MEETING OF BOARD OF TRADE

Bridge Matter Advanced Another Step—Imperial Oil Matter Up Again.

A meeting of the Board of Trade was held in the Firemen's Hall last Friday evening. In the absence of the President, the Vice-President, Mr. Geo. G. McKenzie presided.

Mr. D. A. Stewart, one of the delegates which went to Ottawa to further the bridge matter reported that they had interviewed the Minister of Public Works and with Hon. Mr. Wigmore, pressed strongly for an appropriation for the construction of the bridge this year.

They had been given every assurance that the matter would be dealt with at an early meeting of the government when the chairman of the delegation would be notified of their decision.

A telegram enquiring if the matter had been dealt with had been forwarded and the reply received that the matter had not been taken up.

Mr. Stewart also reported that while in Montreal he had interviewed the C. N. R. management in reference to the suburban train service to Campbellton from the east and had been led to understand that nothing could be done.

Considerable discussion took place on this question. It was felt that the railway management should provide some service to enable people to arrive at Campbellton during the day. The suggestion was made that even a passenger car on the fast freight would be an accommodation to any having business here.

This matter was left in the hands of the Transportation Committee and Mr. Stewart.

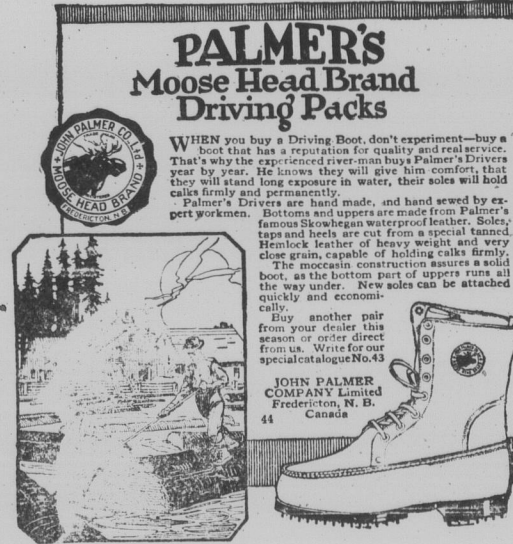

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FIGHT WEEDS WITH PROFITABLE CROPS

One Farmer's Success in Cleaning Field Shows What Can Be Done.

Why should human labor be wasted in fighting weeds? With an ordinary single-furrow walking plough, turning a 12 inch furrow, a man will walk over 10 miles in ploughing an acre over. Add to this the walking necessary for harrowing, cross harrowing and cultivating, and then calculate how much has been wasted when the yield is only one half or two-thirds as large as it would have been had it not been choked by weeds. This will give some idea to the cost of weeds to the farmer. Many weeds are able to survive the ordinary cultivation given in preparing the seed bed. These veteran weeds are amongst the worst enemies the farmer has to fight. Quack or couch grass stand out very prominently in this class.

Weeds of this kind should be fought with profitable crops. This has been done on many of the farms in Dundas county where the Com. of Conservation is conducting illustration work. One field of 7 acres which was badly infested by quack grass was ploughed in the autumn of 1919 and in the spring of 1920 was thoroughly cultivated frequently to keep it from showing green until well into June when it was sown to buckwheat at about double the amount per acre as is sown on clean land when a grain crop is the sole end in view. The farmer conducting this work reports his results as follows:

"The buckwheat grew so rank and heavy that we had to let it get dead ripe before we could cut it with the binder. We threshed 40 bushels to the acre in spite of the fact that some shelled on the ground. There is not a spear of quack to be seen this fall. The soil is very mellow and we have cultivated it two or three times since harvest. We intend to sow grain on it in the spring and seed it to alfalfa as the field is naturally well drained and is now in good condition."—F. C. Nunick

The White House, Bathurst's popular hotel, was destroyed by fire early Sunday morning. The fire was discovered about 1:30 o'clock, and the guests were aroused, all of whom got out of the burning building without injury, though some did not save all their personal effects. The loss of the White House will prove a great inconvenience to the travelling public, as it was the only hotel in the Northern town, the Robertson House having been destroyed by fire a few years ago.
