A Rush for the New French Rentes-Suicide of a Ruined Russian Noble

DUBLIN, Jan 12.—Parnell, before starting for Limerick, made an address to a large crowd who stood on the platform of the railway station. He said he would do nothing to imperil the success of the movement to secure Irish independence, but on the contrary would do everything possible to further the Irish canse. He declared he would stand by the position he had assumed in the committee room-of the House of Commons, when he announced he was willing to sacrifice himself provided he saw the Irish cause safe. At most of the places at which the train conveying Parnell stopped on the way to Limerick yesterday there were friendly deputations waiting to receive him. At Monastervin there was a fight between rival partisans, but it was not serious. When the train arrived at Limerick Junction Parnell made a short speech. He said he had heard cheers given for Mr. O'Brien. Well, he also would call for cheers for O'Brien, and long might he live to soothe and heal animosities, and if possible restore union to their ranks. At Oola a hostile demonstration prevented Parnell from speaking. At Limerick Parnell received a most enthusiastic reception. Upon arriving at his hotel Parnell made a speech to the crowd from a window. He criticised the attitude of the priesthood in regard to the present crisis. He declared that while he was not permitted to say to what length he and Mr. O'Brien had traveled together at Boulogne, he might tell them without any breach of confidence that he himself was perfectly satisfied with the results of the conference.

London, Jan. 12.—The steamer Britannia, from Leith, came into collision with the steamer Bear, from Grangemouth, in the Frith of Forth, Scotland, at an early hour Sunday morning. The Bear sank immediately, her crew having no time to make any effort whatever to save themselves. Of the fourteen men on board the Bear twelve went down with the vessel. The two others were resoued. After the collision the Britannia, wish was badly damaged, transferred her 45 passengers to the steamer Thames, and was then taken in tow by that vessel, the steamersproceeding slowly in the direction of Leith. They had not gone far, however, before the hawser connecting the vessel was snapped asunder, and before another line could be carried to the damaged vessel, she gave a terrific plunge and sank beneath the waves. Forunately the crew had put on life belts after the collision with the Bear, and all with the exception of the chief engineer managed to keep afloat until they were picked up by boats from the steamer Thames. The chief engineer went down with the vessel, and nothing was seen of him again.

An Explosion That Was Mistaken for an Earthquake—Miles of Forest Leveled by the Shock.

Toledo, Jan. 10.—The magazine of the Bradford Nitro-glycerine Company located between Prairie depot and Badner, Wood county, 25 miles south of Toledo, exploded yesterday with an effect that was mistaken for an earthquake shock. No one was near the magazine at the time.

The force of the explosion was so terrific that the trees over many farms were broken and the ground is torn up for half a mile on every side of the yawuing chasm which now occupies the site of the magazine. The scattered farmhouses in the neighborhood had their windows broken.

Business Across the Border.

New York, Jan. 10.—Special telegrams to Bradstreet's show that there has been as yet no general revival from the period of inactivity customary at the opening of the new year. The exceptions have been at Boston, Philadelphia, Cincinnati and San Francisco, where the revival of the demand in leading lines has given rise to decidedly more activity relatively than has been observed elsewhere. Pen and Ink Portraits of Inter-esting Characters,

In my last letter I gave a short sketch of the Lieutenant-Governor of the Territories and a statement of his position in regard to the dispute then in progress in the Assembly. Since then the majority have presented and carried their reply to the speech from the throne, in which they clearly and vigorously protes; against the position assumed by his Honor and his decrimonious and intensely personal discussion which ensued in the House has not tended to decrease the interest or allay the feeling previously manifested in the community. It is not a matter of party politics, it is a bitter family quarrel, with the sympathies of the people in favor of the majority, and against the Lieutenant-Governor and his council directly, but indirectly against the Dominion Government. This being the case I thought it might not be without interest to your readers to learn something of the men who-constitute this much abused and bycotted Advisory Council, as well as of the leaders of the majority who are manfully battling against one man power in this country.

