ECLIPSES, 1898.

In the year 1898 there will be six eclipses, three of the Sun and three of the Moon.

I.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, January 7. Visible generally in the Eastern part of North America, in South America, Europe, Asia and Africa.

II.—A Total Eclipse of the Sun, January 22. Invisible to America. Visible to Europe, the greater part of Asia and Africa, and to the Northern part of the Indian Ocean. Line of totality running through the Chinese Empire, India and Eastern Africa.

III.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, July 3. Invisible to North America. Visible generally in Europe, Asia and Africa.

IV.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, July 18. Invisible to North America. Visible to the South Pacific Ocean, and the extreme Southern part of South America. The line of Annularity passing through the South Pacific Ocean.

V.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, December 13. Invisible here.

VI.—A Total Eclipse of the Moon, December 27. Visible generally throughout North America, Europe, Asia and Africa.

USEFUL HINTS.



Have your recipes and prescriptions properly prepared at PARKE'S DRUG STORE, 16 Market Square.

CARPET WORMS—To banish, sprinkle turpentine around the edges of the carpet.

MOTHS—Use tar paper, camphor or naphthalin.

BEDBUGS—Corrosive sublimate 1 oz., alcohol 1 pint, mix, and when dissolved apply around the cracks of the walls and bedsteads. Also alum and water is good.

A little borax put in the water in which colored goods are to be washed will keep them from fading.

A GOOD DUSTER—Use the old sponge which has become soft and buy a new one at PARKE'S, 16 Market Square.

COCKROACHES—Dissolve a few peppermint lozenges in a pint of water and place where the cockroaches are. If they taste they die immediately of convulsions.

NIGHT SWEATS—Take of sulphate of quinine 1 dram, sulph. ac. aromat. $\frac{1}{4}$ oz., water 8 oz.; dose, teaspoonful before each meal and at bed time.

STARCH POLISH—Spermaceti $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., gum arabic $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., borax $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., glycerine $1\frac{1}{4}$ ozs., water 11 ozs. Melt together, and when cool add 2 ozs. alcohol. Use tablespoonful to $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. starch.

FURNITURE POLISH—A quick dryer, alcohol 8 oz., shellac 1 oz., linseed oil boiled 8 oz., spts. turp. 4 oz., ether 1 oz., aqua ammonia 1 oz., mix. Apply with a soft flannel cloth.


