$\because$ A dry-goods merchant of St. Thomas is offering his stock for sale, with the intention of giving up that line of business and joining withatable beverage manuficturing compuny of that town, said to be doing a very promising business.
* The exports of produce from Prince Edward Ishand during the past few months have been enormous. Of oats alone there linve been shipped from the Island since September one million three hundred and fitteen thousqud bushels.
- At a meeting of the creditors of John Witchell, carpentey apd contrnctor, Penbroke,

Oat., an ofter of 10 eents on the dollar was approved, and a further meoting called for the loth of fanuary to confirm the action taken, and perfect a deed of composition.
$\because$ The insolvency of E. J. O'Flaherts, furtier, of this city, is made public by the issue of a writ of atrachment at the instance of Thomas May \& Co., also of this city, on Tuesday last.

* The failure of John Horsman, a prominent wholesale and retuil hardware merchant of Guelph, Ont., is announced. A loss of $\$ 10,000$ by fire some two years ago is said to have been the origin of his present misfortune. Lintilities are stated to be about $\$ 50,000$, prineipally due to Montreal and English creditors.
- After making allowance for a falling-off of $50,000,000$ bushels in different Soulhern States, owing to a variety of canses, the corn crop of the United States this year is estimated to exceed that of aray previous by over $150,000,000$ bushels. The product in the states and territories west of the Mississippi alone is over $100,000,000$ hushels.

And who has eaten the $797,000 \mathrm{cwt}$. of hams which we received during the same year?" These misfortunes are not due to bud basiness thas year but to a series of losses mude throughout the long yeurs of depression, and only brought to publicity by the suspension of the Consolidated Bauk, in which institution most of the dishonored paper is known to lodge. It is thonght that the full ramifieations of this business, so far as the retail fur trade is concerned, have now been brought to light.

- Dangerous comterfeit one dollar Domin. on bills (payable in Toronto) are in circulation. The praper is mach thinner, but the engraving is singularly well executed, and, apart from the general appearance and yexture by which experts can usually de-
tect counterfeits, it is not ensy to point out differences by which the bogus bills are to be distinguished from genuine. Perhaps the most noticenble difference is the engraving of the head of Jucques Cartier. In the genuine bill the neek is fitirly exposed between the beard and coller, while in the bogrus there is a light line inmediately below the beard, and the work about the neck is dove so imperfectly that it is difficult to say whether the collar renches cloce up to the beatd or a portion of the neck is exposed. The fice of the female figure is also inferior, and much conrser in expression. The next most conspicuons difference is in the cloud work about the centm figure. The line engraving in the gennine bill will here be found even, continuous and quite distiuct, : though very faint, while in the bogus bill the same generit effect is obtained by coarser and less regular lines, not continnous but dotted. In nearly all the fine work, such as clouding, shading and scrolls; the conutericit will be

Finances and Jnsurance Rmyicm.

## MONTREAL, DECEMBER 19, 1879.

The fammers' parliament.
'The amual meeting of the Dominion Grunge was held last week in Toronto, and, judging from the report, the orgonization is increasing in influence. The number of members is stated to be about 31,000 , and there are 760 subordinate and 61 division granges. We are not informed of the number of granges, or of members in each of the provinces, but we learn that since the last report 32 subordinate granges were formed in Ontario, 21 in Nova Scotia and 1 in each of the provin. ces of Queber and Manitoba. The report states that it is a comparatively new step for an organization composed of men and women whose occupation is agriculture "to send representatives from the differ"ent provinces of the Dominion to legis"late upon matters pertaining to that "industry." We have italicized the words "to legislate" which are calculated to convey a very false impression as to the functions of the Grangers, who assume to be a sort of Farmers' Parliament.

