COAL SITUATION FAST BECOMING ACUTE IN CANADA

Ottawa Reports That Supplies Are Rapidly Being Depleted.

Special to The Toronto World. Ottawa, Nov. 16.—Without economy and co-operation Canada's coal problem will soon reach an acute state. Supplies, much below normal, are being rapidly depleted and their renewal is a problem. The United States is problematized. Since the coal strike no bituminous coal has been received in Canada from the south, and all the miners have been ordered to return to work many are refusing to do so.

COMPROMISE IS EXPECTED ON 48-HOUR WEEK PROBLEM

Canadian Labor Group Holds View That Dominion Should Work Out Her Own Salvation—Senate Reservations to Treaty Handicap.

Washington, Nov. 16.—Reservations to the peace treaty adopted by the United States senate raise new difficulties for the International Labor Conference and for the Canadian delegates in particular. One of the reservations includes "labor" among the subjects which "are not to be submitted in any way either to arbitration or the consideration of the committee or of the assembly of the league of nations or any agency thereof."

PLANNING TO HOLD IN RUNNING RAILWAYS

Government to Create Joint Board and Workers to Sit on Executive Committee.

London, Nov. 16.—James Henry Thomas, general secretary of the National Union of Railway Men, in a speech at Bristol today outlined the plan of the government to give the men representation on a joint board of management and expressed the hope that the agreement would be accepted. The government proposed, Mr. Thomas said, that the railways be managed by a joint committee of executives, on which the workers would have three representatives with powers equal to those of the general managers.

OPERATORS PROTEST FAILURE OF WINNERS TO RETURN TO WORK

Demands Made Show Little Difference From Those Made Before Strike.

Washington, Nov. 16.—Negotiation of a new wage scale in the soft coal industry stood in much the same situation tonight as when miners and operators met at Buffalo in September to frame a contract to replace the Washington wage agreement. This time, however, there was no threat of a strike and both sides were ready to resume their conference tomorrow in the hope of reaching a quick settlement.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Nov. 16.—The fuel controller, C. A. Magrath, has given to the press the following statement: "All orders-in-council under which the fuel control was administered during the war, are still in effect, although they have not been enforced since the fuel control organization was discontinued on March 31 last. In view, however, of the critical situation now obtaining in the matter of coal supply, the government has requested the fuel controller again to assume charge of the fuel situation, and in connection with imported supplies, has been intimate enough to secure the co-operation of the Canadian trade commission."

Cleveland, O., Nov. 16.—The giant Handley-Page airplane which left Minnola, New York, Friday morning, with about 1500 pounds of express on an attempted non-stop flight to Chicago, made a forced landing at Chicago's Randall racetrack late today, and was so badly damaged that it will require at least two weeks to make repairs.

PRINCE, RESTING IN SOUTH SPENDS STRENUOUS DAY

Walks Ten Miles, Spends Hour in Swimming and Three Hours Each in Golfing and Dancing.

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Nov. 16.—The Prince of Wales spent yesterday, the first of his three days' rest here, by walking ten miles, spending an hour in a swimming pool, and three hours and dancing for three hours. At the conclusion of this program he seemed to have recovered from the fatigue of his strenuous four-day visit to Washington.

ALL SOFT COAL SEIZED BY FUEL ADMINISTRATOR

Drastic Government Action is Taken to Protect Public Utilities and Essential Industries From a Threatened Fuel Famine.

Provincial Fuel Administrator H. A. Harrington has taken over all bituminous coal in the province of Ontario, under an order which he issued Saturday night. This order follows the action of the federal government in Ottawa by the Canadian Trade Commission to customs authorities to prohibit the export of coal from Ontario to the Dominion, placing an embargo on coal shipments somewhat drastic, has been taken in order to protect public utilities and essential industries in the country in order to meet any conditions that may arise as a result of the recent strike of coal miners in the United States.

