

The Farmer's Corner. The Dairy Cow.

A writer in the English Agricultural Gazette says of dairy cows and their treatment, that taking quality and quantity as the test of excellence, cows are most productive from their second to their fourth calf.

It is stated that the Governors of Acadia College intend to apply to Rev. I. E. Bill in this Province and Rev. Isaiah Wallace in Nova Scotia, to undertake the collection of the \$100,000 which the Baptist Convention recently resolved to raise for the college.

One important desideratum in the dairy economy of this country is an improvement of the farm buildings. The practice of storing large quantities of hay in the sheds or shippens prevails to a large extent. We cannot conceive anything more injurious to the health of the cow, than to contain that every animal requires a certain cubic area of free breathing space, in order that the ordinary functions of life may proceed unimpeded; a free circulation of air, and an even temperature are conducive to health.

Cows in milk are particularly susceptible to atmospheric changes, hence the cow-house should be warm, but well ventilated. Low temperature reduces the flow of milk, hence cows in full profit should never be turned into the pastures during the winter months; gentle exercise and a very liberal supply of pure water is conducive to the health of all pregnant animals; we should therefore recommend that all in-calf cows have daily exercise, though not too many hours exposure during severe weather.

No animal more readily resents harsh treatment than the cow. This is practically demonstrated by the yield of milk that can be obtained by different individuals from the same animal. It is a curious fact that all excitement, whether arising from the stings of gad flies, hunting with dogs, or racing to the milking old, considerably lessens the yield of milk. I have mentioned this to remind you that kind treatment is of pecuniary value.

How to Manage Cuttings. In reply to a correspondent, the Floral Cabinet gives the following directions in regard to the making and managing plant of cuttings:

In selecting a cutting, a great deal depends upon the judicious choice, if the slip is too young and full of fresh sap, it will fade away from too much evaporation; if it is too old—hard and woody—it will take a great while to strike root.

You must take a cutting that is perfectly ripened, and is from a vigorous shoot, yet a little hardened at the base. It is also essential to have a bud or joint at or near the end of a cutting, as all roots strike from it; and the nearer it is to the base, the greater your chance of success.

Plant your cuttings in common red pots, filled full of rich loam and two inches of sand on top (common sand will do, but not sea sand); wet this thoroughly, and put the cuttings close around the edge of the pot, for if the bud or joint comes in contact with the surface of the soil, it seems to strike root more quickly. Pull off the lower leaves before you plant the cutting. Press the wet sand close around the tiny stem.