The practical difficulties in the way of such organizations as the Dominion Grange and the Dominion Board of Trule are very great, so grent, indeed, as to be almost
insurmountable. All that these botlies can do is to discuss subjects of common interest, and ascertain the views of the majority on each of such subjects, aud communicate them to the Govermment or Parliament of the Dominion. It is evident that the members of the Grange are chiefly from the province of Ontario, although a few members from Nova Scotia appen to have been present. It mast be a heary tax in time and money on residents in Nova Scotia to attend a meeting in Toronto for the purpose of diseussing subjects brourht before them with but: little prospect of satisfactory results. The local Boards of Trade are probably better organizel than the Grangers, and are certainly much less numerous. They have much better means of mising money for casual expenses than the Grangers can possibly have, but the inconvenience of attending the annual meetings has been found suthiciently great to prevent many considerable towns from sending representatives. It has been found absolutely necessary to grant sessional allowances to the members of our various Legislatures, Local and Dominion, in order to indemnify them for the expenses which they have to incur in the public service. Without such indemmification, we doubt very much whether it will be found possible to induce our farmers to attend meetings of the Dominion Grange at Toronto.

We have endeavored to form some opinion as to the utility of the late meetings from the proceedings, but we must own without much success. If the Grange were to confine its efforts to the advancement of the art of agriculture in imitation of the Royal Agricultmal Society of Eng. land, we could understand how it might be the means of effecting much good. We fear, however, that it has other aspirations, and when it tells the firmer "to claim his right and assert his position," we cannot but apprehend that there is a desire to promote some class objects. We lean from the Master, that being the designation of the chief officer, that the Grangers look forward to the day "when money " kings and railway rings, and all combina"tions which have hitherto held the far"mers beneath their iron grasp, will suc"cumb to the popular verdict of the "people, and right shall rule." Let us examine this sentence: "There is but one way in which money kings can fasten an iron grasp on fammers, which is by the latter borrowing money."

It is the fashion just at present with others as well as the Grangers to designate as Jews and Shylocks those who have at the earnest solicitation of Canadr lent their money on what they have cleemed good
security, viz, the national faith as regards loans to Government and the security of property as regards individuals. It might be very good advice on the part of the Master of the Grangers to warn their tollow members not to be induced to borrow money at interest, but when he complains of the borrower being in the iron grasp of the lender he goes a little too far. As to " "ailway rings," that taunt might well be spared. The unfortunate shareholders in our railways have not received a lividend for years on the money furnished for the construction of railroads which have materially cheapened the cost of transport to the great benefit of the very class whose exponent is not ashamed to charge them with fastening on it an iron grasp. As to the politicians of all classes, they are charged with riding into place and power by "fraudulent harangues." We incline to think that the Master has conceived the idea that "fratululat haragres". constitute the best mode of attaining power, for most assuredly he las given a specimen of one that it would be difficult for any cno of the class designated as "political partizans and party leaders" to rival. What the political course of the Master may have been we have not the slightest idea, but we infer from the, concluding paragraph of his address that he is given to making forecasts of the future. Referring to his cordial reception as delegate of the Dominion Grange by the National Grange of the United States, and to the warm interest manifested by that body in the success and welfare of the Canadian Institution, he told his brethren that this "gives no uncertain sound as to the final cementing of the last link in the chain of fraternal relations existing between us." It would be interesting to learn from the organ of the Grange the precise meaning of the foregoing sentence. What does the Master mean by the " last link?"

It is in the discussion of the Bankruptey Law that the Grangers have given a practical illustration of the meaning of many of the vague expressions in their yeport and in the aldress of their Master, in which complaints are made against those who "would debar us from our just rights and position." After inveighing against the In. solvency Law, and threatening the Dominion Senate with extinction for having refused to repeal that law which probably affects the famers of the country as little as any other class of the community, a suggestion is offered that the farmers should be allowed each to set apart a cer. tain portion of his land, no doubt including his house and outbuildings, which is not to be liable for his debts. We pre-
sume that this suggestion is offered to the mercantile classes as the condition on which the Grangers will withdraw their opposition to the Insolvency Law. It is we think on the whole fortumate that tho Farners, Parliament has shewn its hand, and enabled other classes to form some idea ofits aims.

