CANADA'S FRUIT CROP

The August fruit crop report of the Canadian department of agriculture has been issued. British Columbia is the banner fruit province this year. The report says:—

"There has been no improvement in the prospects for apples during the month of August. The apples that are on the trees have grown well, and there is a prospect for a medium quantity of very fine fall and winter fruit in all orchards that are reasonably well taken care of. In the orchards where the apples are not well cared for, the codling moth appears to have concentrated upon the few apples that are left. The scab is as bad as usual.