The deck is of No. 1 ash and poplar, ribbed crosswise, curved and slatted endwise. The slats being counter-sunk, all joints and laps are glued, screwed and nailed. The roof covering is in one piece, and of double-texture two-ply sail duck, with rubber between. No seams to tear, rot or leak. 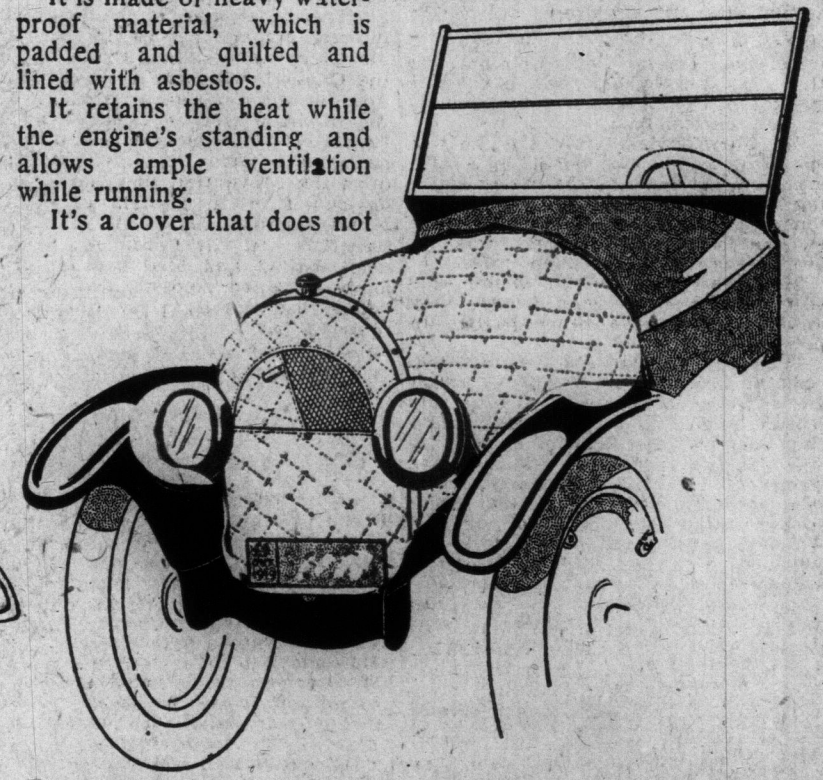

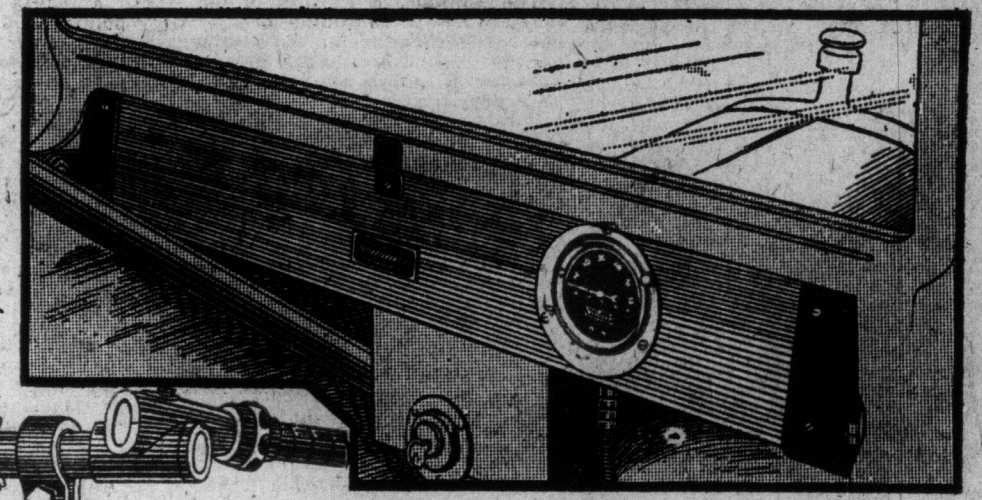

REV. DR. RIBOURG AT SAINT ALBAN'S

Society Can Be Saved From Chaos Only by Return to God.

Rev. Dr. Ribourg, preaching Sunday morning at St. Alban's Cathedral on "God's Mindfulness of Man," said, in part: "The verdict of history is that where there is no vision and no consciousness of God, the people perish. Each great movement along the upward way has been linked to a new consciousness of God. The great worths of all ages have been those who have lived close to God and have incorporated God's thoughts in their lives. The result of that consciousness of God is that it develops righteousness in man. The vision shows the way to purity—individual, social and national. Should every man realize this nearness to God, there would be no social problems to solve for the corporate life of the community would be transformed thru transfigured individuals. At the time of the French revolution, the dawn of a new world, when in dwellth righteousness, was ex-

