God.'"

unforeseen events do not prevent, the above, at least, will be done this year-1892.

No. III are Pi-po-hoan and poor.

The contributors (apart from preachers and students) are not in the employ of the mission. Where there is a large staff of foreigners, there are many natives employed and it is easy to obtain contributions from them.

I insist on the importance of this in considering self-support, contributions, etc.

If all our converts were Chinese their contribution, I submit, would look respectable. explain and defend (against all odds) my views on the subject.

One word more though; what is given in North Formosa is of right down good will and heartiness. They are not grumbling on account of burdens which they cannot bear. There cannot be a grambling people and prosperous church.

Oxford College.

During 1891 I taught in college from January to April and from July till December. Of the twenty-five (25) in attendance nearly all had been out in the field exercising their varied gifts. The accompanying paniphlet will give some idea of the ground over which our thoughts ranged. There is, therefore, no need of placing the subjects on this paper. Every day they were addressed from one to five times, whilst all took copious notes. Subjects were regularly reviewed and the classes constantly drilled. Will this interest you? On being questioned as to what lines of thought were most convincing, one who is a B.A. said, "The fulfilment of prophecy, especially the Resurrection of Jesus Christ." Another thought the "Ten Plagues" and their critical import would influence many; but 20 of the 25 unhesitatingly declared that the reasoning from effect to cause and particularly from design to Designer would more deeply impress the native mind. . . Thus I have been right all along, as to how best to present the eternal Truth of Jehovah to Chinese minds. My museum supplied interesting specimens for investigation. E.g., Limuli, whose ancient relatives swarmed in the Silurian waters; but now lie dead, buried, extinct. Limuli, who find a home in the mud flats and shallow waters of Kelung harbour. Scarabeus sacer, so famed in Egyptian story—conspicuous in mythological language and emblematic of creative power. Pagurus beruhardus (soldier crab) with its friend, a Sea Anemone, attached to his habitation, which was neither built, bought nor rented by his lordship, but taken after careful inspection, without asking questions, etc., etc., etc.

Marvellous the adaptation of vegetable and animal forms to their varied ways of life! Wondrous the contrivance which marks them all! Glorious the design throughout this God-made world. I repeat we tried to see God in shell, plaint and rock. Every eve, at 7 p.m. the Girls' School sent its innuates to College Hall. Both young and old were drilled in reading, singing, speaking and debating. Energy, interest and zeal characterized the entire session.

At the closing exercises there was a recitation, marriage and oration, all of which elicited hearty applause and greatly delighted the foreigners who were present. Without adding anything more I emphatically declare the College work of 1891 was solid, interesting and of permanent value. Our duty at this day is to keep steadfastly and patiently advancing to greater attainments and nobler victories.

Let incessant streams go forth from Oxford College to refresh, enlighten and elevate sin-darkened souls in the midst of black heathenism.

Girls' School.

I now invite special attention to the Girls' School—ask, indeed, the Foreign Mission Committee to consider very carefully my views which previously were not sufficiently made prominent. I will undertake to answer reasonable questions propounded by any man or woman, society or committee within the Dominion (or without it for that matter). Note then the following:—

I. It is impracticable (if not impossible) throughout North Formosa to get girls (Chinese or Pt-po-hoan) to come here and remain for any length of time in the building. It is demanding too much in the present stage of our work to expect poor little girls to wander from the East Coast away from their parents and remain here liable to sickness or death. As there is a struggle for existence there the larger girls cannot be spared.

II. Don't be misled by boarding schools. In considering a sensible and useful plan amongst the Chinese, all servants of the mission, along with preachers, teachers, etc., must be excluded. In one word we need a plan that is feasible for the unemployed masses. These form the back-bone of the native church. Independent farmers, labourers and mechanics, etc., with their families. Preachers, etc., should teach their own as well as other girls, etc.

III. We should proceed cautiously with the Chinese, and not ruthlessly break in on their customs with our nineteenth century views, i.e., if we would eventually carry the weight and influence of thousands with us Christianwards. I am not theorizing, but

putting experience on paper.

IV. From Jui; of last year till Christmas we had 45 (forty-five) in the girls' school. For the first time I realized what I longed to see, viz., families, the members of which did not require outside supervision. There were Bible-women with their daughters or daughters-in-law. Matrons and their little sisters, daughters or relatives. Happy families! All day long reading, sewing, washing, writing, studying, singing, etc. Every night at 7 p.m. old and young marched joyfully into College Hall, where we had exercises and meetings never to be forgotten. That female band went out into the field with clearer views, brighter hopes, greater sympathy and more zeal for saving the blind and perishing—already their labours have yielded fruit. A little girl influenced her grandfather and an old woman brought in a grandchild.

Our idea, then, is to have the girls' school for training Bibls-women, and not a boarding place for girls. The former is quite in accord with the genius of the Chinese, the latter is opposed to it. Let no one run to the extreme and say, "Idolatry is in accord, and therefore should allow it." Extremes are seldom correct. I contend for every iota of the essentials of our glorious Christianity, but submit the rest should be guided by Christian Chinese thought. Now it would be quite Chinese-like for Bible-women to be

One "mother in Israel" has three girls with her at the Toa-tin-tea chapel. Let this work go on in the lives indicated, so that every important centre may have the benefit of such female labourers, who can be supported at \$3 or \$4 per month. Superstition and ignorance are so rampant that every kind of agency that will actually help to batter the strongholds of heathenism should be employed. I do not fear discussion with anyone living throughout the length and breadth of Canada about the employment of foreign single ladies to such a field as this. Let the subject be aired, that truth may prevail and sentimentalism be crushed beneath the feet of bold, clear, scientific and Biblical facts, etc. I call aloud to the Church in Canada, after twenty years down amongst the masses, only in some such way as the above will the work amongst women and girls be overtaken in such an unhealthy and malarious region as as North Formosa. Mark well those words.

On Saturday, 13th February, Mrs. M., our three children and several students went with me to Lām-Khām. After arrival we strolled through the only street, with a row of houses on each side, and not a single individual reviled us as "barbarians." In the evening we had a packed house. I spoke on Psalm xevi. 5. An idol (god of the earth) was brought in after service. A husband, wife, and three children, expressed a desire to worship the living God.

Sabbath 14th, we "opened" the new chapel. A crowd came at 8 a.m. and listened to an exposition of Psalm exxxv. 15-18. Twenty-eight men stood up and read a Psalm or hymn each. At 10 a.m. a still larger audience sat while I addressed them on John i. 10. Many were outside as there was no room in the building. A farmer suddenly arose and exclaimed, "I, too, wish to worship the Creator of heaven and earth." "When did you decide?" I asked. "Why, I came here yesterday to look at you all as theatrical players; but have been thinking through the night and have got some light, so that I now wonder we have been such fools as to worship pieces of camphor wood shaped by ourselves." Another man shouted. "Put my name down as a worshipper of God the Creator; I came here to see and hear what I could, so as to be able to ridicule you all the more; but I am this day convinced the doctrine you preach is true, and idol devotees are all wrong." After singing the closing hymn, a young man pressed through the crowd with a god of wood (Tî-oûg-iâ) in his hands. "Here, take this," he said, "I am done with idols for ever." "Yes." shouted another, "and you flattened its nose with a stone." "I did that, and the rotten old block never grouned." It was a household god 50 years. All these, and five from Pat-li-hun, are in my museum. Some people are wont to say, "The Gospel has lost its power, if it ever had any." Let them tell that to somebody else, not to me. The preached word of God, directed by the all-powerful Divine Spirit that day produced the above results, etc.

It is very difficult, perhaps impossible, to get Christians at home clear on the real state of matters. Let them avoid extremes and think of Corinth, Ephesus, etc. If there are not always fruits according to expectations, some people get discouraged. I can do no more than forward the above fuets with the intimation that I won't be disappointed. All these parties are not likely to turn out noble and true. Nevertheless I most emphatically insist that light is penetrating the thick darkness; life is agitating death-like souls, and the Gospel is spreading and conquering.

Think of it! 17, 18, and 19 years ago I was refused lodgings for the night there and with a dozen students had to take up our abode in an ox stable.

The preacher who is there was one of the herd boys with whom I spent hours during my first year in Tamsui.

[&]quot;Who is so great a God as our God."

[&]quot;Thou art the God that doest wonders."

Hindrances.

I. Gold "Fever."—The precious metal was discovered in the banks of a mountain stream which runs into the Ke-lung river. The rush and excitement of hundreds and thousands proved a great distraction to quiet work, the object of which is the soul's salvation.

II. Mainland Speculators — Crowds came from Shanghai, Fuchow, Amoy, and soldiers from Honan. Their influence and attitude are decidedly anti-Christian.

III. Pi-po-hoan Migrating.—Several villages have been greatly depopulated. Whole families have gone within the mountains to reclaim new land which will be divided between themselves and Chinese who sustain them whilst the work is going on. In the meantime it is a hard life and veritable struggle for existence. Those left behind feel the sudden shock, and it will take a year or two for them to recover confidence and stability.

IV. Severe Earthquakes.—On Tuesday, 17th November last, there were four alarming shocks. Chapels have been more or less damaged on the east coast. The one at Lam-hong-o is in ruins. No wonder. Mountains and rocks there have been rent asynder.

V. Ferocious Savages.

a. The Cook Preacher was on his way here from Ki-lai by boat. A storm beat it ashore. Savages surrounded the party. Marvellous the escape!

b. Thirteen of our Lam-hong-o converts who were in the mountains felling timber fought 23 savages from noon till dark. Four of the former were killed and beheaded.

c. A deacon and two others last month of the year met savages at mid-day in full view of the virlage, and saved themselves by jumping forty feet down a precipice into the sea. Advances.

I. We had two sessions throughout the year in Oxford College and the Girls' School.

No other year in the history of this mission saw so great an advance (by students, women, girls and children) in the study of God's Word and Works. Enthusiasm prevailed without a break to the close.

II. On board the steam launches going in and out we met and combatted them. They never attempted a second conflict, but new batches invariably act as if they never brushed against foreigners ready to meet them on their own superstitions or classical ground.

III. Those poor people, who are fighting rank vegetation, malarial poison and fierce savages, are proparing materials (atones, bricks and lumber) for chapels. A few days are spent earning rice for their families, then as many collecting necessaries for houses in which to worship the world's Redeener.

IV. Willingly and heartily our people have undertaken to repair the injured buildings. At Lam-hong-o they will supply timber, stones, labour, etc., but cannot do all themselves. Years ago they didn't want chapels, then some wouldn't repair after getting them. Tell us if the above is not genuine advance?

V. Several of the men who fought, and a dozen others, have bravely entered the woods again for chapel lumber. Those on the border land are made to feel more dependence on the Living God, etc. Near the mountains I met a number of savages, and extracted teeth for them, etc.

There are daily prostrations before thousands of idols for the sole reason of obtaining dollars and enjoying pleasures!

These are not the only hindrances; their name is legion.

VI. At Sin-Kang, where we fought many a battle, the people (Pi-po-hoan) have, as it were, waked up from a long sleep. A temple in one of its villages is neglected, and no one comes forward to repair it. In Lang-sia, a village close by, a number (who were enemies) are actually fitting up a place in which to worship Jehovab. Two of them were here yesterday.

At Tho-gu, three miles from Tiong-Kang, 30 or 40 Chinese, with an old teacher at their head, tried hard to secure a suitable building last December.

And note well. At Lam-Kham, nearly a day's march south of this, the Chinese secured a site and built a small, new chapel on it. We opened it 14th of last month in the midst of a great crowd. Fifty (50) read Psalms, etc., and declared in favour of Christianity. Nineteen years ago they refused me lodgings, and we "put up" in an ox stalle.

(2) HONAN.

The Second Annual Report from the Presbytery of Honan is so interesting, and presents so clear a view of the situation of our mission, that we feel justified in making large extracts from it. It begins: "Wars and rumours of war have contributed not a little to the continuance of the suspense with which the year began. We were then in great uncertainty regarding the settlement of the Chu Wang looting case; but in the good Providence of God, an unprecedentedly short period enabled us to witness the conclusion of that affair. The local authorities provided full indemnity and issued a proclamation which in the estimation of experienced missionaries, was surprising for its explicitness. Subsequent events have proved the sincerity of their intention to protect us. As the impression seems slow in gaining its way to the mind of the Church we would here desire to clearly indicate that after patient waiting we can at least claim to have gained a foothold in this very hostile province. Not only at Chu Wang, but at another market town called Hsin Chen, suitable premises have been secured, though only with the gravest difficulty, and these premises have now been altered for the residence of foreigners and taken possession of by missionary families, including ladies and children."

At Station I., Chu Wang, are: Rev. Jonathan Goforth, Rev. Douald MacGillivray, B.D., W. McClure, M.D., Medical Missionary.

At Station II., Hsin Chen, are: Rev. J. Fraser Smith, M.D., Rev. J. H. MacVicar, B.A., Rev. M. MacKenzie, Rev. John MacDougall, B.A., Miss Margaret McIntosh, trained nurse.

The medical work at both places has been fully inaugurated, and 2,597 treatments are reported for the year. The proposal t at Mr. MacGillivray should visit Formosa was not favourably regarded by the Presbytery, which view was afterwards justified by the course of events. Two families of our staff, those of Mr. Goforth and Dr. Smith, were called on to

mourn the loss of children. The sympathy of the Committee has already been expressed with the brethren under their trials, and we are sure the Church unites with them in

this expression of sympathy.

There has been in all parts of the Empire during the past year a strong feeling against foreigners, and this has been felt in a marked degree in the province of Honan. Conspicuously so at Hsin Chen, where a determined and violent attack was made upon the mission, during which the lives of two of the missionaries were placed in imminent peril. This attempt did not, however, result in any serious loss or injury, most of the money that had been extorted by the threats of the assailants having been returned. From the above it will be seen that the year past has been one of anxiety and serious trial for our missionaries in Honan. And we have reason for gratitude to God, that notwith standing the very trying experiences through which they have been called to pass, their lives have been spared and their health has been maintained. It may be said of them that they have been "in perils of robbers, in journeyings often, in perils by the heathen, in weariness and painfulness," and been sustained and guided in their work in a remarkable way through it all.

Their judicious and persistent efforts to secure central points in which to settle have been rewarded. And it the meantime the cities of Chu Wang and Hsin Chen are the

head cuariers of our mission.

Reports have been received from each of the missionaries.

REPORT OF REV. J. H. MACVICAR.

In his report Mr. MacVicar says: "Owing to the exigencies of the situation my life has been somewhat nomadic during the past year. My studies in March were turned largely in the direction of preparing and delivering my first formal discourse in Chinese." He states that during his journey from Tientsin he had abundant opportunities for preaching both in English and Chinese, and especially for seeing the work carried on by experienced missionaries. "During my second year in China besides adding infinitesimally to my knowledge of that continent of research, the language, several other lessons have been learned. One is the wisdom of our Saviour's arrangement in sending out His disciples two by two. Another is the wisdom of the advice of Dr. Nevius, that new comers should not be expected to assume responsible work till five or six years after their arrival. But most consciously of all, as already mentioned, has come the lesson of daily and hourly dependence on the sufficiency of His grace who has sent us here to proclaim to a hostile population the unsearchable riches of Christ."

REPORT OF THE REV. JOHN MACDOUGALL.

The year for Mr. MacDougall and wife has been one of domestic trial. The winter months were spent in Lin Ching in study. During the year Mr. MacDougall suffered considerably from ill health, while of Mrs. MacDougall he says she had not during the year a single day of real health. He records with regret that on this account he has not made the progress he expected with the language during the year. He appears, however, to have willingly done all in his power to aid in the work of the mission.

REPORT OF REV. M. MACKENZIE.

He states that the first two months of the year were occupied with the study of the language. With Mr. Goforth and Dr. Smith, he visited many villages, speaking briefly and selling gospels and tracts as opportunity offered. He went to Chefoo in April for Mrs. MacKenzie's health, and enjoyed converse there with missionaries of the American Presbyterian Church. Although he says he has made little progress in the language, yet

REPORT OF REV. J. F. SMITH, M.D.

Dr. Smith writes with gratitude to God from his home in Hsin Chen. He has had a very busy year. He speaks of preaching and dispensing to large, orderly crowds. On November 20th, the first day of a large fair, he opened the dispensary for the first time, and during the five days of the fair he says he had large crowds of people who behaved remarkably well. The dispensary has been kept open about four hours each day, and large numbers have had an opportunity of hearing about the Saviour Jesus. The total number of new patients treated has been 1,164. The number of surgical operations has been 36. Dr. Smith closes his report with an expression of hopefulness in looking forward to the work of another year.

REPORT OF REV. J. GOFORTH.

Mr. Goforth reports visiting during the year 5 cities and 17 market towns. Two of the former and 5 of the latter were visited a second time. While at home he had daily service in the chapel. A 10 days' fair brought great crowds, to whom the Gospel was preached, both indoors and in the open air. Mr. Goforth rejoices in the apparent conversion of Mr. Wang, the teacher, who asks to be received into the Church. His home life was saddened by the death of his beloved child, Donald Marshall, and by the illness of Mrs. Goforth.

REPORT OF REV. D. MACGILLIVRAY.

Mr. MacGillivray's report tells of a year of active work in many directions. With the other brothren he has been working at different points in the field as the exigencies of the mission and the openings afforded in providence required. He has rendered valuable service, both at Chu Wang and Hsin Chen, in connection with the initiation of the work in these cities. He speaks of having, notwithstanding the disturbances, enjoyed unusual peace and joy in the prosecution of the Lord's work. To give one instance from his report—he speaks of a visit paid to a place called Hua Hsien while a fair was being held, at the ghost place is noted for its turbulence and hostility to foreigners, yet each day he and his associates were continuously surrounded by attentive groups of listeners.

He has been abundant in labours, has made good progress in the language, and has been permitted to enjoy unbroken good health. He says, I gratefully remember the benefits bestowed upon me by intercourse with my beloved fellow workers, with all of whom at different times in Honan I have had the closest relations.

REPORT OF DR. McCLURE.

He rejoined Mr. MacGillivray in Chu Wang in April, and then prepared to make his permanent home there. Total number of consultations at the dispensary was 1,097. He says: "We are in the midst of a hostile and superstitious people, whose prejudices it will require time and patience, with wise and sympathetic dealing on our part, to overcome." In the dispensary the missionary side of the work has been made prominent.

In reviewing these reports from Honan, your committee notices, with great satisfaction, that all the brethren have co-operated with one another in a spirit of mutual esteem and confidence. They dwell together in unity. They all seem alike desirous for the advancement of the cause of our Lord Jesus Christ, and willing to forego personal comfort and endure hardships for the Gospel's sake. And while the year has been one of

unrest for all of them so far as a settled home is concerned, and one of great anxiety on account of the attitude of the people, and on the part of some of the members of the staff a year of severe personal affliction, yet a tone of hopefulness and courage pervades their reports. It would appear as if the trials they had been called to pass through had served to deepen and strengthen their faith. The Church has reason for thankfulness for the progress made. A foothold has been gained in the hostile province of Honan. The banner of the cross has been uplifted there. The message of salvation has been conveyed to many of the people. It is as yet the day of small things with them, but it is a day bright with promise. And we doubt not that in answer to their and the Church's prayer, "the little one shall become a thousand, and the small one a strong nation; I the Lord will hasten it in its time."

In closing this part of the report, your Committee would express their appreciation of the admirable manner in which the business is transacted and the accounts kept, as well as of the wisdom and brotherly love which appear to have guided the brethren of this Presbytery since the inception of the mission. They rejoice in the measure of encouragement already given them, and trust that the enquirers who have gladdened their hearts may prove the first-fruits of an abundant harvest. They would also express their deep sympathy with Mr. and Mrs. Goforth, and with Dr. and Mrs. Smith in the death in each family of a beloved child, and trust that these afflictions may be satisfied to the bereaved parents, and that they may be sustained by the rich consolations of the Gospel. They would also express their sympathy with those members of the mission staff who have suffered through long continued illness, and especially with Mr. and Mrs. MacDougall who, on account of the seriously impaired health of the latter, have been compelled to abandon, at least for a season, the work on which their hearts were set, and to return to Canada.

V.-MISSION TO CENTRAL INDIA.

The reports from our India Mission field have been received at so late a period that we have not been able to give them that careful examination which their importance deserves. But we can gather from the facts which they contain, and the spirit which breathes through them, that our missionaries are, amid many difficulties, diligently sowing the seed of divine truth, and working with zeal in their various departments of Christian labour. Their hearts have been saddened by the death of Miss Harris, who had endeared herself to every member of the staff, and impressed them with a sense of her devotion, and of her aptitude and ability for the work to which she was called. We quote from the report of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society the following reference to her death: "Humanly speaking, everything that could be done for their suffering sister was done by the members of the mission staff both at Neemuch and Indore. It was decided by her physicians that the orly chance of recovery, in their estimation, was a sea voyage, and the Mission Council determined to send her home to Canada. Dr. McKellar was appointed to accompany her to London. Before reaching Britain she became unconscious, and on Feb. 15 the spirit was set at liberty, and, 'absent from the body, she was present

with the Lord.' Miss Gordon, of Whitby, Rev. Dr. Caven, of Toronto, Rev. Dr. Matthews, and a few other friends, were present when the body of our beloved sister was laid to rest in a quiet spot in the city of London."

The Church mourns the loss of a beloved and faithful servant, and unites in the expressions of sympathy with the parents and friends of the departed which the sad event has called forth.

Reports have been received from the other lady missionaries with the exception of Dr. Margaret McKellar, whose health has not been good during a portion of the year, and who accompanied Miss Harris on her voyage to London. Dr. Margaret O'Hara and Miss McWilliams, having only arrived at Indore in December, are not in a position to make any report.

Miss Rodger has retired from her position as a missionary of our Church, and the Executive on behalf of the Committee have conveyed to her their appreciation of her labours in the past, and the high estimation in which she is held in the Church as a faithful labourer in the mission field.

Dr. Elizabeth Beatty is at present at home on furlough, and we regret that the state of her health makes it doubtful if she will be able to return to her position in India this year as she had hoped to do.

Rev. W. A. Wilson and wife are now in Canada on furlough, and Mr. Jamieson and his sister are carrying on the work in Neemuch in their absence.

The visit of the Governor-General of India to Indore, and to our mission there, during last year, was an event of great interest to our missionaries and of some importance to our work. His kindly words of appreciation of the labours of our missionaries was an encouragement to them, and could not be without a beneficial influence upon the native population.

In the following extracts from the reports of the missionaries will be found a statement of the progress of the work in the different stations.

REPORT OF REV. J. WILKIE.

The past year has been in many respects the most trying yet experienced in India. The constant strain of the work in its many departments; the efforts often misunderstood and sometimes sadly misrepresented; the cherished hopes not realized; the loud calls for help from the many centres around us, that could not be responded to, etc., ' are all tended to try the patience and weary the spirit. In no year, on the other hand '1. 2 we had greater cause for sincere heartfelt gratitude to our loving Master. Never have we been so kindly received and assisted by the non-christian community, high and low; never have we seen so much apparent interest in the Word; never have we had many calls for Christian teachers and schools.

It has been a pleasure to have had throughout the greater part of the year Rev. N. H. Russell associated with me at Indore. As he had opportunity he did what he could to advance the work, in which he thoroughly identified himself. For six months he taught the mathematics of the college, he took charge of and reorganized on an enlarged basis the Sunday school work, and as he acquired the language, took his slore of the evangelistic work. It is a matter of regret that it was found necessary for him to take charge of the work in Mhow; but he carries with him the grateful memories of those who were associated with him here, as the addresses presented to him both by college students and the congregation amply testify.

Building.—Much time and thought have necessarily been given to this work during the year. The Women's Hospital and the Girls' Boarding School have been finished within the year, and the College building has been going on during part of the time. We believe the buildings will meet the wants of the mission for years to cone.

Rs. 2,000 have been given by friends here for the Building Fund of the hospital.

The boarding school building is a large massive building, with ample accommodation in its large dormitories for a very much larger number of Christian girls than we have here at present, and in its large airy class-rooms for a large number of outside pupils that are already seeking admission. The sincere thanks of the mission are due to the ladies of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, for so liberally providing forthis necessary and import-

ant work, now made possible by these buildings.

The college building has not made equal progress, as we were waiting for the Government grant and therefore their sanction to our plans. The question is still before them; but a number of unfavourable circumstances—not the least being the uncertain revenue—makes me less hopeful in regard to it than a year ago. We are, therefore, now proceeding with the work, which we will carry forward as far as the money on hand will allow, hoping that by that time more will be forthcoming. If we do not receive the Government help, we shall be more free to use the building in the future as the interests of the Mission demand—a no small advantage. The work is the Master's, and He will secure for us what He sees to be needful for His glory. More we do not want.

The site granted by H. H. Maharajah Holkar, is the very best possible for our work i.e. in my estimation; but the great depth of treacherous black clay soil, that must be removed if security is sought for, makes building there very expensive. In June we hope to push it on rapidly so as to have the first storey ready for occupation in September.

During the year a simple gymnasium has been built that already has proved a great boon to the students, especially to the "Home boys."

College work.—I do not think anyone was deceived by my statements about the college when at home; but to prevent the possibility of misunderstanding, I shall explain

what is covered by the term. It includes:-

(1)—The Vernacular Department—in which are taught Hindi and Urdu, from the a, b, c, up to the fourth book, with arith ratic, etc., in vernacular. From this the boy is promoted into (2) the Middle School or Department in which he begins the study of English and the other branches of knowledge from English text books. From this he is promoted into (3) the High School Department in which he is prepared for the Matriculation Examination of Calcutta University—an examination as hard, and in some respects very similar to that of Toronto University. If he passes this, he is next admitted to (4) The College class proper, in which he is prepared for the First Arts Examination of Calcutta University—an examination corresponding to that of the second year of Toronto University.

During the year there has been continued progress in all departments of the work. I have been able to hold promotion examinations in all the classes below the High School department every six months, and have been forced to promote some classes almost bodily.

Notwithstanding the rapid promotions the Inspector was able to say that the College was in a better condition than ever before and so to urge the Agent to the Governor-General to increase the grant from Rs. 125 to Rs. 166, which was done with some kind and complimentary remarks by Mr. Crosthwaite, the Agent to the Governor-General.

Whilst there has been steady progress in the secular study, even more attention has been paid to the direct Bible teaching. "Rock versus Sand," by Dr. Munro Gibson, and the Book of Romans, first five chapters, have been regularly taught to the College and High School classes, and the Gospel of Mark to the lower classes. In the recent examination the highest marks were obtained by a Hindoo, and in the case of many it was a most

difficult matter to tell who should obtain the first place as they all did so well—some being able to repeat nearly the whole of the Gospel off by heart. Twenty-two boys obtained bibles for obtaining more than fifty per cent. of the possible marks. These we were able to give through the generosity of Mr. Milton, a Tahsildar of Sailana and one of our old members.

Actual baptis as from the school we cannot report, but one of our old students wrote me as follows: "It is through very shame that I did not call on you. I wasted my time in useless pursuits instead of looking after truth, but praise be to God that since last night my heart appears to have undergone a thorough change and drawn towards our heavenly Father. I sincerely hope that He will now save me from temptation and evil course." Another of our old students was baptized in Jubbalpore a few months ago, and several seem very near the kingdom. It is ours however to sow, and I count it a blessed privilege to that day after day not only to teach directly and progressively the Gospel, but also midirectly in every subject taught. Much as the contrary is stated, I believe that no form of evangelistic work equals this. The uncertain, fickle, mixed, often small and ignorant congregations of the bazaar, that can be so easily broken up by a noisy brawler or excited religious enthusiast, must not be despised, but afford a far more difficult and unsatisfactory field of work than this.

Since there is such a loud cry for Vernacular and English schools by those who know we will teach the Bible as one of our principal text books, we must give more attention to the training of those who can do work satisfactorily. After our experience here, where we have succeeded in establishing our High School in the face of two others-one supported by the Agent Governor-General and the other by Maharajah Holkar-I feel convinced that if we give the education wanted, the Bible teaching will deter no one, or at least but few, from attending our schools. I have to confess that our Vernacular schools have not been a great success in the past, but this I am not surprised at. Too many of our Christian teachers have been men of no education, able to but stammer through a little Hindi or Urdu. At first the boys come out in numbers, but on finding that no education such as they want is to be obtained, they leave in disgust, too often feeling they have been deceived. The attempt to meet the cry for teachers is a natural one, but in many cases it would, I am convinced, be a saving of mission money and reputation, to close these schools altogether till we can supply those properly trained for the work. But how can this, be done? We cannot expect other missions to undertake the trouble for us, when they all have more work than workers. And so in the past, too often, we have had to send out our own untrained men or take those rejected by others. Some of our men are certainly an exception to this statement and are doing splendid work, still the general rule remains.

I am glad to say that our college is in part seeking to meet the difficulty, and 1 hope will do so more thoroughly in the future. Twenty-four Christian boys are being educated at present, and this number will be largely increased when the other stations can send all their boys.

Maharajah Holkar has been induced to start a college in the city that will to some extent weaken ours. This, however, causes me no special anxiety, as I have no special ambition in the college work beyond a desire to know what the Master wishes in the matter.

The College Home contains 17 boys at present, and is doing all we expected of it.

Mr. John still has it in charge, and has done splendid work during the year.

To the earnest work of Messrs. John and Johory is due much of the credit of the present satisfactory standing of the college, ably seconded as they have been by Pandit Vital Rao, Narayan, Caleb, Behari Lal, and latterly by Mr. Vedanayagam, a graduate of Jaffier College.

Congregation.—Services have been regularly held on Thursday and Sabbath. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been observed four times. Five have been admitted by profession of faith; one adult and three infants have been baptized; three children and one adult have died; two have joined other congregations, and six have left the field, without as yet taking their certificates. Our membership is 32, and number of baptized adherents is 18.

Two elders were appointed, i.e., Messrs. Johory, M.A., and John, who also have been received by the Presbytery as students of theology. Mr. Johory is a fluent speaker in Hindi, Bengali and English, an M.A. of Calcutta University, and a earnest preacher of the Word. He has been Superintendent of our Camp Sabbath school, and has done good work in the other schools and in the evangelistic work of the station.

Mr. John is a native of Ceylon, and a graduate of the American Mission College there. His father is a native pastor in Jaffna, as was Johory's in Bengal. Tamil is his native tongue, but he has already acquired a very ready use of Hindi, and heartily uses it as he has opportunity. Both he and Mr. Johory have been a very great comfort and help to me in the work in the year.

The envelope system was introduced about a year ago, and the tithing system generally adopted. Last year the congregation raised in all Rs. 844.12.10, of which the natives gave Rs. 295.1.4.

Ten Sabbath schools have been carried on during the year by the members of the congregation in different centres in the city and villages around; but of this work Mr. Russell will probably report, as he took special charge of it.

The congregation undertook to support and send out to some needy centres three missionaries. Two of these have done very good work, but the third found the responsibility too much for him, and had to be removed. The difficulty of securing trained teachers is a difficulty felt in this connection.

The attempt to combine the duties of pastor, teacher and builder has not been as successful as I could wish. The retrospect is not all bright, but amidst the many unnumbered blessings and the knowledge that it is the work of Him who doeth all things well, stimulates us to push forward into another year with hearts full of gratitude and confidence, even though the sky is not all clear and some clouds hang over the horizon. During the hot trying weather of April and May how anxiously we look for the forming clouds in earnest expectation of the Monsoon, which, though it may in its first fierce outburst, destroy some pet schemes and carefully cherished hopes, yet in the end brings refreshing to the dry, parched land, and causes all nature to rejoice. May the clouds burst in a rich spiritual blessing in this dry sin-cursed field.

REPORT OF REV. J. F. CAMPBELL, RUTLAM.

The work has gone on with little change.

Services.—On Sabbath two in the vernacular, in the city; attendance about 70 or 80 in the evening and 50 or 60 in the afternoon; and one in English. On other days, in the vernacular daily at the dispensary, and generally at the mission house; weekly on Wednesday evening at the dispensary; special, for Christians, applicants for baptism, etc.; also, in Mohullas, etc.

Sabbath Schools, latterly six, average attendance about 120.

The same small vernacular school, and for a short time a second among the Nacks till the season came at which the scholars had to go to the jungle to cut gress, wood, etc. Besides the daily religious instruction in Sunday school the boys of the former attend the Sabbath services. The number has ranged from about 20 to 35. So much, and the opportunity of giving them religious instruction seven days a week, has cost the mission, say, \$30 for the year.

The Girls' School.—L'uring the last year the attendance of the children has been unsatisfactory. The monthly average number on roll has been about 24. Some of the girls have done well for the time they have been under instruction, five reading in the 2nd Hindi book and one in the 3rd. We feel it a great matter when they get into the 2nd book, as after that they have the means of acquiring knowledge for themselves, even if they are taken away from the school. Arithmetic and geography have also been taught, but only as far as multiplication in the former, and some simple questions from maps in the latter. Two of our Christian girls, the one who was reading in the 3rd book and one of those in the 2nd book, we have sent to the boarding school at Indore.

There have been causes which we think sufficiently account for the unsatisfactoriness of the school for the past year, so that we do not feel discouraged, but hope for better things in the coming year.