The birth place of the leader of the council, Dr. Brett, the honorable member for Red Deer, should insure his being a good man, if not a great one. He is an old Middlesex boy, born at Strathroy in the year 1851. Of Irish parentage, he lacks neither fire nor spirit; in fact, for the latter he professes to have a kindly—a politico professional regard. By profession a doctor and exponnder of both physical and legal constitutions, he has in the former attained marked success, while in the latter, his opponents claim, signal failure. The subjects of his professional operations in the one line are to be found, both living and dead I presume, at Arkona, Winnipeg and at Banff, where he was the builder and still is the proprietor of the far-famed sanitarium. His subjects in the other are the applauding, complaining and protesting people of the Northwest. The doctor stands over six feet high, of sandy complexion and wears a heavy, sandy mustache. He is a fluent and very vigorous speaker, who enforces his remarks by a liberal use of his hands, and in the heat of discussion has been known, more than once, to strike an attitude, as well as his desk. The leader of the former, as well as the present Advisory Council, he took office on the distinct understanding that the Lieutenant-Governor alone should control the expenditure of the Dominion fund, and apparently sincere in his belief that this is the correct interpretation of the law, he is prepared to stand by the Lieutenant-Governor in his endeavor to administer the affairs of the country along these lines.

Next to Dr. Brett, and occupying the second seat to the right of the Speaker, is Mr. B. P. Richardson, member for Wolseley, one of the youngest and ablest gentlemen in the House. Fair, tall and slim, with a mild and intellectual cast of features, you would take him for a preacher or teacher rather than a politician. Born in the county of York in the year 1857, he moved to the N

Mr. Secord was the representative of South Regina, in the old Northwest Council, and continues to represent the same constituency in the present Assembly. Born near Niagara, he received his education at the Brantford High School, in company with Hon. Mr. Justice MacMahon, and was called to the bar in 1871. He commenced practice at Tilsenburg, and continued to reside there until 1882, when he moved westward and took up his home in Regina. In appearance Mr. Secord somewhat resembles Hon. G. W. Ross. Not often does he favor the House with an address, but when he does it is always clear and to the point, a faculty which many of the members appear to woefully lack. He entered the Advisory Council in 1889, and was appointed a Q. C. in 1890. Space will not permit me to describe the leaders of the Opposition, but I will endeavor to do so in a future epistle.

CRITICISMS OF GENERAL BOOTH'S NEW SCHEME.

While Prof. Huxley is criticising and ridiculing Gen. Booth's new departure in England, Prof. Robert Ellis Thompson, D.D., of Pennsylvania University, is speaking warm words in praise of it in America. Prof. Thompson is himself an Englishman, and a man of excellent abilities, in spite of his "protectionist" crotchets, for his subject is political economy in an institution placed in the very heart of spoon-fed industries. But this does not hinder him from regarding sympathetically the work of Gen. Booth and the Salvation Army in London and other congested centers of popula-tion in England. "That organization," Prof. Thompson says, "is only beginning to have justice done to it by those who stand outside it. The religious public naturally took oftense at its singularity and its vulgarity of method and paraphernalia. But experience has shown that these were admirably adapted to the human material on which Mr. Booth and his associates had to work. It was quite useless to carry the manners and speech of the cloister into a population whose 'cul-ture' is that of the music hall. With Paul's warrant to become all things to all men for the sake of winning them, the Sal-vation Army devised a style of Christian propaganda exactly adapted to the needs of the East London 'roughs.' It made religion speak Cockney, and lay aside the airs and graces and dignities of the educated classes. And under these startling novelties of manner and method there throbbed hearts warm with love and pity for the

So it has come to pass that the Army has

problem in its effort to save in-dividuals from ruin. It has its shelters, food depots, labor yards and industrial workshops, and with these the Gospel goes hand in hand to make a really human life possible. But Gen. Booth is not numan life possible. But Gen. Booth is not satisfied with what the army has already attempted, and for his larger operations he pleads with the public for £1,000,000 to carry out his plan of rescue and deliverance. "No one, I think," Prof. Thompson says, "can close the book without hoping that Gen. Booth will be furnished with the means for making his great experiment." Nevertheless he does not agree with the scheme in some of its parts, nor yet with some of the statements or inferences of Mr. Booth. He does not believe for instance, that there has been a great moral retrogression in England, or even in London. Those who are familiar with the history of the matter, he asserts, know the contrary. "A recent study of a file of a London news paper of 1762-63, and of another of 1822-23, leads me to say that, while the evils he depicts have grown in volume with the growth culation, they have not grown in Even London in 1890 could not Intensity. It always has been a danger, he points out, that the social side of the work would come to predominate, as the whole trend of modern thought is in that direction. "To bring a man's spirit into vital rela-tion to God is to effect a vastly greater change in his real environment than can be effected by any kind of colonization." Prot. Huxley, it ought to be observed, sees nothing but evil in Mr. Booth's great scheme, and in his last letter on the subject in the London Times he says some severe things on one and the other. Of the scheme itself he says: "We are, in fact, in sight of a financial catastrophe like that of Law, a century ago. Only it is the poor who will suffer."




