Hamilton, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—One of the most sensational suicides that have occurred in this part of the country for some time took place in this city last night. About 8:30 James Hodge, 68 years of age, strong and healthy, built, walked into the City Hall, after looking around for a few minutes, seated himself at the foot of the staircase leading to the council chamber and, pulling a revolver from his pocket, sent a 38-calibre bullet through his brain.

MEANT A LOT TO THE CAMP

When Gooderham Syndicate Went Into It.

EXCITEMENT RUNS HIGH

At Rossland and Spokane Over the War Eagle Consolidation.

The C. P. R. to Build a Line from the Foot of Sloan Lake to Rossland—Mr. A. W. Carleton, M.P., Writes on the Basis of His Recent Visit to the West—International Riches—General Mining News.

According to reports that arrive from the west excitement is running high in Rossland and Spokane over the War Eagle deal. The people out there recognize that the entry of the Gooderham-Blackstock syndicate into the district on such a large scale means a lot to the camp, and in fact to all British Columbia.

Very few mining districts in the world can show such rapid development as Trail Creek has done. Within the past year mining machinery to the value of over \$1,000,000 has been installed in the various mines.

The town of Trail just to the north of Rossland is advancing with rapid strides, and the inhabitants think they have a lot to be thankful for. At the beginning of 1896 Trail was only a village on the edge of the primeval forest, but now it has a population of 3000, and is a busy mining centre. At a meeting of property-holders on New Year's day it was decided to raise the price of property 25 per cent. The railways are paying a great deal of attention to the place, and another indication of prosperity is the establishment of a brewery by the Kootenay Brewing Co., with a capital of \$50,000. Two saw mills are being erected, one of which is sufficiently advanced to permit the cutting of lumber. Mr. Henze has expressed his intention to add a refinery to his smelter, if assured of sufficient patronage, and many other improvements of minor note indicate that the new year has much in store for Trail.

Just at present there is a rumor to the effect that a tract of land has been secured on the river, in the south part of the town, on which it is proposed to erect another smelter. The usual mysterious "syndicate" is reported to be behind the deal, but nothing to substantiate the report is at hand.

TRAIL TO ROSSLAND.

Over 200 Men Employed on the Railway Between These Towns.

Men, teams and supplies are being taken in to Trail for use on the new railroad to be built between Trail and Rossland. Camps are being established along the west bank of the Columbia, and the actual work of grading will commence in a few days. Over 200 men will be employed on the grading and the work will be carried forward very rapidly.

It is reported on what seems to be good authority that the Canadian Pacific Railroad will build the line from the foot of Sloan Lake to Rossland, a distance of 20 miles, thus giving that system a continuous line from Sloan Lake to Rossland on the Columbia River. Close connection can then be made with the Columbia and Western, now to be extended up the west side of the river. This will enable Mr. Henze to compete for Sloan Lake ores, as he has arranged to treat such ores at the Trail smelter.

TO TAP THE CARIBOO.

Another B. C. Railway Projected by E. E. Ward.

F. E. Ward of Spokane has applied to the British Columbia Government for permission to construct and operate a railway from a point on or near Ashcroft or Kamloops to Barkerville in the Cariboo country.

NORTHERN PACIFIC'S GRIP.

The Big Company Thought to Have Stolen a March.

In the three-cornered fight which is going on between the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Canadian Pacific Railways for the control of the trade of the Kootenay, the first-named road has, according to all accounts, stolen a march on its competitors. The Northern Pacific has practically in its hands the Spokane Falls and Nelson, the Red Mountain and the Nelson and Fort Sheppard Pacific, and is advertising through connection to and from all points on these roads.

SAWMILL FOR ROSSLAND.

It is to Have 25,000 Feet Capacity For Lumber.

Ruelle & Halseck, formerly of Seattle, Washington, have established a firm to be known as the Rossland Milling Company, and have secured a mill site one mile east of Rossland. The machinery has been ordered and is now on the way, and a mill will be constructed that will have a daily capacity of 25,000 feet of lumber. It is expected that the mill will be in full operation within six weeks, and owing to its advantageous location it is expected to run to its fullest capacity. Good material to work upon can be easily and cheaply secured by floating it down from Arrow Lake, and the shipping outlet for the finished product will be to Nelson, and to Sloan and Rossland as soon as the projected roads are completed.

"I am glad to say that a different

Mining, like any other business, must
be conducted upon business principles,
with a due regard to economy.

"The old Marmora Foundry Com-

a parallel case to present operations.

"These people came into the then

Belleville, over the almost impassable

ties they erected their plant, which,