We do not find any expression of opinion as to the recent changes in the tariff on agricultural products, notwithstanding the lively discussion that has been going on as to their effect on the interests of the very class represented at the meeting. It would really have been interesting to learn the views of the Grangers on this subject, but neither in the report nor in the Master's address is there any allu. sion to it.

## RELATIONS BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA.

We can readily comprehend that our English fellow-subjects who are so devotedly attached to the principle of free-trade must feel a good deal of irritation at the protective policy recently adopted by Canada, but, when the exponents of public opinion in the United States make grave charges agninst us on the same ground, wo confess that we are inclined to feel indignant. We are indebted to the Toronto Globe for the opportunity of perusing an article which recently appeared in the Albany Evening Mail, in which both the Canadian parties are charged with evincing jealousy of and hostility to commercial intercourse with the United States. It is not a little amusing to find in a United States Journal a charge that our policy is characteristic of China or Japan, in view of the fact that our exclusive tariff is really a free trade one in com. parison with that of the United States. Our chief complaint against the Albany Journal is the omission on his part to state that precisely the same duties are levied on our imports from the United States, where heavy duties are imposed on every article of Camadian production, as on those from our own Mother Country, where Canadian products of every kind are admitted free of duty. Surely this fact is of essential importance, and ought not to be kept in the back ground. The Albany paper aflimens that our tariff was especially constructed with a view to exclude American manufactures from crossing the border, but he makes no reforence to the exclusion of Canadian manufactures from the markets of the United States. With regard to the negotiation of another reciprocity trenty, it is highly improbable that Canada will make any further effort in that direction. She has
undergone quite sufficient humiliation already in connection with reciprocity, and has now determined to adopt a policy of her own, which, if not perfect, she will amend without reference to the opinions of her neighbors.
The Albany Mail is equally unfair on the subject of the fisheries. It must be borne in mind that Canada does not feel any desire to lease her fisheries to the United States for considerations of any kind, pecuniary or otherwise. The United States fishermen are anxious to enjoy the privilege of fishing in Canadian waters, and in the last treaty on the subject all their demands were granted, notwithstanding their refusal to entertain the Canadian demand for a new reciprocity treaty. As the United States would not consent to give an equivalent for the right of fishing in the form of free commercial intercourse, the only mode left for settling the value of the fisheries was by arbitration; and, after interposing delays for years, a fairly selected commission gave an award which Canada at once accepted, though far below what it deems the fair value of the rights conceded, but which was bitterly compluined of by the United States. The Albany Mail, referring to the Fortune Bay affair, insists that the $A$ merican fishermen were doing nothing but enjoying the rights secured to them by the Treaty of Washington." That is precisely the point at issue. Is there one line in the 'Treaty of Washington granting to United States fishermen privileges which are denied to British subjects? The United States journals are most careful to a avoid the discussion of the question of Sabbath breaking. Are their laws, we should like to know, such that Canadians would be permitted to carry on fishing in United States waters on Sunday? We feel assured that; even if there was any temptation to fish in the United States, no such impropriety would be attempted, but it would be interesting to learn whether there are any laws in the United States for preventing the desecration of the Sabbath. It is wholly incorrect to assert, as the Mail has done, that "an attempt las persistently been made "to justify the lawless depredntions of "the rioters." It has been admitted by the entire Canadian press that the people of Fortune Bay were wrong in taking the law into their own hands, but it is likewiso maintained that the United States fishermen were the first violators of the lave, and that, when redress is claimed for one act of violence, it is not unreasonable that it should likewise be sought for a flagrant violation of the manicipal lay. The case lies in a
nutshell. The treaty confers on United States citizens the right to fish in conmon with British subjects, but nogreater right. Had, then, British subjects the right to do what the United States fishermen wero doing in Fortune Bay on the 6th January last? If not, the United States ought to be as ready to grant redress as they are to claim it. The Albany Mail charges Canada with "a morbid jealousy" of the Uni. ted States; and with assuming " $\mathfrak{a}$ hostilo attitude" towards that country. We havo little doubt that the feeling here is almost universal that the repeated efforts mado by Canada to carry on friendly intercourso with our neighbors have been invariably met in a hostile spirit. Such articles as that in the Albany Evening Mail are not calculated to improve日the feeling which exists.

