BELGIANS JOYFULLY WONDER WHEN GERMAN SKILL WILL SHOW ITSELF

Morning Post Correspondent Found Liege Accessible—All Dread of Germans is Gone—Peasants Still Toil at Harvest to Save It Being Trampled by Armies.

LONDON, Aug. 14. (3 a.m.)—The Post correspondent with the Belgian army sends the following: "The success of the Belgian army has been astonishing. Everywhere along the line of outposts the German main body were baffling checks. Like an angry dog faced by a porcupine the vaunted Prussian army stands puzzled."

"I do not wish to exaggerate the facts or to pretend that the Belgians are winning a series of important battles. Their successes so far are all intrinsically small but they are making a habit of success."

"Yesterday I walked some distance with a soldier, who was on his way from Brussels to the Liege forts. Clearly, therefore, the Liege forts are not closely invested, when individual soldiers can come and go."

"The Belgians jokingly wonder when the German military skill will begin to show itself. The audacity of the Belgians is not only more than the audacity of bawling, like men who are pressed from behind. In contact with the Belgian cavalry the Germans show inferiority. Moreover, the artillery nor infantry has shown brilliancy."

"As an actual fact the attitude of the Germans today is not offensive in any spirit sense. "Here are my observations of the day in detail. I began by finding a comrade in a soldier going from Brussels to one of the forts at Liege. We were mates for some kilometers, and as my papers were irrefragable he offered to let me accompany him right to Liege."

"This would have been a charming adventure, but, interrupted by a journalistic service and I had to say good bye. "No, it is clear from this that Liege is not closely invested, when soldiers can come out and individual soldiers can go in."

Not a Belgian Hero. "Afterwards I visited the position where I had seen operations Tuesday. The Germans had been satisfied with their repulse Monday and Tuesday, and had made no further attack. I am certain as possible that here they learned nothing except that the Belgian lion has strong claws."

"All dread of the Prussians is gone. This is the most valuable gain apart from the fact that the German effort to reach out our dispositions seems to be failing. "At one place (the name was elided by the censor) there appears to have been a battle in which 5,000 Germans were repulsed, in another fight the allies captured prisoners and munitions of war including valuable fire pieces mounted upon motor cars."

Defenders Are Gay. "From here I passed a little behind the outposts front to the position where the Germans had attacked the Wednesday morning, and had been repulsed. Then I went to the extreme left of the position where nothing had been attempted by the Germans."

"Then, guided by the sound of cannon, I went to the centre, where a detailed exchange of artillery shots was being made. Here on the following morning an attack in force was being anticipated. "As I left the field at sunset to make my way back to Brussels in the afternoon of the summer evening, my Belgian comrade stole up lines of old men, women and children bringing little comforts for the troops. Laughter crackled cheerfully."

"In the last of the daylight, side by side with guns and entrenchment old men, women and children still toiled at the harvest, straggling to bring the last of the golden wheat lest the invaders should trample it on the morrow. "At the end I came to a section of the road which had been mined, and there I had to make a footsore detour of seven kilometers to get back into Brussels."

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DEMAND REVIVED FOR HIGHER RATES

Prominent New York Stock Exchange Circularizes U. S. Banks.

RAILWAYS NEED RELIEF Interstate Commerce Commission Told Emergency is Great.

Special to The Toronto World. NEW YORK, August 14.—The prominent stock exchange firm of J. S. Sachse and Company is sending to the 22,000 banks and banking institutions of the United States a circular urging them to use their influence with their congressmen to secure the passage of a bill resending the Interstate Commerce Commission to review and revise its recent rate advance decision and in its discretion promptly to grant further and adequate rate advances to all the railroads. The firm urges this as an emergency measure to prevent the passage of an American railroad securities held in Europe, which was only temporarily halted by the closing of the public markets. It is asserted that American securities are in disfavor, because of low railroad earnings, and that those which are sent over by Europe will not be taken up freely by large investors in America because they have not sufficient confidence in the success of the railroads under the present scale of low freights. Rates need to be advanced materially in order to give such a margin of earnings that the road securities will be sought. It is also pointed out that the credit system of the world has been upset. "We have lost European bankers," the circular says. "Every year our railroad systems have to spend enormous sums to increase and extend their transportation facilities to meet the growing demands of American commerce. To obtain this money the roads cannot turn to Europe and American investors are not a liberal under present conditions. It is absolutely necessary to keep up with requirements of the roads, and it is declared that needed raised will start all the business of the country toward a prosperous level, because constant buying of securities will then take place and the roads can get the funds and credit they now lack for making expenditures."