The desire for the education, even of boys, seems hardly yet awakened in Rutham. The Principal of the Raja's School or "Central College" complains of the great difficulty he finds in securing the attendance of his scholars, and notwithstanding all the encouragement it receives the Raja's school for girls is much like our own in attendance.

The house-to-house eisitation has been very encouraging. Lakshmibai and Chimnabai visit five afternoons in the week. Eighty-five houses have been open to them during the past year, including Brahmius and other Hindu castes, Mussulmans, &c. In addition to these are 4 Brahmin houses visited by Mrs. Campbell alone, making a total of 89 houses; in most of which a warm welcome and willing listeners are found.

Through a gift of Rs. 28,2.0 sent through Mrs. Creehman from the Mission Band in Brookfield, N.S., we have been able to give away to women and girls, who are able to read them, a number of New Testaments which, in some cases, have been thankfully received.

Medical Work.—Ahmad Shah has continued to give much satisfaction. In addition to his Medical work he has edited the Urdu portion of "Gyan Patrika," and has otherwise aided me. He reports:—

Of the in-patients two or three gave hopes that the love of Christ had conquered their hearts, but these hopes have so far proved disappointing.

In connection with this may be mentioned work among famine people, to which, for two or three months, especially, a good deal of our own as well as his attention and that of other helpers, was given. The continued drought in Rajputana caused multitudes to migrate to more favoured districts. Many from that and other parts of India came here for work on the new railway. And numbers of these died of starvation or of disease bred by insufficient and unwholesome food, bad water and exposure. Weak and dispirited, those most in need of help had often to be sought for on the roadsides, in the fields and groves around the city.

The political agents showed a warm interest in the matter, and the Raja of Ruthan, in addition to what he had previously given, established a temporary hospital for the sick and exhausted. Even then we found it necessary to continue, as we had been, receiving some into our little hospital, and others into our own compound, and treating others wherever we found them. Succour came too late to save some, and others wept as they told how perhaps only a fourth remained alive of the little family party.

Tract Distribution.—Large numbers of tracts (mostly 4 page) have been given away at the railway station, at meals, on railway journeys, etc.

Sales of Books, etc., amounted to Rs. 86.6.8.

Itinerancy has, to my disappointment, received but little time this year. Jairam and Bapu have made short tours, but I have succeeded only in going once to Jaora and once to Sailana. Neighbouring villages and melas, the railway station, a Sarai frequented by Pilgrims, and a sort of wood market just outside of the city where large numbers of Bheels gather from day to day, during part of the year, have been visited as formerly.

The Press, as was anticipated, has by its removal to Rutlam lost most of its job work, but has in greater measure fulfilled the purpose of its existence, "(1) as a directly mission or evangelizing agency, and (2) for the training and employment of Native Christians." With the exception of one man who has been in it for about a dozen rears, all employed have been professedly either Christians, or applicants for baptism, or enquirers. And besides a little job work and mission printing of various kinds it has printed over 195,000 pages of tracts and the monthly paper Gyan Patrika, in English, Hindi and Rangri, and part of a Hindi book by Mr. Wilson on "The Necessity for a Revelation," which is also appearing serially in Gyan Patrika.

Gyan Patrika has met with encouraging success. Last year it was said, "Like other such papers this may be expected to take some time to become self-supporting, but probably less than most of our other evangelizing agencies." Its subscription list already numbers 218, which is said to be very good for the first year, and it keeps growing.

I wish here to express my thanks to those who sent donations for it, and in particular to the Religious Tract Society, London, who in the most hearty way put at my disposal for it, or for tracts, as I might see fit, a liberal grant of paper. Arrangements have also been made for the publication henceforth by our press of *The Indian Standard*, the paper of the Indian Presbyterian Alliance.

Building operations have continued more or less through the year, more actively till September, and since then as circumstances suited. The house may now be considered practically completed, though a few hundreds of rupees should yet be expended to finish it.

Baptisms have been only three, one infant and two adults, a Brahman and a Mohammedan. Both seemed earnest, sincere, and intelligent; but after his baptism the former had trouble with his wife, etc., and after manifesting great weakness disappeared, through inducements of the Arya Samaj, we hear. The latter was a particularly hopeful case, buying and studying evidential books, becoming more and more pronounced in favour of

Of others who have professed faith a Mohammedan, who for a long time earnestly pressed for baptism but was kept back—perhaps through excessive caution—was employed on the new railway and is said to be now at a distance from Rutlam; another Mohammedan, a Hindu and a Bhoel have drawn back more or less completely; others are still kept on probation and under instruction.

Communicants received on profession of faith (besides the two above mentioned and one of our own orphan boys who has for years professed faith but first was admitted to the Lord's table while in school at Indore) have been two—Lakhshmibai's son, Vithal, baptized in Mhow some nine years ago, and John, a blind lad, who tells me he had before communicated in the Methodist Church, but who brought no certificate. He seems a gennine believer, is learning to read nicely the books prepared for the blind, and is already useful as a helper.


Our fellow labourers in all the above work, Mr. O'Brien and the native helpers, are the same as last year, with the exception of Chirag Masih and his wife. They have our full confidence and warm regard, and have been a great comfort. Chirag Masih has larely gone into business with another Christian in connection with the new railway. We hope and pray that he may have grace to do as he proposed—work for Christ while supporting himself thus independently.

REPORT OF REV. DR. BUCHANAN, UJJAIN.

When in March, 1891, the weather became too hot for us to live longer in tents, Mrs. Buchanan took our little boy and went to Mhow. I rented a native house in the city until the close of school, only running down to Mhow from time to time. Going back







IMAGE EVALUATION TEST TARGET (MT-3)

and forward between Mhow and Ujjain on a pass given by the R. R., I distributed a great number of Hindi and Urdu tracts. After the rains we got started to build the long wished for and much needed bungalow, and when the cold weather again returned we once more took up our abode here in tents. The bungalow work has gone on satisfactorily. The first storey is of stone and is very substantial. Though stone here, as elsewhere, is much more expensive than brick, still I have pleasure to report that owing to two or three good opportunities I expect to put up the building for less than the cost of a brick one. We are having it larger than would be otherwise necessary, in order that Mrs. Buchanan may have a nice large room for a dispensary in the bungalow.

Services have been held in the vernacular on Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays in the mission school, and during the cold weather we had an English service in our tents

each Sunday.

Preaching in the mobulas and in the villages has been carried on more or less regularly without any difficulties or interference by any persons. With five stations already opened up and only five men here to fill them we have been compelled to give up

the idea of going to the Bheels.

Sunday School.—Practically all the pupils of the whole school, Anglo-Vernacular, Middle and High School, come regularly to the Sunday school. The course of study has been the international lessons. Through the kindness of Mr. Fotheringham, Convener of the Committee on Higher Religious Instruction, our students were allowed to appear for examination. Three appeared in English and three others in their vernaculars. Three of the Christian teachers also took the examination. When once, though late, the idea got hold of them that they were really going to write on papers set for boys in Canada we had a splendid stimulus for work. The pupils of our school get up the daily Bible lessons as a regular task, but the Sunday school lessons have always been much less carefully studied. The committee therefore have our sincerest thanks for giving us what is proving to be an effectual lever in the accomplishment of these weekly lessons. Our head master has been interesting the school in a little fellow in Ceylon, whose expenses at school are partly paid by our school. The boys bring their cowries and some of them their pice and though the whole giving in this direction is a trifle, still it is one way of practically teaching Hindoos and Mahommedans that divine love which is broader than castes or tribes and nations.

The ordinary school work has gone on much the same as last year. The school now includes all the grades from lowest form vernaculars and English to the entrance examination. The names of two boys were sent up for the entrance examination to the Calcuta University, but one of them met with so serious a burning accident that he was not able to write. The other was not successful.

The irresolute, affectionate Hindoo finds it especially difficult to take a step that will cut him off from his relatives and friends. Hence Satan fills their minds with, to them, very valid excuses, for not now becoming out-and-out followers of Jesus. One of them yesterday, after a somewhat extensive tour over India with an aged relative visiting Hindoo sacred shrines, told me that he found that "only ignorant persons visit these shrines."

In August, 1890, Mr. McKelvie sent an orphan boy to us to be trained in our school, and also sent from friends of Mrs. Builder, money for his clothing, books, food, &c. The work then begun has almost unwittingly grown, and this year we have had as many as seven boys at a time. Their support, except for teachers, which they enjoy in common with other boys, has not been charged to the mission. All of them are either orphans or are so poor as not to be able to get any help whatever from their homes. One of them was supported last year by the Kilgour Bros., of Toronto, and four of them to the end of December, 1891, were supported by Mr. McKelvie and the Misses Stockbridge. Two poor boys, the children of Hindoo parents, were taken in on the understanding that they could be taken out at any time the perents wished. The elder of the two, Gangadhar, a lad of about ten years, paid very noticeable attention to religious instruction, and declared himself to be a Christian. He was not baptized, but shortly after, during the cholera epidemic, he took the disease. As with cholera patients generally his mind remained clear and active to the end. When his little body was racked by pain and eramps one of the native Christians told him not to be afraid. His sweet, trustful reply was, "No, I will not be afraid, Jesus is my friend." After a few hours illness, reconciled as we fully believe to God, he passed away to be forever with his new and tried Friend.

The Medical Work has been somewhat more interesting than in former years. The house in which I was living has a number of rooms, and when some patients came that needed more careful treatment, we put them in there. As it was situated just beside the dispensary and school it was very convenient for the work. And though we did not dignify it with the name, hospital, still it has filled to some extent the lack of a hospital. We had in it to end of February six patients. Some of these eases were very interesting. A young Brahmin, who has been more or less with us for the last two years, while engaged in his duty of night-watch at our tents, took suddenly ill with cholera. Many a talk I had had with him about Jesus the only Saviour, and he had told me in conversation that he did not any more worship idols, and said that he would be a Christian. His request was that we, his Christian ministers for Christ's sake, should pray for him. As we prayed his voice joined with ours, and he asked pardon, mercy and blessing of Him who said to the dying thief upon the cross, "To-day shalt thou be with me in paradise." The same even-

While I have asked the Council for the permission from them to collect money in India for a hospital, I should be very glad, and consider that valuable time would be saved, if a little help were given in this way from home. I do not ask a grand building to attract the eye, but simply long narrow buildings that will give suitable protection and plenty of air. Fifteen hundred dollars would be ample for the needs of years.

9,062 treatments were given to 4,861 patients, of whom 411 were females. 167 minor and 3 major operations were performed.

WOMAN'S WORK.

During the stay in tents last cold season Mrs. Buchanan gave as much time as she could to the work in Ujjain, and when in March she went to live at Mhow she took up the medical work that had been carried on in a simple way for years by Miss Minnie Stockbridge. The first two or three weeks the people did not come in large numbers; first, because they did not know the place; and second, because they did not know the doctor. But after that she had more patients than she could well attend to. Miss Minnie Stockbridge's medical work had been chiefly among the people of the villages; and Mrs.

tion, seem fully to be Christians. Buchanan found among these simple folk an interesting and encouraging work. One part of our bungalow became so well known as the "Mem sahib's dawa khana" that the people persisted in coming for some time after all our medicines had been handed over to Dr. Whilelmina Fraser by order of Council in December. On one of my trips to Mhow I did an operation for cataract on a woman, which, as it was perhaps the first operation of any moment in connection with woman's work in Mhow, we were especially glad was a complete success.

The medical work in Ujjain has been carried on chiefly by Rachelbai. The register snows the number of patients treated to be 2,124, and the number of treatments given 4,649. When the room set apart for dispensary in the new house is ready we hope it may be a centre of bodily and spiritual blessing to the timid villagers around Ujjain.

The work in the girls' school has been fairly successful. Hattibai has been teaching last half-year, and the attendance is about the same as formerly. A few of the girls still attend, and several read in the third book. Mrs. Buchanan has not been able to look after it, and I have not visited it as often as I could wish. By the blessing of God I hope we may be able to report greater progress in the coming year.

REPORT OF REV. W. J. JAMIESON, NEEMUCH.

In presenting my first year's report I have little to say regarding "results" except that I have been laid aside with fever seven entire weeks since I came to Neemuch, and still I survive.

The remainder of the time I spent studying Hindi and Urdu, visiting the schools, bazaars, and surrounding villages with Mr. Wilson and the Christian workers. In these tours I had ample opportunity for noting the methods used in evangelistic work and for seeing the people in their sad condition.

Since January I have endeavoured to fill Mr. Wilson's place in forwarding the work so well begun here, and have carried on the work on the old lines without much noticeable change. The congregation formed before Mr. Wilson left with twenty members has continued to prosper without much change. Several have left the station but other new workers have joined.

The Sabbath schools have somewhat increased in numbers, strict attention being paid to attendance tickets, with the promise of reward books for good lessons and highest average attendance. The village school in Jawad, continues to improve under the care of catechist Mohamed Shaw, who seems to use his ingenuity in drawing the people around him. A night school has been started in his own house for the poor and outcasts with a good outlook at present.

Burgu, a man baptized before Mr. Wilson left, whose instruction previous to his coming here proves to have fallen on good ground, is teaching in a village four miles from Neemuch. He preaches and reads the Word thrice weekly to those who gather about him, and two or three times each week goes to villages two miles further out and carries the good news of what the Lord has done for him, and all this additional to his school work is of his own free will. His influence over his parents is already telling for good in their desire to be taught the "way to be a Christian."

The medical work in old Neemuch is interesting and hopeful, in stirring up opposition, and in already causing enquiry regarding the truth. I accompany the workers to the bazaar twice weekly with the baja or baby organ, and with our combined force we keep the rooms and street full of people of all classes, whose attention is fairly good for two hours, or so long as our voices last in song.

Oh! for the gift of tongues and the power of the Spirit, is my constant breathing as I look upon these masses of poor people who are like sheep without a shepherd, to whom in my limited knowledge of the language I can say so little as it should be said.

We las in charall of who the school KEPORT OF REV. NORMAN H. RUSSELL, MHOW.

My first report is hardly capable of as great interest as I hope the subsequent ones may prove to be.

My year of preparation was spent almost entirely in Indore, with occasional visits to most of the other stations. Though feeling it my first duty to conquer the language, I did what little I could to help Mr. Wilkie with his many duties, and I may say I found the former made much easier by my attempts at the latter. I spent three, and for a while four, hours a day in the College with a bright cager class of young Hindoos, men whom I have learned not only to admire but to esteem, and if my brief experience is worthy of consideration, it must be to add another testimony to the benefit to our cause from such intellectual and religious contact with the more promising class of India's youth.

Another work I was exceedingly interested in was that among the children of Indore city and neighbourhood. The little band of native workers at Indore are fully alive to the importance of this work, and are lending their aid to its fullest development.

Before going on to speak of Mhow, I feel it not only my duty but a privilege to acknowledge the unremitted kindness of all the friends at Indore, and more particularly of Mr. and Mrs. Wilkie, during my stay among them. Their consideration and thoughtfulness made what is usually the most trying period of a missionary's experience a time of the greatest pleasure and profit. I was sorry to leave Indore for several reasons; principally in that it left Mr. Wilkie with a burden of work one man cannot possibly overtake; a matter however which I trust the Church will soon see its way to remedy.

I was appointed to Mhow by resolution of the Council and Presbytery at their meetings in November, and took over charge in the beginning of December, and if it does not seem paradoxical after the foregoing statement I cannot but rejoice in the appointment and in the promise of much and fruitful work which the field affords. My co-workers here are Miss Ross and Dr. Whilelmina Fraser, and I think we all feel that in coming to Mhow we have come to ground well prepared for us. More particularly is this true of the girls' schools in Mhow, Pensionpura and Kisanpura, whose good standing and efficiency are no little credit to their former teachers. But I need write nothing about the work of the ladies, which will be fully reported on by themselves, except to say that the zeal with which each of them is developing her own sphere, though it augurs well for the work, will, I am afraid, be too great a strain on their powers of endurance, and I hope that next fall will see the way open to another lady worker being sent to help us in Mhow.

My own special work is of three kinds—school, preaching, and congregational work. School Work.—The Bazaar School, with Harbhajan and Anand (the latter supported by West End Bible Class, Toronto) for teachers, I found in good condition. Its numbers have steadily increased since December, the roll now being seventy-five. The fact that the Parsees carry on a large school work in Mhow, backed by a heavy money grant from the cantonment, diminishes considerably our hopes of speedy development. However, as they do not teach the Bible nor in fact give any moral instruction, we cannot give up the fight to them. We have great hopes of our own school being a success; by far the larger proportion of children in Mhow go to no school, and from these we hope to add considerably to our numbers. We have added to our forces a teacher in Marathi—Salaram. I also take the Bible class myself and examine the classes occasionally in other subjects. I aim to bring the school at present up to middle school standard, from which the step to high school will be comparatively easy.

We have opened a new school in Guzar Khera, a village about a mile from Mhow; it is in charge of Walaji, and is at present very promising. nt breathing as l nerd, to whom in aid. people in Cochapura, a village on the other side of Mhow, with Raoji for teacher. The present attendance is 23. The people here seem quiet, eager to learn and very proud of their school.

We have invitations from several of the larger villages around us to open schools, but can do nothing at present for lack of teachers. We hope, however, soon to be able to supply the want, as we find nothing gives us better standing in, or claim on, a village than the establishing of schools.

Preaching.—There are about 60 villages within a radius of eight miles of Mhow, to all of which we are at present trying to give regular preaching. Raghu is the only worker who devotes his whole time to preaching. But he goes out faithfully morning and evening to his round of villages. The rest of us, Bhagaji, Anand, Waliji, Salaram, Raoji and myself go out in the evenings. The people listen as a rule very faithfully, and are especially fond of the hymns. A small organ for our work would prove of great service. We have also been out as frequently as possible (generally twice in the week) with the magic lantern. This, the gift of two friends of St. James' Square Church, Toronto, is doing noble service. Large crowds, even to 200, will gather to see our pictures, and hear the Bible stories. We are, however, very much in need of some new slides illustrating Gospel scenes.

We have not developed our work as yet beyond the eight mile radius. But a number of larger villages and cities beyond we hope to report on a year from now.

Congregational Work.—Since my arrival the congregation has received no additions by baptism, though we have several enquirers. We meet twice in the week, Sunday afternoon and Thursday evening. The Sunday services I usually conduct myself. But for the Thursday evening prayer-meetings we have drawn up a programme of subjects reaching over some two months to be taken up by the men in turn. The services are regularly attended by the Christians but not so well by outsiders, probably on account of our building being out of the regular line of native travel. The new site will however remedy this.

Sunday School Work.—The whole congregation meets also on Sunday morning, in the school-house, for Sunday school. The attendance, principally of children from our camp schools, is about 200. Bhagaji is superintendent. Besides the camp schools, we have lately opened five new Sunday schools in the surrounding villages; these are well attended, quite beyond our expectations.

Bible Study.—Besides my Bible class or Sunday morning, for all comers, I have a class five days during the week for the workers. Two days we study "Romans," two days a brief course in Theology and on Saturday the Sunday school lesson for Sunday. I find the classes a great pleasure.

Prospective.—I can say but little by way of prospective. I have almost no plans. I try to follow the work rather than make it follow me. There is no doubt Hinduism is losing its hold; but the masses seem very slow in facing the question of a new religion. As ever the name of Christ is a stumbling block, hated and feared by the people of sin. But I have had a good many encouraging interviews with those who believe in and love Him, though they lack the faith to face the dangers of acknowledging Him. We have much to hope for from the coming generation, for India's children are familiar with the name of Jesus. The Lord hath given into our hands India. We can wait for the walls to fall.

REPORT OF MISS ROSS, MHOW.

When I returned to Indore I went into the dirty, dusty city, and was warmly welcomed by many an old friend.

I opened a school, and although the number on the roll soon reached fifty-five it was difficult to induce half that number to attend regularly. As the heat increased we found the small place we used as a school-room very uncomfortable. But we feared that on leaving it the owner, because of the loss of the rent, would tell the children not to come to our school again. They have much power over each other in that way. Fortunately for me I got so ill one day with the heat that I had to close school and go home. The people then said, No, I could not teach there, and cheerfully allowed me to go to better quarters which I had just secured.

We began work here on the first of December. I am very glad to be associated with Dr. Fraser, whose zeal and energy is an inspiration.

The Misses Stockbridge have done nobly, and the fruit of their labours is seen in many ways. They have opened three hundred houses in Mhow and the surrounding villages.

I have charge of three schools. In the one in Mhow there is a daily attendance of one hundred and forty. In Pensionpura thirty-five, and Kisanpura seventeen. In the large school English, Gujerati, Marathi and Hindi are taught. This is necessary as the children wish to learn to read in their mother tongue. Dr. Fraser has in addition to her medical work taken charge of the senior English division, which is a great relief to me, as the vernacular classes require so much attention.

I have paid over seventy visits since we came here, and we have gone together in the evenings to several villages with medicine for the sick and news of eternal salvation through Jesus Christ. But alas! many are slow to hear and slow to think of the priceless value of eternal life.

We were delighted to welcome Miss McWilliams and Dr. O'Hara.

REPORT OF MISS FRASER, M.D., MHOW.

At the meeting of Council held in Neemuch, November 10th, I was appointed to Mhow. I moved here about the first of December.

As I had to secure quarters for my dispensary, and have the house made ready for my work, I was not able to open it until December 13th. Since that date the number of patients has steadily increased. The number for the first six days being 77, that for the last six being 210. For the dispensary work I have a native woman, whom I am training as medical assistant. She is bright and intelligent and will soon be very useful.

I employ two Bible-women, who after singing and reading with the patients in the morning, visit from house to house giving instruction. They report on the week's work every Saturday, the number of visits required from them each week being twenty. The senior English department in the Camp School is in my charge. There I have a valuable assistant, and only teach two and a half hours daily myself. The scholars are Parsees, Portuguese and a few English. We fear that ere this year is out we may lose many of our brightest scholars, for the Portuguese are Roman Catholics, and Father Pius, their priest, is about to open a convent, and no doubt he will gather in his stray lambs.

The eight months previous to my appointment I spent in Indore studying the language.

I cannot speak too highly of the kindness of the missionaries there, nor of the valuable help I received from Miss Oliver, who took much pains to give me an insight into medical work in India. The Indore Mission Hospital affords every facility for enabling the new comer to get a clear view of the diseases common to this land and also for learning the vernacular terms used for diseases among the women, of which you can glean little or no idea from books. I have ofter been asked in Mhow, and even in the remote villages surrounding the city, if I came from the "Doctor Miss Sahibs" at Indore, and when I was able to say "yes," I found an open road to the hearts of the people, showing how

widely spread and how much valued is the grand work done by our medical ladies in the past few years.

The language is not at all difficult, and no one need feel anxious at the prospect of having to learn it.

It was with feelings of joy that we welcomed Dr. O'Hara and Miss McWilliams. We long for the day when you can send two such missionaries to Mhow. We cannot grudge them to Indore, knowing as we do the great need there, but when you can send some one to us.

REPORT OF MISS OLIVER, M.D., INDORE.

Medical Mission Report.

Last year, at the time of writing our annual report, we were watching the walls of the new hospital building growing daily higher; now we have been eight months at work in it. There was no formal opening, chiefly because Miss Beatty, through ill health, was compelled to go on furlough just as the hospital, for which she had so long waited and prayed, was nearing completion. Miss McKellar took her place and has been my faithful yoke-fellow throughout the year.

We celebrated Dominion Day by beginning work in the new building. Very soon we had three of our five wards full, and as one patient goes out there is another poor sufferer ready to take her place. During the past eight months we have had in all 116 patients.

What gain is the hospital to us? The physician in India, whose efforts are often rendered useless by even the most intelligent patients treated in their own homes, is at no loss for an answer to this question. The faithful servant of Christ can even more readly make reply, "Great gain." How could we have a better opportunity to tell the old story than by the sick-bed of those who have put themselves under our care? Our prayer needs not to be for opportunities to preach Christ, but for guidance and faithfulness in using the many which the hospital is the means of bringing to us. My heart was made glad a few days ago by hearing an old patient, who was nearly three months in the hospital, bravely confessing her trust in Christ, and in Him alone, before her whole household.

Every evening we have a short service, or rather Bible class, for the in-patients and servants. On Sunday afternoons we review what has been taught during the week. We have also lately begun a Sunday morning class.

The dispensary in Ranipuri—a division of Indore city—in connection with the native house used by us as a hospital has had rather an interrupted career since September last. We moved the in-patients up to the new building, and encouraged all the out-patients who live on the south side of the city to attend the hospital dispensary. During my absence in October Miss McKellar fell ill and it had to be closed, so we have given up the building.

Of visiting of patients in their own homes we have been able to do little more than pay the necessary visits to those who were too ill to come to us. The outlying villages, in which we were able to do a good deal of visiting last year, have been sadly neglected this year. We have, however, made a fresh start lately, and hope to be able to continue

Our staff of helpers is small, but we are fortunate in those we have. We began the year with a class of two Christian girls to be trained in compounding, nursing, and the treatment of ordinary diseases. One of the two yielded to a stronger attraction, and in August became the wife of one of our Christian young men. The other, Janebai, is with us and is making very satisfactory progress.

We have no hospital matron, but Susanbai, the wife of a native Christian, who holds a good position under one of our Central India princes, has for the past five months undertaken the matron's duties.

We are pleased to be able to report that all the money for the cots, bedding and other furnishings required in the hospital has been raised here chiefly by small contributions of ten or fifteen rupees from the husbands of some of our grateful patients. Rs. 347 of the money thus raised went towards the furnishings. The remaining Rs. 200 we handed over to Mr. Wilkie to help in the sinking of a well on the hospital compound. Some months ago, Gandilal, one of our Indore merchants, gave Rs. 500 for the support of a charity cot, and a few weeks ago, Nanak Chand, another resident of Indore, sent Rs. 200 to be used in the same way. We would also take this opportunity of thanking the friends at home who sent us such an abundant supply of comfortable quilts and flannel jackets for use in the hospital.

REPORT OF MISS SINCLAIR, INDORE.

Boarding School Report, 1892.

Having been temporarily appointed by the Mission Council to earry on the work in the stead of Miss Harris, it becomes my duty to write the annual report.

The girls were then in Neemuch in the rented building where Miss Harris had carried on the work. I went up to Neemuch and a week later moved the school down to Indore. There are at present fourteen (14) girls in the school. Of these, two belong to Rutlam, six to Mhow and six to Indore. The day's programme is as follows:—

In the morning the girls roll up their bedding according to native fashior—weep the dormitories, school-room and verandahs, scour their brass plate and cup; from eight to a quarter to nine I have prayers and a Bible lesson with the children. At nine they eat their morning meal. From 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the classes are held—one of the teachers from the Mission High School giving me two hours' help daily. After fifteen minutes recess we have an hour's sewing. From four to five is study hour. At five they eat the second and largest meal of the day, and after that are free for play. At seven we have evening prayers. There is a woman-cook; but the girls take their turn at helping her. They also make the most of their own clothes, which consist of a skirt and jacket with the chaddar to be worn over the head when they go out. They look very nice when they go to church; there are print skirts of many colours, but all the chaddars are white.

I have not had any matron, so the work has been rather heavy; but from the 1st of March 1 expect a helper, who will relieve me of much that I now have to attend to, and so leave me free to more thoroughly supervise the city school work as well as to dovelop this. We must look to this school for our future workers, and they will be, too, the women of our Native Christian Church. The friends at home cannot too fully sympathise with it nor too freely support it.

GIRLS' SCHOOL, INDORE CITY.

In general the year just past has been like any other, but still it has had its own

little ups and downs and bright days.

The attendance has been very regular throughout the whole year, which is most important in work among the children. They are so apt to come a few days or weeks, and if not at once promoted, or if a doll is not forthcoming, they slip away before one has time to win them. The great majority of the people are proud to have their children taught to read, and very often young lads come to school to ask me to take their little This in itself is a most hopeful sign, and surely it is not a small matter that we nearly a hundred children under the influences of the Gospel, and regularly taught six days out of the week during a period of their lives when there are no deep-seated prejudices to uproot. From the time Miss Rodger went home I kept her school open, but having no satisfactory teacher to put into it, thought it best to close it in September.

While taking a holiday in South India in October last I visited many of the finest girls' schools in this country, and came home with many new ideas. Press of work, however, has prevented me carrying out much that I had hoped to do.

The year's zenana work has not amounted to much. In the hot season when the city school was closed, I visited in several houses in the camp. Throughout the cold season I have been called again and again to houses in the city, but much to my regret have been quite unable to overtake this work.

Since Miss Ross' appointment to Mhow the Hindi girls' school in the city has been kept open by Mrs. Wilkie. In connection with this school also there is a Sunday school. We need helpers, and much of the work that waits to be done can be best done by trained native agents.

REPORT OF MISS A. JAMIESON, NEEMUCH.

Although my work was interrupted at the beginning of the cold season, yet I can gratefully report fair progress in the schools, and the opening of many more zenanas.

I regret having been unable to resume work among the low caste people where I had so much encouragement last year. But with teaching in two schools and zenana visiting, I found it impossible to do so. Until girls' schools have been some years established among these conservative people, and while native helpers are untried, the lady missionary requires to do most of the teaching herself.

During the year thirty-five families have been visited, some of them twice a week and others less regularly. Since the first of January last twelve new houses have opened their doors to us, among these the house of the Suba of Neemuch city. We have ten pupils learning to read, six are doing fancy work. In every house the Bible is taught.

At New Year I received from the ladies of Chalmers' Church, Quebec, a box of exceedingly useful articles for distribution among my pupils. I was able to give Mrs. Wilson what she required for the native Christians and her school girls, and there remains abundance for next "Bara Din." I most heartily thank the kind friends who in addition to sending a share to the W. F. M. S. have so generously supplied me.

VI.-MISSION TO THE JEWS IN PALESTINE.

In the report of the Foreign Mission Committee submitted to the last General Assembly, the Committee recommended the General Assembly to take immediate action to establish a mission to the Jews in Palestine. The Committee was authorized to select and commission one medical missionary, leaving the precise location and the relation of the mission to those already in the field to be determined by the Committee after further correspondence. In view of this resolution of the Assembly, the Committee, at a meeting held on the 15th of September of last year, called to the work Chas, A. Webster, B.A., M.D., a graduate of Knox College-at that time practising his medical profession in the Sanatorium in Dansville, N.Y. On the call being communicated to Dr. Webster, he intimated his acceptance of it, but requested the Committee to permit him to continue in his position in the Sanatorium until June of this year. This request was complied with by the Committee, as his object in making it was that he might thereby be better fitted to serve the Church in the work to which he had been called. Your Committee believe that in Dr. Webster the Church has secured for the opening of this interesting mission to the ancient people of God, in their own land, a missionary well adapted for the work. Dr. Webster, in writing to the Convener in regard to his appointment, says:-"I sincerely thank the Committee for this great honour of being asked to heal the sick and preach the Gospel of the Kingdom in Palestine; and I sincerely thank them, again, for their great kindness in allowing me these extra months of preparation for such a great work." Entering on the work in this spirit, the Church has reason to look forward with hope to the labours of her missionary in this new field. At the same time we know that the Jews are perhaps the least accessible of any people to the religion of Jesus of Nazareth. Even unto this day the vail is upon their heart, and therefore this mission should, in a special manner, be the subject of the earnest prayers of the Church. The Committee deeming it wise in establishing a new mission to send out a colleague with Dr. Webster, have under consideration the appointment of another missionary to accompany him to his field of labour.

VIL-MISSION TO THE CHINESE IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

In regard to this mission the General Assembly of last year granted leave to the Committee to continue its enquiry for a suitable agent for this field, and for information regarding the place at which it would be best for the missionary to begin operations. The Committee in accordance with this resolution of Assembly prosecuted the enquiry for a missionary adapted for the work contemplated by the Church. After full consideration it was determined to call to this work the Rev. A. B. Winchester, of Berlin, Ont. This proposal was cordially received by the Presbytery of Victoria, with which communication was held on the subject, and in the month of December a call was addressed to Mr. Winchester through the Presbytery of Guelph, asking him to undertake this mission. This call was accepted by him and he was formally designated to this work by that Presbytery on the 28th of March. Mr. Winchester, with his family, has arrived in Victoria.

The Committee have authorized him to spend some time in investigating the methods employed in prosecuting such a mission in San Francisco, where operations among the Chinese have been carried on.

In taking this step of planting a mission to the Chinese who land upon our shores, and make a home for themselves in our country, the Church has only done what was demanded of her by the circumstances in which she was placed. It seemed unreasonable to send missionaries to China and yet neglect the Chinese heathen who placed themselves within our reach, at the doors of our Church, and who proved to be accessible to Christian influence and teaching. And as those Chinese who come to this country, do in many instances return to China, either for a time, or to remain there, such of them as come under the influence of the Gospel will take back with them what they have learned of the Christian faith and become witnesses for Christ in their own land.

Your Committee rejoice that after considerable anxiety in seeking for a labourer for this field the Lord of the harvest directed them to one so devoted and so well fitted for the work, by his gifts and by his former experience in mission work in China, as they believe Mr. Winchester to be, and they believe that under the blessing of God his labors will be appreciated by the Church and be fruitful of much good.

MISSION TO THE CHINESE IN THE NORTH-WEST.