## the globe and Mr. strathy.

Tho chief organ of Mr. Strathy, for, thanks to the influence of the Federal Bank, he has some minor organs, has replied to our article of last week, and has endeavored to persuade his readers that we had resorted to abuse of the Globe instead of meeting Mr. Strathy's charges. The charge of black mail, the Globe says "has not been met at all." We fail to comprehend how it is possible to meet such a charge, otherwise than by a positive assertion of its untruthfulness. When on business tours we solicited advertisements from the Federal Bank, precisely as we have done from other banks and merchants, but we emphatically deny that we used threats or other than fair business inducements. As wo felt that Mr. Strathy's letter involved a question of personal veracity, we deemed it our duty to refer specifically to articles in the Journal of Comarioe of which Mr. Strathy had complained, and of which the Globe now complains. Our object was to prove that we had not attacked the Federal Bank. We aro prepared to join issue with the Globe on the subject of his criticism of one of our former articles, which excited the wrath of Mr. Strathy, although it may not be irrelevant to remark that it was published about a year and a half ago. We contend that the rate of interest allowed by the Chartered Banks on deposits is a fair subject for the criticism of the press, and eapecially of commercial journals, and that, to stigmatize such criticism as "tactics which no journal of repute would employ towards any one," is discreditalle to the Globe. The article was not aim d specially at any bank, but, towards the conclusion, it was remarked that the support of the Federal Bank to a reduced
rate could scarcely be expected as it had advertised that it was paying 6 per cent. We pointed out last week that occurrences of a similar character to those at the I ondon and Kingston agencies of the Federal have invariably been noticed by the press, and that we took pains to get correct information, which was refused. What we published was substantially the same as what Mr. Strathy has admitted in his letter. Mr. Strathy and the Globe must be conscious of the weakness of their case when they notice seriously our little paragraph about the case of small-pox.