The bankers to whom the appeal is made are asked to induce some of the large shippers of the country to join in this movement, as the question is now a national one, and relief should be given to the railroads immediately, in view of the emergency necessity.

ELEVEN PORTS IN BRITAIN ARE OPEN "Approved" List is Furnished to U. S. by British Embassy.

Canadian Press Despatch. WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Charge Barclay, of the British embassy, tonight submitted the following memorandum to Secretary Bryan: "The following is a list of approved ports in the British Isles: Aberdeen, West Hartlepool, Hull, London, Folkestone, Plymouth, Bristol, Holyhead, Liverpool, Greenock, all other ports are prohibited ports. All powers can land or embark at the approved ports with the permission of the alien officer at the port; they can land or embark at the prohibited ports only with the permission of the secretary of state. Any power may be closed altogether to traffic if the naval authorities consider it necessary."

Moratorium Extended. VIENNA. The Austro-Hungarian moratorium affecting private debts was extended today till Sept. 30.

United States May Enlarge Censorship. WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Final decision as to the policy of the Washington Government toward the extension of the censorship recently applied on wireless stations to cable offices has been deferred several days. Representatives of some of the commercial companies interested, it is understood, have asked for an opportunity to be heard, and it is expected that their counsel will confer with Attorney-General McReynolds Monday as to legal questions involved. President Wilson and Secretary Bryan conferred about the cable censorship today, but took no action, deciding to study the situation further.

WIVES MUST CONSENT. MONTREAL, Aug. 14.—Every married man volunteering for active service is compelled to bring the written consent of his wife before he can be accepted, according to a militia order made public today. Thousands of these consents have been received by the military authorities.

Refusing to Move From Vicinity of Craig Street Army, Sergeant Hooten of Garrison Artillery Fired With Fatal Results—Bystander Was Injured by Bullet.

Canadian Press Despatch. MONTREAL, Aug. 14.—One man shot dead and another in the general hospital suffering from a rifle wound, the outcome of a misunderstanding between the victim and a sentinel at the Craig street army about 5 o'clock this afternoon indicates that war conditions prevail in earnest in Montreal. The man who was shot, Antoine Notter, a French reservist, arrived in this city this morning from Cape Breton. He was having his photograph taken by an instant photographer on the street, close to the Craig street army and was waiting for it to be finished when ordered away by Sergeant Hooten of the Garrison Artillery.

FRAUD CHARGED. W. J. Newman, 15 Gould street, was arrested by Detective Taylor last evening, charged with obtaining \$100 worth of goods by fraud from the K. and S. Tire Co.

Declined to Move. Notter either did not understand the order or would not obey it. It is said he could not speak English. The sergeant attempted to shove the stranger away with his rifle, which was clamped between his extended hands, whereupon the stranger showed a disposition to resent the treatment. Then the sergeant, it is said, put his rifle to his shoulder and fired without further parley. The bullet entered Notter's groin, passing out thru his body. He was being hurried to the General Hospital when he died.

SUCCESS BY FRENCH IN VOSGES  
IMPORTANT PASS OCCUPIED

British War Office Confirms Victory After Five Days' Resistance by Germans — Many Desertions From Enemy Recorded — Machine Guns Captured — Belgian Victory Officially Reported.

