IS DERELICT ON OCEAN? The Volturo hulk reported as dangerous—Other shipping.

The A. W. Perry arrived from Boston this morning with passengers and freight. The Norwegian steamer Amelia arrived last night from Gloucester to load apples.

The U. S. revenue cutter headquarters at Washington was notified yesterday that the European liners had reported that the bulk of the burned steamer Volturo was derelict in the path of navigation.

Assistant Secretary Newton says that the Volturo was abandoned at a place considerably eastward of the limits of the revenue cutter service.

Mr. Newton added, "does not undertake the destruction of derelict eastward of westernmost Cape Sable Island to the Bermuda Islands. It does not appear that any obligation rests upon our service to destroy a foreign derelict in mid-ocean."

Steamer Mackay-Bennett put to sea yesterday afternoon on a short repair job.

H. Milburn, marine superintendent of the U. S. Revenue cutter, is now in charge of the Mackay-Bennett.

Allen Line's Sardinian from Liverpool, bound for Halifax, was 35 miles northeast of Sable Island at 10 o'clock yesterday.
