interview granted the United "This is the most important meeting since the Treaty of Versailles, was signed," Marx continued, "and for the time-I repeat for the first time—the

Allies are treating us on equal The German Chancellor seemed to consider this the most important factor in making for

a successful outcome. "I am very glad to say," he volunteered, "that Premier Herriot, notwithstanding great opposition in certain political circles in France and even in his entourage, has stood firm. The majority of the French people

want peace and quiet." Evacuation Essential

Asked concerning the all-important question of military evacuation of the Ruhr, Marx said:-

"It is essential-so far as we are concerned-and it is closely united with application of the experts' plan. "We hope to sign the treaty to morrow or at least by Friday morning, but this agreement is only a preliminary for future conferences between Germany and the Allies singly." "The commercial treaty to be consummated with France," the Chancellor said, "is of the highest importance to both countries."

"If the Comite des Ferges, which represents the highest political factor in France, is willing to come to an agreement, the treaty will be one of mutual reciprocity," he added.
Marx, however, evades the question of whether France would be treated as a "most favored nation." He contentd himself with saying:-"Germany can never grant free en-try of ore and potash into the Rush, nor can she make too great concessions







Frank Carvell as a fighting Liberal, prominent in the ranks of the Opposition Party in the House of Commons, foremost in the Public Accounts Committee, and an eager investigator where there was any evidence of fraud or guaft, and Frank Carvell as a minister of the Crown in the Union Government, were two different personalities. In the first relation he was a bitter partisan, seeing but little good in his opponent, eager to trip him up, relentless in his pursuit of facts or arguments to his detriment, and always cultivating that side of his nature which saw eager to trip him up, relentless in his pursuit of facts or arguments to his detriment, and always cultivating that side of his nature which saw but little good in his adversaries. Frank Carvell as a Unionist doffed his partisan mantle, mingled and mixed with his opponents freely and soon ascertained that few of them had horns or tails and that their particular political partisan clothes thrown into the discard were very similar in texture to those he had worn in the past. The Union Government accomplished many things and not among the least of them was the getting together of public men who formerly had no personal appreciation of each other. Carvell found that many of his bitterest opponents had qualitles he had never suspected them of possessing. And with that fairness so characteristic of him he did not fail to recognize the ability and spirit of many who had formerly been personally antagonistic to him. Let me illustrate. Ten years ago in 1914, a royal commission was holding an inquiry in this city into charges in connection with the construction of the Valley Railway and the administration of the Valley Railway and the administration of the Crown Lands. When many of them realize that they can no longer depend upon so good a friend they will surely appreciate the nature of his assistance and the spirit that prompted it.

PAY LAST TRIBUTE TO FRANK CARVELL

Many of Country's Leaders Attend Funeral—Eulogy Delivered.

Woodstock, N. B., Aug. 12-On the banks of the Meduxnekeag, from the modest cottage which he loved so well, all that was mortal of Hon. Frank B. Carvell, late chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners of Canada, was taken to his last resting place this afternoon, amid the tears and heartfelt sorrow of relatives, political friends and opponents. The deep respect in which he was held and general sorrow at his passing were evidenced by the immense concourse of people that assembled to pay the last tribute to this highly esteemed citizen and distinguished statesman.

The funeral procession was the longest seen here in many years. The services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. R. G. Fulton, of St. John, president of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Methodist Conference; Rev. J. T. Cavers, pastor of the Woodstock Methodist church, and Rev. H. F. Rigby, of St. Luke's Anglican church.

"It is not my intention to speak of Mr. Carvell as a public man. The newspapers and records of the country will give full tribute to the great qualities of statesmanship and outstanding ability he possessed. I want briefly to speak of Mr. Carvell as a friend. To those who knew him, who were permitted to enter into that inner circle, he was a friend of the cleverest type. We have many acquaintances but not always many friends. There is a vast difference. My friendship with Mr. Carvell goes back over a period of more than 20 years. I have known him un-Carvell goes back over a period of more than 20 years. I have known him under all the varied conditions of that history-making time. Some think he was always the politician, the campaigner. But it was a delight to enter into his home life, where all the noise and storm of political strife were excluded and there discover the richness of his mind, his intimate knowledge of current events and his great fund of general information.

calls Him Idealist.