A memorial was read in the last General Assembly from the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, asking the General Assembly to endorse the plan for work among the Chinese, already entered upon by the Presbytery of Calgary; and (2) to carry out the purpose already resolved upon to begin mission work among the Chinese on the Pacific coast (see Ass. Min., 1891, page. 62.) The memorial was referred to the favorable consideration of the Foreign Mission Committee. In accordance with this resolution of Assembly the Foreign Mission Committee sanctioned the payment for one year of the sum of \$350 to Mr. Paton as part of his salary, as requested by the Presbytery of Calgary, and requested the Presbytery to send a report of Mr. Paton's work to the Committee. The following report has been received:—

In presenting this First Annual Statement in regard to the work of the Presbytery's Chinese Mission, the Presbytery's Foreign Mission Committee would record their humble thanks to Him by whose command mission work is done, from whom comes all power to carry on the work, and to whom is due all glory for what success has been granted the mission during the past year.

Many and serious difficulties attach to the work among the Chinese in the mountains. They are found in small companies of from ten to sixty in railway, mining and lumber camps, and in the towns and villages in smaller groups of three to twelve. Then, too, they are continually moving from place to place, either voluntarily or under direction of their agent, who, if hostile to mission work, may take this means of breaking up a school, or nucleus of those interested in the study of Christianity. More than this, the Chinese are exceedingly auspicious of Canadians, a result of the persecution by individuals, and of a narrow, short-sighted, reactionary Governmental policy; further, there is to be overcome the eager thirst for money which afflicts the Chinese perhaps to a greater degree than Canadians, though in generosity, when gratitude is aroused, none can surpass these heathen. Add to this, the difficulty of language, of total lack of organization, and of all appliances for mission work, and some of the opposing forces may be imagined.

The work of the missionary was largely that of searching out and organizing, distributing literature and establishing schools at different points. In this work our untiring missionary, Mr. Thos. Paton, regularly visited seven preaching points, coming into con-

MISCELLANEOUS.

A memorial from the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was presented to your Committee, requesting them to take such steps as they deemed advisable to aid in the suppression of the traffic at present openly carried on between China and British Columbia in Coinese girls, who are brought to this country for immoral purposes. Your Committee informed the Board of their entire sympathy with them in the desire to have this infamous traffic put an end to, and further that they would bring the matter under the notice of the General Assembly with a view to eliciting an expression of opinion on the subject. Your Committee have therefore given this question a place in the report now submitted, with the hope that such a deliverance may be arrived at as will strengthen the hands of those who are labouring for the overthrow of this great evil. It is a form of slavery which a Christian people should not tolerate within their borders, and which the Churches of the land should unite against until the evil is overcome, and the reproach which it brings upon our country and our religion taken away.

OVERTURES FROM INDORE PRESBYTERY ON UNION OF PRESBYTERIAN CHURCHES IN INDIA,
AND ON LICENSING OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

These overtures were laid before the General Assembly in 1890, and were remitted by it to the Foreign Mission Committee. The overture on union was remitted with the instruction to consider it carefully, advise with the brethren in India as circumstances may seem to require, and to report to the next Assembly. The action here enjoined was taken by your Committee. They communicated with the Presbytery of Indore on the subject, but no answer has as yet been received to their communication from that Presbytery. In regard to the overture on the licensing of candidates, it was remitted to the Foreign Mission Committee "to take such action as in their opinion may be required." The Committee approved generally of the scheme for the licensing of candidates for the ministry, and communicated their judgment to the Presbytery of Indore. But, as in the case of the overture on union, no further communication has been received from that Presbytery. This action taken in regard to these overtures was not reported to the Assembly last year.

THE SUPPRESSION OF THE OPIUM TRAFFIC IN INDIA.

Another memorial was submitted to your Committee from the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, praying the co-operation of the Committee in the effort being made by the Churches in Britain and in other lands, for the suppression of the opium traffic in India. Your Committee agreed to recommend that the General Assembly adopt a deliverance on the subject. The traffic in opium, which is carried on very extensively in India, is encouraged by the Government for revenue purposes. The increasing indulgence in the use of the drug, on the part of the people, is accompanied with the greatest evils, physical and moral. A widespread agitation has been aroused, in consequence, for the diminution or abolition of the traffic altogether. Petitions are being sent in to the Government praying for this. The protest which is being made against the evil is beginning to be heard, and the Assembly will no doubt unite with other Christian bodies in seeking the suppression of a traffic which is so destructive to the physical and moral well-being of our fellow subjects in India, as well as so great an obstacle to the progress of the Gospel in that land.

THANKS TO MR. J. T. MORTON.

The following resolution was adopted by the Foreign Mission Committee, expressing their acknowledgment of the generous contributions made to the mission work of our Church in China by Mr. J. T. Morton, also of his sympathy with our work, as shown by him in his gift of books to our missionaries, and his willingness to aid them with any service in his power while passing through London on their way to India or China: "The Foreign Mission Committee of the Preshyterian Church in Canada hereby tender to J. T. Morton, Esq., London, England, the very cordial thanks of the Committee, and of the Church they represent, for his valuable and generous liberality during the past three years towards the great and growing Foreign Mission work under the supervision of the Committee, and the Convener and Secretary are hereby instructed to forward to Mr. Morton an official copy of this resolution."

Mr. Morton has paid the salary of Dr. McClure and two native assistants for three years.

WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIGNARY SOCIETY, WESTERN DIVISION.

The report of the sixteenth annual meeting of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society records another year of progress, although "there has been in the work of the Society in foreign fields a peculiar intermingling of lights and shadows." "But," to quote the language of the Foreign Secretary's report, "whether it has been the light or the shadow, the hand of God, we are sure, has led us in the right way." The character of the various reports is fitted to call forth the gratitude of the Church, and to encourage the devoted members of the Society to prosecute their work with renewed energy and faith. This Society now exerts an influence that is felt throughout the whole Church both at home and abroad. It has been blessed to revive the spiritual life of many congregations, and awaken a deeper interest in Foreign Mission work. Its deeds of beneficence have cheered the heart of many a suffering woman, and brought joy into many a home, both on the prairies of our own land, and amid the crowded populations of India and China. The success which has attended the operations of the Society during the past year is attested by the interesting reports laid before the annual meeting held in Toronto, on 3rd and 4th of May, 1892, by the Foreign and Home Secretaries and by the Treasurer. The interest taken in the work of the Society and in Foreign Missions, was manifested in the large attendance of delegates at that meeting and the enthusiastic public meeting which was held on Tuesday evening. The report of the Foreign Secretary opens with a sympathetic reference to the loss which the Church and the Society have sustained during the year by the death of Miss Harris. Reference is made elsewhere in this report to this sad event, and the whole Church will unite with the Society in their expression of sympathy with the family of Miss Harris, and their estimation of the less which our cause in India has sustained by the removal of so useful and earnest a missionary.

This painful event has anew called the attention of the Society as well as of the Foreign Mission Committee to the necessity of guarding the health of our missionaries who are working in climates which are very trying to the constitution. The consequent strain upon the health, added to the burden of duty in a heathen land, with all its discouragements, renders the work more difficult, and should elicit the sympathy of the Church.

The Society has felt for some time the need of an institute in which some preliminary training might be imparted to those young women who are contemplating Foreign Mission work. That such an institution would be of benefit to the candidates is undeniable. The Foreign Mission Committee has the matter under consideration at present, and will confer with the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society on the subject. No doubt a way will be discovered for carrying out the work should it be determined that it is required, and would justify the expenditure it would necessarily involve.

The only map which they have succeeded in procuring and sending out is one of the mission field in India. A copy of this has been sent gratis to each ministerial charge throughout the Church. Some copies have been offered for sale, but the sale has not indicated an extensive desire to secure such a map. A map of the stations in the North-West is in process of preparation, and it is expected will soon be ready for distribution.

The subject is still under the consideration of the Committee, and should the feeling of the Church warrant further expenditure in this direction they will continue the effort to secure a map of each of our mission fields.

Your Committee, in surveying the field of missionary operation in which the agents of the Church have been labouring during the past year, would record their thanks to Almighty God for the work which has been done, and for the blessing which has been enjoyed in connection with it.

In submitting their annual statement to the General Assembly of what has been accomplished, there are, as will appear from the foregoing statements, no extraordinary results to report. Yet in every portion of the field the work has been prosecuted with diligence. In all the various forms of agency employed, the missionaries have earnestly striven to reach the minds and hearts of the heathen people to whom they have been sent. The work of healing the sick, of teaching the young, and visiting in the homes of the people, as well as the earnest proclamation of the Gospel, have been carried on as in former years, and with gratifying results in not a few cases. The past year has been one in which our missionaries in India, China and the New Hebrides have been called on to pass through times of special trial. But notwithstanding these trials the brethren have continued faithfully at their posts, and have gone forward with the work of teaching the Gospel of Christ.

In accordance with the resolution of last Assembly, a step in advance has been taken in the opening of a mission to the Jews in Palestine. Thus that which has been long desired by many in the Church has at length been accomplished. The Jewish peoplo will now occupy a larger share of the attention, and a larger place in the prayers of the Church.

The other appointments made, both to the already occupied fields in India and China and to the new field in British Columbia, will tend to encourage the present labourers in the East, and will begin a work in the West which the Church could not any longer, with due regard to her responsibilities, overlook. In addition to these, in view of the pressure upon the present staff in India, your Committee consider that it is necessary to send some additional labourers to that field. They have, therefore, made known through our church papers that they are propared to receive applications from ministers who may contemplate work in the foreign field, with a view of appointing two to go to India. Preference will be given to such applicants, if otherwise suitable, as have had some experience in teaching.

It is gratifying also to be able to report, that the liberality of the Church has been well maintained during the past year, and the sum of \$92,033.75, as mentioned in this report, has been contributed to the Foreign Mission Fund (W.D.). The report of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (W.D.) for the past year is also of a most encouraging nature. The amount contributed by them for the evangelizing of women in heathen lands, and for the heathen Indian women in our own Dominion, being larger than in any former year, and amounting to \$36,977.59.

Thus taking a brief and general review of the operations of the past year, it is satisfactory to be able to report that there has been no falling back from the position already attained. The ground occupied has been held. The base of operations has been extended in the east and in the west, and the outposts strengthened in several parts of the field. The workers are not numerous but they are devoted. Their position in the face of

the enemy is such as to require much grace on their part. We, in a Christian land, can scarcely realize how trying their position is. They go forth often, if not weeping, bearing the precious seed, yet with hearts oppressed by the overshadowing heathenism amid which they work. And we are to remember that their work so far has been in its initial and preparatory stages, which is always a time of special trial and difficulty.

Your Committee therefore ask for our missionaries in every part of the field, a large place in the sympathies and prayers of the Church. They are in the "high places of the field," and while toiling there, should be encouraged by the thought, that in our churches

and in our families they are remembered at a throne of grace.

With reference to the remit of the General Assembly of 1890, on the relation of the Composite Presbyteries to the Church, the Committee report that after deliberation they recommend that any cases hereafter arising, involving questions as to the relations of such Presbyteries, should be dealt with by the General Assembly on the merits as they may emerge.

The Presbytery of Montreal brought before the Committee the case of Mr. George Augustus Newmark, a converted Jew and a member of Crescent Street Church, Montreal. Mr. Newmark is twenty-four years old, and speaks Hebrew, German, Russian, Polish and English. He professed faith in Christ in 1887. He has resided in Montreal during the last eleven months, and engaged in missionary work among his countrymen, teaching classes of from twenty to forty men. He reports having visited over 600 families, and estimates the Jewish population of the city at about 6,500. Eleven persons of those under his instruction profess their acceptance of the Gespel.

Mr. Newmark appeared before the Western Division of the Committee, and was questioned at length as to his views of Divine truth, and his desire regarding future work.

The Committee were satisfied with his answers and, in view of these facts, the Committee desire to call the attention of the General Assembly to an agent of so much promise, and express the hope that such directions may be given by the Supreme Court as will encourage Mr. Newmark to continue, in the meantime, his labours in Montreal, and to prosecute, for a season, his studies in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, with a view to his being ultimately employed in work among his own countrymen, in such field as the Providence of God may indicate, when the proper time has arrived.

The Committee would also request the General Assembly to appoint trustees to whom may be conveyed property already purchased for the use of the Committee at Alberni, and all other property that it may hereafter be found necessary to purchase in British Columbia in order to carry on effectively the Committee's work among the Indians and Chinese in that Province.

APPENDIX No. 12.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND (WESTERN SECTION) FOR YEAR ENDING APRIL 30, 1892.

The Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund (Western Section), in submitting their Report for the year ending April 30, 1802, would express pleasure that, while the congregations fall far short of doing what is really necessary for the comfort of the retired ministers of the Church, things are a shade better than at the close of the previous year. The slight betterment does not, however, arise from any greater liberality in congregational contributions or from ministers' rates, both being less than in the previous year, but arises from the beneficial effect of the Endowment Fund, the interest on which was \$2,808.74 as compared with \$1,671.40 in 1891, and from the valuable contribution from the Hymnal Committee, the net amount being \$954.17. These enabled the Committee to pay annuities on the reduced scale, and to reduce the adverse balance against the Ordinary Fund by the sum of \$280,18. It is proper to say it, however, that there are some outstanding liabilities, which had they been paid in the year, would have left a lesser amount applicable for the last mentioned purpose. The Committee regrets to have to state that for four years now in succession the want of a moderate measure of liberality on the part of the Church has deprived those older ministers on the Fund, whose years of service would have cuttied them to targer amounts under the rules, of a sum of money that would have added largely to their confort. A decrease of \$139.80 in congregational contributions, and of \$718.07 in ministers' rates, must be regarded as far from creditable, and at the same time points with considerable directness to the source of the trouble, which doubtions lies at the door of the ministers. The Committee is thankful that a kind Providence has, by means of the two sources mentioned, prevented what must have certainly come to pass, namely, a further reduction in the amount of annuities, already too small. Two hundred dollars as a retiring allowance for a minister, who may have served forty years in active ministerial

Partial payments only have been made in the two following cases: Rev. W. M. Christie and Rev. Thos. Goldanith. In the former case, Mr. Christie was engaged in active service in connection with the Home Mission Committee for six months, and only one-half year's annuity was paid to him. In Mr. Gold'smith's case the Committee became aware that he had taken charge of St. Gabriel's Church, Montreal, during the absence of Dr. Campbell, and had also taken charge of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, for a period of six months during the absence of Mr. Macdonnell, for which he had received stated remuneration, and they withheld the November half-year's annuity. It is perhaps proper to report that Mr. Goldsmith made complaint of the Committee's action to the Toronto Preebytery, and that a memorial handed in by him is being forwarded to the Assembly by that Presbytery. Your Convener appeared by request before the Presbytery and gave reasons. As the matter will likely come up for discussion on the Memorial, it need not be further dealt with in this Report.

ered. There are in the Western Section 762 ministers. Of these, 362 appear to be paying rates more or less regularly, and 331 are not connected at all. In other words nearly one-half of the ministers are not connected, and as a natural consequence will not, with a tew exceptions, take much interest in the Fund. This fact explains why the ordinary fund is year after year behind, and why it is so difficult to raise the endowment. The investigation led to a further discovery, namely, that of the 362 paying rates more or less regularly, 188 are in arrear, some for one year and others for more, running up to ten. The Committee is of opinion that a more complete system of registration and record should be kept, so that arrearages may be at once detected and prevented.

ENDOWMENT FUND.

The Rev. Wm. Burns has continued to give his earnest attention to the Endowment, and at the same time has availed himself of every opportunity to press for a more generous support of the Ordinary Fund. Considerable progress has been made in connection with the Endowment, though not as much as the Committee had hoped for and anticipated. This has no doubt arisen in part from the depressed condition of business and the extreme tightness of money. The Agent finds himself somewhat hampered by the appeals being again made on behalf of some of the Colleges. The Committee thinks that the Assembly would not err if it emphasized the prior claims of the Endowment for the Aged and Infirm Ministers. The order to raise the Fund was the act of the Assembly, first at Winnipeg and then at Halifax; besides the Colleges have previously appealed to the Church and obtained a very considerable Endowment. Your Committee does not make this suggestion from any unfriendly feeling to the Colleges but as an act of simple justice to the fund it has been instructed to raise.

The Agent has visited and addressed on behalf of the Fund the three Synods of Montreal and Ottawa, Toronto and Kingston, and Hamilton and London. These have promised co-operation, The first mentioned appointed a Committee to co-operate with the Agent, and the other two will aid through the Presbyteries. He has also visited some of the Presbyteries and endeavoured to get them to do the work within their bounds. The Presbyteries of London and Whitby have undertaken the work, and a report is expected from them shortly. The Committee thinks it well to call the attention of the Assembly to the fact that the Agent's salary and expenses have hitherto been charged to the Capital of the Endowment, while in the opinion of the Committee it should be charged to Revenue, and it is recommended that the accounts be readjusted and Capital Account credited with the full payments made on account of it, and the revenue be made to bear the charges. The following shows how the Endowment stands at the date of this Report:—

THE EFFECT OF THE CHANGE FROM THE PERCENTAGE PL. N TO THE FIXED SCALE OF PAYMENTS UNDER THE AMENDED RULES,

The obtaining of the information necessary to comply with the direction of the last Assembly has involved a very large amount of labour. Each minister connected with the Fund has been communicated with and very valuable statistics obtained, which will be useful for future reference. 362 ministers were communicated with and fully 300 replies received, and we have now entered up in a book the name, residence, date of ordination, or, if ordained elsewhere than in Canada, the date of induction into a Canadian charge, and the age at that time. These facts have enabled the Committee to fix with a large degree of accuracy the effect of the new rule substituting the fixed sum for the percentage. The following will indicate the effect of the change. It must be remembered, however, that being bulk ratios the figures will not convey a perfectly accurate result as to individuals. The results are given by Synods.

SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA.

The change will call for an increase of 20% or 68 cents per minister.

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON.

The change will call for an increase of 35% or \$1.40 cents per minister.

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON.

The change will call for an increase of 35% or \$1.40 per minister.

It must rectly accurate The effect of bringing all under the Deferred Annuity plan involves very much labour, and has not been gone into with sufficient accuracy to warrant the submission of definite figures. Before undertaking that labour, the Committee thought it wise to report the rather unsatisfactory state of facts in regard to the number of ministers not connected with the Fund, as well as the remarkable state of arrearages in the case of those who are supposed to be connected. The state of things certainly calls for some definite action on the part of the Assembly. What that action should be it is not fer the Committee to say beyond an expression of opinion. The unanimous opinion of the Committee is that a rule of the Church should be passed under which all the Ministers of the Church would be compelled to contribute rates with such modifications as might be found necessary to meet the circumstances of age and connection with the scheme brought in after the union with the "Church of Scotland." For the same reason, and in view of the greater difficulty which the facts now submitted open up to the Assembly, no attempt has been made to frame rules for Ministers to connect who may be now excluded by the time limit.

The Committee desires to have the definite direction of the Assembly as to Rule 9 as changed,

Mr. McMillan's case was before the last Assembly. Since that time he has met with a scrious accident, which has further impaired his health. Collections were received from one hundred and forty-six congregations, showing an increase of six, as compared with the year preceding; and Rates were received from eighty-eight ministers, showing an increase of seventeen. The Committee recommend that the application of Mr. McLean and Mr. J. McG. McKay be granted, and also that Mr. McQuarrie's application, with accompanying document, be transmitted to the General Assembly for special consideration, with the recommendation that his equest be granted, and that he receive an annuity of one kundred dollars from May 1st, which is, in the judg-

ment of the Committee, a fair proportion for his years of ministerial service in this Church.

The Committee has also received an application from the Presbytery of Halifax, on behalf of Rev. R. F. Burns, D. D., asking that he be permitted to retire from the active duties of the ministry, and that his name be retained on the Roll of Presbytery as Pastor Emeritus of Fort Massy Church, Halifax

This application was accompanied with a message from Dr. Burns to the effect that as he was not personally connected with the Fund he declined to participate in its benefits.

The Committee deems it worthy of notice that the congregation (Fort Massy), to which Dr. Burns ministered so faithfully for the last seventeen years, has guaranteed to him a retiring allowance of \$500 per annum during his lifetime, and it recommends that the Presbytery's application on his behalf be granted.

The Rev. Andrew Burrows, D.D., makes application through the Committee to have his name restored to the list of rate-contributors, so as to participate in the benefits of the Fund. The Committee recommend that his application be granted on condition that he comply with the terms of

the fifth Regulation. The proposed changes in the Regulations of the Fund have been considered by the Committee since the last meeting of the Assembly, but without any definite results. These changes have also been submitted to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, in accordance with the remit of last Assembly, and after consideration, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—"Without expressing disapproval of the proposed changes, yet inasmuch as the Committee (Western Section) has been instructed to report to the next Assembly as to the effect of the changed rules upon ministers

already connected with the Fund, the Synod defer final action till next meeting." The Committee is gratified to find a marked increase in the rates contributed by ministers, as compared with last year, but regrets to find a considerable decrease in congregational collections, as also in donations and in interest from investments. This decrease, however, has been more than supplemented by the amount received from the Hymnal Committee, which contribution is very

thankfully acknowledged.

The Committee cannot close its report without expressing the hope that this Fund, which has contributed so much already to the comfort of our aged and infirm ministers, and which might be made to yield a great deal more comfort by very little additional effort on the part of the Church, shall receive the hearty and generous support of every minister and congregation within the bounds of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE DISTRIBUTION OF PROBATIONERS, 1891-92.

Your Committee would present the following general summary of their work during the year:—
For the first quarter there were the names of 18 probationers who had placed themselves at the
disposal of the Committee. Of the 25 Presbyteries embraced in the three Synods covered by its
operations, 16 reported 36 vacancles for supply, leaving 9 Presbyteries that made no report.
In the second quarter there were 23 probationers, 11 Presbyteries made no report, and only 14
asked supply for 31 vacancies.
For the third quarter there were 18 probationers, and 23 vacancies were reported by 12 Presbyteries for supply, so that 13 Presbyteries were not heard from.
For the last quarter still current, 9 Presbyteries did not report, and 16 asked for supply for 34
vacancies, for which only 13 probationers were available, so that the Committee could not fully meet
the applications made.

In each of the quarters some of the Presbyteries requested full supply, others only partial. Altogether there were the names of 34 probationers on the roll, and of 87 vacancies.

In these vacancies 44 settlements have taken place, as shown in Appendix I.

Of the 34 probationers, 12 have been settled, as appears in Appendix II, but the Committee are
certain of the settlement of 2 more, although they have not been able to trace them.

For the quarter not yet expired 13 names were on the roll, but one of the number has obtained
a settled charge, thus leaving only 12 actually in the field at this date.

Of the others your Committee need not make a detailed statement. Some have been dropped

In some instances your Committee were under the necessity of declining, or holding in abeyance, names certified by Presbyteries on the ground that these did not report their vacancies.

From the following table the General Assembly will at once see how far Presbyteries have complied with the injunction it issued, and in which it was followed by at least two of the Synods in the territory covered by the operations of your Committee, to report their vacancies for full or partial supply. It will be seen that three have made no report during the year. Some have reported vacancies without taking supply in the first quarter and made no report for the other quarters. But reference to the table which is now given will render further details unnecessary.

Your Committee must acknowledge that they felt such conduct to be the opposite of encouraging them in their work, and anything but fitted to inspire them with respect for those who could render such disloyal treatment to Superior Courts—both Synods and General Assembly. They did not, however, feel themselves warranted to throw up the trust committed to them. The period for which they were to act has now expired, and they would conclude their Report by expressing gratitude to God for the measure of service they have been enabled to render to His cause, so far as entrusted to the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and their hope is that this Assembly will be led wisely to consider the returns made by Presbyteries to the remits sent down last year on a scheme for the Distribution of Probationers, and to such a decision and arrangement as will secure order and prosperity to the Church in this department of her work, and the best interests of both probationers and vacancies.

APPENDIX No. 18.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

To the Venerable the General Assembly :-

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to present the following Report :-

I. Regarding the Prohibition Petition Movement which had not been completed when the last Assembly met.

As this movement has become a factor in the history of the struggle for Prohibition in

Canada we give a brief statement of the main facts concerning it.

The Assembly that met in Halliax in 1883 "instructed" its Committee on Temperance " to take all proper measures to secure the co-operation of the other Churches of the Dominion with a view of petitioning the Dominion Government in favour of entire prohibition at the earliest possible date, and, such ecoperation having been secured, to prepare forms of petition to be signed by our people."

The Report presented to the Assembly in Toronto, in 1889, states that steps had been taken to carry out these instructions, but it does not mention any results. It was then resolved, "That the Committee be again authorized to carry out, as soon as practicable, the instructions of last Assembly, as to petitioning the Dominion Parliament."

After much correspondence, the first step towards practical work was taken in April, 1890, when, having secured the hearty co-operation of the Committee on Temperance of the Methodist Church of Canada, a joint letter, signed by the Assembly's Convener, and by Rev. D. L. Brethour, representing the Methodist Church, was addressed to a large number of different church courts, explaining the object desired, making sundry suggestions for their consideration, and asking their co-operation in the work to be undertaken. Two almost immediate results were the discussion of the matter by many of the church courts in many centres of population, and much notice of the movement by the press generally.

The steps that had been taken were fully reported to the Assembly at Ottawa, in 1890, whon it was resolved, "That this Assembly approves of the action taken, and hereby authorizes the Committee on Temperance for 1890 to continue the negotiations thus entered into with other Churches, and if the results warrant it, to have petitions presented to the Parliament of 1891, or as soon thereafter as practicable."

The results did warrant it, and in the early part of winter forms of potitions, with helpful directions and suggestions, were distributed in large numbers to about seventeen or eighteen different religious bodies.

The various Temperance Societies were also asked to help, and, a little later, they were furnished with forms of petitions to supplement those of the Churches where necessary.

The work was taken up with a good deal of enthusiasm, and was making very satisfactory progress, when it was very seriously checked by the dissolution of Parliament in February. After the elections in March the work was resumed, but the loss caused by the interuption was great. The results, however, under all the circumstances, were gratifying. The petitions were the most numerously signed that had ever been presented to any Canadian Parliament, and they made a marked impression on both the Parliament and the Government. A large and representative delegation also waited on the Government and urged the prayer of the petitions.

At this stage the Assembly, which met at Kingston in 1891, expressed gratification "at the large numbers of signatures obtained throughout the country to the petitions for Prohibition circulated by authority of the last Assembly, in co-operation with other Churches, and authorizes its Committee on Temperance to continue to co-operate with other Churches in such ways as may be found expedient to keep up the acitation for Prohibition began in connection with the Petition movement."

The whole cost was \$584.27, all of which has been paid. A statement of accounts is appended to this Report. The amount of time and labour given freely was very large, and the gratuitous assistance so readily afforded by the Press generally was of much value, and is gratefully acknowledged.

W. 1t have we received for all this labour and expense? The agitation itself did good. The united action of the Churches, and the opening of the way for more complete co-operation in the

future, are of no little importance. Our rulers have been led to give more serious attention to the demand for Prohibition, and the Government to adopt a definite line of action, the practical cutcome being the appointment of a Royal Commission of Enquiry concerning the liquor traffic. Though very far short of what was asked, yet it is a most important move; and if the enquiry be at all fair, and the Temperance people give it all possible assistance, and then follow it up vigor. ously, it cannot but be productive of real good, and a recent discussion in Parliament seems to justify this hope. Rev. John F. Hill, Corresponding Socretary of the "Permanent Committee on Temperance of the Presbyterian Church in U.S.A.," in writing to your Convener, says! "We congratulate you on the manifest progress you are making towards the abolishment of the iniquitous traffic in ardent spirits. The appointment by your Government of a 'Commission of Enquiry concerning the Liquor Traffic' is a most important step in the right direction. In our country this has been earnessly sought for by the friends of Temperance for twenty years, the beauty program of the prog It has been passed by the Senate several times, but was as often defeated in the Lower House of Congress." In continuing to press the question of Prohibition upon the Parliament and Government, we are only doing what it is the right and duty of every citizen and of every Churchpressing them to fulfil one of the first and most important functions for which they exist-to protect, as they alone have the power to protect, the people from a great danger and a recognized evil of gigantic proportions and destructive character.

II. Regarding a plan of organization for Temperance work in the Church.

This matter has been before the Church for several years. Last year, in line with the information submitted by the Committee, it was resolved: "That this Assembly, with a view to the Church doing more effective work for Temperance, approves of the proposal to complete a Temperance organization under the control of the Church."

This plan is in no way binding, but is suggestive, and is furnished as a useful guide for organized work in any congregations that may desire such help. At the same time it is recommended to all as a simple, practical plan for doing good work without multiplying societies. It aims at using forces we already have, with very little extra machinery, thus largely overcoming the objection many have to increasing the number of different societies in the Church. It is the result of much correspondence and a careful study of the methods used in several Churches; and is based chiefly on the plan of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, modified by help taken from the Committee of the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

That there is need of some such plan of organization successive reports of Assemblies' Committees on Temperance have made plain. They have shown that very little has been done for Temperance by our Church as a Church in any organized way. While a large number of our ministers, office bearers and members are among the most active Temperance workers, their work has been done chiefly in societies wholly outside of the Church. That these societies have done, and are doing good work is fully recognized, still there is need of more being done within

the Church.

Frequent enquiries from persons in our congregations asking for some simple, practical plan for doing organized work in the Church is another indication that something in this line is much needed. All are not organizers, and many fail to do good work for the want of some

simple plan on which to begin.

In the unusual efforts put forth during late years in the direction of securing improved legislation and enforcing it, the attention of many has been drawn away from that department of the work commonly called "Moral Suasion." We do not need any less of the one but more of the other. And the proposed plan of organization under the control and direction of the Church, provides a simple way of carrying on the educative work that is yet so necessary.

Two of the five reasons given by the Hon. Mr. Foster why the Government will not now comply with the prayer of our petitions-and they are the only ones with which we have to doare the "desire for intoxicants, the desire for stimulants which exists in a great proportion of the people," and "the power of custom." "These," he says, "will have to be reformed and

overcome before the principle of prohibition is practically realized."

These are the real obstacles in the way. They may not be as formidable as he seems to think, yet there they are, and all that is possible should be done to remove them. To do so it is necessary to persistently inculcate the principle of Total Abstinence. Let all the youth and children of our land be faithfully trained to be total abstainers, and it is easy to see that both the 'desire for stimulants' and the 'power of custom' must soon disappear, and when these shall have been overcome, all other objections will be of little force. It is with the hope of enabling our Church to take a more active part in raising up a generation of Total Abstainers, filled with the Spirit of the Gospel, that will be able, if we fail in the meantime, to secure and to enforce a prohibitory law, that we now submit the following :-

PLAN OF ORGANIZATION FOR MOBE EFFECTIVE TEMPERANCE WORK IN THE CHURCH.

1. The General Assembly's Committee on Temperance shall consist of the Convener, the Conveners of the Committees on Temperance of the several Synods, the Conveners of Presbyteries' Committees on Temperance, and such others as the Assembly may appoint. The objects

The objects of this Committee shall be to take the oversight, under direction of the Assembly, of Temperance work throughout the Church; to co-operate, in such ways as may be found necessary or expedient, with similar committees of other Churches in the Dominion, for the promotion of the cause of Temperance and Prohibition; to select or prepare and circulate suitable Temperance literature; to promote more thorough organization in the Church for Temperance work; to issue to Sessions, before the close of each year, a circular containing the Assembly's questions on Temperance; and to report annually to the Assembly. This Committee shall also have authority to solicit contributions from Congregational Temperance Committees and from friends of the cause throughout the Church.

2. Each Synod and Presbytery shall appoint a Committee on Temperance, whose Convener shall become a member of the Assembly's Committee when notice of his appointment shall have been sent to the Assembly's Convener by the Clerk of the respective Synod or Presbytery. It shall be the object of each such Committee to co-operate with the Assembly's Committee in carrying on its work, to report annually to its respective Synod or Presbytery, and to forward a copy of its report to the assembly's Convener not later, if possible, than the middle of April.

3. Each Session is recommended to appoint a Committee on Temperance, whose objects shall be to co-operate with the Assembly's Committee; to direct Temperance work in the congregation; to take the oversight of other Committees on Temperance. Temperance Societies in the congregation; to encourage the signing of the pledge, and the circulation of Temperance literature; to advance, in every proper way available, the cause of Total Abstinence and Prohibition; to give, at the close of each year, to the Session and congregation a report of the work under its care.

4. Each Sabbath school is recommended to appoint a Committee on Temperance, whose objects shall be to co-operate with the Session; to interest the school in Temperance work; to give prominence to the Quarterly Temperance Lesson; to secure the signature of overy member of the school to the pledge; to have the Temperance Exercise furnished by the Assembly's Committee used occasionally in the school; to organize and conduct, where advisable, a "Presbyterian Children's Temperance Band;" and, at the close of each year, to report to the Session the state of the work under its care.

5. Each Christian Endeavour Society is recommended to have a Committee on Temperance, whose objects shall be to co-operate with the Session; to interest the members of the Society in Temperance work, and secure their signatures to the pledge; to circulate Temperance literature; to hold occasional public Temperance meetings, at which suitable addresses or lectures shall be given; and, at the close of each year, to report its work to the Session.

