Bavarian Soldiers Commit Suicide. MUNICH, July 5.—A private soldier hanged himself at his home in this city yesterday. He left a note saying that the abuse to which he had been subjected by a non-commissioned officer had degraded him so that he did not care to live.

The Camperdown at Malta. VALETTA, Malta, July 5.—The battle-ship Camperdown, which ran into and sunk ship Camperdown, which ran into and sunk the Victoria, arrived here to-day. She was escorted by the Inflexible. The Cam-perdown is the temporary flagship of Rear Admiral Markham, his own flagship, the Trafalgar, being laid up here for repairs. The full extent of the damage sustained by the Camperdown in the collision has not been made public.

Had a Howling Time.

The King could persuade no statesman of ability to become Minister of Finance, and finally made up his raind to lay down the reins of government. In spite of the King's personal popularity, the tendency of the people was toward a republican form of government, which they have now formally declared.

The work of rescuing the living miners and recovering the bodies of the dead is being pushed as rapidly as possible in lagram's colliery. Volunteers for the work of rescue are plenty. Little progress was made last night as the inner workings were still full of gas. Bodies can be seen in different parts of the mine, but they are pinned down with rocks and timbers, and it will take some time to remove them. Late this evening the rescuers had brought 88 bodies to the surface. Two men were Late this evening the rescuers had brought 88 bodies to the surface. Two men were brought up unconscious, but still breathing. Six men who had sustained no injury wintever, but had been imprisoned behind a huge mass of debris, were also dug out.

London, July 5 .- For fear there might be a mistake as to the names of the royal stated that on May 16, 1893, "Her Majesty in Council was pleased to declare her consent to a contract of martimony between his Royal Highness Prince George Frederick Ernst Albert, Duke of York, Earl of Javeness and Baron Killarney, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, son of His Royal Highness the Prince and his consert Her Royal Highness the Princes Herincess of Wales, and Hes Serene Highness the Princes Victoria May Augusta Louise Olga Pauline Claudine Agnes, daughter of her Royal Highness Princess Mary Adelaide Wilhelmina Elizabeth and His Highness Franca Paul Charles Louis Alexander, Duke of Teck, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath."

Prince George of Wales, as he was styled until then, became Duke of York ea Queen Victoria's birthday, 1892, when it was announced: stated that on May 16, 1893, "Her Majesty

was announced:
"The Queen has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the great seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to bear this day's date (Whiteand freiand, to bear this cays date (white-hall, May 24, 1892), granting unto her Majesty's grandson, His Royal Highness Prince George Frederick Ernest Albert of Wales, K. G., and the heirs male of his body lawfully Legotten, the dignities of Baron Killarney, Earl of Inverness and Dukand Vok."

Since 1827 the title had been in abeyance until a year ago. The dukedom of Albany was given to Prince Leopold, the fourth son of Queen Victoria. It is now held by

on of Queen Victoria. It is now held by all young son, who was born in 1884.

The other titles of Prince George of Wales are new creations. The morganatic wife of Augustus, Duke of Sussex (sixth non of George III), who was formerly Lady Cecilia Underwood, was on her marrisge created Duchess of Inverness. She died in 1870.

It will surprise many to learn that it should have been necessary to "selevate" a "royalty" to the peerage. Yet, in spite of their royal titles and special precedence, not only the grandsons but even the younger sons of the reigning sovereign are, in contemplation of law, commoners until they are created peers. The heir-apparent doubtless is born and not made a peer, since he is Duke of Coruwall by birth, although he is Prince of Wales by creation. The Duke of York was born at Marlborough House, St. James, the residence of the Prince of Wales, built in 1707-1710 by Sir John Vanbrugh for the great Duke of Marlborough, who died there in 1722. In 1817 the house was purchased by the Crown for Princess Charlotte and Prince Leopoid, and it was the Prince's house for many years. Queen Adelaide lived in it after the death of William IV. 