## THE NATIONAL CURRENCY.

Although we continue the heading which we have pretixed to former notices of Mr. Brooks' essays in the National, which have reached to No. 5 , we must acknowledge that it is no longer applicable. Mr. Brooks has abandoned the subject of the currency, and has clevoted his list letter to an assauit on the entire credit system. Canada has been "a mere tield of speculation for foreign Shylocks," the persons thus stigmatised being the capitalists who have, at the urgent request of Canada, lent her the money with which she has constructed her canals and other public works. Reference is made to the loan of $\$ 15,000,000$ to the Grand lrime Railway, not a dollar of which, principal or interest, has ever been repaid. Considering that Canda has got the railway and all the indirect advantages which it has conferred, and that the English shareholders have never had a dollar; principal or interest, for their investment, it is cer: tainly rather cool to repronch them with the non payment of their loan.
'ihe Essayist holds the opinion that "every mortgage represents a debt, aud "that debt is a curse, not only upon those "who individually owe it, but on the " country at large." And most assuredly he is right, if it be true that the whole world has been steeped in ignorauce prior to the advent of Mr. Geo. P. Brooks and the currency theorists, of whose opinions he has constituted himself the exponent. If it be true that the Government can, by issuing an indelinite amount of inredeem. able notes, not only construct public works, but supply all borrowers with money ad libitum, and without even exacting interest, then certainly we have been guilty of inconceivable folly in "soliciting British and other Shylocks to give us a golden toy to play with." Mr. Brooks. almits that there are "fumers who have " no mortgage on their farms, and no notes "under discount, men who pay ready " money for their groceries, stock, seed, " farm implements, and for everything
"they use," but he tells these people that they pay to the usurers "their share " like the others, and a very large share "it is." Now certainly they do not pay "like the others," who are described by Mr. Brooks as having their farms under mortgage, and who, moreover, may have notes under discount, and who do not pay ready money for their groceries, stouk, \&c., ©c. We apprehend that even Mr. Brooks' readers and disciples are not so completely bereft of cowmon-sense as to believe that the two classes of farmers whom he hans cleseribed can be placed exactly on the same footing. We are by no means prepared to admit that the debt of the one class is a curse, not only on those who individually owe it, but on the country at large. Ererything depends on the circunstances of the particular case. It is far from impossible that the farmers who have no montgages, no notes under discount, and who pay ready money, may have once been in the very same position as those who are now under the curse, as Mr. Brooks calls it, of debt. One thing, however, is clear, viz., that no one is compelled to borrow money on mortgage or by discount, or to buy on credit, and it is equally clear that the farmer who is free from debt does not contribute to what Mc. Brooks terms the usury exacted by loun companies. Nothing, therefore, can be more absurd than to sum up the aggregate indebtedness of Canadia in the form of public debts, bank discounts, railway debts, \&c., and estimate the interest as a charge on each family. The famer who is free from debt on his personal account has to contribute, in the form of taxes, to the pablic burthens, of which a portion consists of interest on the public debt. That debt was not contracted as the debts of most other countries, notably Great Britain, liussia, France and the United States, for war expenditure, but for objects of vast public utility.

Let us, by way of illustration, cite one public work on which inmense sums of money have been expended,-the Welland Camal. If the value of that work were to be estimated by the tolls collected on the vessels and goods passing through it, it must be acknowledged that it is unvemumerative, but if, on the other hand, we were to draw a comparison between the cost of bringing a bushel of wheat from the western part of Ontario to the sea. board, belore that work was undertaken and since its completion, it would be found that it has been as profitable a work as was ever undertaken. When Mr. Brooks ondeavors to create dissatisfaction at the loan made to the Grand Trunk Railway, does he ever reflect on what our munici-
palities have been doing of late years and up to the very time that we are witing? So advantageous to the districts of country through which they pass have railways been found that our principal cities, towns and townships have been ready to aid them by granting bonuses to companies chartered to build them, on no other condition than the construction of the work. Mr. Brooks recommends that a class whom he terms "the honest but unfortunate ille heads of families," should be aided by the Government with that wonderful instrument "a true national currency." "New homes, new farms, new cities and towns and new wealch are to be created in addition to the Pacific railway, and all by means of bits of paper, irredeemable except in equally worthless bonds." And yet, Mr. Brooks acknowledged, in one of his early letters, that it was indispensable to a sound national currency that no more than a sufficiency should be issued. What he would deem a sulticiency he will not say, but, considering that he objects in his last letter to the payment of interest, it is clear that the aggregate amount would be something enormous. Usury, which is the term applied to interest is "a Juggemaut of woe, injustice and wrong."

We observe that the National refers to the letter of a correspondent of our's from Toronto, in which there was a recommendation to take some active steps to prevent the spread of the views of the leaguers. The National challenges such discussion, and regrets that its opponents refuin from attending the meetings of the league. It is, of course, out of our power to julge whether the league is of snficient importance to render public discussion expedient. If we were to form our opinion from the weight of the arguments used by Mr. Brooks and the National, we should think it decidedy better to let them alone. The national actually cites the case of Robinson Crusje, who was left a solitary on a desert island to prove that gold had then no purchas ing power. We should be quite satisfied to submit the question to the umpirage of Sitting Bull, who, we venture to allirm would not hesitate in his choice between gold and national currency.

