The total number of teachers of all grades was 168,472, giving an average of 32 pupils per teacher. One zery remarkable thing about the school system is the large number of peachers employed without certificates,

the percentage of the whole being not less than 27.17. The percentage is, however, decreasing, but not too rapidly. The average salary in England of male teach average saiary in England of male teachers with certificates is \$737, of certificated female teachers, \$505; uncertificated males, \$330, and uncertificated females, \$275. The children's parents had consented to their being taken to England despite the Archbishop's warning. Many English women were in charge of the gathering when priests arrived at the exchange and read the Archbishop's pronouncement and appealed to the parents not to allow their children to go, emphasizing the dangers of allowing children to be sent to Soofalists' homes in England. The mothers of the children thereupon decided that they would not consent to the sending of the children, despite dissention murmurs from the fathers.