6. It is also recommended that where it is thought desirable, a Presbyterian Woman's Committee on Temperance be organized, whose objects shall be to co-operate with the Session; to promote instruction on Temperance in the family; to banish the wine cup from the social circle; and to do all possible to strengthen the Temperance sentiment in the family and social life of the congregation and community; and, at the close of the year, to report its work to the Sessions.

MODEL CONSTITUTION FOR SABBATH SCHOOL, CHRISTIAN ENGEAVOUR, OR WOMAN'S COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE II. The objects, etc. (to be expressed similarly to the objects in sections 4, 5, and 6, above, having a separate form prepared for each. What follows will be the same for all.)

ARTICLE III. Pledge.—I do solemnly promise before God, relying on His grace, that I will not make, buy, sell or use any intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and that I will help to lead others to join in the same purpose.

ARTICLE IV. The officers of this Committee shall be, at least, a President and Secretary, and such others as may be found necessary. They shall be appointed at the annual meeting of the Committee.

ARTICLE V. This Committee shall make a report to the Session at least once a year, shortly before the close of each year, or as the Session may direct.

ARTICLE VI. Sub-Committees may be appointed on pledge work, circulation of Temperance literature, and for other objects that may be thought necessary and important in the circumstances.

ARTICLE VII. This constitution is intended simply as a useful guide, and may be amended to sait local circumstances at a regular meeting, by a two-third vote, the proposed amendments having been submitted in writing at a previous regular meeting.

BV-CAWS.

1. All meetings shall be opened with prayer.

- 2. The annual meeting, at which the officers shall be elected and the annual report adopted, shall be held during December.
- A special meeting may be called by the President at the request of three members of the Committee.
- 4. Notice of special meetings shall be given by the Secretary three days before the time fixed for the meeting.
- The following order of business is suggested: (1) Opening with prayer and other appropriate exercises.
 Roll call.
 Reading minutes.
 Reports of officers.
 Reports of Committees.
 Unfinished business.
 New business.
 Suitable entertainment.
 Closing with appropriate exercises.
- These by-laws may be amended, or new ones adopted, at a regular meeting by a majority vote.

III. Matters reported on by the lower courts of the Church. During the last three years, of which your Convener can speak from personal knowledge, there has been, on the whole, a steady and encouraging increase of interest in, and attention given to, the work of supplying information by means of Reports. The number of Sessions that have attended to this duty has steadily increased. In the Presbyteries of Pictou, Saugeen, Lindsny, and Whitby all the Sessions reported. Only one was lacking in each of the Presbyteries of Guelph and Maitland, only two each in Winnipeg, Truro, and Torouto, three in several others, and in Brockville "nearly all" reported. Others, such as Montreal and Sarnia, say that there is an improvement. The total number of Sessions that reported was a little over 600. All the Presbyteries in the Dominion, excepting Rock Lake, reported was a little over 600. All the Presbyteries in the Dominion, excepting Rock Lake, reported, the most of them with more than usual fulness and care. Reports were also received from the Synods of Hamilton and London, Toronto and Kingston, and Montreal and Ottawa. The other Synods do not meet till autumn, but at their last meetings they adopted vigorous and hopeful reports. The information furnished this year is, for the most part, full and definite, and the following summary is condensed and arranged with a view to clearness and brevity.

Question I.—Please state the causes that, in your opinion, have produced the improvement during the last twenty years in the drinking customs and temperance sentiment within your bounds?

A very few Sessions seem to doubt whether there has been any such improvement, but they have judged merely from very exceptional local circumstances. That there have been most decided changes for the better is too clearly evident from the almost unanimous testimony given last year by several hundreds of Sessions in all parts of the country, and under widely different circumstances, supported by the voice of nearly two score of Presbyteries and all of the Synods. The great mass of evidence that came into the hands of your Committee from thousands of the most reliable witnesses, testifying to the very great, "marvellous," and even "revolutionary" changes of the last twenty years, puts the reality of such changes entirely beyond reasonable doubt. They are no mere assumption. They are a grand reality, for which we should thank God, and take courage.

In view of these facts, it is well to enquire into the causes that have produced the changes, that we 1 y learn what have been the most effective forces and methods used. Hence the first question.

The unanimous voice of the reports declares the preaching of the Gospel to be the chief cause, and underlying all other causes, for it furnishes men and women of true devotion and sincerity to carry on the work. The plain, out-spoken manner in which the pulpit has exposed the evils of the trailip, the faithful and vigorous presentation of Gospel truth, endorsed by the constantly improving example of our ministers, have been increasingly effective. Next comediasemination of temperance principles in the Sabbath schools, and faithful teaching in Bible classes. Followed up, as these have been, by the growth of spiritual life in the Church and Community, and, especially of late y-ars, by the growing interest taken in the question of Temperance by the Churches, their hostility to the trailic, the unflinching adherence by our General Assemblies to the principle of prohibition, and the decided stand taken by the Churches generally in favour of total abstinence for the individual, and legal prohibition for the State, we have within the Church causes that have been declared to be "more than all other causes combined," and without which they would soon disappear. The position of the Church courts, and especially of our General Assemblies, is strongly emphasized.

Here are the other causes that are most frequently mentioned. Temperance societies are fully recognized as having done very much, particularly in early years; Temperance lectures, literature and the use of the pledge, stand high; improved legislation and the agitation connected with securing and enforcing it; the changed and friendly attitude of the press; the stand taken by many women, in the home, banishing all intoxicants from their family and social life, having their children trained to total abstinence, and in connection with the Woman's Christian

100 societies are erance lectures, e agitation conbress; the stand and social life, man's Christiau Temperance Union, of which special mention has been made; the firm stand taken by early settlers in some parts of the North-West; the advanced position and faithful labours of many medical men; the attitude of many public men in favour of Temperance, and the total abetinence example of responsible citizens, more particularly ministers, elders and church members: private advice and dealing by some ministers in their pastoral work; death of prominent drinkers, and the discipation of their estates; a growing sense of the shame and sin of drunkenness; the disrespect in which the traffic is held; and a few add, scarcity of money. Some further reference will be made to these causes under question 5.

QUESTION 2.—In how many places in your community is liquor sold by license? What proportion do they bear to the population? Has illicit sale increased or decreased?

Many reports are admirably full and definite, and if all had reported with equal care, a very correct view of the state of the traffic in the whole Dominion could be given; as it is, it can be only partial.

We present it by Provinces :-

Nova Scotia .- Only 113 licenses are granted, and these are all shop licenses. Of these 112 are in the city of Halifax, and are in proportion of 1 to 357 of population. The other license is in Halifax County, and within six miles of the city. It may be said that liquor is not sold at all in the rural districts throughout the whole province, so few and insignificant are the exceptious, and it many districts none has been sold for more than a score of years. The Inspector of Schools for Halifax County, in his last report, says: "In Musquodoboit side by side in ten sections stand the school-house and the tamperance hall. Perhaps it would be difficult to find in Nova Scotia or the Dominion of Canada a district of twenty-three sections, stretching along for twenty-five or thirty miles, a more cober and industrious people. Not a grog-shop from one end of Musquodoboit to the other can live." The same may be said of the valley of the Stewiacke, only a few miles distant, and of many other places in Nova Scotia.

The only places that report no decrease of illicit sale are Windsor, Truro, Baddeck, two places, not named, in Sydney Presbytery, and one in Wallace Presbytery, and the city of Halifax, with a.! its licenses. All other places where illicit sale is reported, it has decreased, the most marked cases being in the Presbytery of Victoria and Richmond, where about half-a-dozen in

Port Hastings and River Inhabitants gave up the traffic within the year.

Prince Edward Island .- There are no licenses. The whole province, excepting Charlottetown, is under the Canada Temperance Act, which is "uniformly commended as a restrictive measure," but since its repeal in that city, about two years ago, the sale has been free and open. At the last Session of the Provincial Legislature an Act was passed which greatly limits it. It grants no licenses, but is similar to the license laws of other provinces in its restrictive features. The experiment is an important one, and will be watched with interest.

Reports regarding the illicit sale are varied—several places having none, others very little, while in others it is more defiant; but, "judging from the reports, the illioit traffic seems to be kept pretty well in check," For a number of years the Island has occupied the first place in the Dominion, as far as temperance is concerned, the amount, per head, of liquors consumed being

less than in any other province.

New Brunswick has most of its counties and its capital, Fredericton, under the Canada Temperance Act. The following places are reported as having licenses: St. John, 1 to 700 of population; Campbellton, 12, or 1 to 125; Richibucto, 7, or 1 to 300; Dalhousie, 5, or 1 to 500; Bathurst, 5; Welford, 2, or 1 to 500. The Presbytery of Miramichi reports Northumberland, within its bounds, under the Canada Temperance Act. In it four Sessions report that there is no illicit sale, and four that it has decreased. In only two places where licenses are granted has there been any such decrease, while the quantity of liquor used has not becreased. The results of licenses are invariably reported as unfavourable.

Quebec.—Within the Presbytery of Quebec five Sessions report no license. In the city of Quebec there are only two groceries, so far as known to the Session reporting, that do not sell liquors by license. Licensed places average 1 to 280 of population, and in Levis 1 to 230. Illicit and of the law. In Richmond County, during the last five years, \$20,000 have been taken from

liquor dealers in fines and expenses.

Within the bounds of Montreal Presbytery some districts report no license, and some a marked decrease of illicit sale. Selling on the Sabbath is also falling off to some extent. The following figures give the number of licenses for the city of Montreal: For 1890-hotels, 165; restaurants, 322; shops, groceries, 597—total, 1,034. For 1891—hotels, 153; restaurants, 477; shops, groceries, 304—total, 924. In 1890, arrests for drunkenness, 8,868; in 1891, 9,349. "The reduction in number of licenses was on account of the increased license fee; the amount of drunkenness was not diminished."

This is but an example of what is reported from almost all places where licenses are granted. To reduce the number of licenses does not lessen the amount of liquor sold, nor the amount of drunkenness resulting from it. To raise the license fee only makes it necessary to sell more to meet the additional expense; and to sell more the attractions and temptations to lead men and youth to drink are made all the more alluring and dangerous. The testimony of P. E. Iler, President of the great Willow Springs Distilling Company, Nebraska, fully confirms this. In writing to the trade, he says: "High license has not hurt our business; on the contrary, it has been a great benefit to it." "I believe that high license acts as a bar against Prohibition." "I do not think that high license lessens the quantity of liquor used." If called to vote for "no license, low license, or high license," he believes that the "liquor dealers would almost unanimously go for high license." After all his long experience in different States "previous to high license and since," he says: "I believe that high license is one of the grandest laws for the liquor traffic, and for men interested, as well as for people at large, there is." The only real remedy is complete abolition of the saloou. To get rid of its evil influences it must be more than limited, or lossened in numbers, or highly taxed; it must disappear.

Ontario.—It is impossible to give a summary for this Province, many reports being very indefinite. We would like to have been able to give a tabulated statement covering the whole bounds; failing that we gather the following from the reports of Presbyteries which give the most definite information.

- 1. Synod of Hamilton and London.—(1) London reports 150 licensed places within the bounds, proportion of 1 to 570 of the population. In the City of London licensee have been reduced in two years from 69 to 40. (2) Maitland reports 42 licenses within its bounds. The following figures are given for incorporated towns and villages: Brussels, 4, or 1 to 325; Wroxeter, 2, or 1 to 500; Wingham, 6, or 1 to 360; Lucknow, 5, or 1 to 240; Kincardine, 7, or 1 to 330. Six Sessions report no licenses. (3) Sarnia.—Petroles has six licenses, or 1 to 700; Sarnia, 9, or 1 to 600; Camlachie, 1, and Burns Church, 1, or 1 to 1,000, with the propietor starving. Huron.—In villages where licenses are granted they average 1 to 250 of the population; in towns, 1 to about 450. In the populous township of Hullett there are only two licenses. One place reports 1 to 900, another 1 to 1000. (5) Paris.—The proportion varies from 1 to 325 to 1 to 750; and [6) Stratford, 1 to 325 to 1 to 1000.
- 2. Synod of Toronto and Kingston.—(1) Toronto.—In the City of Toronto there are 150 licensed taverns, 50 shops, and 11 wholesale stores, making an average of about 1 to 1000. Fifteen centres of population outside of the city are reported as having liquor sold by license. The highest proportion is in Streetsville, with 3 hotels, or 1 to 300; next, Newmarket, 6 hotels, or 1 to 350; Brampton has 8, and Eglington 4 hotels, or 1 to 400; Stouffville, 3 taverns, or 1 to 400; Oskwille and Weston have about the same proportion; Milton and Richmond Hill have each 3 taverns, or 1 to 500; Aurora, 3 taverns, or 1 to 666; Unionville has ! to 500; Georgetown 1 to 550; East Toronto, 2 taverns, or 1 to 750; Toronto Junction, 5 taverns, or 1 to 1000; and Scarboro' has the same proportion. The nine places above, for which numbers are given, have 40 licenses. The proportion for the 15 is 1 to 540 of the population. (2) Whitby.—There are 48 licensed places within the bounds. The largest number in any town is 9. The proportion to the population ranges from 1 to 250 down to 1 to 2,500, giving an average of 1 to 758. (3) Guelph reports 105 licenses. Guelph has 18, Galt 11, and other places from 9 down to 1. Three places have none. The only averages given are: Linwood, 1 to 150; Hoxville, 1 to 200; Almira, 1 to 250; and Nassagaweya, 1 to 2,700. (4) Lindsay has about 50, the town of Lindsay having the most, 16, or 1 to 440. A list of 9 other places is given, of which 2 have 1 licensed hotel each, 4 have 2 each, 2 have 3 each, and 1 has 5. The proportion ranges from 1 to 200 down to 1 to 2,000, giving an average of 1 to 400. (5) Orangeville.—Within the limits of 12 congregations there are 33 licensed races, and it is estimated that there are about 55 within the bounds of the Prestytery. The proportion to population varies greatly, from 1 to 200, to 1 to 1,000, giving an average of about 1 to 300.
- 3. Within the bounds of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa there are 4 Presbyteries in the Province of Ontario. (1) Ottawa.—In the city of Ottawa there are 80 taverns, 7 ealoons, and 59 shops, being 1 to 301\frac{1}{2} of population. In Carleton Co. there are 26 licensed places, or 1 to 1,153. New Edinburgh has 1 to 1,100 or 1,200, while Buckingham has 18, or 1 to 100, but if the surrounding county be taken in, the proportion will be smaller. Bristol is under local option. There are no licenses. The law is well sustained by the numicipal council and the popular sentiment, and the results are said to be satisfactory. (2) Brockville does not give the number of licenses, but the proportion, where granted, is 1 to 200 or 300. One district of 10 mites equare is reported as having none. Winchester, a village of 1,200, has adopted the prohibitory clause of the Ontario law of 1889, and has no license. (3) Glangarry.—Numbers not given; proportion, 1 to 250 down to 1 to 1,000, averaging 1 to about 600. Illicit sale is steadily decreasing. (4) Lanark and Renfrew.—Total number not stated. The number in different places varies from 1 to 10. The proportion in 9 centres ranges from 1 to 160 to 1 to 1,000, averaging 1 to 540. One place reports that there are none, "the last of the race having vanished before the steady march of Christian civilization. The illicit sale has decreased all round so far as known."
- 5. Manitoba.—Presbytery of Winnipeg.—Winnipeg has 55 licenses, or 1 to 500 of population: Selkirk, 3, or 1 to 225; Fort William, 15, or 1 to 200; Port Arthur, 19, or 1 to 142; Little Britain has 1 in 10 miles, and it belongs to Hudson Bay Company. Meadow Leaf, Springfield,

and Kildonan report that there is no sale, but the nearness of the last two to Winnipeg largely counteracts the benefits that should otherwise be enjoyed. (2) The Presbytery of Minnedosa reports 6 licenses, the proportion ranging from 1 to 75 at a railway station, to 1 to 275. Where there has been any change illicit sale has decreased. There has been a great revival of interest in temperance work in Manitoba during the year, with a grand convention at Winnipeg; all resulting in an Act being passed at the last Session of the Legislature providing for a popular vote on Prohibition at the Provincial elections this summer. This experiment, like the one being tried on Prince Edward Island, is an important one, and the outcome of it will be watched with much interest.

The Territories.—Some Sessions in Regina Presbytery furnish us with an illustration of Irish wit on the prairies. "All sale is illicit but four per cent, and that being more than four per cent. is illicit, too." Illicit sale has increased since the introduction of four per cent, beer, and hotels selling strong drink in defiance of the law. The license law lately passed is said not to be the wish of the majority of the people. It has been secured principally by three classes, who were active in working for it; those who have the appetite, those who want to make money by it, and those who through it seek political advantage. Medicine Hat is the only place that reports liquor sold by license. It has two licenses, 1 to 300. Medicine Hat, Lethbridge, and Pincher Creek report marked decrease in illicit sale. Davisburg has three places and Rei Deer twelve where liquor is sold illegally, and thoy state that the "permit system" has increased the drinking customs and illicit sale. The Prohibition law which did much good, and was fitted to do very much greater good, had it been fairly dealt with, was over-ridden and made largely ineffective by the introduction and abuse of the "permit system" and "four per cent. beer." They make the enforcement of the law very difficult, and foster drinking customs.

British Columbia.—Proportion of licensed places to population ranges from 1 to 50 to 1 to 300, or 1 to 216, in communities reporting. All but one Session report decrease of illicit sale.

With reference to the illicit sale throughout the whole Dominion, while a few report no change or increase the general testimony is that it has decreased, especially where there are no licenses. On the contrary, the statement comes from several places where there are licenses, that the illicit sale has not decreased. And a few of the Presbyterles say that even some of those who have licenses overstep the law and sell illegally. A considerable number of Sessions, particularly in the rural districts, state that there is no sale within their bounds. To sum up we find (1) But a few villages and towns are free from the presence and influences of the saloon or dram shop, hundreds of which are licensed, showing us that, even at this late date, the third question is not superfluous. It is too plain that multitudes do not yet see the saloon in its true character. (2) The rural districts are largely free from this curse, though it is also true that we cannot in all cases judge of the comparative solviety of country and town or city by the presence or absence of the dram shop, for from these centres it sends its polluted streams far out into the country. (3) The illicit sale still continues in greater or less proportion, especially in villages, towns, and cities. (4) The granting of licenses is not found to be favourable to the reduction of illicit selling, but rather the contrary, as they tend to increase the amount of drinking and drunkenness; and (5) The illicit sale is eteadily decreasing in almost all parts of the

This inveterate foo of all that is good is being gradually, though all too slowly, driven into narrower limits. It has had to yield not a little territory during the past year. An impartial view of the whole field is by no means discouraging, and those engaged in this work must never yield one step of what has been gained. The work will not be easy.

"Griefs shall come,
Pain, hardsbips, death, it may be, in the path;
Yet turn not back! hand once upon the plough,
Drive the brave furrow forward, eyes intent
On the share's point!"

QUESTION III.—What effects have you found the presence of the saloon or dram shop to have in the general life of your community?

The replies to the second question clearly show that there are still hundreds of saloons, or dram shops, both licensed and unlicensed, in nearly all the cities, and many of the towns and villages of this Dominion. If these are good institutions, then let us uphold them and extend them; but if they are known to be decidedly wil in their influe cos, then as Patriots and Christians we are in duty bound to banish hum from the land. They have been long on trial, and the testimony of the Sessions of this great Church should be conclusive as to their character and influence. Let us hear what they have to say, and let us remember, too, that their testimony has been encorsed by Presbyteries and Synods. Here it is:—

One unbroken wail of "bad! bad! evil, and only evil, and that continually," comes rolling up from come to ocean. Some Sessions, happily, do not know much about the saloon from experience, but wherever it exists, there are not two opinions concerning it. Not a syllable is heard from

any part of the land, from the hundreds of our ministers and thousands of our elders who have had the question before them, favouring it in the slightest degree, or even attempting to excuse its existence.

Its baneful influences are described in such language as the following: - Universally the most fruitful source of vice and crime, leading to the violation of almost every law of the decalogue; depreciates the value of property, and hurts trade; it is a snare to the innocent; a source of terrible temptation to youth and men who have fallen, but would fain do better; decoys from religious meetings and influences; it is injurious to the religious life of the individual, family, and community; a menace to the Church and a hindrance to the Gospel; it organizes other evil attractions to increase its traffic; it fosters loose habits, idleness, prodigality, licentiousness, and gambling; it scoops in the money that should go to support suffering families, and pay debts; it is a moral pest, a canker in the moral life, a blight and a curse, almost burning the fruitful field into a barren desert; it is injurious and ruinous for time and eternity; and much more in the same strain; and who will question the truth of it all. Oh! what an awful indictment against the saloon, given by a jury consisting of thousands of the best and most reliable men of our fair Dominion! Oh! What a universal wail of sin, sorrow, and suffering; of desolation, destruction, and death has come to our ears! Shall it not reach our hearts! Shall we tolerate in this great land such an acknowledged source of terrible evils, and imminent danger to our

QUESTION 4.—What has been done to secure the teaching of Temperance in your public schools? Is it now taught?

In only a few instances has anything practical been done to secure such teaching. In a few places deputations have waited upon school authorities to press the matter. In Carleton County, Ontario, special efforts were made, resulting in much increase of such teaching, and in the cities and towns it is faller and more systematic than in the country. Taking the reports as a whole there has been a decided improvement both in the quantity and quality of such instruction. In many places the teachers are reported as being in hearty sympathy with it, and as doing much good by their example.

The L-gislatures of Nova Scotia and P. E. Island have this year enacted laws which give such teaching a more important place in the course of study. The interest in it is evidently increas-

ing, and the outlook is encouraging.

Objections mentioned against the present state of matters are :-

(1) The teaching is left optional; it should be otherwise. (2) The text-books are too technical. and many find it difficult to teach the subject effectively. (3) The text-books are too exclusively scientific and give no place to the moral aspect of the question, which is of the greatest importance. As our country is yet only in the formative period with respect to this department of popular education it is well that these objections be carefully considered, and met, as fully as possible, by the proper authorities in each province.

QUESTION 5.--Please state what means have been used in your congregation to overcome the evils of strong drink, and to foster a sound temperance sentiment. What have been the results?

The object of this question has been missed by some, on account of its similarity to the first, The first was asked in order to ascertain as far as possible what were the m 'effective causes of improvement in the past, while this one was asked to learn how far these can be are still effective. and what means were used by our congregation last year. The replies show us that all these causes of the last 20 years are at work with greater or less effect to-day. It is gratifying to learn that the preaching of the Gospel is still regarded as the most effective weapon we have to overcome all evil. The reports seem to clearly indicate that sermons dealing specially with the varied phases of the Temperance question are much more frequently preached than in former years, and that our ministers are more "unequivocally outspoken" with reference to the evils of the liquor traffic. The quarterly lesson in the Sabbath school is emphasized as a somewhat new and effective element in the educative influences now at work. Also the efforts of the Christian Endcavour Societies and the influences of the regular prayer meetings. Private dealings, in pastoral work with those in sympathy with the liquor traffic, seems to be more frequently and more effectively used than formerly. Some have thus been led to give up the business. The signing of the prohibition petition is often mentioned as producing good effects. Pledge cards, which are more used by Sabbath schools and prayer meetings, and the circulation of Temperance literature, hold an increasingly prominent place, while Temperance organizations outside of the Chnrch, and especially within the Church, have grown in favour and influence. In the Presbytery of Paris two congregations have cleared their bounds of the traffic, and one-Glenmorris-liss "not only ceased to do evil but learned to do well, having turned a bar-room into a reading-room and mechanics institute."

In Stratford Presbytery, Mitchell, a town of 2,200 has a very successful blue ribbon movement, in connection with which 900 signed the pledge. In London a "Commercial Men's Antitreating League" has been formed which is said to be exerting a good and helpful influence, while

The censure of the traffic by church courts and increased information on the whole question have done good during the year. The favourable action of municipal councils in vigorously maintaining the law, is, in some quarters spoken of as most gratifying, causing the sale to greatly decrease and giving rise to a sound Temperance sentiment. The use of unfermented wine instead of the wine of commerce, in dispensing the Lord's support, is put among the helpful influences within the Church. Hope is also expressed that where the traffic is still connected with the

grocery business it will soon be separated from it.

The report of Montreal Presbytery says: "There can be no doubt we are enduring in this thing of intemperance what we would not endure in any other thing in this world. Let there come, as there did recently, a little scare of smallpox, and what a demonstration there is. What are the evils which have come to us in that direction to be compared with the multitudes who nave gone to death by the liquor curse which we Christian people have fostered and winked at? It is high time that as a Church we should be aroused to an even fuller sense of our duty in regard to this great evil.

The RESULTS are said, almost without exception, to be good, encouraging, and very hopeful. One Session says this question has called attention to, and awakened it to a sense of, its duty in this respect. Progress is clearly indicated in every direction. Even in the North-West Territories and in British Columbia where the circumstances are very unfavourable the progress is said to be encouraging.

All information that the reports furnish goes to confirm the importance of diligent, persist-

ent, faithful temperance work in every direction.

The Presbytery of Whitby gives us two illustrations that should be encouraging to many who have to work amidst great difficulties and can see but little of any immediate results of their

The report from the Session of Dunbarton says: "Mr. Kennedy began thirty-three years ago to preach and teach total abstinence and not one of those brought up under his teaching is known to use liquor in any way."

The report from Bowmanville informs us that "the influences of Rev. John Smith, for twenty-four years pastor of the church, and a most pronounced and vigorous temperance advoeste, is still felt in the congregation and community, although he moved away from the town as long ago as 1875."

Such instances might be greatly multiplied, but let those help to inspire the weary toiler, who amidst tears sows the good seed in apparently barren soil, to labour on in faith in Him who alone can give the increase. The fruit thereof shall yet be gathered in, and shall bless the memory, if not the life, of the sower.

RESOLUTIONS.

Be it Resolved-

I. That this Assembly, having heard with gratitude that the Lower Courts of the Church so fully recognize the earnest and faithful preaching and teaching of the Word of God as the principal factors in the Temperance Reform, and that their importance, especially as they bear on the evils of strong drink, is of late years being more strongly emphasized with good results, urges all its ministers to give increasing prominence to sermons on Temperan 3, and all its Sabbath school teachers to use the many opportunities they have to instruct their classes in sound Tomperance

2. That this Assembly, having heard the unanimous and vigorous denunciation given by so many Sessions and Presbyteries in all parts of the Dominion of the saloon or dram shop, and deploring the large numbers that are reported as plying their demoralizing traffic in so many centres of population, desires to place on record its unqualified condemnation of the saloon, or dram shop, as a centre of most degrading influences, and a source of great danger to the Church and country, and its conviction that the license system has been proved insufficient to effectually remove the terrible evils of the drink traffic, and that, so far as legislation is concerned, nothing short of prohibition, rigidly enforced by the proper authorities, should ever be accepted as final, or satistactory.

3. That this Assembly accepts the appointment, by Parliament, of a Royal Commission of Enquiry into the Liquor Traffic as a step in the right direction, though very far short of the prayer of the petitions presented to the Session of 1891, and instructs its Committee on Temperance to urge upon the Government the vigorous prosecution of the work of that Commission, so that its report may be presented at an early stage of the Session of 1893, that there may be time for dealing with the great question of prohibition, fairly and fully, without any unnecessary delay.

4. That, in view of the appointment of a Royal Commission of Enquiry into the Liquor Traffic, there is urgent necessity that the case of the thoroughgoing advocates of Temperance principles should be clearly and fully presented before the said Commission, which can only be done by employing qualified agents and incurring much expense,—the General Assembly acknowledges its responsibility in the premises, and resolves,

(1) To appoint the Moderator, the Clerks, Dr. Campbell and the Convener of the Temperance

Committee immediately to prepare and issue to all congregations a circular explaining the requirements of the case, and asking that a contribution be sent to Dr. Reid, if possible, before the 15th of July next.

(2) To remit it to the Moderator, the Clerks and Dr. Campbell, in connection with the Temperance Committe, either to secure a separate presentation of the case on behalf of this Assembly, or, if found more advisable, then to co-operate with other organizations in presenting the case before the Royal Commission.

- 5. That this Assembly, recognizing that the saloon, or dram shop, has a firm stronghold in the pernicious habit of "treating," is gratified to learn that the "Commercial Men's Auti-treating League" is meeting with much success in removing a serious temptation and in weakening the influence of the saloon, and expresses the hope that it may be the means of leading many to adopt the practice of Total Abstinence, in which alone there is absolute safety from the evils of strong drink.
- 6. That this Assembly gratefully acknowledges the good work done by the various Temperance organizations, and an increasingly large portion of the Press, in training the young and educating the public in the principles of Temperance and Prohibition, and recommends office-bearers and members of the Church to give such organizations, and such portion of the Press, due sympathy, encouragement and support.

7. That this Assembly, fully recognizing the potent influence of woman in relation to the drinking customs of society and the importance of proper home training, earnestly recommends all the women of the Church to discountenance the use of intexicants in family and social life, and all mothers to train their children in the principles of Temperance and Prohibition.

- 8. That, in view of the importance now attached to the scientific teaching of Temperance in the Public Schools of the country, and the provisions being made for such teaching, this Assembly directs its Committee ou Temperance to call the attention of the Provincial Educational authorities to the necessity of making suitable provision for giving instruction on the Morat, as well as scientific bearing, of the use of alcoholic liquors; and that Presbytsries' Committees on Temperance be instructed to memorialize Public Shool Inspectors within their bounds to have a Temperance Manual systematically used in all the schools under their jurisdiction.
- That this Assembly approves generally of the Plan of Organization, as contained in Section II. of this report, and recommends it as a simple and practical plan for doing effective Temperance work within the Church.

QUESTIONS TO SESSIONS.

- 1. Has the Plan of Organization, for Temperance work in the Church, recommended by the last General Assembly been adopted in your congregation? If adopted, What has been done? and with what results? If not adopted, What Temperance work has been done in your Church during the year?
- 2. Are the Temperance sentiment and the practice of total abstinence now on the increase in your congregation? Give a brief statement of the facts on which you base your answer.
- 3. Has the sale of liquor entirely ceased within your bounds? If not, do you think it has decreased during the year?

APPENDIX No. 19.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF RELIGION, 1891-1892.

To the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada :-

FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—The General Assembly at its last meeting made a change in the way of gathering material for its report on the State of Religion, and it is with great satisfaction that your Committee are able to say that this change has commended itself to the Church at large. While no fault is found with the new method by any, from several quarters the change is welcomed as enabling conveners to send in more satisfactory reports.

While this report is one of the most important that can be laid before the General Assembly, there is none more dillicult to prepare. It would be easy to lay on your table a document that was pleasing and attractive, and it would not be hard to draw up one that was gloomy and repulsive; but to present a statement which with fair accuracy reflects the good and bad which is to be found over such a wide area as this Church presents, is exceedingly difficult.

Even in the restricted area of a single congregation it is difficult to draw up a satisfactory report. Perhaps this accounts for some Sessions not reporting. They are so conscientious that they are afraid to give endorsement to statements of which they are not absolutely sure. Others, we are afraid, refrain from reporting through sheer laziness and indifference. Whatever may be the cause, it is a great mistake to neglect drawing up this report. Nothing is better fitted to make the under shepherds feel the responsibilities of their office and work than an attempt to look honestly in the face the spiritual condition of the flock in which the Holy Ghost has made them bishops.

Generally speaking a commendable caution characterizes all the reports. There seems to be no desire to exaggerate either the favourable or the un' vourable elements that exist, and this is certainly matter for thankfulness.

I.—THE WORK DONE BY ELDERS AND DEACONS IN VISITING THEIR DISTRICTS, CONDUCTING PRAYER-MEETINGS, AND TEACHING THE YOUNG.

In regard to the work done by the elders of the Church there is a most satisfactory consensus of opinion from almost every quarter. They are attending to the duties of their office with commendable diligence. In two districts only is there a complaint made in regard to their neglect of duty, one from the Presbytery of Brockville, and another from the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, which, while speaking in highest praise of the service rendered by elders generally, adds, "Yet we hear of some who bear this honoured name without giving evidence of its true meaning in life and work. Our report calls for reform, and asks, 'Can we not get all our Sessions to work? Set each elder his district, and thus develop unused talont."

It is difficult for any Church court to remedy a condition of things which may have risen from congregations choosing unsuitable men for this sacred office, but there can be no doubt that it greatly facilitates the work of the elders to divide every congregation into district. over which one elder has the oversight, and the size and situation of the district should have a distinct relation to

the time which each particular elder is able to devote to the duties of his office.

In regard to the work done by deacons very little is said. The management of the temporal affairs of the different congregations occupies the careful and zealous attention of many able and worthy men, and the performance of this work in the right way is essential to the prosperity of the Church. We are deeply thankful for all the consecrated business talent in the Church, but we would be still more thankful to see men of this stamp in greater numbers engaging in other branches of the Church's work. One report states, "If the designation deacon is taken in the ordinary sense as equivalent to manager, the returns show that this set of office-bearers severely neglect this work; but if it is taken in the New Testament sense there are no deacons in this Presbytery." Another reports, "Deacons are conspicuous by their absence." A third says, "There are none of that order in this Presbytery." This is a day in which all sorts of organizations and orders are popular, why is it then that there is such a distaste for "Deacons?" Is it because the order of deacons is old and the others are new?