Canadian Press Despatch.  
LONDON, Aug. 14, 4 p.m.—The official press bureau of the British war office and admiralty today issued news of a French success in the Vosges Mountains, Alsace, in the following words:  
"After a successful resistance lasting five days at the passes of Sainte Marie-Aux-Mines and Le Bonhomme, the French troops have occupied the region of the Saale Pass, which commands the valley of the Bruche, an affluent of the Rhine.  
"At Saale numerous desertions of German troops are notified.  
"The French have taken many prisoners and captured some machine guns.  
"It is now confirmed that the Belgian troops were successful in their engagement on Aug. 12 with six regiments of German cavalry, supported by 2500 infantry with machine guns and artillery.  
"The Germans were completely disorganized. The six cavalry regiments suffered great loss and the Belgian troops pursued the infantry, which gave way.  
"This (Friday) morning towards

Eighteen, ten miles north of Namur, a mixed detachment from the garrison surprised some cavalry regiments encamped, threw them into confusion and fought them towards the east after taking numerous prisoners and capturing cannon and machine guns.  
"The Liege forts still hold out and German cavalry avoids contact with the French.  
"News of the fighting in the vicinity of Haelen yesterday confirms that the Germans were driven to the east, and that there is now no German cavalry between Hasselt and Ramillies, in the province of Brabant.  
"The Liege forts still hold out and have plenty of supplies.  
"German cavalry patrols are now reported to the north of Montmedy, which lies on the Franco-Belgian border, in the department of the Meuse.  
"The communication of the official press bureau concludes:  
"Belgian cyclists and cavalry from Namur yesterday surprised a force of German cavalry, accompanied by artillery and machine guns, and compelled them to retire. The Germans lost a field gun and several machine guns."

LADIES OF MONTREAL  
VOLUNTEER AS NURSES

MONTREAL, Aug. 14.—There are now 66 nurses and 21 doctors who have volunteered in this city for service at the front and all these names have been forwarded to Ottawa for approval.  
Among the women recruits is Miss Brenda Williams-Taylor, daughter of Sir Frederick and Lady Williams-Taylor, who is offering her services to the voluntary ambulance classes to obtain the necessary certificate.

GERMAN AVIATOR PUT TO  
FLIGHT BY RIFLE FIRE

PARIS, August 14.—It is officially announced that a German aviator, whose machine carried the French flag, threw a bomb upon the railroad station at Vesoul, capital of the department of Haute-Saone, and two others in the town of Lure, fifteen miles north-east of Vesoul, but without particular damage being done. The aviator is said to have been put to flight by fusillades from sentinels and gendarmes.

SHARP DEMAND MADE ON TURKEY  
CONCERNING GERMAN CRUISERS

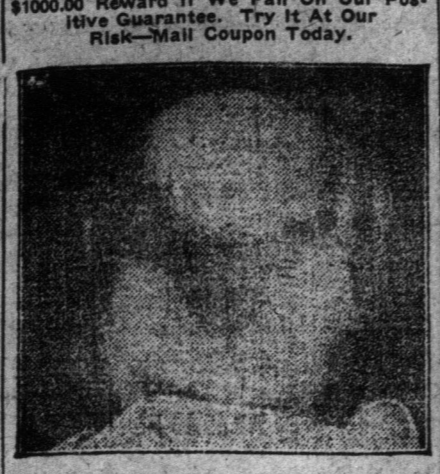
Great Britain, France and Russia Order Immediate Repatriation of Officers and Crews — No Official Confirmation of Purchase of Ships.

LONDON, August 14, 2:53 p.m.—Great Britain, France and Russia have sent a sharp demand to Turkey for the immediate repatriation of the officers and crews of the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau.

It is reported that the two cruisers were met by Turkish vessels outside and escorted into the Dardanelles.  
There is no official confirmation of the actual purchase of the cruisers by Turkey, but the report to that effect is generally credited.

QUITE IN DARK

Minister of War Urges That Daily Newspapers Be Sent Each Man.

PARIS, Aug. 14.—Correspondence between Adolphe Messimy, French minister of war, and Premier Viviani, has been published.

