During the last financial year local authorities paid over in relief of rates £209,881-about \$1,000,000. Some of the larger amounts were Leeds \$275,000; Manchester, \$250,000; Liverpool. \$135,000; Hull, \$97,500; Notting ham, \$75,000, on the basis in most case of a two-cent fare. In addition to this the municipalities improved their posi-

tion financially by repaying out of rev nue \$2,800,000 of their capital expenditure. What private company is doing this? Not only so, but in connection with the charge that proper provision is not being made for den average rate allowed on this head by the municipalities was more than double that of the private companies. Glasgow, which on principle does not use its public utilities in relief of rates, with total receipts from its street railway system of \$3,600,000 and net receipts of \$1,790,000, set aside \$1,100,000 as a provision for depreciation and reserve. This city's favorable showing, according to the commissioners, is due to the corporation doing work which ought to have been charged against the street car operation. There is nothing secret about the accounts of the British municipal undertakings. They are printed and issued every year with unfailing regularity, the sums paid in aid of rates are known, the amounts devoted to the

The figures have been repeatedly and mercilessly attacked by the interested opponents of municipal ownership and have been investigated by parlian tary committees.