II.—The Course of Instruction Pursued in Sunday Schools and Bible Classes, the Extent TO WHICH THE SHORTER CATECHISM IS USED, AND THE ADDITIONS MADE TO THE MEMBER-SHIP OF THE CHURCH FROM AMONG THE YOUNG.

The use of the International Series of Lessons is all but universal in our Sahbath schools. The use of the International Series of Lessons is all but universal in on Sainbaud Schools. While no series of lessons is perfect, there are so many advantages connected with the simultaneous study of the same portion of Scripture by a great number, that it is matter for congratulation that this series has commonded itself so widely, and we trust it may continue to do so. In many cases this series is supplemented by the Higher Religious Instruction of the Young in particular books of the Bible, the Life of our Saviour, the Confession of Faith, the Pilgrim's Progress, Church

History, etc.

The Shorter Catechism is being taught carefully in some portions of the Church, and indifferently in others. While too much was made of memorizing in the past, there is a tendency to make too little of it now. The elipshod way in which the Catechism is sometimes repeated is very painful, and has a very injurious effect on the mind of the pupil. The truth is so well packed in the Catechism that the omission or carcless repetition of a word or clause may make a wrong impression on the mind of the learner. In reading slighting remarks made by Presbyterians on the Calvinistic contents of doctrine one often wonders where they got their notions of Calvinism, and suspects that on the mind of the learner. In reading slighting remarks made by Presbyterians on the Calvinistic system of doctrine, one often wonders where they got their notions of Calviniam, and suspects that their training in the Shorter Catechism must have been very unsatisfactory. As our Church has no desire to throw overboard the theology of the Catechism, our uninisters and elders and Sabbath School teachers should throw more zeal and energy into this part of their work, so that they may turn out Presbyterians dyed in the wool. The Roman Catholic and Anglican Churches are most diligent in training the young in their Catechisms, and if we are indifferent and careless in this work we shall suffer for it.

In recard to the additions made to the care of the care

In regard to the additions made to the membership of the Church from among the young, this has been looked upon very generally as a tabulating of the results of Sabbath school work. One Synod, indeed, takes exception to this, and shows that a double wrong might thus be done. Sabbath Synod, indeed, takes exception to this, and shows that a double wrong might thus be done. Sabbath Schools might get credit for more than they were entitled to, and pastors and parents might not get credit for what they are entitled to, and it adds, "Not unfrequently at Sunday School Conventions and elsewhere the agency of pious parents and devoted pastors, to say nothing of religious literature and the study of the Bible, is ignored, but all the credit given to the Sabbath school, when, truth told, nine-tenths of the instrumental cause may be outside the Sabbath school." In this whole connection we should remember the saying of our Saviour, "One soweth and another respect." The words in the Assembly's heading are carefully guarded. It does not wish information as to how many joined the membership of the Church through any particular agency, but how many joined from among the young. What led them to take that step is a different thing. The reports, so far as they throw light on this, are, on the whole, encouraging. We are glad to see so many of the young taking their place in the ranks of Christian confessors, but we would like to see a great many more.

III.—THE MEANS EMPLOYED TO INFORM CONGREGATIONS, AND ESPECIALLY THE YOUNG, REGARDING THE MISSIONARY AND OTHER WORK OF THE CHURCH, AND TO CULTIVATE THEIR LIBERALITY IN SUPPORTING THE SAME.

There is a general consensus of opinion that the pulpit is the best place in which to do this work. "When the pulpit gets truly alive the pew will soon awaken." Then after this, the distribution of missionary literature, the accounts of their work given by labourers in the home and foreign field, the visits of the agents of the several schemes, and addresses from workers are named. Most neid, the visite of the agents of the several schemes, and addresses from workers are named. Most emphatic testimony is borne to the importance of workers in the home and foreign fields giving information in regard to their work, and it is to be hoped that in the interests of the work they will not neglect this duty. Perhaps it is modesty that keeps some of them from doing this work, or thoughtlessness, or lack of interest in the work of pastors, but whatever the cause it is a hindrance to the extension of the mission work of the Church. Some of them are occasionally very free in their criticism of the way in which congregations spend their money, but if they do not think their work worth a little paper and ink and time, how can they expect others to think it worth dollar bills. No right principled Christian is dependent on the reports of missionaries for the consecration of his substance to the cause of missions; but he is of necessity, as a steward of God, greatly dependent on these reports for the particular direction in which his money ought to go; and all experience proves that Christian liberality on behalf of missions is deepened by the spread of information. Our workers would greatly extend and consolidate their work, if they attended not only to the Apostolic practice of preaching the Gospel, but also of "REHARING TO THE CHURCH ALL THINGS THAT GOD HAD DONE WITH THEM." Our people do not want theories and essays on modes of work, but they do desire to have definite ideas as to the work that is being done. whether in the home or the foreign field are the eyes as well as the hands of the Church, and without their reports the Church walks in darkness.

IV. -THE DISCHARGE OF PARENTAL DUTIES AND THE CULTIVATION OF FAMILY RELIGION.

The statements under this heading are very varied and very cautious, but from every part of the Church, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, comes the unwelcome testimony that the state of religion in the home is not satisfactory. There are a few bright spots, but again and again such statements as these occur:—"Parents do not sufficiently realize their duties." "They are more and more inclined to shift their work on to the Church workers." Old-time fireside evenings and home readings and solid conversation have almost died out." "Family worship is very general, yet

Too many think they have done all when they send their children to Sabbath school. Especially in the "fee family religion is superceded by the ever increasing demands of social, philanthropic, lite-y, musical, and theatrical engagements; and c. the other hand, men and women, boys and girls, pray and sing and exhort and read so much in public that the old home is no more vocal with praise and prayer." At a gathering of ministers, one of them, who had a considerable acquaintance with many parts of Canada, put the question:—"With all the machinery which is now at work in the Sabbath school and different societies, do the young people know their Bibles as well as the old?" The unanimous answer was "No!" The greatest need of the Church to-day is a Christian home, and earnest, religious instruction from fathers and mothers. It has been said that a pound of nother is worth a ton of minister, and in harmony with this a Christian woman said the other day that the greatest need of Canada was PIOUS MOTHERS. This witness is true. The best work for God is done in the home. There is great danger of forgetting this in the whirl of outside engagements; and while we are thankful for all the good that is done by the Sabbath school and other organizations, it is plain that the fear that their existence would lead in some measure to the neglect of parental duty is by no means unfounded; and there is the utmost need, throughout the whole Clurch, of emphasizing the truth, that nothing can excuse the absence of parental training in the knowledge and fear of the Lord. We need to be stirred up to realize our sin and our danger in this respect, I any orelence is to be given to these returns, it is plain that throughout the whole Church there ic cause for the deepest humiliation

V .- THE SERVICES RENDERED BY ASSOCIATIONS OF THE WOMEN OF THE CHURCH AND OTHER ORGANIZATIONS,

From every quarter witness is borne to the great and good service done by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. In all the work of the Church women are among the most zealous and efficient labourers. The Young People's Society of Christian Endeavour is also spoken of with much favour. "Their meetings are good. They are looked forward to with pleasure and engaged in with delight." Nothing is more delightful than to see the young banded together for the study of God's word and the carrying on of Christian work, and so long as they are loyal to Christand His word the results will only be good. But all experience shows that wise guidance is essential to good success; hence the importance of all such organizations being under the authority of Sessions, and under the leadership of such persons as Session, approve.

VI.—THE EMPLOYMENT OF SPROIAL AGENCIES AND THE RESULTS; EFFORTS MADE TO REACH THE CARELESS AND NON-CHURCH-GOERS, THE INTEMPERATE, ETC.; HUMANE AND BENEVOLENT WORKS,

In a few cases special services have been held with gratifying results. In one case the result was reported to be very unsatisfactory. As a rule the most marked characteristic of the year's work has been a dependence on ordinary means and agencies. "Personal dealing is strongly recommended as the best means of gaining the careless for the kingdom of Christ." Little information is given on other points, but there is good reason for believing that all philanthropic efforts are heartily supported by our people. Sometimes it is complained indeed that while liberal in our support of benevolent institutions we are too casy in allowing the management of these institutions to slip into the hands of those who give little towards their support, and yet with supreme self-complacency talk of us as "Dissenters!" There is need of watchfulness in this direction.

VII.—CAUSES WHICH OPERATE AGAINST SPIRITUAL PROGRESS AND THE DEVELOPMENT OF CHRISTIAN CHARACTER.

The list of these sent in is so great that they considerably out-number the letters of the alphabet, therefore, we have arranged them alphabetically. Only in two instances have the returns been paraphrased to fit a letter; in all other cases the exact words of the reports are given.

In this long list there is one which, perhaps, covers more ground than any other, viz., THE LOVE OF PLEASURE. Among those who call themselves Christians these returns prove that many are leavers of pleasure rather than lovers of God. They have a form of godifiness, but they dony its power. They have practically anticipated the revision of creeds, and have made the first question of their new Shorter Catechism to run thus—"What is the chief end of man? Man's chief end is to have a good time." Some ministers have subscribed to this new creed. One report says that representative ministers of our Church encourage such things as dancing and earl parties, wine suppers and theatricals. In some places the character of the Sabbath evening service is so altered that the public has come to call them "Sunday pops." A free concert and a goody goody talk would be a fair description of some Sunday evening services.

The men who run some congregations have adopted the new creed, and seem to think that their main duty is to cater to the amusement of the public. What is the state of religion in any congregation whose minister preaches up the motto, "Enjoy youself and don't get hurt," whose services are an accommodation to the taste of the crowd, whose socials are baits for the giddy and frivolous, reply, Ram's and whose chief reward is a paragraph in the newspapers? Let the "Ram's Horn" repless religion there is in a church the more cysters and ice cream it takes to run it." Truth, Horn!" and you might turn your latter clause into an algebraic formul. and make O. + I. C.=

Attractions for the carnal heart. Hosts of young men have subscribed the new creed. In the summer they deliberately select resorts where they can, with the greatest ease, throw off all the restraints of religion and descerate the Lord's day with impunity. Then, in the winter they find plonty of time, and money too, for all sorts of pleasure, but they have no time to study the Bible or visit the sick, or teach in the Sabbath school, or come to a religious meeting. Sometimes they are so exhausted by their pleasureseeking as not to be able to go to church once on the Lord's day to go twice would be a violation of their principles.

Middle-aged men have subscribed it, and as Pleasure means t them the gathering of gold, they rise early and go to bed late, and drive hard bargains, and tell bushels of lies, and go over their

books on Sundays, to amass and retain their filthy lucre.

Politicians have subscribed it. To gain their own ends they will wade through the filthiest mire till they are besmirched to the eyes. As one report puts it, "Our country is cursed and dishonoured by political corruption carried on so systematically as to be a fine [?] art. There is much

reason to fear that many have their consciences so debauched in political matters as to be unable now to distinguish between good and evil."

Drunkards have subscribed it. They seek their pleasure and drown dull care in the flowing bowl. Profligates have subscribed it. Pleasure means to them sensuality. Unbelievers of all kinds have subscribed it, for they say, with Ingersoll, "I will believe nothing that makes me feel

uncomfortable." The whole tenor of the reports shows that the Church is surrounded by many and subtle influences whereby her work is sought to be hindered; but if she is faithful to her high calling she has nothing to fear, for abundant evidence is also given that the Gospel is still the power of God unto salvation. Helding forth and holding fast the Word of Life, the Lord will still add to her such as are being saved.

In considering this whole matter, and in coming to any conclusion in regard to the actual state of religion in any given place or time, the conviction is pressed in upon us that there is great need of that gift of the great Head of the Church called "The discerning of spirits," and perhaps it may be profitable as a guido and as a corrective to any estimate we may be disposed to make, to place in parallel columns two reports on the State of Religion in these last days; that on the left given by the imagination of man, that on the right given by the Spirit of God.

APPENDIX No. 20.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

I. STATISTICS AND FINANCE.

Your Committee beg leave to report that returns have been received from every Presbytery except that of Newfoundland. They have much satisfaction in stating that, although in one or two cases seriously lacking, the statistics are nearly all of the year 1891. Only in one case were the

cases seriously lacking, the statistics are nearly all of the year 1891. Only in one case were the figures of the previous year incorporated, but their effect is inappreciable in the general result. The Presbyteries of Halifax, Wallace, Pictou, Lunenburg and Bhelburne, Lanark and Renfrew, Whitby, Huron, Maitland, Calgary, and Columbia, have returns from all their schools—ten perfect as against three last year. Only one is omitted in Montreal and Saugeen. An inspection of the third column in Appendix II, will show what Presbyteries have a bad pre-eminence by reason of defect.

As nearly as can be ascertained there are 1,974 Sabbath schools on the rolls of Presbyterial Sabbath school conveners. We may safely say, in round numbers, that there are over 2,000 in connection with the Church. The reported increase is 111. Answers, more or less complete, have been received from 1,653, which is 128 more than last year. The delinquents are 17 fewer, but their number is still inexcusably large. When the static loss of a school are carelessly kept, we have good reason to suspect a lack of that conscientious thorouganess and well-ordered arrangement which are essential to successful Sabbath school work. essential to successful Sabbath school work.

ATTENDANCE.

Officers and Teachers. -- The whole number reported is 15,617 (a decrease of 23). Seeing that 202 more schools have returned answers, it is quite evident that the ranks of our Sabbath school workers have not been sufficiently recruited during the past year. The estimated total of 17,000 must still stand unchanged. The everage attendance of 12,986, or 834 per cent., exhibits commendable increase of fidelity, being 63 per cent. above the rate of last year. More than four-fifths of our teachers are in their places every Sabbath day.

Scholars.—The total number of scholars is 136,731. Allowing, as last year, for unreported schools, at the rate of 20 each, we shall have a grand total of 143,800. Returns are received from 198 more schools than in 1891, and the aggreeate increase is 2,639. The average attendance of scholars is 90,200, or 66 per cent. This ratio is no improvement upon that of last year. Serious blame attaches somewhere when more than one-third of our enrolled scholars are absent every Sabbath. New scholars are received to the scholar way and their sources. Sabbath. New scholars are reported by 887 schools, 205 more than last year, and their aggregate number is 12,749. The returns under this last head are so unsatisfactory that your Committee recommended that the question be changed to "What is the net increase (or decrease) in total membership."

RECITATIONS.

Scripture. -- While there are 717 more reported as memorizing Scripture than appeared last year, soripure.—While there are 71' more reported as memorizing Scripture than appeared tast year, and returns are received from 120 more schools, we cannot find that the recentage has increased in the slightest degree. If we assume, what must be very near the truth, that the 1,053 schools heard from contain one-half the estimated scholars, namely, 71,900, we shall see that the number engaged in this important exercise includes but 64 per cent. of those above the infant class. The Committee would again earnestly call the attention of the Assembly and the Church to this eminous neglect of the Bible as the Sabbath school text-book.

Shorter Catechism. - Seventy-two per cent, of the total number of schools reporting, i.e., 1,189, Shorter Catechism.—Seventy-two per cent, of the total number of schools reporting, i.e., 1,189, state that 51,757 scholars habitually recite the Shorter Catechism. Assuming that these schools contain 72 per cent, of the scholars, and that one-fifth are so young that they could not be expected to study it, we find that only 66 per cent. (14 per cent, less than last year) are, even in the most superficial manner, making themselves familiar with our unrivalled epitome of Bible dectrine. The figures given show a decrease of 1,015, and this corroborates our calculations. When we turn to the next column and find that only 327 schools (37 less than last year) were able to report any scholars as having reviewed the whole Catechism within twelve months; that the total number thus presumably refreshing their memories is only 3,663; and that this is a decrease of 68 since last year, we have a right to suspect that some causes are in operation tending to drive the Catechism out of we have a right to suspect that some causes are in operation tending to drive the Catechism out of our schools altogether. One-third of our schools altogether. One-third of our scholars never touch it, and not one in thirty reviews it even yearly. Taking both these columns together and comparing their testimony with that given last year we cannot avoid the conclusion that there is a growing neglect of doctrinal teaching.

Home Preparation.—The Committee note with pleasure the marked improvement in this particular—50,176 scholars (an increase of 2,964) are reported by 1,016 schools as preparing their lessons at home. The Home Study Leaflet is designed chiefly to assist both teacher and scholar in this duty.

Teachers' Meetings.—The question at the head of this column has not been asked for since eight years ago and owing to the absence of fully tabulated statistics at that time we are unable to institute a full comparison. In 1884 there were 22 teachers' meetings in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, now there are 50; in the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa there were 24, now there are 37; in 1883 the Synod of Hamilton and London reported 27, now it has 56. Throughout all our Synods there now held 226 meetings for lesson study, i.e., in connection with about one-ninth of our Sabbath schools. In some cities and towns union meetings are held, and these are largely attended by Presbyterians.

The sublect of the teacher's prenaration of the lesson has occupied much of the attention of your The subject of the teacher's preparation of the lesson has occupied much of the attention of your committee and a method is proposed, in connection with the scheme of *Higher Religious Instruction*, whereby the weekly meeting of teachers may acquire new importance and efficiency.

CHURCH RELATIONS.

Elders.—2,270 elders are engaged in 1,138 schools. Allowing for unreported schools we may safely say that 2,900, or 48 per cent. of the total eldership, stand in the ranks of our Sabbath school workers. This is a slight increase above last year.

Public Worship.—Seventy-seven per cent. of the schools reporting make an entry in this column. Assuming, therefore, that the total given (51,655) is 77 per cent. of the whole number of our scholars habitually present at divine service, we find that less than 50 per cent. of our enrolled scholars wait upon the stated services of the Church. This is exactly the conclusion arrived at last year and it may be relied upon as true.

Catechumens.—A communicants' class is reported in connection with 114 schools (an increase of 9). The remarkable growth of Young People's Societies having for their avowed and exclusive aim the promotion of religious life renders more imperative than ever the duty of imparting full and definite instruction in regard to the covenant relation of baptized children and their sacramental obligations and privileges.

New Communicants. -3,965 have been added to the communion rolls of churches from the Sabbath school. If we make a slight allowance for the 321 unreported schools we may say that 4,000 scholars have made a profession of their faith during 1891. This will not be more than 37 or 38 per cent. of the whole number thus added. We may take some encouragement from the fact that a slight improvement upon the figures of last year is manifest, but we have no reason to abate our solicitude in regard to the wide gap here disclosed between the Sabbath school and the com-

Communicant Scholars.—Your Committee have hesitated to place upon their schedule the question "How many young people of school age are not in attendance upon the Sabbath school?" because it seemed to recognize an age limit in connection with the Sabbath school. They regard it rather as an institution for the instruction of the whole Church in Bible truth, and that none should prize it more highly than those who have entered upon the consecrated life of a professed Christian. It should be more persistently inculcated that every communicant member of the Church is under the strongest obligation to attend the meeting for catechetical instruction commonly called the Sabbath school. With renewed pleasure, therefore, we note from the returns of 1,121 schools (an increase of 131) that 14,920 communicants (an increase of 648) are enrolled in our senior classes as Bible students. May their number still increase. Bible students. May their number still increase.

CONTRIBUTIONS.

Total Amount.—873,794 (an increase of \$8,201) have been raised for all purposes. Of the 1,653 schools reporting, 346 give no financial returns. Add to these the 321 which sent no reports and we have 667, or one third of the whole number, regarding whose finances we have no information. Employing only the figures given, the average per member is 48 cents, an increase of 2 cents over last year. It is a matter of regret that returns under this head are so defective. While examining the figures received, one is impressed with the conviction that the finances of many of our schools are managed in a vary unbusinessible manager. are managed in a very unbusinesslike manner.

Expended on Sabbath schools.—836,338 (an increase of \$2,387) have been expended on 1,110 schools (an increase of 155). We also note, at this point, the evidence of the last column, which testifies that the number of congregations contributing towards the support of the Sabbath school is fewer by six, and the aggregate amount given less by \$806. Something more than paper recommendations, even coming from the Supreme Court, is necessary before our churches will do their duty towards the support of the Sabbath school.

Schemes of the Church.—The contributions to the Schemes of the Church amount to \$27,801 (a decrease of \$503) from 683 schools (an increase of 47), and are at the rate of 23 cents per member, an increase of 4 cents over last year. We note with surprise the very large falling off in the column for Foreign Missions (\$1,070), and confess that we are quite unable to account for it. It appears to be nearly uniform over the whole Church, so that we must either attribute it to a generally diminished interest in missions, which is incredible, or to some cause operating over the whole Church by which the contributions of our schools are credited to some other agency. We would suggest that some of the deficit may be found in the increased contributions of Mission Bands. The number of schools reported in this column is 30 less than last year, and the total number, 380, is not one-fifth of the whole number of schools in the Church.

SUMMARY.

We note briefly the following facts revealed by our Statistics and calling for serious consideration: (1) The imperfect returns, arising mainly from cardlessness in recording facts from week to week, betraying loose methods and slack discipline. (2) The inadequate supply of teachers, suggesting a lack of moral earnestness and self-denial on the part of our Church members so far as their relation to the Sabbath school is concerned. (3) The low average attendance of scholars, suggesting many sources of weakness in connection with the home and Church training of the young. (4) The too general neglect of storing the minds of the young with the life-giving words of Scripture. No amount of explanation about the lesson can supply the place, for future life, of a memory which readily recalls the devotional and practical passages of the Bible. (5) The decreasing attention given to the study of the Shorter Catechism. Our Church is on the "down grade" here. (6) Neglect of the stated services of the Church, for which the Church is perhaps as much to blame as the home or the Sabbath school. (7) The small proportion of new communicants received from the Sabbath school showing that to many of our return people leave the school before them. from the Sabbath school, showing that too many of our young people leave the school before they

have been led to give themselves to the Lord.

On the other hand our figures furnish much reason for encouragement. (1) That our Statistics are so full and fresh. A marked improvement is manifested every year. They are beyond comparison with those of eight or ten years ago. (2) That our schools grow proportionately to the growth of the Church, showing that ministers and missionaries are alive to their importance. (3) That our teachers exhibit such conscientionness in the performance of their duties as evidenced with the higher newsence attendence. (3) That our teachers exhibit such conscientiousness in the performance of their duties as evidenced by the higher average attendance. (4) That greater attention is given by scholars to the preparation of the lesson at home. (5) That teachers' meetings for lesson study are becoming more common. The Committee's cheme for increasing their efficiency is given under Higher Religious Instruction. (6) That such a large proportion of our elders are giving the weight of their character, wisdom and mature experience to the work of the Sabbath school. (7) That more of our communicant members are found amongst our Sabbath school scholars. The gap between the Church and the school will never be closed until the Church comes into the school. (8) That, on the whole, our Sabbath schools are growing in liberality. The seed sown now will bear fruit in coming years. All departments of the Church's finances will share the fruits.

II.—HIGHER RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

This scheme is, we believe, commending itself more and more to our Sabbath schools. Wherever it has been faithfully pursued the best results have been attained, but, like everything else, it must be used in order to be of any use. There is no royal road to efficiency in Bible study, any more than in secular learning. Our scheme proposes work—thorough and persistent work—with an end in view, along clearly defined lines. It concentrates attention upon cardinal topics, and proposes methods of study with due recognition of diligence at the end. This is the whole scheme in a word. It is an attempt to elevate the Sabbath school as an educational institution. Of the necessity fo this we need say nothing after the facts disclosed by our statistical returns.

The total number who studied under the scheme last year was 737, and of these 393 presented themselves at the examination. The day proved exceedingly stormy over the whole of the Dominion, and La Grippe laid its heavy hands impartially upon examiners and candidates. Your convener was, through illness, unable to issue the question papers on the day appointed, so that a postponement was necessary. All these causes abundantly account for the decreased number of candidates. One most interesting feature of the last examination is the appearance upon our list of nine One most interesting feature of the last examination is the appearance upon our list of nine pupils in the mission school at Ujiain, Indore. These are all heathen, or at least not Christians. The same papers were sent to them as were used in Canada, and the answers were written in Hindi or Urdu. One senior candidate wrote in English upon "The Kings of Judah," and his papers were sent to the convoner who placed them in the hands of the Rev. Thos. Stewart, M.A., Dartmouth, N.S., for examination. In his report Mr. Stewart says: "I am sure that any one who reads the papers of No. 92 must be struck with the excellence of it. The writer (I dare not use the pronoun for I cannot guess the sex) shows a marked acquaintance with the history—a knowledge of facts in some cases outside of the text-book, and evidently obtained from the Bible itself. The few quaint idioms used only add to the impression made by the correctness of the answers." For the rest of the papers the Rev. J. Fraser Campbell, of Mhow, was appointed examiner, and his report has not vet come to hand. One cannot but feel that a new and bleasant bond has been formed between our et come to hand. Omitting the candidates from Ujjain, 231 entered in the Biblical department, of whom 5 took medals, 24 prizes, and 136 diplomas; in the Doctrinal, 63 appeared, of whom 1 took a medal, 13 prizes, and 41 diplomas; in Church History, 2 receive medals, 13 prizes and 16 diplomas, out of a total of 33. Amongst the essayists, 12 receive medals, 23 prizes, and 21 diplomas, out of a total of 57. In all 20 medals, 73 prizes, and 214 diplomas—307 out of 384—are taken. The quality of the answers is rapidly improving. In 1890, 51 per cent. of the candidates obtained diplomas; in 1891, *33 per cent.; and this year 80 per cent. are successful. DEPARTMENT V .- TEACHERS' COURSE.

A .- A weekly study of the International Sabbath School Lessons.

B.-A supplementary course covering three years.

First Year, 1893.—The principles and practice of Teaching as applied to Sabbath schools. Text Book, "The Sabbath School Teachers' Handbook," by Thomas Morrison, M.A., LL.D., Principal of the Free Church Training School, Glasgow.

Second Year, 1894.—Christian Evidences. Text Book. "A Primer of Christian Evidence," by R. A. Redford, Professor of Systematic Thoology and Apologetics, New College, London. One of the International Sabbath School Normal Text Books.

Third Year, 1895.—"The Bible the Sabbath School Teachers' Text Book," by Alfred Holborn, M.A. One of the International Sabbath School Normal Text Books.

M.A. One of the International Sabbath School Normal Text Books.

It is proposed in connection with this course to issue a "Sabbath School Teachers' Preparation Leafet," with an examination paper at the close of every quarter. Each year a certificate will be given to those who have successfully pursued its allotted studies, and at the end of three years the annual certificates will be exchanged for the diploma. No prizes or medals will be given in this department. It is also intended that the supplementary course shall occupy but six months of the year, so that the only work to be followed up during the whole year is the "sekly preparation of the lesson. Further, the suggestion is made that the most competent persons in each school, or congregation, should be assigned special work in the study of special departments of the lesson, such as lesson outlines suited to the teaching of the several grades of scholars, exegetical and verbal difficulties, geography. Manners and customs, doctrines, etc. ties, geography, manners and customs, doctrines, etc.

III.-HOME STUDY LEAFLET.

In accordance with a suggestion made in last year's report, your Committee have begun the publication of a weekly question paper with the above title. Specimen copies are distributed for examination. It has received the warm commendation of such eminent S. S. educationists as Mr. Wm. Reynolds, Mr. W. F. Crafts, Dr. Jas. A. Worden. President W. R. Harper and Dr. S. H. Kellogg. Over 3,000 copies are new subscribed for and the list continues to grow. It will be self-supporting. If faithfully used both by teacher and scholar it will promote the daily reading of the Bible in the line of the lesson topic, and the study of the lesson in the light of the Bible itself; it will train the scholar in accurate and comprehensive knowledge of the text, and enlist the co-operation of parents. It requires the use of the Bible and catechism (not the lesson leaf) in the Sabbath school, and calls for the memorizing of scripture and catechism in such portions as may be prescribed by the tencher. It keeps before the scholar the obligation to be present, with lessons prepared, every Sabbath, and secures the preparation of lessons by absentee scholars. It trains to systematic giving; it informs the teacher at once of any serious cause of absence and constrains him to visit absentees without delay. It awakens an honourable and healthful emulation amongst members of a class; enables a teacher to judge more correctly of the mental capacity and general disposition of a scholar and reveals to thoughtful teachers the weak points of their own work. In fine, it supplies a new link between the teacher, the scholar and the home. We freely acknowledge that it calls for conscientions and persistent effort on the part of both teacher and scholar, but there is no other road than through painstaking to highest and most enduring results. The unsatisfactory state of our Sabbath schools as teaching institutions is mainly due to indolence and misdirected energy.

Beginning with the June number, the Leaftet directs attention to one or more of the questions of the Shorter Catechism as assigned to the dootrinal department for the year. In order to secure the result of their labour for the Church, the convener of the sub-Committee copyrighted it, not for himself, although the author of it, but on behalf of the Committee. It is held by him precisely as are the Hymnals, or the Home Study Leaflet, by those whose names stand upon them. It is freely donated to the Committee, and all profits from its sale go into their funds. Your Committee had the book printed and laid before the Assembly at Ottawa in 1890. stand upon them. It is freely donated to the Committee, and all profits from its sale go into their funds. Your Committee had the book printed and laid before the Assembly at Ottawa in 1890. It was "remitted to the Committee carefully to examine said Handbook and report to next Assembly." In order that all who desired might have an opportunity of leisurely examining it, a cheap edition was published. This was brought before the Assembly at Kingston last year, with the renewed recommendation that "it be approved and recommended as useful guide in matters pertaining to the Sabbath school." Very hastily, and, we believe, under a total misapprehension of the facts of the case, the Assembly struck out this recommendation without discussing the merits of the work. The Committee felt unjustly rebuffed for doing patiently, and at a cost of much thought and labour to one of them at least, exactly what they had been instructed to do. After such a decision, your Committee did not feel justified in incurring the expense necessary to place the book again in the hands of members of Assembly. Copies may be procured from the convener, at the price of 15 cents each, by any who wish to examine it. It has been submitted to a large number of most competent judges, and their opinions will be found on a sheet accompanying this report. It is hoped that this array of testimony will give the Assembly sufficient confidence in the work to enable it to adopt the recommendation regarding it, namely, that the Committee be authorized to publish the work with these words on the title page: "Prepared for and recommended by the Committee on Sabbath Schools of the Presbyterian Church in Canada." By this the Assembly is not officially committed to an approval of all, or indeed of any, of the statements or methods, advanced in the book.

V.—FINANCES.

V .- FINANCES.

When the Lord has work for His people to do, we may rely upon Him for money with which to carry it on. Our part is simply to plan as wisely as we can, with modesty, yet not unworthily, when the cause demands generous treatment. In this faith your Committee have gone forward, and they have not been disappointed. Our growing expenses have been met by growing liberality, not indeed commensurate with our full requirements, but following these at a distance not so great as to cause serious anxiety, yet sufficient to keep us alive to the necessity of using means for raising funds, as well as prayer that these might be forthcoming. An inspection of the Financial Statement appended will show the sources of our income and the objects for which it has been disbursed. The Committee have to thank the Rev. P. M. M. rison, Agent of the Church at Halifax, for coming to their relief when funds were low a year ago, and they regret that they have not yet been able to refund the amount then advanced. Your Committee respectfully submit that the time has come when the work under their charge should be supported, as is that of other committees, from the general resources of the Church. Mr. Morrison's generous action points out the way in which the Convener should obtain relief from personal liability.

The Committee are also of opinion that congregations, as well as Sabbath schools, should be furnished with an opportunity of contributing towards the prosecution of this work. They therefore recommend that a coller' in be taken up, not only in Sabbath schools, but also in congregations on the last Sabbath of September. They are aware that the stated collection for Colleges is appointed for the Sabbath immediately praceding, but since many congregations collect for the Schemes of the Church without regard to the days assigned by the Assembly, and since the sum required by the Committee is comparatively small, and will really be made up by a limited number of congregations, they do not think that the one collection will interfere with t

VI.-RECOMMENDATIONS.

The following are the recommendations as finally adopted:

1.-That question No. 9 in the schedule of the returns from schools be changed to "What is the net increase (or decrease) in total membership?"

2.—That the Teachers' course proposed be added to the Syllabus as a Fifth Department and that the Committee be authorized to prepare the regulations, etc., necessary for carrying it out.

3.—That the Home Study Leaflet be recommended as a useful help in the preparation of the

5. That the General Assembly cordially recommend to Sabbath Schools to contribute to the Sabbath School Committee an amount sufficient to meet current expenses and to liquidate the debt of \$261.53 incurred by the Committee.

6.—That it be a recommendation to the congregations of the Church, to take up a collection in aid of the Sabbath School Committee's funds on the last Sabbath of September, the day already fixed by the General Assembly as a day of special prayer on behalf of the Sabbath Schools of the Church.

REGULATIONS.

1. Examinations will be held at as many places in each Presbytery as the convenience of candidates may require; in every Sabbath school if desired. Presiding examiners will be appointed to make necessary local arrangements and superintend the examination.

nake necessary local arrangements and superintend the examination.

