



Warning Against Mad Dogs.

The Provincial Board of Health The Provincial Board of Health is sending out its annual warning regarding the danger from rabies-infected dogs. The circular gives pointers upon how to detect rabies, and advises that where a person has been bitten the dog be chained up for ten days. In that time if the dog has rabies it will either be worse or will die. At the end of tendays, or before if the dog dies, the head should be sent to the Provincial Laboratory, Queen's Park, where an examination of the brain will be made. Where rabies is found to exist prompt steps will be taken to see that the person bitten is given proper treatment. Killing the dog before the disease has a chance to develop is not advisable, since it cannot be determined definitely whether the animal is infected or not.

Hotelmen Adjusting Things.

Hotel-keepers are beginning to set their houses in order against the day when the bar shall be no more. when the bar shall be no more. The Late Mrs. Johnson.


