P.R. freight clerks have to work "every night, also on Sunday," and "clerks are asked to come back and work, and if they do not they are dismissed from the company." He also says, "Tell me why the Lord's Day Alliance does not stop this work on Sunday."

We beg to assure "A Subscriber," that his letter is the first intimation we have received, concerning this Sunday work. As soon as the Alliance receives definite and reliable information, we shall certainly render every possible assistance to secure the C.P.R. freight clerks their weekly day of rest. 

INPENDIARY SUSPECTED IN OWEN SOUND BLAZE

Fire in the Northern Town Causes Damage Estimated at \$55,000.

OWEN SOUND, July 22 .- (Special.)-Owen Sound had its first extensive conflagration to-day in twenty years. Four acres along the water front and about \$55,000 loss is the result. The blaze was started in a vacant stable about fifty feet from the town's electric ight plant and swept every building long the East First-avenue front to the Northern Navigation Company's warehouse at the corner of Tleventhstreet, where it was got under control in a slow burning log building sheeted with lumber.

The firemen put up a strenuous fight and kept the fire from getting into immense quantities of cordwood, which were piled in the spaces beween the buildings.

The first to go were the coal sheds of the Davis, Smith, Malone Companies, then followed a three-storey wooden elevator warehouse, owned by James McLauchlan, and its contents, own ed by the McLauchlan and Sons Co., wholesale grocers, and W. A. Mc-Clane & Co. The residence of Chas. leibien adjoining and the one-storey rick warehouse and office of the Do ninion Transportation Company were oon ablaze, and as the latter nected with the immense four-storey elevator and storage warehouse, also owned by the Davis, Smith, Malone Company, it was

in incredible time a mass of flames. Cinders were carried half a mile from the blaze and caught in the roof of a frame residence owned and occupied by Abel Wright. As no assistance was available, nothing could be done to save it or its contents. North of the warehouse was one of

the earliest buildings of the town, a log residence, owned by the W. H. Smith estate. The slow burning nature of this building enabled the fire- plete. men to concentrate their efforts on prices. staying the conflagration before it reached the warehouse of the Northern Navigation Company.

The wind was for a time from the south, and it looked as tho the fire would touch with the colonies, H. W. Sir Wilfrid Laurier Resents Intimatien that They Are Opposed To Government Policy.

MELVILLE, Sask., July 22.—(Special.)—Sir Wilfrid Laurier's meeting to-day was not without incident. Prior to the public meeting in the afternoon the prime minister met a deputation of grain-growers. Charles Lunn represented that American settless represented. sented that American settlers were opsented that American settlers were opposed to the naval policy of the government, and objected to a grant to the imperial navy. He characterized the bridging of the Saskatchewan River as a mere bluff, in lieu of the building of the Hudson Bay Railway.

Sir Wilfrid replied to the point, saying that he did not propose to take advice on the navy from American settlers.

A memorial was also received from the Bangor Liberal Association, in-dorsing the navy and anti-cobmine legislation, and asking that South Af-rican veterans from the old country, who were residents in Canada at the time the scrip was issued, be allowed to participate; that the time for se-lection of grants on scrip purchased by speculators be restricted; that cooperative legislation be placed upon the statute books; that the tariff should the statute books; that the tariff should be reformed by admitting farm implements free of duty; that unoccupied lands held by speculators be especially taxed, and that direct legislation be established. They also asked that five per cent. interest be declared the maximum on lien notes for farm implements. per cent. interest be declared the maximum on lien notes for farm implements and agents be prohibited from pricing chattel mortgages from farmers after machines are partly paid for. The prime minister reserved his reply until this afternoon, and said, when introduced by J. S. Dawsey, mayor: "We have come to the last example of progress in Melville. The age of fairles has not gone, the age of miracles is still with us, but the fairles have changed their names to pluck, energy and enterprise."

A NY person who is the sole head of a A a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions.

made at any agency, on certain condi-tions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homestead-

brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$00.00.
