NOVA SCOTIA RAILWAYS.
A Big Boom in Progress—The Plans
Central.
The Daily Sun of July 6 is informed
by Levi Young of the Bonaventure works,
who is one of the promoters and has re-
cently returned from a business trip to
Nova Scotia, that railway building is ac-
tively going on in that province.
The latest
scheme, and one that meets with most
popular favor, is the Hants Central rail-
way to run from Truro to Windsor direct
via the valley of the Kennebec river.
This scheme was taken in hand by E.
A. Charters of Sussex, N. S., who saw
the advantages and necessity for its
construction, and having arranged with
the directors of the Hants Central Rail-
way Company a definite line of action,
succeeded in interesting some American
brokers and capitalists in Boston, among
them being Mr. Winslow, M. B. Ham-
mond, broker, a Mr. Mudge, capitalist,
and a Mr. Crink, contractor, who have
looked into the merits of the proposed
route and expressed themselves ready
willing to float the bonds of the line
and construct the same.

Telegraphic Flash.
The entire length of the eclipse will be
a little more than two hours, and the total
darkness will occur at 12.25 p.m. when the
sun is at 46 degrees high.
Prof. Todd explained the situation of
his station, where the eclipse will be
best seen. It is about 125 miles inland near
Queens river, and 1000 feet above the
sea level. The position is at present
determined in 44 degrees 38' north

Terrible Disaster in a Coal Pit in France. Paris, July 4.—An explosion of fire-damp occurred in a coal pit in the commune of St. Etienne. Two hundred miners are employed. A number of bodies have been taken out of the pit. Two pits were affected by the explosion. One of these pits, the other is on fire. Sixteen bodies have been recovered. Two of the miners who were taken out alive are badly injured and they will probably die. Sixty horses employed in the mine were burned to death. The news of the disaster spread and hundreds of relatives and friends of the imprisoned miners, and their friends, were brought to the surface. There is no hope of rescuing any of the men now in the pit, all of whom have already perished.
