BRITISH AVIATOR IS KILLED

Monoplane He Was Testing Buckled as He Was Traveling 60 Miles an Hour

(Canadian Press) London, Feb. 17.—Graham Gilmour, one of the best known among British aviators, was instantly killed this morning, by a fall with his monoplane from a height of 380 feet.

THE NEW PRESIDENT CUTS OFF HIS QUEUE

Yuan Shi Kai Also Borrows Some Millions—Missionaries Returning to Toronto

London, Feb. 17.—Yuan Shi Kai tonight cut off his queue, says the correspondent of the Daily Mail at Peking, telegraphing on Friday. He still, however, is unwilling to hurt the feelings of the Manchurians and deplores the public rejoicing over his election to the presidency of the republic. The acting president of the province of Chi Li has loaned Yuan \$1,250,000 for his present needs.

SIR EDWARD GREY IN HOPEFUL SPEECH

Much Better Relations Now Between Great Britain and Germany

(Canadian Press) Manchester, Eng., Feb. 17.—Sir Edward Grey, the secretary of foreign affairs, made an optimistic speech here last night, on the present relations of Great Britain and Germany. Referring to the visit of the secretary, Haldane to Berlin, Sir Edward said the relations in regard to details of the statements made by Premier Asquith in the House of Commons and Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg in the Reichstag did not imply that there was any lack of cordiality between the two powers.

FOR EIGHT HOUR DAY

Liberal Leader in Ontario Proposes Legislation for Underground Laborers

Toronto, Feb. 17.—M. N. Rowell, leader of the opposition, proposed in the legislature today to secure an eight hour day for laborers who do underground work. He will introduce a bill to this effect on Tuesday. In specifying "eight hours," he would have the time taken up in descending and ascending from the scene of labor included. He would extend the hours of labor in cases of emergency or imminent danger to life or property.

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BENCH OF NOVA SCOTIA

INVEST AT HOME

"Let us put our brains and our money into home enterprises." This sentence, from the Maritime Merchant, might with profit be made the slogan of the people of the lower provinces, who in years past lost so much money in other fields.

The Merchant, in the article from which the above sentence is taken, refers to a statement to the effect that a group of business men from a Nova Scotia town talk of making a trip to the west in the spring in search of land investments.

While recognizing their perfect right to do so, and admitting that some people who invest in western lands make money out of it, the Merchant points out that all do not reap a profit; for some loss and others have money tied up for years.

At the same time, profitable home industries are needing capital and good chances for profitable home investment are neglected.

Along a line of discussion is a letter lately written by the Hon. Mr. C. P. Phelan, of Victoria. Referring to an advertisement of western town lots, he urges investors to choose rather the rising industries of their own town.

"I am looking steadily forward," writes Mr. Phelan, "to the time when this province of Nova Scotia shall verily be the workshop of the world and this end cannot be obtained if our people scatter their resources in the West. Lots in the west may or may not give a profit on the venture, if any man better to see before you say. You do know that rising industries in the Maritime provinces are calling on you for your support and are offering a fair return for your money. Please do not allow any western investment to lure you from your allegiance to your native land."

This is wise counsel, especially at the present time, when a great forward movement in these provinces has begun. The city and its possibilities of expansion, and must be prepared to prove their faith by their works; otherwise there could be nothing but stagnation or decay.

A HINT FOR ST. JOHN

MANY people have wondered why the Citizens Committee in Montreal, which swept the boards for reform in civic affairs two years ago, failed so completely this year. The explanation offers an explanation.

"The recent elections have proved disastrous to a private of the Citizens Committee. Two years ago, the members who then constituted the Citizens Committee came out unflinching and stated emphatically who they would support and who they would not support. The result was that they achieved a notable victory and demonstrated their usefulness. In connection with the recent elections, things were entirely different. The members of the present committee dilly-dallied with the issues and the men, and only gave their half-hearted support. Instead of being leaders in the reform movement, they left the whole matter in the hands of others."

The Shareholders' charges that the Citizens Committee this year yielded to the influence of a certain powerful interest, which was not interested in reform movements, and adds: "It is unfortunate that the Citizens Committee did not take a more determined stand in the late contest than they did. Their half-hearted approval or condemnation of certain men was more disastrous than their total withdrawal from the campaign would have been."

There is a Citizens Committee in St. John. Last year it swept the boards for reform, and for the commission plan of government. If this year it should fail to work as hard and as heartily to secure the right kind of men as commissioners, it would, like the Montreal committee, lose prestige and help in a measure to undo its own work. The hint from Montreal is worth taking, and the time of the elections draws near.

