






Maclure Sclanders, the able commissioner of Saskatoon, on the present crop situation, contains not only a good view of the prospects for this autumn but also some very important considerations too often overlooked, upon the economic position of the whole of Central Saskatchewan and much of the territory adjacent to it. "The principal crops here are of the pioneering agricultural type; viz., wheat, oats, barley and flax. Every new district starts with such crops; in due course mixed farming is thereafter evolved. It is interesting here to mark that

"From every possible standpoint it would seem to me that crop conditions this year are considerably more favorable than for some years past. Never have our fields looked healthier or of better color. It is my impression that wheat will average for this province probably a couple of bushels per acre more than last year, and perhaps it may turn out even a little better. With the continuance of our present splendid weather, the quality will, of course, average very satisfactory, and damaged grain—feed—will not be anything like so abundant as during the past two years.

"When we consider the very broken and unsatisfactory falls of the past couple of years, at least, I am satisfied that our harvest work should be through earlier this year. Cutting ought to commence in some parts about 17th August, but my impression is that it will not be general throughout this district until between the 21st and 25th. This is just about normal.

Hints to Mothers of Young School Children By CAROLINE COE

Don't make the mistake of bundling up your child's throat every time it goes out. In the morning after its bath pour cold water over your hands and rub its throat, chest and back with it. Then rub it with a coarse towel. If you do this you will find your child will be immune from colds,

See that your child's feet are kept dry. Overshoes are indispensible, as they can be taken off at the schoolhouse, leaving the feet warm and dry.

Be very sure that your little girl's hair is perfectly clean. It should be washed every two weeks. The best time to do this is at night. Make a suds of white castile soap and rub well into the roots and then rinse in many waters. Vermin will seldom stay in a perfectly clean head, but if you find traces of them rub extract of larkspur all over the head and wash it off in the morning.

Visit the school and see that the chair in which your child sits and the desk in front of him is the right height. Look at the ventilation of the room. Insist upon plenty of fresh air. It is of more importance than heat. Do not let your children kiss other children in the public school nor try on others' clothing or hats. Never let them eat fruit or condy that have been handled by others.

Neither must they put their fingers pennies or nickels in their mouth. Teach them to keep their mouths shut when out of doors. To habitually breath through the nose will often prevent one contracting the germ of a cold.

Washington, Aug. 20—The house lobby investigating committee yesterday continued to probe the statements of I. H. McMichael, one-time chief page of the house, that representative James T. McDermott, of Illinois, had been given \$7,500 to work against a "loan shark" bill for the district of Columbia, by pawnbrokers affected by the bill.

### PIPE WATER FORTY-FOUR MILES INTO CALGARY

Calgary, Aug. 20-A pipe line fortyfour miles long to bring water for the citizens of Calgary, from a spot high in he foot-hills of the Rocky Mountains.

the foot-hills of the Rocky Mountains, is the plan which has been drafted out by A. W. Ellson Fawkes, waterworks engineer of this city.

At present Calgary gets pure, ice cold water from the Elbow river, the intake being situated about twelve miles west of the city. The new plan is to go thirty-two miles farther up the river and build a gravity line which will do away with the necessity of pumping, either for fire fighting or any other purpose.

It is expected that the plan will cost more than a million dollars, but the great pressure that will be obtained will prove a big saving in the long run, as the maintenance cost will be small once the pipe line is built. A FAMILY ROW ON IN SUNBURY COUNTY

J. Bell, government agent at Fort Smith, sent out by the dominion forestry department. Pierre Squirrel, chief of a tribe of northern Indians, who was guide for the party, estimates there are fully 200 animals in the herds.

The buffalo resemble the American bis—on, from which they descended, but life in two and threes in the summer, herding together in the winter for protection against the timber wolf, their natural comment. It is announced here that the government will take steps at once to prevent the extermination of the herds by hunters and further protect the animals by increasing the wolf bounty. Harry V. SPOTS ON THE SUN.

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

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

## GERMANY AND PRUSSIA AT ODDS

Latter Wins Second Round Of Secular Fight

### RECENT DIET ELECTIONS


The Standing of Kaiser Wilhelm in the Matter-Electoral Reform as Democratic as That in Germany Must Come Before Conflict Ends

(Times' Special Correspondence) Berlin, Aug. 6-Prussia is victoriou n another round of her secular fight with Germany. The recent diet elections ended without any material party change. The solid Conservative party which is the bulwark of Prussian hegemony in Germany came back nearly as strong as it started; and its Centre ally came back actually as strong. In the old diet the Conservatives had 215 members out of 443, so that they lacked only seven for an absolute majority. In the new diet they have 203. The 103-strong Catholic Centre, which tradition declares cannot be changed in strength, confirmed the tradition by returning with 103. The National-Liberals gained a few seats; and the Socialists who start ed with six members have now ten. But roughly, Prussia's diet retains the party divisions which were established nearly thirty years ago. For practical purposes it is a Conservative diet. And the meaning of that is that Prussia, which is essentually the Conservative state, will continue to rule all Germany, and to baffle all efforts to modernize and liberalize the German constitutions.

Prevents Consolidation with Germany. The recent diet elec

nght which more than any factor prevents the complete consolidation of the empire. The states of Germany and the mass of Prussians themselves resent the domination of Prussia in imperial concils. A certain domination, they admit, is inevitable because Prussia owns 184,558 of the empire's 208,780 square miles, and 40,165,000 of the 64,925,000 population. But the perils of too much Prussian domination were foreseen.

Bismarck, Prussian though he was, devised special safeguards in order to prevent Prussia from incurring the jealousy of her weaker allies. He based the Reichstag on universal suffrage, thus putting a democratic counterpoise to the bureaucratic Prussian state; he gave public assurances to Bavaria and Saxong that the rights of the separate states would be respected; and he laid down financial rules to prevent the states feeling their association with Prussia to be a burden.