"Mr. Carvell was an idealist of the highest order. It was this some failed to understand. I know that what to some was the evidence of unrelenting pursuit of a political enemy was rather his intolerance of the unworthy. It was this, in the first flush of his public life, which attracted him to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He saw in the great Liberal leader the fine qualities he so deeply venerated. Admiration begot association, and then began that friendship which never ceased even in the testing days of Union Government and conscription. I remember how deeply he showed his feeling when telling me of the break when the question of conscription led him to leave his party and become a member of a Government under the leadership of Sir Robert L. Borden. But it was his ideal, his consistency to the ideal, which forced him to make that break. He must be true to conviction no matter what the cost, and to him the cost of that break was beyond expression.

"No pen nor address can today do justice to our departed friend. It will need the pages of the historian to show the man's true worth. We mourn the passing of a great intellect, a master of detail, an untiring worker. But for those who knew him best and understood his fine qualities of heart and soul, our friend, wortly and true, tested and tried, has gone from us."

Disease Will Disappear Within 25 Years.

New York, Aug. 13. - "Within twenty-five years there will be no more tuberculosis," declared Sir Leonard tuberculosis," declared Sir Leonard Rogers, C. I. E. E., one of England's foremost physicians at the International Conference on Tropical Diseases held in Kingston, Jamaica, from July 21 to August 8. Sir Leonard, who has spent most of his life combatting diseases in the British colonies, pins his faith to sodium morrhuate, a tuberculosis remedy which he discovered and subsequently applied with astonishing success.

The remedy, a sodium sale obtained

The remedy, a sodium sale obtained from the codfish, was first used by the English physician in treating leprosy patients in the tropics. His results, Sir Leonard said, was even more successful than those of the much lauded chaulmoogra oil. The doctors noticed, in the case of lepers, that an intravenous injection of sodium morrhuate destroyed the reprosy bacillus in the body, causing a clearing up of all

worth of sodium morrhuate will sunce for a thousand patients and there is nothing complicated in the method of administration."

In outlining the treatment to the conference, the physician produced statistics showing that his claims for the remedy were well founded. These showed that in all cases that were not hopelessly chronic, improvement was manifested from almost the hour of injection and continued until the patient was cured.

PUT CANADA EAST ON BASEBALL MAP

'Sportlife" Pays Tribute to Joe Page in Sketch of Interest.

Under the title "The Man who put Eastern Canada on the Baseball Map" Eastern Canada on the Baseball Map" there is an article of much interest to St. John sport followers in the August number of "Sportlife," formerly "Sporting Life," published in Philadelphia and very widely read. The article is written by "Jim Nasium" and deals with our friend Joe Page, of the C. P. R. who has done much for the advancement of St. John in sporting matters along several lines. After some paragraphs referring to the influence for good that sport has on a country and its people the writer goes on to say:—

When Lacrosse Ruled.

The time was when Lacrosse was the national summer sport in Canada, hockey being its national winter sport as it is now. Nothing has yet appeared to take the place of hockey as the national sport of Canada in winter time, and owing to natural reasons it probably never will. But when, back in the spring of 1889, an American baseball player moved to Montreal and established a residence there, it was the first step in the beginning of the end of Lacrosse as the national summer sport of Eastern Canada and in the spread of baseball northward.

That American baseball player was Joe Page, now connected with the passenger traffic department of the Canadian Pacific Rialway and president of the Quebec, Ontario and Vermont Baseball League, last year's Eastern Canada Circuit, who prior to his moving to Montreal in 1889 had been a player in the old Michigan State League and other organizations and only the fall before had been signed