MR. MORRIS'S ATTITUDE

Teaching the political situation in Northumberland county, the North Shore Leader, Hon. John Morrisey's organ, says: "The Hon. John Morrisey was perfectly frank with his leader when he offered his resignation, if the premier desired it and have party lines drawn. It has been shown in the past that Liberals possess a good deal of brains and political acumen and it is a wise policy of the premier not to prejudice any of the vast number of Liberals who supported his party in 1908 against his administration in the coming contest. If certain persons do not care to follow Mr. Fleming's provincial politics thoroughly independent of federal issues, they should withdraw from the party entirely. When men do not care to agree with their leader, they lose their usefulness. Instead of being a benefit to a party they become a burden for the party to carry."

These observations should have a further tendency to warm things up in Northumberland. In the course of his speech at the nomination, Mr. Morrisey told his hearers that "he could not be charged with being a very partisan party man, and if again elected to Fredericton he would work, as in the past, in the best interests of the county and province."

THE PEOPLE OF THE BAHAMAS CONTINUE TO VOICE THEIR DESIRE FOR UNION WITH CANADA.

The Borden navy is being established on the approval of the plan. It begins with a brass band.

Out of the various projects now receiving attention St. John should soon be able to secure cheap power.

The value of winter exports from St. John thus far is more than \$2,000,000 greater than for the like period last season.

The prospect for more friendly relations between Britain and Germany is more hopeful. The visit of Viscount Haldane to Berlin appears to have been well timed.

One of the most pleasing features of the St. John outlook is the prospect of new industries to give steady employment to many people.

It is a curious fact that, though several months ago it was announced that Hon. Mr. Hasen would go to London on important government business, his first journey is to Washington.

Daylight robbery on the streets of New York are reported. New York is becoming just like our own Vancouver.

The big naval budget has passed the French senate. It calls for an expenditure of \$278,000,000. That is a very considerable sum of money to be compelled to invest at one time in national insurance.

The new president of China prefers Peking to Nanking. Apparently he does not fully trust the republicans who have accepted him as the first president. Possibly the distrust is mutual, for Yuan Shikai is not without some skill in making a quick turn.

We are reminded that Canada now has a considerable Hebrew population, including many men of wealth and influence. A Hebrew delegation is Ottawa to protest against the nationalization of Queen's University unless the designation "Christian" be dropped.

One result of a reduction of the drunkenness to one dollar would be the more frequent appearance of some men in the police court. There is no prospect that such a change would lessen the duties of either the policeman or magistrate.

With a prison farm for habitual drunkards there would be some prospect of a change for the better.

New Brunswick hereafter will have a deeper interest in the deliberations of the Canadian Fruit Growers' Association. The growers and shippers in this province should endeavor to establish a standard of quality and for good packing, that would ensure a constant market for their fruit.

Careless packing of indifferent fruit has given Nova Scotia a poor reputation in some parts of western Canada.

Five murderers were hanged in Chicago yesterday. This is a mere item of daily news, but when one ponderes over it for a little time the need of having the people of China and India does not seem to be quite so urgent. Yet Chicago expends large sums to save distant people who are not murderers, but who are really very good citizens. Chicago is not peculiar in this respect.

Premier Murray of Nova Scotia has announced that his government is willing to assist the municipalities in erecting hospitals to combat tuberculosis. The sanitarium at Kentville is to be enlarged. In New Brunswick, the municipal authorities outside of St. John are not displaying much interest in this matter, and in St. John there is a dead-lock over a site for the proposed hospital. However, we are to have a provincial sanitarium at an early date.

