Ginger Apples. For ginger apples select firm, lus-cious apples and prepare them in the same way—tho it is not so noccessary to clarify the syrup. A delicious pre-serve and one very similar to an East India preserve is made of the same yellow ground tomato prepared with ginger in, exactly the same way as prears. These tomatoes are simply freed from the stem and peeled by pouring boiling water over them, or the peel may be left on and the tomato merely pricked like plums. Do not confound this ginger root used in pickling and preserving with the gro root sold by druggists and some grocery stores is of no value in pre-serving. Neither can you get the same flavor from inclosing ground ginger in a bag and bolling it in syrup. Both these substitutes for the green root sive a rank, coarse flavor to pickles and preserves. What is needed is the green ginger root, which is brought to our markets at this season. It is a thick green root, and when in good condition may be easily scraped free from its skin and cut in slices. When it is poor it is withered and full of black spots.

Ginger Beer. Ginger beer is also an excellent sum-mer beverage. This question General Kuropatkin answers by revealing a remarkable story connected with a Russian timber company, formed to Upper Yalu River. According to General Kuropatkin, the evil genius of the Russian Empire in the year 1903 was a certain Alexander Mikhailovitch Bezobrazoff, a Russian promoter and speculator, who had held the rank of state councillor in the czar's civil service, and who was high in favor, of some of the grand dukes in St. Petersburg.