2. Examinations will be held simultaneously on the day and at the hour named for each paper 3. Question papers will be sent to any minister, Sabbatis school superintendent, teacher or other responsible person who shall apply to the convener for them before January 16th, 1893. In the requisition the candidates must be classified according to the grades (Junior, Intermediate or Senior) of the departments in which they wish to be examined. (See Regulation 5.) It is not necessary to send names, as the coupon returned after the examination will contain all the particulars required for enrolment. The applicant will be held responsible for the proper observance of all according and must either if not a candidate, act as presiding examiner, or suggest the name of regulations, and must either, if not a candidate, act as presiding examiner, or suggest the name of some trustworthy person, whose consent has been obtained, for appointment to that duty. Question papers cannot be issued to any candidates whose names do not reach the convener before January 16th, as after that date parcels will be made up for Presiding Examiners.

4. Candidates may enter in any of the prescribed departments, but are recommended to limit themselves to one, or at most two. When the same work is prescribed for successive, or subsequent years, as in the doctrinal and historical departments, no second diploma, prize or medal will be given for it to anyone, nor will a medallist be eligible for a prize. Successful candidates of a previous year are not excluded from entering, but if the work is the same stat on which they were formerly examined they must take a higher standing, i. e., a former diplomist must obtain at least 75 per cent. on the second occasion and a prize-winner at least 90 per cent., in order to receive recognition.

5. Candidates between ten and fifteen years of age will rank as Junior; those aged hitteen and under twenty as Intermediate, and those twenty years of age and older as Senior. Ages to be reckoned as on January 28th, 1893.

6. Candidates obtaining 90 per cent. of the full marks in any department will be entitled to a

silver medal; those obtaining 75 per cent. of the full marks in any department will be entitled to a book prize; and all candidates who obtain 50 per cent. will be entitled to a diploma.

7. The value of each paper will be 200, and two hours will be allowed for writing the answers.

8. One question paper for the whole Church will be set on each subject, and copies forwarded under sealed covers, to the Presiding Examiners. The covers shall not be removed till the candidates are assembled, and the written answers shall be covered and sealed for transmission to the convener of the Assembly's Committee before the candidates leave the place of examination. The packages must be posted thereafter without delay.

DEPARTMENT IV .- ESSAYS.

APPENDIX No. 21.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING FUND FOR 1891.

The operations of the Board for the past year were the largest in its history, assistance having been given towards the erection of 42 different structures. Six of these were manses and 36 churches. Two of the churches were built before, but the business connected with their erection was not completed till now. Thirty-three of the church edifices are new, and one church has been enlarged. The value of these churches and manses was estimated at \$60,025, exclusive of the lots on which they stand; and the assistance voted by the B = 2. \$14 145, of which \$2,435 was by way of grants, to fifteen structures, and \$12,010, by way of \(\text{i.i.m.} \) are repaid in instalments. Two of the buildings are stone, two brick, two log, and the rest frame. As in former years, the grants were made to new or struggling missions, for the most part, and in \(\text{i.i.m.} \) lamounts. Of the congregations helped three are in the Presbytery of Winnipeg, fou. in \(\text{I.o.} \) Lake, eight in Brandon, five in Minnedosa, seven in Regina, six in Calgary and nine \(\text{i.o.} \) lambda. These figures will be seen greatly in advance of those last year, when only 15 churches were "ailt."

IMMAULED STATEMENT.

The following detailed statement will show where churches and manses have been built, and so enable the church to estimate where the work of Church extension is most active. For convenience they are arranged under Presbyteries. Of the Presbyteries, four embrace Manitoba, part of Ontario and part of the Territories, one is exclusively in the Territories, another is in the Territories in part and part in British Columbia, while the Presbytery of Columbia lies wholly within the boundaries of that Province.

PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG.

Dominion City is on the Emerson branch of the C. P. Ry., 55 miles from Winnipeg. Congregation recently called paster and doing well. Village supported by a good country; manse, \$700; loan \$350.

Morris.—About 40 miles south of Winnipeg, on C. P. Ry. and N. P. and Man. Ry; surrounded by a good country. Manse cost \$800; loan 250.

Marquette.—Thirty-miles west of Winnipeg, on main line of the C. P. Ry. Good district; church costing \$1,300; additional loan \$50.

PRESBYTERY OF ROCK LAKE.

Thornhill.—Station on Pembina Mt. branch C. P. Ry., eight miles west of Morden. Good farming district. Church costing \$1,425; lean \$600.

Roscisle.—Farming and ranching district, 16 miles west of Carman. Railway recently passed through settlement, giving market. Mission growing. Church cost \$1,100; grant \$100.

Belmont.—Station on N. P. & M. Ry., 40 miles south-east of Brandon; surrounded by a good farming country. Church cost \$1,500; loan \$600, of which \$500 given by congregation of Glencoe and \$100 by Geo. Hay, Esq., Ottawa.

Crystal City.—Village on Pem. Mt. branch C. P. Rv., five miles west of Pilot Mound, surrounded by a fine farming and grazing country. Church cost \$1,700; loan \$700.

Hartney lies south-east of Brandon, in the Souris river district. Fine wheat country. Village growing; population as yet not large. Church cost \$3,000; loan \$600.

Nesbit.—Station on the Glenboro' branch, west of the Souris river, and about 25 miles southeast of Brandon. Village surrounded by a good country. Church cost \$1,600; loan \$500.

THE RECORD FOR TEN YEARS.

It is now ten years since the General Assembly appointed the Board in charge of church erection It is now ten years since the General Assembly appointed the Board has helped to erect 180 churches and 30 manses, or an average of 21 buildings a year. During the ten years preceding the organization of the Board, only 15 churches were built, and not one manse. If during the past ten years the work of the Church has made rapid strides in Western Canada, the Board, without boasting, believes the success was in some measure due to the aid given towards the erection of churches and manses, There is not a village of any size on any line of railway between Lake Superior and the Pacific, for which this Board has not helped to provide a place of worship. The erection of churches and manses has supplied our missionaries with homes, and our congregations and missions with the requisite accommodation for the prosecution of Sunday school and other necessary wer; it has given visibility to religion, taken possession of the ground for Christ, and given hope and imparted courage to people who were beginning life under new, and in some cases, adverse conditions.

ADDITIONAL REVENUE.

In accordance with the permission granted by the last General Assembly, efforts were put forth to increase the capital of the Board, and nearly one-fourth of the sum aimed at, \$45,000, has been subscribed. The Board expects to raise fully one-third of the amount in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West, and expresses the hope that the Eastern Provinces and the Motherland may provide the balance. It should be borne in mind that, unlike a similar fund in the American Preshyterian Church, this fund receives no collection from the Church, that only very occasionally is it remembered in the wills of the wealthy, and hence it depends almost exclusively on special contributions for its work. Now is the time to halp it. tributions for its work. Now is the time to help it.

SPECIAL DONATIONS.

Some anonymous friend in Scotland sent, through the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland, a contribution of £300 sterling, for which the special thanks of the Board were tendered, and forwarded through the Colonial Committee. The Board earnestly hopes that more of the wealthy men of the Motherland may imitate the example of this generous donor, and so help the work of Church extension in this new land. Thousands of Scotlish immigrants are settling in this country, and no better investment of mission money can be made than in planting religious institutions

country, and no better investment or mission money can be made than in planning religious institutions among them.

The Board has pleasure in reporting that the young people of the Presbyterian Church, Glencoe, Ont., sent a contribution of \$500 in January last. This amount was loaned to the congregation of Belmont to erect a church. The congregation was informed of the source whence the money was received, and asked to correspond with these young people in Glencoe from time to time. When the money is refunded, the Board purposes to loan it again on the same conditions. These young people will thus have the satisfaction of knowing that they are making a distinct and permanent contribution to the work of the Church. Are there not scores of Young People's Societies in the Church who could follow this praiseworthy example?

THE LEGACY OF MRS, NICHOLLS.

There was a report presented to the last General Assembly showing that the late Mrs. Nicholls, of Peterboro', had, among other bequests, left \$10,000 to the Home Mission work of the Church, and "to the Fund for the aid of missions in Manitoba and the North-West Territories of Canada, \$10,000." Dr. Robertson, a member of this Board, informed the Assembly that he had corresponded Nations and the North-West Territories of Canada, \$10,000. The North-West Territories of Canada, \$10,000. The North-West Territories of Canada, \$10,000 specially designated by Mrs. Nicholis for Manitoba and the North-West, was intended, in part at least, to implement this promise. By letters submitted to the Board since the Assembly rose, from the Rev. A. Bell, pastor of Mrs. Nicholis at, and for some time prior to, the time of her death, and also from H. A. Hail, Esq., of Peterboro', the Board became more fully convinced that Mrs. Nicholis intended to aid its work, and that her intention has so far miscarried only through not knowing the legal designation of the Board, or its precise relationship to the Home Mission work of the Church in the West, and the Board consequently notified the Home Mission Committee at its autumn meeting that it would bring this matter before the General Assembly of 1892, with the view of obtaining at least \$5,000, or one-half of the bequest specially designated for Manitoba and the North-West for the work of church erection.

The Board, therefore, in view of all the circumstances, and knowing that the Assembly is fully able to act in the case, respectfully asks the General Assembly to be pleased to instruct the Home Mission Committee (Western Division) to pay over to the Treasurer of this Board the sum of \$5,000, being one-half of the sum specially designated by the late Mrs. Nicholis in her will for Tome Mission work in Manitoba and the North-West Territories.

Apart entirely from what the Board believes to have been the Intention of the testatrix, the record of the work done by the Board constitutes a valid argument for acceding to the request of the Board. Every manse erected in the past saved the funds of the Home Mission Committee, and

Moreover, as will be seen from the Treasurer's statement, the treasury is practically empty, and the Board is face to face with a rapid expansion of Church work. The Board submits the case in confidence to the wisdom of the Assembly.

The financial statement submitted by the Treasurer will show the revenue at the disposal of the Board during the year and its expenditure.

APPENDIX No. 22.

REPORT OF HYMNAL COMMITTEE.

The Hymnal Committee beg to report that during the past year there have been issued of the Church Hymnal and of the Hymnal and Psalter, with and without music, 25,765 copies. These include only 98 copies of the Hymnal and Psalter with tonic-sol-fa notation.

Of the enlarged five cent Sabbath School Hymnal there have been issued during the year 17,542 copies.

The printing of the enlarged harmonized Sabbath-School Hymnel has been completed during the year and 1,332 copies sold. A large number of the old harmonized edition has been presented to Sabbath schools in whose behalf application was made. The new edition is sold at the same price as the old copy—30 cents.

From the Treasurer's Statement, which is appended, it will be seen that there is a balance of \$1,616.26 to the credit of the Committee. Of this amount it is recommended that \$1,200 be allocated to the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.

As the contract for the publication of the Church Hymnals will expire in January next, it is recommended that the Hymnal Committee be authorized to take such steps as they judge bost for their publication in future.

APPENDIX No. 23.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST DECEMBER, 1891.

In presenting to the General Assembly their Report for 1891, your Committee on Statistics would begin by remarking that a meeting of its members was called by the Convener to be held in Guelph in the month of August last, to consider if any changes should be made, either in the way of omission, modification or addition, in the questions that had been sent out to Congregations and Stations for the previous year, so as to render them more complete. In the circular calling the meeting each member was asked if he found it inconvenient to attend-and the probability of this being the case, in a number of instances, will be evident when it is considered that the Committee was composed of representatives from the bounds of different Presbyteries from Halifax to Winnipeg-to send in writing any suggestions he had to offer. None of the members were present at the meeting as called, and only two acknowledged the receipt of the circular, and made any suggestions. One of these proposed the addition of certain questions which at one time had been on the schedule sent out, and the other stated that he regarded the questions in use as satisfactory. In the circumstances the proper course, perhaps, would have been to make no change, but before the slips were printed it was thought advisable, in consequence of representations made, to add a question as to the amount contributed to the Endowment Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers. This fund has been, for some time, one of the Schemes of the Church, and separated from the Ordinary Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers. It has been brought before the people in, at least, some parts of the Western Section of the Church, by special appeal. It has been receiving contributions, some of them large, and the amount is now considerable, although by no means up to that contemplated. It is, it is true, comparatively local, and this fact caused some hesitation regarding the propriety of setting spart a special place for it. However, it was thought advisable that an opportunity should be given for recording the liberality of the Church in the districts over which the canvass has extended, or was yet to extend. As the payments of the subscriptions are to spread over a number of years-say five at least-the question will have to be repeated for some time unless the General Assembly order its withdrawal, or the Committee that may be appointed deem it expedient to cause its discon-

It is one of the orders of the Supreme Court that the reports of Standing Committees should be in readiness to be distributed in printed form at an early sederunt of each annual meeting. To give effect to this order in the case of your Committee it is necessary that the reports of Presbyteries should be in their hands by the beginning of April, to allow of their being revised and compiled so that they be supplied to the printer not later than the beginning of May. Generally, Presbytery Clerks have been seasonable in making their returns, but in some instances there has been delay even after special and repeated applications have been made, thereby causing no small inconvenience, and it should be borne in mind that the delay of even one Presbytery bus the work of compilation, and likewise interferes with the work of the printer and the arrangement of his forms. Such delay cannot be justified by ordinary circumstances. The slips for congregations and the sheets for Presbyteries were issued in time to reach their destination weeks, and even months, before the end of the year. Notice that this had been done was given in papers and periodicals circulated throughout the Church. It must be concluded that they all reached the presons to whom they were addressed, for the Convener received no intlanation of a failure in this respect in any instance. Yet some of the returns came dropping in after the greatest number of them had been received and sent off to the printer. Some had not come to hand till after the beginning of May. The work of compilation was, in consequence, arrested. It is most desirable that all Presbytery Clerks be punctual in the future in the discharge of this service, and that to admit of their being so, Sessions, and managers or deacons of congregations make their reports to Presbyteries as soon as possible of the charge of the very contractive.

The means of ascertaining this have been furnished to the Convener through the kindness of friends in Ottawa who are attending to their Parliamentary duties, and who have sent him copies of the bulletins upon the census that have been published. quire too much time to enter at any length on the consideration of these, or give a digest of them in even the briefest form; there would be danger, too, of incorporating matter foreign to such a report as your Committee are expected to present. It may, however, be remarked generally that it is well-known that the results of the census have been disappointing. The increase in population has nobeen what was anticipated. Your Committee are not concerned with the causes of this. It may be owing in part to the difference between the mode in which the census was taken for the decades ending with 1880 and 1890 respectively. It may be in part owing to a lower birth-rate, and a diminished per centage in the numbers in families. There may have been other causes. Then if we come to the Census of Religious Denominations, it is a matter of notoriety that the figures in the

we come to the Census of Religious Denominations, it is a matter of notoriety that the figures in the Dominion census are not strictly accurate or reliable, not, perhaps, owing to any fault chargeable on the enumerators, but to the fact, singular as it may appear, that not a few of the people cannot state the denomination to which they belong.

In the Dominion census taken in 1831 there were reported 629,280 as belonging to the Presbyterian Church in Canada, or a total of all Presbyterians of 676,171. In the one taken in 1831 and published this present year the number was 755,199 for all Presbyterians; the numbers in the different sections of the body being united, showing an increase of 79,028.

In the Statistical Report now presented by your Committee, that is for 1891, the number of Families is given as 92,483. With an average of five persons and a half to each Family this would give 508,656 individuals, and to these 16,580 have to be added the number of Single Persons on the connected with Families is the Congregations in which they were worshipping making a total constant. not connected with Families in the Congregations in which they were worshipping, making a total

In the Committee's Report for the year ending with March, 1881, the number of Families was reported as 66,036, which, at the same average per family would give 308,1-38 individuals, to which 6,616 Single Persons not reported in connection with Families have to be added, giving a total of 374,764, or a net increase in the decade of 150,472, being a rate of increase of nearly 15,000 each year.

Had there been fuller returns for each of the years the relative values of the two groups of aggregates might not be materially altered, but the aggregates themselves would have been considerably greater, and the true strength of the Church would have appeared to better advantage, but

such is the state of the figures as they have passed through the Committee.

It will be seen that the Dominion Census for the former ten years gives 254,516 more belonging to our Church than the calculation made from the returns of Congregations and Stations through Presbyteries, while that for the latter ter are gives 229,963 more than the returns of the Church

According to the returns in 1.51 there were 525,336 persons belonging to the Church. Is there not then an urgent and loud call for the services of those making a religious profession, and within the pale of the Church to gather in those that are without? Here at their very doors there is a field for Home Mission work. Those in remote and destitute districts of our Dominion must not be forgotten. Our Provinces and Territories must not be allowed to suffer any relaxation of effort to send forth men to labour among them in the Gospel be allowed to suffer any relaxation of effort to send forth men to labour among them in the Gospel of God's Son, or to procure means to enable such to give themselves wholly to that service. But there is an opportunity for Home Mission work within the bounds of every congregation, and there are men and women who are called on to improve it, for every church member and adherent should

Before proceeding to deal with the returns from congregations and stations which have been received, your Committee would present the following summary of answers by Presbyteries to ques-tions sent out to collect information on certain points not provided for in the statistical blanks, or not to be learned from them with the same accuracy.

From these answers it can be stated that there are throughout the Church, 850 pastoral charges (the Presbytery of Regins overlooked this item, so that the number in it requires to be added), 599

mission stations or groups of stations, and 119 vacancies.

On the Rolls of Presbyteries there were the names of 919 ministers, and there were 72 residing in bounds, whose names were not enrolled, making the ministerial strength of the Church very nearly 1000.

During the year there were 62 demissions of pastoral charges; 10 translations from one charge to another in the same bounds, and 32 to charges in other bounds.

In each of the Presbyteries of Hamilton, Chatham and Brandon there are 4 non-reporting congregations, and in six Presbyteries there are 2 each, and in eight 1 each, making 32 in all. It may be said that all congregations and stations close their year with the calendar year. So far as has been ascertained there are only two exceptions. A greater number, however, keep back their returns after their annual meeting so as to include their contributions to the Schemes of the Church taken up after the beginning of the New Year. Ought not these contributions to be reported at the annual meeting, considered and discussed? Are they not a most important and interesting part of congregational affairs?

Only five Prashverties have not a Committee of the contributions.

Only five Presbyteries have not a Committee on Statistics-Toronto, Orangeville, Paris, Huron and Guelph. In these and some others the Clerk does the work.

There are still two Presbyteries in which the columns are not added; these will be seen on referring to the printed tables—Sarnia and Columbia.

Delayed returns, it will be observed, are comparatively few, but there should not be one. One was received days too late to do anything with it. Before long it may be confidently anticipated there will not be a blank or delay in the case of any congregation.

Taking up in the first place, according to the usual practice of the Committee, the STATISTICS, and beginning at the east, it is found that in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces there are 11 Presbyteries with 197 pastoral charges, and 334 churches or stations supplied in connection with these. The following Presbyteries show the same number of churches and stations under pastoral oversight in each of the years 1893 and 1891. Truro, 37; Lunenburg and Shelburne, 38; and Miramichi, 53. The Presbytery of Sydney has increased from 36 to 49; Vallace from 39 to 40; Halifax from 90 to 98. Victoria and Richmond has fallen off from 20 to 19; Victou from 43 to 42; Prince Edward Island from 83 to 78, and St. John from 99 to 87. Total decrease 19, total increase 13,

from 90 to 98. Victoria and Richmond has raisen on from 30 to 15; Fictor 40 to 42; Fillies Edward Island from 83 to 78, and St. John from 90 to 87. Total decrease 19, total increase 13, giving a decrease of 6 throughout the Synod.

The number of Strtings in these churches and strions has increased from 131,265 to 132,583, a gain of 1,318. added on profession, a decrease of 16, and 36 on certificate, a decrease of 39. In the Presbytery of Pictou 219 were added on profession, an increase of 65, and 138 on certificate, a decrease of 1. In the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island 216 were added on profession, a decrease of 8, and 67 on certificate, a decrease of 6. In the Presbytery of Lunenburg and Shelburg 76 were added on profession, and 6 on certificate, an increase of 17 on the former and a decrease of 2 on the latter. In the Presbytery of St. John 263 were added on profession and 105 on certificate, an increase of 103 in the former and 29 on the latter. In the Presbytery of Miramichi 151, a decrease of 52 were added on profession, and 35, a decrease of 18, on certificate. And in the Presbytery of Newtundland 30, an increase of 10, were added on profession, and 10, an increase of 6, were added on certificate. There has been a decrease of 146 in the number of ADULTS baptized. Last year (1890) none were reported for the Presbytery of Lunenburg and Shelburne; this year 6. In Newfoundland there were none for either of the years. That is, 4 Presbyteries increased one each, and 3 three each, 2 decreased by one each, 1 remains the same, and 1 reports none.

The number of Mannes has increased by 4, being reported at 136, while that of RENTED Houses has decreased by 2, being reported at 5. Each of the Presbyteries has Mannes, but in that of Truro there has been a decrease of 1. Sydney with 9 Mannes shows an increase of 2, with 1 Rented House, a decrease of 1, Victoria and Richmond has same number for each year, 7 Mannese and Rented House. So too with Halifax, 22 Mannes, and Wallace 6 Mannes. Pictou has 11 Mannes, an increase of 1 with a decrease of 1 Rented House. Prince Edward Island has the same number, 29, of Mannese each year, with the addition of 1 Rented House in 1891. Lunchung and Shelburne the Manses and year, with the addition of 1 Rented House in 1891. Lunenburg and Shelburne the same both years, 8 Manses. St. John an increase of 2 Manses, making now 15, and 1 Rented House, a decrease of 1. Miramichi and Newfoundland the same for both years, namely, the former 15 Manses and 1 Rented House, the latter 2 Manses.

Six Manses were Bullt—the Presbyteries of Halifax and Prince Edward Island, 2 each; St. John and Miramichi, 1 each—altogether an increase of 4 on the preceding year. Nine Churches were built, 3 in Sydney, 2 in Halifax, and 1 each in Wallace, Prince Edward Island, Lunenburg and Shelburne and St. John—6 fewer than in 1890. A Hall was erected in Victoria and Richmond.

Next in order is the SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA, with same number of Presbyteries

reported the previous year, namely 6.

In the number of Churches and Stations supplied by pastors there has been an increase of 6. the two Preshyteries of Quebec, and Lanark and Kenfrew report the same number for each year, 26 and 49 respectively; Montreal with 56, gives an increase of 2; Ottawa with 54, an increase of 6, and B. ockville with 34, an increase of 1. On the other hand, Glengarry, 28, shows a decrease of 3.

There has been an aggregate increase on the number of SITTINGS of only 85, fewer than was to

be expected from the increase of churches and stations. In the Presbytery of Quebec there is a decrease of 100, the number being 7,150; in that of Glengarry of 290, the full number being 10,725; in that of Lanark and Renfrew of 375, on 13,200, and in that of Brockville of 995 on 8,363. In 4 Presbyteries there is a total decrease of 1,760; and in 2 Presbyteries a total increase of 1,845, giving the net increase as stated.

In the number of Families connected with Congregations and Stations there has been an increase from 13,845 to 14,069 or of 224. Decreases have taken place in the Presbyteries of Lanark and Renfrew with 2,703, amounting to 56, and in that of Brockville 1,629, to 176; in all 232. Quebec with 1247 has had an increase of 23; Montreal, 4,145, of 245; Glengarry, 1877, of 90; and Ottawa,

2,468, of 98, in all 456.

In the number of SINGLE PERSONS who have not their permanent homes in the congregations in which they are worshipping, and who are under the spiritual oversight of Church Office-bearers, there has been a decrease of 77, the figures for the respective years being 2,639 and 2,562. Montreal shows a decrease of 88 and Ottawa of 43, the full numbers being 1,031 and 544, altogether 131. Quebec width has 497 gives an increase of 20; Glengarry, 146, an increase of 10; Lanark and Renfrew, 385, of 9; and Brockville, 259, of 15; in all 54.

The class of persons reported here should have the earnest and diligent care of Ministers and Elders, and the Christian friends with whom they desire to associate in the public ordinances of religion, and this remark applies to all throughout the Church. Such kindly attention reasonably rendered may keep them at a time of great danger from the paths of those whose work it is to encompass the destruction of souls—will sooth the heart and draw forth the gratitude of many an anxious parent whose child is removed from the influences of a Christian home; and may secure for

active, extensive, and efficient service in the Church, it may be at home, or it may be abroad, not a few who, if neglected, will come to be enrolled in the ranks of the workers of iniquity.

In 1890 the number of COMMUNICANTS on the rolls of Sessions in this Synod was 27,695. In 1891 it was 28,130, giving an increase of 435. In the following 3 Presbyteries there has been an aggrecate decrease of 345, namely, Quebec 2,058, of 14, Lanark and Renfrew, 6,001, of 16; and Brock-ville, 2,933, of 315. In 3 there is an increase of 780, namely, Montreal, which has 8,809, of 106;

Glengarry, 3,208, of 491; and Ottawa, 5,121, of 183.

Throughout the Synod 1,705 were admitted to full communion on their own Profession of its Faith in Christ, and 874 on Certificates from other Churches. The former represent the HEIR FAITH in Christ, and 874 on CERTIFICATES from other Churches. extent to which the kingdom of grace has made inroads on the kingdom of sin, and prevailed in delivering those who were enslaved by the powers of darkness and bringing them to the liberty conferred by Christ. The number of these reported last year was 1,658, and this gives an increase 5 47. In two Presbyteries, namely, Montreal 24, and Glengarry, 5, fewer have been added in the latter year as compared with the former, while Quebec shows an increase of 47; Ottawa, of 4; Lanark and Renfrew, of 12; and Brockville, of 13--m all, 76, which, less 29, gives the net increase

The total number of communicants whose names were REMOVED from the rolls of Kirk Sessions under Presbyteries in the Synodical district was 1,786, and of these 448 were by Death, 31 by Discipline, 865 by Certificate, and 442 Without Certificate. The largest percentage of deaths in proportion to communicants was in the Presbyteries of Quebec and Glengarry, being about 2, and throughout the Synod it has been a little above 1, which has also been the rate in the majority of the Presbyteries. Of the 28,130 communicants in the different Presbyteries of the Synod only 31 had to be put under discipline, a rate of about 1 for each 1,000: figures which it must be conceded bear testimony to the care of Sessions in admitting persons to the privileges of full membership and watching over them afterwards, of the strength of the religious principle by which they are governed, and the ability given them to resist the temptations with which they are surrounded.

Baptism has been administered to 1,954 persons, and of these 90 were adults. In the Presbytery

of Quebec there were 4 of the latter, in that of Montreal, 17; in Glengarry, 5; in Ottawa, 16; in Lanark and Renfrew, 29; and in Brockville, 19. There was an increase of 108 in the number of Infants baptized and a decrease of 14 in that of adults - the numbers for the preceding year being 1,756 and 104, and for the one embraced in this report 1,864 and 90.

There has been a decrease in those called to the ELDRISHIP-that characteristic feature of the Presbyterian denomination, and important part in the Constitution under which Christ has placed His New Testament Church—amounting to 9, the total number in the last report being 996. The Presbytery of Quebec shows a decrease of 8, the full number being 85; Ottawa, of 4, whole number, 188; and Brockville, of 17, whole number 117. The Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew has remained stationary at 194; Montreal, with 260, shows an increase of 13, and Glengarry, 166, of 7. Total decrease, 29, and total increase, 20.

In the number of Other Office-bearens there has been an increase of 53, but your Committee will not enter upon a detailed examination of each Presbytery.

The Werkly Prayer Merting has been attended by 7,764 persons, being an increase of 77 on the previous year. Quebec gives an increase of 200, the number being 731; Montreal, of 143, actual number 1,401; Ottawa, of 44, number, 1,419; Lanark and Renfrew, of 35, whole attendance, 2,250; in all, an increase of 422; but, according to the report from Glengarry there is a decrease of 5, whole number, 978, and from Brockville, of 340, whole number, 985, making an aggregate decrease of 345, The weekly meetings for fellowship in praise, prayer and meditation upon the living oracles of

It was to it is people assembled for that purpose that God spake good and comfortable words towards the closing centuries of the Old Testament Economy, and to whom He gave such a precious/promise, which similar assemblies ever since may receive to their encouragement and incitement in waiting upon Him. To such assemblies in New Testament times Christ has given the assurance that He will be with them. The prayer meeting, then, is a trysting place in which our Divine Saviour has engaged to be present and make His presence felt by the communion which He holds with the souls of those who assemble. What greater incentive can be presented to resort to it by Christians who have the opportunity And what greater blessing can be received here than fellowship with Him whom the soul loves with both gratitude and admiration?

The instruction of the young In SABBATH SCHOOL and BIBLE CLASS is one of the striking features of the religious life of the prosent day. If the Church was long neglectful of her children, and of the command of Christ to "feed His lambs," she has for years been making strenuous efforts. to roll away from her the reproach. If there were now a congregation of the Church or even a mission station, in which there were no such classes, it would be regarded as an anomaly. Sabbath schools are sometimes the pioneers to prepare for the preaching of the Gospel. Flourishing congregations now exist in places in which only a short time ago the only means of religious instruction were in the Sabbath school. Such institutions must have the prayorful sympathy and open encouragement of those who desire to see the rising generation brought to the feet of Jesus that they may learn of Him the lessons that will prepare them for the warfare which has to be carried on, in the present life, against the powers of wickedness, and for the rest in glory of the life to come.

In the Synoid of Montreal and Ottawa there were 20,571 receiving instruction in Such classes, under 2,351 teachers and other officers, being a decrease in the one of 347, and in the other of 90. In the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew a decrease of 381 has taken place in the former, and in that of Brockville 326, making an aggregate of 707, and leaving the numbers 4,160 and 2,35. respectively. In the Presbytery of Quebec there has been an increase of 161; in that of Montreal, 116; in Glengary, 35; and in Ottawa, 48; aggregating 380, thus leaving the net decrease as stated. In all the Presbyteries there has been a decrease in the teaching staff, with the exception of Montreal, which gives an increase of 10. Each of the Presbyteries of Quebec and Glengary has

fewer than in 1890; Ottawa has 5; Lanark and Renfrew, 29; and Brockville, 38; in all 100.
Your Committee will not enter into details on the number of VOLUMES IN SABBATH SCHOOLANI CONGREGATIONAL LIBRARIES, contenting themselves with stating that there has been a decrease of 1,074. The Presbyteries of Quebec and Glengarry show an increase of 1,495, but the other 4 Presbyteries of Control of the teries show a decrease of 2,569.

The number of Missionary Associations in all the Presbyteries of the Synod in 1890 was 42; The number of Missionary Associations in all one trend years and in 1891 it was 41. Quebec and Ottawa each have 2 fewer; Montreal has 3 more; Glengary, and Lanark and Renfrew remain the same, namely, 5 each; Brockville has a decrease of 2.

In 6 Presbyteries there has been an increase of 5,073, made up as follows: Peterborough, 975; Whitby, 400; Lindsay, 495; Toronca, 2,333; Barrie, 330; and Saugeen, 480. These changes of figures between the two years is not altogether owing to a change in the sitting causelty of the church edities, or the lowing of places of wayshir which were at one in the sitting capacity of the church editices, or the closing of places of worship which were at one time in use, but to a difference of estimate or of calculation for the two years.

The number of FAMILIES connected with these churches or stations has risen from 22,160 to

22,659, an increase of 499. In 6 Presbyterles there has been a decrease aggregating 462. In Kingston there has been a decrease of 92; in Whitby of 69; in Barrie of 1; in Owen Sound of 204; in Saugeen of 24, and in Guelph of 72. It would be well if Kirk Sessions and others would take an interest in this subject on which information is sought. Your Committees in previous years have brought the case of Young Persons particularly before the Supreme Court in their reports. They have already in this report pressed their claims on the consideration of church members as well as of office-bearers. It cannot be concealed that there is reason to fear that, in some congregations, they are overlooked by those who are especially bound to consider them and give them attention, counsel and encouragement. There are congregations in our centres of population and business from whose reports it appears that there are no Single Persons from outside quarters connected with them. Is the inference an unfair one that they are not looked after by those whose province it is to watch for souls?

There has been an increase in the number of COSMENICANTS amounting to 2,052; the figures having risen from 46,314 in 1890 to 48,856 in 1891. The Presbytery of Owen Sound is the only one in which a decrease is reported, and it amounts to 397. In all the other Presbyteries there have been increases amounting to 2,449. As night be expected, Toronto shows the largest, 761; Peterborough comes next, 488; Orangeville follows, 335; Lindsay has 257; Saugeen, 202; Guelph, 151; Kingston, 99; Whitby, 88; and Barrie, 68. The rate of increase throughout the bounds of the Synod has been rather more than 4 per cent.

During the year 6,285 communicants have been ADDED to the rolls of Sessions, and of these the large number of 2,721 was by CERTIFICATE, leaving 3,564 who have joined on their own PROFESSION of Faith; and, by so doing, have declared that they had come out from the world to give themselves of Fath; and, by so doing, have declared that they had come out from the world to give themselves to God as their God in Christ, be glorify Him with their bodies and their splrits. Dealing only with the latter class there has been an increase on the previous year of 114. Three Presbyteries report a decrease, namely: Kingston, 68; Barrie, 4; and Sangeen, 118—altogether 190. Seven show an increase, namely: Peterborough, 113; Whitby, 23; Lindsay, 11; Toronto, 14; Orangeville, 35; Owen Sound, 65; and Guelph, 48—altogether 304.