INDEFENSIBLE DISMISSAL

Government Turns Out, With No Appearances, Fofeman of Experimental Farm (Kentville Chronicle) We do not know, however, that the government needs any defence for dismissing other than that the hungry job hunter is still pursuing and must be got rid of. Within a few days J. Rufus Starr, the very efficient foreman on the government experimental farm at Kentville has received notice from Ottawa of his dismissal. No reason, whatever, is assigned. The department, past or present has never found fault with Mr. Starr's work as foreman and director. On the contrary the department, through its reports, has always spoken in commendation of his work, and everyone in Kentville knows how faithfully and diligently he has pushed the work and cared for the interests of the farm. The dismissal could not have been made on grounds of political partisanship, for Mr. Starr does not profess to be a Liberal. It is doubtful if he ever voted the Liberal ticket in his life, and since his appointment to the farm has been unblemished, in fact and word, from participating in any way in political matters. His appointment was not a political one. When the department sought a man for the position, Mr. Starr was selected because he was a practical scientific farmer and no one questioned his political preferences. His dismissal could not have been made on the recommendation or with the knowledge of Mr. Foster, the member for this county, for Mr. Foster, while here during the week of the town elections, said personally to Mr. Starr: "I see no reason why you should not continue to work here." Who then urged Mr. Starr's dismissal? Has Mr. Foster handed over the duties of his position to any other man, or does he hunger for a job? Is he helpless in the hands of some little clique of self-appointed dictators? If so, he is too weak a man to represent Kings county. The people voted for a representative, not for a tool to be used by schemers. We cannot believe that Mr. Foster. He does not look like it. If he meant what he said to Mr. Starr, we believe he will assert his manhood. In the dismissal just sheer desperation on the part of the government to get rid of a body of hungry job hunters whom a labor union would call "Scabs."

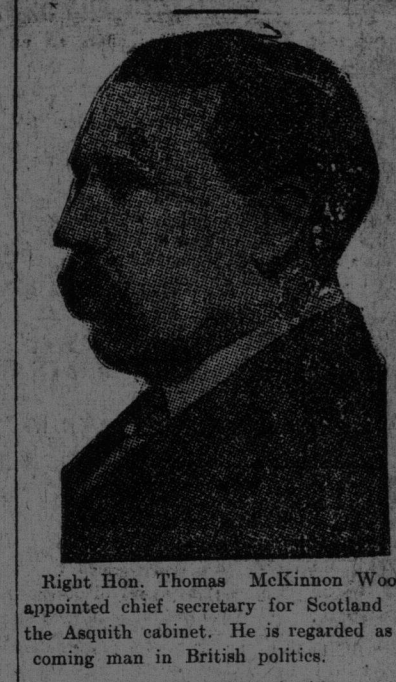
APPLE REPORT

In a report on the apple trade received Wednesday from George Johnson, Smithfield Market, Manchester, Eng., Mr. Johnson says:—"Since my last report on the state of the apple trade in our markets, the demand kept good and prices realized, with the exception of barrels arriving in poor condition, remained satisfactory all around up to Christmas. "Since then up to last week, the trade in apples has been seriously depressed, owing to the lock-out in our cotton industry, which of course curtailed very considerably the purchasing power of consumers and would-be buyers. The mills in our districts are now working again full time, we begin to feel a noticeable improvement and I have no doubt this better state of things will last at least up to the first arrivals of Australian & Tasmanian apples. "The crop in this part of the world, I am advised, will be heavy and premature; the first shipments are expected to arrive about end of March. With this word of warning I should advise you to ship right now away to the end of the season."

TRADE OF GREAT BRITAIN GROWS

Statement for 1911 With Special Relation to Business With Canada is issued

The "Accounts relating to the Trade and Navigation of the United Kingdom," recently issued for the month and twelve months ended December 31 last, show that, in spite of labor disturbances throughout the year and the interruption of business during the coronation holidays, the value of merchandise imported into and exported from the United Kingdom in 1911 exceeded those of 1910—the highest previous year recorded.

The rise of \$11 millions in the value of imports is the net result of increases of \$22 millions in "Food, Drink and Tobacco," and \$42 millions in "Articles wholly or mainly manufactured," and a decrease of \$53 millions in "Raw Materials and Articles mainly unmanufactured." The decrease in the last mentioned group is, however, more than accounted for by the fall in the prices of raw cotton and rubber.

The value of the imports of these commodities taken together was less in 1911 than in 1910 by some \$46 millions, but the quantities of both imported were greater in 1911, and had the prices of 1910 been maintained in respect of these two commodities the total value of the imports of the group would have shown an increase of about \$24 millions instead of a decrease of \$63 millions.

The increase in the value of exports of United Kingdom produce was largely due to the exportation, in increased quantities and at higher prices, of yarn and manufactures of cotton, the total value of these being greater by about \$69 millions in 1911 than in 1910. There were also increases exceeding \$7 millions under the heads of "Metals," "Chemicals," "Drugs, Dyes and Colors," and one of over \$5 millions under the head of "Apparel."

The foregoing remarks relate to merchandise only, the figures quoted do not include imports and exports of gold and silver. The total values of these (including bullion and specie) in 1911 were as follows:—Imports \$338 millions, exports \$277 millions, net imports \$61 millions.

