AFFAIRS AT THE POWER HOUSE

City Engineer Inspects and Finds Trouble Looming Ahead.

The city engineer forwarded the following letter to the board of control yesterday, in reference to the street railway service, but no action was taken in regard to them:

"I recommend that the city council order the Toronto Railway Co. to equip all their double track cars with air brakes, in addition to hand brakes. If the council have not the necessary power to make the order, I recommend that it be obtained from the legislature."

"Accompanied by E. H. Keating, manager of the Toronto Railway Co., the city engineer inspected the power house of the company on the 13th inst. The company commenced remodeling the plant some months ago, and the work is not yet completed. There is at present in the station four engines of 1800 h.p., two engines of 1800 h.p., four engines of 500 h.p., making a total of 11,600 horse power. One of the engines was burned out during the exhibition and will not be in service until about February, which leaves about 9000 h.p. available."

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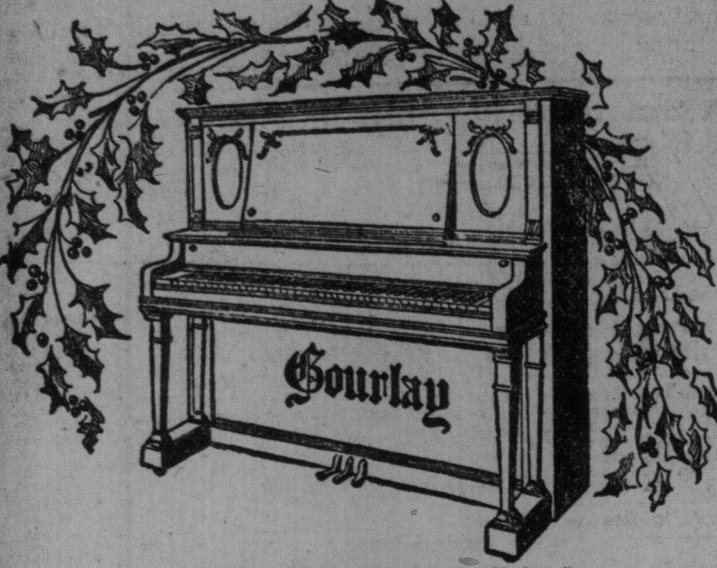