## IIIE COURSE OF CHEESE.

While the present season has presented unusual features in very many branches of our export trade, in none, perlaps, are these more maked than in the cheese market. Ravely, if ever before, has a season opened so inauspiciously as that just passed. The large stocks held over from last year, not only in this city
and throaghout the cheese marts of the Dominion, but still more notably in Eng. land, and the low price which ruled during the winter months, only to be followed by further dealings and a sagging market upon the advent of spring, together served as a strong check upon the farmer and factor against free operations. To these agencies favoring diminished production, was next added the fairly ruinous figures reached in mid. summer, whereby dairymen were led to a not inconsiderable extent to divert milk from its ordinary use to the fattening of calves and hogs. Finally, a long dry season added its influence in the same direction, through depriving the grass of moisture, to the impairment of its milkproducing power. To these several causes, all working directly to one end, may be traced a largely decreased supply of cheese for the season; but, as stocks held over entered into the summer export, the forwarding movement gives no reliable clue to the extent of the reduction.
The rise in cheese this year began at about the time of the apparent absorption of the last of the stock of 1878 , and then it was that the attention of shippers was drawn to the condition of the market as affected by the limited character of the new makes. At this juncture a few bold operators, taking the risk of the market abioad, succeeded in making quite a number of contracts for fall makes, but, as a rule, we understand that factory men refused to sell beyond stocks on hand. The revival of business in England now brought about the same effect in this as in the butter market, to which we had occasion to refer last week. A rapid and almost uninterrurted rise, from 30s. to 60s, took place, the price at this port, singularly enough, rather leading that cabled from the other side, upon which it was in $r$ fality dependent. The demand freely absorbed all that came forward, and the close of navigation found stocks low in Livercool, and not large at this port, the total visible supply being generally eatimated inadequate to the full requirements for consumption to be felt before the coming of another season.

So it has happened that a most unpromising season at the opening $y$ roves a very proticatle one at its close. It is true that not a few contracts were made by factory $n$ en at the low prices, lut list year the same plan worked greatly in their favor, and, moreover, the contracts, we beheve were generally made not to extend keyond October. Owing to the prolongation of fair pasturing weather, it in thought that the November-make this
year has been exceptionally large; in which case the dairymen have somewhat of an offset against their early sales in the high price to be had for unexpectedly late makes. In a majority of instances, however, as we have already stated, farmers refused to contract ahead, and the consequence is that they have reaped a very good proportion of the gross price paid for the season's cheese by consumers abroad. In fact, all interested parties, shippers, handlers, factory-men and farmers, have done well, and have every reason to congratulate themselves upon the outcome of the year's business. As to the future course of the market, if the points we have touched upon seem to suggest a continued upward movement, it should not be forgotten that the unusual November make has a contrary bearing, and furthermore, since consumption has already been so large this season, there would appear to be more than usual margin for miscalculation as to the demand during the winter months. Added to this is the probability, which we find generally ignored, that consumption will not continue on the ordinary scale of former good years, since the revival of business, while having a thoroughly sound basis is yet, on the surface, of a somewhat spas. modic and speculative character; moreover the lower prices of meats might well have the effect of turning consumption largely in that direction, to the consequent neglect of cheese. In the present state of trade reactions, extending back in their effects to actual consumers, are not by any means remote possibilities, and perhaps it would be the part of wisdom to regard them as contingencies it were well to provide against.

## CANADIAN FORESTRY. <br> (Continued.) <br> PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

The area of Prince Edward Island is 2,173 square miles. Population in 1871, 94,021 . The ownership of the woodlands is divided between the Government, residents on the Island or in the United Kingdom. The extent of timber lands was estimated in 1874 at one-eighth of the whole area of the island, and, though this proportion is rapidly diminishing, no steps whatever are taken to retard or prevent the exhaustion of the timber supply.
The rate of diminution may be seen in the fact that the amount of timber which it is estimated should annually be cut is put at 600 tons, whereas the quantity actually cut was, in 1874 , about 10,000 tons. About 8,000 tons of this is annually consumed on the Island, so that the supply, even for home consumption, will
rapidly fail unless some steps are taken to avert the evil. Most of the trees found in other parts of the Dominion grow also in this Province. There is very little oak, elm or ash, owing to excessive forest clearing and fires.