pected, but the revolution went thru its baptism of blood and ended in despotism. And why? Because the elementary thing which could have operated the change and brought about the golden age had been overlooked, namely, the moral and spiritual rebirth of the individual. "The golden age of the millennium, the Kingdom of God on earth, must come, and will come in time, but they must be heralded first by the spirit of personal purity and righteousness. All the schemes of corporate reconstruction are useless, unless the individual soul is born again, unless men have become conscious of God's presence in their midst, and have a clear vision of God's requirements. Then the value of such consciousness will be seen in its results: better men will make a better world. In the last five years, we have had ample proof of the bankruptcy of a civilization without God. "Civilization may accumulate resources and open one department after another of life's treasures to the enjoyment of men, but a moment will come when it will find itself incapable of inspiring men to the worthy and equitable use of the gifts it has garnered. For when civilization loses hold of God, it loses everything. "There is no doubt that just now we are facing a crisis in all the spheres of man's activities in commerce, in industry, in governments, in society, in the church, and it seems that only a return to the God we have forgotten can save human society from chaos and, perhaps, disaster."

The above table shows that the number of smallpox cases in Toronto have considerably decreased and that only 23 have been reported in the past 24 hours. When pointed out to the M. O. H. that the number of cases reported were dying down daily, he would not say whether it was his opinion that the abatement of the disease was due to vaccination or not, but declared his thankfulness that the epidemic was showing a decreasing number of new victims.

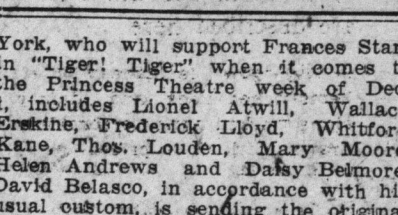

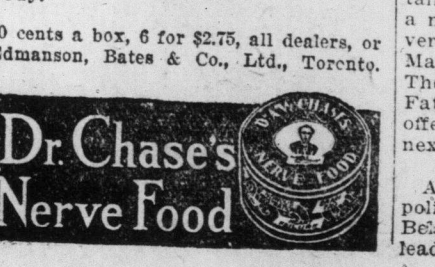

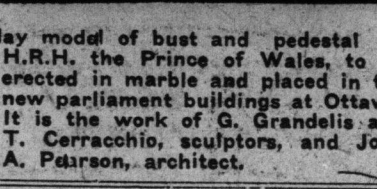

The World-Will or the Senators?

With the failure of the United States senate to ratify the peace treaty there disappears the last hope of the league of nations. As a result we may look for either a series of separate treaties producing practically the same effect, which is most improbable, seeing that the league with all its present prestige has failed; or there may be a return to the old balance of power conception of international relationships, which is also unlikely, in view of the marked hostility on all sides to this war-stimulating and armament-gendering policy.

America's isolation was begotten of selfishness, and while there was an admirable design behind the resolve on isolation, yet every form of selfishness has to pay its price. The civil war of half a century ago taught the American people that whether one liked it or not one had to be one's brother's keeper.

If democracy were world wide, not merely in form, but in spirit, there would be the less to regret. Or if there were some common tie of idealism and fellowship among the nations, such as links the British dominions together, all might be well.

The world would be quite a different place if various events had happened differently, but what has come to pass has usually balked the shrewdest diplomat. The world will get itself expressed, and should it differ with that of the senators, history will be dictated by the world-will. And this is the point that senators so very rarely seem to count upon.

SOFT COAL IS SEIZED BY FUEL CONTROLLER

(Continued From Page 1.)

done to carry on which the coal is required.

"This statement must be sent to the fuel administrator of the province in which the industry is located.

"While no demand has come from the United States that request for coal must be supported by an affidavit, it must be evident to us that it is imperative that no question be raised in the United States as to the correctness of the information given them in these applications.

"Upon receipt of a wire from the provincial administrator that he has an application for coal, required for emergency use, as outlined above, the fuel controller will endeavor to arrange for the coal to be supplied, requesting from the United States fuel administrator coal which cannot be supplied from coal now available in Canada.

"If any evidence of the failure on the part of any industry to put forth every effort to save coal comes to the attention of the fuel controller he will not approve any subsequent application for coal, which that industry may file with him.

"From the foregoing, it is evident that the provincial governments must immediately bring their provincial fuel administrators into existence again in order to look after coal shortages that may arise, either in connection with coal from Canadian mines or imported supplies as it is only by taking such action that the needs within their respective provinces may be protected."

Ontario is believed to be the only province that has a fuel administrator's office existent at the present time, and Mr. Harrington explained last night that he anticipates difficulty in keeping coal moving, and in keeping a close check on the situation, as he has his staff a sufficient number of inspectors, to cover the whole province."
