HIS INNOCENCE Implicates Two Other Italians in Murder

KAMLOOPS, B. C., Aug. 1-Cedio was hanged at 9.20 this morning in the presence of jail officials and a few spectators. The execution should have taken place at eight o'clock, but was delayed owing to the confession he made yesterday afternoon. The con-fession stated that he was innocent of the crime charged against him, and named two others, Moravelli and Cag-listro, as instigators and perpetrators of the destruction of the King's Hotel at Niagara in November, 1906, which resulted in the death of Louise King-He affirmed that Moravelli was in-timate with King's wife and the inten-tion was to get rid of King. To effect this powder was carried into the house. He tried to warn King, but his imper-fect knowledge of English impeded him, and his warning was mistranslat-ed by Moravelli.