## british columbia.

The area of British Columbia is estimated at 213,000 square miles. Population, 50,000 , including Indians and Chinese. The timbered lands of the Province (with unimportant exceptions) belong to the Government, but can be purchased, leased or pre-empted without restriction. About two-thirds of the whole area of British Columbia (or, in round numbers, some 110 ,000,000 acres) is covered with timber of the following descriptions:-White pine, red pine, spruce, larch, plane, maple, oak, birch, beech, hemlock, cedar, alder, poplar, yew, ash, \&c., \&c. No steps appear to have been taken to prevent waste or to guard against the ravages from forest fires.
Of all the Provinces of the Dominion British Columbia alone appears to offer a supply of any considerable magnitude for the future wants of the timber trade. The timber resources of the Province are declared by local authorities to be practically inexhaustible, but it is probable that, should the whole strain of the demand be thrown upon British Columbia, a few years would make a very perceptible inroad upon the stock of native timber, situated in accessible districts of this Province.

## Economic Uses and Properties.

In toughness and elasticity, with comparative lightness, the ash stands unrivalled.

It is applied to almost every article of wood manufacture that require the above properties.

To the coach maker, the wheelwright, the boat builder, and, indeed, to all other artificers, whose trade require wood that combine strength with pliability, the ash is of much value. It is also greatly used in the manufacture of oars for the navy and mercantile marine.

The under bark of the ash gives a very brilliant dye to skins and wools. The
leaves and twigs possess medicinal properties, especially valuable as embrocations.

The wood of the alder is used in the manufacture of small fancy articles, and in turning and panelling. It also possesses the tanning properties to a considerable degree.

The wood of the different species of this well-known tree is used by all furniture makers, by wheelwrights in house and ship building, and in the general purposes of domestic economy. Used as firewood it is second only to maple, and the ashes yield a large percentage of potash. The bark of the white birch (betula alba, or papyracea) is most valuable to the Indian and the voyageur, in their journeyings and explorations through this vast country, as no other material is so well adapted for the manufacture of canoes. The fancy basket work of the Indian is too well known to require description, and from the bark of the various genera useful dyes are obtained.

## what educatlon is of most Value.

That which constitutes history, properly so called, is in great part omitted from works on the subject. Only of late years have historians begun giving us the truly valuable information. As in past ages the king was everything and the people nothing; so, in past histories the doings of the king fill the entire pictare to which the national life forms but an obscure background. While only now, when the welfare of nations rather than of rulers is becoming the dominani idea, are historians begimning to occupy themselves with the phenomena of social progress.

We want all facts which help us to unclerstand how a nation has grown and organized itself. Among these, let us, of course, have an account of its government, with as little as may be of gossip About the men who officered it, and as much as possible about the structures
principles, methods, prejudices, corruptions, etc., which it exhibited; and let this account not only include the nature and action of the central government, but also those of local governments, down to their minutest ramifications. Let us, of course, also have a paralle! des. cription of the ecclesiastical govermment, its organization, its conduct, its power, its relations to the state ; the ifleas nominally as well as those really believed and acted upon, let us at the same lime be informed of the control exercised by class over class, as displayed in all social observances, in titles, salutations and forms of address. Let us know too what were all the ohner customs which regrlated the popular life out of doors and indoors; including those which concern the relations of the sexes, and the relations of parents to children. The superstitions, also, from the more important myths down to the charms in common use, should be indiented.
Next should come a delineation of the industrial system showing to what extent division of labor was carried; how thates were regulated, whether by caste guilds or otherwise; what was the connection between employors and employed; what were the agencies for distributing commodities; what were the means of communication, what was the circulating medium. Accompanying all which should come an account of the industrial arts technically considered: stating the procerses in use and the quality of the products. Further, the intellectual condition of the mation in its various grades should be depicted; not only with respeet to the kind and amount of education, bat with respect to the progress mado in science, and the prevailing manner of thinking. The degree of rosthetic culture, as displayed in architecture, sculpture, painting, dress, music, pochry, and fietion, should be described. Nor should there be omitted a sketch of the daily lives of the people, their food, their homes and their amusements. And lastly, to connect the whole, should be exhibited the morals, theoretical and practical, of all classes: as indicated in their laws, habits, proverbs, deeds.

