OTTAWA, May 14 .- (Can. Press.)-A bulletin issued today by the censor and statistician's office records the condition of crops and live stock on April 30 as reported by agricultural correspondents thruout Canada.

It is estimated that in Ontario about 18 per cent. and in Alberta about 43.5 per cent. of the areas sown to wheat last fall have been winter killed. These percentages represent a deduction of 261,000 acres from the total area sown to fall wheat, viz.: 1.086,800 acres, so that the area remaining to be har-







MUSICIANS JOIN WITH STAGE HANDS?

Present Convention May Result in Amalgamation of Two Unions.

One of the most important steps in the interests of organized labor that have been taken during the eighteen years in which th∈ American Federa-tion of Musicians has been in existence tion of Musicians has been in existence will in all probability be taken at today's session in the Labor Temple. This will be an agreement between the musicians of the United States and Canada and the International Theatrical Stage Hands Employes' Union.

Speaking to The World last night President Weber of the American Federation of Musicians stated that the Stage Hands' International Union will address the convention today as fraternal delegates, and that every effort will be made by them to ratify the desired agreement between that union and the seventy thousand musicians of the two countries.

Should an agreement be arrived at it will mean that in case of a grievance both bodies will unite. Should the musicians of a certain theatre or of the theatres of a city go on strike the stage hands would, according to the agreement, go cut with them, and the musicians would adopt the same course in case of a strike or threatened strike of the stage hands.

An Important Question.

President Weber stated that another very important question to come before the convention today would be the proposal that the American Federation of Musicians establish publishing houses of their own for the publication of music. During the past few months a thoro investigation into the question and a huge mass of statistics and information have been secured and will be placed at the disposal of the convention.





DOMESTIC SCIENCE LECTURER ENTERTAINING UNAWARES

SPLENDID lesson in efficient housekeeping was taught to the nation a few weeks ago, during the flood in Dayton, Ohio, by the National Cash Register Company. Without any previous notice thousands of hungry, terror-stricken, homeless mortals were thrust into the factory dormitories, dining

All were fed and cared for, not for a day nor a night, but for several

How few homes are so well prepared for emergencies or chance visitors as this factory was? How few women have a well-stocked cupboard and the "know-how" to make a few unexpected visitors comfortable at a moment's notice? This is a great gift and one easily acquired; sometimes it is met with in the character of a homeless, ancient maiden lady, again it is not found in the make-up of a boarding-house keeper.

It is well enough to say that this big factory is in the habit of feeding hundreds; this is true, but it is that same habit of good business ability that American women need to cultivate, to give them the same efficiency that is found in a well-run factory.

The Cash Register Company's chef introduced a new style of catering and quick service at an officers' dinner some two years ago that deserves to be well known. By it he serves one hundred diners in five minutes.

The tables are in the form of a horseshoe, with the chairs on the outer side. The tables each seat fifty and are thirty-six inches across.

The Hotel Monthly gives this description of the service itself:

In front of each chair a space of eleven inches is measured for each individual and there a silvered nickel plate is placed, filled with hot water. The dinner plate is put on this so that the foods on it are kept hot through

The table setting includes knife, fork, spoons, small bread and butter plate, centre piece of fruit and end pieces of bread.

This bread included Zwiebach, cornbread, pulled bread, white and brown bread and biscuits. Individual saits and peppers are at hand.

All the food is served from chafing dishes passed by a boy inside the horseshoe and diners help themselves.

The bread is passed by another waiter and then the hot water containers, and the now empty plates, are removed and fruit, dessert and beverages served. This idea of service is good, for it obviates the danger of careless and awkward waiters spilling hot liquids into diners' laps and makes it possible to serve a great number in a moment's time.

Beware of carton goods like breakfast foods; they should always be freshly packed, and so must all flours and baking powders.



China, Resentful at British Opium Traffic, Leans to United States.

GENERAL CHANG'S VIEW

President of Opium Prohibition Commission Says British Influence Is Waning.

LONDON, May 14,-Gen. Chang, resident of the Chinese National Opum Prohibition Commission, has arrived in England. He is delegated to lace before the British people the plain facts of the opium-suppression novement and to appeal, on behalf of the men of all parties and provinces in China, for a complete release from the obligations imposed by existing treaties in respect to the Indian traf-

fic.

Gen. Chang, discussing the British policy in an interview in The Daily News, referred to the effect of the opium traffic on Anglo-Chinese commercial relations, saying:

"Now that the Chinese people generally have realized the evil that opium is doing to the country, they find it hard to forgive England for insisting off its importation. The poorer people are learning to read, and many of the new vernacular newspapers are very bitter.

"It would be going too far to say that there is a definite boycott against British goods, but certainly the tendency is not to buy them when something else will do as well.

"From many points of view British influence in China is decreasing, solely on account of the resentment against the opium traffic. As long as your Shanghal stocks keep coming in these strained relations will, I am afraid, continue.

"How far this tendency has pene-trated you will see from an amusing conversation I had recently with one of my servants. He had been sent to buy some kerosene oil, and came back with an unusual brand. Questioned why he had chosen this, he explained that one kind had a trade mark which he thought British and the other was American, and he unhesitatingly chose the American.

"You see," the general concluded, "America gave us back her share of the Boxer indemnity, and she has given us recognition. Great Britain has given us opium. Can you wonder that America gains in our developing markets what Great Britain loses?"







SYNOPSIS OF DOMINION LAND REGULATIONS.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 13 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, nother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. A NY person who is the sole head of



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