"I believe it to be necessary to send to all those fighting under the conditions the comfort of a daily newspaper. I would have the soldiers constantly measure the importance of their individual effort in the national task, and by this thought create among them a generous emulation.  
"I wish the soldiers to learn with what care the nation surrounds the parents, the wives and the children they have left behind them while they consecrate themselves to their great task—a task glorious because their sacrifices are the price of the independence of our country and of the grandeur of France in the triumph of right and Liberty."  
Premier Viviani responded approvingly of the suggestion with much feeling.

GUELPH, Aug. 14.—Thousands of citizens crowded the streets this evening when the newly-enlisted recruits, who will go to the front and do battle for the British Empire, headed by the Guelph Musical Society Band and the members of the Veterans' Association, many of whom have taken part in several campaigns, marched to Exhibition Park, where a patriotic concert was given by the ladies of the Garrison Club, the resulting funds being used to provide comforts for the local men who will go to the front. Dozens of automobiles were in the parade and all the officers of the local militia were present. The concert was patronized by thousands and a handsome sum was realized. As the recruits marched along the streets they were greeted with cheer after cheer.

This is a war of ideals, and it is this that makes the strength of Belgium as the strength of ten, until we Britons feel that we could not desire our own men to do better.

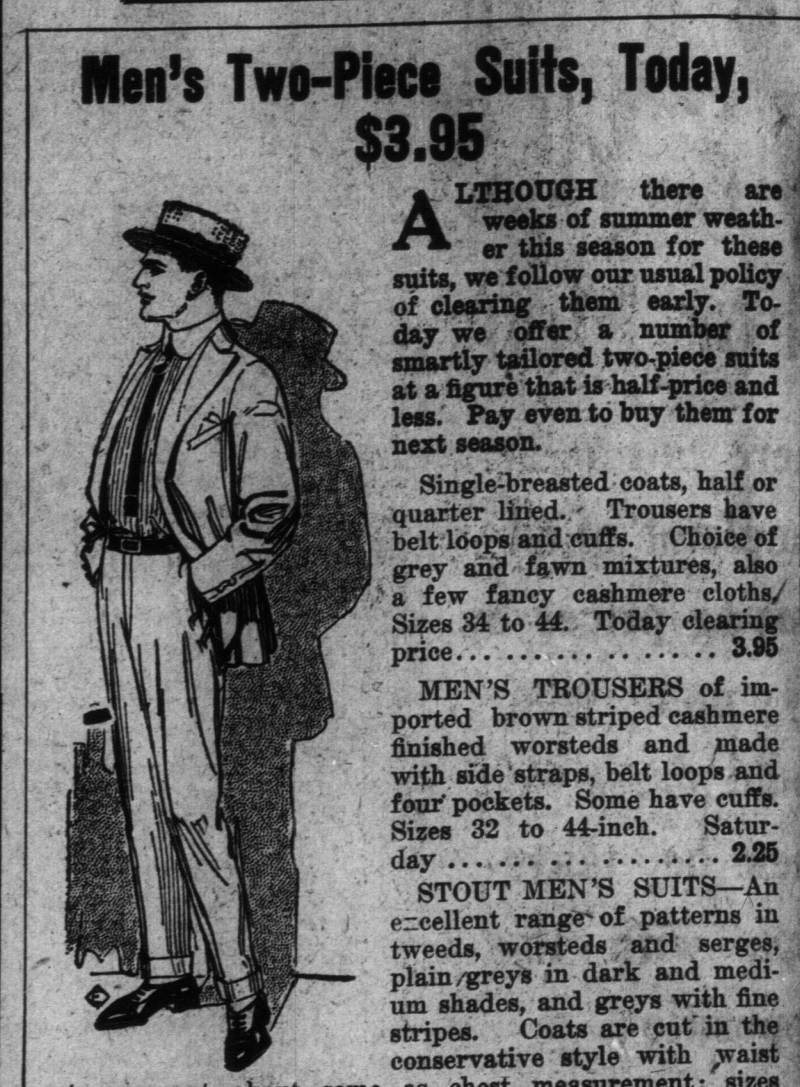
