FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF
THE MANAGERS OF
THE ORPHAN'S HOME AND FEMALE AID SOCIETY.

In presenting their report for the preceding year, the Managers of this admirable institution have again to record their sense of its continued and continuing success, affording to them, and they are sure to the members of the association at large, the liveliest and most heartfelt gratification, and the assurance that their efforts to promote the objects of "the charity" may not be in vain.

There are at present in the Home 94 children, 50 boys and 44 girls, of whom 51 have received during the year, and in the same period 43 have left, 16 having been apprenticed out, 5 adopted, 20 taken back by their parents or guardians, and 3 induced to leave.

This compared with the statements of former years, will show that there has been a steady increase in the number of children admitted, while of those taken from the Home the number has been greater than in any preceding year.

The health of the children during the year has been on the whole good, some of them only having had a cutaneous affection for which they have been carefully treated by the attending physician, Dr. Ogden, whose services have been always so cheerfully given, and while so affected they have been kept separate from the other children. A consideration of the propriety of this induced the Managers, under the advice of Dr. Ogden, to provide a distinct department in the building for such patients, and accordingly the upper part of the east wing was laid off into two bedrooms, and a staircase made connecting with the ground floor, and all communication with the main building cut off, and the Managers are happy to be able to say that it has effected a great improvement and answers the purpose admirably. The alterations were made under contract at an expense of \$114.

The condition and management of the children under the matron, Mrs. Holmes, has been in every other respect satisfactory, as has also been their progress in their studies under their teacher, Miss Scott.

The Managers have much pleasure in referring to the Treasurer's accounts for the year, showing the sum of \$3,419 11 as the gross amount received for the benefit of the Home from all sources, including the balance of \$524 51 from the preceding year, while the expenditure is shown to have been \$2,885 83, leaving a balance of \$298 88 at the credit of the account to begin the year with. In the item of expenditure, it will be seen is included the sum of \$300 12 laid out in alterations and improvements in the building, which cannot of course be termed ordinary expenditure. Under the advice of the committee of council, it was deemed prudent to make a permanent investment on the security of real estate of the \$1,000 invested in gas stock, and the sum of \$235 from the general funds to make up the requisite sum, and mortgages have accordingly been taken for the amount of \$1,200, yielding a semi-annual interest.

The Managers have much pleasure in recording the generous bequest of \$800 by the late Hon. James Gordon, left by his will for the benefit of the Home, as announced to them by his executors, and also in alluding with thankfulness to the unceasing liberality of the many friends of the Protestant Orphans, and in particular to that of the Orangemen, from whom donations from all parts of the Province are continually pouring in, materially aiding in the support and maintenance of the Home, on whose behalf at the entertainment given at the Crystal Palace on the late anniversary of the birth of our beloved Queen, the handsome sum of \$354 was taken up and handed over to the Treasurer by Messrs. Fleming and Irwin, in the name of the Orangemen, besides the sum of \$46 contributed by various lodges throughout the country, for all which the members of the association cannot feel too grateful.

Nor must they omit to to acknowledge the constant contributions by the butchers and market gardeners of the St. Lawrence and St. Patrick's markets, at all times most cheerfully and readily given, and by which the expenses of the charity are so very much lessened.

The Managers have also to notice the pleasing fact of a communication having been received last February from Mr. Charles, Secretary to the Reformatory and Refuge Union in London, England, informing them that an International Reformatory Exhibition was to be held in London, during the month of May, and requesting contributions in work from the children of our Home.

Accordingly a box containing such articles as the children could prepare in the short time allowed them, was forwarded by Express to London in April, and in due time it is hoped that a pleasing account will be transmitted of its reception, and that good results will follow from the circumstance of

the Institution's fame having thus extended itself to the other side of the Atlantic.

In concluding their report, the Managers feel that while much has been done to further the great objects of this House of Charity, and while they believe its beneficial influence has been extensively appreciated and felt, and it has been the means under Providence of rescuing many an unsheltered orphan and giving him the blessings of education and a home, fitting him to go out among the honest yeomanry of the country, who have come to regard the Home as a training school for the boys and girls that they require—while all this affords matter for pleasing reflection, yet that much remains to be done, and they would fervently hope that the efforts heretofore exerted in its behalf will continue to be put forth, so that in all time to come the "PROTESTANT ORPHANS' HOME" in Toronto may be found to be an eminently useful and flourishing institution.