In the Presbytery of Toronto 1,431 persons have entered into new church connections on certificate: in the Presbytery of Guelph, 289; in Barrie, 198; in Peterborough, 170, and so down to 87 in Saugeen and 74 in Whitby.

The Removals by DEATH throughout the bounds of the Synod were 640, which was 73 fewer than the previous year; by Discipling, 57, which was 42 fewer; my CERTIFICATE, 2,589, an increase of 19; and without CERTIFICATE, 899, a decrease of 233. The greatest number of deaths was in Toronto, 157, and the next in Guelph, 113; in Peterborough there were 63, and so down to the

lowest number, 31, in Sangeen.

In the Presbytery of Guelph there was the greatest number of Removals by Discipline, 13; in Toronto there were 12; in Barrie, 10; in Orangeville, 7; Kingston and Whitby, 4 each; Owen Sound, 3; Peterborough and Lindsay, 2 each; Sangeen none.

Of the 2,589 Removals by CERTIFICATE 1,119 were in Toronto; 342 in Guelph; 245 in Barrie, and so down to 87 in Saugeen.
There were 899 Removals without Certificates.

The ordinance of Bartism was administered to 2,416 Infants and 266 Adults. In all the Preshyteries there were cases of Adult Baptism; the fewest, 6, in Saugeen; the next, 10, in Peterberough; then 11 in Whitby; 13 in Bartis; 24 in Lindsay; 25 in Kingston; 29 in Owen Sound; 33 in Orangeville; 42 in Guelph, and 73 in Toronto.

There has been an increase of 18 in the number of Elders, and of 230 in that of Other Office.

BEARERS, but your Committee need not enter upon a particular examination The attendance on Werkly Prayers. Merrings has alvanced from 11,449 to 12,183, a net increase of 734. All the Presbyteries show an increase except Owen Sound, in which there has been a falling off of 126. In Toronto there has been an increase of 305; in Orangeville, of 155; in Barrie, of 125; in Guelph, of 119, and so with the others.

In 1890 the attendance on Sadbath School and Bible Class was returned as 37,527, and in 1891 as 38,353, an increase of 826; and for the benefit and Scriptural instruction of these a staff of 1891 as 36,303, an increase of 320°, and for the benefit and Scriptura instriction factor a state of 4,504 persons were engaged, freely and voluntarily giving themselves to serve the Lord Christ in this department of religious work—an increase of 316 on the preceding year. Watering others, their own souls have been watered. Many prayers have been offered up in their behalf and in the behalf of those to whom they were ministering. Their own prayers have not been unanswered.

There was an increase of 3,403 on the number of VOLUMES in SABBATH SCHOOL and CONGHEGATIONAL LIBRARIES, the total number being 59,775. The Presbytery of Toronto stands highest, its

libraries containing 19,288 volumes; Guelph comes next, with 10,407; Kingston is third, with 6,214; Peterborough is fourth, with 5,785; Barrie is fifth, with 4,121; Lindsay is sixth, with 3,113; Orange ville is seventh, with 3,010; Saugeen is eighth, with 2,909; Whitby is ninth, with 2,881; Owen

Sound has the smallest number, 2,047.

To many the possession of such means of instruction and improvement must be a boon. Even in cities, with all the literary conveniences they may possess, there must be many to whom the volume from the Sabbath School or Congregational Library is more suited and acceptable than any that is to be found in other libraries. It is supposed that proper care has been taken in the selection of them, and that they are all of such character that any one of them may be entrusted to members of the Sabbath School and Bible Class, and, indeed, to those connected with the congregation, as profitable for both mind and heart. They form, or should form, a healthy literature.

An increase of 9 has taken place in Missionary Associations, the last number reported being 121. In 3 Presbyteries there has been a decrease of 5, namely, Kingston and Toronto, 1 each, and in Peterborough 3. In 6 Presbyteries there has been an increase of 14, namely, Saugeen and Owen Sound, 1 each; Barrie, 2; Whitby and Guelph, 3 each; and Orangeville, 4. Lindsay reports the same number for each year.

Sound, I each; Barrie, 2; Whitby and Gueiph, 5 each; and Grangevine, 5. Images, reports the same number for each year.

The number of Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies has increased from 169 to 181. In the Presbytery of Toronto there was an increase of 7, the last number being 46. Barrie gives an increase of 5, having 18; Whitby and Lindsay have increased by 1 each; Peterborough and Orangeville have decreased by 1 each; Kingston, Owen Sound and Gueiph stand as they were a year ago. The number of Mannes in the bounds has fallen off by 7, the actual number being 184, while that of Rented Houses has increased by 1, being now 13. Kingston reports 4 manses fewer than in the previous year; Toronto, Orangeville and Gueiph, 2 each; Whitby, 1; Lindsay, Barrie, Owen Sound and Saucean report an increase of 1 each.

Sound and Saugeen report an increase of 1 each.

During the year 2 Mansas were built; 1 in the Presbytery of Barrie and 1 in Lindsay.

Ten Chauches were built; one in each of the Presbyteries of Peterborough, Whitby, Owen
Sound and Guelph; 4 in Toronto and 2 in Barrie. Besides these 2 churches were enlarged.

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON.

In the Synod of Hamilton and London, embracing 9 Presbyteries, the number of Churches or STATIONS supplied by pastors, or constituting pastoral charges, is 328, being 11 more than for the previous year. The Presbytery of Stratford gives a decrease of 1; Hamilton, Chatham, Huron and Bruce, an increase of 1 each; Paris and London an increase of 2 each; Sarnia, an increase of 4; Maigland remains the same for both years.

In 1890 the number of Sittings was reported as 107,041, and in 1891 it was 103,516, showing that although there has been an increase of churches or stations, as just stated, there has been a decrease of 3,525 in the accommodation provided for worshippers. Five Presbyteries show a decrease of 4,618; namely, Hamilton, 565; London, 945; Chatham, 1,230; Stratford, 298; and Bruce, 1,580; Four Presbyteries report an increase of 1,093; namely, Paris, 223; Huron, 200; Mattland, 235;

The thought returns, and may be repeated, that there is want of due care, in fact, a want of faithfulness to duty in the calculations, if hey should not be called guesses, of Kirk Sessions in this item of information which is sought. It can be of no interest to anyone to under-estimate the capacity of the buildings in which congregations assemble for worship on the first day of the week. On the other hand an over-estimate or carelessness in arriving at the numbers should not be chargeable against any Session. Accuracy and honesty should be the points kept in view.

The total number of FAMILIES in the Synod has increased by 290; the numbers for the respective

years being 19,726 and 20,016. In the Presbytery of London there has been a decrease of 58; in Chatham, of 28; in Bruce, of 179 (caused, it is presumed, in a great measure by emigration to Manitoba and the North-West Territories), and in Sarnia, of 67; in all, 332. In the Presbytery of Hamilton there has been an increase of 99; in Paris, of 162; in Stratford, of 342; in Huron, of 10,

and in Maitland, of 9; altogether, 622, leaving a net increase as previously stated.

The number of Single Persons not connected with Families of Congregations was 2,676 against 2,589, as reported the previous year, showing an increase of 87. Paris gives a decrease of 89; London, of 40; and Huron, of 12; that is, in the 3 Presbyteries, of 141. Hamilton and Chatham give an increase of 25 each; Stratford, of 108; Bruce, of 52; Maitland of 11: and Sarnia, of 7; in

all, 228.

The Communicants on the rolls of Sessions numbered 41,733, being an increase on the previous year of 789, made up as follows:—In the Presbytery of Paris an increase of 333; in London of 100; in Chatham of 156; in Stratford of 574; and in Maitland of 81, making an aggregate of 1,244. But there were decreases—in Hamilton of 263; in Huron of 31; in Bruce of 126, and in Sarnia of 35, and the strategy of the strategy of

aggregating 455, giving the net increase already mentioned.

The Additions during the year were 4,502, of whom 1,665 were by CERTIFICATE from the Sessions The ADDITIONS during the year were 4,002, in which 1,003 were by Charles and 100 for Congregations with which they had been formerly united, leaving 2,837, who, for the first time, publicly declared themselves to be of the family of God. Last year the additions were 4,292, of whom 2,585 were received on their own profession. There has thus been an increase in this class of 252. Of this number 72 were added in Hamilton; 136 in Paris; 47 in Stratford; 7 In Chatham; 1 in

Of this number 12 were added in framiton; 136 in Faris; 47 in Stratford; 7 in Chatham; 1 in Huron, and 44 in Maitland, aggregating 307. But in each of the Presbyteries of London and Sarnia there were 23 fewer, and in Bruce 9, additions from this source than in the preceding year.

The Removals by Death were 637; by Discipling 41; by Certificate, 1,886; and Without Certificate 555, making an aggregate of 3,119. There was an increase in the removals by death the latter year as compared with the former of 81; and by certificate 50; while there was a decrease in the removals by discipline of 77, and without certificate of 6. There has been a decrasse in the number of Bartisms of Infants, amounting to 32, and an increase of 30 in that of ADULTS, making a net decrease of 2 in both. Of the former the full number was 2,019, and of the latter 307. In the previous year the respective numbers were 2,051 and 277. It is taken for granted that parents who have themselves put on the Lord Jesus Christ will not regard it as unimportant to bring their children to the Lord in the Sacrament which He has appointed for such, and that they will not be slow in recognizing their duty to avail themselves of their privilege. Cases of adult baptism are comparatively uncommon, and awaken a deever interest. Of those in the Synod of Hamilton and London the greatest number has been in the Presbytery of Farls, 57, and the fewest in that of Bruce, 17, to which Huron stands next, 18. Hamilton and London stand close to each other, the former having 49, and the latter 45. In Maltland there were 36; in Stratford, 30; in Sarnia, 29; and in Chatham, 26.

In the Elderich of 30; in Sarnia a decrease of 42; the largest being in the Presbytery of Hamilton, 34; Chatham and Sarnia has a decrease of 11 each; Maitland of 2; Bruce of 12—in all. 70. In the number attending WERKLY PRAYER MEETINGS there has been an increase of 716; the numbers for the respective years being 11,282 and 11,998. In the Presbytery of Chatham there was a decrease of 98; in Huron, 55; in Maitland, 3; in Sarnia, 2; or a total of 158. On the other hand there was an increase in Stratford of 371; in Paris of 246; in London of 167; in Bruce of 57; and in Hamilton of 33-total 874.

SABBATH SCHOOLS and BIBLE CLASSES were attended by 33,361, a decrease of 388 on the previous year; and there working in these 3,698, an increase of 22 on the preceding year. In Sabbath school attendance there has been an increase in the Presbytery of Hamilton, amounting to 576; in Paris to 245; and in Stratford to 163; aggregating 884. Six Presbyteries, however, show decreases, numbering 1,272, made up as follows:—London, 222; Chatham, 16; Huron, 307; Maitland, 126; Bruce, 469, and Sarnio, 142.

A comparison need not be instituted to show the increase and decrease in the different Presby-series of the Synod on those engaged in Sabbath school work. Taking the difference between the

series of the symbol on those engaged in Saddath school work. Taking the difference between the turn of the items of each, the net increase is what has been given.

The Volumes in Sabbath School and Congregational Libraries have increased by 500; the total number being 54,370. In 4 Presbyteries there has been an increase of 1,881 volumes, namely: London, 1,112; Chatham, 377; Paris, 209; and Maithand, 183; while in 5 there has been a decrease of 2,381, namely, in Bruce, 697; in Sarnia, 603; in Hamilton, 422; in Stratford, 376, and in Huron,

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS have increased in the Presbytery of Paris from 11 to 15; in London from 17 to 25; in Huron from 6 to 8; in Sarnia from 10 to 21, in all 25, but each of the Presbyteries of Hamilton, Maitland and Bruce show a decrease of 1; Chatham of 2; and Stratford of 3, in all 8, giving a net increase of 17.

WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETIES exist in all the Presbyteries and number 165, being an increase of 19 on the previous year. In the Presbyteries of Hamilton, Huron and Bruce there is a decrease of I each; Chatham and Muitland have increased 1 each; Paris, London and Stratford

3 each; and Sarnia 11. There has been a reduction of I in the number of MANSES, and an increase of 3 in RENTED-Houses, the respective numbers being 150 and 17. 

SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

In the above Synod there has been an increase of from 249 churches and stations forming pastoral charges in 1890, to 316 in 1891, a gain of 67. The Presbytery of Whinipeg reports 29 such charges and stations, an increase of 8: Rock Lake, 27, an increase of 2; Brandon, 44, an increase of 7; Regina, 90, an increase of 1; Minnedosa, 19, an increase of 5; Calgary, 35, an increase of 31.

In 2 Presbyteries there is a reported decrease amounting to 890, namely, in Rock Lake of 870, the number reported being 1,700, and in Calgary 20, the number reported being 1,939, notwithstanding the increase in the number of stations. Winnipeg, which reports 6,440, gives an increase of 460; Brandon, with 4,420, gives an increase of 225; Regina.









In the number of Families in these Presbyteries there has been an advance of 901. In Brandon there has been a decrease of 53, the numbers having fallen from 1,032; in Winnipeg there has been an increase of 147, the number having risen to 1,592; in Rock Lake, 8, the last return giving 459; in Regina, 181, the latest number being 1,008; in Minnedosa, 150, the number having advanced to 336; in Calgary, 85, the total being 486; and in Columbia, 383, the total now being 1,409.

The number of Single Persons shows an increase of 375. The Presbytery of Winnipeg, with 475, shows a decrease of 66; and Calgary, with 345, shows a decrease of 30, total 96. The Presby-tery of Columbia reports 904 single persons, an increase of 267; Regina, 345, an increase of 95; Minnedosa, 104, an increase of 63; Rock Lake, 128, an increase of 27; and Brandon, 264, an

increase of 19; total increase, 471.

Communicants on the rolls of Sessions have risen from 8,180 to 9,907, an increase of 1,727. The only decrease, 24, has been in the Presbytery of Brandon. Winnipeg shows an increase of 326; Rock Lake of 66; Regina of 234; Minnedosa of 255; Calgary of 77, and Columbia of 783, total 1,751.

The additions on Profession were 1,206, an increase of 323, and by Certificant 1,299, an increase of 353, or a total increase from the two sources of 676. From the latter number it can be learned that there has been a large influx of a Presbyterian population into this part of the Dominion from other quarters, and it may be presumed that the Statistics of other religious denominations show the same thing to be true of them. From the former it may be learned that the Church is not inactive, nor inefficient, and that there is, comparatively, a considerable proportion which attend to her invitations to enter within her pale, and sit down at the feast spread by Christ for his disciples.

Of those added on their own profession, 246 were on the Presbytery of Winnipeg, a decrease of 59, and, by certificate 209, an increase of 24. In the Presbytery of Rock Lake there were 85, three fewer than last year, of the one, and 59, three more than last year, of the other. In the Presbytery of Brandon there were 143 added on profession, and 175 by certificate, being a decrease of 115 and 53 respectively. In the Presbytery of Regina there were 200 and 111, an increase of 126 and 29 respectively. In the Presbytery of Minnedosa, 130 and 57, an increase in the respective numbers of respectively. In the Presbytery of Minnedosa, 139 and 57, an increase in the respective numers of 127 and 37. In the Presbytery of Calgary there was an increase of one in the former and a decrease of 29 in the latter. CATE, and 335 WITHOUT.

The BAPTISMS OF INFANTS has increased from 907 in the previous year to 1,107 in the year embraced in this report, an increase of 200. Of these there was an increase of 1 in the Presbytery of Brandon; of 59 in that of Regina; of 38 in that of Minnedosa; of 57 in that of Calgary; and 106 in that of Columbia; making an aggregate of 261; while in the Presbytery of Winnipeg there was a decrease of 52; in that of Rock Lake, 9; total, 61.

There was an increase of 19 in the Baptisms of Adults, Winnipeg reporting a decrease of 6; Brandon of 8; Rock Lake remains the same, but Reginagives an increase of 16, Minnedosa of 4, Calgary of 3, and Columbia of 10—in all 33 less 14.

In the Presbytery of Brandon there has been a decrease of 8 in the number of ELDERS, of whom there were altogether throughout the Synod 355, an increase of 69 on the previous year. In each of the other Presbyteries there has been an increase: in Winnipeg of 9, in Rock Lake of 1, in Regina of 13, in Minnedosa of 11, in Calgary of 8, and in Columbia of 35.

In the number of Other Office-Bearers there has been an increase of 187. All the Presbyteries show an increase in this class of persons officially engaged in doing the work of the Church in

their own department.

Wekely Prayer Meetings have been attended by 3,051, an increase of 686. In Winnipeg, there has been a decrease of 30; in Rock Lake an increase of 95; in Brandon, of 89; in Regins, of 115; in Minnedosa, of 97; in Calgary, of 25; and in Columbia, of 295, or a total of 716, less the one instance of decrease noted.

There has been an increase of 2,005 in those attending SABBATH SCHOOL and BIBLE CLASS, and of 196 in those actively engaged in Sabbath school work. The numbers of these for 1891 were respectively, 9,552 and 1,003. Calgary is the only Presbytery in which there has been a decrease in scholars, the figures for each of the years being 424 and 405. Winnlegs reports 2,862, an increase of 296; Rock Lake 370, an increase of 696; Brandon, 1,644, an increase of 131; Regins, 1,337, an increase of 493; Minnedosa, 618, an increase of 255; and Columbia 2,236, an increase of 789. The total increases are 2,024, decrease 19, net increase 2,005.

In 1890 there were 10,396 VOLUMES in SABBATH SCHOOL and CONGREGATIONAL LIBRARIES, and in 1891 there were 15,198, being an increase of 4,802. In each of the Presbyteries there has been an increase. In Winnipeg, of 1828; in Rock Lake, of 557; in Brandon, of 990; in Regina, of 594; in Minnedosa, of 600; in Calgary, of 334; and in Columbia, of 399.

In Missionary Associations there has been an increase of 2; 1 in Winnipeg and 1 in Brandon.

Rock Lake has none. Minndosa and Calgery had one each in the respective years; Regina and Columbia 3 each; Brandon has now 4, and Wannipeg 10.

There has been an increase of 6 in Woman's Forkign Missionary Societies; 3 of these in

the Presbytery of Winnipeg, in which there are now 11; Brandon has 9, a decrease of 1; Minnedosa has 2, an increase of 1; Calgary 4, an increase of 3; Columbia remains at 3 for both years. Rock Lake and Regina are without such organizations.

The number of Manses has risen from 30 to 47, including those which are Church Manses, while the RENTED Houses have been reduced from 8 to 5.

Seven manses have been BUILT, an increase of 4 on the previous year, and 17 churches, an increase of 5, with 1 school-room.

From these figures it will be seen that the Church is making decided progress in Manitoba and the North-West Territories. Your Committee need not go into calculations to show whether she is keeping up with the population as a whole. Appearances favour the conclusion that at least the Presbyterian portion of it is carefully considered, although it cannot be said abundantly provided with the means of grace which they have been taught to regard as most in harmony with the doctrines and worship of the New Testament Kingdom. An urgent call comes from the western to the eastern section of the Dominion to send them help, and their cry should not be lost in the other strong appeals which are made from other departments of Christian activity and liberality for personal consecration to the service of the Lord, and larger contributions into His treasury.

In the Synod of the Maritime Provinces there has been a decrease of \$4,019 in the STIPEND RECRIVED FROM ALL SOurces, according to the returns made. One Presbytery, that of Newfoundland, gives the same amount for each of the vears 1890 and 1891. Six Presbyteries report a decrease, aggregating \$7,518; namely: Truro, \$342; Victoria and Richmond, \$1,569; Halifax, \$3,904; Wallace, \$253; Lunenburg and Shelburne, \$1,050; and Miramichi, \$400. Four Presbyteries report an increase of \$3,499; namely: Sydney, \$669; Pictou, \$719; Prince Edward Island, \$1,554; and St.

John, \$557.

It is not the intention of your Committee to institute a comparison of the one year with the other in the case of each Presbytery, to endeavour to ascertain how this falling off has taken place. It would require too much time to do so, but it is recommended that Presbyteries do this for them.

Selves.

There has been an increase of \$6,011 in the STIPEND PROMISED BY CONGREGATION ALONE. Under this item, as under the former one, Newfoundland reports the same figures for each year. Six Presbyteries show an increase, aggregating \$9,370; namely: Sydney, \$1,187; Halifax, \$2,881; Pricton, \$1,773; Prince Edward Island, \$2,360; St. John, \$897; and Miramichi, \$272. The other 4 Presbyteries give a decrease of \$3,359, as follows: Truro, \$45; Victoria and Richmond, \$1,769; Wallace, \$305; and Lunenburg and Shelburne, \$895.

In the STIPEND PAID BY CONGREGATION ALONE there has been an increase from \$147,880 to \$148,200, or of \$320. In 5 Presbyteries there have been increases amounting to \$2,544, namely: Halifax, \$1,653; Wallace, \$126; Pictou, \$202; Miramichi, \$222; and Newfoundland, \$141. In the other 6 Presbyteries there have been decreases as follows: Truro, \$200; Sydney, \$121; Victoria and Richmond, \$1,336; Prince Edward Island, \$185; Lunenburg and Shelburne, \$42; and St. John, \$140.

Two Presbyteries in this Synod report the same amount paid that was promised as Stipend 3 show an increase of the payments above the premise, namely: Victoria and Richmond, \$5; Wallace, \$1,631; and Lunenburg and Shelburne, \$314. The Stipend paid was less than that promised in the following: Sydney, \$823; Halifax, \$948; Picton, \$1,309; Prince Edward Island, \$244; St. John, \$1,619; and Miramichi, \$283.

Only 3 Presbyteries report no arrears, namely: Truro, Wallace and Newfoundland. In Sydney they are \$870; in St. John, \$689; in Halifax, \$448; in Victoria and Richmond, \$265; in Prince Edward Island, \$260; in Pictou, \$204; in Lunenburg and Shelburne, \$136; and in Miramichi, \$128-total, \$3,000.

**S128-total, \$3,000.

The whole sum expended on Church or Manse in 1891 was \$60,585. In 1890 it was \$64,648, showing a decrease of \$4,063. In 4 Preshyteries \$11,202 less were expended during the latter year, namely: Truro, \$259; Pictou, \$7,827; Lunenburg and Shelburne, \$2,359; and Miramichi, \$758. In the remaining 7 Preshyteries there was an increase of \$7,139 in the latter of the two years wade up as follows: Sydney, \$2,359; Victoria and Richmond, \$197; Halifax, \$284; Wallace, \$1,281; Prince Edward Island, \$552; St. John, \$2,015; and Newfoundland, \$451.

Your Committee are not able to present the expenditure on Church and Manse separately, either in the case of this Synod or of the others, for while some of the congregations and Presbyteries keep the items distinct, as may be seen by referring to the tables following, others do not. The questions sent out are prepared with the view of having the items kept and reported, the one distinct from the other, and if there is a departure from this in some of the reports there is a frus-

distinct from the other, and if there is a departure from this in some of the reports there is a frustration of the purpose intended.

THATION OF THE INCIDENTAL AND CONGREGATIONAL CONTRIBUTIONS AND PAYMENTS aggregated \$63,012, a slight increase, \$171, on the expenditure for the same objects the preceding year. The total expenditure for STRICTLY CONGREGATIONAL PURPOSES throughout the Synod was \$271,797, a decrease of \$3,572 according to the former report. In the following Presbyteries there are decreases as stated: Truro, \$801; Victoria and Elchmond, \$882; Halifax, \$617; Pictou, \$3,779; Lunenburg and Shelburne, \$3,093; Miramichi, \$763; and Newfoundland, \$3,431, making an aggregate of \$13,428. The increases have been as follows: In the Presbytery of Sydney, \$2,828; in Wallace, \$1,747; in Prince Edward Island, \$167; and in St. John, \$5,114—total, \$9,856.

Your Committee will not treat the Schemes of the Church in detail, but take the total contributions and payments to each, comparing them with those of the year 1890.

The entire amount raised throughout the Synod in 1891 was \$47,175, being an increase on 1890 of \$898. To the ordinary expense fund of COLLEGES \$3,503 were paid, an increase of \$36; and to the special, \$952, an increase of \$679.

To HOME MISSIONS, \$8,792 were paid, a decrease of \$424.

To Augmentation, \$8,554, an increase of \$278.

To French Evangelization, \$4,961, an increase of \$34.

To Foreign Missions, \$17,843, a decrease of \$141.

To Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, ordinary, \$1,094, an increase of \$51; and to the ENDOWMENT Fund, which now appears for the first time, \$25.

The total PAYMENTS FOR ALL PURPOSES was \$339,953, being \$9,769 less than for the previous year. In the Presbytery of Truro there was a decrease of \$1,937; in Victoria and Richmond of \$1,300; in Halifax of \$5,993; in Picton of \$4,335; in Lunenburg and Shelburne of \$3,939; in Miramichi of \$1,521; and in Newfoundland of \$1,636—aggregating \$20,661. In the Presbytery of Sydney, on the other hand, there was an increase of \$3,096; in Wallace of \$1,700; in Prince Edward Island of \$365; in St. John of \$5,731—aggregating \$10,892.

SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA.

In this Synod there has been an increase of \$8,580 on the STIPEND RECEIVED FROM ALL SOURCES, In this Synd there has been an increase of \$5,300 three \$1,620, the whole amount being \$14,122; and in the Presbytery of Brockville, of \$1,625, the whole amount being \$14,417. But in the Presbytery of Montreal there has been an increase of \$5,389. making the whole amount \$55,579; in Lanark and Renfrew of \$3,663, making the whole sum received \$25,329; in Ottawa of \$1,099, in a total of \$27,508, and in that of Glengarry \$120, in a total of \$12,839.

In the STIPEND PROMISED BY CONGREGATION ALONE there was an aggregate increase of \$9,675.

Two Presbyteries in the Synod report a decrease: Lanark and Renfrew, of \$1,405, the actual amount promised being \$23,355; and Brockville, \$1,737, amount promised \$14,109. In a sum of \$12,422 promised in the Presbytery of Quebec, there is an increase of \$09; Montreal promised \$49,042, an increase of \$5,212; Glengarry, \$14,078, increase \$3,583. The four Presbyteries thus make an increase of \$11,817, and the two a decrease of \$2,142.

There has been an increase in the STIPEND PAID BY CONGREGATION ALONE of \$7,303. In the Presbytery of Quebec \$11,929 have been paid, an increase of \$241; in that of Montreal, \$19,334, an increase of \$3,181; in that of Glengarry, \$14,670, an increase of \$1,102; in that of Ottawa, \$25,265, an increase of \$3,420; and in that of Lanark and Renfrew, 23,404, an increase of \$1,633. But Brockville gives a decrease of \$1,864, the amount paid having been \$13,826, against \$15,630 the

previous year.
In 1890 the Presbytery of Quebec was the only one without ARREARS OF STIPEND; last year this bonour belongs to Lanark and Renfrew. But the total arrears in the Synod have fallen of

from \$1,023 to \$514. The amount expended on Church or Manse in 1891 was \$84,505, an increase of \$11,718 on the preceding year. In Quebec there has been a decrease of \$1,765; and in Montreal of \$8,184, or in the two Presbyteries, of \$12,949. But in Glongary there has been an increase of \$1,534; in Ottawa of \$11,326; in Lanark and Renfrew of \$10,496, and in Brockville of \$1,311, the total increase being \$24,667.

For Incidental And Congregational Purposes there was expended in 1891 the sum of \$67,392. In 1890 the sum was \$85,749, a decrease of 13,357. The Committee will not give a detailed statement of the decrease in the various Presbyteries under this heading.

In 1890 the total expenditure for Structly Congregational Purposes was \$289,681, and in the following year \$290,345, an increase of \$664. In Quebec there has been a decrease of \$3,937; in Ottawa of \$1,036, and in Frockville of \$1,846, giving an aggregate of \$6,819; while in Montrel there has been an increase of \$252; in Glengarry of \$2,759, and in Lanark and Renfrew of \$4,472, making a total of \$7,483.

The entire amount raised throughout the Synod for the SCHEMES OF THE CHURCH in 1891 was \$66,651, of which \$541 were for COLLEGES (ordinary) and \$4,895 (special).

In 1890 the total payments to the Schemes of the Church by congregations and stations in this Synod was \$78,192, which gives a decrease of \$11,541. Four Presbyteries show an increase as follows:—Quebec \$84; Glengarry \$1,395; Ottawa, \$3,487; Lanark and Renfrew \$221, being a total of \$5,097. In Montreal, however, there is a decrease of \$16,390, evidently arising from some special object in the previous year which was not presented, or did not appeal so loudly for help last year; and in Brockville there is a decrease of \$228, giving a total of \$16,618, and the net decrease as above stated.

In each of the other Presbyteries there is an increase; in Kingston of \$2,048; in Peterborough of \$2,491; in Whitby of \$039; in Lindsay of \$1,182; in Toronto of \$10,483; in Orangeville of \$1,419; in Sangeen of \$309; and in Guelph of \$369, making an aggregate of \$19,122, and chamist the not increase to be assurant. showing the net increase to be as given.

IN OTHER INCIDENTAL AND CONGENGATIONAL expenditure there has been an increase of \$1,144, the amount having risen from \$146,650 in the one year to \$150,794 in the other. Your Committee do not pursue the details.

The Total Expenditure for Strictly Congregational Purposes throughout the Synod was \$188,722, but this includes \$381 for an object not specified in one of the congregations of the Presbytery of Orangeville. The payments for STRICTLY CONGREGATIONAL PURPOSES were \$158,429, an increase of \$2,229 on the previous year. Only two Presbyteries report decreases, Calgary \$1,598, and Columbia \$16,249, or together, \$17,847. In Winnipeg there was an increase of \$4,836; in Rock Lake, of \$2,295; in Brandon, of \$3,159; in Regina, of \$5,260; and in Minnedosa, of \$5,580, making a total of \$20,076, which, less \$17,847, leaves \$2,229 net increase.

Taking the different Schemes of the Church, the payments to College Funds, ordinary, were \$2,239, an increase of \$298; special, \$326, an increase of \$12.

To Home Missions, \$3,914, an increase of \$479.

To Augmentation, \$1,626, an increase of \$328.

To FRENCH EVANGELIZATION, 854, an increase of \$102.

To Foreign Missions, \$3,301, an increase of \$987.

To Agen and Infirm Ministens' Fund, \$360, an increase of \$77.

To Widows' and Orphans' Fund, \$316, an increase of \$89.

And to Assembly Expense Fund \$247, an increase of \$99.

It thus appears that there has been an increase in the contributions to each of the Schemes of the Church in the Presbyteries throughout this Synod, aggregating \$2,471.

To the SCHEMES of the Church the TOTAL contributions amounted to \$13,232. The previous year they were \$10,036, showing an increase of \$3,196. Some amounts are reported in the total payments that are not entered in previous columns, as has been seen to be the case with other Synods and Presbyteries.

In the Presbytcry of Winnipeg there was an increase of \$1,166—in Rock Lake of \$176, in Brandon of \$371, in Regins of \$409, in Minnedosa of \$182, in Calgary of \$252, and in Columbia of \$640; total, as already given, \$3,196.

For ALL PURPORES there were raised throughout the bounds of the Synod \$189,517, or an increase of \$3,332 on the previous year. In 5 Prosbyteries there was an increase of contributions, amounting to \$23,411, Winnipeg giving towards this sum an increase of \$6,810, Rock Lake of \$2,468; Brandon of \$2,810, Regina of \$5,526, and Minnedosa of \$5,797. In Calgary there was a decrease of \$1,418, and in Columbia of \$13,661; total, \$15,079.

Combining the entire contributions for strictly congregational purposes, for the Schemes of the Church, for Presbytery and Synod Funds, and for other religious and benevolent purposes, it is found, adding in Delayed Returns, that the entire income and expenditure of the Church for 1891 were \$2,003,239, or an increase of \$429 on the preceding year.

Your Committee, as has been the practice heretofore, have prepared a table showing the average contribution per member and family towards stipend, all congregational objects, Schemes of the Church, and all purposes. They recommend this table to the attention of all Presbyteries, and, indeed, of all who take an interest in the work in which our Church is engaged in fulfilment of the commission given her by her King. Much may be learnt from it to incite to thanksgiving for the measure of the grace of liberality which has been poured out in some cases, and much to humble and lead to prayerfulness in the case of others, who do not seem to feel the force of the obligation to honour the Lord with their substance and the first-fruits of all their increase. Let none be judged, however, merely by the figures. The circumstances of the contributors must be taken into consideration. The mite of the poor may be comparatively larger than the givings of those who cast in of their abundance to the Lord's Treasury. The duty, the privilege, of each one is to render to Him in such proportion as to call forth His commendation, "She hath done what she could."

The average contribution for stipend per family, throughout the Church, was \$9.14, an increase on 1890 of a little more than 14 cents; per communicant \$1.71, an increase of 2 cents; for all congregational objects \$18.87 per family were contributed, a decrease of 20 cents; per communicant \$9.73, a decrease of 20 cents; for the Schemes of the Church, per family, \$3.38, a decrease of cents; per communicant \$1.74, a decrease of 6 cents; for all purposes \$23.04 per family, a decrease of 37 cents, and \$12.19 per communicant, a decrease of 32 cents.