All these facts, given with as much brevity as consists with cleamess and acearasy, should be so grouped and arrang that they may be comprehended in their entirety, and thus may be contemplated as mutually dependent parts of one great whole. The aim should be so to present them that we may readily trace the relationship subsisting among them; with the view of leaming what social phenomens co-exist with what
athers. And then the corresponding delineations of succeeding ages should be so managed as to show us, as clearly as may be, how each beliel, institution, wustom and arrangement wits modified; and how the "consensus" of preceding struetures and functions was developed into the consensus of succeeding ones.
Such alone is the kind of information respecting past times which can be of service to the citizen for the regulation of his conduct. The only history that is of practical value, is what may be called Descriptive Sociology, and the historical writings of the late Lord Macaulay, if we except the unfinislied work of Henry Thomas Buckle, are the nearest approach to it that have yet appeared. The highest office which the historian can discharge is that of so narrating the lives of nations as to furnish materials for a comparative Sociology so called, and for the subsequent determination of the ultimate laws to which social phenomena conform.

It was contended that British Consols were of this mature.

We are asked first as to the exact mature of " British Consols," and the question reminds us that some of our currency theorisis have nsed the term "Consols" in a way that betrays ignorance of its precise meaning. "Consols" is an abbreviation of consolidited stocks, and originated many years ago when the funded debt of the United Kingdom, then consisting of a variety of lonns at diferent mates of interest and maturiag at different periods, was consolidated into one irredemable stock, whiel at first bore 3.1 per cent. interest but wits afterwards redued to 3 per cent, the holders laving had the option of accepting the capitat. It is possible that we may not be strictly accurate as to the original rate of interest paid on consols, but there can be no doubt that they are a permanent lown to the Government which may be redeened afier notice, and that the present rate of interest is 3 per cent. We fuil 10 comprehend why any one should urge the Government to issue irtedeemable sccurities. In Englata, where woney is abundan and Governmeut securities mach sought after, the Governuent has been able to obtain it on such securities as Consols, but in Canada investors would not be sat:sfied with irredecmable securities. The Cundian Goverument issues 5 per cent. stock to all applieants, and mdertakes to redeen it on application at par, anarraugement infinitely more beneficin to investors than the finglish C̣onsols.
J., Guclph, Ont.-We cannot afford to ndopt club-rates. The profit on subseriptions, in running a 32 to 36 page mper, such th the Journal of Commerce, is almost nil. Besides, we do not think there are business firms enough in the city to form a club, outside of those already on our subscription list.

- Whether or not electricity will ever cume into general use as an illuminator may yet be regarded as an open question, but that it will serve to cirenmscribe the utility of gas can no Ionger be doubted. Establishments requiring great light are constantly reported experimeuting with electricity successfully, and now we read that "the Guman steamer "Ciay of Burliu," which arrived at New York on Suturday, was lighted during the royage by electricity. Four lights were placed in the saloon and two in the steerage, each having a light power of 400 standard candles, the apparatus being driven by a small four-borse engine. The experiment proved such a success that the passengers presented an address of thanks to the Inman Company, through Capt. Kennedy, commander of the ressel."