Imports from Canada The values of the imports from Canada and of the exports and re-exports to the Dominion in 1910 and 1911 were as follows:—Imports in 1910, \$12,716,000; in 1911, \$11,807,000; Exports of United Kingdom produce in 1910, \$83,574,000, in 1911, \$85,988,000; Re-exports in 1910, \$14,488,000, in 1911, \$14,028,000. There was, thus, in 1911, a small decrease in imports, accompanied by small increases in exports and re-exports. The decrease in imports was chiefly due to reduced quantities and lower prices of wheat.

Among the principal articles included in the totals for 1911 given in the preceding paragraph were the following:—Imports—Wheat, \$28,413,000; Wheat meal and flour, \$8,610,000; bacon and hams, \$9,889,000; cheese, \$22,333,000; canned salmon and lobsters, \$4,403,000; apples (raw), \$3,914,000; wood, sawn or split, planed or dressed, \$14,350,000.

Exports of United Kingdom Produce—Iron and steel and manufactures thereof (so far as distinguished in the monthly accounts of Trade and Navigation), \$7,883,000; cotton piece goods, \$7,008,000; woolen and worsted tissues (including carpets and carpet rugs), \$13,385,000.

EVICTED AFTER LOT OF TROUBLE

Secretary of League Against Arbitrary Landlords Put Out of Home

NEWS LETTER FROM PARIS

Aged Religious Almost Lose Lives in Convent Fire—The Diplomats and the Ballet—The French as Authors—A Double Murder

(Times Special Correspondence)
New York, Feb. 15.—Within the last few years there has been a noticeable increase in the number of wife-deserters by men who, tiring of their marital ties, consider the divorce courts a useless waste of time and money, and take French leave. The legislature at its last session passed a law making it a felony for a father to desert his children, but this seems to have had no terror for thousands of unhappily married men. There is now a gallery of photographs of deserters with such information about them as will be helpful in finding and identifying them. Agents of the organization which has undertaken the task on behalf of the poorer wives of the city, have been established in various cities and through them the work of tracing the fugitives is being carried out.

The organization is being conducted on the same lines as the government secret service and has recourse to a hundred different sources of information. To date the results have been highly gratifying and hundreds of wives, with little children dependent on them for support, are now being supported in whole or in part by the reclaimed husband and father. So far no effort has been made to enforce the penal statute against them, because in that event the family would be sure to be the victim instead of the transgressing husband. Encouraged by the results achieved by the organization, it is now intended to have the work taken up by other organizations of the city on behalf of other women than those of the extremely poor classes to which the movement has to date been restricted.

Income of \$75,000 a Year

How much money should a minor be allowed to spend for his or her yearly maintenance? Every once and a while this question is put up to the courts by guardians and executors of estates, but so far no formula for answering it has yet been devised to which all the justices of the supreme court will subscribe. The question was raised again the other day when application was made to have the allowance of Frances E. Leggett, the daughter of a millionaire merchant, who died here a few years ago, raised from \$50,000 to \$75,000 a year.

The mother of the young girl thinks she should be educated abroad in preference to her own country.

Ultimately, when Mrs. Leggett attains her majority, she will have an income of something like \$75,000 a year. How she can now spend \$45,000 a year was not made clear, although it was said that she required a retinue of servants, special tutors, etc., besides a variety of wearing apparel suited to "various climates." Since there was no objection to the application from any one, and considering the young woman's heredity, the court gave its consent to the extra allowance.

CITY ROAD CASE

IN POLICE COURT

Four Women Under Arrest—The Assault Upon Constable Godfrey

In the police court this morning a case against May Tapley, charged with keeping a disorderly house in City Road and also with assisting a silver watch and \$5 from Harry Burchill of St. Martins, was begun. The prisoner pleaded not guilty to both charges. He had been asked about articles and after threatening to call in the police Mrs. Barry produced the watch. When he could not get his money back he called the police. He said he was under the influence of liquor yesterday and had to be held and taken all night in the house parlor. The value of the watch was shown \$7.

Sergeant Heineke told of being called into the house and making the arrests. When he searched about the money Mrs. Barry told him that Graham had taken the money from Burchill's clothes, but when threatened with arrest she also denied the money. She stated that she had found the money on the floor. Burchill denied the money and placed all hands under arrest. The witness said that three of the prisoners had been before the court before on a preliminary the same charge. The prisoner was remanded to jail.