The following is a report of payments for all purposes, with increase or decrease for each year since 1875, when the last union was consumnated :-

MISSION STATIONS.

Your Committee have little satisfaction in compiling this part of their Report, in consequence of numerous instances in which no returns have been made, and the few particulars which have been given by most of those reporting. It may be an erroneous, but it appears to be only a fair, conclusion that Presbyteries do not take the oversight which they should of the Stations or Fields within their bounds, and these exist in all the Presbyteries with the exception of Wallace, Prince Edward Island, Whitby, Stratford, and Maitland. In London one has been recently formed. The Presbytery of Barrie contains the greatest number of any in the Church, 109, and it must have cost the Clerk great labour to collect the details he has supplied, but he has done his work with scrupulous Clerk great labour to collect the details he has supplied, but he has done his work with scrupulous care.

Taking Synods, that of Manitoba and the North-West Territories has the largest number, 292; and, in that Synod, the Presbytery of Winnipeg, 80. The next Synod is that of Toronto and Kingston, 204, and in it the Presbytery of Barrie. In the Synod of the Maritime Provinces there are 103, the largest number in any of its Presbyteries being in Halifax, 31. That of Montreal and Ottawa comes next with 86, and of these 31 are in Quebec, and 28 in Ottawa. The Synod of Hamilton and London has the smallest number, 34, only three Presbyteries reporting such, and one, that of Bruce, and 35 of Chether 11 and Synoia 8. contains 65, Chatham, 11 and Sarnia, 8.

STATISTICS.

But confining themselves to generals your Committee would state that the number of Stations receiving supply was 773, an increase of 75 on the previous report.

The accommodation for worshippers amounted to 37,165 sittings, an increase of 6,514.
Connected with these Stations were 7,736 families, and 1,748 single persons, which, on the basis of 3 to a family, would make a total of 8,318, or reckoning five and a half to a family, and adding in the number of single persons, there is a total of individuals numbering 4,295. In the number of families there is an increase on the foregoing year of 587, and 257 on single persons.

On the number of communicants, 9,548, there was an increase of 498, and of 81 on those added on Profession, 611, and 25 on those by certificate, 320.

The total removals were 402, an increase of 69, of whom 95 were by death, 4 by discipline, 138 by certificate, and 165 without.

by certificate, an I 165 without. Baptism was administered to 668 infants, a decrease of 32, and 54 adults, a decrease of 49.

There has been an increase of 12 in the number of Elders, making it 304, and of 45 in other officebearers, 774

In 1890 the average attendance at weekly prayer-meetings was 2,831; the next year it was 3,235, an increase of 404. In Sabbath school and Bible class there were enrolled 7,796 in the latter year, against 6,077 in the former, an increase of 1,719, showing that this provision for the religious instruction of the young is more generally appreciated and improved; and these were under the active and consecuated care of 982 workers, an increase of 199.

Volumes in libraries, Sabbath school and congregational, have increased from 9,019 to 9,490,

Missionary Associations have risen from 8 (only 5 Presbyteries having been reported as possessing such organizations) to 13, one Presbytery, that of Barrie, having 6.

Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies have increased from 15 to 31, 8 Presbyteries having them in the one year and 16 in the latter.

17 manses, increase 3, were provided; and 2 rented houses, decrease 1; and 19 churches were built, increase 9, but no manses, a decrease of 1.

The total payments for supply have decreased by \$2,202, the amount being \$18,584; the amount promised by the Stations has increased by \$4,072, being \$26,147; and the amount paid by \$1,423, the whole sum being \$43,314. Arrears have increased from \$1,651 to \$1,944.

The amounts expended on churches or manses make a total of \$11,961, an increase of \$2.515, and on other purposes connected with Stations, \$4,809; and on strictly local work, \$60,370, an increase of \$4,845.

In all the Synods, with the exception of that of Hamilton and London, there have been contributions to the ordinary College Fund, from \$9 in Montreal and Ottawa to \$47 in Toronto and Kingston, \$63 in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, and \$287 in Manitoba and the North-West

In all there have been payments to the other Schemes of the Church, except the Endowment Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers, aggregating \$3,258 of which \$161 were in the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa; \$238 in Hamilton and London; \$535 in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces; \$1,026 in Manitoba and the North-West Territories, and \$1,270 in that of Toronto and Kingston, with \$28 in Delayed Returns,

For ALL Purposes there have been contributed and paid in the Stations reported \$63,996, or an average of \$8.27 per family, and of \$6.70 per communicant, figures which speak well for the desire of those connected with these Stations to give of their substance for the preaching of the Word. Had the returns been fuller there is every reason to conclude that the results would have been seen to be still more satisfactory.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

Your Committee are convinced that there is reason for profound gratitude to God for the measure of prosperity granted by Him to this Church throughout the year. In all the particulars indicative of healthy energy and activity there has been progress. According to reports frequently published and widely circulated, Canada, instead of making headway in wealth and population, was in a state of stagnation, if not losing ground. In view of these, your Committee began to prepare this report with some measure of anxiety regarding the standing of the Church for the year as compared with the previous one. The issue has been agreeably disappointing, for if in the matter of income and expenditure it has not come up to 1889, it is in advance of every other year since the union—of \$60,616 beyond 1888, and \$272,987 beyond 1887, and considerably more for previous years. The only ouestion is has the rate of contribution been in proportion to the increase in the member-The only question is, has the rate of contribution been in proportion to the increase in the membership, the wider area over which the Church has been spreading, and the general circumstances of the country? And looking at all these your Committee believe that she has made satisfactory progress.

Let a few of the items indicative of this be mentioned. Taking in the whole Church in her

paterial charges and mission stations there has been an increase in these of 139 for the past year. In the number of sittings in these there has been an increase of 8,205—of families of 1,945, of single persons of 650, and of communicants of 4,752. The number of additions on profession has risen by 913; of attenders at weekly prayer-meetings by 3,776; of young persons in Sabbath school and Bible class by 5544, and of Sabbath school workers by 776.

It will be conceded that one evidence of prosperity is the provision made by the people for the proper maintenance of those who minister to them in holy things. Where there is progress in this respect it is a proof that their worldly circumstances are improving, and that their interest in respect it is a proof that their worldly circumstances are improving, and that their interest in religion at least among themselves is growing. Now, in the stipend received from all sources there has been an increase of \$29,022, partly it may be from the Augmention Fund and Home Mission grants, yet still from the people generally if not locally. There has been an increase of \$37,896 in the stipend promised, and of \$25,415 in the stipend paid by congregation alone, and \$14,494 in the total expenditure for strictly congregational purposes.

It has been the effort of the Church for some years, and a recommendation of last Assembly on the report of its Committee on Systematic Beneficence, to train the young to take an interest in the cause of the Gospel, and to contribute towards it. In the reports required from congregations and stations from year to year one of the items returned has been the portion of the whole sum reject.

tations from year to year one of the items returned has been the portion of the whole sum raised for Foreign Missions that has been raised by Sabbath schools. According to the answers now under consideration there has been an increase of \$1,202.

It has been seen that the number of Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies has increased

during the year. There has been no relaxation of the zeal and energy of the noble band engaged in this work, and who have done so much in kindling and fostering a missionary spirit in congregathis work, and who have done so much in kindling and lostering a missionary spirit in congrega-tions and stations, and helping to supply the great need that is felt for both men and women to go forth to the Gentiles and preach to them the unsearchable riches of Christ. Many at home and many abroad have reason and will have to rise up and call these workers blessed. The efforts of the different branches have been successful in the immediate localities in which they labour, and their last reports show that they have been increasingly successful and this is borne out by reports sent in which show that there has been an increase in their receipts and expenditure for all purposes has risen from \$2,062,293 to \$2,067,235, or an in-crease of \$4,942—an average of \$22.35 to each family, a decrease of nearly 45 cents, and of nearly \$12 to each communicant. a decrease of about 20 cents.

There has been progress towards it, and there is no reason why it should not be accomplished. Then committees will present their annual reports to the Supreme Court with much greater satisfaction to themselves, and there will be more fully seen the grounds God gives for thankful acknowledgment of the abundant blessing He has been communicating. In no one report has the Church so full a presentation given of what He is doing for His church and enabling her to do. Is there not a day coming—has it not arrived?—when the Report of the Committee on Statistics will be received with special acknowledgment and thanksgiving by the Assembly to the Hely One of Israel for the benefits He has bestowed? He has bestowed?

RECOMMENDATIONS.

- I. Your Committee would call attention to the neglect of many vacancies in not sending in their reports, and would ask the Assembly to renew its injunctions to Presbyteries to require these.
- II. That Presbyteries be enjoined to call upon their Clerks, or Committees on Statistics when there are such, to report at some meeting, say in March, or as soon thereafter as practicable, the names of congregations and vacancies that have not reported.
- III. That congregations be enjoined not to report in their statistical and financial returns to Presbyteries moneys that have not been actually remitted to the Trensurers of the Church for the different Schemes.
- IV. That Woman's Foreign Missionary, Young People's, and kindred Societies, in connection with congregations, that have undertaken the collection of moneys for religious purposes, be requested to furnish the treasurer of the congregation, or to report at the annual meeting of the same, the amounts they have collected, so that the congregations may be credited with these, and that they may appear in the reports of their operations.
- V. That local treasurers, or the agent of any Scheme who have collected subscriptions in different localities, be asked to report the amounts and objects to the treasurer of the congregations to which the subscribers belong, that they may be entered in their books, and included in the returns made to the Committee on Statistics.
- VI. That it be referred to the Committee to be appointed to consider and provide for inserting a column in the Statistical Report inquiring if Young People's, or other Societies, have been formed in congregations and stations as auxiliary to the Home Mission Committee, and another in the columns on Finance for entering the amounts collected.
- VII. That Sessions be required to procure from the Superintendents of all the Sabbath schools and Bible classes in connection with congregations and stations the actual number of those enrolled in each so that the returns may be complete.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

WESTERN SECTION.

The financial statements connected with the several Schemes of the Church show a gratifying increase in the receipts for the past year. It is true that several of them have received large bequests, but, allowing for these, there has been an increase in most cases from the ordinary sources. The Reports of the Boards and Coramittees deal with the financial results in each particular case, and so in this brief statement attention shell be specially called to the matter of the General Assembly Fund. The matter has been brought under the notice of each Presbytery and Congregation, and the result is that there has been an increase, though a small one, the amount received in 1890-91 having been \$3,975.50 and for 1891-92 \$4,145.11. But still the contributions are not satisfactory, and not a few congregations—and some large congregations—here given no attention to this important and necessary fund. It appears to be necessary that some more definite regulations should be made to meet the contingent expenses of the Assembly from year to year, and it is recommended that the Finance Committee shall make out an estimate of the amount required for the expenses of the current year, and that these shall be apportioned among the several Presbyteries on an equitable principle, making allowance for the circumstances of the more distant and feeble Presbyteries. The amount be raised and sent to the Treasurer before the end of the year.

In reference to the distribution of the minutes it is evident that the plan of sending to the congregations, at the rate of one for each elder, cannot be kept up, the large increase in the eldership requiring a large additional expense each year. It is suggested that a copy of the minutes and reports should be sent to each Minister, and to the session of each congregation complying with the requirements of a contribution, and also one for the Board of Deacons or of Managers in each congregation, thus giving three copies to each congregation. Copies should be sent also to all the Foreign Missionaries in the different fields. Then copies should be on sale at reasonable amount, say 500, orders for these to be each to the Assembly Clerk, say by the 1st July of each year, that it may

In reference to the printing of the Reports of Boards and Standing Committees the Assembly should adopt a rule similar to that which has been adopted by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, which is in the following terms: "A sufficient number of the Reports of the Boards and Committees shall be forwarded by them to the place of each Assembly, prior to the day of meeting, and a file of the same, stitched together, shall be delivered to each Commissioner."

The accounts for the several Schemes are appended, and a general balance of the several Funds is added. The accounts have been audited by A. Jeffrey and J. Y. Reid.

APPENDIX NO. 28.

REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

More and more throughout all Christian lands is the question of Sabbath Observance coming to the front as a matter vitally affecting the physical, social and spiritual interests of mankind. Social economists and statesmen, though they may ignore the religious aspects of the Sabbath, find themselves compelled to give attention to it for economic reasons.

On the continent of Europe there is a decided movement to recover the Sabbath as a day of rest from toil for the labouring man. In Great Britain, in this country, in the United States and other lands where the Sabbath as a day of rest has been fairly well kept, there is a determination to retain the day of rest, and preserve it from the encroachments which greed of gain is ever seeking to make upon it. Hence it is wise for us to recognize two great aspects of the Sabbath question. We can and ought to unite with all parties, whatever be their views as to the sanctions of the day or the manner of its observance, who contend for the setting apart of one day in seven as a day of complete rest from toil.

The social economist may seek this merely for the physical well-being of society. The labour unionist may demand it as his right from personal or family reasons. The Roman Catholic may contend for it on merely ecclesiastical grounds, because the Church commands that the day shall be kept. So far as civil protection for the Sabbath is concerned, the contest is narrowing itself down to a fight for the day as a day of rest from labour, and all who accept this simple platform must join hands and wage united warfare if this day of rest is to be maintained. We must not seek to incorporate everything in civil law that we may feel to be binding upon our own consciences.

It is quite different when we come to view the Sabbath in t light of our own duty as Christian people, and as a Christian Church. For us the day is not merely to be retained as a day of rest; it is to be a day of worship also, a day that we sanctify unto the Lord our God. Hence it becomes us to keep the day holy, and by all the means in our power to promote the due religious observance of the Lord's Day.

From the reports presented to your Committee, we believe we can say without boasting that our Church has not been negligent either in resisting encroachments upon the Sabbath as a day of rest from toil, or in enforcing its religious sanctions as a day of worship.

As two ways in which the Lord's Day is violated, the reports present the usual, almost stereotyped, list of complaints. Railway and steamboat traffic, as heretofore, stand out in bad pre-eminence; then followed Church parades, Sunday funerals, Sunday visiting, fishing, driving, etc.

A thoughtful examination of the list, whilst showing that we are sadly far from perfect, proves that, comparatively speaking, we are a Sabbath-keeping people. Whilst, therefore, we should put forth our utmost endeavour to have removed from our midst the evil that exists, let us be protoundly thankful to the God of the Sabbath for the inestimable boon He has conferred upon us, and continues to us in this land—a quiet Sabbath Day.

The report from the Synod of the Maritime Provinces is especially encouraging. One fact is worthy of notice, namely, that with regard to the Sunday traffic over the Intercolonial Railway; the report says:—"Local traffic has diminished over the whole system to a very considerable extert."

"There are fewer passenger trains leaving for their destination on the Lord's Day." "Though freight traffic, too, is less this year than last."

"Less labour has been performed in the mechanical department at Truro on Sabbaths." "This imprevement is due to a change in the head of that department."

From the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa comes a note of different tone. "There is more freight carried on the Sabbath than on any other day of the year. It would almost seem, too, that the railway authorities have specially selected this day as the proper time for doing repairs and other special works in their numerous workshops." This report calls attention to political gatherings in Quebec upon Sabbath Days.

It also refers to the fact that the Canadian mail packets sail from Quebec upon Sunday. The Canadian mails are put on board on Sunday morning, and a supplementary packet is made up and forwarded to Rimouski upon the Sabbath Day.

The Synod appointed a deputation to wait upon the Government in connection with this matter. The Postmaster General has promised to confer with the Steamship Company to see what can be done to avoid this desceration of the Lord's Day.

In the report from the Synod of Toronto and Kingston special note is made of measures taken in Toronto to prevent the passing of a proposed By-law, whereby street cars would be allowed to be run in that city upon the Sabbath Day. The measures were successful and the By-law was defeated by a large majority.

Hopeful words came from the Synod of Hamilton and London. After going over the ground pretty carefully the report says:—"On the whole your Committee cannot refrain from expressing the conviction of the healthy tone of public opinion on this subject, and in particular their satisfaction at the jealous care evinced by the congregations of the Church with respect to the claims of the Sabbath upon our time and regard."

In Lethbridge, N.-W.T., there has been considerable agitation over the opening of the Post Office for the delivery of mails on the Sabbath Day. Strenuous efforts have been put forth to have to closed. The Government has been approached both by petition and deputation. Pressure, however, has been brought to bear upon the Government on the other side of the question, and the result is not yet known. The whole community is interested in the result of the efforts which the good people of this town are putting forth. The plea put forward for the opening of this Post Office is the usual one of mercantile necessity. In a case like this every Christian citizen of that town should refuse to take his mail from the office on the Sabbath, and our people there should be made to feel that in such a conflict the whole Church will make common cause with them.

Three matters stand out prominently in the reports of this year :-

(1) The first is the evident increased attention given to the subject of Sabbath Observance in the ministrations in the pulpit, and in the teachings in the Sabbath Schools. Your Committee cannot too strongly emphasize the necessity of this. If the people be not educated in the conscientious and intelligent observance of the Lord's Day, it will be quite in vain for us to pass laws or look for help in outward restraints. The best restraint from evil is ever that formed in the hearts of a God-fearing community.

(2) It was natural that all the reports should refer to the legislation sought from the Dominion Parliament. Your Convener asked Mr. Charlton, who has charge of the Bill, for a statement of the position in which it now stands. Mr. Charlton has kindly furnished the following, which we take

the liberty of embodying in our report :-

The Bill was reported to the House last session by the Special Committee to which it had been referred. This Committee eliminated from the Bill such provisions as were held to come more properly within Provincial jurisdiction. The provisions of the Bill as reported were:—1st, the prohibition of the publication, circulation, or sale of newspapers on the Lord's Day; 2nd, the closing of the canals on the Lord's Day; 3nd, the restriction of local traffic on the railways on Sunday to the movement of perishable goods and milk, and a provision intiting the co-operation of the American Government for securing the same regulation in regard to international traffic; and 4th, the prohibition of excursions by rail or steamer, or partly by rail and partly by steamer on the Lord's Day. The Bill was reported by the Committee too late to receive any action on the part of the House last session. The same Bill was again introduced the present session. It passed its second reading and was referred to the Committee of the whole House; when first taken under consideration by the Committee the Bill was thrown out by the expedient of moving that the Committee rise. This expedient is often adopted when the appointe of a Bill wish to strangle it without having their votes go upon the Journal, as votes in Committee of the whole are not recorded. The following day the promoter of the Bill moved that it be restored to the list of public bills and orders in the position it formerly occupied. Under Parliamentary rules a vote upon this motion could only be made upon a recorded divisor, and the Bill was permitted to be restored to the orders without opposition. It has since been considered in Committee of the whole. The Sunday newspaper action has been rejected, and the one relating be canals adopted in a modified form; when the Committee rose and reported progress the railway, section was under consideration. At this stage of the session it is unlikely that final action upon the Bills will be reached.

It is certain that a considerable majority of the members of the present House are either openly or secretly opposed to Sunday observance legislation, and apathy regarding the question on the part of the Christian public will render the chances of a Sunday observance Bill doubtful. A more vigorous and united effort in favour of securing the rights of the civil Sabbath to the toiler in Canada should be made by all church organizations and denominations favourable to the measure.

(3) The third matter made prominent in the reports is in reference to the closing of the World's Fair on Sundays. This is, without doubt, the burning question of the year on the question of Sabbath observance. Naturally the sgitation has been keenest in the United States, where the primary responsibility rests; but it is an international rather than a national affair, and from all Christian lands influence is being brought to bear upon the Commissioners to have the g.tes of the Exhibition closed upon Sunday. It is, without doubt, an exceedingly mortant event—a strategic point in the great Sabbath conflict. Should the foes of the Sabbath carry their point, it would prove one of the most serious retrograde movements in regard to Sabbath observance that has ever occurred on this continent. On the other hand, the closed gates and suspended business of this great Exhibition would be a lesson to the world of the blessings of the due observance of the Day of Rest

Our Church has shown its deep interest in the issue by the action taken at the various Synods. From the Presbytery of Gueiph and the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, there come to the Assembly special overtures, which will no doubt be presented in due form.

It is satisfactory to know that material help to a solution of this great question has been given by a recent action of Congress when making an appropriation to the Columbian Fair, coupled it with the condition that the Government exhibits be closed on the Sabbath days.

The Church has a high duty to discharge in regard to the due observance of the Lord's Day—not only to defend it from the constant encroachments which the greed of gain and the love of pleasure are making upon it, but also to promote such a use of the day as shall tend to man's highest spiritual and moral welfare.

Your Committee would make the following recommendations :-

RECOMMENDATIONS.

(1) Same as last year, viz.—"That ministers of our Church be careful to bring before their congregations the nature and sanctions of the Sabbath day as they have opportunity, and that at least one sermon during the year be devoted to the subject.

"That parents in their home instructions and teachers in their Sabbath Schools, take pains to instil into the minds of the young the teachings of Scripture in regard to the Sabbath day.

That the ministers and members of our Church, and especially those on our various Sabbath Observance Committees, seek, as they have opportunity, to use the press in influencing public attention to right views on Sabbath observance."

(2) That the General Assembly express its sympathy with the people of Lethbridge in their efforts to secure the closing of the Post Office in that place on the Lord's Day, and that the General Assembly memorialize the Government in regard thereto.

(3) That the Assembly express its general approval of the bill for the better protection of the Lcrd's Day now before Parliament, authorize the Moderator and Clerk to sign a petition in favour thereof, and appoint the members of its Committee on Sabbath Observance as its representatives in the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada.

(4) That the Assembly join with other bodies in urging upon the Commissioners of the Columbian Exhibition, to be held in Chicago, to close the Exhibition on Sabbath days; and that the Assembly also petition the Government of Canada to command the closing of all exhibits over which they may have authority.

(5) That a circular be sent to Presbyteries, containing questions for the purpose of eliciting information, and that Presbyteries be recommended to call for reports from their Committees on Sabbath Observance at a regular meeting of Presbytery.

APPENDIX No. 30.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON "THE PRESBY-TERIAN RECORD" AND "THE CHILDREN'S RECORD" FOR 1891-92.

At a meeting of the Committee duly convened and held in the office of publication, on the 30th day of May, 1892, the following report was read and it was unanimously agreed to transmit it to the General Assembly.

ROBT. H. WARDEN, Convener.

There have been printed during the year 565,000 copies of the Record, or an average of about 47,000 monthly. The receipts have been \$10,173.35. The expenditure, including \$1,000 specially voted by last Assembly, \$10,546.23. The balance on hand May 1, 1891, was \$3,149.35, on May 1, 1892, it was \$3,044,07. This, while representing the state of the accounts at a particular date, does not imply a permanent balance, as the receipts come in largely at the beginning of the year. Pursuant to the resignation which they laid on the table of last Assembly, and to the appointment then made, Mr. Croil, who had managed the Record since its beginning in 1876, and Mr. Murray, who since 1877 had been associated with him transferred their work on the first of January to

ray, who since 1877 had been associated with him, transferred their work on the first of January to Mr. Scott.

Mr. Scott.

For a number of years the income of the Record slightly exceeded the expenditure, and the balance was given to the Schemes of the Church. Latterly, the surplus has been devoted to the distribution of the Record, paying, in 1890-91, for about 3,500 copies that were given free, and partly paying for about 5,500 that were sent out to mission stations and weaker congregations at rates varying from ten to twenty cents, thus raising the circulation to a grand total of 46,000 copies.

At the beginning of 1892 it was felt that owing to the large circulation, in consequence of the energy with which it had been conducted in the past, it might with safety be enlarged, which was accordingly done, the change in size and type, considerably increasing the cost, making it necessary to ask the full price of twenty-five cents from all subscribers, and to lessen considerably the number of free conies.

Samples have been freely distributed with a view of increasing the circulation. The mailing list

at the present time, including one thousand free copies, is 45,750.

The whole number of the Children's Record printed from January to December, 1891, was over 220,000, or an average, apart from the special issue of January in that year, of 18,000 per month. The total income for 1891 was \$2,247.65. The expenditure was \$2,455.43, leaving a debt balance at the end of December of \$206.18. Of subscriptions unpaid at that date, enough will probably be received to cover this amount,

The whole issue from January to April, 1892, has been 75,000, or an average, including specials for sample distribution, of nearly 19,000 monthly. The receipts for the same period have been \$947.43, the expenditure \$691.31, or, including the balance of \$200.18 paid on last year, it amounts to \$897.49, leaving a balance on hand at date of \$49.94. The subscription list at the present time amounts to about 17,000.

On the first of January, Mr. Cruikshank, who amid the cares of a large and growing congrega-tion, and the building of a new Church, had carried on so vigorously the Illustrated Magazine and Children's Record for the year 1891, transferred his work to Mr. Scott, and since that time the two Records have been under one management.

OBITUARY NOTICES.

Rev. B. Ross, Truro.—The death of this faithful servant of God took place on the loth June, 1891. He was a native of Pictou, and was the son of one of the ronner Presbyterian ministers of the county. He studied in Scotland, and after a period spent in teaching in the grammar school of New Glasgow, was licensed to preach the Gospel, and was settled in Upper Londonderry, N.S. He did much missionary work through the Province. He was an excellent scholar, and was for several years one of the examiners of Dalhousic College. He was highly respected by all who knew him. He died in his sixty-seventh year.

Rev. Donald Fraser, M.A., minister of the First Presbyterian Church, Victoria, B.C., died 9th July, 1891. He had suffered from bilious fever for some months, and, in the hope of finding relief, earns to Ontario. He made no real improvement, and returned home only to die. Mr. Fraser was educated at Queen's College, and had laboured with great faithfulness and success at Priceville and Mount Forest before going west. He died at the age of 48, leaving a widow and six children.

Rev. James Ferguson died at London in August, 1891. aged 63 years. He was a native of Glengarry, and educated at Knox College. At Lobo and at Alvinaton he faithfully discharged the duties of the pastoral office, and for some time before his death he lived in London, engaging in missionary work in Manitoulin Island and St. Joseph Island. Mr. Ferguson was a most excellent man, held in the highest respect by all who knew him. He left a widow and large family, most of whom fill important and responsible positions.

Rev. Geo. Brown died at Wroxeter in August, 1891. He had been pastor of Wroxeter for twenty-two years, having previously laboured first in the Foreign Mission field, and afterwards in New Brunswick. In consequence of the infirmities of advancing age, he resigned his charge about three years ago. He was a faithful pastor and held in very high esteem by all who knew him.

Rev. James Allan of Covehead, P.F.I., died on the 11th August, 1891. He came, from Scotland about 40 year, ago, and soon after his arrival was ordained as pastor of the Presbyterian congregation at Covehead. He was an earnest preacher and most faithful pastor, and his memory will be long affectionately cherished by those among whom he laboured.

Rev. Robert Scott, of Brooksdale and Burns Church, died on the 3rd October, 1891. For about eleven years he laboured in the Gospel ministry with great zeal and unwearied diligence. His early death is regretted by his congregation and by his brethren in the Presbytery. He was educated at Knox College.

Rev. W. Neilly, a young and devoted missionary, who was appointed to Schreiber and other places on the Canadian Pacific Railway, was drowned in the waters of Lake Superior as he was crossing in his cance from Steele River to Jackfish, on 10th November, 1891. He taught for some time in West Gwillimbury, where he was well known and highly respected. He studied in Knox College and gave himself with great zeal to missionary work. He was looked upon as one of the most devoted missionaries in the service of the Church in the North-West, and will be long remembered in the region where he laboured.

Rev. Jonas Johnson, the pieneer Icelandic missionary in Manitoba, died on the 6th December, 1891, after a short illness, at the early age of 27. He was a native of Iceland, and was converted under the ministry of Rev. Mr. Murphy, of the Mariners' Church, New York. He arrived in Winnipeg about four years ago, and, while working with his own hands to gain a livelihood, laboured as a missionary among his countrymen, of whom there are between 2,000 and 3,000 in Winnipeg. The work was taken up by the Presbyterian Church, a building erected and the mission greatly blessed. His early death was deeply regretted, and the funeral services in the Martin Luther Icelandic Church were very largely attended.

Rev. Alexander Kennedy, one of the fathers of the Presbyterian Church and a faithful standard-bearer of the cross, after many years service, passed away at the age of 87, at Welland, at the residence of his brother-in-law, Mr. G. C. Cowper. Mr. Kennedy, who had from his youth a strong desire to be engaged in missionary work, was licensed to preach the Gospel in 1835, and was ordained the first missionary to Trinidad. His preaching attracted great attention, and he advocated with characteristic seal the cause of the oppressed Africans. Repeuted attacks of fever obliged him to leave Trinidad and come to Canada in 1852. When his health was somewhat restored he accepted a call to Enniskillen, and afterwards removed to Dunbarton, where for about 30

years he ministered to a deeply attached congregation. Some years before his death he retired from active duties, although to the end of his life he delighted to preach the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Rev. George Coull, M.A., a native of Scotland, and a graduate of King's College, Aberdeen, died at St. Sylvester on the 3rd February, 1892. After license he was appointed a missionary to Smyrna. After some years he came to Canada and laboured in New Glasgow, and afterwards at Valleyfield and some other places. Afterwards he was appointed acting Professor of Hebrew and Chaldee in Morrin College. His attainments as an Orientalist were of a very highly esteemed as a minister, a scholar and a Christian gentleman.

Rev. A. L. Wyllie, for many years minister of the Presbyterian congregation of Great Village, N.S., died soon after the begioning of 1891. After coming to this country he laboured first in Londonderry, N.S., afterwards in Richmond and North-West Arm, Halifax. Latterly he was engaged in missionary work in various places under the direction of the Home Mission Board. As a minister he was highly esteemed, and did much good in the places where he exercised his ministry.

Rev. Alex. Ross, formerly of Harbour Grace, Newfoundland, and who latterly was principally exployed in preaching in the Home Mission field, died after a short illness, having till his last illness enjoyed uninterrupted health. Mr. Ross was a well-read theologian, an acceptable preacher, and highly esteemed in private for his genuine kindness of heart.

Rev. James Hally, for nearly twenty years the faithful and much-loved pastor of the congregation of See. Therese and Grand Freniere. He had obtained leave of absence for some months, and had gone to visit his native country. When just about to set out on his return to Canada he was seized with what proved to be his last illness. The intelligence of his death gave deep sorrow to his congregation and brethren.

Rev. C. Ewen McLean.—Mr. McLean was a native of Ross-shire, Scotland. He studied at Glasgow, and was licensed in 1847. After some time he came to Canada and was ordained to the pastorate of Winslow by the Presbytery of Montreal in 1852. He was afterwards settled at Stayner. After spending a couple of years in Scotland he returned to Canada and laboured at Leitch Creek, Capte Breton. Having demitted his charge in consequence of declining health, he spent the remainder of his days in retirement a. Consecon, Ontario. In the absence of an ordained missionary at Consecon he gave what service his health permitted. He enjoyed the respect of his co-Presbyters and of many friends.

Rev. William Stewart, late of Hornby, died at his home in Toronto on the 20th January, 1892. When he came to Canada he was for twelve years minister in Chatham, N.B. Afterwards he was sottled at Hornby, where he laboured from 1859 to 1887. Since the latter date he lived in Toron.to. He was a man of scholarly attainments and literary tastes, faithful in the discharge of his duties. He had a peculiarly happy faculty of aptly introducing Scripture into all his public exercises.

Rev. John Cook, D.D.—This well-known and distinguished divine, who for more than half a century occupied a prominent place in the Presbyterian Church, died at Quebec on the 31st March, 1892. In the brief space afforded here a very imperfect record can be given of the life, labours and character of Dr. Cook. He came from Scotland in 1836, and became pastor of St. Andrew's Church, Quebec. His powerful intellect, his varied qualifications and the active interest which he took in everything connected v v. action and religion soun gave him a place of great influence in the Church and in the contract of the second place of the second power, his discussions were distinguished and the clearness of thought, beauty of language and true eloquence. He rendered important services in various ways, and at different times to Queen's University, and he was principal of Morrin College from its establishment to his death. He was twice Moderator of the Synol of the Presbyterian Church in connection with the Church of Scotland, and in 1875, when the great union was effected, he was regarded as the one best entitled to fill the position of Moderator. In the history of the Presbyterian Church in Canada the name of Dr. Cook will always shine forth as one of the most distinguished of her ministers and leaders.

Rev. Peter Currie, a retired minister of the Church, died at Strathroy on the 28th April. Mr. Currie was for many years pastor at Teeswater, but retired from active duty about ten years ago He was widely and favourably known throughout Western Ontario. He was a student of Knox College.

Rev. James Sinclair, retired minister of third and town line of Huntly, died on 20th April, aged 83 years, after a brief but severe illness. He was a native of Ireland. For many years he faithfully preached the Gospel to the people of his charge. His remains were followed to the grave by a large number of mourners and friends.

Rev. Thomas Lowry, died at Milverton, 28th May, 1892. Mr. Lowry was a native of Ireland, and for ten years exercised his ministry in that country. After coming to Canada he laboured at Parrie and Innisfil, Whitby, North Mornington and Milverton, and First Church, Brantford. For some years past he lived in Milverton. He was an earnest and able preacher and pastor, and for several years was Secretary of the Foreign Mission Committee. His memory will be long cherished by many of the ministers and members of the Presbyterian Church. He died at the age of 81.
